THE HIGHLIGHTS ...

CHAMPS AGAIN: Miami University's football team captured a share of its third straight Mid-American Conference East Division title in 2005, posting a 7-4 record and 5-3 league record to forge a three-way tie for the division title with Akron and BGSU.

FINISHING STRONG: After a disappointing 0-2 start, Miami overcame an array of injuries and other challenges to win seven of its final nine games and post the program's fifth straight season with at least seven wins.

MAKE IT A DOZEN: Miami posted a winning record for the 12th straight season, making it one of only eight NCAA Division I-A programs nationally to own a string of 11 or more consecutive campaigns above .500.

A RARE FEAT: Miami became only the sixth NCAA Division I-A football program to feature a 3,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard wide receivers. The RedHawks were just the third team to achieve the feat in 11 games.

TAKING IT AWAY: Miami's defense forced a whopping 35 turnovers during 2005 to rank third nationally at the end of the regular season. Miami and USC were the only teams to rank among the nation's top five in both interceptions and fumble recoveries at the conclusion of the regular season.

AIR MIAMI: Under first-year head coach **Shane Montgomery**, Miami's vaunted passing attack did not miss a beat. Miami led the MAC and ranked 15th nationally in passing offense, while also ranking 19th in scoring offense. Miami has not finished a season outside of the Top 25 in passing or scoring offense since 2002.

ALL-MAC LANDSLIDE: Miami placed a league-high 11 individuals on the all-MAC first and second teams in 2005, which marked the program's highest total since 1974. Five RedHawks earned first-team honors and five others received repeat all-MAC mention.

BRAINS AND BRAWN: As well as performing on the football field, a number of Miami's seniors also were honored for their performance in the classroom. Senior **Josh Betts** was a finalist for the Draddy Trophy, which goes to the nation's top scholar-athlete. Fellow seniors **John Glavin**, **David Hutzelman** and **Steve Burke** all earned ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District plaudits.

BRINGING HOME THE BELL: Miami brought home the coveted Victory Bell for the fourth time in the past five years, downing Cincinnati, 44-16, in front of a national television audience. It was Miami's first win over a Big East opponent.

ZAPPING THE ZIPS: Miami rocked the eventual MAC Champion Akron Zips, 51-23, and set an NCAA record in the process. In the fourth quarter, the RedHawks scored 21 points in just 60 seconds to place their names in the record books.

QUITE A CLASS: The RedHawks will miss a 19-member senior class that played a critical role in the team's success since 2002. During their four seasons, the Red and White won 35 games and at least a share of three straight MAC East titles. All 19 individuals were on the Miami two-deep in 2005.

General Notes

REDHAWKS CAPTURE MAC EAST CO-CHAMPIONSHIP: With a defeat of Ohio in its regular-season finale and a loss by Bowling Green to Toledo, Miami University's football team clinched a share of its third straight Mid-American Conference East Division Championship in 2005. In a three-way tie between Akron, Bowling Green and the RedHawks, Akron earned the division's berth in the MAC title game by virtue of the league's third tiebreaker—winning percentage of cross-division foes—and an earlier head-to-head win over BGSU. Miami was absent from the league's title game and from bowl competition for the first time since 2002.

LUCKY SEVEN: Since head coach **Shane Montgomery** arrived on campus as Miami's offensive coordinator in 2001, the RedHawks have never finished a season with fewer than seven wins. With a 38-7 defeat of Ohio in the RedHawks' season finale, Montgomery extended that run to five straight seasons with at least seven wins. The last time Miami posted at least five straight seven-win seasons was from 1968-75 when it posted eight in a row. The only other string of seven straight seasons with at least seven wins came from 1950-56.

MAKE IT A DOZEN: With a win over Buffalo on Nov. 5, Miami continued an impressive run that began in 1994 and has been highlighted by a string of 12 straight winning seasons. During the stretch, Miami has posted a 93-44-2 (.676) record. The run is even more impressive when considering that only eight of the nation's 119 Division I-A programs own active strings of more than 10 consecutive winning seasons. Only Florida State (29), Michigan (21), Florida (18) and Virginia Tech (13) own longer active streaks than Miami, which is tied at 12 with Toledo and Southern Miss.

BEAST OF THE EAST: Miami continued a strong run of dominance in the East division in 2005. The RedHawks, who have won at least a share of the last three division titles, have never finished outside of the top three teams in the East and have finished among the top two teams in the division seven times. Miami has won 18 of its last 19 games versus current MAC East foes. Since division play began in 1997, the RedHawks have gone a dazzling 37-5 (.880) versus the five other current members of the MAC East. A loss to Bowling Green on Nov. 10 ended a 17-game winning streak versus the other active members of the MAC East.

THE MAC DADDIES: In 58 years of Mid-American Conference play, Miami has dominated the conference, winning a MAC-record 251 games and picking up 14 conference titles. The RedHawks' 14 league championships are four more than second-place Bowling Green. Miami has gone 20-4 (.833) in the MAC since 2003.

SECOND-HALF SUCCESS: Following Miami's 38-27 loss at Northern Illinois on Oct. 5 that stuck the RedHawks with an early MAC deficit, Miami head coach **Shane Montgomery** refocused his team on taking care of its own business over the second half of the season and letting the rest of the chips fall where they may. The RedHawks have been very good in the second half of the regular season over the past three years, forging perfect 6-0 records in both 2003 and 2004 and finishing at 5-1 in 2005 to rally

MONTGOMERY MAKES STRONG DEBUT: After a shaky start, **Shane Montgomery**, the 32nd head coach in program history, finished strong and posted a 7-4 record in his head coaching debut. The seven wins were the fourth-highest total among first-year Division I-A head coaches in 2005, trailing only LSU's Les Miles, Notre Dame's Charlie Weis and Florida's Urban Meyer. His seven first-year wins were the most at Miami since **Tom Reed** won eight in 1978 and tied for the fourth-most by a new Miami head coach with such names as **John Pont**, **Ara Parseghian** and **Bill Mallory**.

'HAWKS ON THE TUBE: With its ESPN2 debut coming in the season finale at Ohio, Miami made its 15th national television appearance over its past 40 games and 14th since 2003. Miami, which opened its season with an ABC broadcast for the second straight season, also was on ESPN2 three times in 2005. Of Miami's last 15 national television appearances, the RedHawks have posted a 7-8 record, including a 5-1 record at home. The win at Ohio on Nov. 21 marked Miami's second nationally-televised road win since 2002.

General Notes

ONE OF THE TRULY ELITE: While its reputation as the Cradle of Coaches sometimes tends to overshadow the football program itself, Miami possesses a tradition of football success that ranks among the elite programs nationally. Through 116 seasons, Miami football has accounted for 639 wins, which ranks 18th nationally. The Red and White also has posted an impressive all-time winning percentage of .639, which ranks among the top 15 programs nationally.

A SPECIAL SENIOR CLASS: If there is truly no substitute for experience, then Miami was well-stocked in 2005. The RedHawks were led by a 19-member senior class, with all 19 seniors appearing on the two-deep and a whopping 16 in the starting lineup. Of the 16 senior starters, 14 were starters in 2004 and eight had been regular starters since the MAC Championship 2003 season. The class posted an impressive 35-15 record and won three MAC East titles during their four years. The 35 wins were the most by a class since the 1975 graduating class won 39 games over four years and tied for the second highest four-year win total of any class in program history.

LEAGUE-BEST 11 REDHAWKS NAMED ALL-MAC: Following the 2005 regular season, Miami was honored with a league-high 11 selections to the all-MAC first and second teams. Among the selections were five first-team all-league picks and five repeat selections. Senior **Marcus Johnson** was the lone repeat first-team all-MAC pick, while seniors **Martin Nance**, **Nate Bunce**, **Darrell Hunter** and **John Busing** also earned first-team plaudits. Second-team honors went to seniors **Todd Londot**, **Mark Kracium** and **Todd Soderquist**, juniors **Joey Card** and **Ryne Robinson** and sophomore **Brandon Murphy**. The 11 total selections to the first and second teams marked Miami's highest total since 1974.

NANCE A SEMIFINALIST FOR BILETNIKOFF AWARD: RedHawk senior wide receiver **Martin Nance** was selected as one of 15 semifinalists nationally for the prestigious Biletnikoff Award, which was awarded to Oregon State's Mike Hass. Nance, who ranked among the national leaders in receptions, receiving yards and receiving touchdowns was the first Miami player to earn semifinalist status. He is the program's career leader in receiving yards and career receptions. Nance was one of three MAC wide receivers to make the list.

BETTS A FINALIST FOR DRADDY TROPHY: Miami senior quarterback **Josh Betts** was honored as one of 16 college football players nationally to earn a spot on the National Football Foundation's Scholar-Athlete class. Along with earning an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship, Betts automatically became a finalist for the Draddy Trophy, which is presented each year to college football's top scholar-athlete. Betts carried a 3.43 grade point average as a finance major at Miami and was a two-time Academic All-MAC pick. The award, which was presented in a banquet at the Waldorf Hotel in New York City that Betts attended, went to LSU's Rudy Niswanger.

THREE REDHAWKS EARN ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT STATUS: Three Miami seniors were announced in November as ESPN the Magazine Academic All-District IV selections. Seniors **John Glavin** and **David Hutzelman** were first-team honorees and were considered for All-American status, while safety **Steve Burke** was a second-team selection. All three individuals, who met the criteria of at least a 3.20 GPA and regular contributions on the field, were former walk-ons who were carrying double majors.

THREE REDHAWKS NAMED ACADEMIC ALL-MAC: Miami seniors **John Glavin**, **Josh Betts** and **David Hutzelman** all were honored following the 2005 regular season as Academic All-MAC picks. Glavin joined Akron's **Jason Swiger** as one of two three-time academic all-league selections, while Betts was a repeat pick. Glavin was Miami's first three-time academic all-league pick since Eddie Tillitz from 2000-02.

THREE TABBED FOR SENIOR ALL-STAR BOWLS: Three RedHawk seniors, the highest program total since 2000, were selected to compete in senior all-star bowls following the 2005 season. Wide receiver Martin Nance and cornerback Darrell Hunter, were selected to the Senior Bowl in Mobile, Ala., marking the third straight season at least one RedHawk competed in the game. Quarterback **Josh Betts** was picked to the Hula Bowl roster, making him the first Miami QB to compete in a senior bowl since 1976.

The Offense

THE WRAP: Though it experienced its share of ups and downs in 2005, Miami's offense continued to rank among the nation's best, finishing among NCAA I-A's Top 30 in passing offense (15th/291.6 ypg), scoring offense (20th/33.7 ppg) and total offense (28th/425.6 ypg). Second-year starter **Josh Betts** directed the RedHawks' passing attack, ranking among the nation's top 20 in total offense for the second straight season, and keyed on wide receivers **Martin Nance** and **Ryne Robinson**, who became the first tandem in program history to each top 1,000 yards receiving in the same season. Sophomore **Brandon Murphy** posted a strong debut as Miami's starting running back, rushing for 107.0 ypg and ranking 15th nationally.

WHO'S GONE: The RedHawks graduated six starters from its offense following the 2005 season, including four all-MAC selections. **Josh Betts** finished his career as Miami's second-leading career passer in yards (7,029) and TD completions (54), while **Martin Nance**, a first-team all-MAC pick, was the program's all-time leader in career receiving yards (3,131) and receptions (208). Miami also took a big hit on the offensive front, losing three all-MAC linemen in seniors **Nate Bunce**, **Mark Kracium** and **Todd Londot** as well as four-year letterwinners **Dan Tyler** and **Tyler Vogel** at tight end.

WHO'S BACK: Miami returns five starters on the offensive side of the ball, led by second-team all-MAC picks **Ryne Robinson** at wide receiver and **Brandon Murphy** at running back. Robinson is coming off a breakout season in which he ranked eighth-nationally in receiving yards, while Murphy ranked fourth in the MAC in rushing during his first season as a starter. **Josh Williams** returns at Miami's third receiver spot after a solid junior season and has the versatility to play on the outside or inside. The RedHawks also return two-year starter **Charlie Norden** at tackle and first-year starter **Steve Meister** at guard.

AIR MIAMI: Since arriving as Miami's offensive coordinator in 2001, **Shane Montgomery** has revolutionized the Red and White's offense. Prior to Montgomery's arrival, Miami had never passed for 3,000 yards in a season and had averaged more than 250.0 yards per game for a season only once. Since that time, Miami has averaged 3,626 yards passing per season or 291.0 yards per game, as well as 33.3 points per game. Under Montgomery, Miami has not finished a season ranked outside of the nation's Top 25 in passing or scoring offense since 2002.

RARE COMBINATION: With running back **Brandon Murphy** (107.0 ypg) ranked 23rd nationally in rushing yards per game and wide receivers **Ryne Robinson** (101.7) and **Martin Nance** (100.6 ypg) ranked eighth and 11th, respectively, in receiving yards per game, Miami was the only team in Division I-A to boast two wide receivers and a running back all ranked among the nation's Top 25 at their respective positions.

DYNAMIC DUO: Miami wideouts **Martin Nance** and **Ryne Robinson** caused headaches for defensive coordinators all season while becoming the 20th receiving duo in NCAA I-A history to each top 1,000 yards in the same season. Robinson finished with 1,119 yards while Nance totaled 1,107 yards to secure the second 1,000-yard receiving season of his career. The duo owns three of the four 1,000-yard seasons in Miami history.

Montgomery at Miami

Since arriving at Miami for the 2001 season, Shane Montgomery has revolutionized Miami's offense. Following is a look at Miami's passing offense, total offense and scoring offense per game averages under Montgomery and where they rank nationally.

FOUR FOR THE RECORD BOOKS: While posting two 1,000 yard receivers in the same season is uncommon, teams totaling a 3,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers in the same year are downright rare. With **Brandon Murphy** rushing for 1,070 yards, **Martin Nance** and **Ryne Robinson** both topping the 1,000-yard receiving mark and Josh Betts clearing 3,000 yards passing for the second straight season, Miami became just the sixth team in NCAA I-A history and fifth in MAC history to achieve the unique feat.

BALANCING ACT: While Miami has become known for its passing attack, the RedHawks did not abandon the run. Of 857 total plays run in 2005, Miami ran the ball 412 times or 48.1 percent of the time. The running game is considered a key complement to the passing game, as the RedHawks have not lost a game in three years in which they have outrushed their opponent and own a 33-4 record since 2001 when they have outrushed their opponent.

STREAKS AND SUCH: **Josh Betts** finished his career throwing at least one TD pass in 15 straight games and multiple TD passes in his last 10 games ... **Martin Nance** and **Ryne Robinson** finished the season with at least one reception in 31 and 30 straight games, respectively ... center **Todd Londot** started his last 42 as a RedHawk.

THROWING STRIKES: With 27 touchdown passes in 2005, **Josh Betts** finished second on Miami's single-season charts and ranked as the highest total ever for a Miami quarterback in an 11-game season. While **Ben Roethlisberger** owns the single-season record of 37 TD strikes, established in 2003, he passed for just 21 TDs over the first 11 games of that campaign.

MAKING HIS OWN NAME: Though his name is substantially shorter and required considerably fewer vowels than that of his predecessor, **Josh Betts** quietly went about making his own name by posting two of the most productive seasons by any passer in program history. Betts, who topped 3,000 yards passing in both of his years as a starter ranked only behind Big Ben in career passing yardage (7,029) and passing TDs (54) at Miami.

The Offense

NANCE IN THE ZONE: Anyone wondering whether senior wide receiver **Martin Nance** lost a step after a season-ending knee injury in 2004 got their answer in 2005. The senior, who tied for third nationally with 14 touchdown catches and sixth nationally at 7.4 receptions per game, totaled seven 100-yard receiving days in 2005 and was the first Miami player to post multiple 1,000-yard receiving seasons in his career. A Biletnikoff Award semifinalist and first-team all-MAC pick, Nance also ranked 11th nationally in receiving yards per game, posting 100.6 ypg, as part of the nation's top statistical receiving tandem.

RECORD BREAKER: Miami senior wide receiver **Martin Nance**, who became the first receiver in program history to top 3,000 career yards versus Bowling Green on Nov. 5, became Miami's career leader in receiving yardage on Oct. 29 at Temple and surpassed former teammate Michael Larkin (2001-04) for the program's career mark in receptions (208) at Ohio the following week. He may not be on top for long, though, as teammate **Ryne Robinson** enters his final season just 41 receptions and 612 yards shy of Nance.

HERE'S TO MR. ROBINSON: After showing everyone his ability as a punt returner as a freshman, junior wide receiver **Ryne Robinson** has spent the past two seasons showing what an asset he can be in the passing game. In less than two seasons as a starting wide receiver, Robinson, a 2005 second-team all-MAC pick, already has climbed among the program's top three receivers of all time in terms of receptions (167/3rd) and receiving yards (2,519/3rd). The dangerous receiver with quick feet and deep speed broke into Miami's starting lineup in the sixth game of 2004 and has totaled 124 receptions for 1,866 yards in the 19 games since. He ranked eighth nationally in receiving yards per game in 2005.

MURPH'S TURF: Though he was plagued by injuries over his last four games, sophomore running back **Brandon Murphy**, a first-year starter in 2005, provided Miami's offense with one more threat opposing defensive coordinators had to reckon with. Murphy, who topped 1,000 yards on Nov. 5 versus Buffalo, averaged 107.0 yards per game to rank 23th nationally. A fast back with good balance and a durable build, he owned a string of five straight 100-yard rushing games at one point and finished the season with nine rushing touchdowns on the way to second-team all-MAC plaudits.

PAVING THE WAY: Miami's offense was anchored by a veteran offensive line in 2005 that featured third-year starters **Nate Bunce** and **Mark Kracium** and fourth-year starter **Todd Londot**. The imposing trio, which all earned first or second-team all-MAC honors in 2005, combined to start 110 games during their Miami careers. It marked the second time in the past three years that Miami placed three offensive linemen on the all-MAC first and second teams, while Londot, a three-time second-team all-MAC selection, was the first Miami lineman to earn all-MAC honors in three straight seasons since former guard Mike Bird (1995-97). Despite 354 pass attempts over the team's last nine games, Miami's O-line allowed just 12 quarterback sacks.

REDZONE ALERT: Miami's offense scored on 37 of its last 40 trips into the redzone in 2005 to increase its conversion percentage to 88.3 percent (53-of-60) inside its opponent's 20-yard line. Of those last 37 trips into the redzone, Miami came away with 26 touchdowns. The RedHawks, who scored 36 TDs and booted 17 FGs in the redzone, ranked second in the MAC in red zone efficiency and turned the ball over only twice in the redzone.

The Defense

THE WRAP: Despite a roller coaster ride of a year in which injuries played a major role, Miami's veteran defense settled down late in the year to finish, once again, among the MAC's top defensive units. Under first-year defensive coordinator **Taver Johnson**, the RedHawks ranked third in the league in total (347.4), rushing (139.5) and scoring (23.5) defense in 2005. The aggressive unit, which featured nine senior starters, also was one of the best nationally in forcing turnovers, ranking fourth nationally with 35 turnovers forced. Over the last six games of 2005, the RedHawks allowed just 278.5 ypg.

WHO'S GONE: Graduation decimated a Miami defensive unit that featured nine senior starters and a total of 11 seniors on the two-deep. Hardest hit is a linebacking corps that was led by three-year starters **John Busing**, a 2005 first-team all-MAC pick, and **Terna Nande**, a two-time all-MAC honoree, at outside linebacker. Five of the six linebackers on the Miami two-deep, including two-year starter **Derek Rehage** at middle linebacker, were in their final year of eligibility. In the secondary, the RedHawks lost starting cornerbacks **Darrell Hunter**, a two-time all-MAC pick, and **Ryan Redd**, as well as three-year starter **Steve Burke** at strong safety. Finally, the RedHawk defensive front lost defensive end **Marcus Johnson**, a two-time first-team all-MAC pick, four-year contributor **John Glavin** at nose guard and **Mike Barz** at the other tackle spot.

WHO'S BACK: The RedHawks return just two starters to their defense for the 2006 season, led by second-team all-MAC safety **Joey Card**, who was second on the team in tackles in 2005. Defensive end **Craig Mester**, who played his first season as a starter in 2005, also returns after totaling 10.5 quarterback sacks over his first two seasons. Elsewhere, the RedHawks return six-of-nine letterwinners on the defensive line, five-of-nine letterwinners in the secondary and three-of-nine letterwinners at linebacker.

BIG, BAD BACKERS: Though injuries prevented their senior seasons from being all they could have been, Miami's veteran linebacking trio of **John Busing**, **Terna Nande** and **Derek Rehage** finished their careers as one of the better linebacking groups in program history. Busing and Nande, both all-MAC honorees during their careers, were three-year starters for the Red and White at the outside linebackers, while Rehage started his last two seasons at middle linebacker. Unfortunately, a foot injury caused Rehage to miss the first five games of his senior season, while Nande missed five games early in the season after suffering a lacerated liver. During their careers, the trio combined for 807 tackles, 87.0 tackles for loss, 23.5 quarterback sacks and 14 interceptions.

TURNOVER MACHINE: A primary focus of defensive coordinator **Taver Johnson** and his staff, the turnover returned to prominence in Miami's defensive gameplan in 2005. In just 11 games, the RedHawks totaled 20 interceptions and 15 fumble recoveries to rank among the Top 10 nationally in each category. Overall, the RedHawks' 35 total turnovers gained ranked only behind TCU, USC and Tulsa. At 3.18 turnovers forced per game, the RedHawks trailed only TCU (3.33 tpg) in NCAA I-A. Miami ranked among the nation's top five in turnovers gained for the second time in three years, after ranking fourth (39) in 2003.

INSTANT OFFENSE: Not only did Miami's offense thoroughly enjoying the field position set up by its defense, as evidenced by the 13 touchdowns and six field goals that were scored following opponent turnovers in 2005, but on Nov. 5 versus Buffalo the defense also got into the act. After going 21 games without scoring a defensive touchdown, the RedHawk defense tallied a 37-yard interception return for a touchdown by freshman **Robbie Wilson** and a 27-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown by senior **Darrell Hunter**.

GRINDING TO A HALT

While everyone views Miami as an offensive power, it's difficult to look past what the team has accomplished defensively since the beginning of 2003. After ranking 12th in the Mid-American Conference in defense in 2002, Miami began a resurgence in 2003 that has keyed around the team's ability to stop the run. Over the past three seasons, Miami has led the league in rushing defense, allowing 123.7 rushing yards per game while holding 19 of those opponents under 100 yards rushing.

The Defense

MAN IN CHARGE: Knowing that his expertise lay more with the offensive side of the ball, **Shane Montgomery** hired former linebacker coach (2000-03) **Taver Johnson** to run the defense. Promoted to assistant head coach during the summer, Johnson returned to Miami after a year as a special teams assistant with the NFL's Cleveland Browns. Johnson was the fifth individual to fill the role of defensive coordinator or co-defensive coordinator at Miami since 2002—a tribute to a defense that has remained one of the league's best despite the transitions.

YOUNG UP FRONT: Though the RedHawks lose three starters from their defensive line next season, they can find a measure of relief in a large cast of younger players who got their first taste of action in 2005. In order to keep the defensive front fresh later in games, Miami's coaching staff relied on contributions from six first-year contributors, including four redshirt freshmen. One of those freshmen, **Joe Coniglio**, got his first career start in the season finale at Ohio and contributed two tackles for loss. Coniglio totaled eight stops for loss and four sacks on the way to being named Miami's freshman of the year.

THE PHYSICAL FREAK: Dubbed a physical freak because of his, well, freakish physical abilities, senior linebacker **Terna Nande**, a two-time all-MAC pick, missed five games in 2005 because of a lacerated liver he suffered at Kent State on Sept. 17. He returned to action on Nov. 5 versus Buffalo, and totaled a career-high 13 tackles versus Bowling Green (Nov. 15). Identified prior to the season as the No. 1 physical freak in college football by ESPN.com's Bruce Feldman, Nande had a bench press of more than 500 lbs., a squat of more than 600 lbs., a 39-inch vertical leap and a top time of 4.45 in the 40.

STING LIKE A BUSING: Miami's defensive captain in 2005, senior outside linebacker **John Busing** had been a regular contributor on the Miami defense since his true freshman season and a starter since the beginning of 2003. Miami's leading tackler in 2004 and 2005,

Busing totaled 97 tackles and ranked eighth in the MAC in tackles per game (8.8) as a senior. A former wide receiver and cornerback in high school, Busing totaled eight interceptions during his Miami career and led all linebackers nationally in interceptions in 2003.

HOLDING THE LINE: Though there is little glory to be found in the trenches, Miami senior defensive tackle **John Glavin**, a former walk-on, distinguished himself as one of the league's best. Leading an inexperienced defensive front in 2005, Glavin often faced double and even triple teams from opposing offenses but still made his impact felt. Glavin, who battled injuries throughout his career finished with 31.5 career tackles for loss and was honored as a senior by being named to ESPN analyst Mark May's All-MayDay team.

COVER CORNER: After three years of covering the best they could throw at him, Miami senior corner back **Darrell Hunter** was named first-team all-MAC. Hunter, who was a second-team all-MAC pick as a junior, totaled a career-high 41 tackles and two interceptions as a senior. The 6-foot-1

athlete was clocked as fast as 4.28 seconds in the 40-yard dash during his career and, according to strength and conditioning coach **Dan Dalrymple**, is the fastest player in program history. He totaled eight interceptions during his career.

MAKING HIMSELF KNOWN:

Though the secret was out on Miami defensive end **Marcus Johnson** entering his senior season, the second-year starter endured regular double teams and graded out, once again, as one of Miami's most consistent defensive players. For his effort, Johnson was named first-team all-MAC for the second straight season, making him the first Miami defensive lineman to earn back-to-back first-team all-league plaudits since Jon Wauford achieved the feat from 1990-91. Johnson was in on 20.5 tackles for loss and 10.5 quarterback sacks in his career despite starting just two seasons.

The Special Teams

THE WRAP: Though featuring a kicker in his first season as a full-time place kicker and a redshirt freshman punter, Miami enjoyed a solid season in special teams, ranking among the MAC's top half in every category. The RedHawks ranked third in the MAC in net punting (36.6 ypr), while ranking second in punt return average (11.9). From a placekicking standpoint, Miami ranked fourth in the MAC in field goal percentage (.704) and third in PAT conversions (.978). Finally, the RedHawks ranked fifth in kickoff returns (20.6 ypr), while placing sixth in kickoff coverage (20.5 ypr).

WHO'S GONE: Of the four major special teams positions, senior placekicker **Todd Soderquist**, a second-team all-MAC pick in 2005, is Miami's lone special teams casualty for 2006. A four-year contributor, Soderquist handled all of Miami's kickoffs over the past four years and served as a placekicker for the past three seasons, though 2005 was his first season as Miami's full-time placekicker.

WHO'S BACK: The RedHawks return three key cogs to their special teams in 2006, including punter **Jacob Richardson**, longsnapper **Dave McClain** and holder **Kyle Decker**. Richardson, a redshirt freshman in 2005, averaged 38.4 yards per punt and totaled 10 punts inside the 20 during his Miami punting debut. McClain, a three-year starter as the RedHawks' longsnapper returns for his senior campaign next year. Decker, a walk-on quarterback, was a first-year holder for Miami on place kicks. The RedHawks' top returning leg is freshman **Nathan Parseghian**, who converted his lone PAT attempt in 2005 but did not have a field goal attempt.

THE AMAZING MR. ROBINSON: The MAC Special Teams Player of the Year in 2004, **Ryne Robinson** has made quite a name for himself as one of the nation's top punt return men. Robinson, who has amassed 1,502 yards in career punt returns and averages a gaudy 14.6 yards per return, already owns the Miami and MAC career and single-season records and is closing on the NCAA career mark of 1,761 punt return yards held by former Texas Tech standout and current Miami Dolphin Wes Welker.

Robinson also is an all-MAC baseball player for the defending MAC Champions, leading the league in stolen bases and triples last season. Last year, he became the first Miami player since Joe Spicer in 1973-74 to play in a bowl game and NCAA Tournament baseball game.

TAKING IT TO THE HOUSE: Though it came down to the last game of the 2005 season, **Ryne Robinson** once again electrified the RedHawks with a punt return touchdown. In the season finale, Robinson took an Ohio punt at the 46-yard line and dashed straight up the middle for his sixth career punt return touchdown, moving him within two of tying the NCAA record for career punt return TDs. It marked the third straight season in which Robinson returned a punt for a touchdown versus Ohio.

BIG LEG TODD: Though he got only one season as Miami's full-time placekicker, senior **Todd Soderquist** did not let the opportunity pass him by. Soderquist, a 2005 second-team all-MAC pick and a second-team all-MAC kicker, ranked second in the MAC and 15th nationally in scoring at 9.1 ppg and booted a league-high 1.73 field goals per game. A four-year contributor as Miami's leg of choice on kickoffs, booted 25 of his 74 kickoffs for touchbacks. An unusually-gifted athlete for the position, Soderquist also served as an excellent last line of defense on Miami's kickoff team, totaling seven tackles in 2005 and 16, including 10 solo stops for his career.

CLIMBING THE CHARTS: Senior placekicker **Todd Soderquist** enjoyed one of the better seasons of any kicker in program history in 2005. Soderquist, who ranked ninth nationally in field goals per game, converted 19 field goals to tie for second on Miami's single-season charts. The program record for field goals in a season is 20 by Gary Gussman (1984-87) in 1987. On the career charts, Soderquist climbed to a fifth-place tie at Miami with 29 career FGs. A two-time MAC East Special Teams Player of the Week, Soderquist totaled 18 points in a Nov. 5 win over Buffalo, which tied for the third-highest, single-game total amassed by a kicker in MAC history.



ROBINSON'S PUNT RETURN TOUCHDOWNS

Just one game into his sophomore season, Ryne Robinson already was more than half way to the NCAA record for career punt return TDs. Former standouts Wes Welker of Texas Tech and Antonio Perkins of Oklahoma share the record with eight punt returns for TDs. Here is a run down of Robinson's punt return TDs to date.

After spotting Ohio to a 7-0 lead, Miami put the clamps down defensively and rolled to 38 unanswered points in a 38-7 defeat of the Bobcats in both teams' 2005 season finale. Junior running back Jimmy Murray, who made his first career start, rushed 113 yards and a touchdown, while senior quarterback Josh Betts passed for 297 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the win. Defensively, the RedHawks allowed a season-low seven points and just 185 yards of total offense—101 of which came in the first quarter. Junior Ryne Robinson provided the key play early in the second quarter, returning a punt 46 yards for a touchdown, to give him three punt return TDs in three meetings with Ohio. The win was Miami's sixth in a row over the Bobcats and improved the Red and White to 51-29-2 versus its most-played MAC rival.
