



If there is a lesson that the Miami University men's swimming and diving team learned during the 2005-06 season, it is simply this: streaks are made to be broken. Heading into last year's conference meet, the Eastern Michigan Eagles had dominated the Mid-American Conference by winning six straight conference titles, but three days in Athens, Ohio shifted the balance of power. By winning 10 of the 20 events at the conference meet, including eight individual and two relay events, Miami captured its first MAC title since 1999 and ended Eastern Michigan's stranglehold on the conference's top spot.

"It was an exciting three days," Miami's 22nd-year head coach **Pete Lindsay** said. "The guys just kept pressing, and an Eastern Michigan disqualification in a relay opened the door for us. The lead changed hands three or four times on the final day, and that was a lot of fun."

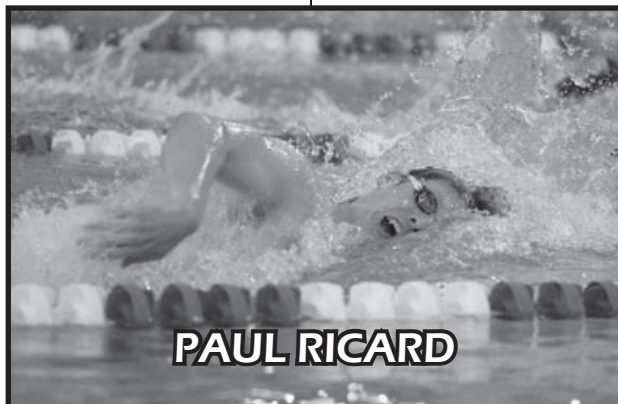
While Miami's defeat of the six-time defending champions can be classified as an upset, the back-to-back MAC Coach of the Year believes that the victory was not as unexpected as some might think.

"The seniors and juniors had a pretty clear indication that they could perform well last season, and they were on a mission from the first day of practice," Lindsay said. "We had some young guys that won championships with breakthrough swims, and our team responded to the great fan support."

In addition to Lindsay winning his second straight coach of the year honor, **Paul Ricard** was named the MAC Swimmer of the Year and **Chris Heaton** was tabbed as the MAC Diver of the Year. Both Ricard and Heaton won a pair of MAC titles, sweeping the distance freestyle and diving events, respectively, but Lindsay acknowledges that Miami's championship run was truly a team effort.

"We got some significant contributions last year from guys like **Nick DuPuis** and **David McKown** that helped pull us up in the middle in terms of scoring," Lindsay said. "We also had some very good leadership with **Scott Robson** and **David Hine**."

Because of its unique blend of teamwork and leadership, the RedHawks enter the 2006-07 season in the unfamiliar, yet coveted position as the defending conference champions.

#### SIZING UP MIAMI

Returning six individual MAC Champions and 16 letterwinners, Miami welcomes back the bulk of its title-winning squad. Besides

Ricard and Heaton, three additional MAC titlists—including the conference's top breaststroke—return for the Red and White this season. Junior **Theo Kuczek** and senior **Griffin Marshall** won MAC gold medals last season in the 100 and 200 breaststroke, respectively, while senior **Michael Donohoe** returns as the defending conference champion in the 200 butterfly.

"We had more conference champions than anyone last year, and they are in defense mode," Lindsay said. "I've always felt it is harder to defend, but we have some hungry swimmers and divers who are excited for the season."

Of the 12 Miamians who earned all-conference honors last year, eight are returning, including second-team selections **Andy Amyot**, **Nick DuPuis** and **Blake Norman**. Lindsay, however, believes the key to the RedHawks' title defense will be

the continued development of its other scoring athletes.

"I think the middle-level players on the team have some excellent opportunities to move up," Lindsay said. "Two sophomores, **Davis Mello** and **Nick DuPuis**, have really come back strong and taken it up a notch. The freshman sprinters from last year, **Mike Brown** and **Zach Siegel**, have been very strong in the water, and if **Chase Mortimer** gets healthy, he has shown the ability to be a top-eight scorer in three events."

#### REDHAWKS ON THE NATIONAL SCENE

In addition to returning some of the conference's top swimmers and divers, the RedHawks boast a group of athletes with the ability to succeed at the national level. **Paul Ricard** was the only Miami swimmer to post an NCAA "B" cut last season, clocking in with qualifying times in the 500 and 1,650 freestyle, but Lindsay believes the RedHawks have three or four athletes with NCAA-qualifying potential.

"The kind of work Paul has been doing is pretty amazing," Lindsay said. "Paul and Michael [Donohoe] went out to Senior Nationals this summer and swam very well, and I think they are poised to defend their championships. **Ryan McHugh** is another swimmer who I am excited about. He changed his stroke and got his U.S. Open Cut, and he is already averaging two

seconds faster than last year."

Lindsay, however, points out that the Miami swimmers are not the only ones with a shot at advancing to the national meet.

"**Chris Heaton** trained hard all summer and has really taken it up a notch with his diving," Lindsay said. "Chris was training in Indianapolis this summer and in consideration for the U.S. Diving Elite Training Program, and he's got a shot at getting through sectionals and advancing to nationals."

## STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES

The 2006-07 version of the RedHawks has both strengths and weaknesses, and perhaps Miami's most obvious strength is the breaststroke. Miami returns the MAC Champions in the 100 and 200 breaststroke and four additional top-eight conference finishers in the event.

"If you look at conference results, we have the first, second, third and fifth fastest returning times in the 100 breast," Lindsay said. "In the 200 breast, we have the first and third swimmers returning, so overall our breaststroke is pretty strong."

Lindsay also points out the freestyle and relay events as two of Miami's deeper events.

"In the 200 free we have Paul, Ryan and Zach who have turned in times that would have been top eight last year," Lindsay said. "We've shored up a couple of gaps we had in the 100 free, and I expect the freestyle relays and the medley relays to be pretty strong events. We're still untested in the backstroke, but we have freshmen who could contribute."

While almost a third of Miami's roster is comprised of freshmen, the group, led by a pair of familiar names, has the ability to be significant contributors. Headlining the first-year class are **Michael Carroll**, a three-time state qualifier whose brothers John (1998-2002) and Pat (2002-06) both swam for the Red and White, and **Matthew Grubb**, a four-time state qualifier who is following in the footsteps of his brother, John (2001-05).

"It is a good solid freshman class," Lindsay said. "Many of them are second or third in line, and they know the Miami tradition. The stories aren't new to them, but they've come in with the expectation that they are going to do well. Michael and Matthew have brothers who have been there, but they have to carve out their own niche."

## THE EXPECTATIONS

Following a home-heavy first-half of the season, the RedHawks hit the road for five road dual meets after the New Year. Miami hosts only one home dual meet in the second half of the season, with the MAC Swimming and Diving Championships slated for Feb. 22-24 at Buffalo. The RedHawks also compete in three of their four MAC dual meets in the second half, including a trip to Ypsilanti to face Eastern Michigan.

"Our last home meet is the first weekend back in January, and then we are road warriors," Lindsay said. "I do like

the fact that we have three MAC meets leading up to the conference championships. We have Buffalo, Ohio and Eastern Michigan in the second half, and there is more emphasis on dual meets in the second semester this year."

Despite the daunting road slate facing the RedHawks, Lindsay believes Miami will once again be in contention for the MAC title in late February.

## Meet the Coaches

Head Coach Pete Lindsay

**N**ow in his 22nd year at the helm of the Miami University men's swimming and diving team, head coach **Pete Lindsay** has overseen more than two decades of success in the pool. The back-to-back Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year, Lindsay has guided the RedHawks to three conference titles, including a first-place finish in 2006.

The 2005-06 season was one of Lindsay's most successful in his 21-year tenure, as Miami upended six-time defending champion Eastern Michigan and captured its first MAC title since 1999. Winning 10 of the 20 events at the conference meet, the RedHawks took home eight individual conference titles, two relay crowns and placed a league-high 12 athletes on the all-conference squads.

Six RedHawks earned all-MAC first-team status last season, including MAC Swimmer of the Year Paul Ricard and MAC Diver of the Year Chris Heaton. Ricard won conference titles in the 500 freestyle and 1,650 freestyle, and Heaton swept the one- and three-meter diving events, helping Lindsay secure his second straight MAC Coach of the Year award. Theo Kuczek (100 breaststroke), Griffin Marshall (200 breaststroke), Justin Marcy (100 butterfly) and Michael Donohoe (200 butterfly) also won individual MAC titles last season under Lindsay's watch.

Since taking over the Miami program in the 1985-86 season, Lindsay has helped the RedHawks finish as either the runner-up or the conference champion on 14 occasions and win Mid-American Conference titles in 1997, 1999 and 2006. As the program's second-winningest coach with 134 career dual-meet wins, Lindsay needs only 11 more wins to surpass Raymond Ray as the all-time leader in coaching victories.

In the past seven seasons, Lindsay has guided the RedHawks to six seasons of .500 or better, including a school-record tying 12 wins in 2002. From 1990-99, Lindsay compiled eight seasons of .500 or better that included back-to-back seasons of double-digit wins in 1996 and 1997, the first time Miami had accomplished the feat since the 1974-75 seasons. Lindsay additionally was named coach of the year four times in the 1990's, taking home the award in 1991, 1994, 1996 and 1999.

During his career in Oxford, Lindsay has mentored 92 individual and relay conference champions, eight MAC Swimmers of the Year, five MAC Divers of the Year and three of Miami's seven MAC Championship teams. Lindsay's career record stands at 134-104-1, good for a .562 winning percentage.

Prior to Miami, Lindsay was the head coach of the women's

team at the University of Michigan. In Ann Arbor, he coached six all-Americans and led the Wolverines to a ninth-place finish at the 1984 NCAA Championships. Before his stint with the Wolverines, Lindsay served as the men's and women's coach at Western Michigan University from 1979-1983 where he produced 11 MAC Champions.

Lindsay started his coaching career in 1967 with the San Diego Swimming Association. As an undergraduate at Miami in 1971-72, he was the varsity coach at Talawanda High School in Oxford before spending the 1973-74 season at the Long Beach Swimming Club. After serving as a volunteer assistant at the University of Washington from 1974 to 1975, Lindsay spent two seasons as an assistant at the U.S. Naval Academy before working as Miami's graduate assistant from 1977-79.

Lindsay is currently the only Miami head coach who teaches full-time at the university. He works as a sports studies instructor in the department of physical education, health and sports studies.

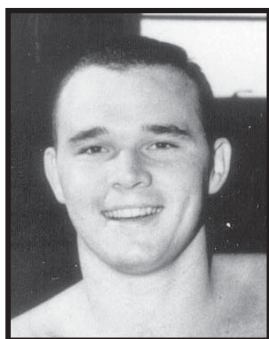


### Bill Mulliken Miami Hall of Fame

**B**ill Mulliken will forever be remembered as one of the greatest athletes to wear the Red and White. One of the most talented and decorated athletes in Miami swimming history, Mulliken became the first swimmer inducted into the Miami Hall of Fame in 1971.

In 1959, Mulliken won an NCAA and Olympic championship, both of which were firsts for a Miami athlete. As a nine-time Mid-American Conference Champion, Mulliken set 15 Miami, Mid-American Conference, American, NCAA and Olympic records during his tenure. Best known for setting the Miami, American, NCAA and Olympic record in the 200 breaststroke, Mulliken became only the third all-America swimmer from Miami. Mulliken completed his degree at Miami before earning a law degree from Harvard Law School. The following is a list of Bill Mulliken's championship and record-setting times:

**Dennis O'Brien**

**D**ennis O'Brien earned all-America honors in the 200-yard butterfly in 1956 and 1957, becoming Miami's first swimming all-American. A winner of seven individual titles at the MAC Championship, O'Brien led Miami to its first MAC team championship in 1955. O'Brien also was a part of two national record-setting relays teams for his AAU team and held the world record in the 50-yard butterfly during his junior year. Dennis was inducted into Miami's Hall of Fame in 1996.



**Tom Perrin**

**T**om Perrin, a 1986 inductee into Miami's Hall of Fame, was named the Swimmer of the Year in the MAC and Miami's Athlete of the Year in 1972. While at Miami, Perrin notched six MAC individual titles and was a member of three championship relay teams. He became Miami's first recipient of an NCAA post-graduate scholarship and enrolled in medical school at Indiana University.



**John Russell**

**A** 1987 Miami Hall of Fame inductee, John Russell earned All-America honors three consecutive years after finishing fifth in the 100-yard butterfly at the NCAA Swimming Championships from 1966-68. Russell was a member of nine MAC championship relay teams, and he led Miami to its first back-to-back MAC championships in 1967 and 1968. As a senior in 1968, Russell qualified for the Olympic Trials.

President

**N**amed the 21st president of Miami University by the board of trustees on April 21, 2006, **Dr. David C. Hodge** opens a new chapter at Miami University following a 31-year tenure at the University of Washington. Hodge succeeds Dr. James C. Garland, who served in the role for 10 years.

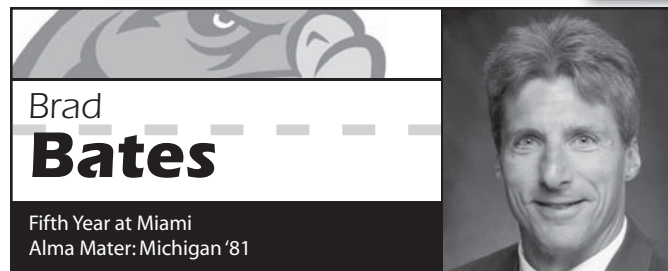
Hodge served as the dean of the college of arts and sciences at the University of Washington from 1998-06. As dean of the largest college at UW, he provided leadership for achieving academic excellence across the 40 departments, 900 faculty and 500 staff who served more than 24,000 students. Hodge was responsible for the conduct of all academic programs, meeting student curricular needs, providing research infrastructure to support both unfunded research and funded research, managing 1.2 million square feet of facilities and supporting College and departmental development programs.

Joining the UW faculty in 1975, Hodge held the appointment of professor of geography and adjunct professor of civil engineering while supervising more than 40 master's and Ph.D students during his tenure. In 1990, Hodge earned the prestigious University of Washington Distinguished Teaching Award. Prior to his most recent post at UW, he served as chair of the geography department from 1995-97 and divisional dean for computing, facilities and research in the college of arts and sciences from 1996-98.

His research, which focuses on urban and transportation geography with special interest in the impacts of communication, has been supported by the National Science Foundation, Congressional Office of Technology Assessment, U.S. and Washington State Departments of Transportation and numerous other state and local Seattle agencies. Hodge directed a National Science Foundation program in 1993-94 and was the editor of *The Professional Geographer* from 1994-97. Additionally, he has served on numerous Seattle and Washington committees and boards dealing with issues of community development and transportation.

A native of Minnesota, Hodge earned his bachelor of arts degree in geography from Macalester College in 1970 and went on to earn his master's degree and doctorate in geography from Pennsylvania State University in 1973 and 1975, respectively. In 1996, Hodge was named a Centennial Fellow in the Penn State College of Earth and Mineral Sciences and received the Hosler Alumni Scholar Award in 2003. Hodge also served on the Board of Trustees at Macalester College from 2000-06. He is a member of the Macalester College Athletics Hall of Fame and remains the school's outdoor track and field record holder in the 800 meters with a time of 1:50.20.

Hodge and his wife, Valerie, have two children: Gene, a recent graduate of Washington, and Meriem, who will be a sophomore at Miami University.

Director of Athletics

**A** progressive and driving force behind Miami University's athletic department since his arrival in November of 2003, **Brad Bates** has been instrumental in not only upholding Miami's storied athletic tradition but also in ushering Miami athletics into the next generation of intercollegiate athletics.

Over the past three years, Bates has presided over a department that made back-to-back football bowl game appearances for the first time in nearly 30 years, while capturing conference championships in football, ice hockey, baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's swimming and synchronized skating. This past year, Miami's ice hockey team earned a No. 1 ranking nationally on the way to an NCAA Tournament berth, and its men's basketball team made its second straight trip to the NIT. Miami also has won the Reese Trophy, an all-sport award presented annually to the MAC institution with the best all-around men's sports programs, in three of his four seasons.

In addition to the RedHawks' athletic success during his tenure, Bates has spearheaded efforts to improve the "athletic classrooms" in which Miami's student-athletes compete to rate among the best in the nation. Renovations to Yager Stadium continue, with plans for an indoor facility in the works. Already added to Yager are new stands on the east side, a state-of-the-art scoreboard, permanent lighting, Cradle of Coaches Plaza and a FieldTurf playing surface.

Also due for completion by this fall are a brand new softball field, located to the southwest of Yager Stadium, a brand new ice hockey facility, slated to open this coming fall, and a renovated field hockey field that is being upgraded with a new artificial turf surface and press box.

Paramount among Bates' accomplishments has been the department's success in graduating its student-athletes. Over the first two years of the NCAA's Academic Performance Rate (APR), Miami has consistently ranked among the best Division I-A programs nationally, with a number of its individual programs posting the highest scores nationally.

Bates, who came to Miami after 17 years at Vanderbilt University, achieved a doctorate in education at Vanderbilt in 1997. This followed the bachelor's and master's degrees he earned in education at the University of Michigan in 1981 and 1982. At Vanderbilt, along with overseeing the administration of all 15 sports, Bates, a Senior Associate A.D. when he departed, was highly involved in the department's budgetary, marketing, development, licensing and Title IX compliance decision-making.

Athletically, Bates was a walk-on defensive back for Michigan from 1977-81. He played for then-Wolverine head football coach Bo Schembechler, a 1951 Miami alumnus and member of Miami's legendary Cradle of Coaches. In his four years as a player, the Wolverines won three Big Ten Championships, posted a record of 37-11-0 and played in three Rose Bowls and a Gator Bowl.

Bates and his wife, Michele, reside in Oxford.

## ACADEMIC SERVICES

**M**iami's athletic department strongly emphasizes that its student-athletes succeed not only in their athletic pursuits but also in their academic endeavors. Realizing the unique demands placed on the student-athlete, Miami feels a responsibility to provide the best possible academic support.

Miami's Comprehensive Academic Support Program began during the 1987-88 academic year. The program's main focus is to monitor and track student-athlete's progress toward graduation while staying in compliance with Miami University, Mid-American Conference, U.S. Figure Skating Association, Central Collegiate Hockey Association and NCAA guidelines.

The Academic Support Program is comprised of three full-time academic coordinators, including Cindy Veraldo, Lindsay Fenton and Ryan Miller. Miller, in his first year as an academic coordinator, works directly with the men's swimming and diving team.

The coordinators have the responsibility of implementing and coordinating all aspects of the academic support program for both the men's and women's varsity teams. Other responsibilities include meeting with potential student-athletes on recruiting trips, working in conjunction with the Rinella Learning Center to provide for student-athletes with special needs and serving as a referral source for the various offices around campus including the Student Counseling Center and the Office of Career Services.

The offices of the academic coordinators are located in the Walter L. Gross Jr. Family Student Athlete Development Center. The coordinators have the responsibility of implementing and coordinating all aspects of the academic support program for both the men's and women's varsity teams.

## STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

**I**n today's highly-competitive world of intercollegiate athletics, the guidance and training a student-athlete receives in their strength and conditioning program is every bit as important as the direction they receive on the field. At Miami University, the strength and conditioning program is a source of pride and tradition.

Heading Miami's strength and conditioning program is James Carsey, who enters his sixth season at Miami and second year as head strength and conditioning coach. A former football standout at Ashland University, Carsey understands the direct link between success in the weightroom and success on the field.

"While the coaching staff is able to provide more direction during the season, it is limited by NCAA regulations as to how much time it can spend with the team at other times of the year," Carsey said. "The strength and conditioning staff works with the team all year long and has the opportunity to aid in each student-athletes' physical and mental development. Our role in maintaining an individual's drive throughout the year is key in getting the most out of that individual's potential."

Carsey succeeds long-time strength and conditioning coach Dan Dalrymple, who was named head strength coach for the New Orleans Saints last winter after spending 17 years building Miami's strength and conditioning program from the ground up. Assisting Carsey are full-time assistant Ryan Faehnle, who joined the staff this past summer, second-year intern Matt Cady and a group of well-trained student assistants.

"Coach Dalrymple's philosophy was always that student-athletes come to Miami to be champions, and it's our obligation to provide those student-athletes with the tools to reach their full potential," Carsey said. "We still embrace that mindset, while also working to instill qualities such as pride, integrity, loyalty and dedication."

## WALTER L. GROSS CENTER

The hub of Miami's athletic facilities, the \$5 million Walter L. Gross Jr. Family Student-Athlete Development Center was dedicated in the fall of 2001. This facility, which is located between Millett Hall and Yager Stadium, caters to both the academic and physical needs of Miami's student-athletes.

One half of the facility is dedicated for a 10,000-square foot physical fitness center, which includes free and machine weights, a circuit training machine, cardiovascular equipment, and speed, agility and jump training facilities.

The other portion of the center is devoted to academic enrichment. The new center features two large study areas, an informal study lounge, private tutoring offices and a computer lab.

"Miami's athletics' program has always prided itself with a strong commitment to both athletics and academics," says Steve Cady, senior associate athletic director and chair of the project design team. "This facility epitomizes our philosophy. It is an unbelievable addition to our facilities."

Separating the academic and physical fitness centers is a main lobby and reception area, which features a rotunda that dominates the reception lobby ceiling. Miami's rich athletic tradition, headlined by a listing of Miami's past and present All-Americans, is highlighted on the rotunda.

The facility opened its doors to student-athletes during the summer of 2001 and had a Grand Opening Gala on Friday, Sept. 21 in conjunction with Miami's football home opener with Cincinnati.

"This is a showcase facility for Miami University athletics," says former academic coordinator and current Red and White Club director Darcy Shriver. "It is a convenient location for our student-athletes to enrich their academic and athletic experience, and it represents another Miami commitment to first-rate athletic facilities."

**Affiliation:** Public university of Ohio

**Philosophy:** Miami is a residential university with a focus on teaching undergraduates. A liberal education core complements the more specialized studies of the majors.

**Established:** Founded in 1809, Miami is named for the Miami Native American Tribe that inhabited the area now known as the Miami Valley Region of Ohio. Miami is the seventh-oldest state institution west of the Allegheny Mountains.

**Locations:** Main campus in Oxford, Ohio (35 miles north of Cincinnati and 45 minutes southwest of Dayton); regional campuses in Hamilton and Middletown, Ohio; European Center in Luxembourg. The main campus in and around Oxford consists of 1,179 acres.

**Enrollment:** 15,200 undergraduates and 1,700 graduate students on the Oxford campus; approximately 2,500 on each regional campus (based on Fall 2006 enrollment)

**Diversity:** Multicultural students make up 8.65 percent of the first-year class and 8.2 percent of the undergraduate student body (based on Fall 2005 enrollment).

**Degree Programs:** Miami offers the bachelor's degree in over 100 areas of study and the master's degree in more than 50 areas; Miami also offers a number of doctoral degrees. Several associate's degrees are available through study on the regional campuses.

**Class Size:** 70 percent of freshman classes at Miami have 30 or fewer students and 88 percent have 50 or fewer students. The average class size is 24, with the ratio of full-time students to full-time faculty standing at 17:1.

**Calendar:** First semester begins late August, ends late December; second semester begins early January, ends early May. Summer sessions are also offered.

**Cost:** For 2005-2006, tuition and fees for undergraduates total \$21,587 per year; Ohio residents receive a minimum of \$10,902 in Ohio resident scholarships. Room and board charges are \$7,610.

## MIAMI AND THE APR ... GRADUATING OUR STUDENT-ATHLETES

**A**ccording to the latest Academic Progress Report (APR), recently released by the NCAA and covering the 2004-05 academic year, Miami and its 18 NCAA-sponsored athletic programs remain in excellent standing and continue to rank among the best in the Mid-American Conference and the nation.

"Our coaches recruit the brightest intellectual minds in the country to compete for championships at the NCAA's highest level," Director of Athletics **Brad Bates** said. "Our APR data is a strong indication that we are accomplishing our primary objectives as an athletic department. Not only are we producing championship programs, we also are graduating our student-athletes at an impressive rate. This is an especially profound accomplishment when you consider the rigorous academic curriculum at Miami."

Of the athletic programs evaluated by the APR report, all 18 of Miami's programs finished comfortably above the minimum score of 925, which approximates a 50 percent graduation rate, while six earned a perfect score of 1,000 and 16 ranked among the top four in their respective conference.

Women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's golf and women's tennis each posted perfect scores of 1,000 to pace the nation, and football, men's track and field and men's and women's swimming each headed their counterparts in the MAC. Miami's football program ranked 12th nationally among NCAA I-A programs, while men's basketball ranked among the Top 40 teams nationally.

"With all the success on the playing field at Miami over the past few years, I am most proud of the fact that we continue to lead the way among Division I-A programs in the academic performance of our athletes," said then-President James Garland. "The latest scores prove once again that Miami has maintained an athletic program with high standards, integrity, and achievement."

Overall institutional APR scores, which ranked Miami second nationally in Division I-A a year ago, are no longer compiled by the NCAA.

The APR, which was released for the first time last year and which is being enforced for the first time this year, is considered a real-time snapshot of each athletic program's academic performance. Programs that are unable to record the minimum score of 925 are penalized by not being able to replace the grants-in-aid, for one year, of the previous year's academic casualties.

APR is calculated by allocating points for eligibility and retention, giving a student-athlete one point each for maintaining academic eligibility and staying at an institution. The number is then divided against the possible number of points and multiplied by 1,000 to make for an easier reference.
