Now in his 23rd year at the helm of the Miami University men's swimming and diving team, head coach **Pete Lindsay** has overseen more than two decades of success in the pool. A six-time Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year, Lindsay has guided the RedHawks to three conference titles, including a first-place finish in 2006.

Helping Miami to second-place conference finish in 2007, Lindsay mentored MAC Swimmer of the Year Paul Ricard and MAC Diver of the Year Chris Heaton. Ricard put together a stellar junior season in which he won three conference titles in the 200, 500 and 1,650 freestyle and became the first RedHawk in five seasons to qualify for the NCAA Championships. Heaton, meanwhile, swept the boards at the conference meet and was named the conference's top swimmer for the second straight season. Lindsay's RedHawks won a total of eight individual conference championships, while nine Miamians garnered all-conference honors.

The 2005-06 season was one of Lindsay's most successful in his tenure, as Miami opened six-time defending champion Eastern Michigan and captured its first MAC title since 1999. Winning 10 of the 20 events at the conference meet, the RedHawks took home eight individual conference titles, two relay crowns and placed a league-high 12 athletes on the all-conference squads.

Since taking over the Miami program in the 1985-86 season, Lindsay has helped the RedHawks finish as either the runner-up or the conference champion on 15 occasions and win Mid-American Conference titles in 1997, 1999 and 2006. As the second-winningest coach in school history with 140 career dual-meet wins, Lindsay needs only five more wins to surpass Raymond Ray as the all-time leader in coaching victories.

In the past eight seasons, Lindsay has guided the RedHawks to six seasons of .500 or better, including a school-record tying 12 wins in 2002. From 1990-1999, Lindsay compiled eight seasons of .500 that included back-to-back seasons of double-digit wins in 1996 and 1997, the first time Miami had accomplished the feat since the 1974-75 seasons. Lindsay additionally was named coach of the year four times in the 1990's, taking home the award in 1991, 1994, 1996 and 1999.

During his career in Oxford, Lindsay has mentored 100 individual and relay conference champions, nine MAC Swimmers of the Year, six MAC Divers of the Year and three of Miami's seven MAC Championship teams. Lindsay's career record stands at 140-113-1, good for a .552 winning percentage.

Prior to Miami, Lindsay was the head coach of the women's team at the University of Michigan. In Ann Arbor, he coached six all-Americans and led the Wolverines to a ninth-place finish at the 1984 NCAA Championships. Before his stint with the Wolverines, Lindsay served as the men's and women's coach at Western Michigan University from 1979-1983 where he produced 11 MAC Champions.

Lindsay started his coaching career in 1967 as a coach with the San Diego Swimming Association. As an undergraduate at Miami in 1971-72, he was the varsity coach at Talawanda High School in Oxford before spending the 1973-74 season at the Long Beach Swimming Club. After serving as a volunteer assistant at the University of Washington from 1974 to 1975, Lindsay spent two seasons as an assistant at the U.S. Naval Academy before working as Miami's graduate assistant from 1977-79.

Lindsay is currently the only Miami head coach who teaches full-time at the university. He works as a sports studies instructor in the department of physical education, health and sports studies.

Entering his first season as the head diving coach at Miami is **KongRong Li**. Li brings 26 years of national and international coaching experience to Miami after spending the last seven seasons as the co-head diving coach at U.S. Elite Diving Academy in Columbus.

"We are very excited about KR joining the staff," head coach Pete Lindsay said. "He has a breadth of knowledge and international experience which will enable Miami's divers to compete at the highest levels of NCAA and national competition. The Nixon Center diving pool will be a very exciting place this season."

Li joined the U.S. Diving Elite Academy in 2001, serving as the co-head diving coach for six seasons and helping more than 20 divers move on to the collegiate ranks. Since 2004, Li coached numerous athletes who went on to dive at Division I institutions in the Big Ten, Southeastern Conference and Atlantic Coast Conference. All told, Li's athletes earned 13 NCAA athletic scholarships from 2005-06.

From 2002-07, Li mentored eight high school state champions, including the 2006 men's state champions in Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky. Li also achieved success at the national and junior national levels, guiding the junior team to five straight top-three finishes (2002-06) and helping the national team to three consecutive top-three showings, including a first-place finish in 2006. Additionally, Li served as the head coach of the junior world championship team in 2004.

Prior to working at U.S. Diving Elite, Li spent seven years (1995-2001) at the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS), which is Australia's elite diving program. While at AIS, Li earned a Level 3 accreditation from the National Coaching Accreditation Scheme (NCAS) and worked with 2004 Olympic gold medalist Chantelle Newbery, 2004 Olympic silver medalist Matthew Helm and 2004 Olympic bronze medalist Robert Newbery.

At AIS, Li helped develop the training program that aided Australia in lifting its international standing to No. 2 in the world after the 2004 Olympic Games. In addition, Li worked with Diving Australia to conduct a Talent Identification Program and participated in Australia's national camps, which were held annually for the national and developmental squad athletes.

Cincinnati native **John Janszen** is entering his second season as an assistant swimming coach at Miami. Janszen was hired in December 2006 after spending nearly seven years at Xavier University as a student-athlete and assistant coach.

Helping Miami to a second-place conference finish in 2007, Janszen mentored eight all-MAC swimmers, including back-to-back MAC Swimmer of the Year Paul Ricard. Ricard won three MAC titles and became the first Miamian in five seasons to qualify for the NCAA Championships. Ricard also set a pair of school records in the 500 freestyle (4:21.84) and 1,650 freestyle (15:11.56). In addition to helping Miami to its fourth straight top-two MAC finish, Janszen's had two swimmers place on the all-MAC academic team.

Prior to Miami, Janszen spent nearly two years coaching at Xavier (Aug. 2005 - Nov. 2006), as he assisted the men's and women's teams. With the Musketeers, Janszen assisted with all training groups, including the sprint, distance, individual medley and stroke groups. Janszen also was in charge of recruiting for the men's program.

Also an experienced YMCA coach, Janszen split time between the Powel Crosley Jr. YMCA and Gamble Nippert YMCA (2004-2006). Serving as an assistant coach at Powel Crosley since Aug. 2005, Janszen ran the National and Senior Team practices. Prior to that, Janszen served as the head coach at Gamble Nippert from Sept. 2004 to Aug. 2005.

Janszen coached at both the club and high school levels in Cincinnati, serving as the head swimming coach at Wyoming High School (Nov. 2005 - Feb. 2006), an assistant coach with the Indian Hill Swim Club (June - July 2003-05) and the head swimming coach at the North Hills Swim and Tennis Club (2000-02).

Prior to his coaching career, Janszen swam for four seasons at Xavier (2000-04), earning Team MVP and the Extra Effort Award in 2001. An Atlantic-10 Commissioner's Honor Roll selection in four semesters, Janszen also was named Xavier's Most Improved Student-Athlete in 2004.

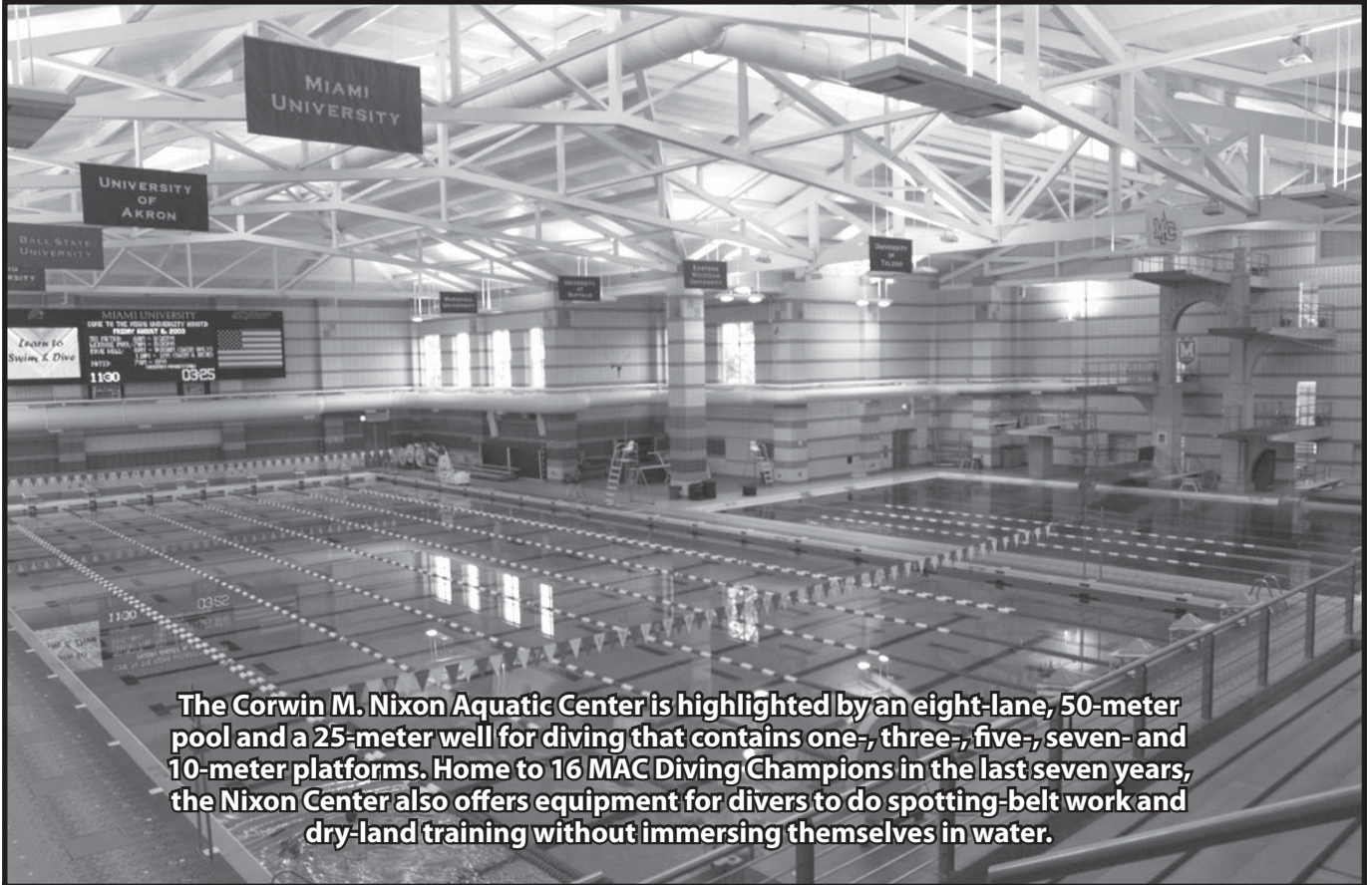

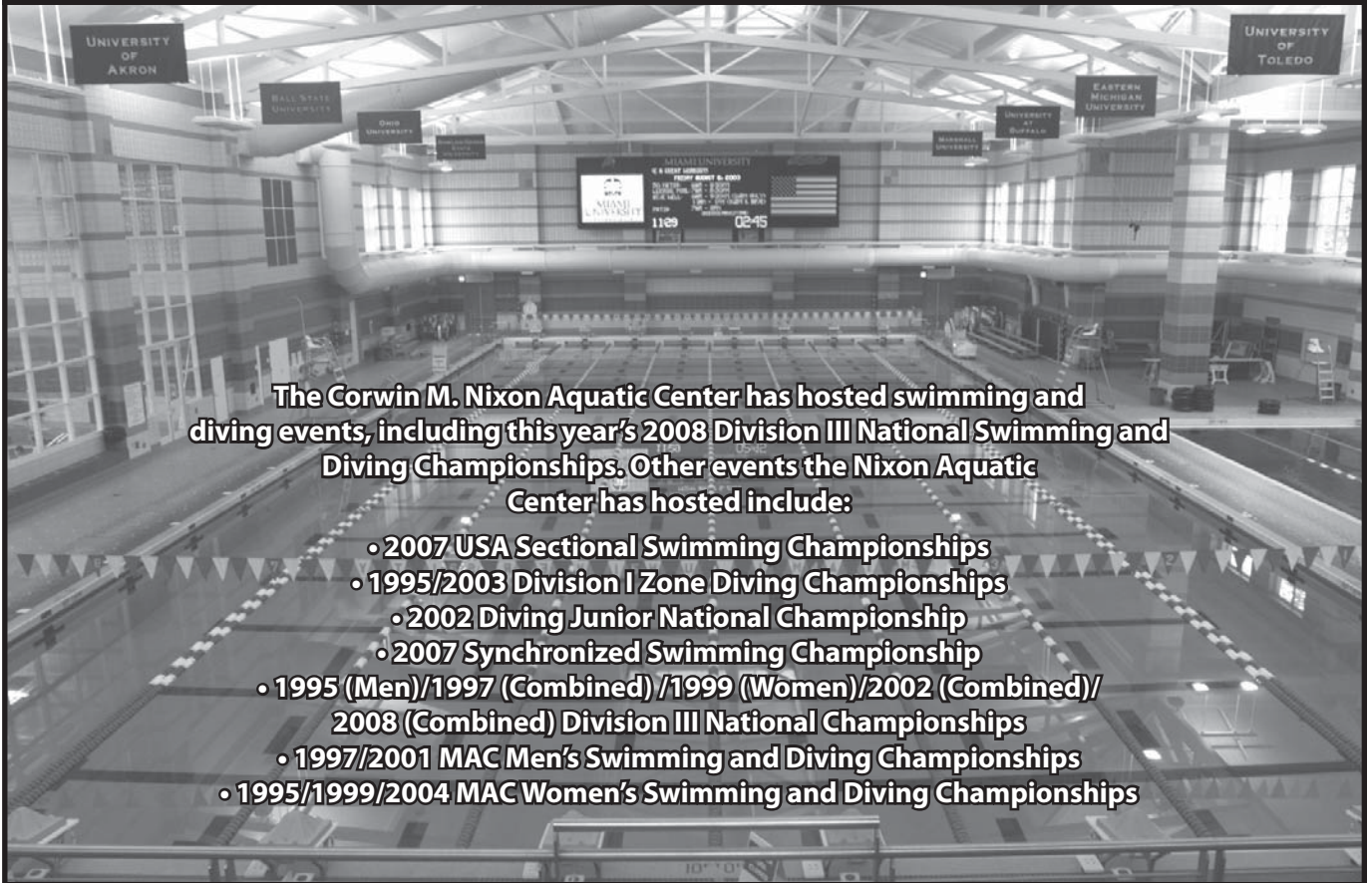

The Corwin M. Nixon Aquatic Center is highlighted by an eight-lane, 50-meter pool and a 25-meter well for diving that contains one-, three-, five-, seven- and 10-meter platforms. Home to 16 MAC Diving Champions in the last seven years, the Nixon Center also offers equipment for divers to do spotting-belt work and dry-land training without immersing themselves in water.

Individual and Team Accomplishments

TEAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

During the 2006-07 season, Miami ...

- Placed second at the MAC meet, giving Miami its fourth straight top-two MAC finish
- Won three of its four MAC dual meets, with Miami's only loss coming to the Eastern Michigan Eagles
- Head Coach **Pete Lindsay** moved eight dual meet wins away from surpassing **Raymond Ray** as the winningest coach in program history. Ray won three MAC titles and 144 dual meets as Miami head coach from 1952-1974. Lindsay has won three MAC titles and 137 dual meets since assuming the head coaching position in 1985-86.
- **Paul Ricard** and **Chris Heaton** repeated as the MAC Swimmer and Diver of the Year, respectively. Ricard won three MAC titles in the freestyle events, while Heaton swept the boards at the conference meet for the second straight season.
- Junior **Paul Ricard** qualified for the NCAA Championships, giving Miami its first national qualifier in five seasons.

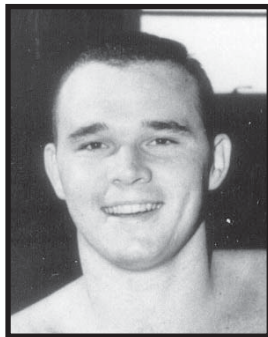


Bill Mulliken
Miami Hall of Fame

Bill Mulliken will forever be remembered as one of the greatest athletes to wear the Red and White. One of the most talented and decorated athletes in Miami swimming history, Mulliken became the first swimmer inducted into the Miami Hall of Fame in 1971.

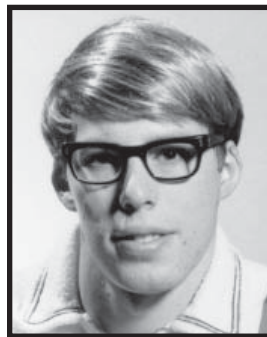
In 1959, Mulliken won an NCAA and Olympic championship, both of which were firsts for a Miami athlete. As a nine-time Mid-American Conference Champion, Mulliken set 15 Miami, Mid-American Conference, American, NCAA and Olympic records during his tenure. Best known for setting the Miami, American, NCAA and Olympic record in the 200 breaststroke, Mulliken became only the third all-America swimmer from Miami. Mulliken completed his degree at Miami before earning a law degree from Harvard Law School. The following is a list of Bill Mulliken's championship and record-setting times:

Dennis O'Brien

Dennis O'Brien earned all-America honors in the 200-yard butterfly in 1956 and 1957, becoming Miami's first swimming all-American. A winner of seven individual titles at the MAC Championship, O'Brien led Miami to its first MAC team championship in 1955. O'Brien also was a part of two national record-setting relays teams for his AAU team and held the world record in the 50-yard butterfly during his junior year. Dennis was inducted into Miami's Hall of Fame in 1996.



Tom Perrin

Tom Perrin, a 1986 inductee into Miami's Hall of Fame, was named the Swimmer of the Year in the MAC and Miami's Athlete of the Year in 1972. While at Miami, Perrin notched six MAC individual titles and was a member of three championship relay teams. He became Miami's first recipient of an NCAA post-graduate scholarship and enrolled in medical school at Indiana University.



John Russell

A 1987 Miami Hall of Fame inductee, John Russell earned All-America honors three consecutive years after finishing fifth in the 100-yard butterfly at the NCAA Swimming Championships from 1966-68. Russell was a member of nine MAC championship relay teams, and he led Miami to its first back-to-back MAC championships in 1967 and 1968. As a senior in 1968, Russell qualified for the Olympic Trials.

Miami University Director of Athletics

Since arriving in July 2006 as Miami University's 21st president, David Hodge has been a visible presence among students, staff, faculty, and alumni. Emphasizing the unique qualities of the Miami Experience, President Hodge in his first year created the Top 25 program to redesign Miami's foundation courses and launched the Miami Access Initiative, which provides tuition and fees to Ohio students with family incomes of less than \$35,000.

In recognition of the tremendous alumni support for Miami, Dr. Hodge raised the goal for Miami's Campaign for Love and Honor to \$500 million, extending the campaign through the Bicentennial and incorporating plans for a new Bicentennial Student Center.

The Hodges came to Miami last summer following Dr. Hodge's 31-year tenure at the University of Washington, where he served from 1998 to 2006 as the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, the university's largest college, with 40 departments, 900 faculty, and 500 staff who serve more than 24,000 students.

Joining the UW faculty in 1975, Dr. Hodge held the appointment of professor of geography and adjunct professor of civil engineering. In 1990, he earned the prestigious University of Washington Distinguished Teaching Award. Prior to his appointment as dean, he served as chair of the geography department (1995-97) and divisional dean for computing, facilities, and research (1996-98).

His research, which has attracted grant support from the National Science Foundation and other federal, state, and local agencies, focuses on urban and transportation geography with special interest in the impact of telecommunications. Dr. Hodge served as program director at the National Science Foundation in 1993-94 and was editor of *The Professional Geographer* from 1994 to 1997.

Additionally, he has served on numerous Seattle and Washington committees and boards dealing with issues of community development and transportation.

A native of Minnesota, Dr. Hodge earned his bachelor of arts degree in geography from Macalester College in 1970 and went on to earn his master's degree (1973) and Ph.D. (1975) in geography from Pennsylvania State University. From 2000 to 2006, he served on Macalester's Board of Trustees; prior to this, he served on the Macalester Alumni Board. An NCAA All-American, he is a member of the Macalester College Athletics Hall of Fame and remains the school's outdoor track and field record holder in the 880 (now 800 meters) with a time of 1:50.2.

President Hodge and his wife, Valerie, have two children: Gene, a graduate of the University of Washington, and Meriem, a current Miami University student.

A progressive and driving force behind Miami University's athletic department since his arrival in November of 2002, Brad Bates has been instrumental in not only upholding Miami's storied athletic tradition but also in ushering Miami athletics into the next generation of intercollegiate athletics.

Over the past five years, Bates has presided over a department that made back-to-back football bowl game appearances for the first time in nearly 30 years, while capturing conference championships in football, ice hockey, baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's swimming and diving and synchronized skating. This past year, Miami's ice hockey program made its second straight NCAA Tournament appearance and won the first tournament game in program history, the men's basketball team made its third straight postseason appearance and earned the program's 17th NCAA Tournament berth after winning the MAC Tournament, while the senior synchronized skating team made United States Skating history by capturing the silver medal at the ISU World Championships, becoming the first U.S. team to ever medal at the event. Miami also has won the Reese Trophy, an all-sport award presented annually to the MAC institution with the best all-around men's sports programs, in three of his five seasons.

In addition to the RedHawks' athletic success during his tenure, Bates has spearheaded efforts to improve the "athletic classrooms" in which Miami's student-athletes compete to rate among the best in the nation. Renovations to Yager Stadium continue, with plans for an indoor facility in the works. Already added to Yager are new stands on the east side, a state-of-the-art scoreboard, permanent lighting, Cradle of Coaches Plaza and a FieldTurf playing surface.

Additionally, Miami unveiled several new and renovated facilities last year: a brand new softball field, a brand new ice hockey facility, and a renovated field hockey field that was upgraded with a new artificial turf surface and press box.

Paramount among Bates' accomplishments has been the department's success in graduating its student-athletes. Over the first three years of the NCAA's Academic Performance Rate (APR), Miami has consistently ranked among the best Division I-A programs nationally, with a number of its individual programs posting the highest scores nationally.

Bates, who came to Miami after 17 years at Vanderbilt University, achieved a doctorate in education at Vanderbilt in 1997. This followed the bachelor's and master's degrees he earned in education at the University of Michigan in 1981 and 1982.

Athletically, Bates was a walk-on defensive back for Michigan from 1977-81. He played for then-Wolverine head football coach Bo Schembechler, a 1951 Miami alumnus and member of Miami's legendary Cradle of Coaches. In his four years as a player, the Wolverines won three Big Ten Championships, posted a record of 37-11-0 and played in three Rose Bowls and a Gator Bowl.

Bates and his wife, Michele, reside in Oxford.

ACADEMIC SERVICES

Miami's athletic department strongly emphasizes that its student-athletes succeed not only in their athletic pursuits but also in their academic endeavors. Realizing the unique demands placed on the student-athlete, Miami feels a responsibility to provide the best possible academic support.

Miami's Comprehensive Academic Support Program began during the 1987-88 academic year. The program's main focus is to monitor and track student-athlete's progress toward graduation while staying in compliance with Miami University, Mid-American Conference, U.S. Figure Skating Association, Central Collegiate Hockey Association and NCAA guidelines.

The Academic Support Program is comprised of four full-time members including **Craig Bennett**, who is an Academic Coordinator/Learning Specialist. Bennett works directly with the men's swimming and diving team.

According to head coach Pete Lindsay, "Craig supports our student-athletes in their academic pursuits and also provides them with an opportunity to grow as individuals. Craig connects student-athletes to resources across campus, and by acting as a secondary advisor, he helps keep our student-athletes informed as to how they in their coursework as well as how are they proceeding toward graduation."

The offices of the academic coordinators are located in the Walter L. Gross Jr. Family Student Athlete Development Center. The coordinators have the responsibility of implementing and coordinating all aspects of the academic support program for both the men's and women's varsity teams.

SPORTS MEDICINE

The top priority for the Miami sports medicine staff is to ensure that all student-athletes attain the highest potential for safe and effective participation in their chosen sports. This includes prevention, treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries, utilizing the latest techniques and equipment.

The main goal of the training staff is to prevent an injury from occurring. This involves getting to know the athletes and determining what factors could predispose them to injury, then acting to improve the situation. This process could include anything from routine taping to strengthening exercises for a chronic problem.

Despite all precautions, injuries occur, and when they do, the qualifications of the Miami athletic training staff become apparent. Regardless of the severity of the injury, the athletic trainers are prepared to give immediate quality evaluations and treatments for the condition. When the athletes return to competition, they do so after completion of a personally designed rehabilitation program with the goal of getting the athlete back to pre-injury status as quickly as possible.

Benefiting from one of the finest training rooms in Division I athletics, Miami's athletes are cared for with muscle stimulators, ultrasound, whirlpools and other state-of-the-art rehabilitation equipment. The resources do not end with the equipment, as the staff of 10 certified athletic trainers and 30 student trainers have established one of the best sports medicine programs nationally.

Miami's sports medicine department is directed by head trainer Gale Newton, who is aided by assistant trainers Jennifer Beardslee, Dave Donnelly, Jason Eckerle, Paul Eversole, Megan Shaw, Misao Tanioka, Rebecca Way, Amy Whitman and Mike Young. This is Tanioka first season working with the baseball team.

Further bolstering Miami's Sports Medicine Department are a host of professionals who help get Miami's student-athletes back on the field. Team physicians Dr. Steve Dailey, a former Miami football letterwinner, and Dr. Doug Ross are joined by team orthopedic surgeon Dr. Ron Hess and team chiropractor Dr. Todd Elwert. Mark Cristell serves as the team's primary physical therapist.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING

In today's highly-competitive world of intercollegiate athletics, the guidance and training a student-athlete receives in their strength and conditioning program is every bit as important as the direction they receive on the field. At Miami University, the strength and conditioning program is a source of pride and tradition.

Heading Miami's strength and conditioning program is **James Carsey**, who enters his seventh season at Miami and third year as head strength and conditioning coach. A former football standout at Ashland University, Carsey understands the direct link between success in the weightroom and success on the field.

"While the coaching staff is able to provide more direction during the season, it is limited by NCAA regulations as to how much time it can spend with the team at other times of the year," Carsey said. "The strength and conditioning staff works with the team all year long and has the opportunity to aid in each student-athletes' physical and mental development. Our role in maintaining an individual's drive throughout the year is key in getting the most out of that individual's potential."

Carsey succeeds long-time strength and conditioning coach Dan Dalrymple, who was named head strength coach for the New Orleans Saints last winter after spending 17 years building Miami's strength and conditioning program from the ground up. Assisting Carsey are full-time assistant Ryan Faehnle, who joined the staff this past summer, second-year intern Matt Cady and a group of well-trained student assistants.

"Coach Dalrymple's philosophy was always that student-athletes come to Miami to be champions, and it's our obligation to provide those student-athletes with the tools to reach their full potential," Carsey said. "We still embrace that mindset, while also working to instill qualities such as pride, integrity, loyalty and dedication."

Philosophy: Miami is a residential university with a focus on teaching undergraduates. A liberal education core complements the more specialized studies of the majors.

Established: Founded in 1809, Miami is named for the Miami Native American Tribe that inhabited the area now known as the Miami Valley Region of Ohio. Miami is the seventh-oldest state institution west of the Allegheny Mountains.

Locations: Main campus in Oxford, Ohio (35 miles north of Cincinnati and 45 minutes southwest of Dayton); regional campuses in Hamilton and Middletown, Ohio; European Center in Luxembourg. The main campus in and around Oxford consists of 1,179 acres.

Enrollment: 14,385 undergraduates and 1,341 graduate students on the Oxford campus; approximately 2,492 on Hamilton Campus ; 1,908 on Middletown Campus

Diversity: Multicultural students make up 8.1 percent of the first-year class and 7.9 percent of the undergraduate student body

A Culture of Champions

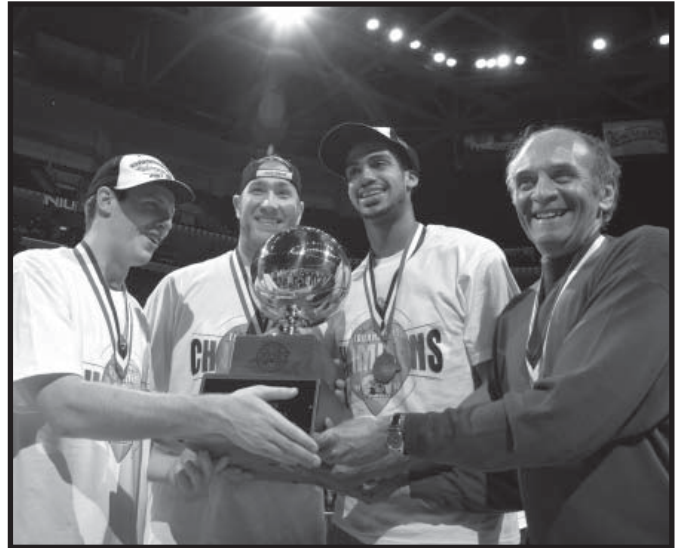

Miami nickname history

At the request of the Oklahoma-based Miami Tribe, (for whom the school is named) the Miami Board of Trustees voted on Sept. 25, 1996 to discontinue the use of Redskins as the nickname for the University's athletic teams.

More than 3,000 nickname suggestions (700 different names) from alumni and current members of the Miami community were received. At its meeting on April 19, 1997, the board selected the nickname RedHawks from three nickname finalists—RedHawks, Thunderhawks and Miamis—forwarded them by the athletic nickname selection committee. The new moniker went into effect July 1, 1997.

Then-University president Dr. James C. Garland unveiled the RedHawk logos at a press conference on Oct. 18, 1997 prior to the Marshall game.

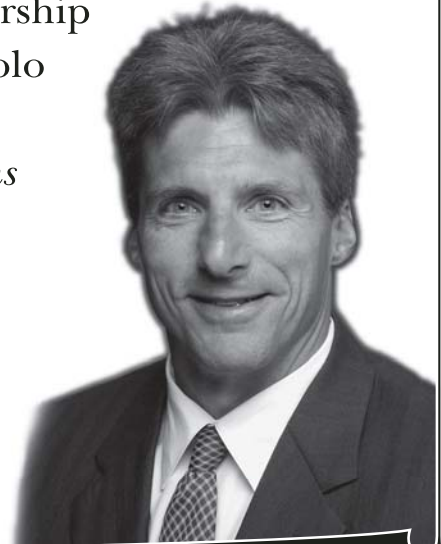
Swoop, the mascot of Miami teams, made its first appearance on Dec. 9, 1997, before the men's basketball contest versus Xavier.

Use of the nickname Redskins for Miami athletic teams dated back to the 1930-31 school year, when the Miami alumni magazine, then edited by the school's lone publicity man, Ralph McGinnis, announced the new nickname as successor to Big Red, which had caused confusion with Denison University teams.

A similar tag had popped up in a 1928 story in the *Miami Student* that referred to the "Big Red-Skinned Warriors," but the transition was not made for another three years. For a time in 1931, Redskins and Big Red were used interchangeably in *The Student*. Prior to 1928, teams had been referred to as The Miami Boys, The Big Reds or The Reds and Whites.

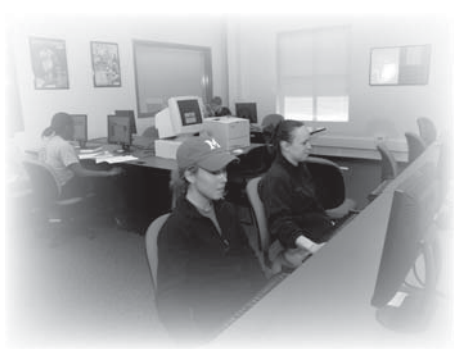

THE WALTER L. GROSS CENTER

The hub of Miami's athletic facilities, the \$5 million Walter L. Gross Jr. Family Student-Athlete Development Center was dedicated in the fall of 2001. This facility, which is located between Millett Hall and Yager Stadium, caters to both the academic and physical needs of Miami's student-athletes.

One half of the facility is dedicated for a 10,000-square foot physical fitness center, which includes free and machine weights, a circuit training machine, cardiovascular equipment, and speed, agility and jump training facilities.

The other portion of the center is devoted to academic enrichment. The new center features two large study areas, an informal study lounge, private tutoring offices and a computer lab.

"Miami's athletics' program has always prided itself with a strong commitment to both athletics and academics," says Steve Cady, senior associate athletic director and chair of the project design team. "This facility epitomizes our philosophy. It is an unbelievable addition to our facilities."

Separating the academic and physical fitness centers is a main lobby and reception area, which features a rotunda that dominates the reception lobby ceiling. Miami's rich athletic tradition, headlined by a listing of Miami's past and present All-Americans, is highlighted on the rotunda.

The facility opened its doors to student-athletes during the summer of 2001 and had a Grand Opening Gala on Friday, Sept. 21 in conjunction with Miami's football home opener with Cincinnati.

"This is a showcase facility for Miami University athletics," says former academic coordinator and current Red and White Club director Darcy Shriver. "It is a convenient location for our student-athletes to enrich their academic and athletic experience, and it represents another Miami commitment to first-rate athletic facilities."
