2.) CONFERENCE TOURNEY TIDBITS: Miami is 18-19 all-time in the MAC Tournament, having lost its last two conference tournament games. Miami's last win in the conference tournament came against Western Michigan in 2005 when it downed the Broncos in the first round, 74-71, in Oxford and is 8-7 under head coach **Maria Fantanarosa** in the MAC Tournament.

MAC TOURNAMENT OPENER: After finishing as the fourth place team in the East Division, the Miami University women's basketball team (12-17; 6-10 MAC) plays in the opening game of the 2007 Mid-American Conference Tournament Sunday, March 4 against the Western Michigan Broncos (13-17; 6-10 MAC). The RedHawks and Broncos, who are the No. 5 seed in the West Division, tip off at 1 p.m. at Quicken Loans Arena.

SCOUTING THE BRONCOS: Led by 10th-year head coach **Ron Stewart** (Indiana '71), Western Michigan stands at 13-17 overall and 6-10 in MAC play. The Broncos finished as the fifth-place team in the MAC West ... Western Michigan and Toledo finished with identical 6-10 conference records in the MAC West, but the Rockets held the tiebreaker by virtue of their season sweep of the series and earned the No. 4 seed in the West ... Western Michigan boasts the nation's leading scorer in senior guard **Carrie Moore**, who is averaging 25.3 points per game. **Lindsey Brown** (12.7 ppg) and **Tiera Delahoussaye** (11.4 ppg) also average double-figure points ... Moore's 405 points during conference play were more than any player on her team scored during the entire season ... Brown leads the team in rebounding with 8.7 rebounds per game, while Moore ranks second on the team with 7.0 rebounds per game ... Moore was the team's leading rebounder during conference play with 8.4 rebounds per game.

AT LOOK AT THE SERIES: Miami and Western Michigan are meeting for the 50th time in series history, with Miami holding a 28-21 series edge ... The Broncos won the team's first meeting this season, 90-68, on Feb. 10 at University Arena in Kalamazoo ... Miami is 4-2 against Western Michigan in neutral site games, with Miami winning the team's last four meetings in neutral site games, all which have come in the MAC Tournament ... Miami won the team's last meeting in the MAC Tournament, 74-71, in Oxford in 2005 and won the team's last meeting in Cleveland, 77-70, in 2002 ... Western Michigan has two straight in the all-time series ... head coach **Maria Fantanarosa** is 5-6 against Western Michigan during her nine-year tenure.

LAST MEETING WITH WESTERN MICHIGAN: Western Michigan 90, Miami 68 (Feb. 10, 2007)—Unable to overcome a sluggish start, Miami fell, 90-68, to the Western Michigan Broncos at University Arena. Despite 23 points and 10 rebounds from junior **Jaclyn Leininger**, Miami trailed by 22 at halftime and was held to 35.2 percent shooting in the loss ... Miami was held scoreless for the game's first 4:26, and Western Michigan pushed its lead to 18-4 by the 12:28 mark ... Miami trailed by as many as 21 in the first half and went into halftime down 41-22. Leininger finished with 15 first-half points on 7-of-12 shooting and grabbed eight rebounds, but the rest of the RedHawks went a combined 3-of-24 from the floor ... Junior **Amanda Jackson** scored Miami's first 10 points of the second half, but the RedHawks could not chip away at Western Michigan's lead and still trailed, 50-34, with 15:49 remaining ... Western Michigan increased its lead to 25 by the 10-minute mark ... Carrie Moore, who entered the game as the nation's leading scorer, paced Western Michigan with 29 points and 11 rebounds.

A MIAMI WIN OVER WESTERN MICHIGAN WOULD:

- Give Miami its first MAC Tournament win since defeating Western Michigan in the first round of the 2005 tourney
- Snap Miami's four-game losing streak
- Be Miami's fifth straight win over Western Michigan in the MAC Tournament
- Be Miami's first win away from Millett Hall since Jan. 3, 2007

A MIAMI LOSS TO WESTERN MICHIGAN WOULD:

- Be Miami's eighth loss in nine games
- Snap Miami's four-game postseason winning streak against Western Michigan
- Be Miami's eighth straight loss away from Millett Hall
- End Miami's 2006-07 season with a 12-18 record

HEAD COACH MARIA FANTANAROSA: A

former standout on the court for the Red and White, **Maria Fantanarosa** is in her ninth season working the sidelines for the Miami women's basketball program and owns a 138-121 (.533) record at Miami. Fantanarosa surpassed Pam Wettig as the winningest coach in program history with an 87-79 victory over IUPUI (Dec. 30), winning her 132nd career game with the Red and White.

After taking over a team that had no freshman class in 1998, she guided the team to a program-record six straight winning seasons, including two MAC East Division Championships. In 2003-04, Fantanarosa led Miami to its first MAC Championship and 20-win season since 1989-90 while earning MAC Coach of the Year honors.

Fantanarosa also has helped Miami players to all-MAC accolades 12 times, including 2001-02 MAC Player of the Year Heather Cusick. After this past season, she received a contract extension that carries her through 2011.

A 1990 graduate of Miami, Fantanarosa was a two-time all-MAC honoree for the Red and White. Following her graduation, she went on to serve as an assistant women's basketball coach for Xavier (1990-94) and South Carolina (1994-97) before serving a one-year stint as head coach at Western Carolina (1997-98).

One of the most prolific scorers in high school girls basketball history, Fantanarosa's 3,823 career points while at Mt. Carmel Area High School in Kulpmont, Pa., rank among the all-time top 10 nationally.

THESE GUARDS ARE GOOD: Miami's backcourt closed the regular season strong, as they shouldered the bulk of the team's scoring load over the final five games. Miami's three starting guards — junior **Amanda Jackson** and sophomores **Jenna Schone** and **Ashley Hawkins** — combined to average 53.8 points per game over the past five games, with Jackson averaging 23.0 ppg in the last five contests. Miami's three starting guards have combined to score at least 50 points in each of the past five games, and Wednesday's loss at Bowling Green was the first time in five games that all three Miami starting guards did not hit double-figure points. Schone led Miami with 19 points against nationally-ranked Bowling Green, with Jackson chipping in 17 points and Hawkins adding nine.

EAST AND WEST TIDBITS: Miami finished the regular season with a 4-6 record against the MAC East Division and a 2-4 record against the MAC West ... In its own division, Miami swept Buffalo, split with Ohio and Akron and was swept by Kent State and Bowling Green ... Miami's regular-season sweep of Buffalo was the program's first MAC regular-season sweep since the 2003-04 season ... Miami has posted an all-time mark of 133-100 (.570 winning percentage) against MAC East opponents and an all-time mark of 166-101 (.621 winning percentage) against MAC West opponents.

CONFERENCE TOURNEY TIDBITS: Miami is 18-19 all-time in the MAC Tournament, having lost its last two conference tournament games ... Last season, Miami bowed out in the first round of the MAC Tournament with a 73-65 loss to Northern Illinois ... Miami's last win in the conference tournament came against Western Michigan in 2005 when it downed the Broncos in the first round, 74-71, in Oxford ... Miami has won its last four conference tournament games against Western Michigan dating back to 1993. The RedHawks have defeated the Broncos in the conference tournament in 1993, 1996, 2002 and 2005 ... Miami is 8-7 under head coach **Maria Fantanarosa** in the MAC Tournament.

ROAD AND HOME SPLITS: Miami finished the season with a 4-11 road record and 7-5 home record ... Miami has lost seven straight away from Millett Hall, a streak it looks to snap against Western Michigan in the first round of the MAC Tournament ... By finishing 7-5 at Millett Hall this season, Miami clinched its seventh winning home record in the past eight seasons ... Miami

has won at least seven home games in six of the last nine seasons ... Miami's last road win was Jan. 3 when it defeated Buffalo, 72-59, at Alumni Arena.

MAC TOURNAMENT BRACKET: With the regular season complete, the MAC Tournament picture is set, with Miami earning the No. 4 seed in the MAC East ... Bowling Green and Kent State clinched first round byes in the MAC East, with Ball State and Eastern Michigan earning first-round byes in the MAC West ... Bowling Green and Ball State won the division titles in the MAC East and West, respectively ... The following are the first-round matchups for the 2007 MAC Tournament:

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE: After forcing 14 Bowling Green turnovers in Wednesday's loss, Miami finished the conference slate +5.25 in turnover margin, which ranks second in the conference in MAC-only games. Even more impressive is the fact that Miami forced its opponent into 14 or more turnovers in every MAC game this season, including 20 or more turnovers seven times. Miami also converted defense into offense, as it is averaged 19.4 points per game off turnovers in conference play.

MASTERS OF THE SWIPE: Though it finished with only seven steals in Wednesday's loss to Bowling Green, Miami finished its conference slate ranked second in the MAC in steals during conference play with 11.25 steals per game ... With a defense predicated on ball pressure and disrupting the passing lanes, the RedHawks have reached double-digit steals in eight of the final 10 regular season games and 19 times overall this season ... Junior **Amanda Jackson** finished with a team-high four steals against Bowling Green ... Miami finished the regular season ranked third overall in the MAC in steals with 10.76 steals per game, with Jackson leading the team at 2.69 steals per game.

MAC ACCOLADES: After posting back-to-back 20-point games against Akron (Feb. 21) and Kent State (Feb. 24), junior guard **Amanda Jackson** was tabbed as the Mid-American Conference East Division Player of the Week (Monday, Feb. 26) for the fourth time this season. Jackson opened the week with 28 points and seven rebounds at Akron and followed with 23 points in Miami's final regular-season home game against Kent State. For the week, Jackson averaged 25.5 points per game and 5.5 rebounds per contest. Jackson also chipped in four steals and five assists while shooting 46.9 percent from the field (15-for-32) and 46.2 percent (6-for-16) from 3-point range. Jackson also earned the MAC East Player of the Week award on Nov. 15, Nov. 29 and Jan. 8.

FINISHING STRONG: Noted for her ability to score points in bunches, junior guard **Amanda Jackson** has been Miami's most impressive second-half performer this season. The 5-foot-9 guard posted 11 second-half double-figure scoring efforts during MAC play, including 12 second-half points in Wednesday's loss to nationally-ranked Bowling Green. Jackson finished Miami's MAC slate averaging 12.2 second-half points per game and was held under 10 second-half points only five times in conference action.

ON THE BOARDS: Though she is perhaps more comfortable as a three, junior **Jaclyn Leininger** has provided an important presence in the post for Miami, averaging 7.5 rebounds over the past nine games. Leininger finished the month of February with three double-doubles, and as Miami's most consistent post threat, Leininger averaged 8.3 points and 6.4 rebounds per game in conference play.

BLUE-COLLAR EFFORT: Junior **Laura Markwood** ended the season strong for the RedHawks, averaging 8.6 rebounds per game over the final three games of the regular season. After an 11-rebound game at Akron (Feb. 21), Markwood followed with a 10-rebound, five-steal performance against Kent State (Feb. 24) and added five points and five rebounds in the regular-season finale at Bowling Green (Feb. 28). After being slowed by a knee injury that cost her four games in December, Markwood is beginning to look like she is back near 100 percent, as the games against Akron and Kent State were the first back-to-back double-digit rebound games of her career.

PLAYER MILESTONES: Having scored 1,265 career points, junior guard **Amanda Jackson** continues to move up the career scoring chart and now ranks eighth on the Miami all-time

list. With 17 points against Bowling Green on Wednesday, Jackson moved within five points of passing **Colleen Day** (2000-04) for seventh place ... With 223 career steals, Jackson ranks fifth all-time at Miami ... Jackson's career scoring average of 14.3 points per game ranks third on the Miami all-time list ... Sophomore **Jenna Schone** has 95 career 3-point field goals and needs five more to reach 100. She ranks ninth on the Miami career list for 3-point field goals made.

WHEN IT'S OKAY TO ONE-UP YOUR COACH: Ranking eighth on the Miami career scoring list with 1,265 career points, junior guard **Amanda Jackson** has surpassed both current Miami head coach **Maria Fantanarosa** (14th; 1,086 career points) and assistant coach **Lisa Hayden** (16th; 1,047 points) on the Red and White's career scoring list. After becoming the third-fastest player in program history to reach the milestone scoring mark, Jackson is four points away from passing another member of the Miami coaching staff—assistant coach **Colleen Day** (1,269 points), who stands seventh on the Red and White's all-time scoring list.

SEASON MILESTONES: In addition to her career milestones, junior guard **Amanda Jackson** is on pace for numerous single-season records ... With 513 points this season, Jackson ranks third on the Miami single-season chart and needs 12 points to top **Heather Cusick's** and **Mary Ann Myers'** single-season record of 524 points. Miami is guaranteed to play at least one more game with its first-round MAC Tournament game ... Jackson's .854 free throw percentage (117-for-137) ranks fourth on the Miami single-season charts ... With 12 20-point games this year, Jackson has tied Cusick's single-season record for 20-point games ... Sophomore **Jenna Schone** (131 assists) ranks 10th in the single-season assists chart. The Miami record for assists in a season is 168.

DOUBLE-FIGURE FUN: Scoring 17 points in Wednesday's loss to Bowling Green, junior guard **Amanda Jackson** registered her 16th double-figure scoring effort in the past 17 games. As Miami's leading scorer at 17.7 points per game, Jackson has been held under 10 points only once since the calendar has changed to 2007, which was a nine-point effort at Northern Illinois. Making a successful return from a knee injury that sidelined her for all but 10 minutes of the 2005-06 season, Jackson has hit double-figure points in 24 of Miami's 29 games, including 10 20-point games and two 30-point games.

THE HAWK: As a potent scoring threat, sophomore guard **Ashley Hawkins** averaged 14.0 points per game over the final five regular season games. After being held to a combined 15 points in losses to Eastern Michigan (Feb. 7) and Western Michigan (Feb. 10), Hawkins responded with double-figure points in four of Miami's final five regular season games. The 5-foot-9 guard has been one of Miami's most improved players this season, as she has more than doubled her scoring average from her freshman season from 5.2 ppg to 10.9 ppg. Since moving into the starting lineup at the beginning of MAC play, Hawkins has hit the 20-point mark four times and finished as the team's second-leading scorer in conference play at 13.4 points per game.

THE FLOOR GENERAL: Averaging 16.8 points per game over Miami's final five regular season games, sophomore **Jenna Schone** upped her season scoring average to 11.8 ppg, which ranks second on the team. Schone also has been Miami's best distributor this season, dishing out 131 assists (4.52 assists per game) and posting three double-digit assist efforts. Schone ended the regular season ranked in the top sixth in the conference in assists in overall games (5th, 4.52 apg) and MAC-only contests (6th, 4.31 apg). Schone has started all 57 games of her college career and was a 2006 All-MAC Freshman Team honoree.

MILESTONE VICTORY: With Miami's 87-79 victory over IUPUI on Dec. 30, 2006, head coach **Maria Fantanarosa** picked up her 132nd career win and became the winningest coach in program history. Fantanarosa surpassed former Miami mentor **Pam Wettig** as the all-time wins leader on her fourth attempt at the milestone win. Now in her ninth season at the helm of the Red and White, Fantanarosa holds a 138-121 all-time mark as Miami's head coach.

Sophomore **Jenna Schone** iced two free throws with six seconds remaining and junior **Amanda Jackson** made a dramatic comeback to the hardwood, as Miami escaped Cleveland State's Goodman Arena with an 86-84 season-opening victory over the host Vikings.

After trailing during much of the second half, Miami surged ahead over the final three minutes of the game only to see Cleveland State almost force overtime with a late 3-point field goal. Schone was fouled by a trapping CSU player on the ensuing in-bounds pass, however, and drained both free throws to regain the lead. Sophomore Stephanie Ford deflected a CSU pass on the game's final possession, preventing the Vikings from getting off a final shot and securing the victory.

Jackson, who returned to the floor for the first time since suffering a season-ending knee injury on Nov. 20 of last season, poured in a career-high 31 points and added six steals while reminding Miami fans just how much she was missed during a trying 2005-06 campaign.

Miami spent much of the first half battling through its opening-game jitters and trailed 17-9 after a Viking 3-pointer at the 12:16 mark. Struggling with foul trouble and facing a significant rebounding deficit, the RedHawks finally jump-started their offense by turning up the defensive intensity. Sparked by Jackson, who swiped five first-half steals, Miami clawed back into the game behind 16 first-half points off turnovers.

The RedHawks led by as many as 10 points after a Schone bucket to start the first half but the teams would battle back and forth throughout the half, with the game featuring 12 lead changes and 11 ties.

The Big Ten's first visit to Millett Hall since 1982 was an unpleasant one for the host Miami RedHawks, as Northwestern University blistered the RedHawks, 80-51, in women's basketball action.

Sophomore **Jenna Schone** led Miami early, hitting her first three shots, as the RedHawks pressed out to a 9-6 edge by the first media timeout. The Wildcats exploded out of the timeout, however, pouring in 11 unanswered points to claim their first edge of the night and force a Miami timeout. Trailing 17-9, Miami finally ended its drought with an **Ashleigh Brown** bucket at the 12-minute mark.

The RedHawks would trail by double digits on two occasions before **Eve Pyle** scored five straight Miami points to close the gap to seven points at 9:47. Northwestern, which continued to simmer from the field, would let Miami no closer and pressed out to a 15-point edge by the six-minute mark. Leading the RedHawks, who finished the night at 24 percent from the field, was Pyle, who contributed a double-double of 12 points and 10 rebounds, including seven offensive boards.

Led by junior **Sarah Hull's** career-high 23 points, Miami sprinted to a 90-63 victory over Wright State University at the E.J. Nutter Center. Hull scored 17 second-half points and was one of four RedHawks in double figures as Miami snapped its two-game losing skid.

Miami rebounded from a 29-point loss to Northwestern and posted its largest margin of victory since a 90-63 win over New Orleans on Nov. 25, 2006. Along with Hull, junior **Laura Markwood** (11), sophomore **Eve Pyle** (16) and sophomore **Stephanie Ford** (12) scored in double figures as Miami hit the 90-point mark for the second time this season. Sophomore **Jenna Schone** added a career-high 10 assists in the victory.

Miami opened on a 13-3 run, holding the Raiders without a field goal for the first 4:10 of the game. After Miami led by as many as 14, Wright State clawed its way back with a 15-7 run and trailed by only six at the 10-minute mark. Holding a 24-22 at the final media timeout, Ford and Hull combined to score Miami's final 10 points of the half and helped the RedHawks take a 34-28 lead into halftime.

The RedHawks opened the second half on a 14-4 run over the first four minutes, sparked by the hot shooting of Hull, who hit five 3-pointers in the second half. Miami stretched its lead to 62-45 with just under 12 minutes to play, and it grew to as many as 30 by the eight-minute mark, with Miami ripping off a 13-0 run and holding Wright State scoreless from the 11:30 to 7:20 marks.

Miami's lead hit 34 at the 4:10 mark, its largest of the game, and the RedHawks coasted over the final four minutes as they wrapped up a 27-point win.

Northern Iowa jumped out to an 11-4 lead over the first four minutes of the game, but Miami cut Northern Iowa's lead to 16-12 by the 11:27 mark, as its pressure defense came up with five early steals. The two teams traded baskets for the remainder of the first half, as there were three ties and two lead changes, and a Panther basket with 55 seconds left gave Northern Iowa a 32-30 lead at intermission.

Northern Iowa went on a 7-0 run and took a 55-48 lead with 7:13 left in the game, but the RedHawks answered with a 10-3 run of their own, tying the game at 58-58 with 5:17 remaining. Miami went up, 62-59, but a pair of Northern Iowa baskets knotted the game at 64-64 with just under one minute to play. Both teams turned the ball over in the final minute, and Northern Iowa's desperation three-pointer from halfcourt fell well short.

Northern Iowa then scored the first nine points in overtime and held Miami scoreless for the first 4:40 of the extra frame as it secured a seven-point win. Pyle (12 points) and Hawkins (10 points) also scored in double figures for Miami, but it was undone by its 37 percent shooting.

Sophomore **Jenna Schone** scored a career-high 19 points and 10 different RedHawks found their way into the scoring column as Miami defeated Youngstown State, 69-51, for its first home win.

On a chilly shooting night in which Miami converted on 35.5 percent of its shots, Schone was the RedHawks' hottest hand as she pumped in 14 second-half points and finished 8-of-13 from the floor. Junior **Amanda Jackson** added 17 points, five rebounds, four steals and two assists.

After Miami opened the game on a 7-0 run, Youngstown State responded and took an 8-7 lead with 15:52 left in the half. Both teams cooled off considerably, but Jackson took over at the seven-minute mark, scoring six of Miami's eight points, to push the RedHawks in front, 23-18, with 3:30 remaining. Miami took a 29-21 lead into intermission after **Eve Pyle** drained a 3-pointer from the right wing with under a minute left in the half.

The RedHawks opened the second half by scoring the first eight points, but after holding Youngstown State without a field goal for the first 4:23 of the half, the Penguins ripped off a 10-0 run and narrowed Miami's lead to six. Miami extended its lead to 15 with 7:43 remaining after Schone, junior **Laura Markwood** and sophomore **Ashley Hawkins** scored six straight points. The RedHawks lead grew to 18 with less than three minutes to play as they put the finishing touches on a their double-digit victory.

Despite a career-high 20 points from sophomore **Jenna Schone**, a late run from the visiting Tulane Green Wave handed Miami University an 82-67 loss at Millett Hall. Miami battled back from a double-digit second-half deficit and trailed by only one with under six minutes to play, but Tulane scored nine unanswered points over the final 4:35 to seal the victory.

The teams traded baskets for the first eight minutes as Miami trailed, 20-16, at the 12-minute mark. Tulane responded with an 11-2 run over the next 2:44, but Schone single-handedly brought Miami back with eight straight points. The RedHawks pulled to within one but went into the locker room down, 41-37, at halftime. Schone finished the half 7-of-7 from the floor, with her only misses of the first 20 minutes coming at the free throw line.

After intermission, Tulane scored seven unanswered points after junior **Laura Markwood** opened the half with a putback, but junior **Sarah Hull's** 3-pointer cut the Green Wave's lead to 50-44 with 16:29 left.

After Tulane's lead hit double digits at 66-56, Miami ripped off a 9-0 run, as Ashley Hawkins' transition layup pulled Miami within one, 66-65, with 6:07 remaining.

A 9-0 Green Wave run that coincided with Schone fouling out with 3:12 left in the game effectively sealed the game. Miami managed only field goal over the final six minutes.

Following up a 19-point outing against Youngstown State, Schone posted her third straight double-figure scoring game, hitting her first seven shots of the game and finishing 8-of-9 from the floor.

Four different players scored in double figures, led by junior **Jaclyn Leininger's** second career double-double, as Miami kicked off "Beat Big Ten Week" with an impressive 84-74 win over the Michigan Wolverines. Starting in place of an injured **Laura Markwood**, Leininger scored 22 points on 9-of-14 shooting and grabbed a career-high 11 rebounds as the RedHawks defeated the Wolverines in their first visit to Millett Hall.

In addition to Leininger's 22 points -- which was two shy of a career high -- junior **Sarah Hull** (18 points), junior **Amanda Jackson** (13 points) and sophomore **Eve Pyle** (13 points) all hit double figures in points as Miami shot 51.7 percent from the floor. More importantly, the RedHawks converted their shots late, as Miami ended the game on a 9-0 run over the game's final 1:59 and handed the Wolverines a 10-point loss.

Miami sprinted out to an 11-4 lead over the first 5:38 and led for the final 16:30 of the first half as it shot 64 percent from the floor, including 4-of-8 from 3-point range. After halftime, Miami's lead grew to as many as 11 before a 17-5 Michigan run put the Wolverines in front, 68-67, with 6:52 remaining in the game.

Michigan tied the game at 72-72 with 3:10 left, but a 6-2 Miami run that included five straight points from Leininger, gave the RedHawks a 78-74 advantage with 1:32 remaining. Miami then forced a poor shot with the shot clock expiring on Michigan's next possession, and Hull hit a pair of free throws to put Miami up, 80-74, with 45 seconds left.

Michigan forced another shot in traffic with 35 seconds on the clock, and Pyle's layup with 16 seconds left after Miami broke a halfcourt trap effectively sealed the victory.

Miami jumped out to a 23-21 lead with 9:53 left in the first half, but a 31-14 run to close the half sent the RedHawks into the locker room down 49-37. Leininger picked up two fouls in the first seven minutes of the half, while sophomore **Stephanie Ford** and **Kris Coner** had three fouls and two fouls, respectively.

Illinois State's lead grew to as many as 17 in the second half, but seven straight Miami points from Leininger cut Miami's deficit to 12 with under 12 minutes left in game. A Leininger 3-pointer from the right wing was part of a 7-0 Miami run that cut Illinois State's lead to single digits at 71-63 with 9:50 remaining, but Leininger picked up her fourth foul at the 8:04 mark, and Illinois State held Miami without a field goal for the final 4:38 as it wrapped up a double-digit win.

Career-best scoring efforts from sophomores **Jenna Schone** and **Ashley Hawkins** carried Miami to its fourth straight win, as the RedHawks downed Akron, 79-73, at Millett Hall. Schone and Hawkins scored 27 and 21 points, respectively, as Miami moved to 3-0 in Mid-American Conference play for the first time since the 2001-02 season.

Junior **Amanda Jackson** also scored in double figures in the victory, notching 16 points and scoring her 1,000th career point at the 16:08 mark in the second half. Jackson became the third-fastest player in program history to join the 1,000-point club, hitting the mark in her 75th game.

Cold shooting by Miami in an early hole before a pair of free throws from freshman **Courtney Reed** gave the RedHawks their first lead of the game, 10-8, with 13:02 left in the half.

Miami took a 14-12 lead after back-to-back transition baskets from Hawkins and Jackson, but Akron answered with an 8-2 run, taking a 20-16 lead with 7:54 remaining. The Zips' lead grew to six by the six-minute mark, and Akron led for the rest of the half, carrying a 34-28 into intermission.

Pushing the tempo after intermission, Miami reeled off a 19-6 run to start the half, with Jackson and Schone accounting for 15 of the RedHawks' 19 points in the spurt. Miami hit eight of its first 12 shots in the second half, pushing out to a 47-40 lead with 14:49 left in the game.

The Zips pulled to within four twice in the final 10 minutes before a 13-4 RedHawk run pushed their advantage to 71-58 at the three-minute mark. Miami then weathered a late Akron run, as the Zips got as close as six before Schone hit seven free throws over the final 31 seconds to put the game away.

A furious rally by Miami fell short at the M.A.C. Center, as Kent State downed the RedHawks, 83-76. Despite a career-high 22 points from sophomore **Ashley Hawkins**, Miami nearly rallied from a pair of 10-point second-half deficits but ultimately dropped its first Mid-American Conference game of the season.

Miami sprinted out to an 11-3 lead after the first four minutes and forced Kent State to call an early timeout at the 16:05 mark. After Miami's lead hit 10 at 13-3, Kent State reeled off eight straight points and cut Miami's lead to 13-11 with 13:24 left in the first half. Miami then pushed its lead to 17-11 before a 9-2 run gave Kent State its first lead of the game at 20-19 at the 10-minute mark.

Kent State ended the first half on a 14-6 run and took a 44-34 lead into intermission. Miami turned the ball over three times in the final 2:56, and the Golden Flashes hit on 53.3 percent (16-of-30) from the floor.

In the second half, Kent State continued to convert easy baskets and still held a 52-42 edge with 16 minutes remaining. An 11-3 Miami run, however, brought the RedHawks right back, narrowing Kent State's lead to 56-53 with 7:49 remaining.

Miami knotted the game at 59-59 off sophomore **Jenna Schone's** 3-pointer from the right wing with 10:14 left to play but could not get over the hump, as the Golden Flashes pushed out to an 11-point lead at 79-68 with 3:26 remaining.

Four quick points from Hawkins and mid-range jumper from Schone cut Kent State's lead to 79-74 at the two-minute mark, but the RedHawks' rally fell short as the Golden Flashes converted their free throws down the stretch.

Despite nearly rallying from a 14-point deficit with under three minutes to play, Miami fell to the 17th-ranked Bowling Green Falcons, 64-56, at Millett Hall. Trailing 58-44 with 3:05 remaining, Miami put together a 12-2 run and pulled to within four with under 40 seconds but could not get over the hump as Bowling Green won its 30th consecutive Mid-American Conference game.

Hosting a ranked team for only the fourth time in program history, junior **Amanda Jackson** helped the RedHawks put a scare into the nationally-ranked Falcons, scoring a game-high 21 points. Sophomore **Jenna Schone** also had 18 points, but Bowling Green limited Miami to 32.4 percent shooting and held the RedHawks under 60 points for only the second time this season.

Jackson scored eight of Miami's first nine points, knotting the game at 9-9, and back-to-back baskets from sophomore **Stephanie Ford** and junior **Laura Markwood** staked Miami to 13-9 advantage at the 12-minute mark.

An 11-2 Bowling Green run put Miami in a six-point hole at 20-14, until Jackson hit a 12-footer that sparked a 6-0 Miami run. Miami went into halftime trailing 30-27, however, as Bowling Green held the RedHawks to 34.4 percent shooting from the floor in the first half.

A 7-4 Miami run to open the second half knotted the game at 34-34, but Bowling Green slowly pulled away, as a pair of free throws from Amber Flynn with 6:13 left pushed Bowling Green's lead to double digits at 51-41.

After Miami ripped off its 12-2 run in the final three minutes, Bowling Green missed four of six free throws in the final minute, but Miami could not convert, missing its final four shots.

Unable to overcome a slow start, Miami fell to Ball State, 90-62, at Worthen Arena as the Cardinals scored the first 11 points of the game and broke open a 10-point game late in the second half.

Junior **Amanda Jacsksn** led Miami with 12 points while sophomores **Eve Pyle** (11 points) and **Ashley Hawkins** (10 points) also hit double figures.

Ball State jumped out to an 11-0 lead less than four minutes into the game, hitting their first three attempts from behind the 3-point arc. Miami finally got on the scoreboard when Hawkins hit a transition jumper at the 16:20 mark.

Miami cut Ball State's lead to single digits by the 12-minute mark, but the Cardinals' hot shooting kept their lead at 23-14 with 11:12 left in the half.

Pushing its lead to as many as 19 points, Ball State controlled the remainder of the half and took a 44-29 lead into intermission. Ball State shot a blistering 62.1 percent in the first half (18-for-29), including 6-of-8 from behind the 3-point line.

Ball State kept its double-digit lead intact by scoring 10 of the first 16 points after halftime, but Miami slowly chipped away and pulled to within 12 at 59-48 with 11:34 left to play. Pyle's 3-pointer at the 15-minute mark sparked a 13-4 Miami run, while Hawkins also contributed six points in the spurt.

After an offensive rebound and putback from freshman **Ashleigh Brown** cut Ball State's lead to 10 points at 64-54, Ball State reeled off 17 straight points and pushed its edge to 81-54 with 4:32 left in the game.

Ball State closed the game on a 26-8 run over the final 8:36 and finished the game shooting 60.7 percent from the floor.

Sophomore **Ashley Hawkins** scored a career-high 28 points and sophomore **Eve Pyle** notched her third career double-double with 13 points and 11 rebounds as Miami ended a three-game losing skid with an 87-77 win over Toledo. Miami led by as many as 21 points in the second half and weathered Toledo's late second-half run as it snapped a seven-game losing streak against Mid-American Conference West Division opponents.

In her third 20-point effort of the season, Hawkins hit 11-of-19 shots from the floor and added a game-high six steals, while junior **Amanda Jackson** added 21 points, five rebounds and five assists. Sophomore **Jenna Schone** also dished out a career-high tying 11 assists in the win.

Miami scored the first nine points of the game, after a pair of Toledo baskets, the RedHawks extended their lead to 19-6 behind a 10-2 run. Miami's lead grew to as many as 14 after Schone's 3-pointer from the right wing at the 10:07 mark.

A 10-5 run from the Rockets pulled them to within single digits at 29-20, but the RedHawks kept their advantage above 10 points for the final five minutes and took a 41-30 lead into halftime.

Hawkins scored eight of Miami's first 10 points after intermission, and after Toledo cut Miami's lead to single digits, 10 straight RedHawk points, punctuated by Jackson's baseline 3-pointer with 12:18 remaining, extended the RedHawks' edge to 63-44.

Down by 21, the Rockets ripped off a 12-0 run, slicing the RedHawks' lead to nine at 76-67 with 4:23 left in the game. Toledo then pulled to within eight points at 78-70 with 1:36 to play, but baskets from Jackson and free throws from Schone and Pyle in the final 90 seconds sealed Miami's first home win against Toledo since Jan. 11, 1995.

Behind 23 second-half points from junior **Amanda Jackson**, Miami turned a three-point halftime deficit into a nine-point margin of victory as it downed the Central Michigan Chippewas, 79-70, at Millett Hall. In a game televised nationally on ESPN, Jackson finished with a career-high tying 31 points and grabbed a career-high 11 rebounds as Miami posted its 11th straight home win over Central Michigan.

Leininger led Miami with 17 points and added 11 rebounds, while freshman **Courtney Reed** (12 points) and sophomores **Jenna Schone** (11 points) and **Ashley Hawkins** (11 points) also scored in double figures. Despite cutting a 17-point second-half deficit to five with under seven minutes to play, Miami could not get any closer as Northern Illinois won its sixth straight home game.

After Northern Illinois carried an 11-9 advantage into the first media timeout, the Huskies put together a 10-4 run and extended their lead to 21-13 with 12:47 left in the first half.

Northern Illinois' lead grew to double digits by the 12-minute mark, and the Huskies held the RedHawks without a field goal for the final 5:33, taking a 44-31 lead into intermission. The host Huskies were red-hot from the floor, connecting on 57 percent of their first-half shots (20-of-35), while Miami was limited to 24 percent shooting (8-of-34).

The Huskies led by as many as 17 in the second half before Miami mounted a comeback, as back-to-back layups from Hawkins brought Miami to within single digits at 52-43 with 13 minutes left to play. The RedHawks kept chipping away as a 10-2 run started by Reed's 21-foot 3-pointer and capped by Schone's old-fashioned three-point play, cut the Huskies' lead to 62-57 with 7:04 remaining.

Miami could get no closer than five points as Northern Illinois put together a 13-3 run, pushing their lead to 75-60 and effectively putting the game out of reach with under three minutes to play.

A cold-shooting effort sunk Miami in a 74-56 loss to the Eastern Michigan Eagles at Millett Hall. Miami connected only on 28 percent of its shots and hit 18 field goals as its nine-game home winning streak against Eastern Michigan was snapped.

Despite converting 24 Eastern Michigan turnovers into 21 points, the game was decided in the painted area as the Eagles outrebounded the RedHawks, 55-33, and held a 40-22 advantage on points in the paint. Juniors **Amanda Jackson** (14 points) and **Jaclyn Leininger** (12 points) each scored in double figures for Miami in the loss.

Eastern Michigan jumped out to a 17-8 lead with 12:04 remaining, but after Miami called a 30-second timeout, it responded with an 8-2 spurt, narrowing Eastern Michigan's lead to 22-16 with 7:44 remaining in the half. Junior **Sarah Hull**, playing in her first game since Dec. 30, sparked the run with a 3-pointer.

The Eagles pushed their lead to double digits with a 14-5 run, extending their lead to 36-21, and took a 40-27 lead into intermission. It was a tale of two halves for the Miami RedHawks in its 86-76 loss to Kent State at Millett Hall. After Miami led by three points at halftime, Kent State shot 72 percent from the floor over the final 20 minutes and limited Miami to 29 percent shooting in the second half as the RedHawks dropped their third straight game.

Junior **Amanda Jackson** scored 23 points and moved into a fourth place on the Miami single-season scoring list with 496 points, while sophomore **Jenna Schone** also topped the 20-point mark, finishing with a game-high 26 points.

The two teams were tied at 18-18 before Jackson scored seven straight points, including a three-point play and a transition layup with 10:20 remaining in the half that gave Miami a 25-18 lead and forced Kent State to burn a 30-second timeout.

A strong first-half effort gave way to a second-half fade as Miami fell the No. 18/19 Bowling Green Falcons, 92-62, in both team's regular-season finale. After Miami trailed by three at intermission, Bowling Green opened the second half on a 27-10 run and never looked back as it handed Miami its fourth straight loss.

In front of a raucous crowd on Senior Night at Anderson Arena, Bowling Green scored the first six points of the game, but an 8-2 run from Miami, capped by a baseline 3-pointer from junior **Amanda Jackson**, knotted the game at 8-8 with 16:04 remaining in the half.

Bowling Green's 15-2 put Miami in a 23-10 hole, but after the Falcons pulled ahead by double digits at 36-24, sophomore **Jenna Schone's** three free throws sparked a 9-1 run to end the half. Miami scored the final six points of the half and trailed, 37-33, at intermission.

Bowling Green opened the second half on an 8-2 run, as it scored the first six points of the half and pushed its lead to 45-35 with 18:24 remaining. After Jackson's 3-pointer cut the Falcons' lead to 45-38, Bowling Green scored 10 straight points, including a pair of 3-pointers from Honegger and Megan Thorburn, as it surged in front 55-38 with 15:49 remaining.
