Missouri Basketball Goes Searching For Fourth Consecutive NCAA Berth

A new era of Missouri Basketball takes center stage in 2011-12 as Frank Haith takes over for his first season at the helm of the Tiger program. A 25-year veteran of the coaching ranks, Haith spent the previous seven seasons rebuilding the Miami (Fla.) Basketball program, becoming the winningest postseason coach in Hurricane history, while also taking the club to five postseason appearances in his seven years.

While the leadership of the program saw a revamping during the offseason, the return of all five starters and top-six scorers leads the Mizzou headlines in 2012. Mizzou's eight-member senior class is highlighted by the return of four-year standouts Laurence Bowers, Marcus Denmon, Kim English and Steve Moore, each of whom have contributed to 77 wins during their Tiger tenure. As freshmen the players helped Mizzou to a school record 31 wins and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament's Elite Eight and have since been to back to back NCAA Tournaments in 2010 and 2011. As it stands, the fourth-year Tigers are just 23 wins shy of tying the school record for career wins and need 24 victories in 2011-12 to surpass the 100 wins by MU legends Jon Sundvold and Steve Stipanovich.

Mizzou Backcourt

It's no secret, Mizzou has one of the deepest backcourts in the country and the veteran crew is led by a pair of 1,000-point senior scorers, Marcus Denmon and Kim English. Denmon is coming off one of the most efficient seasons in school history, averaging 16.9 points on 50 percent shooting from the floor, 45 percent shooting from three-point range and contributing a near 2-to-1 assist/turnover ratio of 61 dimes and just 32 miscues.

What was underappreciated about Denmon, however, was his willingness to guard the top scoring guard on the opposing team and his ability to make plays in all facets of the game. A first team All-Big 12 selection as a junior, Denmon was one of the Big 12's Top 13 performers in six statistical categories and would have ranked fourth in assist/turnover ratio with enough dimes.

"Marcus is a very efficient and savvy basketball player," Haith said. "You don't see a lot of wasted movement and that's what makes him so difficult to guard and play against. He is coming off a tremendous year and is obviously one of the top players in the country as evidenced by his invite to the World University Games and the Chris Paul camp. When basketball people take notice of you, then you know you play the game the right way."

A colleague of Denmon's at the World University Game trials is fellow backcourt mate, English. English is coming off his second consecutive year scoring in double figures with 10.0 points per game, and while he shot a respectable 37 percent from beyond the arc, he shot an identical 37 percent from the floor, the lowest of his career. He did improve his assist totals and saw his turnover numbers tumble as a junior and an off-season spent on campus, along with a trip to the Stephen Curry Skills camp has the Baltimore native focused on his final campaign in Black & Gold.

"I have to turn last season into a positive," English said. "I didn't

play as well as I was capable of and the team didn't finish the way we feel like we should have, but the positive is that we get one more shot to come out and play together and make it right. That's all we can really ask for, one more shot and as a senior class, we get that chance."

Another Tiger to return to the backcourt after averaging double figures in 2010-11 is junior guard Michael Dixon. One of the Big 12's quickest guards, Dixon dished a career high 113 assists in just 22.3 minutes per game as a sophomore and averaged 10.3 points and 1.8 steals per game. Ranked among the Big 12's leaders in assists, steals and assist/turnover ratio, Dixon shot a career high 39 percent from beyond the arc and is one of the school's all-time leaders in free throw percentage at 83.4 percent.

The Kansas City native finished his second season with 17 total starts and reached double figures in scoring 19 times, including a career high 18 vs. NCAA Tournament qualifier, Old Dominion and 17 points on four other occasions.

"We really like what Mike can add to our lineup and the options he gives us," Haith said. "He is extremely quick with the basketball in his hands and is an adept finisher around the hoop. He has good court instincts and is a winner. He can really get after people on the defensive end and once he finds that comfort level guarding on the basketball and not taking unnecessary chances he can be as well-rounded of a guard as there is in this league."

While Dixon is one of the quickest players in the Big 12, he isn't without competition on his own team. Phil Pressey, one of the country's top freshman point guards in 2011, is back after unloading a Mizzou Freshman Record 117 assists and 61 steals in 30 games. The younger Pressey missed four games during his rookie campaign

with a fractured right finger and wore a soft cast to protect the hand the rest of the year. But that didn't slow down the lightning-quick guard's play. Pressey finished the year leading all Big 12 newcomers in dimes and thefts and his 1.7 assist/turnover spread ranked third overall in 16 league games.

Pressey also saw his scoring numbers improve during league competition, which included a career high 17 points at Kansas, 16 at Texas A&M and 13 vs. Colorado. Pressey finished the year with 11 steals over his final two games, ripping six in the Big 12 Championship in the rematch with the Aggies and five vs. Cincinnati in his first NCAA Tournament contest.

"I'm really looking forward to my sophomore season," Pressey said. "I have gotten to know the staff and am looking forward to running an offense that suits me and will allow me to set up my teammates."

"The transition to Division I basketball takes some time and I know that," Pressey continued. "But I just feel comfortable with my teammates and am looking forward to the opportunity to play for Coach Haith and his staff."

Another senior, Matt Pressey, adds depth and athleticism to the backcourt. One of the team's better leapers and stronger perimeter players, Pressey made 10 starts as a junior and reached double figures six times, including a career high 18 points vs. Northern Illinois and 15 in the win over Old Dominion. Named the Big 12 Newcomer of the Week following those performances, Pressey also scored 15 points at Oklahoma State and finished the year with 53 assists as a key cog in Mizzou's deep backcourt rotation.

"Matt's a guy that just wants to win," Haith said. "I don't think the box score stats really matter to him, he's a guy that will do whatever is needed to help his team win. If he needs to score, he'll do it, but if we need a guy willing to extend the pressure on the defensive end, he is someone we will feel comfortable calling on. He's the type of player every successful team needs."

Jarrett Sutton also returns to the Tiger lineup for his fourth season. The sharp-shooter has 13 career treys in 34 career games played and is another selfless Tiger in that senior class.

"Jarrett can really shoot the basketball, but he is also a great young man and tremendous student," Haith said. "He is what you want and expect from a senior leader. He's a guy that has already graduated and is back for one final year in what we hope will be a tremendous experience for him."

One new face in the backcourt for the 2011-12 season is freshman Tony Lester. A native of Gastonia, N.C., Lester is a 5-10 point guard that will add depth behind both Dixon and Flip Pressey. Lester played last season at the Tilton School and averaged nine points and four assists at the point guard position.

Mizzou will also have a pair of redshirts sitting out this season in the backcourt. Both Earnest Ross and Keion Bell will not be able to play for the Tigers, but both bring experience to the practice squad. Ross was Auburn University's Most Valuable Player last season, averaging 13.1 points and 6.6 rebounds as a sophomore in the SEC. The 6-foot-5, 222-pounder was the league's most improved scorer from his freshman to sophomore years and led the team with six double-doubles and hit nearly 50-percent of his treys over his final eight games.

Bell is a prolific scorer and poured in 1,365 points in three seasons at Pepperdine. The 6-foot-3, 200-pound scoring guard averaged 16.4 points over his career, including 18.9 points as a junior and 18.5 as a sophomore. He finished his Pepperdine career with five 30-point games, 26 20-point contests and topped double figures in 65-of-83 career games.

"Earnest and Keion will give us a veteran presence on our scout team, but most importantly will give us dependability in the backcourt for the 2012-13 season. They are two young men that have enjoyed success at the college level already and they will have an extra year to grow and learn our system here at Missouri."

Mizzou Frontcourt

While Missouri returns its backcourt completely intact from the 2010-11 campaign the Tigers return three key performers and add two newcomers to the lineup in the paint, led by a pair of honorable mention All-Big 12 selections, Laurence Bowers and Ricardo Ratliffe.

Bowers is one of the Big 12's more versatile forwards. He led the league in blocked shots for most of his junior campaign and finished the year with 62 swats, which ranked second in the conference and among the Top 70 nationally. He also ranked second on the club in scoring (11.6), tops in rebounding (6.1) and dished 46 assists and ripped away 38 steals.

Bowers flashed his versatility throughout his third season, including incredible efforts of 20 points, nine boards and six steals vs. Baylor and 22 points, 10 boards and five thefts vs. Kansas. The 20-9-6 game vs. Baylor was a first in school history and Bowers finished just two steals shy of becoming the first player in school history with 60 blocks and 40 steals in the same season.

"I'm really looking forward to my senior season," Bowers said. "I don't think any of us were satisfied with how we finished the year and that has been one motivating factor for us this summer. We have a new coaching staff and are getting some new instruction, which is beneficial, and I think with all the returning guys we have that it will help us with any transition. Personally, strength has been a big focus for me this year. I wanted to add some strength to allow me to be more physical in the post and I can already tell the difference."

Ratliffe won Big 12 Newcomer of the Year honors in his first season at Mizzou after averaging 10.6 points and 6.0 rebounds. As expected, there was a period of adjustment for the 6-foot-8 power forward and he eventually settled in nicely, reaching double figures in scoring 23 times, while ranking second with 45 blocked shots. A native of Hampton, Va., Ratliffe was incredibly unselfish last season, dishing 39 assists while committing just 34 turn-

overs. He also shot 57 percent from the floor, while starting 29-of-34 games.

"That second season goes so much smoother for transfers," Haith said. "Not just on the court, but in every facet of college life. With that being said, Ricardo had a very good junior season and he will be even better next year. He's perfectly suited for the way we play and he gives us the size and toughness we need in the Big 12 Conference."

Another player of size is senior Steve Moore. The biggest Tiger at 6-foot-9, 267 pounds, Moore is Missouri's Blue Collar performer in the middle, adding solid defense, shot-blocking and rebounding to the equation. The Kansas City native performed well when called upon and played a career high 11.4 minutes, while blocking 32 shots.

"Steve and (Strength & Conditioning Coach) Todor Pandov have worked hard this offseason and I believe it's going to pay off for him," Haith said. "When you play in a physical league like the Big 12 you need guys like Steve to control the paint and mix it up down low and we are looking forward to a big season from Steve and all of our post players."

Kadeem Green is the lone freshman forward on the roster this season, but the 6-foot-8 Canadian certainly has familiarity with the program after redshirting last year following an Achilles tendon tear as a high school senior. Green will add length and shot-blocking ability to the front line. The Toronto native boasts a 7-foot-3 wingspan and has improved his mobility greatly after his lengthy rehabilitation efforts.

"As Kadeem continues gets his mobility and quickness back I think he will have a chance to make an impact for us, starting on the defensive end," Haith said. "He's not unlike a lot of young big men, he is still learning the game and his work in the weight room is already paying dividends. Repetition will be important for Kadeem and his development, but we like what we are seeing from him."

Missouri could also add the services of

Depth will be key for Mizzou Basketball in Frank Haith's first season at MU

Louisville transfer George Goode in August. Goode, a fifth-year senior, is on pace to graduate this summer and would be eligible to play immediately pending graduation and his enrollment in the home-state school. A native of nearby Raytown, Mo., Goode's career with the Cardinals was shortened due to injury, but he played in 27 games as a junior, making two starts, while averaging 2.9 points and 1.4 rebounds. The 6-foot-8, 230-pounder would add to Mizzou's frontcourt depth and versatility as he has the ability to step out on the perimeter and knock down a jumper, while helping the club on the glass.

That veteran roster returns to Mizzou Arena in 2011-12, where the Tigers have gone an impressive 51-3 over the last three seasons of play. Missouri hasn't dropped a non-conference home game in the build-

ing since 2005-06 and with the implementation of the new 18-game Big 12 schedule, protecting the home turf will be at a premium.

The Tigers also boast marquee non-conference games vs. Illinois once again in St. Louis, vs. Villanova at the Jimmy V Classic in Madison Square Garden, at the CBE Classic in nearby Kansas City vs. the likes of Notre Dame, California and Georgia and an intriguing non-conference road tilt at Old Dominion, a club that is looking to make its third consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Missouri's schedule will be announced when preliminary-round games of the 2011 CBE Classic are finalized by tournament organizers.

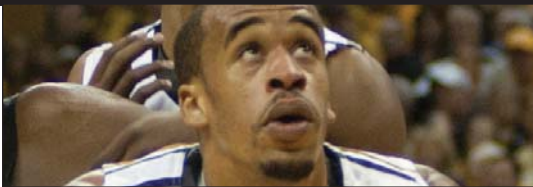

Frank Haith enters his first season as the head coach of the Mizzou Basketball program. A 25-year coaching veteran, Haith brings Big 12 ties, a family atmosphere and impeccable academic success to a Tiger program which has surged back onto the national landscape.

Haith was officially welcomed to the Missouri family on April 5, 2011, and immediately appreciated the Tiger's passionate fanbase. The Burlington, N.C., native came from the University of Miami where he was not only forced to instill a winning mentality into his players and supporters, but do it at a university void of any lengthy basketball tradition.

"I'm honored to be named the new head coach at the University of Missouri, and I want to thank Chancellor Brady Deaton and Director of Athletics Mike Alden for believing in me and presenting me with this tremendous opportunity to come back to the Big 12 Conference and lead this program," head coach Frank Haith said. "I have always had a tremendous amount of respect for this university and this program. I coached against Norm Stewart. Mizzou Arena and the facilities here are first class. The support of the students and administration is second-to-none and the tradition is outstanding. I'll tell you this Mizzou Nation, we are going to win and win big!"

Haith's task in South Beach was monumental. In addition to resurrecting a hoops program that was restarted just two decades prior, he ushered the Hurricanes into the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference where many didn't expect his program to win a single league game. Those critics were wrong.

In his first of seven seasons as the head coach, Haith guided the 'Canes to seven ACC victories (despite being picked last) and qualified for postseason play. He was recognized by being named a Naismith National Coach of the Year finalist and NABC District 6 Coach of the Year. Miami returned to postseason play the following year. The Hurricanes won 18 more games and advanced to the quarterfinals of the NIT, recording the program's first postseason wins since 2000. Postseason success was a theme under Haith. His teams won six total games in the NCAA and National Invitation tournaments, including a memorable run to the second round of the Big Dance in 2008. The 'Canes went 23-11 in Haith's fourth season, just one win shy of the school record and he was named a finalist for ACC Coach of the Year and the Skip Prosser Man of the Year honors.

It wasn't just on the hardwood that Haith led a University of Miami renaissance. His young men were as well-rounded as any in America. They were visible on campus and in the Miami

community. Most importantly, they graduated. An incredible 21-of-22 seniors to play for Frank Haith walked across the stage to receive a diploma.

“That’s my proudest moment,” Haith would say. “To know we have turned out young men, ready to make positive contributions in the community, ready to be great fathers and husbands. That’s what coaching at the college level is all about.”

It’s not an accident Frank Haith was hired as the 17th basketball coach at Mizzou. The grind from student-assistant at Elon College to being named the National Recruiter of the Year by Rivals.com doesn’t just happen without a dedication to family, career and your student-athletes.

Haith paid his own way through Elon and graduated in 1988. He helped the Fighting Christians twice win 20 games and earned the opportunity to cut his teeth at perennial

power Wake Forest the following year as a graduate assistant. His first full-time coaching position at Division I came at UNC-Wilmington from 1990-92 and he laid the foundation for his job at Missouri with a three-year stop at Texas A&M from 1992-95, which included helping the Aggies reach postseason play in 1994.

A remarkable 21-win campaign during his one season at Penn State (1995-96) allowed the Nittany Lions to reach the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 31 years, and he returned to Texas A&M and the Big 12 Conference for one season as the Aggies’ Associate Head Coach in 1996-97 before returning to Wake Forest in 1997. The Demon Deacons reached postseason play each of his four years in Winston-Salem, including winning the NIT Championship in 2000 and reaching NCAA Tournament play in 2001.

Haith parlayed that success at Wake Forest into an opportunity at the University of Texas. Coaching alongside friend and mentor Rick Barnes,

Haith was a part of (at the time) the winningest three-year stretch of basketball in Texas history. The Longhorns averaged better than 24 wins per season and never failed to reach the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament. The Longhorns advanced to the Final Four in 2003 and Haith worked magic on the recruiting trail, ushering four McDonald's All-Americans to Austin, including Brad Buckman (2002), LaMarcus Aldridge (2004), Daniel Gibson (2004) and Michael Williams (2004). Aldridge and Gibson are now mainstays in the NBA, with Aldridge being drafted No. 2 overall to the Chicago Bulls. The Class was rated No. 2 nationally by Rivals.com and Haith was the nation's hottest young coach. So began the daunting reclamation project at Miami, which concluded with an average of 21 wins over his last three years, national rankings in three of his final four campaigns and three of the school's six (all-time) 20-win ledgers.

One of 10 siblings, family will always be first for Frank Haith, and his student-athletes are part of that family. A proud father and husband, Frank and his wife Pam are the parents of two children, Corey and Brianna. Frank and Pam met in high school, began dating a short time after and have been together for 27 years. The Haith family has been active participants in their home community and spearheaded fundraising and renovation efforts for Morningside Park in Elon, N.C., in the neighborhood in which Haith grew up.

2010-11 MIZZOU BASKETBALL SEASON IN REVIEW

Missouri returns to postseason play, tops 20 wins for third consecutive year



The 2010-11 campaign had a multitude of storylines for Missouri Basketball, but while the departure of head coach Mike Anderson at the end of the year will loom largest in the short term, a return to NCAA Tournament play for a third consecutive season and a school record 77 wins over that stretch will leave the biggest lasting impression for the Tigers.

Missouri finished the 2011 season with 23 wins and yet another NCAA Tournament trip. Missouri played some of the year's more exciting games, including overtime affairs with Georgetown, Vanderbilt and Texas A&M and pulled off a furious rally to claim Busch Braggin' Rights for a second straight year vs. Illinois. The Tigers also had two juniors join the 1,000-point club and Marcus Denmon gripped Mizzou Nation by earning first team all-Big 12 honors while shooting 50 percent from the floor and ranking among league leaders in scoring, steals, assists and shooting percentage.

Missouri started its journey with five consecutive wins and the 2010 Cancun Challenge title in Cancun, Mexico. Wins over Western Illinois and North Florida carried the club down to Mexico where the Tigers dispatched both Wyoming and La Salle. While the four early-season wins were critical, perhaps the biggest part of Missouri's trip was the improved play of Denmon. Known primarily as a shooter his first two seasons in Columbia, Denmon exploded on the scene, scoring 21 points in the Cancun title round vs. La Salle. Denmon showed a new efficiency in his game since recovering from a knee injury and hit 5-of-9 treys during Mizzou's 83-71 win. Denmon was named the Cancun Challenge MVP, while Ricardo Ratliffe, the Big 12's Newcomer of the Year, made all-tournament honors with back-to-back double digit rebounding efforts, including 14 points and 14 boards vs. the Explorers.

Following another double-figure win over Arkansas-Pine Bluff on Nov. 28, Missouri carried its 5-0 record into a huge early-season contest against Georgetown on Nov. 30 at Sprint Center in Kansas City. The Tigers, undoubtedly feeling the effects of an incredible travel slate, started slow and trailed the Hoyas by 18 points on three occasions in

the first period. Missouri was last down 18, 38-20, with 7:41 remaining in the opening stanza before Denmon started a furious rally with a deep trey. Mizzou continued battling despite Georgetown's incredible 71 percent shooting in the first half and cut the deficit to 54-47 at the break. Missouri continued its surge early in the second period led by Denmon and Michael Dixon, who cut the Georgetown lead to one, 75-74, with 8:22 left before Denmon gave the Tigers a 77-75 lead with a huge trey.

The two clubs continued their hot shooting, but Missouri finally was able to build a little breathing room (93-89) following a pair of Dixon free throws with just 26 seconds left. Missouri then got a big defensive stop, but faulty free throw shooting and a game-tying trey from Chris Wright at the buzzer sent the game into overtime. Georgetown, carrying the momentum from the late-game rally, pulled away in the final five minutes, hitting three more treys and all six charity tosses to earn the 111-102 win.

While the Tigers absorbed the loss, it took a near perfect effort for John Thompson III's crew to get the win. The Hoyas hit an incredible 15 treys and 18-of-18 free throws in the overtime win. Austin Freeman led Georgetown with 31 points and Jason Clark added 26, while Denmon scored 27, Ratliffe added 22 and Dixon chipped in 17.

There was little time for self-doubt after the difficult loss. Missouri boarded a plane in Kansas City early the next morning and traveled to Eugene, Ore., to face the Oregon Ducks in the Big 12 / Pac-10 Hardwood Series. The final stop in Missouri's incredible 7,308 mile journey, Missouri showed no signs of fatigue early, racing to a 22-point lead in the first half. Denmon was again outstanding, scoring 19 points on 5-of-7 shooting. The junior also led the club with eight rebounds and was second with three assists. Missouri led by 20 at the half, but the fatigue of two weeks worth of travel finally set in and the fresher Ducks rallied to shoot 62 percent in the final half and hit an incredible eight treys to cut Missouri's lead down to just two, 82-80. Missouri did make enough plays down the stretch, including

four consecutive free throws from Dixon to escape historic McArthur Court with a win and improve to 6-1 on the year.

Missouri (6-1) finally returned home on Dec. 8 for a matchup with SEC favorite Vanderbilt. The Commodores brought a near identical 7-1 mark to Mizzou Arena and nearly wiped out MU's incredible non-conference home winning streak, forcing overtime, before falling 85-82. Vanderbilt held Missouri to just 38 percent shooting, however Missouri won the battle on the glass, 45-40, and made key plays down the stretch to get the win. Denmon led Mizzou with 21 points and four assists, but no play in 2010-11 was bigger than his steal and lay-up late in the overtime session. Dixon had tied the game with a floater with just 33 seconds left and Vanderbilt was holding for the final shot. With the contest tied, 82-82, Denmon stepped in front of a Brad Tinsley pass and raced to the other end of the floor. His bucket was good, while being fouled by Tinsley, and following his free throw Missouri led 85-82 with just five seconds remaining. Mizzou then forced a contested three-point attempt from Tinsley and celebrated the three-point victory.

Double figure wins against Presbyterian, Oral Roberts and Central Arkansas led Mizzou into its annual holiday showdown with Illinois in St. Louis. Considered by many national pundits to be the country's top annual non-conference rivalry game / atmosphere, the Tigers and Illini played a game for the ages, with the two NCAA Tournament-bound programs exchanging eight ties and nine lead changes before Mizzou would pull away for the 75-64 win.

Illinois led by three, 57-54, with just 3:30 remaining, but a steal by Denmon and a jumper from Laurence Bowers off that turnover signaled a huge shift in momentum. A block from Bowers on the next possession allowed Denmon to push the Tigers back in front, 58-57. Mike Tisdale split a pair of free throws to even the game at 58-58, before a Dixon jumper put the Tigers in front for good. As he did vs. Vanderbilt a few weeks prior, Denmon keyed the Missouri win with a steal off an errant Illini inbounds pass and fed back to Ratliffe for the lay-up, making it 62-58.

The game got tight for a moment when a Dixon turnover off a free throw miss found its way into the hands of D.J. Richardson for a trey, but Bowers outraced Bruce Weber's club down the floor for a lay-up (while being pushed in the back) to put the game on ice. The dangerous foul was whistled intentional and Bowers made good on both free throws to make it 66-61. Missouri then iced the game with a lay-up from Denmon. A missed Illinois trey and a technical foul on the Illinois bench allowed the Tigers to score a remarkable eight points in 14 seconds resulting in the 11-point win.

Denmon led five Tigers in double figures with 15 points, while Dixon added 10 points and six dimes and Justin Safford finished with 11 total points in 16 crucial minutes.

The winning streak reached nine following the holiday break with resounding wins over Northern Illinois, Old Dominion and North Alabama.

Missouri put a record-setting margin on Northern Illinois in the first half, outscoring the Huskies 57-17 in the first 20 minutes. Denmon

was incredibly efficient once again, scoring 24 points on 9-of-11 shooting. The junior's only misses came outside the three-point stripe, but he managed to hit 5-of-7 treys and finish the game averaging one point per minute. Matt Pressey was also outstanding, scoring 18 points and grabbing five boards, while Dixon scored eight points and dished eight of Mizzou's 26 assists in the 36-point win.

The competition was stiffer three days later when Missouri hosted returning NCAA Tournament qualifier, Old Dominion. The nation's top rebounding club, Old Dominion would go on to win the Colonial Athletics Association postseason crown in 2011 and advance once again to NCAA play, but on this night, Missouri controlled from start to finish. The Tigers battled the Monarchs to a near draw on the glass and forced 21 turnovers. Denmon scored 22 and Dixon added 18 tallies on perfect 3-of-3 shooting from three-point range and 5-of-5 shooting from the foul line.

Following a 40-point win over North Alabama, the Tigers opened Big 12 play on the road at Colorado on Jan. 8. Facing a veteran Buffaloes squad, which boasted three senior starters and a likely NBA first round pick in sophomore Alec Burks, Missouri found themselves down early and were forced to battle back in front of a seldom excitable Colorado fan base. Missouri and Colorado traded blows for much of the game's first 15 minutes and a Denmon trey with 4:32 remaining in the half gave the Tigers a 32-31 lead. CU responded however by scoring 15 of the game's next 17 points to carry a 46-34 advantage into the break.

Colorado stretched that lead to as many as 18 in the second half and while Mizzou cut the lead to single digits on a few occasions, Missouri dropped its league opener, 89-76, due in large part to a career high 36 points from Burks and 18 more from Cory Higgins.

Missouri evened its league record with a 77-69 win over Nebraska. Denmon was again spectacular, scoring 27 points on 5-of-7 three-point shooting in the win, while the MU defense forced 15 turnovers and racked up 10 steals vs. Doc Sadler's Huskers. The Tigers scored 19 of their 77 points off of turnovers and Nebraska standout Lance Jeter scored just nine points before fouling out.

Missouri looked to be in position for a season-shaping victory Jan. 15 at nationally-ranked Texas A&M and the Tigers led by as many as 12 early in the game, before falling behind by nine in the first half. The Tigers battled back from that deficit and led by four points in the final three minutes of regulation, but were unable to hang-on. Phil Pressey's jumper with 2:30 remaining gave MU a 76-72 advantage and the Tigers had the basketball with less than 1:30 remaining up two possessions.

Dash Harris cut the Tiger lead to 76-75 when he was fouled while making a lay-up and then after Bowers split a pair at the line, Khris Middleton tied the game with two free throws to force overtime.

Missouri did grab an 87-85 lead in overtime on a deep three-pointer from Denmon, but with the Tigers leading 87-86, Middleton came up with a big steal and lay-up to allow the Aggies to escape with an 91-89 victory.

Missouri moved back over .500 in league play with wins over Kansas State and Iowa State. The Big 12 preseason favorite, Kansas State was consistently inside the Top 10 nationally throughout early-season play, but Missouri continued to play its best basketball at home and led by as many as 16 in the ESPN Big Monday affair. Missouri had five players reach double figures, led by Denmon's 14 and Phil Pressey's 13. Meanwhile, K-State shot just 19 percent from three-point range and committed 24 turnovers vs. the Mizzou pressure in the 75-59 defeat.

The Big wins continued on Jan. 22 as the Tigers dismantled Iowa State 87-54. Missouri hit 10 treys, forced 18 turnovers and blocked nine Cyclones shots in the 33-point win. Missouri also dominated the rebounding margin, grabbing 61 boards and holding ISU to just 27 percent shooting. The win pushed the Tiger's record to 17-3 on the year, setting up a difficult two-game road stretch at Texas and at Oklahoma State.

The road woes continued for Missouri, both on the court and off it as it traveled to Austin, Texas and Stillwater, Okla. Missouri met up with Texas on Jan. 29, just when the Longhorns were playing their best basketball of the season. Fresh off a win at Kansas, UT was looking to build on its undefeated league start and earned a 71-58 win over the Tigers. Missouri was forced to play without Bowers, who was knocked woozy from an inadvertent elbow. English and Phil Pressey were the lone Tigers to reach double figures and 52 percent shooting from the host Longhorns was too much to overcome.

The difficult road swing continued Feb. 2 at Oklahoma State. Ice storms in the Midwest forced flight cancellations and the Tigers spent two days in Kansas City before flying down the afternoon of the game. The extended road trip may have taken the legs away from the Tigers as OSU led by as many as 15 before a furious rally made it a one-possession game in the final minute.

Matt Pressey was the star for Missouri, coming off the bench to score 15 points in 26 minutes, while Denmon added 15 points and four steals. OSU outscored Missouri 29-to-11 at the foul line however to corral the victory.

Missouri found encouraging success midway through the league slate, winning five of its next six games, including its first league road win of the year. The Tigers returned home and handled a very good Colorado team 89-73. Mizzou led by as many as 22 in the game and held the Buffaloes to just 41 percent shooting. Missouri also forced 23 turnovers and parlayed that into 31 points fueling the rout. Kim English scored 21 off the bench in 24 minutes as five Tigers reached in double figures.

Missouri hung tough with Kansas for nearly 30 minutes, but the Jayhawks pulled away down the stretch to provide the lone MU setback over a three-week span. Missouri bounced back immediately, topping Oklahoma, 84-61, despite playing without Denmon for most of the game. The Kansas City native, who led Missouri in scoring throughout the year, scored nine points in 14 minutes, but suffered a cut below his eye and was forced to sit out the remainder of the game while getting stitches. The rest of Denmon's teammates more than picked up the slack, as Dixon scored 16 points and Ratliffe added 13 to pace the host Tigers. In fact 10 different Tigers scored and Mizzou

dished 17 assists compared to just seven turnovers in the victory.

A veteran Texas Tech bunch forced Missouri into a rare single-digit home win, 92-84. Denmon scored 20 points in the victory and highlighted the contest with his 1,000th career point. In fact Mizzou nearly had two players reach the 1,000-point plateau, but English fell just short and reached the milestone with a pair of free throws just a few days later at Iowa State. That contest in Ames, Iowa, would mark Missouri's first Big 12 road win of 2011, as the Tigers fought Fred Hoiberg's club to a 76-70 decision. Denmon scored 25 points in the triumph, while Bowers chipped in 16 and Ratliffe contributed a 10-point, 10-rebound double-double.

The stellar play of Ratliffe and Bowers continued vs. Baylor on Feb. 23. The Bears entered the 2010-11 season with as much talent as any team in American, especially in the front court, but 13 rebounds from Ratliffe and nine from Bowers allowed the Tigers to control the glass, and the game, in the 77-59 victory. Bowers had a monster day overall, scoring 20 points, grabbing those nine boards and ripping away six steals in just 25 minutes.

That would be the final win of the regular season for the Tigers as losses at Kansas State (80-70), at Nebraska (69-58) and at home to Kansas (70-66) dampened the close of the year. Missouri was tied in the final minutes at Kansas State and used a furious rally to push the Jayhawks to the brink, but were unable to add to their season win total. The Tigers finished tied for fifth in the league standings, but were the No. 6 seed heading into the 2011 Phillips 66 Big 12 Tournament in Kansas City.

Matched up with Texas Tech in the first round, Mizzou withstood a late Red Raiders comeback to gain an 88-84 win. Denmon scored 20, had five assists and five steals while Dixon chipped in 17. The victory allowed Missouri to reach the 23-win mark and following a loss to Texas A&M in the quarterfinals, advance to a third consecutive NCAA Tournament as the No. 11 seed in the East Region in Washington, D.C. vs. Cincinnati.

Mizzou's 2011 season ended on March 17 in a 78-63 loss to the Bearcats. The Tigers led by as many as seven in the first half, but Cincy handled the Tiger pressure and shot 54 percent from the floor in the 15-point win. Ratliffe was one of four Missouri players in double figures with 13, but the Tigers shot just 29 percent in the first half to thwart any comeback opportunities.

While the year ended abruptly in our nation's capital, Missouri finished the campaign by reaching a number of milestones. This year's club became the first in school history to record 23 or more wins in three consecutive years and the 77 total wins in that three-year stretch is a school record. Denmon and English each topped 1,000 career tallies and the 2012 senior class of Bowers, Denmon, English and Steve Moore will have a chance to become the winningest four-year class in Mizzou history. Missouri will also enter a new era in 2012, as former University of Miami sideline boss, Frank Haith, was hired to be the program's 17th head coach in school history. Noted for his rebuilding job with the Hurricanes, Haith comes to Mizzou as Miami's all-time winningest postseason coach and has familiarity with the Big 12 Conference following coaching stints at Texas and Texas A&M.
