### CLASH OF THE TITANS: TOP-3 TEAMS SQUARE OFF FOR BIG 12 NORTH TITLE

The game that has been circled on calendars in both the states of Missouri and Kansas has finally arrived, and what a showdown it will be, as the 3rd-ranked Missouri Tigers (10-1 overall, 6-1 in Big 12 play) will face the 2nd-ranked Kansas Jayhawks (11-0, 7-0) Saturday night at Arrowhead Stadium in Kansas City, Mo.

It's a winner-take-all proposition in this neutral-site clash of the titans, with the winner claiming the Big 12 North Division title, and a spot in the Big 12 Championship game, set for Dec. 1st in San Antonio, Texas. And with both teams currently in the top-4 of the BCS standings, the winner can keep its hopes alive for a chance to play for the BCS title.

Mizzou is coming off a 49-32 win at Kansas State to earn a 10th regular season win for the 1st time in school history (on-field), while Kansas was equally impressive in closing out its home slate with a 45-7 dismantling of Iowa State last Saturday.

**TIGERS, JAYHAWKS RESUME NATION'S 2ND-MOST PLAYED RIVALRY**

With roots dating back all the way to the Civil War period in American history, Missourians and Kansas have always had a fierce rivalry in everything from washers to football.

Not only is it a spirited one, but it has several other things going for it that makes it one of the best (and most underrated) in the country...

– The MU-KU series is the 2nd-most played in the nation, with its 115 previous meetings. Only Minnesota and Wisconsin (117 meetings including their 2007 contest won by the Badgers) have played each other more than MU and KU...

– It is one of the most even rivalries around. Amazingly, the series is dead even, at 53-53-9 in the previous 115 meetings. The series tie makes it tied for the most closely-contested of the nation's top-23 most-played rivalries – those with 100 or more games played alltime (tied with Baylor-TCU; see chart below)...

– And like all great fierce rivalries, it's complete with controversy. Many stories abound about the bad blood between the two programs throughout the years. While the two schools maintain diplomatic relationships, they don't even agree on the series results, as MU claims a series deadlock at 53-53-9, while KU claims that it leads by 2 games (54-52-9). The dispute goes back to the 1960 season, when unranked KU came to Columbia and upset undefeated and #1-ranked Mizzou, 23-7. The win was later forfeited by KU after the NCAA ruled that ineligible players took the field for the Jayhawks. Kansas counts the result on the field in their record books, while MU sides with the NCAA and counts the forfeit in its win column.

The loss remains as likely the most bitter in Tiger history, as it cost MU a chance at its only national championship, as the Tigers went on to finish 10-1 on the field (11-0 in the record books with the forfeit), and ranked 5th after defeating Navy in the 1961 Orange Bowl.

**SATURDAY IS WORTH MORE THAN A WIN ON THE GRIDIRON**

Saturday's winner will not only take home the traditional bass drum trophy given to the winner of the rivalry game, but the school will earn 3 points in the MU-KU Border Showdown Series.

This marks the 6th year of the Border Showdown, which records the head-to-head results between MU and KU in all sports each season. Each competition is assigned a certain amount of points during the year, and the school that wins the most at the end wins a traveling trophy and bragging rights.

Entering Saturday's football game, Mizzou holds a 5.0-to-4.5 lead thus far in the 2007-08 series, as the Tigers earned 1.5 points each for wins in volleyball and women's swimming and 1.0 points each in men's cross country and women's cross country, while KU got 3 points for soccer, and another 1.5 points for an early-season volleyball win.

Keeping in line with the closeness of the MU-KU football series, the season series in the Border Showdown is 3-2 in favor of MU coming into this year, as Mizzou won in 2002-03 (32.0-to-8.5), in 2004-05 (22.5-to-17.5) and again in 2006-07 (25.0-to-14.0), with KU claiming wins in 2003-04 (21.5-to-18.5) and in 2005-06 (22.0-to-17.0).

## #3/4/4 Mizzou vs #2/2/2 Kansas — Nov. 24, 2007

### MIZZOU-KANSAS SERIES HISTORY

As previously stated, MU and KU have the 2nd-most played rivalry in college football history, and this Saturday will mark the 116th meeting between the two heated rivals, with the series evenly deadlocked at 53-53-9.

Mizzou broke a 3-game losing streak to KU last season with a 42-17 triumph in Columbia in what was the regular-season finale for the Tigers.

The series returns to Kansas City, Mo., for the next two years, as both schools agreed to move home games in 2007 and 2008 to Arrowhead Stadium, home of the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs.

Kansas City was the historical site of the MU-KU rivalry, as the city was the host of the 1st 16 games in the series, from 1891-1906, and for 21 games overall. KU holds a 12-6-3 edge overall in games played in the series in Kansas City, and Saturday marks the first games played there since MU won in consecutive years in 1944 (28-0) and 1945 (33-12).

MU Head Coach Gary Pinkel won his first 2 games against Kansas, making him only the 3rd coach in Tiger history to win his first 2 games over the Jayhawks. After last year's win, he stands 3-3 overall against KU.

### MU-KU BASS DRUM UP FOR GRABS SATURDAY

Most every school has goofy trophies that they play rivals for each year, and Mizzou is no exception. MU and KU play annually for a bass drum. Here are details of the significance behind the drum...

**MU-KU BASS DRUM** — Issued to the winner of the Missouri-Kansas football game ... Originated in 1935 ... Trophy was originally conceived as an Indian War Drum in nature by a couple of Mizzou alumni, since Osage Indians roamed the plains of Kansas and Missouri long before the state universities were founded ... Original intent was to stimulate new interest in longtime series that had dwindled during the Depression of the '30s and MU's all-time low in football victories ... Supposedly authentic Indian drum was purchased in a Kansas City pawn shop, and new drum was acquired prior to 1986 game ... Autographed originally on both drum heads by KU and MU alumni ... Tradition was temporarily forgotten for a few years but resumed on an annual basis in 1947 ... The first game ended in a scoreless tie.

### LAST YEAR REWIND: MIZZOU 42, KANSAS 17 (2006)

Chase Daniel threw for a career-best 356 yards and four touchdowns to lead Missouri to a 42-17 win over Kansas in the regular-season finale to give MU 8 wins, and to knock its bitter rival from a bowl game of its own.

Chase Coffman caught two scoring passes for Missouri (8-4, 4-4 Big 12), which ended a three-game losing streak on the season, and also to the Jayhawks. The Tigers tied for second in the Big 12 North with Kansas State.

Jon Cornish had 126 yards on 15 carries for Kansas (6-6, 3-5), which had won three in a row. Cornish scored on a 42-yard run in the first quarter en route to his eighth 100-yard game of the season and a school-record 1,457 yards, passing Tony Sands (1,442) and June Henley (1,349).

Missouri twice led by 13 in the first half, but the lead was shaved to three in the third quarter soon after offsetting personal fouls away from the play nullified a 75-yard touchdown pass from Daniel to Brad Ekwerekwu. Officials first announced that the score would count but changed their minds after huddling for several minutes.





Missouri's Jared Perry and Kansas' Jerome Kemp exchanged clips while Ekwerekwu was sprinting to the end zone. The Tigers ended up punting after a third-down incompleteness, and Kansas needed only three plays to narrow the gap to 20-17 when Aqib Talib scored on a 42-yard swing pass from Kerry Meier.

A fourth-down offsides call when the Tigers were preparing to punt kept alive the ensuing 11-play drive capped by Temple's 20-yard scoring run that gave Missouri a 10-point lead. Jeff Wolfert added his third field goal of the game, and Coffman and Greg Bracey added touchdown receptions in the fourth quarter as the Tigers pulled away.

Daniel, who was 26-for-38, topped his previous best of 320 yards in the opener against Murray State in his first season as starter. His 74-yarder in the first quarter to Perry, was the school's longest pass play since 1989.

## TIGERS CAN BECOME 1ST MU TEAM IN HISTORY TO WIN 11 GAMES

Mizzou will take to the field Saturday in Kansas City, Mo., with a chance at making history. With a 10-1 record entering the game, the Tigers will look to become the 1st team in school history to win 11 games in a season on the field.

The only other time MU has won 10 games was back in 1960, when the Tigers had a 10-1 record on the field, but a perfect 11-0 mark in the record books, after a regular-season finale loss to rival Kansas was later forfeited by KU for using an ineligible player.

That 1960 team won 9 regular season games, then won its bowl game (1961 Orange) for 10 on-field wins, and 11 wins in the record books.

The 2007 squad has already become the first Tiger team to ever win 10 regular-season games on the field with its 49-32 win last Saturday in Manhattan. And with a minimum of 2 games remaining in the season (including a bowl outing), the overall record of 11 wins by the 1960 team is still in play.

Mizzou has now won at least 8 regular-season games in consecutive years for only the 2nd time in school history — 1941 and 1942 was the only other such occasion for the program, now in its 117th season of competition.

Head Coach Gary Pinkel joins MU legends Don Faurot and Dan Devine as the only Mizzou coaches to achieve multiple 8-win regular seasons. Faurot won 8 regular season games 4 times, while Devine did it twice. Pinkel's teams have now done it 3 times (2003, 2006, 2007).

## TIGERS LOOKING FOR 1ST 7-WIN CONFERENCE SEASON SINCE 1960

At 6-1 currently in the Big 12 Conference, the Missouri Tigers are looking for a win Saturday that would give them 7 league wins for the first time since 1960.

The school record for most wins in a conference season is 7, from the 1960 team that went 7-0 in league play in the record books – with the loss to Kansas later forfeited. That team went 6-1 on the field in league play, so if the Tigers were to defeat Kansas this Saturday, that would give them an MU-record 7 on field league wins.

The current bunch is already only the 4th team in school history to win as many as 6 league games. Here's a look at those years:

## MIZZOU IN THE MIDST OF ITS WINNINGEST DECADE SINCE THE 1960S

A fun fact to ponder is that in the decade of the 2000s, Mizzou has upped its record to 50-44 (.532), and that is the school's best winning percentage in a decade since the 1960s, when MU enjoyed its most successful era ever.

From 1960-69, the Tigers went 77-22-6 (.762), and were the only school in the nation to never lose more than 3 games in any season during that decade. Under Hall of Fame Coach Dan Devine, the Tigers finished the season ranked in 8 of those 10 years, including 4 in the top-10 (5th in 1960; 6th in 1965; 9th in 1968; 6th in 1969).

Additionally, the 50 wins MU currently has posted this decade (8 seasons), has already surpassed the 10-year win totals for the school in both the 1980s (45) and 1990s (43).

## TIGERS RISE TO #3 IN A.P. POLL, ALSO STAND #4 IN BCS RANKINGS

After its 49-32 victory at Kansas State last Saturday, Mizzou moved up 3 spots in the Associated Press Top-25, to 3rd. This marks the 10th-consecutive week the Tigers have been ranked, with the current ranking the highest for any Mizzou team since 1960, when the Tigers reached #1 for one week (for the only time in school history). The opponent for that game? It just so happens it was the same Kansas Jayhawks that Mizzou faces this Saturday.

The 6th week of BCS rankings was released Sunday, and the Tigers rose to a school-best #4, and were one of 4 Big 12 Conference teams included in this week's top-25: #2 Kansas, #10 Oklahoma, and #13 Texas were the others.

A few notes about MU carrying a ranking into a game:

- – MU is 95-59-1 overall (61.6%) in its previous 155 games as a ranked team, but it has never taken the field as the #3-ranked team in the Associated Press...

- – This will mark just the 3rd time that MU and KU have met with both teams carrying AP rankings into the game. Here's a look at those contests...

### **TIGERS ROLL TO 10-1 WITH 49-32 WIN AT KANSAS STATE LAST SATURDAY**

Mizzou continued to shatter barriers on its historic season, as it turned a tight ballgame at halftime into a comfortable 49-32 victory at Kansas State, representing MU's first win in Manhattan since 1989. The win broke an 8-game losing streak in Manhattan for the Tigers, and gave the program 10 regular-season on-field wins for the first-time ever.

Playing the guest to K-State's senior day, and with the Wildcats fighting for bowl eligibility, the Tigers scored first and jumped to a 14-3 lead in the 1st quarter, and eventually held a 21-18 lead at halftime after withstanding a KSU surge that gave them a brief lead.

Junior FS William Moore got things started on the game's opening series, as he intercepted KSU's Josh Freeman on the 3rd play of the game, setting up the Tigers at the KSU 15 yardline. Two plays later, QB Chase Daniel connected with WR Jeremy Maclin from 8 yards out to make it 7-0 just like that.

After a K-State field goal, Maclin turned in possibly the play of the game, as he fielded the ensuing kickoff at the MU 1-yardline, went up the middle, spun out of traffic to reach the corner, and raced down the sideline for a 99-yard touchdown to give MU a 14-3 lead. The return was more than significant, it was super-mega significant because it represented MU's first kickoff return for a TD since 1982 (Ricky Doby 85 yards at Oklahoma State). Mizzou had gone 287 games and 976 kickoff returns between TDs!!

K-State answered to take a brief 15-14 lead by scoring 12 points in a one-minute span, when James Johnson ran for a 66-yard TD with :16 seconds left in the 1st quarter, followed by a Wildcat blocked punt return for a TD at the 14:16 mark of the 2nd. MU managed to block both extra point attempts, and quickly regained the lead with its following offensive possession, driving 81 yards for a Daniel-to-Martin Rucker TD pass of 8 yards.

With the Wildcats sensing a chance at the upset, Daniel and company would have nothing of it, as the Tigers drove 77 yards and 93 yards to begin the 3rd quarter for consecutive TDs that made it 35-18 at the 9:20 mark. Tony Temple scored the first TD on a 2-yard run and Daniel found Maclin wide open for a 44-yard TD (on a 3rd-and-17) for the latter score.

The Wildcats closed to within 10 points with 2:23 left in the 3rd on a Freeman TD pass, but the Tiger offense again applied the kill shot by scoring consecutive TDs, on a Daniel-to-Rucker TD pass and a Temple run, to put MU up, 49-25. K-State scored a garbage TD in the closing minutes to account for the final margin.

## MACLIN NAMED WALTER CAMP NATIONAL OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK AFTER BREAKING NCAA FRESHMAN ALL-PURPOSE YARDAGE MARK AT KANSAS STATE

Freshman wide receiver/return man extraordinaire Jeremy Maclin was named the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Offensive Player of the Week, for his record-breaking efforts in MUs 49-32 win in Manhattan, Kan., over Kansas State.

Maclin, who is proving himself to be the most dynamic and versatile freshman in the nation, amassed an MU single-game record of 360 all-purpose yards, breaking the NCAA freshman single-season all-purpose yardage record in the process. The old record was 2,026 by Terrell Willis of Rutgers in 1993, and after Saturday, Maclin now has 2,309 in 11 games.

Maclin broke the NCAA record on an historic play, as he took a kickoff return 99 yards for a touchdown in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter, for Mizzous first kickoff return for a score since 1982. Mizzou had gone 287 games and 976 kickoff returns between its last touchdown, both of which were nation-long streaks.

Maclin, who leads the Big 12 Conference and ranks 2<sup>nd</sup> in the NCAA in all-purpose yards (209.9 ypg), is the only player in the nation to have touchdowns via receiving (9 TDs), rushing (4), punt return (2) and kickoff return (1). He also became only the third Tiger in history to have a kickoff return and punt return for a touchdown in a season joining former greats Roger Wehrli (1968) and John Moseley (1973).

After his big day at Kansas State, which also included a career-best nine receptions for 143 yards and two touchdowns, Maclin now leads MU with 885 receiving yards on the season. He ranks 2<sup>nd</sup> in the Big 12 (18<sup>th</sup> nationally) in punt returns (12.19 avg.), 6<sup>th</sup> in the league in receiving yards (80.45 ypg), 6<sup>th</sup> in scoring (8.73 ppg) and 8<sup>th</sup> in kickoff returns (24.47 avg.).

## MORE ON THE J-MAC ATTACK

One could make a pretty good argument that Maclin has been the biggest impact freshman in the country this season, at least in terms of being key to his team's success.

He's made big play after big play in key situations for the Tigers, and has no doubt been a big reason why MU is 10-1 for the 1st time since 1960 and in its highest-ever BCS position currently, at 4th. Maclin has scored a TD in 6 straight games, has at least 1 score in 9-of-11 outings, and has 6 multiple-TD games thus far.

In addition to already having broken the NCAA freshman single-season all-purpose yardage record, the Kirkwood, Mo., native is also on pace to break the NCAA freshman per-game all-purpose yardage mark of 184.8, established in 1991 by Marshall Faulk of San Diego State.

With his 267-yard day against Texas A&M, Maclin broke the Big 12 Conference freshman season record of 1,937 set by Adrian Peterson of Oklahoma in 2004.

**DANIEL MAKING A RUN FOR HEISMAN CONSIDERATION**

Junior QB Chase Daniel continues to make a claim to top signal caller status in the Big 12 Conference, and for top national honors as well with his stellar play. Among those national honors that his name keeps popping up for around the country is the mother of them all – the Heisman Trophy.

Daniel received a letter from the Heisman Trust two weeks ago, indicating that he is being followed by many of the voters, and thus, is in a position to potentially garner an invite to the Heisman ceremony in New York City the weekend of Dec. 8. Finalists will be announced Dec. 5.

The Tiger signal caller, who has already been named a semifinalist for the O'Brien and Maxwell Awards, justified that Heisman correspondence on Saturday, when he burned K-State for 4 TD passes and 284 passing yards in leading MU to its 1st win in Manhattan since 1989.

Daniel recently turned in a QB rating of 189.91 in leading MU to a 40-26 win over Texas A&M. He completed 27-of-35 passes (77.1%), for 352 yards and 3 TDs with zero INTs.

Daniel has been stellar during crunch time, as his QB rating in the 4th quarter of Big 12 games in 2007 is 194.56 – he's 37-of-42 passing for 399 yards, with 4 TDs and 1 INT.

Daniel became the 1st repeat winner of the Big 12 Conference Offensive Player of the Week this season, when he won the Big 12 award for his 421-yard, 5-TD performance at Colorado in which he completed 26-of-44 passes and had a QB rating of 172.42. The yardage marked a career high for Daniel, with the TD passes tying his own school single-game record he'd established twice previously (2006 vs. Murray State and 2007 at Ole Miss). Daniel led MU to a 55-10 win in Boulder.

Daniel has now won the weekly Big 12 award twice this season, and 4 times overall. He won the award earlier this year for his performance in leading Mizzou to a 41-6 win over #25 Nebraska on Oct. 6th, when he passed for a then-career-best 401 yards and had a career-high 473 yards of total offense in all as the Tigers rolled up 606 yards on the night. He also won during the 2006 season for his efforts against Murray State and Kansas.

**RUCKER LEADS ALL OF NCAA'S TIGHT ENDS IN RECEPTIONS PER GAME**

All-American candidate TE Martin Rucker bypassed the NFL draft after his junior year, in order to come back to help lead his team to great things in 2007, and also to help improve his draft status for next year. Through 11 games, his decision appears to have been an extremely good one, as Rucker has played like a man among children, as he leads all of the nation's tight ends with his per-game averages of 6.36 receptions and his yardage average of 63.55 yards (70 receptions, 699 yards, 7 TDs in all) is 5th-best nationally among tight ends. He also ranks 24th nationally – among all position players – with his 6.36 catches per game.

Rucker has been a beast every time he's touched the ball – we're hyperbolizing a little here, probably, but it's hard to remember a time when he was brought down by any less than 3 people on a play when he's touched the ball this season.

And when teams choose to focus on limiting his touches, as Kansas State did last Saturday, that attention opens things up for others, like a Jeremy Maclin, who had 9 catches for 143 yards and 2 TDs. Rucker was held to 4 catches for 28 yards in Manhattan, but still played a key role in MU's big win, as he caught a pair of TD passes for his 1st multiple-score game since his freshman season at Baylor.

The co-captain was a focal point of the offensive attack that rolled up 606 yards against Nebraska, as Rucker caught 9 passes for 109 yards and 1 TD against the Huskers. He followed with a 6-catch, 35-yard outing at Oklahoma where he caught a TD pass in the 4th quarter. Rucker is had a 6-catch night at Colorado that saw him break the MU single-season record for most receptions by a tight end (old mark was 54 by Chase Coffman in 2006), and he had a 6-catch, 54-yard day against Texas A&M.

Rucker, who was voted a team co-captain by his teammates this off-season, caught 53 passes for 511 yards and 5 TDs a year ago. He entered his senior season (after bypassing the NFL Draft) already holding the MU career records for TEs in receptions (119) and yardage (1,341).

With updated career numbers of 189 receptions for 2,040 yards and 17 TDs, Rucker is now just the 3rd Tiger ever (1st tight end) to reach 2,000 yards. He also stands just 12 catches shy of breaking the MU career receptions record of 200 held by former standout WR Justin Gage (200 from 1999-2002).

Rucker is the younger brother of Mike Rucker, who was an All-American defensive lineman at Nebraska and is a standout with the NFL's Carolina Panthers. His father, Martin Sr., also has a very public job, as he is a State Representative in the Missouri House of Representatives, for District 29.

## SPIEKER, RUCKER SET TO TIE CONSECUTIVE STARTS RECORD SATURDAY

There's something to be said for longevity, and that trait will be on display Saturday night, as senior center Adam Spieker and senior tight end Martin Rucker are set to tie a school record for most consecutive starts, when they take the field for their 48th straight start.

Each has started every game of his Tiger career, and will tie the MU record of 48 straight starts by former QB Brad Smith.

## WILLY MO LEADS BIG 12 IN INTERCEPTIONS, TAKING OVER FOR INJURED PIG

When Mizzou lost its biggest playmaker, SS Pig Brown, to a season-ending injury in game #8 against Iowa State (ruptured Achilles'), with the loss went a player who was among the best in the Big 12 Conference at his position, and someone who was on his way to all-Big 12, and possibly even some all-America recognition.

Brown's running mate in the secondary, FS William Moore (a.k.a. Willy Mo), had been having a good year up to that point, but since Brown has been out, Moore has turned his game up to 11 on the Spinal Tap volume knob, and he's playing his way into potential all-conference honors, as well.

Moore has notched an INT in each of the 3 games without Brown, raising his season total to 6, which is most in the Big 12, and 4th nationally. The total is tied for 2nd-most on the MU single-season list, just 1 behind the record of 7 set in 1968 by former all-American, and 2007 Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee, Roger Wehrli.

Each of those INTs has led to points for the Tigers, with MU getting a FG at Colorado, followed by a TD against Texas A&M and again last week vs. Kansas State. Moore's play at KSU set the tone right away, as he jumped a pass in the flat by KSU's Josh Freeman on just the 3rd play of the game, and returned it 22 yards to the K-State 15 yardline to set up the Tigers to take a quick 7-0 lead.

Against the Wildcats, Moore had 8 tackles in all, including 1 QB sack, and he also had a huge stop of Freeman at the Tiger 1-yardline which forced a 4th down and a KSU field goal attempt. The week before, against Texas A&M, Moore had 6 tackles, including 1 TFL, and added 1 PBU to go with his INT.

Prior to that, he had his best outing of the year at Colorado, in what was the defense's 1st game without Brown. At CU, Moore had 11 tackles, including a huge stop on a 3rd-and-short try early in the game that forced a Buffalo punt and swung momentum MU's way, in addition to forcing a fumble, grabbing an interception and notching 1 QBH.

## BY AIR, OR BY LAND, THE TIGER OFFENSE IS SCORING LIKE NO OTHER

Mizzou ranks 6th nationally in scoring offense coming into Saturday's game, averaging 42.50 points per game. Perhaps the most remarkable thing about this is the consistency with which the Tigers have scored this year – Mizzou has scored 30 points or more in each of their 11 games so far, and that's something that's never been done before at the school.

The previous longest stretch of consecutive games scoring 30 points or more was 5, and that was done only twice before, in 1997 under Coach Larry Smith, and in 2002 under Coach Gary Pinkel.

The 11 games of scoring 30 or more this season is also the MU single-season record, here's a quick look at those figures...

With 467 points scored so far, the current Tigers have already broken the season school record of 399 points, set in 13 games by the 2003 squad. With at least 2 games (including a bowl game) on the horizon, MU's current pace of 42.50 ppg extrapolates to a 13-game total of a massive 553 points! This year's team has also, in just 11 games, already surpassed the team records for points in a 12-game season (369 in 2005) and an 11-game season (368 in 1997).

## MIZZOU ONLY TEAM TO SCORE 30 PTS. EACH GAME IN 2007

Another testament to the consistency with which Chase Daniel and the Tiger offensive attack is playing this year – a check of the national results in 2007 shows that Mizzou is the only school in the country to score at least 30 points in every game.

MU and Hawaii were both in that category heading into last week, but Hawaii was held to 28 points in their win against Nevada.

MU also has the most 30-point games in the nation, doing it 11 times so far. Here's a quick look at teams with the most 30-point games so far (through games of Nov. 17th)...

## TIGERS LEAD THE NATION IN 3RD-DOWN CONVERSIONS

The latest NCAA stats show that Missouri enters this weekend's games atop the nation's rankings in 3rd-down efficiency, converting a nation-best 56.0% (89-of-159). Mizzou maintained the top spot in the rankings in spite of a season-low conversion rate of 36.4% (4-of-11) last Saturday at Kansas State – that marked only the 3rd time this year that Mizzou was held under a 50% rate for a game.

Earlier, MU had a solid 9-of-16 showing (56.3%) on the road in the Tigers' 41-31 loss at 6th-ranked Oklahoma – that, despite the fact that OU came into the game ranked 3rd nationally in 3rd-down defense, allowing opponents a conversion rate of just 25.5%.

## TIGERS ALSO 2ND IN NATION IN FEWEST YARDS PENALIZED

One of Head Coach Gary Pinkel's tried and true lines has to do with Missouri beating Missouri, and how penalties and mistakes do just that. So far in 2007, his Tigers have done a good job of not beating themselves with penalties, as MU ranks 2nd in the nation in fewest penalty yards per game, with just 32.82 yards averaged. Mizzou's opponent this Saturday, Kansas, is also very sound in that category, ranking 6th, at 37.45 penalty yards per game.

Through 11 games, MU has been flagged 49 times for a grand total of 361 yards. They are coming off a game in which they were penalized just 3 times for 20 yards at Kansas State. Previously they were penalized 4 times for 35 yards at Colorado, a game after they were flagged just 1 time for 7 yards against Iowa State – a tough pass interference call which went against MLB Brock Christopher that extended an ISU drive on 3rd-and-long.

Prior to that, MU was flagged just 3 times for 33 yards against Texas Tech. Previously, the Tigers were cited 5 times for 25 yards at Oklahoma, after getting flagged 9 times for a season-high 79 yards against Nebraska the week before.

## OFFENSE AVOIDING THE THREE-AND-OUT

Few things cripple an offense more than the dreaded failed possession that ends up going three-and-out with a punt. Mizzou's offense has proven astoundingly successful in 2007 at avoiding that pratfall, however, as through 11 games, MU has gone three-and-out (followed by a punt) only 17 times.

Five of those 17 times came in the season opener against Illinois, and another 2 came in game #2 in the 4th quarter at Ole Miss when MU had a big lead and was more concerned with milking clock than anything else. The chart below shows that Mizzou has had just 10 three-and-out offensive possessions total in the last 9 games...

### DON'T JUDGE THIS DEFENSE SOLELY BY ITS STAT RANKINGS

A quick look at the NCAA stat rankings shows that MU ranks 96th in pass defense, allowing 258.3 yards per game. That is a little misleading however, as the Tigers have played from ahead for the vast majority of time this season, forcing opponents to throw the ball early and often, and giving up mostly meaningless yards in between the 20s.

Perhaps a more impressive category to peruse would be pass efficiency defense, where the Tigers rank 43rd nationally (3rd in the Big 12), with a rating of 119.2. The Tigers intercepted Texas Tech QB Graham Harrell 4 times on Oct. 20, when he had only 3 INTs all year coming into the game, and just recently held Colorado's Cody Hawkins to 112 yards passing and no TDs for the 1st time in his career.

In Big 12 Conference games, MU ranks 2nd in pass efficiency defense, with an opposing QB rating of 117.0. The Tigers have allowed only 8 TD passes in 7 league games, which is fewest in the conference.

### TIGER 2-MINUTE OFFENSE HAS BEEN NEAR UNSTOPPABLE

At the risk of sounding boastful, it's almost unfair when the Tiger offense steps on the field in a 2-minute situation near the end of the 2nd quarter. That's because with MU's fast-paced spread offense, nearly every possession is a 2-minute offense, and when faced with little time left on the clock, the Tigers are used to ramping it up quick-like.

Through 11 games, MU is a perfect 8-of-8 operating in its last possession of the 2nd quarter. The only 3 times it didn't score were when it intentionally took a knee to end the half against Texas Tech, at Colorado and at Kansas State.

Of the 8 scores, 6 have come from the foot of PK Jeff Wolfert, with 4 of his FGs coming at the halftime gun – a perfect management of the clock in coaching circles. One of the TDs was also near-perfect clock usage, as it came with just :04 seconds left at Ole Miss.

Perhaps most impressive was MU's 2-minute drill at 5th-ranked Oklahoma, where the Tigers took over after a punt on their own 13-yardline with just 1:34 remaining in the quarter. Chase Daniel and company drove masterfully downfield, using the sideline and timeouts to near perfection, moving 85 yards on 9 plays to reach the Sooner 2-yardline before having to kick a 19-yard field goal at the gun.

Equally impress was the situation listed below against Iowa State, where MU took over after a kickoff return on its own 41-yardline with just :20 seconds left. Only up by 3 points at the time, MU chose not to run out the clock, and ate up 30 yards just like that to give Wolfert a shot at a 48-yard field goal, which he promptly booted to give MU momentum heading into half.

## COFFMAN BREAKS MU CAREER RECEIVING TD RECORD AT COLORADO

The nation's best "backup" tight end, junior Chase Coffman, had quite a performance at Colorado in Mizzou's recent 55-10 win, as he caught 3 TD passes that helped him break the school career receiving TD record.

For the game, Coffman caught 5 passes for 60 yards, with his scoring grabs coming from 25, 23 and 5 yards out, in order. He broke several tackles on his 1st, made a trademark hurdle over a diving CU defender on the 2nd that freed him up to spin and dive into the endzone, and his last was a stunning one-handed grab in the back of the endzone that saw him tiptoe with one foot in to make the catch stand.

The 3 TDs upped his career total to 19, and that broke the previous MU career record of 18, established by WR Justin Gage from 1999-2002. That total now stands at 20, after a 1-TD day against Texas A&M.

For his career, Coffman has 154 receptions for 1,650 yards, totals which rank 3rd and 7th, respectively, on the MU career receiving charts among all players, and 2nd among MU tight ends.

## IN CASE YOU HAVEN'T HEARD ABOUT CHASE DANIEL, LET US TELL YOU SOME STUFF

There can't be many QBs in the nation playing at a higher level than Tiger signal caller Chase Daniel, who currently ranks 4th in the nation in total offense (349.27 ypg) and 9th nationally in passing efficiency (155.06 rating).

And he hasn't been putting up numbers against the sisters of the poor, exactly. Here's a look at Daniel's numbers this season against his 9 BCS-conference opponents this year...

## #3/4/4 Mizzou vs #2/2/2 Kansas — Nov. 24, 2007

Daniel had a scintillating night at Ole Miss, where he tied his own MU single-game record by tossing 5 TDs (all coming in a span of just 16:07), as he helped lead the Tigers to an important 38-25 road win. In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter alone at Ole Miss, Daniel was 12-of-17 passing for 177 yards and 4 TDs, good for a stout QB rating of 235.7.

He's twice been named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week in 2007, for a 401-yard, 2-TD, 473-yard total offense night in a 41-6 win over #25 Nebraska, and most recently, for a career-best 421-yard passing night, including a record-tying 5 TDs, at Colorado, in leading MU to a 55-10 road win.

Last season, Daniel smashed numerous season records that former QB great Brad Smith and others held, including passing yards (3,527 – almost 1,100 more than the old record of 2,436 by Jeff Handy in 1992), passing TDs (28), TDs responsible for (32) and total offense (3,906). Daniel ranked 5th in the NCAA in total offense with his per-game average of 300.5 ypg – that was the highest a Tiger has rated in total offense nationally since Bob Steuber finished 3rd in 1942.

Daniel, in his first year as a starter in 2006, led MU to its first 6-0 start since 1973, and an 8-win season for only the 10th time in school history. He enters Saturday's game against Kansas with a career record of 18-6 as a starter at Mizzou.

## **PINKEL STANDS 3RD ON ALLTIME MU COACHING WINS LIST**

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 7th season at MU and touts a career record of 120-73-3 (62.0%).

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 38-22 over the past 5 seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005 and 2006, has a 7-year record in Columbia of 47-36 (56.6%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has won 19 of his last 25 games overall.

MU's 49-32 win last time out at Kansas State gave Pinkel his 47th MU win, which put him in 3rd by himself on the coaching wins list at MU. Here's a quick look at the top 6...

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

The 2006 season got off to an historic start for Pinkel and his Tigers, as he led MU to its first 6-0 start since 1973, and its first 7-1 start to a season since 1969. He was awarded with a new five-year contract late in the year that will keep him on the Tiger sidelines through the 2011 season. The new deal trumped the old contract that was set to expire after the 2008 campaign.

Pinkel has led MU to 3 bowl games, and when his Tigers reach a 4th in 2007, he will join Faurot (4 bowls), Devine (6 bowls), and Powers (5 bowls) as the only coaches to guide MU to 4 bowl games. After beating Nebraska in 2007 (41-6) for the 3rd time in 5 years, Pinkel became the first MU coach since Onofrio to defeat NU three times.

Pinkel has guided Mizzou to 4 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 10-1 in 2007), with those representing 4 of MU's 6 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

## **WOLFERT CONTINUES ON PERFECTION IN CONFERENCE PLAY**

Junior PK Jeff Wolfert continued his perfect run through conference play, as he was a perfect 7-of-7 in PATs last Saturday at K-State.

Wolfert is still perfect in Big 12 games this season in 47 combined kicks (37-of-37 PATs and 10-of-10 FGs). At the risk of throwing a big jinx on the proceedings, Wolfert has never missed a kick of any kind in Big 12 play in his career – Wolfert has now made 81 consecutive combined kicks in Big 12 play in his career, spanning 2006 and 2007. He went a perfect 34-of-34 in 2006 (23-of-23 PATs and 11-of-11 FGs), to go with the perfect 47-of-47 so far in 2007.

One of the great “feel-good” stories in college football last season had to be Wolfert, who became one of the most reliable kickers in the nation in 2006, after kicking in just 1 game in his entire life (in high school, at that) prior to winning the starting job in fall camp.

Wolfert moved his point total for the 2007 season to 103 at Kansas State, and that broke his own single-season kick-scoring record of 99, set in 13 games a year ago.

Just how impressive was Wolfert a year ago? Impressive enough to be named last year as a semifinalist to the Lou Groza Award, given annually to the nation's top kicker. Evidently, numbers such as 18-of-20 on field goals and 45-of-45 on PATs will earn you that kind of recognition.

All Wolfert did was break MU records for most points scored in a season by a kicker (99), most FGs made (18), most PATs made (45), most consecutive PATs made in a season (45), highest percentage of FGs (.900) and PATs (1.000) made, and longest field goal made on the road (54 at Nebraska). He made an incredible 63-of-65 combined kicks in all, on the season, with his only misses coming on his very 1st collegiate FG try – a 41-yarder in the season opener versus Murray State – and on a 36-yard FG try in the 4th quarter of game #2 versus Ole Miss.

After that last miss, Wolfert made every one of his final 53 combined kicks (15 FGs, 38 PATs) to close the year, a streak that was broken in the '07 opener against Illinois when he missed a FG try from 49 yards out. He's got a current string going now of 49 straight combined kicks made in 2007 (10 FGs, 39 PATs), since his last miss on a FG attempt vs. Illinois State.

## HEAD COACH GARY PINKEL

In his seventh year directing the Missouri Tiger football program, Head Coach Gary Pinkel has built a solid foundation that has Mizzou pointed toward an exciting future.

While Pinkel himself would say that the program is still a work in progress, numerous accomplishments can be pointed to that already tell a nice success story. Mizzou enjoyed an exciting 2006 campaign that saw them win eight regular-season games for just the 10th time in school history, and the Tigers' appearance in the Brut Sun Bowl marked MU's third bowl game in the past four seasons – the first time in 25 years that Mizzou has had three bowls in four years.

Mizzou caught the attention of the national football community in 2006, as the Tigers got out to a scintillating 6-0 start, the first time since 1973 that MU had won its first six games. Mizzou was ranked for much of the season and had its name mentioned on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* and had its program prominently featured in other national publications such as *USA Today* and *The New York Times*. MU has won 10 regular-season games for the 2nd time ever in 2007 (and stands 10-1), and currently ranked #4 in the latest BCS poll (MU's highest-ever).

His success has led to an increased commitment to his program from the University, as Pinkel was awarded with a new five-year contract last November that will keep him on the Tiger sidelines through the 2011 season. With winning seasons in 2003 (8-5), 2005 (7-5) and 2006 (8-5), Pinkel is the first MU coach to achieve three winning seasons since Warren Powers.

Pinkel and his program successfully built on the momentum created from a thrilling 38-31 win over South Carolina in the 2005 Independence Bowl that saw his Tigers overcome a 21-point deficit. The landmark win marked the largest come-from-behind win in school history, and it gave Mizzou only its second bowl win in the last 24 years.

In the last five seasons, Pinkel has led the Tigers to a mark of 38-22 overall.

Pinkel has led Mizzou to three bowl games, and that puts him in select company, as he joins Don Faurot, Dan Devine, Al Onforio, and Warren Powers as the only coaches to guide MU to three bowl games. After beating Nebraska (41-6 on Oct. 6th)

for the 3rd time in 5 years, Pinkel became the first MU coach since Al Onforio to defeat the Huskers three times.

His seven-year Mizzou record stands at 47-36, and in 17 years, his record is 120-73-3 overall. The win over Nebraska in 2005 was the 100th of his head coaching career. His 47 wins at Mizzou is now 3rd-most on the school's career coaching victories list, with the win last weekend at Kansas State moving him past Warren Powers for 3rd on the list.

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Chase Daniel threw three touchdown passes, Pig Brown intercepted a pass at the 1 with 51 seconds to play, and Missouri held off Illinois 40-34 in both teams' season opener at the Edward Jones Dome in St. Louis, Mo.

The Tigers (1-0) scored on a 100-yard fumble return and a 66-yard punt return and were up 37-13 late in the third quarter.

Illinois redshirt freshman quarterback Eddie McGee - in the game after starter Juice Williams left after a blow to the head in the second quarter - scored from 16 yards with 4:08 to play in the third quarter to cut the margin to 17.

After Missouri's Danario Alexander fumbled on a double-reverse, McGee hit Kyle Hudson on a 41-yard scoring pass on the next play. The Illini got within three early in the fourth quarter after Daniel fumbled deep in his own territory. Rashard Mendenhall scored from the 4 two plays later to make it 37-34.

Missouri went ahead 40-34 on Jeff Wolfert's 32-yard field goal with 8:32 to play, then held on.

The Illini had one final shot, taking over at their 30 with 2:51 to play and driving to the Missouri 22. But Brown leaped high to intercept Brown's pass, and Missouri ran out the clock to claim its third straight win over Illinois in St. Louis, matching previous wins in 2002 and 2003.

McGee was 17-for-31 for 257 yards and a touchdown, but lost two fumbles and was intercepted twice. One of the fumbles came when McGee was inches from scoring on a quarterback draw in the second quarter. Missouri safety Pig Brown scooped up the ball and ran 100 yards the other way — tying an NCAA record in the process for longest fumble return.

Daniel was 37-for-54 for a career-high 359 yards and threw touchdown passes of 1 yard to Chase Coffman in the first quarter, 2 yards to Will Franklin in the second quarter and 25 yards to Jeremy Maclin in the third quarter.

Maclin also scored on a 66-yard punt return that put Missouri up 37-13 with 6:11 to play in the third quarter, before the Illini began the comeback.

Martin Rucker caught 10 passes for 86 yards for Missouri, and Alexander had nine catches for 82 yards, before dislocating his left wrist while being tackled on a key 33-yard reception in the fourth quarter that extended a crucial drive for the Tigers. Team officials said after the game they hoped to have Alexander back in time for the Nebraska game in Columbia on Oct. 5th.

Illinois rushed for 174 yards, led by Daniel Dufrene's 58 yards on six carries. Mendenhall had 42 yards and scored on runs of 25 and 4 yards.

Williams was scrambling near the sideline early in the second quarter when he appeared to take a helmet-to-helmet hit from Missouri cornerback Hardy Ricks. Ricks was playing despite suffering a dislocated shoulder just weeks prior in pre-season camp.

The Illini said Williams was held out for the remainder of the game as a precaution. He was 6-for-9 for 59 yards and rushed six times for 15 yards.

Both teams made the most of the opportunities presented them, as Illinois scored 20 of its points off Tiger miscues, including six on a blocked punt returned for a touchdown, and 14 more after recovering MU fumbles on the Tiger 5-yardline and 41-yardline.

Mizzou countered by scoring 16 points off of three Illini fumbles, with another seven coming on Maclin's punt return score — only the third non-blocked punt return for a touchdown at Missouri since 1990.

OXFORD, Miss. (AP) - Chase Daniel accounted for a career-high 396 total yards and threw five touchdowns passes as Missouri sprinted to a 28-point lead over Mississippi then held on for a 38-25 win.

It was the eighth time in the last nine games that Daniel had at least 309 total yards. He faced little pressure as he masterfully ran the spread offense and picked apart the Ole Miss (1-1) defense in the first 35 minutes.

Rebels running back BenJarvus Green-Ellis had a career game with 226 yards rushing.

The Tigers (2-0) built a halftime lead of 28-7 with four touchdowns and 245 yards passing. Daniel then seemed to put the Rebels away with a 38-yard touchdown pass to Greg Bracey just 1:12 into the third quarter that gave the Tigers a 35-7 lead.

Daniel's five touchdown passes came on five consecutive series spanning the second and third quarters.

But Ole Miss quarterback Seth Adams led the Rebels' push, completing 23 of 41 passes for 305 yards and three touchdowns in his second start. His scoring passes of 68 yards to Mike Wallace and 3 yards to Greg Hardy in the third quarter cut Missouri's lead to 38-19.

Green-Ellis cut it to 38-25 with a 2-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. But failed conversions cost Ole Miss 5 points, and the Rebels couldn't overcome their first-half mistakes, including Green-Ellis' fumble at the Missouri 7.

Daniel has thrown for 689 yards in two games, leading an offense that is averaging 39 points and 494 yards.

Not only was Daniel efficient, he was quick. All of Missouri's scoring drives lasted less than 3:05, with three coming in under 2 minutes.

The Ole Miss defense rarely pressured Daniel, giving him plenty of time to find an open receiver. The Rebels were often in position to stop big Tigers plays, but missed several key tackles that allowed first downs or scores.

COLUMBIA, Mo. - Jeremy Maclin racked up 275 total yards and scored two touchdowns and Tony Temple add two TDs to lead Missouri to a 52-24 win over Western Michigan in Mizzou's 2007 home opener.

Chase Daniel threw for two touchdowns and ran for a third, completing 27 of 46 passes for 328 yards for Missouri.

As it did in season-opening victories against Illinois and Mississippi, Missouri (3-0) built a big first-half lead - going up 31-3 on the Broncos (0-3) - before withstanding a second-half comeback that briefly cut the lead to 14.

But the Tigers' defense stopped Western Michigan when it counted, including a fourth-and-goal from the 6 midway through the fourth quarter.

Missouri wasted little time at the outset, with Maclin catching a 24-yard touchdown pass from Daniel to cap a 6-play, 72-yard opening drive.

The Tigers extended the lead to 14-0 on a 1-yard touchdown run by Temple - Missouri's first rushing score of the season. Linebacker Brock Christopher's interception set up the 46-yard scoring drive, which also featured a 39-yard scramble by Daniel before he was knocked out of bounds at the 1.

The run was a career long for Daniel, who added a 35-yard run for a score in the fourth quarter.

Daniel entered the game with a chance to set the Division I record for consecutive passes without an interception, having thrown 235 in a row without a pick, a streak dating back to a Nov. 4, 2006 game against Nebraska.

He extended the mark with his first 20 passes Saturday before Western Michigan's Anthony Gebhart picked off Daniel with 3:31 remaining in the second quarter. That play preserved the national mark of 271 set by Trent Dilfer at Fresno State.

Maclin added his second touchdown early in the second quarter with a 17-

yard run on a direct snap to the receiver, who was lined up in the shotgun.

Maclin caught seven passes for 96 yards, rushed six times for 52 yards, returned five kickoffs for 96 yards and returned two punts for 31 yards. His 275 all-purpose yards ranked as the 5th-most in MU single-game history.

Maclin nearly had another long score on a third-quarter kickoff, but ran into the back of a blocker and had to settle for a 29-yard return. And his 23-yard punt return in the third quarter deep into Western Michigan territory set up Temple's second rushing touchdown to make it 38-10.

Tommy Saunders caught a 25-yard TD pass from Daniel just before half-time, and backup quarterback Chase Patton completed the Tigers' scoring with an 18-yard run with 1:33 remaining.

Mark Bonds had a 9-yard touchdown run and Branden Ledbetter added a 27-yard scoring reception for Western Michigan, both in the fourth quarter. Ledbetter's score allowed the Broncos to cut the lead to 38-24 before Daniel ran for a 35-yard touchdown.

**COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP)** - For No. 25 Missouri, every possession is a 2-minute offense.

The Tigers used their no-huddle spread offense to take care of business by beating Illinois State 38-17 going into an off week before the Tigers' Big 12 opener against Nebraska.

[Chase Daniel](#) threw three touchdown passes for Missouri (4-0), which had 581 total yards and 38 first downs.

The Tigers scored on drives lasting 17 seconds, 3:11, 2:40, 3:33 and 2:04, and on Maclin's punt return. On 24 scoring drives this season, the Tigers' average time of possession is 2:08.

"I want to score - I'm not worried about grinding it out," said coach [Gary Pinkel](#), who became the first-ever Missouri coach to start 4-0 in three different seasons. "Our offense is not milk the clock."

[Tony Temple](#) scored on a first-quarter pass and a third-quarter 1-yard run, and [Jeremy Maclin](#) caught a touchdown pass and scored on a 64-yard fourth-quarter punt return.

Daniel was 21-for-34 for 294 yards and threw two interceptions. He completed passes to 11 different receivers. He has thrown 13 touchdown passes this season after setting a school record with 28 in 2006 in his first year as a starter.

Temple rushed 18 times for 101 yards, his sixth career 100-yard game.

Luke Drone was 22-for-37 for 242 yards, one touchdown and one interception for Illinois State (2-2) of the Football Championship Subdivision - the former Division I-AA. Geno Blow gained 116 yards on 21 carries. Eyad Salem caught seven passes for 106 yards and a fourth-quarter 13-yard touchdown.

Daniel's receivers did most of the work on the scoring passes.

On the first play from scrimmage, Will Franklin caught a pass on a wide

receiver screen at the Missouri 43 and ran the distance.

"We had no idea they were going to come and blitz like that and we had our screen called," Daniel said. "It was scripted, so it worked out perfectly."

Later in the quarter, Daniel threw a short pass to Temple, who ran in for an 11-yard score.

Missouri drove 97 yards after Illinois State failed to convert on fourth-and-goal from the 3 early in the second quarter. The 8-yard touchdown to end the drive came as Daniel appeared to run, then flipped forward to Maclin, who ran it in.

Illinois State coach Denver Johnson defended the decision to pass on the field goal that would have cut Missouri's lead to 14-6.

"When you get down there, you've got to get points," Johnson said. "Field goals weren't going to do us any good. If we wanted any chance at all to win the game, we were going to have to score touchdowns."

Illinois State's Parrish Fisher scored on a 4-yard run in the second quarter.

[Jeff Wolfert](#) had a 26-yard field goal for Missouri and Tyler Funk had a 21-yarder for Illinois State.

In many ways, the win was typical of Missouri's other games this season.

Missouri came into the game tied for seventh nationally averaging 532 yards per game. Missouri is averaging 42 points per game.

But the Tigers were ranked 97th in total defense, allowing 447 yards per game. Illinois State had 397 yards.

Maclin, a redshirt freshman, became the first Missouri player in 32 years to return two punts for touchdowns in a season. He also had a 66-yard score in the opener against Illinois.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — Chase Daniel turned 21 a few minutes after No. 17 Missouri polished off a late-night victory over No. 25 Nebraska. His performance was one long birthday celebration.

Daniel passed for a career-best 401 yards and ran for two scores and the Tigers got a big game from their suspect defense in a 41-6 victory over No 25 Nebraska.

"We played our 'A' game in a lot of facets," Daniel said. "If our defense plays like that week-in and week-out and we keep scoring, the sky's the limit."

Nebraska, which entered the game averaging 36 points, was held without a touchdown for the first time since a 31-3 loss to Oklahoma on Nov. 13, 2004. Missouri's four nonconference opponents averaged 25 points, leading to anticipation of a high-scoring affair that never materialized.

"I was so proud," coach Gary Pinkel said. "It was as complete a game as we've played in a long time."

The Cornhuskers were outgained 606-297. Quarterback Sam Keller, who was 25-for-43 with 223 yards and one interception, felt responsible.

"Extremely disappointing," Keller said. "It's a horrible, horrible feeling, and I put all the blame on myself."

Daniel was 33-for-47 and also was Missouri's rushing leader with 72 yards on 11 carries. Chase Coffman and Danario Alexander each caught a touchdown pass to help the Tigers (5-0, 1-0 Big 12) beat Nebraska decisively at home for the third straight time and go to 5-0 for a second straight season.

Pinkel is 2-15 against ranked opponents in seven seasons, both victories coming at home over Nebraska. The Cornhuskers were ranked

10th when Missouri ended a 24-game losing streak in the series with a 41-24 victory in 2003, and Missouri won by the same score in 2005.

A game viewed as a key early Big 12 North matchup attracted a crowd of 70,049, Missouri's first sellout since the Nebraska game in 2003 with most fans clad in yellow for a so-called "Gold Rush" game. The Tigers had a ball and even scored a touchdown off a fake field goal early in the fourth quarter.

"I wish it was like that every game," Daniel said. "It was an unbelievable atmosphere, unlike anything I've ever been in."

The crowd was the largest at Mizzou since 1984, when 70,915 packed Faurot Field on Sept. 26 that year to see Notre Dame take on the Tigers.

Missouri put away Nebraska (4-2, 1-1) without leading rusher Tony Temple, who sprained his right ankle in the first half. Temple had one catch for 20 yards and three carries for minus-2 yards.

Marlon Lucky had 123 yards rushing and receiving for Nebraska, held to a pair of first-half field goals by Alex Henery. Nebraska had won eight in a row against Big 12 North opponents.

"It's not our standard of football," coach Bill Callahan said. "We just couldn't get off the field on third down and we didn't convert on third down."

Missouri led 14-0 in the first quarter and 20-6 at the half, a big change from last year's 34-20 loss at Lincoln, Neb., in which the Tigers trailed 27-3 in the second quarter. Nebraska capitalized on a pair of early interceptions off Daniel in that game.

Daniel set the tone from the start on Saturday, going 12-for-14 for 127 yards while leading Missouri to touchdowns on its first two drives. One of the incompletions came on a dropped ball.

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Mizzou went toe-to-toe on the road with the 6th-ranked team in the nation, holding a 24-23 lead early in the 4th quarter, before the homestanding Sooners took advantage of key Tiger mistakes to hold on for a hardfought 41-31 over the 11th-ranked visitors.

The Tigers showed great resiliency all night long in the hostile environment of 85,041 in attendance, and clawed back from a 23-10 deficit in the 3rd quarter, to take a 24-23 lead into the last period.

The lead was regained with help from both sides of the ball, as the offense first scored on a 10-yard end-around by WR Jeremy Maclin (his 2nd rushing TD of the night) with 4:41 left in the 3rd, followed by TB Jimmy Jackson's 4-yard plunge with 1:30 remaining. The latter possession was set up when the Sooners' Juaquin Iglesias fumbled a kick-off return, giving the ball back to the Tigers.

Leading 24-23 in the 4th, Mizzou had a golden opportunity slip out of its hands, literally, when SS Pig Brown couldn't hold onto a potential interception in MU's endzone on an errant ball thrown by OU quarterback Sam Bradford. The drop proved costly, as Bradford regrouped and led the Sooners the remaining 33 yards needed to regain the lead, at 29-24 with 12:26 left.

Mizzou signal caller Chase Daniel, who would end the night 37-of-47 passing for 361 yards with 1 TD and 2 INTs, was ready to lead another drive downfield, but on the ensuing possession, a fumbled exchange with Maclin spelled doom, as OU's Curtis Lofton alertly scooped the ball up at the Tiger 12-yardline and rambled into the endzone for a quick score that pushed the Sooner lead to 35-24 with 11:40 left.

That bit of disaster put the Tigers in a big hole, and forced to abandon the run altogether, Oklahoma sat back in pass defense, and forced the Tigers to punt on their next possession after gaining one first down.

After the Tiger defense forced a punt, Daniel was intercepted on a tipped pass near the sideline, and OU converted by driving only 24 yards for a game-icing TD, on TB Chris Brown's 3rd TD of the game.

Mizzou wouldn't die easily, though, as Daniel led an 80-yard TD drive that culminated in a 5-yard TD pass to TE Martin Rucker to account for the final score.

A year after Oklahoma scored all 26 points in a 26-10 win over Mizzou in Columbia off of Tiger turnovers and drive-extending penalties, the Sooners once again capitalized on MU miscues to win for a second straight year. In all, Mizzou committed four turnovers on the night in Norman – three interceptions and one fumble – that Oklahoma converted into 21 key points.

The Tigers, looking for the schools' first win in Norman since 1966, did their part in forcing a pair of Sooner fumbles that MU converted into 14 points, but the 4th-quarter mistakes proved to be too costly to overcome.

Mizzou outgained Oklahoma on the night by a total offense margin of 418-to-384. The Tigers gained nearly 135 more yards than Oklahoma was allowing coming into the game, and its defense held the Sooners nearly 100 yards below their season average coming in – OU came into the game ranked 11th in both total defense (283.33 ypg) and total offense (482.17 ypg).

Maclin was an offensive star on the night in defeat, as he gained 189 all-purpose yards, including 104 on kickoff returns (one of which he returned 56 yards, representing the longest KOR for MU since 2002). He also ran 4 times for 32 yards and 2 TDs, while catching 5 passes for 53 yards.

TE Chase Coffman led all receivers on the night with 10 catches for 102 yards – both career high totals.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — [Chase Daniel](#) led the Missouri offense in the Tigers' most well-rounded effort of the season.

Missouri's improving defense intercepted Graham Harrell four times, returning one for a score, while throttling the nation's top offense in a 41-10 victory over No. 22 Texas Tech on Saturday.

Texas Tech forced Missouri, minus injured [Tony Temple](#) to run the ball, and the Tigers did so with great success. They gained 212 yards on the ground and Daniel had 210 yards passing on only 19 attempts, both season lows.

Backup tailback [Jimmy Jackson](#) had 59 yards and three touchdowns on 12 carries. Freshman [Derrick Washington](#) added 66 yards on nine carries for Missouri (6-1, 2-1 Big 12), which rebounded from a 10-point loss at Oklahoma last week and is 2-1 during a three-game stretch against ranked opponents.

"A game like that against such a good team, and the damage they can do in seconds, I'm very proud of our team," coach [Gary Pinkel](#) said.

Temple missed his second straight game with an ankle injury, adding a bruise to a sprain in practice on Wednesday. Missouri still won for the 13th time in 14 home games.

The scoring total was by far a season low for Texas Tech (6-2, 2-2), which entered the game first in points (50) and yards (582) per game. Missouri scored on its first four possessions of the second half to top its 40-point average, though the game didn't come close to fulfilling expectations of a points-fest featuring two of the most prolific passers in the country.

Texas Tech entered the rankings last week after a 35-7 victory over Texas A&M. The high point for the Red Raiders Saturday was a 68-yard touchdown pass from Harrell to Edward Britton in the second

quarter that cut Missouri's lead to 10-7. Harrell, who entered the game with 31 TD passes and only three interceptions, was 44-for-69 for 397 yards and wasn't helped by several drops.

The attempts were a season high and the yardage was second-lowest of the year and fewest against a major college opponent.

Texas Tech had 388 yards total offense, 101 yards fewer than the previous low against Iowa State.

Texas Tech was stopped in its first four attempts on fourth down against Missouri, which surrendered 41 points against Oklahoma. The Red Raiders finished 3-for-6 on fourth down.

Texas Tech's Michael Crabtree, who leads the nation in receiving and scoring with 17 touchdowns, had 10 catches for 76 yards to set an NCAA freshman record of 1,320 yards with four games plus a bowl appearance to go. He entered the game needing 22 yards to surpass the mark set by USC's Mike Williams in 2002, but was held out of the end zone for the second straight week.

Missouri kept it on the ground for the most part against a defense designed to stop the passing game. Daniel completed 14 passes, including a 57-yard touchdown to [Jeremy Maclin](#) in the fourth quarter.

Texas Tech was shut out in the first quarter for the second straight game, trailing 10-0, although the Red Raiders' defense kept it close. The lone touchdown came on a 38-yard interception return by [Stryker Sulak](#) on a ball tipped high in the air, and Missouri had to settle for a 21-yard field goal later in the quarter after a drive that fizzled at the 1.

Texas Tech ended its drought on a TD connection from Harrell to Britton with 6:39 left in the second quarter, but Missouri answered with its first offensive touchdown only 1:39 later on Jackson's 1-yard run for a 17-7 lead.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - Coming off a pair of routs over ranked opponents at home, Missouri had a harder time of putting away one-win Iowa State.

Given the current climate in college football, however, the Tigers' postgame locker room seemed just as noisy as ever.

Lorenzo Williams recovered a fumble in the end zone at the start of the second half, giving No. 13 Missouri breathing room and momentum in a 42-28 victory over the Cyclones. The Tigers, who entered the game seventh in the nation in total offense at 518 yards per game, won despite being held to a season-low 366 yards. Mizzou averaged more than a full yard per play more than ISU, (5.6-to-4.5), but the Cyclones held a massive edge in time of possession (38:22-to-21:38), keeping the ball away from the potent Tiger offensive attack.

Jimmy Jackson, Tony Temple, Martin Rucker and Jeremy Maclin each scored for Missouri (7-1, 3-1 Big 12). The Tigers had been punishing teams at Faurot Field, beating then-No. 22 Texas Tech 41-10 last week and then-No. 25 Nebraska 41-6 three weeks ago.

"You want to win all these games 40-6 and go eat hot dogs in the fourth quarter, but that's not football," coach Gary Pinkel said. "There's going to be battles out there and we were in a battle in the fourth quarter to keep this game and that's OK, as long as we won."

Missouri lost safety Cornelius "Pig" Brown for the season with a ruptured Achilles tendon in the fourth quarter. Brown, twice named Big 12 defensive player of the week, has been a big factor in the Tigers' improving defense.

Backup Alexander Robinson had 149 yards on 21 carries with a 37-yard scoring run for Iowa State, his first career 100-yard game, and Devin McDowell had a 25-yard interception return. The Cyclones had

389 yards total offense and played their second straight Top 25 opponent tough after holding down No. 4 Oklahoma in a 17-7 loss last week.

Daniel was 28-of-37 for 250 yards with one touchdown and the interception on a high throw that Martin Rucker tipped.

Missouri's play at the end of the half and right after the break was instrumental in winning for the 14th time in the last 15 home games. Iowa State's Bret Meyer scored on a 1-yard run with 24 seconds left in the half to cut the deficit to 17-14, and Missouri got downfield fast enough for Jeff Wolfert's 48-yard field goal on the final play.

Stryker Sulak stripped Meyer on a sack inside the 5 on the third play of the second half. Williams fell on the ball in the end zone and Missouri added a 2-point conversion for a 28-14 cushion.

Williams beat Sulak in a footrace to the ball.

Iowa State scored on its next drive on a 1-yard pass from Meyer to Marquis Hamilton before Missouri put the game away on Rucker's 10-yard reception and Maclin's 17-yard run on a reverse, the latter coming early in the fourth quarter to make it 42-21.

Meyer became the second quarterback in Big 12 history to pass for 9,000 yards, also setting a school record with 33 completions in 48 attempts. Todd Blythe caught six passes for 54 yards to become the school's career reception leader with 168, four more than Lane Danielson from 2000-03.

Daniel was 11-of-11 for 103 yards on Missouri's first two drives, which ended on touchdown runs by Jackson and Temple, for a 14-0 lead with 6:52 to go in the first quarter. Missouri didn't face a third down until its 18th play, and Daniel also tied a school record with 15 straight completions set by Kent Kiefer in 1990 before throwing the ball away on the next-to-last play of the first quarter.

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — Chase Coffman caught three of Chase Daniel's five TD passes as the Tigers trounced the Buffaloes 55-10 for their first win in Boulder since 1997.

His three TDs gave Coffman 19 for his three-year career, surpassing the school record of 18 set by wide receiver Justin Gage from 1999-2002.

It started with a 25-yarder, a pass he caught over the middle and zig-zagged his way through a half dozen defenders.

On his second score, he hurdled free safety Ryan Walters at the 5-yard line before bullying his way into the end zone to make it 38-10.

"I've been doing it because I'm getting tired of people diving at my knees," Coffman said. "This time, it just happened to work and I landed and just kept going."

Coffman has attempted the hurdle in scrimmages but this was the first time it worked in a game.

Following Colorado quarterback Cody Hawkins' third turnover, Coffman showed soft hands and superb concentration in pulling in a 5-yarder that made it 48-10.

It was also a historic night for Jeremy Maclin, who gained 187 all-purpose yards to break the single-season school record at Missouri, which is off to an 8-1 start for the first time since 1969.

At 4-1, the Tigers stayed right behind Big 12 North leader Kansas, which is unbeaten in league play and faces Missouri Nov. 24 at Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium.

The 55 points were the most Colorado had allowed at home since a 59-20 loss to Missouri on Oct. 8, 1983.

"It's huge," said Daniel, who completed 26 of 44 passes for 421 yards. "Oklahoma lost here. They gave Florida State all they wanted here. It was good to come out here and win a game, the first time since '97. We've been breaking down barriers and that was one of them.

"It's the next step to the Big 12 championship."

Maclin, a redshirt freshman, had 108 yards receiving, 12 rushing, 44 yards

on kick returns and 23 on punt returns. That gave him 1,682 all-purpose yards in nine games, breaking Devin West's record of 1,621 yards set in 1998.

"They've got a lot of nice things going," Colorado coach Dan Hawkins said. "... You never expect to go down like that."

Defensive tackle George Hypolite intercepted Daniel's first pass, which was deflected, giving the Buffs offense at the Missouri 11 and setting up Byron Ellis' 2-yard TD run that gave Colorado a 7-0 lead.

Daniel responded with a 72-yard pass to William Franklin, setting up 3-yard touchdown toss to tight end Martin Rucker.

Alonzo Barrett's blocked punt set up the Buffs with another short field and Kevin Eberhart's 24-yard field goal put them on top 10-7.

Then they surrendered 48 unanswered points.

It began to completely unravel when Hawkins was being pursued by two defenders and tried to pass anyway. The ball slipped out of his right hand and Lorenzo Williams recovered for the Tigers.

Three plays later, Daniel hit Maclin with a 46-yard touchdown toss that gave Missouri its first lead at 14-10.

The Buffs went three-and-out on their next four possessions. In between, the Tigers scored on Jeff Wolfert's 27-yard field goal, Tony Temple's 4-yard run and Coffman's 25-yard catch-and-run as the Tigers built a 31-10 halftime lead.

"That play where he caught it and broke like six tackles and got into the end zone, it was an amazing play," Hypolite said. "But again we missed six tackles for him to get in there."

Colorado also went three-and-out on its first two drives after halftime. When Hawkins finally completed a first-down pass, the crowd mockingly cheered but then began heading to the exits on the next play when a pass was tipped by linebacker Sean Weatherspoon and intercepted by free safety William Moore.

Hawkins, the coach's son, was replaced by backup Nick Nelson after completing 12 of 25 passes for 100 yards, no touchdowns and one interception. He fumbled twice.

# 2007 GAME RECAPS

GAME #10 • #7 MIZZOU 40, TEXAS A&M 26

NOV. 10, 2007 • FAUROT FIELD/MEMORIAL STADIUM • COLUMBIA, MO. • (64,945)

Redshirt freshman Jeremy Maclin caught two touchdown passes, one to pull the Tigers out of late trouble and the other on the school's longest reception in 31 years, in a 40-26 victory over Texas A&M.

Coach Gary Pinkel jokingly claimed credit. He said Maclin, who missed last year with a knee injury, has been his personal project this season.

"I select every year who I coach," Pinkel joked. "Last year I coached Chase Daniel and this year I'm coaching J-Mac. He wasn't very good when he got here, either."

Daniel threw for 352 yards and three touchdowns for Missouri (9-1, 5-1 Big 12), which reached nine victories for the first time since 1969 and only the fourth time in school history. The Tigers scored nine points in the final 3:44 on Maclin's 12-yard grab and a safety when Lorenzo Williams sacked Stephen McGee in the end zone to stave off a test from the Aggies.

"I don't think you ever want games like this or need games like this, but it was good to have it," Daniel said. "I'd rather be blowing people out by 60 if we possibly can."

Missouri set a single-season scoring record of 411 points, 12 more than the 2003 team in a 13-game season, with at least three games to go.

They also finished 6-0 at Faurot Field and clinched their first winning record in conference play under Pinkel, in his seventh season.

But Texas A&M (6-5, 3-4), which has lost three straight to top-10 opponents, made Missouri work on Senior Day.

"Our guys kept fighting, and I wish we could have converted a couple of times," McGee said. "We just didn't do that. You've got to hand it to them, they played a really good game."

Maclin's 82-yard sprint on a routine sideline pass near the end of the half put Missouri ahead 24-9, but the Aggies twice cut the deficit to five and missed a chance to narrow it to 2 when Matt Szymanski was wide right on a 36-yard field goal attempt early in the fourth quarter.

Missouri responded with an 80-yard drive capped by Jimmy Jackson's 6-yard run and Texas A&M again shaved the deficit to five when Martellus Bennett

broke several tackles on a 42-yard catch, his second touchdown of the game.

Maclin twisted, strained and then stretched the ball into the end zone on his 12-yard grab up the middle with 3:44 left that put Missouri ahead 38-26 and finally out of danger. He bruised his left shoulder on the play and did not return, but Pinkel said the injury was not serious.

"The guys battled hard, we got it to the fourth quarter, we had a chance," Franchione said. "We just couldn't get back in position to get a score and get ahead."

Jorvorski Lane tied the Texas A&M record for career rushing touchdowns and total touchdowns, getting his 44th rushing and 45th overall on a 2-yard run in the third quarter.

Maclin finished with five catches for 146 yards, and his catch-and-run with 1:43 to go in the first half was the school's longest scoring play since an 86-yard run by Robert Delpino in 1987.

Tony Temple scored on a 44-yard run in the first quarter, Missouri's longest run of the year, and the Tigers enjoyed their longest drive of the year on a 17-play march capped by Chase Coffman's 5-yard catch in the second quarter.

Temple, who left immediately after the game to attend his grandmother's funeral, finished with 22 carries for 141 yards.

Texas A&M scored on its first two possessions of the second half. Mike Goodson's 43-yard catch on a tipped ball set up Lane's 2-yard run, and Kerry Franks had a 60-yard catch in the second quarter that set up McGee's 6-yard scoring pass to Bennett.

McGee finished 18-of-28 for 247 yards with two touchdowns and an interception. He said the missed field goal was one of the biggest plays of the game.

"When we get down there, we've got to convert," McGee said. "You move the ball all the way down there and you don't get points, it can be a big momentum changer."

The game drew a near-sellout of 64,945 and gave Missouri a season-average attendance of 60,232, the school's best since 1981.

Jeremy Maclin scored three touchdowns and had a Missouri-record 360 all-purpose yards to set the NCAA single-season freshman record for all-purpose yardage, helping No. 6 Missouri set up one of the biggest college football games this season with a 49-32 victory over Kansas State.

Missouri (10-1, 6-1 Big 12) entered the weekend ranked fifth in the BCS, needing wins over Kansas State and Kansas, No. 3 in the BCS, to remain in the national championship hunt.

The Tigers took care of Kansas State (5-6, 3-5) by winning in Manhattan for the first time since 1989.

Quarterback Chase Daniel kept his burgeoning Heisman Trophy hopes alive with a solid day in the win, as he completed 28-of-41 passes for 284 yards and 4 touchdowns, with zero interceptions.

The Tigers took awhile to find their groove offensively, and also allowed a blocked punt return for a touchdown in a back-and-forth first half that ended with MU holding a 21-18 lead at halftime.

But Missouri pulled away early in the third quarter, with Daniel throwing a pair of touchdown passes to turn a 21-18 lead into a rout. The victory secured the second 10-win season in school history - first since 1960 - and gave the Tigers six conference wins for the first time since 1969.

More importantly, it kept up Missouri's hopes for the first national title in its 117-year history of playing football.

Maclin made sure the Tigers still have that a chance.

The redshirt freshman caught an 8-yard TD pass 67 seconds into the game, making a sliding grab in the end zone two plays after William Moore intercepted Josh Freeman's second pass. Maclin followed Brooks Rossman's 18-yard field goal by breaking two tackles and streaking

down the sideline for a 99-yard touchdown on the ensuing kickoff.

It was Missouri's first kick return for a touchdown since Ricky Doby scored on a reverse against Oklahoma State in 1982, the nation's longest drought, and it broke a string of 287 games and 976 kickoff returns between touchdowns. That play also pushed him past the NCAA freshman season record of 2,026 all-purpose yards.

Maclin then put the game all but out of reach midway through the third quarter, somehow sneaking up the middle unnoticed for a 44-yard touchdown catch that put Missouri up 35-18.

Missouri led 21-18 at halftime. One score came on Maclin's kick return and another, Maclin's 8-yard catch from Daniel, came after an interception at the Kansas State 15 on the third play of the game by free safety William Moore. It was Moore's Big 12-leading 6th interception of the season, and put him only one behind the MU single-season record of 7, by former All-American Roger Wehrli in 1968.

But the Wildcats couldn't sustain the pressure in the second half, allowing four touchdowns in their third straight loss.

"Missouri showed their true stripes," Kansas State linebacker Ian Campbell said. "They weren't going to let a little roll or a little momentum swing take everything away from them. Us not being able to come through and capitalize on some of the things that we had going for us shows the reason that we're not ranked No. 3, 4 or 5 in the country."
