### MU-KU BORDER SHOWDOWN

## TIGERS CLOSE REGULAR SEASON AGAINST ARCH RIVAL KANSAS

It's the game that many Mizzou fans circle on their calendar before the season starts, and it's finally here — Mizzou vs. Kansas, the nation's 2nd-most played rivalry and one of the most hotly-contested rivalries in all of sport.

This year's edition will take place Saturday afternoon in Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium, with kickoff set for 2:30 p.m. FOX Sports Net will televise the game.

Mizzou is riding high, coming off of a 31-27 comeback win last Saturday at Texas Tech that gave the Tigers consecutive wins for the first time in 2011. The Red Raiders took control early on, as they forged a 14-0 lead after one quarter, and they still held a 27-17 edge heading into the 4th quarter.

The Tigers dug in, however, and posted the 3rd-largest 4th-quarter comeback win in school history, as QB James Franklin threw for one score in the final period, and ran for the game-winner on a 9-yard keeper with 2:22 left. Franklin's run stood up as the winning points, when the Tiger defense made a goalline stand in the closing seconds, intercepting Tech QB Seth Doege at the MU 4-yardline with just :32 seconds left in the game.

The win made Mizzou bowl eligible for the 7th-straight season, extending its school-record streak. Of course, a 7-5 bowl record is much more attractive to prospective bowl committees, so the Tigers certainly have extra incentive to come out on top Saturday, in addition to the natural rivalry with KU.

Kansas comes into Saturday's Border Showdown looking to break a nine-game losing skid. Since starting the season 2-0 under 2nd-year Head Coach Turner Gill, the Jayhawks have dropped their last nine games by an average margin of 29.3 points a contest.

Kansas is coming off a 61-7 loss last Saturday at Texas A&M, but they had a pair of wins barely get away the previous two weeks, as they dropped a 13-10 heartbreaker at Iowa State three weeks ago, followed by a 31-30 overtime home loss to Baylor two weeks ago.

## TIGERS QUALIFY FOR BOWL WITH ANOTHER 4TH-QUARTER RALLY

When Texas Tech sped out to a 14-0 first quarter lead, things looked dire for the Missouri Tigers, who entered the game with a 5-5 record and needed one more win to reach bowl eligibility. When the 4th quarter started, Tech's lead was still 10 points, at 27-17. Little did the Red Raiders know that Mizzou had them right where they wanted.

Okay, it wasn't actually in the Tiger gameplan to spot two touchdowns to a team that already had a road win at #1 Oklahoma on its ledger, but that's how things unfolded Saturday in Columbia on Senior Day. Thankfully, the Tigers have displayed a strong finishing kick all season long, and Saturday was no different as Mizzou rallied for a pair of touchdowns to take a 31-27 lead with 2:22 left, and the defense preserved the win with a goalline stand capped by an interception on the MU 4-yardline with :32 seconds remaining.

The comeback marked the 2nd double-digit 4th-quarter deficit overcome to win in less than a month. On Oct. 29th, Mizzou trailed at Texas A&M by 11 points in the 4th quarter before coming back to force overtime, eventually claiming a 38-31 OT win. The A&M comeback stands as the 2nd-largest 4th-quarter deficit ever overcome to win for Mizzou (13 points is the biggest 4th-quarter deficit overcome, against Nebraska in 1949), while Saturday's 10-point deficit is the 3rd-largest overcome.

The 4th quarter has been a huge swing to the Tigers in 2011. Mizzou has outscored opponents by a whopping 133-to-52 margin in the 4th quarter.

The 133 4th-quarter points is the 2nd-most in the FBS, trailing only Houston, with 137. Conversely, the Tigers have scored only 40 points in the 3rd quarter, a figure which ranks 103rd out of 120 teams comprising the FBS ranks.

# MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

## FRANKLIN KEYS DECISIVE 4TH-QUARTER WIN VERSUS RED RAIDERS

Sophomore QB James Franklin stood tall with the heat on Saturday, as he led the Tigers on a pair of touchdown drives in the final quarter to erase a 27-17 deficit., including an 89-yard drive to win the game in the final minutes.

- — Franklin led the charge for the Tiger offense, as he accounted for all four touchdowns on the day (2 passing, 2 rushing) that made the difference in Mizzou's thrilling comeback win. He ended the day with 324 yards of total offense (including a career-high 152 yards rushing), and scored the game-winning touchdown on a 9-yard keeper with 2:22 to play...

- — Mizzou trailed by a 27-17 score entering the fourth quarter of play yesterday, but Franklin led a 63-yard drive that ended with his 7-yard TD pass to WR Marcus Lucas on 3rd-and-goal with 12:03 left to pull the Tigers to within 27-24. After a defensive stop, Franklin and the offense got the ball back on their own 11-yardline with just 6:06 left in the game. On the game-winning drive, Franklin ran 5 times for 39 yards and completed 2-of-3 passes for 35 yards...

- — In the 4th quarter alone, Franklin complete 5-of-8 passes for 85 yards and a TD, while he ran 9 times in all for 76 yards and a score...

- — Franklin has accounted for 31 touchdowns on the year (18 passing / 13 rushing), and that total ranks as 4th-most on the MU single season charts. In the last four games (where MU is 3-1 including wins over two ranked teams), Franklin has a passer rating of 152.68 and has completed 69.0% of his throws for 881 yards, 7 TDs and zero interceptions. He's also rushed for a team-high 349 yards and 5 TDs in that stretch, and is averaging 307.5 yards of total offense in those games...

## TIGERS, JAYHAWKS RESUME NATION'S 2ND-MOST PLAYED RIVALRY

With roots dating back all the way to the Civil War period in American history, Missourians and Kansans have always had a fierce rivalry in everything from football, to a fierce game of Donkey Kong in the neighborhood pub.

Not only is the rivalry a spirited one, but it has several other things going for it that makes it one of the best (and most underrated) in the country...

- — The MU-KU series is the 2nd-most played in the nation, with its 119 previous meetings. Only Minnesota and Wisconsin (121 meetings including their 2011 contest won by the Badgers) have played eachother more than MU and KU...

- — It is one of the most even rivalries around. Mizzou holds a narrow 56-54-9 edge in the previous 119 meetings. That makes the series one of the most closely-contested of the nation's top-23 most-played rivalries — those with 107 or more games played alltime...

- — And like all great fierce rivalries, it's complete with controversy. Many stories abound about the bad blood between the two programs throughout the years. While the two schools maintain diplomatic relationships, they don't even agree on the series results, as MU claims it leads at 56-54-9, while KU claims that it is tied at 55-55-9. The dispute goes back to the 1960 season, when unranked KU came to Columbia and upset undefeated and #1-ranked Mizzou, 23-7. The win was later forfeited by KU after the Big 8 Conference ruled that ineligible players took the field for the Jayhawks. Kansas counts the result on the field in their record books (and the NCAA also records it as 55-55-9), while MU counts the forfeit in its win column.

The loss remains as likely the most bitter in Tiger history, as it cost MU a chance at its only national championship, as the Tigers went on to finish 10-1 on the field (11-0 in the record books with the forfeit), and ranked 5th after defeating Navy in the 1961 Orange Bowl.

## MIZZOU-KANSAS SERIES HISTORY

As previously stated, MU and KU have the 2nd-most played rivalry in college football history, and this Saturday will mark the 120th meeting between the two heated rivals, with MU claiming it leads the historic series at 56-54-9.

Mizzou has won two straight, and four of the last five overall, including three of four games played in Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium since the series moved there in 2007.

Mizzou cruised to a 35-7 win over Kansas in 2010, marking MU's largest margin of victory over KU since claiming a 55-17 win in 1988. Blaine Gabbert led Mizzou on touchdown drives on its first two possessions, and the Tiger defense was stingy from the outset, as Mizzou led 21-0 at halftime. The Tigers allowed only 141 yards of total offense to Kansas, while Mizzou's offense was nicely balanced, with 218 rushing yards and 179 passing yards.

The 2009 edition saw one of the more exciting and dramatic games ever played in the storied series, as MU won a back-and-forth affair, getting a 27-yard Grant Ressel at the final gun to claim a 41-39 win. The Tigers trailed 14-3 at the end of the 1st quarter, and faced a 21-13 halftime deficit before rallying to take a 36-28 lead early in the 4th quarter. Kansas posted a rally of their own with 11 straight points, and the Jayhawks appeared on the verge of the upset win, as they held a 39-36 lead after a short field goal with just 5:10 to play. That probably loomed even larger when MU couldn't muster a drive and punted the ball back with three minutes left in the game. But the punt was downed inside the Jayhawk 5-yardline, and on 3rd down, Aldon Smith and Brian Coulter met in the endzone for

a sack and safety on Kansas QB Todd Reesing with 2:45 to play to pull MU to within 39-38. After the ensuing free kick, MU drove downfield, thanks to some key runs by TB Derrick Washington, and the Tigers drained the clock to set up Reesell for the game-winner with no time left.

Kansas claimed a 40-37 win in Arrowhead Stadium in 2008 that was a definite gut-kick for the Tigers, who came into the game as favorites. It was a game played in cold and snowy conditions, and after Kansas surged to a 19-7 first-half lead, the Tigers worked some comeback magic and eventually would hold leads of 30-26 and 37-33 in the 4th quarter, only to see the Jayhawks post two TD drives in the final five minutes of play. The last one was capped with a play that will likely burn in the memories of Tiger fans forever, as on 4th-and-7 from the MU 26-yardline with just :27 seconds to play, Reesing avoided pressure and floated a perfect pass to a streaking Kerry Meier in the endzone for a back-breaking TD that accounted for the final score. Mizzou drove furiously downfield in short time, but had to settle for a long field goal attempt, but Jeff Wolfert's 54-yarder at the gun was partially blocked, sending Mizzou home with the defeat to drop them to 9-3 on the season.

The year before left a decidedly different taste in the mouths of Tiger fans, as Mizzou won for the second straight year against Jayhawks in 2007, claiming a thrilling 36-28 win over KU at Arrowhead Stadium. Nicknamed "Armageddon at Arrowhead," the game featured 11-0 and 2nd-ranked Kansas against 10-1 and 3rd-ranked Mizzou, with #1 LSU having been upset the night before — meaning the winner would likely ascend to #1 in the polls and control the inside track to a spot in the BCS Title Game. Mizzou rode the arm of QB Chase Daniel to a 14-0 halftime lead, and that would eventually surge to a 21-0 Tiger lead in the 3rd quarter before Kansas could get untracked. Kansas would post an admirable comeback that pulled them to within 34-28 with 2:03 to play, but after Mizzou drove into KU territory on the ensuing possession before pinning the Jayhawks inside their own 5-yardline, the Tigers sealed the deal with a sack of Reesing in the endzone for a safety with just :12 seconds left to account for the final score of 36-28. The win gave MU its first-ever Big 12 North Division title, and two days later, when the polls came out, the Tigers were the #1 team in the land.

Tiger Coach Gary Pinkel stands 6-4 against Kansas in his 10 years at Mizzou. He won his first two contests against the Jayhawks, and that made him only the 3rd coach in Tiger history to win his first 2 games over Kansas.

The series returned to Kansas City, Mo., in what was initially a two-year agreement, as both schools agreed to move home games in 2007 and 2008 to Arrowhead Stadium, home of the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs. It was announced the week of the 2008 contest that both schools had reached an agreement, in conjunction with the Chiefs and the Kansas City Sports Commission, to extend the series in Kansas City another four years, through 2012.

Kansas City was the historical site of the MU-KU rivalry, as the city was the host of the 1st 16 games in the series, from 1891-1906, and has been now for 25 games overall. KU holds a 13-9-3 edge overall in games played in the series in Kansas City, and the 2007 game marked the first games played there since MU won in consecutive years in 1944 (28-0) and 1945 (33-12).

## MU-KU BASS DRUM UP FOR GRABS SATURDAY

Most every school has goofy trophies that they play rivals for each year, and Mizzou is no exception. MU and KU play annually for a bass drum. Here are details of the significance behind the drum...

**MU-KU BASS DRUM** — Issued to the winner of the Missouri-Kansas football game ... Originated in 1935 ... Trophy was originally conceived as an Indian War Drum in nature by a couple of Mizzou alumni, since Osage Indians roamed the plains of Kansas and Missouri long before the state universities were founded ... Original intent was to stimulate new interest in longtime series that had dwindled during the Depression of the '30s and MU's all-time low in football victories ... Supposedly authentic Indian drum was purchased in a Kansas City pawn shop, and new drum was acquired prior to 1986 game ... Autographed originally on both drum heads by KU and MU alumni ... Tradition was temporarily forgotten for a few years but resumed on an annual basis in 1947 ... The first game ended in a scoreless tie.

## SATURDAY IS WORTH MORE THAN A WIN ON THE GRIDIRON

Saturday's winner will not only take home the traditional bass drum trophy given to the winner of the rivalry game, but the school will earn 3 points in the M&I Bank MU-KU Border Showdown Series.

This marks the 10th year of the Border Showdown, which records the head-to-head results between MU and KU in all sports each season. Each competition is assigned a certain amount of points during the year, and the school that wins the most at the end wins a traveling trophy and bragging rights.

Entering Saturday's football game, Mizzou holds a 9.5-to-0 lead thus far in the 2011-12 series, as the Tigers have swept all competitions so far in volleyball (2 wins worth a total of 3.0 points), soccer (1 win, 3.0 points), men's cross country (higher finish at Big 12 Championships, 1.0 point), women's cross country (higher finish at Big 12 Championships, 1.0 point), and women's swimming and diving (1 win, 1.5 points).

In the previous nine years of the showdown, MU has won the series seven times, including the last five years. Mizzou has claimed yearly wins in 2002-03 (32.0-to-8.5), in 2004-05 (22.5-to-17.5), in 2006-07 (25.0-to-14.0), in 2007-08 (24.0-to-15.0), in 2008-09 (23.0-to-17.0), in 2009-10 (23.0-to-16.5), and again last year in 2010-11 (23.0-to-16.0), with KU claiming wins in 2003-04 (21.5-to-18.5) and in 2005-06 (22.0-to-17.0).



## LAST MEETING REWIND: #15 MIZZOU 35, KANSAS 7 (2010)

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Blaine Gabbert directed scoring drives on No. 15 Missouri's first two possessions and later scored on a 1-yard run himself, leading the Tigers to a 35-7 victory over Kansas in the 119th renewal of college football's second-oldest rivalry.

De'Vion Moore scored two touchdowns for the Tigers (10-2, 6-2 Big 12), who drew 117 yards in penalties in the always-passionate border showdown but still dominated their archrivals.

The Jayhawks (3-9, 1-7) ended a tough season in Turner Gill's first year as head coach and lost for the 16th time in their last 19 games after opening 2009 with five straight wins.

Missouri rolled up 397 yards of total offense while recording the fourth 10-win season in its 119-year history and giving coach Gary Pinkel his 150th career win. The Tigers will go into the bowl season with losses only to Nebraska and Texas Tech on back-to-back weekends.

On Missouri's first possession, Gabbert hit T.J. Moe for 16 yards and then got 19 yards on a quarterback keeper to help set up Moore's 3-yard touchdown run. Moore also capped Missouri's day with a 5-yard touchdown run with 2:56 to play following Carl Gettis' interception of Quin Mechem.

The Tigers, ranked first in the Big 12 in scoring defense and sacks, took down Kansas quarterbacks five times and held the Jayhawks to just 141 total yards.

That was the lowest total offense output against Mizzou by a conference opponent since 1980, when Kansas was held to 126 yards in a 55-7 Tiger win in the old Big Eight Conference days.

The Jayhawks finally got on the board after Bradley McDougald intercepted Gabbert's pass in the third quarter. Three times in the 13-play, 46-yard drive Webb converted third downs, including when he was forced out of the pocket on third-and 7 and scrambled 8 yards to the 3. James Sims scored on the next play, breaking a scoring shutout string of 100 minutes, 29 seconds for the Tiger defense, which was coming off a shutout performance the previous week at Iowa State (a 14-0 Mizzou win).

That made it 21-7, but the Tigers came right back. Moe caught a 6-yard pass from Gabbert on third-and-5, then got open on the next play for a 37-yard run-and-catch to the Kansas 15. Gabbert finished the drive with a TD on a 1-yard sneak on 3rd-and-goal.

Kansas' Jordan Webb was just 7 of 20 for 45 total yards. Gabbert was an efficient 16 of 26 for 179 yards.

## QUITE A DISCREPANCY BETWEEN 3RD AND 4TH QUARTER PRODUCTION FOR MU

There's a big emphasis put on finishing games strong in the Mizzou program, and the numbers show that the Tigers have done that well in 2011, as they have outscored opponents by a significant 133-52 margin in the 4th quarter. That's an average of 12.1 points scored in the 4th quarter for Mizzou. As noted previously the Tigers have posted a pair of 4th-quarter wins after rallying from double-digit deficits in the final 15 minutes, including last Saturday's 31-27 win over Texas Tech after trailing 27-17 entering the 4th quarter.

On the flip side, 3rd quarter scoring has been troublesome for the Tigers, as they've managed only 37 points all season in the 3rd period (3.4 pts./game), including just 24 total in 8 Big 12 Conference games (3.0 pts./game). Third-quarter dry spells in league play turned a manageable 24-14 halftime deficit at Oklahoma into a 31-14 deficit at the end of 3 quarters; a 10-3 halftime deficit at Kansas State into a 17-3 deficit; a 24-17 halftime deficit vs. Oklahoma State into a 38-17 deficit; and a 14-13 halftime lead at Baylor into a 28-14 deficit.

Putting it another way, in MU's 4 Big 12 losses, it has been outscored in the 3rd quarter by a 43-0 margin. In its 4 Big 12 wins to this point, MU has outscored opponents by a 24-12 margin.

Last Saturday versus Texas Tech saw Mizzou score its first touchdown in the 3rd quarter since Oct. 15th. Trailing 20-10 after Tech opened the half with a field goal, the Tigers marched 70 yards for a TD, on a James Franklin-to-Michael Egnew 5-yard TD pass with 4:43 left in the quarter to pull to within 20-17. That would be the only time Mizzou would touch the ball in the quarter, as the Red Raiders played keep away.

The week prior against Texas, the Tigers scored their first points in the 3rd quarter since Oct. 15th, with a field goal by Trey Barrow to extend the lead to 17-3. They didn't take full advantage of the opportunity presented, however,

as Mizou blocked a Longhorn punt and took over with a 1st-and-goal from the 1-yardline. Three runs netted minus-one yard, however, and the Tigers had to take the three points. Mizou's defense did its part to maintain the lead, as the only points scored in the 2nd half by UT came on a 3rd-quarter blocked punt that went out of the endzone for a safety.

It's not like the Tigers have been getting stonewalled by opposing defenses in the 3rd quarter, they simply haven't capitalized on opportunities. In 12 3rd-quarter possessions in conference losses only, only 4 have ended in 3-and-out punts, and 6 of them have ended on the opponents' side of the field.

The 12 drives have ended in the following ways: 6 punts, 2 missed FGs, 2 fumbles, 1 interception and 1 on downs.

## 2011 SENIOR CLASS STANDS 4TH CURRENTLY ON SCHOOL TOP-FIVE WINS LIST

Mizou's sizeable 2011 senior class has been around for some outstanding moments in the program's history, as detailed above. Even though MU's 6-5 record entering the final week of the regular season isn't what the group had in mind back in August, it still has a chance to make its mark on the Tiger history books.

This senior class has already been part of one of the winningest four-year periods of time in Mizou football history, as their 34 wins from 2008-present stand as the 4th-best mark ever. The 2010 class was part of a record 40 wins in its four years (2007-10), a record in which this year's senior class certainly had a large role in contributing to.

What's more, if the Tigers can reach a bowl game in 2011, this class would become only the 5th in MU history to play in four bowl games in a 4-year span. The only previous classes to achieve that feat were the 1981 senior class, followed by the last three classes to matriculate (2008, 2009, 2010). Here's a look at the most prolific senior classes at Mizou, in terms of wins in a four-year period.

## MIZZOU HAS PLAYED 4TH-TOUGHEST SCHEDULE SO FAR, PER THE NCAA

According to the NCAA statistics, Mizou has played the nation's 4th-toughest schedule so far, in terms of opponent winning percentage (through games of Nov. 19th). The combined record of the 5 teams Mizou has lost to is 40-13.

Four of Mizou's 5 losses on the season have come at the hands of ranked opponents, with three of them coming on the road (at #23 Arizona State [37-30 in OT]; at then-#1 Oklahoma [38-28]; and at then-#20 Kansas State [24-17]), in addition to a 45-24 home loss to then-#6 Oklahoma State. The Tigers were able to get over the hump and defeat the 5th ranked team they've gone up against — #16 Texas A&M in College Station (38-31 in OT), and followed up with a win over #21 Texas (17-5 in Columbia).

## FRANKLIN TURNING IN AN IMPRESSIVE SEASON IN 1ST YEAR AS STARTER

Sophomore QB James Franklin might not have come with the hype of his predecessors Chase Daniel or Blaine Gabbert, but he's quietly putting together an outstanding season in his first year as a starter. With a plethora of star QBs in the Big 12 Conference, Franklin won't make 1st-Team All-Conference, but he's certainly positioned himself for big things in the future.

He's coming off a clutch performance against Texas Tech that saw him lead the Tigers to a 31-27 win, thanks to a 14-point 4th-quarter rally that erased a 27-17 deficit starting the final period of play. Franklin threw and ran for two TDs each on the day (including one each in the 4th quarter rally) to account for all 4 MU TDs in the game, and he ended with a career-high 152 yards rushing and added 171 yards passing on 13-of-20 passing.

In crunch time, Franklin was at his best against Tech, as he completed 5-of-8 passes in the 4th quarter for 85 yards and 1 TD, while he ran 9 times for 76 yards and the game-winning score with 2:22 left.

Franklin, who has helped guide the Tigers to wins over two ranked teams this season (at #16 Texas A&M and over #21 Texas) ranks 14th in the NCAA in total offense, averaging 304.27 yards per game. He's got the Tiger offense ranked 11th nationally in total offense heading into Saturday's game with Kansas (483.45 avg.), and he enters the Kansas game with a string of 116 consecutive passes without an interception since his last one on Oct. 22nd against Oklahoma State.

Franklin has been responsible for 31 TDs so far in 2011 (18 passing, 13 rushing) — a figure which is already 6th-best in MU single-season history (see chart on page 15 sidebar).

Recently Franklin, playing in his homestate of Texas, was our choice for Mizzou offensive player of the week in MU's thrilling 38-31 overtime win at Texas A&M. Here's a recap of his exploits...

• — Franklin led a dramatic comeback win in a hostile environment, as the Tigers overcame a 28-17 4th-quarter deficit to pull out a 38-31 overtime win at 16th-ranked Texas A&M (the 2nd-largest 4th-quarter deficit overcome to win in Tiger history). Franklin, who accounted for 4 TDs on the day, tossed a clutch 11-yard TD pass in overtime on 3rd down that proved to be the winning points. That capped an outstanding day for the sophomore, as he finished with 295 yards of total offense, including 16-of-24 passing for 198 yards and 2 TDs (42 yards, 11 yards) and 97 yards rushing and 2 more TDs (20 yards, 8 yards). His 20-yard TD run to open scoring in the 1st quarter was featured as the #2 play on SportsCenter that Saturday night and Sunday morning, as he scrambled to the sideline with no open receivers, and broke the tackles of at least three Aggies to get to paydirt...

## MAKING SOME QB COMPARISONS

After winning 10 games 3 times in the last 4 seasons, expectations coming into the 2011 season were understandably very high for the Missouri Tigers. While Mizzou stands at 6-5 overall, it's important to keep in perspective that it features a 1st-year starting quarterback in true sophomore James Franklin. While each of MU's previous 3 quarterbacks are now playing in the NFL, it is interesting to take a look at comparisons of Franklin to the likes of Brad Smith, Chase Daniel and Blaine Gabbert, in terms of how they fared in their first 11 starts.

Here's the rundown:

The stats really are pretty similar, even when comparing the wins, as Daniel and Gabbert both stood one game better in the win column to this point in the year. Smith finished the 2002 season with a 5-7 record, Daniel finished the 2006 season with an 8-5 record, and Gabbert finished the 2009 season with an 8-5 record.

Franklin has been responsible for 31 TDs through 11 games, which is the most of the group. He's also the only one of the group to guide the Tigers to a win over a ranked team (winning each of his last 2 against ranked foes) in his first year as a starter. Were it not for a missed field goal at the end of regulation, Franklin would stand 3-3 against ranked opponents.

One more interesting thing to note when looking at the numbers above for the 1st 11 career starts, is the strength of schedule. While we don't have access to the opponents' schedule strength rankings from each year to date, one way to assess that is the number of ranked teams each QB went against.

## HAMILTON GETS 2ND "SAVE" OF THE YEAR, DESERVES ALL-BIG 12 ACCLAIM

Defensive tackles often toil in virtual anonymity in the trenches, but Mizzou's senior DT Dominique Hamilton has been anything but anonymous in 2011, as he's putting together an all-star caliber type of season.

Hamilton leads all Big 12 interior linemen with 52 tackles on the season, and while a "save" isn't a football statistic, we're going to borrow from the game of baseball to give Big Dom credit for a pair of saves in 2011, as he has single-handedly (literally) made a pair of plays to preserve dramatic Tiger wins. He deflected passes that ended games against both Texas Tech and Texas A&M, with one creating a game-winning interception, and the other ending an overtime drive on 4th down for the win.

The last "save" came this past Saturday at home against Texas Tech. With MU having rallied from a 10-point 4th-quarter deficit to take a 31-27 lead with 2:22 left in the game, the Red Raiders drove downfield and stood in prime position with a 1st-and-10 at the Tiger 11-yardline with under a minute to play and three timeouts left. After Tech QB Seth Doege completed a pass for 4 yards to reach the Tiger 7-yardline with :37 seconds left, he next tried a pass over the middle. Hamilton got a push at the line, and got his mitt up in the passing lane to deflect the ball. It hung in the air for around 4 1/2 minutes (approximately) and finally nestled into the loving arms of Tiger DE Michael Sam, who made the interception at the MU 4-yardline with :32 seconds left. Mizzou ran out the clock and claimed the dramatic 31-27 win to reach bowl eligibility.

Hamilton's first "save" came on Oct. 29th at 16th-ranked Texas A&M, when the Tigers similarly rallied from an 11-point 4th-quarter deficit to force overtime. After Mizzou scored a TD on the initial possession of overtime for a 38-31 lead, the Aggies tried to answer, but eventually faced a 4th-and-5 at the Mizzou 20-yardline. Hamilton foiled A&M's plans when he batted down Ryan Tannehill's pass attempt over the middle to end the game.

Hamilton was on his way to a standout junior season in 2010, but he suffered a broken foot early in game #7 against Oklahoma, ending his season early.

## LAWRENCE STARS WITH FIRST 100-YARD DAY TO KEY WIN OVER TEXAS

Junior TB Kendial Lawrence began the year as MU's #1 tailback coming out of fall camp, as he was clearly the Tigers' most productive back in two-a-days. After a tough opener against Miami (Ohio) when he was held to just 10 yards on 9 carries, Lawrence suffered a broken bone in his leg in practice prior to the 2nd game of the year at Arizona State. He missed the next three games recovering and had his first action back at Kansas State (6 carries, 5 yards).

The emergence of Henry Josey as the Big 12's most productive running back could have deterred Lawrence, but he was determined to get back to help his team, and he did just that and then some against #21 Texas when he subbed for an injured Josey and ran for a career-high 106 yards and 1 touchdown to key Mizzou's 17-5 win.

Lawrence went for his first career 100-yard game against a Longhorn defense which entered the game with the nation's 9th-ranked rushing defense, allowing just 94.88 yards per game. He carried a career-high 18 times on the day, and his 35-yard touchdown in the 2nd quarter staked MU to a 14-3 lead. He also caught a pass for a 20-yard gain on the day. His previous career best rushing game was a 96-yard outing in 2010 at Texas Tech.

Last Saturday against Texas Tech, Lawrence just missed a 2nd-straight 100-yard day, as he went for 94 yards on 15 carries (6.3 average).

He enters Saturday's game against the Jayhawks with 395 rushing yards and 3 TDs on the season.

## JACQUES SMITH MAKING A PUSH FOR ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS

Senior DE Jacques Smith for All-Big 12 honors, you say? We say yes, and here's why.

- Smith leads the Big 12 in forced fumbles, with an average of 0.44 per game, and his 4 total forced fumbles is tied for most in the league this season...

- Entering Saturday's game against Kansas, Smith stands 6th in QB sacks (0.56 per game average), and he ranks 8th in the league in TFLs with his 1.00 average per game. Keep in mind that Smith suffered a dislocated elbow in the season opener against Miami (Ohio), and he was forced to miss the next two games. The injury definitely hampered him for awhile upon his return, and his numbers didn't jump off the page, but now that he's healthy he's playing at the level he expected to when he was a pre-season 1st-Team All-Big 12 pick by many outlets...

- Smith had only 3 tackles versus Texas, but he was his disruptive self as he contributed to Mizzou's huge defensive effort with 2.0 TFLs and 1 QB sack, plus a forced fumble and a pass break up...

- Smith got a sack and forced fumble to end one Texas drive, and later nearly got another in the 4th quarter, but the Longhorn QB was ruled to have started his arm coming forward before the ball came out...

## GAINES 3RD IN NCAA WITH 16 PASSES DEFENDED - HAVING ALL-BIG 12 TYPE OF YEAR

Sophomore CB E.J. Gaines is in his first year as a starter, and he's quickly developing into an outstanding cover man who leads the Big 12 Conference, and ranks 3rd in the NCAA with 18 passes defended (16 PBUs, and 2 INTs). His 16 pass break ups this season has broken the Mizzou single-season record (see accompanying chart), and he surpassed the previous mark of 15 last Saturday with a pair of break ups against Texas Tech.

The youngster has really stepped up to the challenge the last month, as he's come up with 12 pass break ups in games against Texas Tech (2 PBUs), Texas (2 PBUs), Baylor (1 PBU), Texas A&M (4 PBUs), Oklahoma State (3 PBUs, plus an INT). He has also moved up to 4th on the squad with 66 tackles.

Gaines was front and center in Mizzou's 17-5 upset over #21 Texas, as he contributed with 2 pass break ups, to go with 6 tackles as the Tigers held UT to a season-lows of 247 yards and 5 points.

Gaines had a 7-tackle, 1-PBU night at Baylor, and prior to that won Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week honors for his 10-tackle outing at Texas A&M, and his play in the 2nd half was indicative of the improved results of his unit, as the Tiger defense held the high-powered Aggie offense to just a field goal after halftime. Gaines had 3 of his pass break ups in the 2nd half. He became the first Mizzou cornerback to win the weekly conference award since R.J. Jones in 2002.

He's at his most exciting with the ball in his hands, however. Against OSU he showed just how exciting, as he broke two long returns, nearly taking them both for touchdowns that could have changed the complexion of the game.

His first came late in the 3rd quarter, with MU trailing by 14 points and with the defense's back against the wall. Oklahoma State faced a 3rd-and-4 at the Mizzou 5-yardline. A TD by the Cowboys would have been a back-breaker, but Gaines saw to it that that wouldn't happen. He made a great read and jumped the route thrown by OSU's Brandon Weeden, intercepting the ball five yards deep near the right sideline of the endzone. Most of the time, people take a knee, but Gaines saw a chance to make something happen, and he did that as he made several moves to elude would-be tacklers inside the 20. He eventually took it back 54 yards the other way to set the Tigers up in plus territory, needing perhaps just one more downfield block that would have sprung him.

Later, in the 4th quarter, Gaines also came up big in the return game. Inserted as MU's new primary punt returner prior to the Iowa State game, Gaines raced the other way 33 yards with 6:09 left to put the Tigers, who trailed by just 14 points at the time, on the Oklahoma State 35-yardline. A score there would have cut the deficit to a touchdown, but it wasn't to be as MU was intercepted on a batted ball on the next snap.

Those plays weren't the first big ones Gaines has made this season. He took a punt return back 44 yards for a score against Western Illinois (when he was the backup return man), and in the season opener, he made another interception in the Tiger endzone to thwart a scoring opportunity by Miami (Ohio).

In 9 punt returns, Gaines is averaging a solid 10.9 yards per attempt.

## BIG 12'S LEADING RUSHER HENRY JOSEY LOST TO KNEE INJURY

Mizzou's big win two weeks ago over #21 Texas was exciting on many levels for Tiger fans, but it also came in the midst of a big injury setback for sophomore TB Henry Josey, who just the day before the game had been named a semifinalist for the 2011 Doak Walker Award. Josey, who led the Big 12 Conference, and ranked 5th nationally in rushing (127.67 avg. coming into the UT game), was tackled in the 3rd quarter, and went down in pain as his left leg got caught awkwardly underneath him.

Unfortunately for the Angleton, Texas native, he sustained a torn patellar tendon, along with tears in his anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) and medial collateral ligament (MCL), injuries which obviously will sideline him for the remainder of the 2011 season. Josey had surgery the next morning to begin the repair process, and Mizzou team physicians and trainers are confident that he will be able to return to full strength down the road. The exact timetable for his return is unknown currently, but he ends his season with the 5th-best rushing total in MU history (1,168 yards, 9 TDs, 8.1 avg. per carry).

# MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

## PINKEL HAS THIRD-MOST WINS IN MIZZOU HISTORY

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 11th season at MU (21st overall as a head coach) and touts a career record of 156-91-3 (63.0%).

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 61-29 (67.8%) over the past 7 seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2010, has an 11-year record in Columbia of 83-54 (60.6%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has gone 55-24 in his last 79 games overall (69.6%). MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 83. The win over Kansas in 2010 was the 150th of his career.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

In 2007, Pinkel guided the Tigers from unranked in the pre-season to a team which won a school-record 12 games and a final ranking of #4 in the Associated Press Top-25. Mizzou ascended to #1 in the BCS rankings following the regular season, and stood just one half away from playing in the BCS National Championship Game (before Oklahoma pulled away from a halftime tie to win the Big 12 title game). For his efforts in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was also named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007, and his 7 bowl games is an MU record.

Pinkel has directed Mizzou to 7 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 12-2 in 2007, 10-4 in 2008, 8-5 in 2009 and 10-3 in 2010), with those representing 7 of MU's 9 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

The Big 12 North Division titles won by Mizzou in 2007, 2008 and 2010 represent the only football conference titles of any kind Mizzou has won since 1969 — the last time it claimed a share of the old Big Eight Conference crown. In April of 2011, Pinkel agreed to a two-year contract extension, meaning he'll patrol the Tiger sidelines through the 2017 season.

## MIZZOU IS NCAA'S ALLTIME OVERTIME KING

If it seems like Mizzou has been involved in a lot of overtime games, well, you're not crazy, because the Tigers have played in as many OT games as any school since the rule was put in place for the 1995 bowl season.

The Tigers have now played 2 overtime affairs in 2011, and after its thrilling comeback 38-31 OT win at #16 Texas A&M on Oct. 29th, Mizzou stands 1-1 on the year in overtime games. Coupled with Mizzou's Sept. 9 OT game at Arizona State (won by the Sun Devils, 37-30), Mizzou has now played 14 overtime games, which is most in NCAA history, through games of Nov. 19th. Schools next on the list with 13 overtime games include Fresno State (5-8), North Carolina State (8-5), Texas A&M (7-6), Pittsburgh (6-7), SMU (3-10) and Syracuse (7-6).

More importantly, when Mizzou goes to overtime, more often than not it comes out on the winning side. Mizzou owns 10 OT wins alltime, which is the most in FBS history entering this weekend (tied with Tennessee, who is 10-2 alltime). The Tigers had won five straight OT games until the recent defeat at Arizona State.

Interestingly, MU Head Coach Gary Pinkel is credited with winning the very first overtime game ever played in Division I history, when his Toledo Rockets beat Nevada, 40-37, in the 1995 Las Vegas Bowl. The overtime rule was put into effect for that bowl season, and has been in use ever since.

Pinkel is now 9-2 alltime in his career in overtime games, including 7-2 at Mizzou.

## CLEANING UP THE PENALTIES OF LATE

Gary Pinkel has always prided himself on his teams playing with focus and pride, characteristics which have historically led to his squads being among the least penalized in the Big 12 Conference — MU ranked among the top-30 in fewest penalties for 4 straight seasons from 2006-09 (see chart below).

The 2010 squad went down to 68th nationally in the category, and that troubling trend continued early on in 2011, as through the first 5 games, Mizzou was averaging a whopping 8.60 flags and 71.20 penalty yards per game, which ranked the Tigers in the bottom 20 in the country.

If the next 2 weeks were any indication, Pinkel's Tigers have cleaned up those mistakes, because they were been whistled a combined 1 time for 11 yards in consecutive games against Iowa State and Oklahoma State. In Mizzou's big win at #16 Texas A&M, the Tigers were clean through 3 quarters, with only 2 penalties for 15 yards, before getting called on 3 penalties in the 4th quarter, but they still ended with 5 penalties for 45 yards on the day.

In the last 6 weeks, Mizzou has jumped all the way up to 57th in the national team rankings for fewest penalties, with their current average of 5.64 penalties and 47.18 penalty yards per game. In the last 6 games, Mizzou has committed only 19 penalties total for 163 yards, averages of just 3.17 penalties and 27.17 yards per game.

The Tigers were whistled just 3 times for 20 yards in their win over #21 Texas and followed with a 4-penalty for 30-yard day in its comeback win over Texas Tech last Saturday.

Mizzou opened the year with a 9-penalty, 81-yard effort in its opener against Miami (Ohio), and then saw 11 flags come its way for 114 crucial yards that played a big role in a 37-30 overtime loss at #23 Arizona State in week two. Here's a look at MU's penalty history in the recent past:

## HEY MOE! TIGER T.J. MOVES INTO MU CAREER RECEPTIONS TOP-10

Junior WR T.J. Moe emerged in 2010 as one of the most consistent and dependable play-makers in the Big 12 Conference, as he led the Tigers in receiving (92 receptions, 1,045 yards, 6 TDs). His numbers are down slightly from last season as the Tigers have been more balanced with a Big 12-best run game, but Moe still stands as MU's most productive receiver on the year, as he enters Saturday's game against Kansas with 51 receptions for 629 yards and 4 TDs — all team-high totals.

He was held last Saturday against Texas Tech to a season-low 2 catches for 8 yards, but he also got involved in the run game by carrying twice for 11 yards. He also averaged 25.75 yards on 4 kickoff returns to help the cause.

The Tigers were held to just 186 passing yards against #21 Texas two weeks ago, but Moe still played a big role, as he led the way with game-high totals of 5 catches for 74 yards. His 40-yard catch-and-run down the seam in the 2nd quarter was a crucial play on 3rd down which set up the Tigers' first score of the day.

Moe was limited to 3 catches for 31 yards in the previous outing at Baylor, but he did contribute with a 17-yard TD in the 4th quarter as the Tigers tried to rally late. He was held in check the week prior at #16 Texas A&M, but he still contributed with 4 catches for 38 yards. His 17-yarder with :20 seconds left in regulation was a key play that helped set up a potential game-winning FG.

Prior to that, Moe had a 6-catch, 103-yard, 1 TD outing against #6 Oklahoma State. His TD catch came from 34 yards out with 2:03 left before halftime, and it was a key play that closed the Tigers to within 24-17 at the time. The former record-setting high school quarterback also dusted his arm off the shelf and got his first collegiate completion, as he threw a 31-yard pass on a throw-back pass to QB James Franklin.

With 145 career receptions (1,682 yards, 10 TDs), Moe has now cracked into the Mizzou career top-10 list for receptions. He stands 8th on the list entering Saturday's game, and he's only 26 yards out of the school's career top-10 list for receiving yardage.

The big day vs. OSU was Moe's 2nd 100-yard outing of the season. His first was a breakout performance, and

he got just that at top-ranked Oklahoma a few weeks ago.

Moe had a big game at OU, as he hauled in 7 James Franklin passes for a season-best 119 yards. It marked the first 100-yard receiving game of the year for any Tiger, and it was the 4th 100-yard receiving game of Moe's career. Moe had 3 receptions at Oklahoma of 20 yards or more, going for gains of 32, 29 and 21 on the night. He leads Mizzou with 10 catches on the year of 20 yards or more so far.

That was a nice sign for the Tiger offense, as Moe entered the OU game as MU's leading receiver, but with numbers that were smaller than what Mizzou fans had grown accustomed to seeing. He began the year with a 6-catch, 56-yard outing against Miami (Ohio) and followed with 6 catches for 48 yards at Arizona State, and added 4 catches for 68 yards and 1 TD against Western Illinois in a little over one half of play.

## TIGER OFFENSE AS BALANCED AS THEY COME

Since going to the spread offensive attack prior to the 2005 season, the Tigers have built a reputation for having one of the more potent passing games in the country. Through 11 games in 2011 however, it would be difficult to find a more balanced offense through than Mizzou's, as the Tigers have totaled 2,664 yards rushing and 2,654 yards passing.

The emergence of sophomore TB Henry Josey (1st in Big 12, 14th in NCAA in rushing, averaging 116.80 ypg) had served as a nice complement to sophomore QB James Franklin, who ranks 14th in the NCAA in total offense so far, averaging 304.27 yards per game (232.1 passing yards). They had been arguably among the best 1-2 rush/pass combinations in the country, prior to Josey being lost for the remainder of the 2011 season with a knee injury suffered in MU's win over Texas.

Mizzou's scores have been pretty balanced, with 26 rushing TDs to go with 19 passing TDs thus far.

## MORE ON BALANCE OF THINGS - MU 1 OF 3 TO AVG. 240 RUSH/240 PASS

Most observers thought that the Tiger offense, despite returning 9 starters from last year, might take awhile to find itself, given the fact that it was being led in 2011 by a first-time starter in sophomore QB James Franklin. Add to the mix the fact that three-year starting LT Elvis Fisher was lost for the entire season due to a ruptured patellar tendon in his left leg in training camp, and outside expectations for Mizzou's offense were very tempered heading into the season.

After a slow start offensively in the season-opening 17-9 win over Miami (Ohio), where the Tigers had just 291 yards of total offense, MU has been improved. Since that game, Mizzou has averaged an impressive 502.70 yards of total offense, including 501 at #23 Arizona State, a school-record 744 against Western Illinois, and 532 more at #1 Oklahoma (the most-ever by Mizzou at Oklahoma) for a big 3-game stretch. The Tigers were held to 338 total yards vs. #21 Texas, but much of that had to do with the fact that the offensive game plan changed to ball control and clock burn due to MU holding a two-score lead, combined with a stifling defensive effort by the Mizzou defenders.

After being held to a 326-yard day in a loss at #20 Kansas State, the offense bounced back with a 583-yard outing in a blowout win over Iowa State, and followed with yardage totals of 463 vs. #6 Oklahoma State, 482 at #16 Texas A&M and 578 yards in a losing effort at Baylor.

Again, we will humbly submit that through 11 games, Mizzou's offense has been arguably one of the most balanced in the nation. Here's a look at the top rushing schools so far, and how they also throw the ball. Of note is the fact that Mizzou is one of only 3 teams so far to average both 240 yards passing and 240 yards rushing (Nevada and Northern Illinois are the others, see chart below). Here's the numbers: (w/per game average and NCAA ranking in parentheses):

## 16 TIGERS EARN ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12 HONORS

Sixteen members of the Mizzou football team were named last week to the 2011 Academic All-Big 12 football team. Mizzou was one of four schools with 10 or more student-athletes to make the listings.

Mizzou had two of the league's six student-athletes to make the team with perfect 4.00 grade point averages — senior TB De'Vion Moore and redshirt freshman Matt Hoch.

First team members consist of those who have maintained a 3.20 or better GPA while the second team selections hold a 3.00 to 3.19 GPA.

To qualify, student-athletes must maintain a 3.00 GPA or higher either cumulative or the two previous semesters and must have participated in 60 percent of their team's scheduled contests. Freshmen and transfers are not eligible in their first year of academic residence. Senior student-athletes who have participated for a minimum of two years and meet all the criteria except percent of participation are also eligible.

Mizzou's honorees include:

## TIGERS HANG TOUGH, 2 OF 3 LARGEST 4TH-QUARTER COMEBACK WINS IN MU HISTORY

After getting out to leads of 7-0 and 14-7 at 16th-ranked Texas A&M on Oct. 29th, the Missouri Tigers went cold during the second quarter, as the offense stalled with 3-and-outs on its first two possessions, while Texas A&M rolled to four straight touchdowns and a 28-14 lead. A late drive ended in a Trey Barrow 26-yard field right before halftime (his first collegiate kick ever, as he was subbing for the injured Grant Ressel) to cut the deficit to 28-17.

After a scoreless 3rd quarter, the Tigers were in serious need of a big play to jump start a comeback attempt. Sophomore CB Randy Ponder, a former preferred walk-on who is now on scholarship, gave them just that when he intercepted A&M's Ryan Tannehill at the Mizzou 25-yardline and returned it 45 yards the other way to the Aggie 30-yardline. Three plays later, QB James Franklin scored from 8 yards out and suddenly the Tigers were back in the game, trailing just 28-24 with 10:50 to play.

Mizzou's defense seized the momentum and held for a 3-and-out, and on the first play when MU took over on its 21-yardline, Josey burst off right tackle for 43 yards to the Aggie 36-yardline. That set up Josey's own 11-yard TD run with 7:38 left that brought Mizzou all the way back to a 31-28 lead. Even though the Aggies would go on to tie the game on a field goal and send it to overtime, the Tigers came out on top, thanks to a beautifully-executed 3rd-down fade pass in overtime from Franklin to WR Marcus Lucas for an 11-yard TD that accounted for the final score. Senior DT Dominique Hamilton secured the win when he batted down a Tannehill pass attempt on 4th down in overtime, to preserve the 38-31 win.

The comeback from an 11-point 4th-quarter deficit was the 2nd-largest in MU history, trailing only a 13-point deficit overcome in 1949 against Nebraska. As chronicled earlier in these notes, the Tigers also posted a win last Saturday against Texas Tech that ranks as tied for the 3rd-largest 4th-quarter comeback win in school history.

## JOSEY TURNED IN AN ALL-STAR SEASON, 1ST IN BIG 12, 9TH IN NCAA RUSHING

Prior to the bad break endured two weeks ago with his season-ending knee injury, sophomore TB Henry Josey had squarely put himself into the mix as one of the top story lines in the Big 12 Conference in 2011, and he was also making a serious push for national honors, beyond the league.

The unassuming and baby-faced youngster began the season as Mizzou's 3rd-string tailback, but because of injuries to others, he jumped into the lead back role in game number two, and kept a stranglehold on the spot with his stellar play.

Josey's season ended late in the third quarter against Texas when his left leg got caught underneath him awkwardly while being spun around on a tackle. He sustained tears in his patellar tendon, his ACL and his MCL and had surgery the next day to begin the repair process. There's no timetable for his return, but Mizzou physicians and trainers are confident he'll make a full recovery.

When Josey went down, he had been held to just 19 yards on 11 carries against a stingy Texas run defense. Even with those numbers, he ended his season with the 5th-most prolific rushing season in Mizzou history, with 1,168 yards, to go with 9 touchdowns.

Josey is still the Big 12's leading rusher, and the 14th-ranked runner in the NCAA, averaging 116.80 yards per game. Prior to Texas, he had 4-straight 100-yard rushing games, and 6 100-yard outings in his previous 7 outings. He had a 132-yard, 2-TD night at Baylor, and previously had a 162-yard, 1-TD effort in MU's 38-31 overtime win

at #16 Texas A&M. The Aggies entered the game with the 5th-ranked rushing defense in the nation (allowing just 79.86 yards per game, but Josey gashed them for 8.1 yards per carry on 20 tries. His 43-yard burst in the 4th quarter set up his own 11-yard TD run with 7:38 left in regulation that gave Mizzou a 31-28 lead after trailing 28-14.

Prior to that, Josey had a 138-yard outing in defeat to #6 Oklahoma State. He carried a career-high 25 times against the Cowboys and averaged 5.5 yards an attempt.

What makes Josey's story so interesting is that he entered the season third on the depth chart in what was considered by most to be MU's deepest position. However, injuries to senior TB De'Vion Moore and junior TB Kendial Lawrence, combined with losing sophomore TB Marcus Murphy for the season with a shoulder injury that occurred prior to the start of fall camp, and all of a sudden, he became a one-man show of sorts.

Josey had a 129-yard performance the week prior in MU's 52-17 Homecoming win over Iowa State. He carried 19 times against the Cyclones (a career-high at the time), and had 1 rushing TD while averaging 6.8 yards per attempt.

A few more tidbits on Josey's exploits...

- — Josey rushed for a game-high 133 yards and 1 TD (on a 48-yard scamper in the 4th quarter) to help the Tigers to a 241-yard output on the ground at top-ranked Oklahoma on Sept. 24th. Josey did his damage against an OU defense that came into the game ranked 20th in the NCAA against the run, allowing just 78.00 yards per game to opponents...

- — Josey became MU's primary back early in the season, as Lawrence (who began the year with the starting role) went down with a cracked fibula in practice the week of the Arizona State game, while Moore started at ASU but suffered a high ankle sprain on the first play of the night. Josey came off the bench and was impressive against the Sun Devils, as he had 145 yards from scrimmage (94 rushing on 9 carries / 51 receiving on 2 receptions)...

- — The week after that, Josey was thrust into the starting role for the first time this season against Western Illinois (he started one time in relief in 2010), Josey looked to make the most of his new-found opportunity. And did he ever do just that.

In a performance for the record books, Josey played only one half before retiring for the night, but not before he blistered Western Illinois for 263 rushing yards and 3 TDs (6, 21, 68) on just 14 carries — good for a rather salty per-carry average of 18.8 yards. It was the 4th-highest single-game rushing total in MU history.

Moreover, Josey's yardage is the 3rd-highest single-game output in the NCAA through games of Nov. 19th.

## TIGERS FENCE IN LONGHORNS, TAKE 17-5 WIN TO REACH .500

One week after being touched for 697 yards of offense by Baylor in a disappointing 42-39 road loss, very few outside of the Tiger program would have expected the Mizzou defense to lead the charge the next week against #21 Texas — a team that Mizzou hadn't beaten since 1997.

But that's exactly what took place, as the Tiger defense dedicated itself during the week to clean up its mistakes, and the end result was a defensive masterpiece. Texas managed only 247 yards of offense on the day (with 78 of them coming on their game-opening drive), including just 76 yards rushing for a ground game which came into last Saturday ranked as the Big 12's top rushing attack (11th nationally, averaging 246.38 yards per game).

Mizzou's offense was held in check most of the day by a stout Longhorn defense, but it contributed enough to help the Tigers grab a 14-3 halftime lead, then it used a ball-control style of play in the 2nd half — MU held the ball for 17:42 in possession time after half — to coast to the win (Mizzou's 2nd of the year over a ranked opponent).

The Tigers took the opening kick and took just six plays to move into the redzone. On 2nd-and-2 from the Texas 8-yardline, however, WR L'Damian Washington was stripped after a reception, and the Longhorns recovered. Texas put together an impressive drive the other direction — giving the game early appearances of being an offensive showdown — but the Tiger defense stiffened and forced a short field goal for a 3-0 Texas lead.

After the teams traded punts back and forth, Mizzou mustered an impressive drive, going from its 17-yardline to the Longhorn 2-yardline, where QB James Franklin scored on 3rd-and-goal on a QB keeper with 8:46 left in the first half to give MU the lead, 7-3. After the Tiger defense forced a 3-and-out, the offense responded again. TB Kendial Lawrence took a nifty-looking option play 35 yards for a TD with 4:43 left to make it 14-3, and that's how it stood at half.

Just to hold a halftime lead against Texas was a big deal for the Tigers. Mizzou hadn't held a halftime lead over Texas since 1997, and the aggregate score at halftime of the last two games was 70-10 in favor of Texas (Longhorns led 35-3 at half in Austin in 2008 and led 35-7 at half in Columbia in 2009).

In the 3rd quarter, both teams blocked punts which led to points for both sides. Mizzou struck first when TE Eric Waters got loose to block a Texas punt near the Texas 15-yardline. The ball rolled backward toward the endzone,

# MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

## **MIZZOU ALSO TOPS IN THE CLASSROOM IN THE BIG 12**

The 2010 season was quite a year for the Missouri Tiger Football program, as Mizzou claimed its third Big 12 Conference North Division title in the last four years, thanks to the school's third 10-win season in four seasons.

In the off-season, a pair of Tiger standouts became top-10 NFL Draft picks, when sophomore DE Aldon Smith was taken seventh overall by the San Francisco 49ers, and he was followed shortly by junior QB Blaine Gabbert, who was the number 10 pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

The latest bit of great news came down from the NCAA in May, as Mizzou's Football team won a league championship in the classroom, as the Tigers' team Academic Progress Rate of 967 was tops in the Big 12 Conference.

Thirteen Tiger football players recently earned their degrees from Mizzou, including five (Terry Dennis, Elvis Fisher, Trey Hobson, Grant Ressel and Austin Wuebblers) who will take part in 2011 as graduate students.

where MU's Matt Hoch fell on the ball inside the 1-yardline. Three rushes netted a loss of one yard for Mizzou, however, and the Tigers settled for a 19-yard Trey Barrow field goal and a 17-3 lead. The Longhorns later bottled Mizzou's offense up inside its own end, and blocked a Barrow punt attempt near the goalline. A heads up play by Barrow, who pushed a Texas player out of the endzone before he could corral the ball, kept the damage to a safety, which made it 17-5 with 3:31 left in the 3rd quarter.

On Texas' ensuing drive, the Longhorns reached the Tiger 35-yardline, but Mizzou's defense held and forced a 53-yard field goal attempt, which was missed to preserve the 17-5 margin just before the start of the 4th quarter. Mizzou went to a ball control offense in the final period and ate up 9:58 in possession time to keep the Longhorns at bay and preserve the win which got them back to an even .500 on the season.

It was MU's first win over Texas under Head Coach Gary Pinkel, and it marked Mizzou's first win over UT overall since 1997.

## **DEFENSE DISPLAYS AMAZING TURNAROUND IN LEADING THE CHARGE**

As noted above, Mizzou's defense was the story in the Tigers' 17-5 win over #21 Texas. Here's a few bits of tid from the effort:

- — Mizzou allowed just 247 yards on the day — a season low for the Longhorn offense, which came into the game averaging 437.13 yards per game (ranked 32nd coming in). What's more is that effort came just seven days after the Tigers got touched for 697 yards of offense at Baylor in a 42-39 loss. That's exactly 430 yards less of offense Mizzou gave up from one week to the next!...

- — Texas came into the game leading the Big 12 Conference, and ranking 11th nationally in rushing, averaging 246.38 yards per game. In the two weeks prior to Saturday, Texas ran for a combined 880 yards and 11 touchdowns against Texas Tech and Kansas. The Tiger defense held the Longhorns to a mere 76 yards rushing — UT's 2nd-lowest rushing total of the season, and a whopping 364 yards below what they had averaged over the previous two games...

- — Texas got 78 yards on its first series of the game, when it drove for a field goal and a 3-0 lead. That drive took 12 plays, for an average of 6.5 yards per snap. The rest of the game saw Texas muster just 169 more yards of offense on 53 snaps, meaning Mizzou allowed only an average of 3.2 yards per play after the opening drive...

- — Texas came into the game ranked 28th in the nation in scoring offense, with a per-game average of 34.38 points. Mizzou held them out of the endzone for the first time in series history since a 3-0 Tiger win in 1916, and it was the first time overall for Texas to go without a touchdown since the 2004 season...

## **LATE RALLY FALLS SHORT AT BAYLOR**

After notching a dramatic comeback win at 16th-ranked Texas A&M two weeks ago — thanks to the 2nd-largest 4th-quarter comeback in school history (trailed by 11 pts. entering the 4th quarter) — Mizzou looked to continue the momentum last Saturday at Baylor. Things got off to a good start, as the Tigers took a 14-7 lead late in the 2nd quarter, thanks to two short TD runs by TB Henry Josey (6 yards, 2 yards). Up to that point, the Tiger defense had held the high-powered Bear offense in relative check, but that would change in a hurry, as Baylor would score 28 of the game's next 31 points, to jump out to a 35-17 lead midway through the 4th quarter.

Mizzou would mount a big rally, as it 3 TDs in the final 7:05 of the game to pull to within 42-39 with 1:59 remaining, but the comeback hopes were ended when the Bears recovered MU's final inside kick attempt, and ran out the clock.

A turning point in the game came right before halftime, when Baylor drove in the closing seconds to the Tiger 1-yardline. A stop on 3rd-and-goal just short of the goalline set up a 4th-down gamble with :06 seconds left, and Baylor QB Robert Griffin III was ruled to have scored on a QB sneak with four-tenths of a second left, even though MU defenders were adamant that he never crossed the line. The play was reviewed by replay officials, but with the scrum of bodies, it was impossible to overrule the call on the field, and the TD stood to make it 14-13. The Tigers' Dominique Hamilton blocked the ensuing extra point to preserve a 14-13 halftime lead, but the TD definitely seemed to turn the tide.

Baylor opened the 2nd half by taking the opening possession for a TD and a 21-14 lead, and Mizzou's offense went dormant in the 3rd quarter, losing the ball on downs, a punt, and a fumble, while the Bears capitalized to take a 28-14 lead. A Trey Barrow field goal early in the 4th cut the deficit to 28-17 (the exact margin overcome the previous week at College Station), but then the Bears broke out their big-play offense, striking for a 68-yard TD pass and an 80-yard TD run on consecutive drives to hold the Tigers at bay.

Mizzou got a 24-yard TD pass from QB James Franklin to WR Marcus Lucas with 7:05 left to cut the deficit to 35-25, only to see the Bears respond with the long TD run on the first play to make it 42-25. The Tigers wouldn't go down quietly though, and answered with a Franklin-to-T.J. Moe TD pass of 17 yards, followed by a Franklin-to-L'Damian Washington TD strike of 15 yards with 1:59 left to account for the final margin.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - James Franklin's gut reaction: He flunked his first career start.

"Umm, I probably failed this test today," Franklin said after No. 21 Missouri's tougher than expected 17-6 victory over stubborn Miami, Ohio. "I'd say, eh, around a D, maybe."

As the sophomore quarterback kept talking, he eased up on himself. Although his interception led to Miami of Ohio's lone score, he did run for one score and passed for the clinching touchdown.

"I just think a win's a win and it's something I have to learn to enjoy," Franklin said. "There's things that I'm worried about and things that I'm focused on that I didn't do so well. I'll give it a C-minus, being positive."

Franklin was 17 for 26 for 129 yards. That was often a half-game under the three quarterbacks who preceded him at Missouri - Blaine Gabbert, Chase Daniel and Brad Smith - all of whom are in the NFL. Coach Gary Pinkel noted that Franklin made some nice throws in the second half, and said there was plenty of room for improvement.

"You grow from adversity," Pinkel said. "You don't like going through it, but you grow from it."

E.J. Gaines had an end zone interception for the Tigers, who whipped the RedHawks by 38 points in their final pre-Big 12 tuneup last season but had their struggles on both sides of the ball in 90-degree heat. Three of their first four possessions ended quickly with punts for an offense that averaged 30 points last season, and Miami moved the ball with some success.

Gaines' pickoff halted a 67-yard drive near the end of the first half with Missouri up 10-0.

"The momentum shift stuns you," first-year Miami coach Don Treadwell said.

"Kind of like a boxer, you get that uppercut but you don't go down."

Missouri hurt itself with 81 yards on nine penalties, and has a short week ahead with the next game Friday night at Arizona State.

Miami recovered from a 51-13 spanking at Missouri last fall to win the Mid-American Conference, and entered the opener with a six-game winning streak. The RedHawks gave Missouri a scare, trailing 10-6 after Erik Finklea's 10-yard run late in the third quarter.

Missouri, which had been around a 20-point favorite, answered on the first play of the fourth quarter. Marcus Lucas' 10-yard catch was his first college touchdown and in his first start as the fill-in for injured Jerrell Jackson.

Dayonne Nunley's interception and 5-yard return of Franklin's overthrown pass gave Miami possession at the Missouri 19 and set up Finklea's score.

Down by 11, Miami ran out of downs at the Missouri 30 midway through the fourth quarter. Dominique Hamilton recovered quarterback Dysert's fumble with 1:49 left.

Two Missouri defensive players left with injuries. Linebacker Will Ebner sustained a high left ankle sprain in the first quarter, which could sideline him for a month, and end Jacques Smith has a dislocated left elbow that'll keep him out for at least one game.

Franklin's 5-yard run up the middle capped a 76-yard drive late in the first quarter.

The RedHawks struggled on the kicking game, with Mason Krysinski wide left on a 41-yard field goal attempt in the first half and the extra point kick partially blocked after Finklea's score. It was the first game for Krysinski, a sophomore.

TEMPE, ARIZ. — It was one of the most anticipated games of the college football weekend, and the Mizzou-Arizona State game lived up to its billing, as the 23rd-ranked Sun Devils bested the 19th-ranked Tigers 37-30 in overtime before a sellout crowd and a Friday-night national television audience in Tempe, Ariz.

Mizzou might have lost the game, but it walked off the field with its collective heads held high, thanks to an impressive 4th-quarter rally that forced overtime, and nearly won the game in regulation.

Trailing 30-16 with 14 minutes left in the game, the Tigers dug in on both sides of the ball. Forced to punt the ball away with 13 minutes left, Mizzou pounced on a fumbled punt by ASU (Kenronte Walker recovered the muff at the ASU 32-yardline). Three plays later, QB James Franklin floated a beauty of a pass over the middle to sophomore WR L'Damian Washington for a 25-yard TD (Washington's 1st career TD) to cut the deficit in half with 12:00 to play.

The Tiger defense held on its next series and forced a Sun Devil punt. The offense took over on its own 42-yardline with 8:19 left, needing another TD to tie the game. It got just that, as Franklin calmly led an 11-play, 58-yard drive in front of the frenzied sellout crowd at Sun Devil Stadium. He capped the drive with a 4th-and-goal TD pass of 3 yards to All-American TE Michael Egnew, and with 2:50 to play, the Tigers had tied the game at 30-30.

After ASU returned the ensuing kickoff to its own 40-yardline, the Sun Devils appeared to be in prime position to drive for a game-winning field goal. But the Tiger defense bowed its backs again and forced a 3-and-out, getting the ball back one more time for the offense. On the first play, from his own 8-yardline, TB Henry Josey burst around the left end for 39 yards to take the ball near midfield, and all of a sudden, Mizzou was in business.

Three plays later, the Tigers were at the ASU 30-yardline, looking for a few more yards to get reliable PK Grant Ressel a chance at a game-winning field goal. Two passes fell incomplete, however, and Ressel had to stand over a 48-yard attempt with :17 seconds left. After trying to induce the Sun Devils to jump offsides unsuccessfully, Ressel got the kick away and it was plenty long, but it hooked just wide left to send the game into overtime.

In the extra period, ASU took the ball first and converted a big 3rd-and-7 on the way to a touchdown and a 37-30 lead. It was only the 3rd 3rd-down conversion of the game for the Sun Devils. Needing a TD to answer, the Tiger offense was stymied in its overtime possession, and a 4th-and-5 desperation pass by Franklin into the endzone fell incomplete, sending Mizzou to its first September loss since 2005 (breaking a string of 22-straight September wins).

As the score might indicate, it was a night for the offenses, as the teams combined for 993 yards of total offense, with Mizzou going for 501 and ASU 492.

Franklin was a star in just his second career start, as he amassed 403 yards of total offense, including 319 yards in the air and 2 touchdowns, to go with 84 rushing yards and the 1 score.

After senior TB De'Vion Moore was injured and lost for the game on the first series of the night, Josey came off the bench and gave the running game a spark, as he had 94 yards on just 9 carries.

Penalties were rampant on both sides of the ball, as the teams combined for 23 penalties and 224 penalty yards.

Despite converting on only 3-of-15 3rd downs, Mizzou still managed 501 yards of offense and held a time of possession advantage of 32:43-to-27:17.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - Henry Josey rushed for three touchdowns and 263 yards in just one half of play, while James Franklin threw for three scores as Missouri overwhelmed Western Illinois 69-0.

Missouri (2-1) set a school record with 744 yards of offense and tied a school record for most points scored while holding Western Illinois (1-2) to just one first down and 44 total yards. That outburst broke the previous record of 665 yards against Kansas in 1949, and the 700-yard difference in total offense shattered the previous school record difference of 489 yards, when Mizzou beat Bowling Green 37-0 in Columbia in 1998, thanks to an edge in total offense of 545-to-56.

The Tigers built a 42-0 halftime lead against the overmatched Leathernecks of the Football Championship Subdivision. Josey scored on rushes of 6, 21 and 68 yards, breaking his career high of 112 yards in the first quarter. He didn't play in the second half, missing a chance to top Devin West's school-record 319 yards against Kansas in 1998.

Wes Kemp caught two TDs for Missouri, including a 37-yarder on a 4th-and-3 to cap Mizzou's first drive of the night. Backup QB Jimmy Costello even got into the act, as he threw his first career touchdown in fourth-quarter duty, on a 54-yard catch-and-run by WR Jimmie Hunt (it was also Hunt's first career score).

Western Illinois quarterback Josh Hudson was just 4 for 15 for 20 yards with one interception for the Missouri Valley Conference school. He was sacked four times and harassed all night by a Missouri defense that only had one sack in an overtime road loss last week against Arizona State.

Bryce Flowers led Western Illinois with 28 yards rushing on 14 carries. He replaced starter Caulton Ray, who was suspended before the game for an unspecified violation of team rules. First-string left tackle Enock Presendieu was

also suspended.

Franklin was 18 for 25 for 246 yards for Missouri, playing just two series in the second half before coach Gary Pinkel summoned Costello and later Ashton Glaser. Franklin threw touchdowns of 10 and 37 yards to Kemp and 30 yards to T.J. Moe.

Jared Culver had 11 carries for 86 yards and one touchdown in relief of Josey, with Greg White adding 10 carries for 36 yards. Josey carried the ball just 14 times, an average of nearly 19 yards per carry. He started his first game of the season after injuries to De'Vion Moore and Kendial Lawrence.

E.J. Gaines returned a punt 44 yards for a touchdown with under five minutes left in the game to cap the scoring on MU's record-setting night.

Missouri's 69 points matched a mark set against Kansas in 1969 and tied against Nevada in 2008. The Tigers' 69-point victory margin topped the previous record of 60 points versus Centre (Ky.) 83 years ago.

Missouri opens Big 12 Conference play next week with a visit to Norman and top-ranked Oklahoma. The Tigers upset the Sooners 36-27 last year in Columbia.

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) - After leading the Sooners at the end of the first quarter, the Tigers fell to top-ranked Oklahoma 38-28 on Saturday night.

The Tigers (2-2, 0-1 Big 12) pounced early to take a 14-3 first-quarter lead, breaking a streak of 20 straight home games in which Oklahoma (3-0, 1-0) never trailed. It didn't last though, as the Sooners roared back with 28 straight points to avenge a loss in Columbia last year when they were first in the BCS standings and move their home winning streak to 38 straight games.

Mizzou rolled up 532 yards of total offense, the most ever by a Tiger team in Norman. James Franklin threw for 291 yards and a touchdown, and ran 103 yards and 2 scores, playing on the same field where his father, Willie, starred for OU in the 1970s. Henry Josey continued his impressive stretch as he gashed the Sooner defense for 133 yards and a touchdown on the ground. All of those fireworks weren't enough, however, to negate a Sooner attack that rolled up 592 yards of its own.

Oklahoma's Landry Jones threw for 448 yards and three touchdowns to Ryan Broyles to lead the Sooner charge that overcame Mizzou's impressive start.

Missouri also had a hot start in last season's upset, returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown, but then was able to close strong with 16 straight fourth-quarter points for a 36-27 victory.

This time, the Sooners were able to prevent any late heroics by the Tigers.

Henry Josey took an option pitch and raced 48 yards down the left sideline for a score to make it 31-21 with 6:44 left in the game, and it could have been even closer if not for a pair of missed 46-yard field goals by Grant Ressel.

The Sooners eliminated any drama by answering immediately with a 62-yard scoring drive, capped by Broyles' twisting 4-yard grab in the back of the end

zone. Broyles finished with 13 receptions for 154 yards, helping Jones to his fifth career 400-yard passing game.

Broyles got Oklahoma's rally started by scoring from 25 yards out on a throw that initially went through his arms. Broyles was able to cradle it along his leg and then secure it long enough before falling out of bounds that the touchdown call was upheld on review.

He followed that three drives later with a 4-yard TD catch in the right side of the end zone, and the Sooners never looked back.

Dominique Whaley added 150 total yards—82 on five catches and 68 on 16 rushes—and Jaz Reynolds contributed a career-high 93 yards receiving on five catches.

James Franklin scored on a 1-yard sneak and found L'Damian Washington open with a seam up the middle for a 45-yard touchdown pass to stake Missouri to an 14-3 lead. Only Texas Tech in 2006 had a larger lead at Oklahoma during its home winning streak, and Baylor had been the only opponent to hold a lead in Norman since Mizzou led by one in the fourth quarter in its last visit in 2007.

But after completing his first five passes, Franklin—the son of former Sooners tight end Willie Franklin—misfired on 15 of his next 19 attempts and finished with 291 yards on 16 for 33. He also had another 1-yard TD sneak with 32 seconds left to provide the final margin.

Michael Egnew, the Tigers' All-American tight end, didn't make his first catch until his team was down 17 in the fourth quarter. He ended up with two catches for 40 yards.

Missouri lost its 18th straight game on Owen Field, with its last win coming in 1966.

MANHATTAN, Kan. – A pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns closed Mizzou to within one score of 20th-ranked Kansas State, but it was too little, too late for the Tigers, who fell to 2-3 overall and 0-2 in Big 12 Conference play following a disappointing 24-17 loss.

After three quarters of missed opportunities and crucial mistakes which gave the Wildcats at least 14 of their 24 points, the Tigers roared back late with short touchdown runs of 2 yards by TB Henry Josey with 8:12 left and 1 yard by QB James Franklin with 5:02 left to close to within seven points.

Needing one more stop by its defense to have a chance at tying the game, the Tigers couldn't get the ball back, as K-State managed a pair of 3rd-down conversions which allowed them to run out the clock and preserve the victory to improve to 5-0 and 2-0.

Two of K-State's touchdowns were gift-wrapped by Mizzou mistakes. The first came on the very first play of the day, when Franklin threw into double coverage down the left seam, right into the waiting arms of Wildcat defensive back Ty Zimmerman. Zimmerman intercepted the ball at the Mizzou 36-yardline and returned it 15 yards to set the Wildcats up deep in MU territory. The interception ended a stretch of 108 consecutive passes without an interception by Franklin.

It took Kansas State six plays to punch it into the end zone for a quick 7-0 lead.

Franklin was sacked for a 13-yard loss on Missouri's ensuing possession, and the Wildcats converted a 3rd-and-10 which keyed them to a 51-yard drive that ended in Anthony Cantele's field goal which made it 10-0.

By the time the first quarter drew to a close, the Tigers had exactly zero yards of total offense - 20 yards through the air and minus-20 on the ground.

"They just dropped back and they told us, 'Hey, we're going to make you guys have to make plays,'" Franklin said, "and we just made a bunch of mistakes and they capitalized on that."

Josey finally got things rolling for Missouri in the second quarter, using his quick feet to spring for a couple of long runs. But a false start inside the 10-yard line on second down pushed the Tigers back and they had to settle for Grant Ressel's 32-yard field goal to cut the deficit to 10-3.

Ressel had a chance to get Missouri within 10-6 at the break, but he pushed a 43-yard attempt wide right on the final play of the half as rain started to fall.

The Wildcats' only big mistake all game happened early in the third quarter, when Klein was picked off by Kip Edwards on the 2nd snap of the half. But their defense held and Ressel's 36-yard field goal attempt was wide left.

That ended a frustrating stretch of possessions for the Tiger offense that saw consecutive drives reach the Kansas State 9-yardline, the KSU 27, the KSU 24 and the KSU 17 – only to convert those opportunities into a mere 3 points.

Even with the missed chances, the Tigers still trailed only 10-3 after the last missed field goal, and their defense appeared to get the ball back to their offensive counterparts after stopping K-State on a 3-and-out. However, Mizzou cost itself when Darvin Ruise was called for roughing the punter, giving Kansas State the ball back. The Wildcats took full advantage of the second chance, and marched downfield for a back-breaking touchdown which made it 17-3 with 5:50 left in the third quarter.

K-State would win the field position battle over the next couple of series, and after backing MU up deep in its own territory, a 26-yard punt return led to a short touchdown drive of 36 yards early in the 4th for a 24-3 advantage. That set up Mizzou's late attempt at a rally, which came up one score short.

Mizzou won most every statistical battle on paper, but the missed opportunities and mistakes, combined with the Wildcats' ball control offense which held the ball for 38:28 proved too much to overcome.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - James Franklin accounted for five touchdowns and Henry Josey had 129 yards rushing and a score as Missouri routed Iowa State 52-17 in its 100th homecoming game.

Michael Egnew, T.J. Moe and Wes Kemp each had a scoring reception for Missouri (3-3, 1-2 Big 12), which scored on its first four possessions. Much of a sellout crowd of 71,004 had dispersed by the end of the Tigers' 10th straight victory at home, and their first game at Faurot Field in a month.

It was the most lopsided setback of the year for Iowa State (3-3, 0-3). A.J. Klein's 78-yard interception return for a touchdown was the lone highlight for the Cyclones, who have been outscored 54-10 in the first quarter.

Iowa State's James White was held to 61 yards on 14 carries a week after getting a career-best 148 yards against Baylor.

White had 10 yards on 10 carries in the first three quarters.

Missouri had no penalty yardage in its fifth straight victory in the series. Linebacker Luke Lambert had two fumble recoveries.

After scoring on the first four drives for a 28-3 cushion, the Tigers turned it over in the passing game the next three times but were hurt only by Klein's third career touchdown. The Tigers had 298 yards rushing one week after managing just 112 yards in a loss at No. 17 Kansas State.

Missouri defensive tackle Terrell Resonno injured his right knee in the first half and did not return. The 295-pound senior has started all 14 games the last two seasons and had 15 tackles and a sack in the first five games.

Franklin was 20 for 28 for 289 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for 84 yards on 11 carries with two touchdowns. Josey had 129 yards on 19 carries for his third 100-yard game of the year and scored in the fifth straight game.

Missouri opened the game with 10 straight runs, including Franklin's 1-yard sneak with 12:03 to go in the first quarter for its fastest first touchdown of the year.

The Tigers' second score came quickly, too, after Steele Jantz fumbled on an option run and Lambert recovered at the Iowa State 38, setting up a 2-yard run by Josey.

Egnew had six catches for 105 yards. He split the defense and had an easy route to the end zone the last 20 yards on a 39-yard catch, the longest of the tight end's career, to make it 21-3 late in the first.

The Cyclones lost by 23 points in each of their first two Big 12 games.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - Four second-half turnovers by Missouri wiped out any chance of an upset win for the Tigers, as Oklahoma State converted those miscues into 21 points to provide the exact margin of victory in a 45-24 win in Columbia.

OSU's Joseph Randle scored four touchdowns, two on runs that capitalized on big defensive plays by Shaun Lewis, as the No. 6 Cowboys remained unbeaten and ended Missouri's 10-game home winning streak.

Henry Josey had 138 yards on 25 carries and T.J. Moe had six catches for 103 yards and a score for Missouri (3-4, 1-3), but it wasn't enough to overcome the four turnovers. Even with the mistakes, the Tigers trailed by just two scores midway through the 4th quarter, but interceptions on consecutive possessions (one on a batted ball at the line of scrimmage) proved too costly.

Randle had 138 yards on 14 carries and scored on runs of 16, 59 and 12 yards. He also caught a 13-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter.

Brandon Weeden had three touchdown passes after the opening snap of the second quarter. Lewis' interception and fumble recovery helped the Cowboys (7-0, 4-0 Big 12) pull away despite injuries to both starting wide receivers.

Justin Blackmon caught a touchdown pass in the first quarter before hurting his right shoulder. Hubert Anyiam was wearing a boot on his left foot in the second half.

The Tigers had a strong second quarter, scoring on an 18-yard run by Kendial Lawrence and Moe's 34-yard catch from James Franklin to cut the deficit to seven, before being undone by mistakes. Franklin threw two interceptions and lost a fumble at the Oklahoma State 4, all in the second half.

Lewis intercepted a tipped pass at the Missouri 27 and three plays later Randle scored on a 16-yard run for a two-touchdown cushion midway through the third quarter to extend the Cowboy lead to 31-17.

Missouri appeared to regain momentum when E.J. Gaines intercepted Weeden in the end zone and returned it 54 yards, also ending Weeden's string of 194 consecu-

tive passes without a pick. The Tigers drove quickly inside the Cowboy 10-yardline, and appeared poised to make it a one-score game, but after a faked handoff, Franklin was hit by a crashing Lewis before he could securely tuck the ball away. The ball popped out and was picked up by Lewis.

Franklin's lost fumble gave the Cowboys possession at the 12, and again they needed just three plays to respond with Randle's 59-yard jaunt making it 38-17.

Weeden was 33 for 49 for 338 yards after a sizzling start. The 28-year-old senior was 19 for 25 for 214 yards in the first quarter, with all six incompletions on drops.

Michael Harrison was wide open on a 27-yard catch and Blackmon caught an 8-yarder for his 28th receiving touchdown in 19 games. On the first play of the second quarter, Oklahoma State went up 21-3 on Weeden's 13-yard TD pass to Randle.

A trick play produced Missouri's best play of the quarter, with Franklin throwing a lateral pass to Moe and then getting it back for a 31-yard gain to the 13. But the Tigers stalled, settling for a short field goal by Grant Ressel.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Missouri quarterback James Franklin made up for a rough outing last week against Oklahoma State, as he threw for two touchdown passes, including the game-winner in overtime, and running for two more scores to lead the Tigers to a 38-31 win over No. 16 Texas A&M.

The winning score came on an 11-yard throw to Marcus Lucas in overtime, and the Tiger defense secured the win on A&M's ensuing possession when Dominique Hamilton batted down a Ryan Tannehill pass on fourth down.

"There was nothing easy about it," Missouri coach Gary Pinkel said of the win. "These kind of games you just have to fight and fight. A lot of players did a lot of good things in critical situations and I'm very proud of them."

The Tigers had a chance to win it in regulation, but a 46-yard field goal attempt sailed wide right as time expired by punter Trey Barrow, who was forced into all kicking duties, as regular place kicker Grant Ressel was out with a hip flexor strain.

Missouri (4-4, 2-3 Big 12) got the ball when Jacquies Smith caused a fumble by Tannehill, which was recovered by Dominique Hamilton.

The Aggies led by 11 at halftime, but Missouri took a 31-28 lead on an 11-yard run by Henry Josey with about eight minutes left. Texas A&M (5-3, 3-2) tied it on a 35-yard field goal about four minutes later.

Franklin threw for 198 yards and ran for 97 yards. Josey, the Big 12's leading rusher, had 20 carries for 162 yards.

It was the fifth 100-yard game for Josey and his second in a row.

Missouri took its first lead of the second half on the 11-yard touchdown run by Josey. To get that drive going, Josey bounced to the outside and dashed down the sideline for 43 yards before being dragged down from behind.

The Tigers went for it on fourth-and-1 from the Texas A&M 43 early in the fourth quarter and Franklin's run was short. Missouri made up for it when Tannehill was hit on the arm by Brad Madison as he threw a pass which was intercepted by Randy Ponder.

Ponder returned it 45 yards and Franklin cut A&M's lead to 28-24 when he scored on an 8-yard run three plays later.

Pinkel was proud of his team's defensive improvement in the second half.

"We got out of drives. I think we were a little bit more aggressive in the secondary," he said. "We got a lot of balls batted down, we got some turnovers and we forced fourth down punts."

Tannehill threw for three touchdowns in the first half, but the Aggies managed only a field goal after that to lose their third game this season after leading by double digits at halftime.

Both teams lost fumbles in the third quarter. Texas A&M's Ryan Swope fumbled after a catch, but Missouri gave it back three plays later when Josey coughed it up. The Aggies didn't capitalize on that error and neither team scored in the quarter.

Tannehill hit Cyrus Gray on a short pass and he ran into the corner of the end zone for a 12-yard touchdown to tie the game at 14 early in the second quarter. Missouri's offense stalled on the next drive and they had to punt. The punt was shanked and it went just 22 yards, giving A&M the ball at the Missouri 41.

The Aggies took advantage of the short field when Tannehill found Swope for a 6-yard touchdown pass take a 21-14 lead in the second quarter.

Texas A&M pushed its advantage to 28-14 when Tannehill scored on a 3-yard touchdown run with about three minutes left in the second quarter.

The Tigers had a first down from the Texas A&M 11 late in the second quarter, but the offense stalled and they settled for a 26-yard field goal to make it 28-17 at halftime.

Franklin broke four tackles on a nifty 20-yard run third-and-1 to give Missouri a 7-0 lead on the team's second drive of the game.

Tannehill's first touchdown pass was a 2-yard strike to Michael Lamothe that tied it at 7-all later in the first quarter.

Eric Waters caught a pass from Franklin and two Texas A&M defenders missed tackles as he dashed 42 yards for a touchdown to put Missouri back on top 14-7 with two seconds left in the first quarter.

WACO, TEXAS — After notching a dramatic comeback win at 16th-ranked Texas A&M two weeks ago — thanks to the 2nd-largest 4th-quarter comeback in school history (trailed by 11 pts. entering the 4th quarter) — Mizzou looked to continue the momentum at Baylor. Things got off to a good start, as the Tigers took a 14-7 lead late in the 2nd quarter, thanks to two short TD runs by TB Henry Josey (6 yards, 2 yards).

Up to that point, the Tiger defense had held the high-powered Bear offense in relative check, but that would change in a hurry, as Baylor would score 28 of the game's next 31 points, to jump out to a 35-17 lead midway through the 4th quarter.

Mizzou would mount a big rally, as it 3 TDs in the final 7:05 of the game to pull to within 42-39 with 1:59 remaining, but the comeback hopes were ended when the Bears recovered MU's final onside kick attempt, and ran out the clock.

A turning point in the game came right before halftime, when Baylor drove in the closing seconds to the Tiger 1-yardline. A stop on 3rd-and-goal just short of the goalline set up a 4th-down gamble with :06 seconds left, and Baylor QB Robert Griffin III was ruled to have scored on a QB sneak with four-tenths of a second left, even though MU defenders were adamant that he never crossed the line. The play was reviewed by replay officials, but with the scrum of bodies, it was impossible to overrule the call on the field, and the TD stood to make it 14-13. The Tigers' Dominique Hamilton blocked the ensuing extra point to preserve a 14-13 halftime lead, but the TD definitely seemed to turn the tide.

Baylor opened the 2nd half by taking the opening possession for a TD and a 21-14 lead, and Mizzou's offense went dormant in the 3rd quarter, losing the ball on downs, a punt, and a fumble, while the Bears capitalized to take a 28-14 lead. A Trey Barrow field goal early in the 4th cut the deficit to 28-17 (the exact

margin overcome the previous week at College Station), but then the Bears broke out their big-play offense, striking for a 68-yard TD pass and an 80-yard TD run on consecutive drives to hold the Tigers at bay.

Mizzou got a 24-yard TD pass from QB James Franklin to WR Marcus Lucas with 7:05 left to cut the deficit to 35-25, only to see the Bears respond with the long TD run on the first play to make it 42-25. The Tigers wouldn't go down quietly though, and answered with a Franklin-to-T.J. Moe TD pass of 17 yards, followed by a Franklin-to-L'Damian Washington TD strike of 15 yards with 1:59 left to account for the final margin.

Mizzou eventually put up 578 yards of offense on the night (including 253 rushing and 325 passing), but it wasn't enough to overcome a 697-yard output by Baylor (291 rushing, 406 passing).

James Franklin compiled 382 yards of total offense and threw for three 4th-quarter touchdowns to lead the Tiger rally. Franklin completed 20-of-27 passes in the 4th quarter for 219 yards.

Josey managed his 4th-straight 100-yard rushing game, as he went for 132 yards and the pair of 1st-half touchdowns. Michael Egnew led the way in the passing game with 12 receptions for 69 yards, while WR Marcus Lucas caught 4 passes for a team-best 80 yards and a touchdown.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - In the final Big 12 meeting, Gary Pinkel got the best of Texas.

Missouri's coach didn't seem all that euphoric about ending the school's six-game losing streak in the series and knocking off the only conference school he hadn't beaten heading into next year's move to the SEC.

The Tigers likely lost the conference's leading rusher for the rest of the year.

"I don't think off that field, 'Gosh, I finally beat Texas!'" Pinkel said after Missouri's 17-5 upset of the No. 21 Longhorns on Saturday. "I don't do that.

"This game, I don't care who it is, this gives us a chance to have a really good season and accomplish some goals."

Kendial Lawrence topped 100 yards with a touchdown in relief of Henry Josey and a defense burned for 697 yards at Baylor a week earlier kept No. 21 Texas out of the end zone for the first time since 2004. Missouri won for only the second time in the last 17 times in the series.

Pinkel said Josey was undergoing an MRI exam but didn't expect positive news. Coming off four straight games with 125 or more rushing yards, Josey was held to 19 yards on 11 carries.

"I feel really bad for Henry," Pinkel said. "Whatever happens, if he has to have surgery or whatever, we've got the best people taking care of him and we'll get him back 100 percent."

Missouri upset a ranked team for the second time this season after beating Texas A&M on Oct. 29. The Tigers finish against Texas Tech, whipped 66-6 by Oklahoma State on Saturday, and Kansas in search of a seventh straight bowl bid.

"We're still fighting for our bowl lives," defensive end Jacquies Smith said. "It doesn't mean any more just because it's Texas."

James Franklin completed his first 10 passes and ran for a 2-yard score for the

Tigers (5-5, 3-4), who beat Texas for the first time since 1997. Lawrence had 106 yards on 18 carries with a 35-yard score in the second quarter.

"Once you get consistent carries, you get the feel of the game easier," Lawrence said. "You've just got to go when your chance comes and make it happen."

Texas (6-3, 3-3) entered with injury concerns at running back and was held to 76 yards rushing in only its third road game of the year. Missouri allowed only a chip-shot field goal for the game's first score and a safety off a blocked punt in the third quarter.

The previous two weeks at home, Texas whipped Kansas and Texas Tech by a combined 95-20 and topped 400 yards rushing in both games. Leading rusher Malcolm Brown (toe) and Joe Bergeron (hamstring) got no carries and the depth chart got leaner after Fozzy Whitaker left with an apparent right knee injury while making a cut in the first quarter.

Lawrence, who won the tailback job in fall drills but was shelved for three games early in the season by a broken fibula, stepped up with 79 yards on eight carries and a TD before intermission.

Missouri controlled play in the half even after fumbling away a scoring chance on its first drive when Emmanuel Acho stripped L'Damian Washington after a reception and Texas recovered at its own 12.

Franklin scored his 11th rushing touchdown on a 2-yard keeper to put Missouri ahead and Lawrence's 35-yard run made it 14-3 with 4:43 to go in the half.

Thanks to the defense, Missouri was able to sit on its lead most of the second half.

Eric Waters' blocked punt set up Missouri at the 1 for its first score in the third quarter in four games, though the Tigers had to settle for a 19-yard field goal by Trey Barrow that made it 17-3.

Less than four minutes later, Leroy Scott's blocked punt out of the end zone gave Texas two points.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - James Franklin accounted for four touchdowns and got the go-ahead score on a 9-yard run with 2:22 remaining as Missouri rallied past Texas Tech 31-27 on Saturday night.

Franklin rushed for a career-best 152 yards with two touchdowns to help the Tigers (6-5, 4-4 Big 12) overcome Henry Josey's season-ending knee injury last week. He was 13 for 20 for 172 yards and two more touchdowns, including a 7-yarder to Marcus Lucas earlier in the fourth that cut Texas Tech's lead to three.

Texas Tech threatened late, driving to the Missouri 6, before Dominique Hamilton tipped a pass from Seth Doege and Michael Sam intercepted at the 4.

Doege threw for one touchdown and ran for another for Texas Tech (5-6, 2-6), which has lost four in a row and must beat Baylor next week to become bowl eligible for the 12th straight season.

Missouri trailed entering the fourth quarter for the seventh time, and won for the second time under those circumstances.

A week after trailing 49-0 at halftime in a 66-6 loss to Oklahoma State, Texas Tech started fast, playing with the wind on a gusty day, and led 17-10 at the break, fueled by touchdowns on two of the first three possessions - a 1-yard run by Bradley Marquez out of the wildcat formation and Doege's 3-yard run. It was only the third time Tech had led at the break all season.

Michael Egnew's first touchdown catch in five games came on a leaping grab in the back of the end zone to cut Missouri's deficit to 20-17 with 4:43 to go in the third quarter. It was the first touchdown in the third quarter in five games for the Tigers, who have totaled 40 points in that quarter all year.

Texas Tech went up 10 again on Darrin Moore's 24-yard catch from Doege with one second left in the third that made it 27-17.

The wind was such a factor early that Texas Tech called a timeout to force

Missouri to punt into it. The move was foiled when Trey Barrow got a very favorable roll on a 68-yarder into the end zone.

Missouri lost a scoring chance in the first quarter when Kendial Lawrence got stripped by Cornelius Douglas at the Red Raiders 6-yard line and fumbled the ball out of the end zone.

Moore's 54-yard run to the 6 topped his season total of 39 yards the first 10 games and set up a 5-yard run by Franklin that capped a 10-play, 90-yard drive, the Tigers' longest of the year.

Missouri cornerback E.J. Gaines had two pass breakups for a season total of 16, breaking the single-season school record set by Michael Harden in 2002.
