TIGERS SEND SIX TO NATIONALS

The Missouri wrestling team will send six grapplers to the 80th annual NCAA Wrestling Championships held in the Qwest Center in Omaha, Neb., from March 18-20. The six member squad consists of one defending National Champion, three returning All-Americans, one Big 12 Champion, and five grapplers ranked among the top 10 of their weight class. The three seniors, junior, sophomore, and redshirt freshman will vie for their chance at a National Title, competing against their weight classes' 32 other competitors. As a team, the Tigers have finished among the top 15 programs in the nation for six consecutive years.

Three Missouri wrestlers earned automatic bids to the tournament, by the amount of allotted wrestlers per conference, per weight class set before conference tournaments began by the NCAA. Defending National Champion Mark Ellis, 2009 NCAA qualifier Dorian Henderson, and redshirt freshman Brent Haynes all earned automatic bids. Missouri's three other NCAA competitors all qualified by way of their finishes at the Big 12 Championships. The 2010 Championships mark the eighth straight year in which Missouri has qualified five or more grapplers for the National Tournament.

Leading the way for the Tigers, two-time All-American, Nick Marable earned the highest seed of his teammates, at No. 3. The senior won his third consecutive Big 12 Championship title on March 6, with a 6-5 decision over Iowa State's Jon Reader in the finals.

Over the past 11 years in which Head Coach Brian Smith has been at the helm, 12 Missouri wrestlers have been crowned All-Americans with eight earning multiple honors.

Of Missouri's three returning All-Americans, seniors Maxwell Askren and Marable are two-time honorees. If either earn a top-eight finish, they would become the first Tiger since Ben Askren to earn three or more All-America accolades. M. Askren could also become just the fifth Missouri wrestler to earn All-America honors in more than one weight class.

The three-day National event will be broadcast live on the ESPN network. Friday and Saturday's action will air on ESPNU and ESPN360. Saturday evening's finals, beginning at 6:30 p.m. will be broadcast live on ESPN.

NOTES ON MISSOURI'S QUALIFIERS

141: Todd Schavrien

Schavrien wrestled to a third place finish at Big 12 Championships, taking a victory over Iowa State's Dalton Jensen, to earn his second appearance as an NCAA qualifier.

165: Nicholas Marable

The Two-time All-American has scored a team-best 45 dual points this season, going 13-1 in dual matches. Marable earned his third consecutive Big 12 Championship title at 165 pounds on March 6, and stands at 114 career wins.

174: Dorian Henderson

Earned an automatic bid in the Big 12 conference, finishing the season 20-15. His fastest fall came in just :34 over Drexel's Dave Woodall.

184: Maxwell Askren

The two-time All-American went 14-1 in dual matches this season, with his only loss coming to Illinois' John Dergo at The Midlands. Askren enters NCAA's standing just one win shy of joining Missouri's 100 career wins club.

197: Brent Haynes

Haynes makes his first NCAA appearance. Only a redshirt freshman, he carries a 25-13 record into the tournament. In his first dual meet, he defeated Illinois' then-12th ranked Patrick Bond.

HWT: Mark Ellis

The defending National Champion at heavyweight is tied for the team lead with eight falls on the year and is 7-2 in duals. Earning 33 dual points, the senior's fastest fall came in just :49 over George Mason's Adam Barnette.

TIGERS RETURN THREE ALL-AMERICANS

Competing at the 2009 NCAA Championships in St. Louis, the Missouri wrestling team made history by crowning five All-Americans. Prior to 2009, the most All-Americans Missouri had in a single year was three.

Missouri opens the 2009-10 campaign with three All-Americans in the Tiger's 10-man lineup. This marks the third time in four years, that Missouri's lineup contains three All-Americans. It is also the second straight year, a Missouri first, in which three All-Americans are back in search of top-eight finishes at the National Championship.

Of Missouri's returning All-Americans, two, seniors Maxwell Askren and Nicholas Marable, are two-time honorees. If either earn a top eight finish at the National Tournament, March 18-20, in Omaha, Neb., they would become the first Tiger since Ben Askren to earn three or more All-America accolades. Only Ben Askren, Missouri's first National Champion, has more honors with four (2004-2007).

BACK-TO-BACK ALL-AMERICAN HONORS

In Missouri's 63 years of wrestling, eight Tigers have earned back-to-back All-America honors. Thirty Tigers have collected 44 honors with 12 earning two or more accolades, but only Dave Young (1981-82), Shaon Fry (1993-94), Scott Barker (2002-03), Ben Askren (2004-07), Tyler McCormick (2006-07), Nicholas Marable (2008-09), Maxwell Askren (2008-09) and Raymond Jordan (2008-09) managed top eight finishes in consecutive years. This year, senior Maxwell Askren could become just the fifth Missouri wrestler to earn All-America honors in more than one weight class.

A LOOK BACK AT NATIONALS 2009

Missouri crowned its second-ever wrestling national champion upon the completion of then-junior heavyweight Mark Ellis' 3-2 overtime victory over fifth-ranked Konrad Dudziak of Duke. The second tie breaker bout of the night, Ellis managed a reversal with 10 seconds remaining in the second 30 second overtime period to capture his first career All-American honor and national title. The first Missouri wrestler to accomplish the feat was two-time National Champion Ben Askren at 174 pounds in 2006 and 2007. Ellis became Missouri's first-ever heavyweight All-American.

In addition to Ellis, Raymond Jordan, Michael Chandler, Maxwell Askren and Nicholas Marable all earned All-America honors by finishing among the top seven of their respective weight class. Missouri tied with national champion Iowa for the most All-Americans of the tournament, five.

As a team, the Tigers finished the 79th annual Division I Wrestling Championships in seventh with 70 points. Iowa captured its second consecutive team title with 96.5 points, while Ohio State took second (92 points) and Iowa State third (84.5 points). The top-15 finish is Missouri's sixth straight, dating back to the 2004 NCAA Championships, and highest finish since taking third in 2007. Since the start of the program in 1928, the Tigers have managed three top-10 team finishes, the first coming in 1984 at 10th. Two of the three top-10 finishes have come under current Tiger Head Coach Brian Smith.

The highest attended NCAA Championships in history, a total of 97,111 fans were at the annual event, including 17,385 at the title finals.

LAST TIME OUT

Wrestling in front of 2,610 fans in the Howard McCasland Field House, the Tigers finished the Big 12 Championships in fourth place with 33 points. Oklahoma State claimed the Championship Title with 70.5 team points, followed by Iowa State in second with 69 points.

Senior Nick Marable avenged his only dual loss of the season in the 165-pound title match, taking a win over Iowa State's Jon Reader, 6-5. Marable struck early, being first on the board with a take-down at 2:37. Reader escaped at 2:21, and took Marable back to the mat at 1:18. Marable escaped at :40, ending the period in a neutral position. Reader started the second period on bottom, earning only an escape in the second period. In the third period, Marable got an escape and a takedown to counter Reader's one escape, ending the match 6-5. With the win, the Collierville, Tenn. native improves to 33-3 on the season, and becomes the first Missouri wrestler to win three consecutive Big 12 Championship Titles, taking the crown in 2008 and 2009 as well.

Senior Max Askren's entrance into the Missouri 100 win club was deferred by Oklahoma State's Clayton Foster, as Foster claimed a 10-6 win over Askren in the 184 pound finals. Askren got the early lead, striking first with a takedown at 1:27 in the first period, but Foster soon changed the momentum of the match with a reversal at :51. In the remaining two periods, Foster garnered a takedown and a nearfall, holding Askren to just two more escapes to end the match. Askren now sits at 99 wins in his career, and 15-2 on the season. Earlier in the day, junior Todd Schavrien and red-shirt freshman Nick Hucke finished third in their respective weight classes, while redshirt freshmen Nathan McCormick and Brent Haynes finished fourth.

2009-10 SEASON SNAPSHOT

Coming off a season that awarded the Tigers five All-Americans and a National Champion, the 2009-2010 Missouri wrestling team had large shoes to fill. Beginning the season strong, Missouri won their seventh consecutive home opener, with an 18-16 victory over Illinois. Ranked as high as No. 8 in National Preseason Polls, Missouri had five wrestlers among the top 20, including three among the top 10.

The Tigers progressed through the season, gaining three titles at the Central Missouri Open, and two at the Nittany Lion Open. In November, five champions emerged from the Missouri Open, moving the Tigers into The Midlands with confidence. After placing fourth in Evanston, Ill., with 103 team points, the Tigers competed in the NWCA National Duals in January, falling to No. 6 and No. 7 Minnesota and Cornell, respectively.

Plowing through the second half of their non-conference schedule, the Tigers saw four straight wins, averaging a 21-point margin of victory over their opponents. Taking that momentum forward, the Tigers won their conference opener over Nebraska, 22-16. The Tigers' youth reared its head in conference losses to Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Iowa State to end the regular season.

Five Missouri wrestlers competed in their first Big 12 Conference tournament. Senior Nick Marable won his third consecutive title at 165 pounds, while senior Max Askren earned second place honors.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS RETURN IN 2012

In September 2008, it was announced that St. Louis was one of only six cities selected for the inaugural "NCAA Championship City" Pilot Program. The program will feature multiple host opportunities of NCAA Division I, II and III men's and women's championships through 2010, including the Division I Wrestling Championships in 2010.

ALLOCATION OF NCAA QUALIFIERS

The NCAA has announced the qualifier allocations for the 2010 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships and the Big 12 has 37 automatic berths into the field.

Each qualifying tournament was awarded spots per weight class based on current year data. Each wrestler was measured on the following: Division I winning percentage; rating percentage index (RPI); and coaches ranking. A threshold of a 0.725 winning percentage, top 28 in the RPI and top 28 in the coaches ranking was established to allocate 284 of the 330 championships field positions.

For each wrestler that reached the threshold in at least two of the three categories, his qualifying tournament was awarded a qualifying spot in that weight class. Each qualifying tournament was awarded a minimum of one wrestler per weight class, which will go to the tournament champion, even if they did not have any wrestlers reach at least two of the three thresholds. NCAA tournament spots for each qualifying event will be awarded at the tournament based solely on place-finish.

After all of the qualifying events have concluded, the NCAA Division I Wrestling Committee will meet in-person to select the remaining 46 at-large qualifiers, which will be announced on March 10. All weight classes will consist of 33 wrestlers. The at-large selections will be made based on the following criteria: head-to-head competition; qualifying event placement; quality wins; results against common opponents; winning percentage; RPI; coaches ranking and the number of matches contested at that weight class.

ACADEMIC ALL-BIG 12

Three members of Missouri's wrestling team received Academic All-Big 12 accolades as announced by the league office. Two Tigers, Maxwell Askren (Harland, Wis.) and Nathan McCormick (Leawood, Kan.) received first-team honors, while redshirt freshman Brent Haynes (Kansas City, Mo.) was named to the second team.

Askren is a four-time first team academic All-Big 12 recipient, while McCormick and Haynes are receiving their first honors.

Nominated by each institution's director of student-athlete support services and media relations offices, the wrestling academic all-league squad consisted of 14 first team members combined with two on the second team. First team members have recorded a 3.20 or better grade-point average (GPA), while the second team are those with a 3.00 to 3.19 GPA.

To qualify, student-athletes must maintain a 3.00 GPA or higher either cumulative or in the two previous semesters and have participated in 60 percent of his team's scheduled contests. Freshman and transfers are not eligible in their first year of academic residence. Senior student-athletes who have participated for a minimum of two years and meet all the criteria except percent of participation are also eligible.

ELLIS VS. ZABRISKIE

Senior heavyweights Mark Ellis of Missouri and David Zabriskie of Iowa State have competed against each other seven times since the 2006-07 campaign. Zabriskie owns the 7-0 advantage over Ellis. But, in the past two meetings, Ellis has closed the gap, dropping the last two matches my just one point. Here's a record of their previous matches.

THREE TIGERS EARN AUTOMATIC BIDS

With the number of automatic qualifiers set for the Big 12 Conference, it is already a given that Missouri's Dorian Henderson, Brent Haynes, and Mark Ellis have qualified for the 2010 NCAA Championships. All five Big 12 grapplers in each of the three weight classes will contend for a National Title, March 18-20, in the Qwest Center in Omaha, Neb. Ellis is a defending National Champion at heavyweight, and Henderson is a returning NCAA qualifier. This will be redshirt freshman Brent Haynes' first time taking the mat at the Championships.

FIVE TIGERS FIRST APPEARANCE

This year, five Missouri wrestlers will compete in their first Big 12 Championships. Redshirt freshmen Brent Haynes, Nathan McCormick, and Nick Hucke joined sophomore Patrick Wright and freshman Eric Wilson in competing for a bid to the NCAA National Championships. In a season fueled by the success of young wrestlers, these five combined for 81 wins, and 69 dual points.

HUCKE STEPS UP AT 149 POUNDS

One of Missouri's five wrestlers making their first Big 12 postseason appearance, redshirt freshman Nick Hucke replaced sophomore Scott O'Donnell in Missouri's lineup for the Big 12 Championships. Hucke owns a 10-9 record, and took third place at the conference tournament. Hucke closed out his redshirt season with a 22-5 record.



HAYNES IS HAPPY, NOT CONTENT

Redshirt freshman Brent Haynes stepped into Missouri's lineup for the first time Nov. 12, earning not only his first career dual victory, but his first win over a ranked opponent. With the win, Haynes became the first Tiger redshirt freshman since Maxwell Askren (2006-07) to crack the top-15 grapplers in his weight class this early in the season. Haynes accomplished the feat by upsetting Illinois' No. 12 Patrick Bond, 4-1, at 197 pounds, earning Missouri's second victory of the evening. Two days later, the two-time Missouri High School State Champion took third at the UCM Open, finishing the day with a 5-1 record that included a tournament opening win by fall and 18-2 win by technical fall in 4:42. On Feb. 7, Haynes upset No. 5-ranked Alan Gelogaev of Oklahoma State by recording an 8-7 decision. He was down by a score of 7-4 heading into the final period against Gelogaev, but rallied to record an escape, a takedown and then picked up a point for riding time. Haynes ranks as high as 10th by InterMat and D1 Wrestling. He is 25-13 on the year and has recorded six pins.

ASKREN CLOSES IN ON 100 WINS

Senior 184-pounder Maxwell Askren enters this weekend with a career record of 99-16, leaving him just one win away from becoming the 18th member of the Tigers' 100-win club. Askren is a perfect 8-0 in duals this year and is ranked as high as No. 3 in the polls. He earned the No. 1 ranking earlier this season. Prior to that, the last time Askren was ranked No. 1 in the nation came during the 2006-07 campaign when he stood at No. 1 in the 197 pound weight class. This year's top-ranking marked the first time a Tiger grappler had been ranked No. 1 at 184 pounds.

TIGERS WIN IN LINCOLN

Missouri opened its Big 12 Conference season by recording a 22-16 win over Nebraska on Jan. 29 in Lincoln, Neb. The victory was the first dual win for the Tigers in Lincoln since they defeated the Huskers, 24-16, in 2001. Mizzou took home six of the 10 matches against Nebraska last week, which included wins from Patrick Wright, Nicholas Marable, Maxwell Askren, Mark Ellis and Todd Shavrien. Shavrien's 3-2 decision sealed the dual win for Missouri as Scott O'Donnell won the final match of the night by forfeit at 149 pounds.

MISSOURI ANNOUNCES OGLE HOPKINS ENDOWMENT FUND

The University of Missouri Wrestling Program has announced that it has begun distributing scholarships from the Ogle Hopkins Endowment Fund. For the first time since the passing of former MU wrestler, Ogle Hopkins, the endowment gives one wrestler per year the opportunity to benefit from the donated amount. The endowment was established after an initial donation of \$25,000 by Joe Atkins as a memorial fund in honor of Ogle Hopkins. The fund is set up to give one annual scholarship award to a member of the MU wrestling team. Unlike typical endowments, the Ogle Hopkins Endowment is not set up with specifications for a wrestler to have a particular GPA, pursue a specific degree, or be from a certain county; rather, the MU compliance office headboards with Coach Brian Smith to decide who receives the scholarship for that year. The 2010 recipient is senior Max Askren. Instead of Askren getting the money directly, due to NCAA regulations, the amount will be allocated indirectly to Askren's scholarship aid to be used towards books, tuition fees, or whatever the case may be.

MORE THAN A DECISION FOR MARABLE

Senior 165-pounder Nicholas Marable was often teased last season for winning so many of his matches by two points or fewer, 15 to be exact. This summer, the two-time All-American worked with the TigerStyle wrestling staff and laid out a game plan that helped Marable improve on his scoring. Now 33-3 on the year, 15 of Marable's wins have been marked as bonus point victories, including four technical falls. Marable pinned Mike Vieira of Neosho in 1:12 at the UCM Open on Nov. 14 for his first win by fall in 27 matches. He entered the 2009-10 season with six career major decision wins, but has already recorded nine wins by major decision this season. Marable leads the Tigers by earning 45 dual points this season.

MISSOURI NAMES ALL-DECADE TEAM

The University of Missouri recently named its All-Decade Team for all sports for 2000-2009. Former Tiger Ben Askren was named the All-Decade performer in wrestling. The first MU wrestler to win a National Championship, Askren was a two-time National Champion, four-time All-American and three-time Big 12 Champion.

Current wrestler Mark Ellis earned Honorable Mention recognition on the All-Decade Team along with Tyron Woodley and Raymond Jordan.

MARABLE JOINS THE 100-WIN CLUB

With his major decision win over Mike Finch of Iowa State at The Midlands on Dec. 29, Missouri senior Nicholas Marable picked up his 100th career win. Marable became the 17th Tiger wrestler to join the 100-win club. Currently 114-23 for his career, he stands at eighth on the list, just two spots below current Tiger Assistant Coach Matt Pell, who has 122 career wins.

NWCA ALL-STAR CHALLENGE

Two-time All-American Maxwell Askren (Hartland, Wis.) held off ninth-ranked All-American Josh Patterson of Binghamton, 14-7, while competing at the 44th annual National Wrestling Coaches Association (NWCA) All-Star Classic held in Fullerton, Calif., Nov. 22. Askren's win marks the second straight year in which a Missouri wrestler competed in, and won, his match at the annual event, 165 pounder Nicholas Marable (Collierville, Tenn.) won his 2008 match against Mack Lewnes of Cornell, 3-2.

Wrestling in Titan Gym on the campus of Cal State Fullerton, Askren put up four points in the first period with a takedown and reversal, but was reversed by Patterson to end the first three minutes of action, 4-2. Missouri's senior chose down to start the second period and turned Patterson for a reversal and four point lead. Patterson chose to start the third period in the neutral position and Binghamton's grappler took Askren down. Not to be outdone, Askren secured his third reversal of the match and locked up six points through takedowns with an additional point added for his 4:18 of riding time.

Bouts contested at the All-Star Classic do not count toward a wrestler's official record.

SCHAVRIEN, MARABLE FINISH FIRST AT NITTANY LION OPEN

Two Tigers, junior Todd Schavrien (Poway, Calif.) and senior Nicholas Marable (Collierville, Tenn.) captured first place finishes at the Nittany Lion Open in State College, Pa. A total of 11 Missouri wrestlers finished among the top eight of their weight class with redshirt freshman Nathan McCormick (Leawood, Kan.) and sophomore Dorian Henderson (Columbus, Ga) finishing second at 133 and 174 pounds, respectively. Missouri Head Coach Brian Smith sent 16 wrestlers to compete in the all-day tournament.

"The guys wrestled well and had some good wins," Smith said. "We've improved from the last time we competed, but we're still making mistakes in some matches that we should have won. Overall, it was a good tournament for us. This should really prepare everyone for competition in the Midlands, Dec. 29-30."

Marable, one of two two-time All-Americans returning for his senior season, improved to 17-0 on the year, his longest consecutive win streak in his four years at Missouri. The Tiger grappler dominated his competition, winning three of his five matches by major decision. Competing in the championship finals, Marable outscored Rutgers' Scott Winston, 15-6. Marable now has 98 wins on his career.

2009 NCAA qualifier Schavrien collected his third first place tournament finish of the season holding off Anwar Goeres of Binghamton, 4-2, in the title bout. Schavrien pinned his second opponent of the day, Mike Nevinger, in 5:48, one of 15 Tiger wins by fall at the Nittany Lion Open.

True freshman Brad Wisdom (Farmington, Mo.) finished third at 125 pounds, rattling off three straight wins, two by major decision, before falling Penn State's Brad Pataky, 8-4. Wisdom rebounded with a 2-1 win over Ross Gitomer of UVA. Wisdom was one of four Tigers to finish the day in third place along with teammates Patrick Wright (157), Brent Haynes (197) and Dominique Bradley (HWT).

A MCCORMICK RETURNS TO THE LINEUP

Nathan McCormick, Missouri's starter at 133 pounds, is the third of three brothers that have competed under Head Coach Brian Smith. Tyler McCormick, now a member of the staff at Mizzou, competed for Missouri from 2004-2007 earning All-America accolades in 2006 and 2007 at 133 pounds. The oldest of the three brothers, Chris McCormick, competed at 133 and 141 pounds between 2002-2006. Nathan McCormick is 19-16 on the season and is tied for the team lead with eight wins by fall this season.

SEASON OPENERS

In 64 years of Missouri wrestling, the Tigers have amassed a 35-29 record in season openers and sit at 8-4 under current Head Coach Brian Smith. Following the Nov. 12 opener against Illinois, the Tigers now own a seven dual home opening streak beginning with their 21-17 win over then-No. 1 Oklahoma State in 2003. The seven dual home opening is the longest in program history.

TRUE FRESHMAN, BIG WIN

Missouri true freshman Bradley Wisdom kicked off his collegiate career with a win, 8-5, in the Tiger's Nov. 21 dual with Cal Poly. Wrestling at 125 pounds, the Farmington, Mo., native becomes the first true freshman since Sean Connoles to step into the Missouri lineup and manage a win in his first appearance. Connoles competed at heavyweight for Missouri and managed a 9-4 win in the Tiger's 2005-06 season opener against Stanford.

SENIOR STRENGTH

The University of Missouri is proud to honor one of the most decorated senior classes in Missouri wrestling history, the three members of the 2010 senior class have combined to earn 293 wins, five Big 12 Championship titles, four All-American titles, and claim a National Championship title in 2009 at heavyweight. All three grapplers have carried a No.1 ranking in their career, helping Missouri to finish in the top-15 teams in the nation since their careers began in 2006.

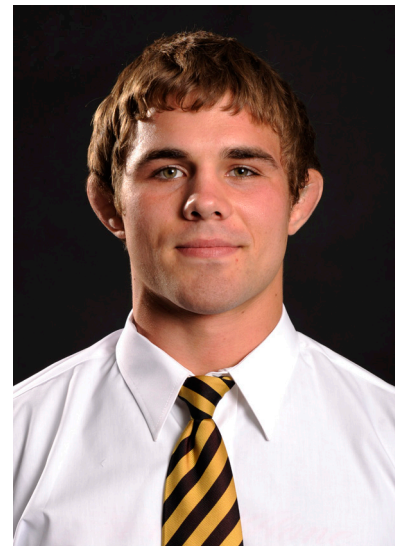

Missouri wrestler Haynes put into spotlight

COLUMBIA — Missouri wrestler Brent Haynes knows how to bring the Hearnes Center crowd to its feet.

In two of Missouri's home meets this season, Haynes, a freshman, upset top-15 wrestlers in the 197 pound weight class, receiving standing ovations both times. In the first home match of the season, Haynes, unranked at the time, upset No. 12 Patrick Bond of Illinois 4-1. Last Sunday, Haynes, ranked No. 13 at the time, upset Oklahoma State's Alan Gelogaev 8-7. Against Gelogaev, Haynes trailed 4-0 in the first period but scored two take-downs in the third period to tie the match and received a riding time point to win.

In this week's rankings, Haynes moved up to No. 10 to become the only freshman ranked in the top 20 in his weight class.

Haynes wasn't even sure at the beginning of the season what weight class he would be wrestling this season. But when senior Max Askren dropped from 197 to 184, that allowed Haynes to step into the lineup. Before making his final decision to drop down a weight, Askren talked with Haynes and made sure that Haynes would be OK with wrestling up a weight class. Haynes said he didn't have a problem taking on the challenge.

"Is it a tough weight class," Missouri coach Brian Smith said. "Yes, but he's performed well all season. You're going to have a kid that's All-Americaning as a freshman."

One of the main reasons that Haynes has been successful in his first year of collegiate wrestling is his ability to control people on the top position.

"He's a leg rider," Smith said. "He's cranking on your shoulder while his hips are crushing you down. When you look at his legs, he's really using them like he's got four arms. When you see some guys ride, they don't use their legs, so they only have two arms. It's a huge advantage when you have a good leg rider."

In college wrestling, it is uncommon to see people control from the top, since many wrestlers are quick enough to achieve early escapes. But Haynes said that he has always been tough on top.

"I was always good in high school on top," Haynes said. "But once I came here, coach Smith kind of refined and touched up a few things I was doing so now instead of riding out three out of four people I wrestle, I'm riding out everyone."

Haynes is third on the team in falls with six, behind 2009 NCAA National Champion Mark Ellis and freshman Nathan McCormick, who each have eight.

Regardless of Haynes' success so far this year, the toughest challenge still lies ahead. Out of the five Big 12 wrestlers at 197, all but one are ranked in the top 10 in the country, with Gelogaev fell to No. 11 in this week's rankings.

"You either got to get tough or get out," Haynes said. "Either I'm going to get my butt kicked every time I wrestle a Big 12 kid, or I'm going to have to step it up."

Haynes toughest test of the season thus far will come Sunday, when the team travels to Ames, Iowa, to take on the Iowa State Cyclones. Haynes will take on defending national champion and No. 1-ranked Jake Varner.

"It's a measuring stick for him to see where he's at against the best," Smith said. "Can he beat him? Yeah because he brings some things to the table that guys aren't use to seeing at that weight class."

Haynes said that he just has to wrestle his match and remain confident against Varner.

"There's nothing really for me to lose, I can only gain out of this match," Haynes said. "It's just an opportunity to prove how hard I've been working."

Missouri wraps up its regular season at Iowa State before heading to the Big 12 Tournament on March 6.

Missouri wrestler Ellis looks to defend 2009 NCAA Championship

COLUMBIA— Despite being the defending national champion, Missouri senior Mark Ellis has struggled in the regular season.

Ellis has lost eight matches this season, including his last two matches, to Oklahoma State's Jared Rosholt and Iowa State's David Zabriskie, 3-2. Ellis' first match at the Big 12 Tournament on Saturday will be against Zabriskie, the only wrestler in the country whom Ellis is winless against. Zabriskie has defeated Ellis six times, including twice this season.

"I've lost matches for different reasons," Ellis said. "I'm not sure what else to say other than the fact that I am better. I wrestle harder, and I bring it most of my matches so in the past I just didn't get it done. That's all going to change this weekend."

Ellis currently has an 18-8 record on the season. He finished last season with only three losses.

"We can't really focus on the losses," Missouri wrestling coach Brian Smith said. "Yes, we're working on the little things so he scores more, but I'm not going to worry about the losses. He's beaten Rosholt before, and we know he can beat Zabriskie. It's just a matter of putting the two matches together, and he will. He's ready for it."

However, Ellis said that a Big 12 and NCAA Championship would erase all of that.

Last season, Ellis was unable to win the Big 12 Tournament, but rebounded two weeks later to win the NCAA Championship. Smith said that Ellis was down after losing to Zabriskie 3-1 in the Big 12 Finals, but told Ellis to keep his composure and prepare for nationals.

He's telling Ellis the same this season.

"The season isn't over," Smith said. "It's living for today and looking at the end. The NCAA and Big 12 is what matters the most in a wrestling season in college. These guys right here know that, especially (Ellis and seniors Max Askren and Nick Marable)."

After winning the national championship, Ellis had an interesting off-season, going out for the Missouri football team, thinking that he might want to play football in addition to wrestling.

"I thought maybe that was something I wanted to do, but I realized it would be difficult to do both and still win another national title," Ellis said.

2008 Olympic wrestler Ben Askren is the only other wrestler to win a national championship for Missouri, winning in 2006 as a junior, and repeating in 2007. In his campaign to repeat in 2007, Askren went undefeated with a record of 42-0 and finished his career at Missouri with an 87-match winning streak.

Ellis will see Zabriskie and possibly Rosholt this weekend at the Big 12 Championships. All five heavyweights in the Big 12 have already qualified for the NCAA Wrestling Championships, held in Omaha, Nebraska, March 18-20.

"I have yet to win a Big 12 title and I really want to get that done before I leave Mizzou, so this is my last chance," Ellis said.

Senior wrestler grows into leadership role

COLUMBIA — Wrestling practice: The words are enough to strike fear into the hearts of many athletes.

Lifting massive weights, running for miles, smashing teammates into the mats and going to extreme measures to make weight are all part of the grueling practices that the Missouri wrestling team sometimes has twice a day. Nick Marable, a senior and two-time all-American on the team, has become accustomed to the routine and learned the importance of having a positive attitude. By approaching practice each day with acceptance rather than fear, Marable has improved as a wrestler and grown into a team leader.

“With wrestling, the biggest thing is your mentality,” Marable said. “If you don’t come into practice every day with a good mentality and expect to get better that day, think that it’s a good day and that it’s going to be fun, then practices are terrible.”

Marable, who placed in the top three in the state tournament all four years of high school at Christian Brothers High School in Memphis, Tenn., acknowledges that he was not prepared for NCAA wrestling when he moved to Columbia in 2005.

“In high school ... if you’re good, you’re good, and you don’t have to work as hard as some of the other people,” he said. “But in college, everyone’s on the same level, so it’s like whoever puts in the most work and effort is going to get the most out of it.”

Missouri coach Brian Smith agreed that Marable did not make the best impression at the start of his career. After contracting mononucleosis in the summer before his freshman year, Marable began the season out of shape.

“When he first came in, I still joke about it, I didn’t even think he was going to make it,” Smith said. “My coaches and I thought, man this kid is never going to make it.”

Despite his coaches’ doubts, Marable survived and excelled. Taking his freshman redshirt year as an opportunity to acclimate to college, Marable met two upper-classmen on the team, Ben Askren and Matt Pell, who taught him about the physical and mental aspects of the sport.

“My freshman year, I relaxed and enjoyed college a little bit,” Marable said. “But then my sophomore year, I decided to step it up. And once you start putting the time in, it all gets so much easier.”

With a new outlook, Marable began to approach practices much as he does today, as an opportunity to improve and learn from his teammates and coaches. Lifting weights and refining technique make up only a part of the hours the team spends on the fourth floor of the Hearnes Center. Marable said one of the most valuable parts of practice is learning from wrestling against coaches and teammates.

As Askren and Pell did when Marable first met them, Marable knows that, as one of only three seniors on the team, it is time for him to step up as a leader.

“He’s really focused on bringing the team together, which is the most important thing,” Smith said.

Not only does Marable host parties and barbecues at his house for the team, he also tells his teammates about his struggles over the past four years.

“I tell them my story my freshman year, how I kind of got in trouble from not doing things the right way,” Marable said. “Once I started doing things the right way, managing my time and looking forward to practices, things got a lot easier and a lot better. I try to guide them that way.”

Although this undoubtedly helps the younger wrestlers understand the mental aspects of the sport, the freshmen and sophomores can also look to Marable’s discipline for an example of how to work out. Smith says that Marable improved his technique and strength over the summer by logging long hours in the weight room and on the mats, and that Marable wants to succeed more than anything this season.

“There’s a sense of urgency for him,” Smith said. “He’s got to do everything right and train right ... He’ll be right in the thick of things. We know he’ll win it.”

Although Smith is confident Marable can advance in the NCAA Tournament this year, the senior is most concerned that the Tigers live up to their potential. After spending years learning from older teammates and passing those lessons along, Marable says that he now knows that, though wrestling is a somewhat individual sport, team success is crucial.

“Everyone always wants a team national title ... but I just want our team to wrestle to their full potential,” Marable said. “I felt like in past years we’ve been a good team, but we haven’t wrestled to our potential. This year, I ... want us to wrestle the best we can.”

Max Askren adjusts to new weight class, bad back

COLUMBIA — In June, Max Askren thought it was finished.

Suffering from persistent back problems, especially at the end of last season, the All-American wrestler was almost certain that he would not be able to wrestle his senior year. By mid-summer those fears were eased.

Nevertheless, adjustments because of lingering injuries and a new weight class have marked the start of this season.

The pain in his back emerged three weeks before the Big 12 Championships. After suffering a herniated disk in high school, he knew that the probability was high for the pain to resurface and trigger more serious problems. Still he went on to place fifth in the 197-pound weight class before getting a MRI that revealed one disc in his back was “pretty much gone” and another was bulging.

“Sitting in class all day was really difficult for me,” Askren said. “Wrestling didn’t help it. I came to grips with it around June or July that it wasn’t going to get better and that I was going to have to figure out something else that I was going to have to delve into.”

Despite his fears, Askren never shared his suspicions with head wrestling coach Brian Smith or the other wrestling coaches. He confided only in his older brother, former Missouri wrestler Ben Askren, and a few close friends.

“I didn’t talk to those guys about me not wrestling just because it wasn’t a for sure thing and there wasn’t a reason to put that burden on their minds,” Askren said.

In the meantime, Askren began to focus on his personal fitness, realizing if he couldn’t wrestle, he’d have to find other alternatives in order to stay in shape. He began to cycle almost everyday and adjusted his diet. Without the protein shakes and ice cream that he’d been accustomed to eating to maintain his wrestling weight, Askren lost about ten pounds.

“I didn’t step on the mat for three or four months,” Askren said. “I got into biking and stuff because I like working out and hate feeling fat. You don’t feel good.”

Late in the summer his back was improving, and he realized he would be able to wrestle in his final collegiate season. But he weighed in at about 185 or 190. He had hovered around 200 pounds in the past. Luckily, teammate Brent Haynes, who wrestled in the 184-pound class last year, had put on weight and was willing to trade spots with Askren.

“It was just kind of logical for him, at 205 or 210, to go to 197 and for me to go 184,” he said. “But I talked to Brent before any decision was made, because he’s a big part of the decision, and if he wasn’t all right with it I would go back to 197.”

Now that Askren has moved to the lower weight class, Smith said that he is wrestling at the ideal weight.

“He’s a pretty disciplined kid, so I don’t see this as a huge challenge,” Smith said. “And I think that he’s going to be wrestling at the weight that he should be. There were some guys in the conference that when he’d wrestle them, he’d look a lot smaller.”

The work, however, is not over.

“The challenge is that this is the first time that he has to watch his weight, cut his weight, and keep control of it,” Smith said. “Literally, it’s the first time in his college career.”

Keeping the weight down, though, is just one of Askren’s worries this season. His back is still an issue, and he practices separately from the team so he does not get injured. Every day a different teammate will work out with him for 45 minutes or an hour before the team’s official practice, and the coaches will give him instructions about what to work on in these individual sessions.

Additionally, Askren will sit out several matches this year to make sure he does not get prematurely injured. The reason is both Askren and Smith know that the senior’s chances at winning a championship are still very real.

“At the end of the year, that’s when it counts,” Smith said. “The regular season doesn’t really matter that much. We know Max, and we know that he can wrestle. We’ve just got to get him to March, get him healthy, and then he has a really good chance of winning the national title.”

More well-rounded Askren as strong as ever

Two-time All-American has overcome back woes, ready for Big 12s, NAAs.

Wrestling used to mean everything — and then some — to Missouri's Max Askren.

"When he was younger," said his older brother, Ben, a former Tigers star, "he'd do nothing but wrestle and think about nothing but wrestling."

Those days are long past. The two-time senior All-American, ranked third nationally at 184 pounds heading into tomorrow's Big 12 Championship meet in Norman, Okla., speaks Japanese, French and Russian and plans to move to Russia after graduation. He is a deep thinker who answers questions with lines like, "That's a very philosophical realm you're getting into." Also an aspiring chef, he's turned the house he shares with teammate Brent Haynes into an international kitchen.

"That's how I burnt myself here," he said, lifting his shirt to reveal a dark red streak on his side. "I was making lavash, which is a homemade" Armenian "cracker."

But Askren will also let you in on another truth: His passion for wrestling burns as intensely as ever.

When Askren told his family over the summer he wouldn't wrestle his senior season, Ben knew better. Yes, he had watched Max wrestle through debilitating back pain the final three weeks of last season. He'd been there when Max's blown discs ached so much that he couldn't take off his shoes after placing fifth at the NCAA Tournament and then as he stayed off the mats for the next four months.

"But I knew in the long run he wasn't happy with how he finished last year and he wanted to finish up strong and win a national title," said Ben, a volunteer assistant at Arizona State. "If you had made me bet on it the day he said he wasn't wrestling, I would've said there was no way he's done. Even though that's what he said, I could read through it."

He was right.

Max's back pain eventually subsided, and aided by a relaxed practice schedule and a switch from 197 pounds to 184, Askren isn't sure he's ever felt better heading into the postseason. One of the No. 17 Tigers' three legitimate national title contenders, along with senior heavyweight Mark Ellis and 165-pounder Nick Marable, Askren is 19-1 and the favorite to claim the 184-pound Big 12 title.

Seventh-ranked Clayton Foster, an Oklahoma State junior, is the only other conference wrestler ranked among the top 10.

"I'm prepared," Askren said. "It's like you study and study for a test. When you're prepared, there's really not too much to worry about."

Missouri Coach Brian Smith said, "Mentally, it's the happiest I've seen him at this point in the season, the most relaxed he's ever been. I've never seen Max more ready."

Not that the path to this state has been smooth.

Askren had endured setbacks before, most notably as a freshman when he dropped his first two NCAA Tournament matches as the top seed. But little could compare to the back pain he began to suffer with about three weeks left in his junior year. Though Askren's been hesitant to discuss the injury in detail, it involved multiple discs. And by the final weekend of last season, he could barely move.

"I remember watching him try to take off his ankle band when he took fifth place at NAAs, and he couldn't even bend over," Smith said. "I'm like, 'Man, that kid just sucked it up for us and did a great job at a tough weight class.'"

Askren wondered if his career was over, the pain not receding in the weeks after the season. Midway through the summer, he told Ben, a two-time national champion who promised to remain in Columbia until Max graduated, he was through. Ben then followed former Missouri assistant Shawn Charles, who took over Arizona State, to Tempe, Ariz. But when Askren's pain finally began to ease, he began to contemplate a senior season without wrestling.

"He realized that this is it," Smith said. "We sat and talked about shortening the season, and shortening practices. His mind-set coming in was just looking at everything with the glass half full. This is it, and he was going to enjoy this season."

Askren returned to the mat in August, his eye immediately turned to March.

"If I am wrestling," Askren said this week, "I plan on winning."
