PLAYERS OF THE WEEK (OCT. 31, 2005)

Co-Offensive Players of the Week

CURTIS BROWN, BYU, SENIOR, RUNNING BACK

Brown ran for a career-high 219 yards on 25 carries (8.8 yards per carry) and career-best four touchdowns in BYU's 62-41 victory over Air Force. Three of his four touchdowns came in the fourth quarter.

ROBERT MERRILL, TCU, SENIOR, TAILBACK

Merrill rushed for a season-high 170 yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries (5.9 yards per carry) to key the TCU's 23-20 win at San Diego State. His 1-yard scoring run gave TCU its first points of the game just 2:58 into the contest. Merrill's 21-yard touchdown carry in the third quarter tied the game at 13-13. In the final drive of the game, he had a fourth-down rush for a first down that enabled TCU to run out the clock in the final minute to preserve the victory.

Co-Defensive Player of the Week

ROBERT HERBERT, COLORADO STATE, JUNIOR, CORNERBACK

Herbert had three unassisted tackles, broke up two passes and recovered a fumble on a muffed punt in Colorado State's 35-25 victory at New Mexico. He also returned an interception 30 yards that set up the Rams go-ahead touchdown (32-25) in the third quarter.

QUINCY BUTLER, TCU, SENIOR, CORNERBACK

Butler recorded four solo tackles, including one tackle for a loss of three yards, and broke up two passes in TCU's 23-20 victory at San Diego State. He also intercepted a fourth-down SDSU pass and returned it 10 yards to set up TCU's game-tying touchdown (PAT blocked) in the third quarter. It was Butler's team-best fifth interception of the season and his fourth pick in the last five games.

Special Teams Player of the Week

JASON SMITH, COLORADO STATE, FRESHMAN, PLACE KICKER

Smith became only the second kicker in Colorado State history to kick as many as four field goals in his collegiate debut. Smith hit field goals from 30, 41, 28, and 25 yards in the Rams 35-25 victory at New Mexico.

WEEKLY REPORT

No. 20 TCU improved to 6-0 in the MWC (8-1 overall) after defeating San Diego State, 23-20, while Colorado State picked up its first road win of the year by a 35-25 count at New Mexico to set up this week's matchup between the Horned Frogs and Rams for the top spot in the MWC standings.

The Rams, 4-1 in the MWC, travel to Amon G. Carter for the first time to take on TCU. The series stands at 1-1 all-time with CSU defeating TCU, 42-21, in Fort Collins in 1998 and falling to the Frogs, 3-17, in the 2002 Liberty Bowl. A TCU victory over the Rams this week would give the Horned Frogs their first outright conference title since 1958. A Colorado State victory over TCU would set up the Rams for a shot at a fourth MWC title in six years.

In other league action last week, BYU downed Air Force, 62-41, in the highest scoring MWC game in history.

Fourth-quarter scoring proved critical in all three conference matchups last week. The Falcons attempted a rally with 27 points in the final stanza, but BYU responded with 21 points to secure the victory. TCU edged San Diego State, 10-7 in fourth-quarter points to ensure its road victory, and Colorado State outscored New Mexico 17-0 in the final quarter to collect a road win.

In all non-league games, the MWC is 13-13 overall in 2005, including 4-6 in road/neutral games vs. automatic-qualifying BCS opponents, and 5-8 overall.

EYEING THE POSTSEASON

TCU is bowl eligible with its 8-1 mark, while five other MWC teams are fighting for a shot at the postseason. Colorado State must win one of its final three games, while New Mexico must win one of its final two contests. BYU, Utah and Wyoming must win two of the next three contests. The Cougars look to return to the postseason for the first time since 2001, while the Utes and Cowboys look to build on last year's bowl victories. The list below shows what each MWC team must do to become bowl eligible in 2005.

A LOOK AT THE RANKINGS

The Oct. 31 Bowl Championship Series Standings has TCU ranked 18th. The Frogs are ranked 19th in this week's Harris Poll, and 20th in both the *USA Today* and *AP* Polls.

BYU AND AIR FORCE SET CONFERENCE SCORING RECORD

The 103 combined points in BYU's 62-41 win over Air Force last Saturday was the highest scoring MWC game in history, surpassing the 101 points by TCU (51) and BYU (50) earlier this season. The game was the second-highest scoring game in the NCAA this season, behind Ball State's 60-57 win over Western Michigan.

MOUNTAIN WEST RECEIVERS AMONG THE BEST IN NCAA

In the most recent NCAA statistics, six MWC wide receivers are ranked in the top 50 for total yardage, including four in the top 20 and three in the top 15. New Mexico's **Hank Baskett** leads the pack ranking third with 928 yards, followed by Wyoming's **Jovon Bouknight** in 10th with 843 yards. Colorado State's **David Anderson** is 14th with 821, San Diego State's **Jeff Webb** is 17th with 791 and **Jason Brown** of Air Force is 27th with 704 yards.

BYU's **Jonny Harline** ranks 40th nationally, but second among tight ends in receiving yards with 626. Only Garrett Mills of Tulsa has more yards with 774.

MWC TEAMS HAVE EYE FOR INTERCEPTIONS

Five of the nine MWC teams rank in the top 16 in interceptions in the latest NCAA rankings, released Oct. 30. TCU leads the nation with 19, followed by New Mexico tied for seventh with 13. Wyoming is tied for 12th with 12 and Colorado State and San Diego State are tied for 16th with 11.

TCU LEADS NATION IN TAKEAWAYS, TURNOVER MARGIN AND INTERCEPTIONS

TCU leads the nation in total takeaways (30), turnover margin (+1.78) and interceptions (19). The Horned Frogs also rank tied for fifth in fumble recoveries (11).

LUBICK WINS 100TH GAME AT COLORADO STATE

Colorado State head coach Sonny Lubick, who has the highest winning percentage in school history (.649), earned his 100th win at CSU after a 35-25 victory at New Mexico. Lubick is only the second coach in school history to win 100 games. Harry Hughes had a 125-93-18 record from 1911-41. Lubick has led CSU to six conference titles, eight bowl appearances, and four seasons with 10 or more wins.

NEW MEXICO'S MOORE JOINS ELITE NCAA GROUP

New Mexico tailback **DonTrell Moore** rushed for 119 yards on 19 carries and two touchdowns in the loss to Colorado State. Moore became just the sixth player in NCAA Div. I-A history with four 1,000-yard rushing seasons, joining Tony Dorsett (Pittsburgh 1973-76), Amos Lawrence (North Carolina 1977-80), Dennis Manns (New Mexico State 1995-98), Ron Dayne (Wisconsin 1996-99), Cedric Benson (Texas 2001-04). Moore has 1,085 yards on 222 carries this season.

In the first six years of the MWC, 12 players have reached the 1,000-yard mark in a single season. Moore holds the distinction as the only running back in Conference history to have more than one 1,000-yard rushing season. He collected 1,134 yards as freshman in 2002, 1,450 in 2003 and 1,091 in 2004. Moore is currently the New Mexico and MWC all-time rushing leader with 4,760 yards. He also is currently ranked second nationally among active career rushing leaders behind DeAngelo Williams of Memphis (5,371).

WYOMING'S BOUKNIGHT CONTINUES TO PRODUCE

Wyoming senior wide receiver/kick returner **Jovon Bouknight** is one of the most productive active players in college football. Bouknight ranks among the Top 5 players in the nation in several active career categories -- receptions (third), receiving yards (third), all-purpose yards (third) and receiving touchdowns (third).

Last time out, Bouknight accounted for all four of Wyoming's touchdowns in a 39-31 loss at Colorado State on Oct. 22. He set career highs in receptions (12), receiving yards (187) and TD receptions (3), as well as throwing a 16-yard pass for the first touchdown of the game. His TD receptions were from 16, 22 and 63 yards. Bouknight added 32 yards on two kickoff returns and had 12 yards rushing for a total of 231 all-purpose yards on the day. It was the 11th 100-yard receiving game of his career and fifth of this season. Bouknight has had 100 or more yards receiving in nine of the last 12 games and has scored a touchdown in six of seven contests this season. He currently has 3,353 career receiving yards, 225 career receptions, an MWC-record 28 career TD receptions and 5,338 career all-purpose yards. Bouknight is Wyoming's career leader in all-purpose yards and is second all-time in career receiving yards in MWC history.

WHAT YOU MAY HAVE MISSED IN WEEK 9...

- ◆ Colorado State WR **David Anderson** caught eight passes for 128 yards and two touchdowns in the 35-25 win at New Mexico. Anderson broke CSU's career records for receiving yards (3,234) and receptions (193). He also has 21 career touchdowns, three shy of matching the school record, and had the 15th 100-yard game of his career, also a school record.
- ◆ BYU QB **John Beck** completed 31-of-43 passes for 383 yards and three touchdowns in the 62-41 win over Air Force. Beck surpassed former New Mexico QB Casey Kelly (5,606) for third all-time in the Mountain West Conference for most career yards with his current 6,029. He is 136 yards behind former Wyoming quarterback Casey Bramlet for second. Beck also replaced Gifford Nielsen for ninth all-time in Cougar history for most career passing yards when he threw for 383 yards against Air Force to give him 6,029 career yards. Nielsen had 5,833 yards, playing from 1975-77.
- ◆ Air Force QB **Adam Fitch** threw for a school-record five touchdown passes vs. BYU. Fitch recorded career highs in every category with 13 completions, 24 attempts and 265 yards. His 265 yards passing are the most by a Falcon this season and the most since Mike Thiessen threw for 265 yards vs. BYU in 2000.
- ◆ Air Force WR **Jason Brown** recorded his third-career 100-yard receiving day with 156 yards on nine receptions and two touchdowns at BYU. All three have come this season. Brown had 115 vs. San Diego State and an option-era-record 184 vs. Utah (1980-present).
- ◆ San Diego State QB **Kevin O'Connell** surpassed his career best in completions with 25 (24 at AFA Sept. 15, 2005), and was one off his career high for attempts with 46 (47 at BYU in 2004) in the 23-20 loss to TCU. O'Connell totaled 235 passing yards in the game and rushed for his fourth touchdown of the season. His 26-yard TD run is the SDSU's longest rushing score of the year.



- Air Force fell at BYU, 62-41. The 103 total points marks the second-highest scoring game in school history. The most is 105 vs. Utah in 1988 (AFA 56-49).
- Air Force falls to 3-6 overall and will record back-to-back losing seasons for the first time in the Fisher DeBerry era (1984-present). The back-to-back losing seasons are the first at the school since 1980-81 and just the fourth in the DeBerry era. AFA was 2-9-1 in 1980 and 4-7 in 1981.
- Air Force recorded its third blocked kick this season. **Charles Wells** recorded the blocked punt in the fourth quarter. The block was picked up by **Garrett Rybak** and returned 10 yards for a touchdown. The block is Air Force's 92nd since 1990 and the first-career block for Wells. The touchdown by Rybak is the first of his career. The blocked punt return for a touchdown is the first by Air Force since 2000 vs. Northwestern when Nate Allen blocked a punt and recovered it in the end zone.



- BYU defeated Air Force 62-41 Saturday. The last time BYU scored 62 points was in 2001 when it defeated Air Force 63-33 October 20. The 62 points is the second-highest total ever allowed by the Air Force. The Cougars' 63-point outing in 2001 marked the most points ever allowed by an Air Force team.
- WR **Michael Reed** recorded his first career 100-yard receiving game with 103 yards on five receptions against Air Force.
- Entering the Air Force game, BYU had turned the ball over 15 times and forced nine, good for a -6 turnover margin which ranked 101st in the nation. The Cougars closed the gap on Saturday, forcing four Air Force miscues, compared to two turnovers for BYU.
- The Cougars held Air Force scoreless in the first quarter, marking the third time this season BYU has shutout its opponent during the opening frame. It was also the eighth quarter the Cougars have held their opponent scoreless this season.



- QB **Justin Holland** has thrown for 2,281 yards in eight games, along with 20 touchdowns. He is only the second QB in school history, along side former Ram Moses Moreno, to throw for 2,000 yards in eight games. His touchdown figure this season is tied for the top spot with former Rams' Moreno (1997) and Matt Newton (20).
- **Holland** completed his first 12 pass attempts at New Mexico for 138 yards and a touchdown. He finished the day completing 20-of-26 for 312 yards and two touchdowns.
- P **Jimmie Kaylor** leads the MWC and ranks fifth nationally in punting average. Kaylor has had six punts of 50 yards or more in 2005, and two more longer than 60 yards.
- Colorado State has an 84-5 record (94.4 %) under Sonny Lubick when the Rams lead after three quarters.



- New Mexico lost a fourth quarter lead for just the fourth time since 2001, but the second time this season, in the 35-25 loss to Colorado State. The Lobos led BYU earlier this season, 24-13 after three quarters before falling, 27-24 on Oct. 8.
- The Lobos had 34 plays for 304 yards and zero turnovers in first half against CSU and 28 plays for 47 yards and four turnovers in the second.
- New Mexico recorded five sacks in the loss to Colorado State, the Lobos second-highest total of season. Prior to the UNM game, the Rams had been sacked just nine times through the first seven contests.
- LB **Mike Mohoric** had a season-high 12 tackles and matched his career high with two sacks and two tackles for loss in the loss to CSU.



- SDSU has lost three of its last five meetings against ranked opponents by just a three-point margin. The Aztecs lost to No. 20 TCU, 23-20 Saturday and also fell at No. 17 Michigan 24-21 in 2004, and at No. 2 Ohio State, 16-13, in 2003.
- True freshman NT **Jonathan Soto** and WR **Justin Amaral** made their first career starts against TCU. Fifteen different Aztecs have made their first career start in 2005, including 11 on the defensive side of the ball.
- LB **Freddy Keiaho**'s set a career high for solo tackles with 11 against TCU, surpassing his previous best of 10 at Ohio State earlier this season. Keiaho has 10 or more tackles in four games this season.
- WR **Jeff Webb** has caught one or more passes in 30 straight games and at least three in 25 consecutive contests. Webb moved into sixth place all-time at SDSU for career receiving yards surpassing Tim Delaney (2,535). He has at least one TD reception in each of the last three games.



- TCU's defeated San Diego State, 23-20 Saturday. The Frogs trailed at the half for the first time since Sept. 24, when they were down 24-16 at BYU. After entering the game a nation-leading +17 in turnover margin, TCU was at -3 in the first half and -1 for the game.
- DB **Quincy Butler**'s third-quarter interception was his team-high fifth of the season and fourth pick in the last five games.
- The Frogs are 35-for-37 in the red zone in their seven wins and 1-for-4 in the one loss.
- WR **Cory Rodgers** is fourth on the TCU career receiving list with 142. Stephen Shipley is next on the list in third with 152 (1989-92).
- TCU is 8-1 or better after eight games for the fourth time in the last six seasons. In each of the three previous occasions, the Frogs went on to win at least 10 games (10-2, 2000; 10-2, 2002; 11-2, 2003).



- Eight different players caught passes in UNLV's 42-32 loss to Utah led by TE **Craig Estandia** with 10 for 120 yards and two TDs. WR **Corey Anderson** had four receptions for a career-high 92 yards.
- Only two of UNLV's 18 turnovers this season have come from a position other than the quarterback - a fumble at Wyoming by RB Erick Jackson and another fumble vs. Air Force on a kickoff return by Ronnie Smith.
- DB **Joe Miklos** led the Rebels with 10 tackles (7 solo) against Utah. It was his second straight game with 10 or more tackles.
- DL **Leon Moore** leads the MWC in tackles for loss with 10.5. He currently ranks sixth on the UNLV career list with 16.



- Utah's 42-32 win at UNLV on Oct. 22 snapped a three-game losing streak. The Utes need to win two of their three remaining regular-season games to become bowl eligible.
- Utah captured its first road victory of the season, and 200th all-time, at UNLV. The Utes also ended a three-game road losing streak.
- The Utes will remain in state for the remainder of the season, with home games against Wyoming (Nov. 5) and New Mexico (Nov. 12) and a road game at BYU (Nov. 19).



- Wyoming's two-game road winning streak this season came to a halt after a 39-31 loss at Colorado State Oct. 22. The Cowboys recorded a 29-28 road win at Air Force followed by a 24-14 victory at Ole Miss earlier this season.
- Wyoming has lost three consecutive games for the first time in two seasons. The last time UW lost three in a row was at the conclusion of the 2003 season.
- The Cowboys turnover problems continued with five the last time out at Colorado State - three lost fumbles and two interceptions. Wyoming committed two turnovers against New Mexico on Oct. 15, and lost seven turnovers against TCU on Oct. 8.
- QB **Corey Bramlet** moved into seventh in career passing at Wyoming with his 296 yards against Colorado State. Bramlet currently has 4,429 career passing yards, moving ahead of Craig Burnett, who threw for 4,373 yards from 1986-87.
- WR **Jovon Bouknight** extended his streak of catching at least one pass in a game to 44 vs. New Mexico. His streak is the longest current streak in the NCAA. The 44 straight games with a catch also is a Wyoming school record.

BYU leads the MWC and is ranked eighth in the nation in pass offense (325.2 ypg). The Cougars have passed for over 300 yards in four of the eight contests this season. UNLV is getting off to slow starts in 2005, having been outscored by 27 points in the first quarter and by a total of 122-70 in the first half. However, the Rebels have outscored their opponents 62-55 in the fourth quarter.

TREND REPORT

BYU is 4-0 this season when RB **Curtis Brown** rushes for 100 or more yards in a game and 0-4 when he doesn't reach the century mark. UNLV is 4-5 after a bye week since joining the MWC in 1999.

THE SERIES - BYU leads 9-3

UNLV defeated BYU last year in Provo, 24-20. The Cougars are 5-0 all-time against the Rebels in Las Vegas. Four of the last five games between UNLV and BYU have been decided by a touchdown or less. The Cougars needed overtime to defeat the Rebels (27-20) the last time in Las Vegas.

THE COACHES

Bronco Mendenhall is in his first season as head coach at BYU. He served as defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the two previous years for the Cougars.

Mike Sanford was hired as the ninth head coach in Rebel football history on Dec. 6, 2004. This is his first head coaching position after an outstanding career as one of the top assistants in the nation at Utah.

TREND REPORT

Wyoming turned the ball over seven times in the first five games en route to a 4-1 mark. The Cowboys are currently 4-4 and have turned the ball over 14 times in the last three games. Utah has outscored its opponents 192-123 through the first three quarters this season, including 164-92 in the second and third periods. The fourth quarter has been a different story with the Utes being outscored 72-16.

THE SERIES - Utah leads 46-30-1

TREND REPORT

The Frogs also boast the conference's second-best total defense (2361.2 ypg), while the Rams have the second-rated pass offense (306.5).

TREND REPORT

Colorado State has scored 34 points off nine opponent turnovers the last two games. CSU scored 17 points following four New Mexico turnovers, and had five turnovers that for 17 points in the win over Wyoming. In six games prior, the Rams scored 20 points off 12 turnovers. Did You Know...

Since the inception of the Mountain West Conference in 1999, only three teams (BYU, Colorado State and Utah) have won the regular-season football title. BYU, Colorado State and Utah shared the 1999 crown. BYU won the 2001 title, while Colorado State won outright championships in 2000 and 2002. Utah claimed its own championships in 2003 and 2004.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

In the six-year history of the Mountain West Conference, the champion has gone undefeated twice and had just one loss three times. Only once has the league champion had two losses. In 1999, BYU, Colorado State and Utah tied for the league title at 5-2. The Cougars opened league play that year 5-0 before losing their last two games, while the Utes began 3-0 before suffering their first loss. The Rams started league play 0-2 in 1999 and are the only team to begin the league schedule with two losses and garner a share of the title.

BOWL ARRANGEMENTS

The Mountain West currently has agreements to send three teams to bowl games in 2005. Since 1999, the MWC has posted a 9-9 bowl record.

INSTANT REPLAY IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE

PHILOSOPHY

1. The MWC's instant replay plan is based primarily on the experiment conducted last season by the Big Ten, with the addition of a coaches challenge element. It is not an "NFL-style" approach.
2. The intent of the system is to utilize available technology to identify and correct egregious errors, thus positively impacting the officiating program and enhancing the overall MWC football operation. Preliminary evidence indicates the flow of the game is not significantly disrupted, nor the length of the game excessively extended. Previous experience has shown a "tranquility effect" on the coaches, fans, administrators, etc.
3. A common sense approach is desired, including an understanding that an instant replay system will focus only on significant, reviewable plays. Such a system will not be perfect and errors may still occur. Inasmuch as instant replay is an experiment in 2005, some procedural and technical challenges should be anticipated.
4. It is believed the use of whatever technology is available (e.g., in-stadium video with limited number of cameras vs. national television production) will provide an opportunity to improve the game and is worth pursuing. It is understood the technology (e.g., number of cameras and source) will not necessarily be consistent for every game.
5. The threshold for reviewing/overturing a play shall include the following:
 - **Indisputable** video evidence.
 - Discernable competitive effect. Subjectivity and judgment will be involved.

THE REVIEW

1. The final replay decision will be made in the booth by the Replay Official, not on the field involving review by the referee.
2. The MWC system in the video replay booth will essentially mirror that used successfully by the Big Ten during the 2004 season. The Replay Official and Replay Assistant will review (utilizing the equipment specified) every play via whichever video source is available (e.g., television OR in-house stadium feed). In the event the necessary thresholds are met for the contest to be interrupted and a play reviewed, the Replay Official will notify the referee (and several other on-field individuals) via the pager system and execute the necessary review. The referee will be notified of the Replay Official's decision whether or not to overturn the ruling on the field. The referee will announce the decision utilizing the public address system and play will resume.
3. The Video Technician will be responsible for maintenance and operation of the booth equipment as assigned, along with other specific responsibilities. The Replay Official will utilize the TiVo unit, permitting him to stop and rewind particular plays/angles. The Replay Assistant will monitor the live feed, as well as the action on the field, and provide coordination assistance and guidance to the Replay Official. A second TiVo unit will be prepared in each booth to be immediately brought online as a back-up if necessary.

THE SOURCE

1. For televised contests ONLY, a feed from the production truck will be utilized. In-house stadium video (two-camera minimum) will be utilized for games that are not televised. The video feed to the replay booth, regardless of source, will not include audio.
2. Every available camera angle (within the available time frame), regardless of the source (e.g., television OR in-house video) shall be provided to the video replay booth without editorial manipulation by the stadium/television personnel.
3. Only a single source of video (i.e., TV production OR in-house video, not both) will be utilized for the replay system.

EQUIPMENT & PERSONNEL

1. Two TiVo units, 23-inch flat screen monitor, 17-inch basic monitor, pager system base unit and two VHS/DVD recorders.
2. The replay crew will consist of three individuals, including the Replay Official, Assistant Replay Official and a Video Technician.
3. The Replay Officials will be considered part of the officiating crew and will be included in the pre-game and post-game meetings of the crew.



INSTANT REPLAY IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE

UTILIZATION

All intra-conference MWC football games will utilize instant replay. The visiting institution for non-conference, crossover contests shall have the option of using replay under the home team's (i.e., home conference's) system. Utilizing an approach jointly agreed upon by the I-A conferences, the Mountain West Conference will distribute a consent form to non-conference opponents no later than July 1, with a required response date of August 1. The I-A members of the Collegiate Commissioners Association have adopted an approach whereby each conference will encourage its institutions to agree to the utilization of instant replay when visiting non-conference opponents.

SCOREBOARD REPLAY POLICY

The existing MWC scoreboard video replay policy will be retained. The current policy permits a controversial play to be shown once at full speed and once at slow motion.

COACHES CHALLENGE

The MWC instant replay system shall include a coaches challenge element structured as follows.

- The head coach is the only individual who may throw the flag to challenge a play.
- Each head coach is entitled to one challenge per half, provided he has a timeout remaining.
- If the initial challenge is upheld, the head coach may have one additional challenge in the half (max. 2 per half).
- If the initial challenge is not upheld, the team loses a timeout and any further opportunity to challenge in that half.
- A head coach who challenges a non-reviewable play on his first challenge loses his challenge opportunity for that half, but does not lose a timeout.
- A head coach who challenges a non-reviewable play on his second challenge opportunity in a half (which he would gain via a successful first challenge) will cause the team to lose a timeout.
- Once a team has exhausted either its timeouts or its challenge opportunities in a half, the referee shall collect the challenge flag from the head coach.
- A team without a timeout remaining in either half may not initiate a challenge.
- The head coach shall not be equipped with a pager to receive notification a play is to be reviewed.
- The recommended approach is that the head coach waits to see if the play will be reviewed and only throws the challenge flag if a play is not reviewed and he desires to challenge.
- A head coach will be charged with a challenge (and subject to the guidelines outlined above) whenever he throws the challenge flag, UNLESS he does so simultaneously with the pager notification to the field a play is to be reviewed. In that one, limited exception, the challenge flag will be returned to the coach without a challenge being charged.
- The replay booth personnel will be responsible for watching for a coaches challenge flag in a goal line-type situation when the officials will be some distance from the team area. If the replay official has not decided to review a play and a head coach throws a challenge flag that is not seen by the officiating crew, the replay booth will immediately activate the pager system to kill the play. However, if a play proceeds before it can be stopped, it will stand.

MEDIA POLICY

The Replay Officials are off-limits to the media. The existing pool reporter approach will be utilized, with the referee as the spokesperson for the entire crew. If appropriate, the referee will consult with the replay official before meeting with the pool reporter. Should an appropriate MWC staff member be in attendance, that person would assume the responsibility of consulting with the referee and the Replay Official on any issues, then meeting with the pool reporter.

REVIEWABLE PLAYS

Plays that **MAY** be reviewed with the use video replay:

1. Plays governed by sideline, goal line and end line:
 - a. Scoring plays, including breaking the plane of the goal line.
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line, goal line.
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds.
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in bounds.
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/incomplete/intercepted in the field of play and end zones.
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver.
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player.
 - d. Quarterback (passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, the play is finalized).
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing beyond the line of scrimmage.
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing after change of possession.
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage.
3. Other detectable infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress errors with respect to first down.
 - c. Touching of a kick.
 - d. Number of players on field.
 - e. Clock adjustments.
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays.

Plays that **MAY NOT** be reviewed with the use of video replay:

1. Holding.
2. Offside/encroachment.
3. Pass interference.
4. Personal fouls (e.g., late hits).
5. Illegal blocks.
6. Illegal formations.
7. Face mask.
8. Taunting/excessive celebration.
9. False starts.
10. Roughing the passer/kicker.
11. Fighting participants.
