PLAYERS OF THE WEEK (Nov. 27, 2006)

Co-Offensive Players of the Week

JOHN BECK, BYU

Senior, Quarterback, Mesa, Ariz./Mountain View

Senior quarterback John Beck completed 28-of-43 passes for 375 yards and four touchdowns in BYU's come-from-behind 33-31 victory over Utah. It was the Cougars first win over the Utes in five games, allowing BYU to secure its first outright Mountain West title since 2001. Beck connected on touchdown passes of 36, 4, 2 and 11 yards. On the final drive of the game with BYU trailing 31-27, Beck drove the Cougars 75 yards on 10 plays with 1:19 remaining and hit tight end Jonny Harline on the game-winning 11-yard touchdown pass.

ROCKY HINDS, UNLV

Sophomore, Quarterback, Los Angeles, Calif./USC

Sophomore quarterback Rocky Hinds helped UNLV halt a 10-game losing streak with a career-high 26 completions on 34 pass attempts (75 percent) for a career-high 351 yards and two touchdowns in the Rebels 42-39 victory over Air Force. He also posted a career-high in rushing yards with 45 on five carries. Hinds' 351 yards passing gave him 2,148 for the season to make him the first UNLV player to pass for at least 2,000 yards since Jon Denton in 1997.

Defensive Player of the Week

CODY KASE, NEW MEXICO

Junior, Linebacker, Valencia, Calif./Hart

Junior linebacker Cody Kase had a season-high eight tackles (six solo) and an interception on the third play of the game to establish the tone for the Lobo defense in the first half. Case's second interception of the season set up a Kenny Byrd field goal as the Lobos went on to a 24-0 lead at the end of the first period. Kase also equaled his career high with two sacks for 15 yards and had a pair of quarterback hurries.

Special Teams Player of the Week

KENNY BYRD, NEW MEXICO

Senior, Place Kicker, Albuquerque, N.M./St. Pius X

Senior place kicker Kenny Byrd made both of his field goal attempts from 35 and 45 yards, and connected on all five extra points in the 41-14 victory over San Diego State. He also tied his career-high with six touchbacks on kickoffs, giving him a league-leading 32 on the season.

WEEK 13 RECAP

No. 21 BYU became the fourth team in MWC history to post a perfect record in conference play, capping off its 2006 title run with a win over Utah. New Mexico defeated San Diego State to record its sixth victory of the season and become the fifth bowl-eligible MWC squad this year. In Salt Lake City, the Cougars engineered a 75-yard scoring drive over the final 1:19 for a 33-31 comeback win over the Utes. The two-point decision, which marked BYU's lone single-digit margin of victory this season, ended a four-game losing streak to Utah. In Albuquerque, New Mexico scored 24 first-quarter points off three interceptions and a defensive stop for a 41-14 win over San Diego State. The Lobos will be making their fourth bowl appearance in five years, having accepted an invitation to participate in the inaugural New Mexico Bowl on Dec. 23.

In other MWC action Saturday, TCU generated over 600 yards of offense for the second straight week while handing Colorado State a 45-14 loss. On Friday, UNLV closed out the season on a high note, snapping a 10-game losing streak with a 42-39 win over Air Force.

IN THE RANKINGS

BYU moved up in the rankings across the board after its victory over Utah. The Cougars are ranked 20th in the latest *Associated Press* Poll and 21st in the BCS, Harris and *USA Today*/Coaches Poll.

BYU CLAIMS 2006 MOUNTAIN WEST CROWN

BYU became the fourth team in MWC history to post an unblemished record (8-0) in Conference play en route to the 2006 title. This is the Cougars first outright Mountain West championship since the 2001 season and 22nd league title overall. The 2001 Cougars were the first team to go undefeated in league play, followed by Utah in 2004 and TCU in 2005.

FIVE MWC TEAMS BOWL ELIGIBLE

BYU (10-2), TCU (9-2), Utah (7-5), New Mexico (6-6) and Wyoming (6-6) are all bowl eligible. This is the second year in a row, and third overall since the inception of the league, the MWC has boasted five bowl eligible teams.

BYU ACCEPTS PIONEER PUREVISION LAS VEGAS BOWL INVITATION

BYU accepted an official invitation to participate in the 2006 Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl after the win over New Mexico on Nov. 18. The Cougars will play Oregon of the Pac-10 Conference in the Dec. 21 bowl game. BYU will appear in a bowl game for the second straight year, marking the first back-to-back bowl appearances since 1998-1999. The Cougars lost to California in the 2005 Las Vegas Bowl, 35-28.

TCU POINSETTIA BOWL BOUND

TCU has accepted an invitation to play in the second annual San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. The Horned Frogs will face an Northern Illinois of the Mid-American Conference on December 19 at 5 p.m. (PST) at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego, California. TCU will be making its 23rd bowl appearance and eighth in the last nine seasons. The Frogs defeated Iowa State, 27-24, in the 2005 EV1.net Houston Bowl.

ARMED FORCES BOWL SELECTS UTAH

Utah has accepted an invitation to play Tulsa of the Conference USA in the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl in Ft. Worth, Texas, on Dec. 23. The Utes will be making their fourth straight bowl appearance. Utah has won its last five bowl games, dating back to a 17-16 win over Fresno State in the 1999 Las Vegas Bowl. Last year, the Utes defeated Georgia Tech, 38-10, in the Emerald Bowl.

NEW MEXICO TO PLAY IN INAUGURAL NEW MEXICO BOWL

New Mexico defeated San Diego State last Saturday, 41-14, to even its record at 6-6 overall. The win over the Aztecs made the Lobos bowl-eligible for the sixth straight season. New Mexico accepted the New Mexico Bowl's invitation after the SDSU game and will face San Jose State from the Western Athletic Conference in the Dec. 23rd contest. In their last bowl appearance, the Lobos fell to Navy, 34-19, in the 2004 Emerald Bowl in San Francisco.

BYU'S WIN STREAK REACHES NINE

BYU's nine-game win streak is currently tied for the third-longest in the country. Ohio State leads the NCAA with a 19-game win streak, followed by Boise State with 12 straight wins. Below is a list of the current win streaks in the NCAA.

WEEK 14 PREVIEW

TCU (10-2, 5-2) and Air Force (4-7, 3-4) conclude the regular season Saturday in Fort Worth. The Horned Frogs have won three straight in the series, including the last two in Fort Worth. The Falcons have won its last two regular season finales, while the Frogs are 4-1 under Coach Patterson in regular season finales.

San Diego State (2-9, 2-5) hosts Colorado State (4-7, 1-6) in the season finale for both teams. The Aztecs are 4-3 in regular season finales since 1999, while the Rams are 5-2. San Diego State won last years battle in Fort Collins, 30-10, but Colorado State has won six in a row in San Diego.

WEEK 13 HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ TE **Jonny Harline** had seven receptions for 118 yards, including a career-high three touchdown receptions, in BYU's 33-31 win over Utah.
- ◆ In just three quarters of action, TB **Rodney Ferguson** rushed 22 times for a career-high 210 yards and two touchdowns in New Mexico's 41-14 victory over San Diego State.
- ◆ RB **Aaron Brown** totaled 285 all-purpose yards and three touchdowns in TCU's 45-14 win at Colorado State. Brown rushed for a career-high 166 yards and had scores from 1, 28 and 45 yards. He also caught three passes for 48 yards and returned two kickoffs for 71 yards.
- ◆ New Mexico WR **Travis Brown** notched his second 100-yard receiving game of the year, finishing with six receptions for a game-high 116 yards, including a 35-yard TD, at BYU.
- ◆ TB **Rodney Ferguson** rushed for a game-high 138 yards on 20 carries for New Mexico at BYU. Ferguson also had three catches for 23 yards for 161 total offense yards. It was his fourth game over 100 yards rushing/receiving this year.
- ◆ Freshman walk-on LB **J.J. Williams** had a career-high 13 tackles and a tackle for loss for two yards in the loss to BYU.
- ◆ QB **Brett Ratliff** completed 24-of-39 passes for a season-high 358 yards and three touchdowns in the two point loss to BYU.
- ◆ Utah WR **Brent Casteel** had a career-high 100 receiving yards on five receptions and two touchdowns against BYU. His previous high was 92 yards against Colorado State two weeks ago.



BYU'S BECK NAMED NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE WEEK

BYU senior quarterback **John Beck** has been named the Walter Camp Football Foundation National Offensive Player of the week after leading No. 21 BYU to a 33-31 come-from-behind victory over Utah on Saturday. He was also named the MWC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance. Beck completed 28-of-43 attempts for 375 yards and four touchdowns, including a game-winning, 11-yard pass with no time remaining to complete the comeback.

BECK CONTINUES TO BREAK PASSING RECORDS

BYU quarterback **John Beck** passed for 375 yards and four touchdowns in the win against Utah. Beck currently has a career total of 76 touchdown passes and is the all-time Mountain West Conference career touchdown leader. He is also second on the BYU charts. Beck became the first MWC player and second in BYU history to surpass the 10,000 yard passing mark. Beck currently has 10,646 career passing yards to rank first all-time in the MWC and second at BYU.

UNLV'S WOLFE BREAKS MWC FRESHMAN RECEIVING RECORD

UNLV wide receiver **Ryan Wolfe** currently holds the UNLV freshman single-season record with 55 receptions, surpassing the previous mark of 41 was set by Damon Williams in 1995. Wolfe holds the MWC freshman single-season receiving yards record with 911 yards, breaking the old mark of 771 set by BYU's Austin Collie in 2004. Wolfe also holds the UNLV freshman single-season receiving record, besting Len Ware's mark of 628 in 1996 after just eight games. Wolfe currently leads the MWC and ranks 23rd in the nation in receiving yards with 75.9 per game, which is the second-best mark by a freshman in the NCAA this season behind Akron's David Harvey, who ranks 21st with 76.2 yards per game. If Wolfe maintains his current status atop the MWC receiving charts, he would become the first freshman in MWC history to lead the league in receiving.

BROWN RUSHES INTO BYU RECORD BOOK

Senior RB **Curtis Brown** became the first BYU running back in school history to surpass the 3,000 career yard mark after this season. Brown currently has 3,101 yards in his career and is the BYU all-time leading rusher, breaking Jamal Willis' record of 2,970 yards from 1991-94. Brown's 3,101 rushing yards also ranks second all-time in the MWC behind only DonTrell Moore of New Mexico (4,973 yards from 2002-05).

WENDLING SELECTED TO 2006 NATIONAL SCHOLAR-ATHLETE CLASS

Wyoming senior FS **John Wendling** was chosen as one of 17 student-athletes selected to College Football's 2006 National Scholar-Athlete Class. The 17 players also are finalists for the 2006 Draddy Trophy, which recognizes one player as the best in the country for combined academic success, football performance and community leadership. Each member of the 2006 National Scholar-Athlete Class receives an \$18,000 fellowship for post-graduate studies. The group will also vie for the prestigious Draddy Trophy, which is selected by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. The winner, named on Dec. 5, will earn a total of \$25,000 for post-graduate work. Nominees for the Draddy Trophy must be a senior or graduate student in their final year of eligibility, have a GPA of at least 3.0 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability as a first team player and demonstrate strong leadership and citizenship. The Air Force Academy's Chris Howard is the lone student-athlete from a Mountain West Conference institution to win the Draddy Trophy back in 1990.

OVERTIME GAMES

Mountain West teams have been involved in four overtimes contests in 2006, tying the league record for overtime games in one season set in 2002. Wyoming has been involved in two of the three overtime games, falling at Virginia, 12-13, on Sept. 9, and at Syracuse Sept. 29, 34-40 in double-overtime. BYU also has played one overtime contest this season, dropping a 23-30 double-overtime decision at Boston College on Sept. 16. The first intra-league overtime contest of the year took place Oct. 14 with New Mexico defeating UNLV, 39-36. MWC teams are 2-8 all-time against non-conference opponents in overtime since the league's inception in 1999. An MWC team hasn't won an overtime contest against a non-conference foe since BYU defeated Virginia, 38-35, on Sept. 2, 2000. Below is a look at MWC records in overtime since it was established in college football in 1996. The MWC record reflects each institution's record since joining the MWC.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS

3...Air Force blocked three kicks, two extra points and a punt in the game at UNLV. The blocks give Air Force 98 since 1990 which ranks second nationally to Virginia Tech.

3...Junior **Shaun Carney** has become the first quarterback in the option era (1980-present) at Air Force to record three 1,000-plus yard passing seasons. Carney threw for 1,315 in 2004 as a freshman 1,393 last year as a sophomore and currently has 1,148 yards this season. Carney is just the fourth player ever in Air Force history with three 1,000-yard passing seasons. He joins Rich Mayo (1959-60), Rich Haynie (1971-73) and Dave Ziebart (1977-79).

4...TCU coach **Gary Patterson** will record his fourth 10-win season in the last five years if the Horned Frogs defeat Air Force on Saturday. No other coach in TCU history has more than two 10-win campaigns.

5...San Diego State defensive end **Antwan Applewhite** has recorded at least one sack in each of the last five games after not having any in the team's first six outings of 2006. For the season, he has 4.5 sacks for a loss of 33 yards.

6...New Mexico is bowl-eligible for the sixth straight season. The Lobos are the only team in the Mountain West Conference that can claim that feat.

6...Colorado State has lost six games in a row. It's the longest losing streak for the Rams since a six-game skid in 1988. The last time CSU lost seven in a row was in 1981.

8...TCU is 8-0 this year when holding its opponent to 17 points or less.

8...BYU has held its opponents scoreless in the opening quarter in eight games this season. Overall, the Cougars are outscoring opponents 148-15 in the opening quarter of play. BYU has allowed just one first-quarter touchdown all season (at Boston College).

9...The number of games BYU has won this season by two touchdowns or more. On the year, BYU is outscoring opponents by an average of over 20 points per game.

11...BYU has scored first in 11 straight games this year. The only time an opponent scored first in a game was Arizona (field goal) in the season-opener.

11...The number of receptions BYU RB **Curtis Brown** had at Boston College on Sept. 16. The 11 receptions are tied for the most by a RB in the NCAA this season (Shannon Woods-Texas Tech).

11...BYU led 14-0 at the end of first-quarter action against Utah, marking the 11th straight game the Cougars have led after the first quarter of play.

11...Through 11 games this season, Colorado State has yet to have an individual rusher surpass 100 yards in a game. It is the latest point in a season during the **Sonny Lubick** era that the Rams have not had a 100-yard rusher.

12...BYU's 14-10 halftime lead over Utah in its last outing extended the Cougars' streak of being ahead at the half to 12 straight games. BYU has held a halftime advantage in every game this season. BYU is outscoring its opponents 251-57 in the first half of play in 2006.

12...Utah has gone 12 straight games this season without a 100-yard rusher for either itself or its opponent.

12...UNLV ended its 12-game Conference losing streak with a 42-39 victory over Air Force.

13...Consecutive games New Mexico has won when the team does not commit a turnover. The Lobos are 16-1 in such games under head coach **Rocky Long**.

16...UNLV has lost 16 consecutive road games, dating back to a 24-20 win at BYU on Oct. 8, 2004.

24...The number of consecutive games New Mexico WR **Travis Brown** has caught at least one pass.

24...Since 2001, New Mexico has recorded 24 wins and just eight losses in regular-season games played after Oct. 15.

99...TCU QB **Jeff Ballard** has not thrown an interception in his last 99 pass attempts.

113...New Mexico S **Quincy Black** ranks second in the MWC with 113 total tackles in 2006. Black is the first Lobo to post 100 tackles in a season since LBs Daniel Gawronski and Billy Strother recorded 100 apiece in 2003. Black leads the MWC with eighth double-digit tackle games this season.

115...Air Force LB **Drew Fowler** has 115 tackles on the season and leads the league in tackles per game at 10.5. Fowler is the first Falcon with 100 tackles in a season since Marchello Graddy (113) and Trevor Hightower (104) in 2003.

- Air Force gained 211 yards passing in its 42-39 loss at UNLV. It marked the third consecutive game (Notre Dame - 205 yds., Utah - 218 yds.) the Falcons earned 200-plus yards passing. Air Force averaged 67 yards through the air in its first eight contests.
- QB **Shaun Carney** stands in third place in career passing yards at Air Force after completing 10-of-18 passes for 211 yards against UNLV. Carney currently has 3,856 career yards, moving ahead of Gary Baxter who had 3,362 passing yards from 1967-69, and Rich Mayo who had 3,390 passing yards from 1957-60.
- Air Force (4-7, 3-4) faces TCU next week to round out its season. The Falcons will have their third consecutive losing season for the first time in coach **Fisher DeBerry's** 23 years at the Academy.
- The 42 points scored by TCU are the most allowed by the Falcons this season and the highest output by an opponent since BYU scored 62 against Air Force last season.



- For the first time since the 2001 season, BYU earned a victory over in-state rival Utah. The Cougars outscored the Utes 19-7 in the final quarter, overcoming a 10-point deficit to record the memorable 33-31 victory.
- BYU has outscored its opponents in 35-of-48 quarters this season, including 22 shutout quarters. The Cougars trailed Utah, 24-14, in the third quarter, marking the first time they have fallen behind a team since the Boston College game, breaking a streak of 32 consecutive quarters.
- BYU outscored its opponents 283-72 at home this season. The Cougars averaged 47.16 points per game, while holding opponents to just 12 points per game. The +35.16 margin of victory per game at home is the largest home margin of victory in stadium—and program—history
- Senior QB **John Beck** joins Brandon Doman ('01), Steve Sarkisian ('96), Robbie Bosco ('84), Steve Young ('83) and Marc Wilson ('79) as the only quarterbacks in BYU history to lead the Cougars to a perfect league record. Beck, Sarkisian and Bosco are the only quarterbacks in BYU history to record eight conference wins in a single season.



- Colorado State used a total of three true freshmen in 2005, and six during the 2004 season. To date, the Rams have yet to use a true freshman in the 2006 lineup. CSU is one of two teams (Wake Forest) in the country that has not played a true freshman this season.
- Colorado State allowed 45 points by an opponent (TCU) for the first time this season, and the first time since Navy earned 51 points in last year's Poinsettia Bowl. It was also the first time the Rams allowed 45 points at home since a 34-48 loss to Colorado on Sept. 7, 1996.
- Colorado State lost its sixth straight game, the longest losing streak in Head Coach **Sonny Lubick's** 14-year tenure at CSU.
- Colorado State will conclude the regular season in December for the first time since 1987 when they faced BYU in Melbourne, Australia.



- New Mexico became bowl-eligible for the sixth straight season with a 41-14 rout of San Diego State in its regular-season finale. The Lobos will play in the inaugural New Mexico Bowl Dec. 23 at University Stadium.
- Sophomore TB **Rodney Ferguson** rushed for a career-high 210 yards, marking the seventh Lobo to surpass 200 yards in a game. He now has 1,132 yards on the season, the fifth-best single-season total in school history.
- The Lobos' 24 first quarter points against San Diego State are the most in the opening period since New Mexico scored 24 against New Mexico State on Sept. 24, 1983, marking a span of 275 games.



- QB **Kevin O'Connell** recorded his 12th career 200-yard passing game with 272 yards at New Mexico. It was the most by an Aztec QB through the air this season. O'Connell set personal season highs in attempts (40), completions (23) and passing yardage (272) and moved into SDSU's career top 10 for passing yardage with 4,575, surpassing Lon Sheriff, who was 10th with 4,533 yards from 1999-2002.
- Despite the 41-14 loss to New Mexico, SDSU earned a season-high 431 yards of total offense, including 327 yards passing, marking the most this season and the most since recording 421 passing yards against Hawai'i last year.
- Junior **Brett Swain** set a career-high for receptions (8) and receiving yards (108) in the game versus New Mexico.



- TCU extended its winning streak to six games. The Frogs have won 20 of their last 23 games and can reach 10 wins for the fourth time in the last five seasons with a victory next week at home against Air Force.
- During TCU's current six-game win streak, the Frogs have outscored their opponents 152-13 in the first half.
- RB **Aaron Brown** rushed for a career-best 166 yards at Colorado State, marking TCU's first 100-yard rushing game of the season. Brown is the first Frog to reach the century mark since Robert Merrill ran for 109 yards in the 2005 EV1.net Houston Bowl win over Iowa State.
- TCU's 45 points marked the third time this season and the second consecutive game the Frogs have scored 40+ points.
- TCU has not surrendered a touchdown in its last two home games, outscoring Wyoming and San Diego State by a combined score of 78-3.
- TCU's defense ranks third nationally in run defense (64.8 yards per game) and seventh in both scoring defense (12.6 points per game) and total defense (259.3 yards per game).



- UNLV's 42-39 win over Air Force snapped a 10-game overall and 12-game MWC losing streak, its longest streak since dropping the last five games of the 1997 season and then going 0-11 in 1998.
- QB **Rocky Hinds'** 351 yards passing gave the sophomore transfer 2,148 for the season. He is the first UNLV player to pass for at least 2,000 yards since Jon Denton finished with 2,586 in 1997.
- WR **Casey Flair** and WR **Ryan Wolfe** each earned 100-plus yards passing, marking the first time UNLV had two 100-yard receivers in the same game since Sept. 7, 2001, when Michael Johnson had 174 and Troy Mason 106 vs. Northwestern.



- Utah concludes the regular season 7-5 overall and 5-3 in the MWC. The Utes are bowl eligible for the fourth consecutive year and fifth time in six years. The Utes boast the best bowl record among the nine MWC institutions at 5-0 since 1999.
- DB **Eric Weddle** threw his first career touchdown pass in the second quarter against BYU with an 18-yard strike to WR Brent Casteel. He also recorded nine tackles, including five solo.
- WR **Brent Casteel** collected his eighth and ninth touchdown catches of the year against BYU. His nine touchdowns this year tie him for fifth with Jack Steptoe (1976) for receiving touchdowns in a season (9).
- Utah totaled 474 total yards of offense, compared to BYU's 429. The Utes have outgained their opponents in eight of 12 games this season.



- Wyoming defeated UNLV 34-26 on Nov. 18 to conclude the regular season with a bowl eligible record of 6-6. The Cowboys also finished with a 5-3 conference record, which is their best mark since joining the MWC in 1999. Wyoming won five of seven games to conclude the season.
- Wyoming held seven of its 12 opponents to under 100 yards of rushing this season, including UNLV to 59 yards in the regular-season finale.
- The Wyoming defense is currently ranked among the top 10 defenses in the country in both total defense, ranked No. 9, and in passing defense, ranked No. 10.
- Redshirt freshman QB **Karsten Sween** started the final seven games of the season for Wyoming and posted a 5-2 record.

The Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl has the first choice, followed by the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl with the second selection. The Armed Forces Bowl will have the third choice among MWC teams, while the New Mexico Bowl will have the fourth pick. The MWC also has a contingency deal with the Texas Bowl this season. Since 1999, the MWC has posted an 11-11 bowl record.

BOWL FACTS

Collectively, eight of the nine MWC members have participated in a bowl game the last seven years, led by Colorado State and TCU with six appearances each. Six of the nine members have won bowl games since 2000 with Utah leading the way with a perfect 5-0 record.

BCS CHANGES

The Bowl Championship Series altered its system during the off-season by adding a fifth bowl game and widening the field of eligible teams to the top 14 from the top 12 for 10 bowl spots. Any Division I-A team is eligible for at-large consideration. The BCS did not change its automatic qualifiers -- the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the final standings; the champions of the Big East, Big Ten, Southeastern, Pac-10, Big 12 and Atlantic Coast Conferences. Notre Dame will be an automatic-qualifier if it finishes in the top eight, while any non-automatic-qualifying BCS team that finishes in the top 12, or in the top 16 if they're ahead of a BCS champion, will receive automatic inclusion. The BCS standings will be released on Sundays in 2006 compared to Mondays in the past. The BCS will continue to use the Harris Poll, the USA Today coaches poll and six computer rankings for its standings.

WEDDLE MAKING A NAME FOR HIMSELF

Utah senior DB Eric Weddle is currently ranked tied for 11th in the NCAA with six interceptions. He has 17 career interceptions and currently is tied with LaVon Edwards (17 from 1988-91) for second in that category at Utah. Harold Lusk holds the career record with 19 (1993-96). He is one of three players (Dwight Lowery, San Jose State and Ryan Smith, Florida) in the NCAA to have back-to-back games with at least two interceptions, and one of two players to record three interceptions in a game. He was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week, as well as Mountain West Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his performance at San Diego State on Sept. 23. Weddle recorded three interceptions, two of which he returned for touchdowns, to tie a school record set back in 1985 by Erroll Tucker. He became one of just four Utes ever to record three interceptions in a game—and the first since Eric Jacobsen accomplished the feat in 1987. Weddle made Utah history by scoring back-to-back offensive and defensive touchdowns from scrimmage. Weddle has been named a Midseason All-American by Sports Illustrated.com, cbssportsline.com and collegefootballnews.com. Weddle's numbers on the year include 58 tackles, six interceptions and eight touchdowns (two on interception returns, four rushing and one passing on offense and one on a fumble return).
