WEEKLY REPORT

San Diego State is the lone Mountain West team scheduled to play Saturday, Dec. 3. The Aztecs conclude the regular season at Hawai'i and look to finish with an even 6-6 record for the second time in the last three seasons.

TCU CLAIMS MOUNTAIN WEST TITLE

TCU's outright Mountain West Conference title is its first in nearly 50 years. The Horned Frogs (10-1, 8-0), are playing their first season in the MWC and last won an outright league title in 1958 as member of the Southwest Conference. TCU shared SWC titles in 1959 and 1994 and won a piece of championships in the Western Athletic Conference (1999, 2000) and Conference USA (2002).

TCU POSTS PERFECT MARK IN MOUNTAIN WEST PLAY

TCU is just the third team in Mountain West Conference history to go undefeated in league play (BYU, 2001; Utah, 2004). The Horned Frogs posted their first undefeated conference record since the 1938 national championship team that competed in the Southwest Conference. It's also just the fourth perfect league mark in school history.

DID YOU KNOW....

TCU became just the fourth team since the inception of the Mountain West Conference in 1999 to win the regular-season football title. BYU, Colorado State and Utah shared the 1999 crown. BYU won the 2001 title, while Colorado State won outright championships in 2000 and 2002. Utah claimed its own championships in 2003 and 2004.

TCU BOASTS NATION'S THIRD-LONGEST WIN STREAK

TCU currently is tied with LSU for the third-longest active win streak in Division I-A behind only USC (33) and Texas (18). The Horned Frog nine-game win streak is their longest since winning 12 in a row in a stretch that spanned the final two games in 2002 and the opening 10 contests in 2003.

ATTENDANCE RECORDS

The Mountain West Conference set an attendance record in 2005, averaging 35,275 fans in 48 home contests played. The old mark was 35,213 set in 2004. This is the first time in league history the MWC has posted back-to-back season attendance averages of 35,000-plus. The total attendance of 1,693,216 for all games also ranks as the highest in conference history, surpassing the 2003 mark of 1,667,548 in 49 home contests.

BOWL FACTS

Collectively, eight of the nine members have participated in a bowl game the last six years, led by Colorado State and TCU with five appearances each in that span. Six of the nine members have won bowl games since 2000, including victories by Utah (Tostitos Fiesta Bowl) and Wyoming (Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl) last season.

A LOOK AT THE RANKINGS

The November 28 edition of the Bowl Championship Series Standings has TCU ranked 14th. This week marks the 19th time TCU has received a rank in the BCS Standings, the most of any school playing in a conference without an automatic BCS Bowl bid (Boise State and Utah tied for second with 12). The Frogs also are ranked 15th in this week's Harris, USA Today and AP Polls.

BOWL REPORT

For the first time in league history, the Mountain West Conference is sending four teams to bowl games as BYU, Colorado State, TCU and Utah have been invited to the postseason. New Mexico also is bowl eligible, but is currently awaiting a possible bowl bid. The Lobos had a conditional invitation to play in the Fort Worth Bowl, but both the Big 12 Conference and Conference USA have enough teams to fill the bowl's contractual obligations.

TCU has committed to play in the EV1.net Houston Bowl on Dec. 31 at Reliant Stadium against an opponent from the Big 12 Conference. Kickoff is scheduled for 1:30 p.m. CT. The Horned Frogs finished the season as the MWC champions with an 8-0 mark in league play. TCU is replacing the contracted selection from the Southeastern Conference, which was unable to qualify enough bowl-eligible teams. One of only three teams in the nation currently with a 10-1 record (Penn State, Oregon), the Horned Frogs posted wins over five bowl-eligible teams, including a season-opening victory at then-No. 7 Oklahoma. TCU has appeared in a bowl game five of the past six years and is one of only seven Division I football programs (Boise State, Georgia, Iowa, Oklahoma, Texas, USC) to post at least 10 wins three of the last four seasons.

BYU and Colorado State tied for second in the MWC with identical 5-3 records in league play and 6-5 overall. The Cougars will play in their first Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl and are making their first postseason appearance since the 2001 Liberty Bowl. BYU, 7-1 all-time at Sam Boyd Stadium, will face a Pac-10 Conference or at-large opponent. The Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl is scheduled for Dec. 22 at 5 p.m. PT.

The Rams are headed to their ninth bowl in the past 11 seasons and will play Navy (6-4) in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. The game is scheduled for Dec. 22 at Qualcomm Stadium in San Diego, and kick at 7:30 p.m. PT. The Rams have visited San Diego three times to play in the Holiday Bowl. They were defeated by Michigan in 1994 (24-14) and Kansas State in 1995 (54-21), and beat Missouri in 1997 (35-24).

Utah accepted an invitation to play in the fourth-annual Emerald Bowl against an ACC team. The game will be played in San Francisco's SBC Park on Dec. 29 at 1:30 p.m. PT. The Emerald Bowl invitation marks the fourth time in the last five years the Utes have played in a postseason game. Utah, which finished tied for fourth in the MWC at 4-4 (6-5 overall), is 4-0 in bowl games since 1999, including last year's 35-7 victory over Pittsburgh in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl.

1,000-YARD RUSHERS

The Mountain West Conference has four players that have eclipsed 1,000 rushing yards in 2005. New Mexico senior tailback DonTrell Moore currently leads the pack with 1,298 yards, followed by Colorado State sophomore **Kyle Bell** (1,166), BYU junior **Curtis Brown** (1,095) and Utah senior **Quinton Ganther** (1,000). Bell is the first Ram running back to surpass the 1,000-yard mark since Cecil Sapp (1,601) in 2001, and is just the second sophomore in MWC history to reach the 1,000-yard total. Moore also accomplished the feat as a sophomore in 2003 and is the only player in league history to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in four consecutive seasons. Brown is the first Cougar to reach the milestone since Luke Staley ran for 1,582 in 2001, while Ganther becomes the first Ute to hit the mark since Dameon Hunter (1,396) in 2001. The four 1,000-yard rushers in 2005 is second only to 2001 when the league boasted five.

1,000-YARD RECEIVERS

In the seven-year history of the Mountain West, nine wide receivers have reached the 1,000-yard mark. Colorado State senior **David Anderson** accomplished the feat in 2003 (1,293) and has done it again this year with 1,095 yards. Wyoming senior **Jovon Bouknight** had 1,075 yards in 2004 and posted 1,116 this season. Anderson and Bouknight are the only two receivers in MWC history to record 1,000 yard seasons twice. New Mexico senior **Hank Baskett III** is the third MWC wideout to surpass the 1,000 yard mark this season with 1,071 yards. San Diego State senior **Jeff Webb** could become the fourth 1,000-yard receiver in the MWC this season if he can collect 33 yards in the season finale at Hawai'i. The league has never had four 1,000-yard receivers in the same season

3,000-YARD PASSERS

BYU junior John Beck is just the fifth MWC quarterback to pass for 3,000 or more yards in a season. Beck currently leads the Conference and is ranked third in the country with 3,357 passing yards. The other MWC QB's to surpass 3,000 yards in a season are Wyoming's Casey Bramlet on three occasions (2001-02-03), BYU's Kevin Feterik (1999) and Brandon Doman (2001), and San Diego State's Adam Hall (2002).

NEW MEXICO'S MOORE JOINS ELITE NCAA GROUP

New Mexico tailback **DonTrell Moore** became just the sixth player in NCAA Div. I-A history with four 1,000-yard rushing seasons, joining Tony Dorsett (Pittsburgh 1973-76), Amos Lawrence (North Carolina 1977-80), Dennis Manns (New Mexico State 1995-98), Ron Dayne (Wisconsin 1996-99) and Cedric Benson (Texas 2001-04). Moore has 1,298 yards on 275 carries this season.

In the first six years of the MWC, 12 players have reached the 1,000-yard mark in a single season. Moore holds the distinction as the only running back in Conference history to have more than one 1,000-yard rushing season. He collected 1,134 yards as freshman in 2002, 1,450 in 2003 and 1,091 in 2004. Moore is currently the New Mexico and MWC all-time rushing leader with 4,973 yards. He also is currently ranked second nationally among active career rushing leaders behind DeAngelo Williams of Memphis (5,788).

WYOMING'S BOUKNIGHT CONTINUES TO PRODUCE

Wyoming senior wide receiver/kick returner **Jovon Bouknight** is one of the most productive active players in college football. Bouknight ranks among the Top 5 players in the nation in several active career categories -- receptions (250-third), receiving touchdowns (29-third), receiving yards (3,626-third) and all-purpose yards (5,921-fourth). Bouknight has had 12 100-yard receiving games in his career, including six in 2005. He is Wyoming's career leader in all-purpose yards and the Mountain West's all-time leader in career receiving yards.

WINS AGAINST AUTOMATIC-QUALIFYING NON-CONFERENCE BCS CONFERENCES

With five wins vs. non-conference automatic-qualifying BCS opponents, the MWC is tied for third among all 11 Division I-A leagues. The MWC ranks sixth in terms of percentage.

- Air Force concluded the 2005 season with a 4-7 overall record and 3-5 conference mark. The Falcons defeated New Mexico in the season finale, 42-24, snapping a three-game skid to the Lobos.
- The Falcons set an option era record (1980-present) for touchdown passes with 14 this season, surpassing the old mark of 13 set in 2000. Air Force also finished the season with 1,978 yards passing, breaking the old option era record of 1,727 yards in 2000.
- Air Force secured its 22nd conference rushing title this season, averaging 246.5 yards per game. Head coach Fisher DeBerry has led the team to 20 of the titles, including eight straight.
- Air Force has scored in 156 consecutive games dating back to the 1992 Liberty Bowl vs. Mississippi. The 156-game streak is the second-longest among teams in the Mountain West Conference (TCU 163) and ninth-longest in the nation.



- With six wins on the season, BYU is guaranteed of its first winning regular season since 2001. The Cougars will play in the Las Vegas Bowl on Dec. 22, marking their first bowl appearance since 2001.
- QB **John Beck** (3,357) reached the 3,000-yard passing mark against Wyoming and RB **Curtis Brown** (1,095) eclipsed the 1,000-yard rushing mark against Utah. Beck and Brown are the first BYU duo to reach the 3,000 and 1,000-yard plateaus in the same season since 2001 when Brandon Doman passed for 3,542 yards and Luke Staley ran for 1,582 yards. Prior to Saturday's game, USC was the only team in the country that had reached the 3,000 yards passing and the 1,000 yards rushing marks in the same season.
- The Cougars lost 41-34 in overtime to Utah in the regular-season finale Nov. 19. It was BYU's second overtime loss of the season. Entering the 2005 season, BYU was 5-0 in overtime games.



- Colorado State has won at least five league games for the 11th time in Sonny Lubick's 13 seasons as head coach.
- Colorado State had at least one 100-yard receiver in each of the first eight games this season, but have not had a 100-yard receiver in each of the past three contests.
- QB **Justin Holland** has thrown 20 TD's on the season, tying for the top spot with former Rams' Moses Moreno (1997) and Matt Newton (2000).
- Colorado State has 12 pass interceptions in 2005. The Rams totaled eight in 11 contests in 2004.
- P **Jimmie Kaylor** leads the MWC and ranks third nationally in punting average. Kaylor has had nine punts of 50 yards or more in 2005, and three more longer than 60 yards. Additionally, he has had 11 of his 49 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line.
- Colorado State has an 84-5 record (94.4 %) under Sonny Lubick when the Rams lead after three quarters.



- New Mexico set a home average attendance record for the third straight season, averaging 38,341 fans per game.
- New Mexico has recorded at least six wins in five straight seasons for first time in program history.
- The Lobos suffered a 42-24 loss to Air Force in the regular-season finale for both teams. UNM has lost three straight home games for the first time since a four-game slide in 1998. The Lobos finished with a losing record at University Stadium (2-3) for the first time since 1998 (2-4).
- LB **Mike Mohoric** had a career-high 20 tackles against Air Force, surpassing his previous best of 14 last year at Oregon State.



- San Diego State has won consecutive road games (at Utah and at Colorado State) for the first time since the 2000 campaign when the Aztecs won three in a row (at Wyoming, BYU, New Mexico).
- SDSU has won 14 straight games when owning at least a 14-point lead at any point during the game. The Aztecs also improve to 17-2 in the Craft era when leading after three quarters.
- SDSU had a six-game home average of 36,233 fans per contest this season, marking its best attendance average since 1993 (38,477).
- RB **Lynell Hamilton** rushed for 154 yards on 27 carries the last time out vs. Wyoming and has reached the century mark in rushing yards in each of his last two games and three times this season. SDSU is 7-0 when Hamilton reaches 100 yards rushing.
- WR **Jeff Webb** has caught one or more passes in 32 straight games and at least three in 27 consecutive contests. Webb surpassed Patrick Rowe for fourth on the SDSU career receiving yards list with 2,748.



- TCU's 48-point margin of victory over UNLV was its largest since a 52-3 win vs. Arkansas State on Sept. 23, 2000. Six of the Frogs last seven victories have been by at least 14 points.
- TCU has reached 10 wins for the fourth time in the last six seasons. Gary Patterson became the first TCU head coach to record three 10-win seasons. Patterson has been on staff for four of the eight 10-win campaigns in Frog history. He was defensive coordinator under Dennis Franchione in the 2000 season.
- The Frogs are 46-for-50 in the red zone in their 10 wins and 1-for-4 in the one loss.
- QB **Jeff Ballard** has eight rushing touchdowns this season to rank second on the team to TB **Robert Merrill** (9).
- WR **Cory Rodgers** recorded his 17th career touchdown catch vs. UNLV, tying him with Mike Renfro (17, 1974-77) for the top spot in the Frog record book. Rodgers also became the sixth player in TCU history to reach 2,000 career yards receiving (2,065 yards).



- UNLV concluded the season with a five-game losing streak, marking the second straight season the Rebels have ended the year losing five in a row.
- TE **Greg Estandia** led the Rebels in receptions with 49, receiving yards with 563 and touchdowns with seven. Estandia is just the third tight end in school history to lead the Rebels in season receptions, and first since Jack Hansen caught 38 back in 1972.
- DB **Joe Miklos** had 15 tackles (3 solo) vs. Colorado State. It was his fifth straight game with 10 or more tackles.
- LB **Beau Bell** led the MWC in tackles in conference games with 83 (10.4 per game).



- QB **Brett Ratliff** completed 17-of-32 passes for 240 yards and four touchdowns in Utah's 41-34 overtime win at BYU. In his first-ever NCAA Division I-A start, Ratliff also rushed for 112 yards on 19 carries (5.9 yards per rush) and one touchdown.
- RB **Quinton Ganther** ranks No. 3 in the MWC and 28th in the nation, averaging 100.0 yards per game.
- Utah drew 249,215 fans to its six home games this year for an average of 41,536—the second-best home attendance average in school history behind last year's 44,112 mark.
- Utah leads the MWC in total offense and ranks No. 12 in the nation, averaging 466.0 yards per game.



- Wyoming concluded the season with six consecutive losses, marking the Cowboys longest skid since 2001 (8 games).
- Wyoming averaged 20,650 fans this season, marking the best home attendance average since 1990 (21,375).
- WR **Jovon Bouknight** ends his career with a streak of 47 games catching at least one pass. The 47 straight games with a catch is a Wyoming and Mountain West record.
- **Bouknight** moved into the No. 2 spot in career receptions in Wyoming school history with 250. He passed former UW All-American Ryan Yarborough, who had 239 receptions from 1990-93.
- QB **Corey Bramlet** concluded his career in No. 6 position for all-time passing yards in school history this week. Bramlet now has 5,149 career passing yards. He moved past Scott Runyan, who threw for 4,817 yards at Wyoming from 1984-87.

MWC Among Nation's Best for Interceptions

Four of the nine MWC teams rank in the top 25 in the latest NCAA rankings in interceptions. TCU leads the nation with 24, followed by San Diego State tied for 9th with 17. New Mexico is tied for 17th with 15 and Wyoming is 24th with 14.

Home Cooking

Since the start of the 2000 campaign, TCU is 29-4 (.879) in Amon Carter Stadium. The Frogs went 5-0 at home this season and have boasted undefeated marks four occasions since 2000 (2000, 2002, 2003, 2005). The undefeated home records contributed to at least 10 wins in each season.

Ahead of the Class

INSTANT REPLAY IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE

PHILOSOPHY

1. The MWC's instant replay plan is based primarily on the experiment conducted last season by the Big Ten, with the addition of a coaches challenge element. It is not an "NFL-style" approach.
2. The intent of the system is to utilize available technology to identify and correct egregious errors, thus positively impacting the officiating program and enhancing the overall MWC football operation. Preliminary evidence indicates the flow of the game is not significantly disrupted, nor the length of the game excessively extended. Previous experience has shown a "tranquility effect" on the coaches, fans, administrators, etc.
3. A common sense approach is desired, including an understanding that an instant replay system will focus only on significant, reviewable plays. Such a system will not be perfect and errors may still occur. Inasmuch as instant replay is an experiment in 2005, some procedural and technical challenges should be anticipated.
4. It is believed the use of whatever technology is available (e.g., in-stadium video with limited number of cameras vs. national television production) will provide an opportunity to improve the game and is worth pursuing. It is understood the technology (e.g., number of cameras and source) will not necessarily be consistent for every game.
5. The threshold for reviewing/overtaking a play shall include the following:
 - **Indisputable** video evidence.
 - Discernable competitive effect. Subjectivity and judgment will be involved.

THE REVIEW

1. The final replay decision will be made in the booth by the Replay Official, not on the field involving review by the referee.
2. The MWC system in the video replay booth will essentially mirror that used successfully by the Big Ten during the 2004 season. The Replay Official and Replay Assistant will review (utilizing the equipment specified) every play via whichever video source is available (e.g., television OR in-house stadium feed). In the event the necessary thresholds are met for the contest to be interrupted and a play reviewed, the Replay Official will notify the referee (and several other on-field individuals) via the pager system and execute the necessary review. The referee will be notified of the Replay Official's decision whether or not to overturn the ruling on the field. The referee will announce the decision utilizing the public address system and play will resume.
3. The Video Technician will be responsible for maintenance and operation of the booth equipment as assigned, along with other specific responsibilities. The Replay Official will utilize the TiVo unit, permitting him to stop and rewind particular plays/angles. The Replay Assistant will monitor the live feed, as well as the action on the field, and provide coordination assistance and guidance to the Replay Official. A second TiVo unit will be prepared in each booth to be immediately brought online as a back-up if necessary.

THE SOURCE

1. For televised contests ONLY, a feed from the production truck will be utilized. In-house stadium video (two-camera minimum) will be utilized for games that are not televised. The video feed to the replay booth, regardless of source, will not include audio.
2. Every available camera angle (within the available time frame), regardless of the source (e.g., television OR in-house video) shall be provided to the video replay booth without editorial manipulation by the stadium/television personnel.
3. Only a single source of video (i.e., TV production OR in-house video, not both) will be utilized for the replay system.

EQUIPMENT & PERSONNEL

1. Two TiVo units, 23-inch flat screen monitor, 17-inch basic monitor, pager system base unit and two VHS/DVD recorders.
2. The replay crew will consist of three individuals, including the Replay Official, Assistant Replay Official and a Video Technician.
3. The Replay Officials will be considered part of the officiating crew and will be included in the pre-game and post-game meetings of the crew.



INSTANT REPLAY IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE

UTILIZATION

All intra-conference MWC football games will utilize instant replay. The visiting institution for non-conference, crossover contests shall have the option of using replay under the home team's (i.e., home conference's) system. Utilizing an approach jointly agreed upon by the I-A conferences, the Mountain West Conference will distribute a consent form to non-conference opponents no later than July 1, with a required response date of August 1. The I-A members of the Collegiate Commissioners Association have adopted an approach whereby each conference will encourage its institutions to agree to the utilization of instant replay when visiting non-conference opponents.

SCOREBOARD REPLAY POLICY

The existing MWC scoreboard video replay policy will be retained. The current policy permits a controversial play to be shown once at full speed and once at slow motion.

COACHES CHALLENGE

The MWC instant replay system shall include a coaches challenge element structured as follows.

- The head coach is the only individual who may throw the flag to challenge a play.
- Each head coach is entitled to one challenge per half, provided he has a timeout remaining.
- If the initial challenge is upheld, the head coach may have one additional challenge in the half (max. 2 per half).
- If the initial challenge is not upheld, the team loses a timeout and any further opportunity to challenge in that half.
- A head coach who challenges a non-reviewable play on his first challenge loses his challenge opportunity for that half, but does not lose a timeout.
- A head coach who challenges a non-reviewable play on his second challenge opportunity in a half (which he would gain via a successful first challenge) will cause the team to lose a timeout.
- Once a team has exhausted either its timeouts or its challenge opportunities in a half, the referee shall collect the challenge flag from the head coach.
- A team without a timeout remaining in either half may not initiate a challenge.
- The head coach shall not be equipped with a pager to receive notification a play is to be reviewed.
- The recommended approach is that the head coach waits to see if the play will be reviewed and only throws the challenge flag if a play is not reviewed and he desires to challenge.
- A head coach will be charged with a challenge (and subject to the guidelines outlined above) whenever he throws the challenge flag, UNLESS he does so simultaneously with the pager notification to the field a play is to be reviewed. In that one, limited exception, the challenge flag will be returned to the coach without a challenge being charged.
- The replay booth personnel will be responsible for watching for a coaches challenge flag in a goal line-type situation when the officials will be some distance from the team area. If the replay official has not decided to review a play and a head coach throws a challenge flag that is not seen by the officiating crew, the replay booth will immediately activate the pager system to kill the play. However, if a play proceeds before it can be stopped, it will stand.

MEDIA POLICY

The Replay Officials are off-limits to the media. The existing pool reporter approach will be utilized, with the referee as the spokesperson for the entire crew. If appropriate, the referee will consult with the replay official before meeting with the pool reporter. Should an appropriate MWC staff member be in attendance, that person would assume the responsibility of consulting with the referee and the Replay Official on any issues, then meeting with the pool reporter.

REVIEWABLE PLAYS

Plays that **MAY** be reviewed with the use video replay:

1. Plays governed by sideline, goal line and end line:
 - a. Scoring plays, including breaking the plane of the goal line.
 - b. Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line, goal line.
 - c. Runner/receiver in or out of bounds.
 - d. Recovery of loose ball in bounds.
2. Passing Plays:
 - a. Pass ruled complete/incomplete/intercepted in the field of play and end zones.
 - b. Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver.
 - c. Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player.
 - d. Quarterback (passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, the play is finalized).
 - e. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing beyond the line of scrimmage.
 - f. Illegal forward pass or illegal handing after change of possession.
 - g. Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage.
3. Other detectable infractions:
 - a. Runner ruled not down.
 - b. Forward progress errors with respect to first down.
 - c. Touching of a kick.
 - d. Number of players on field.
 - e. Clock adjustments.
 - f. Fourth-down/try fumble plays.

Plays that **MAY NOT** be reviewed with the use of video replay:

1. Holding.
2. Offside/encroachment.
3. Pass interference.
4. Personal fouls (e.g., late hits).
5. Illegal blocks.
6. Illegal formations.
7. Face mask.
8. Taunting/excessive celebration.
9. False starts.
10. Roughing the passer/kicker.
11. Fighting participants.
