LOBOS HEAD TO NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2000, 11TH TIME IN LAST 13 YEARS

TEEING OFF: The University of New Mexico men's golf team begins play in the 2002 NCAA Championships on Wednesday, May 29, in Columbus, Ohio. The four-day tournament runs through Saturday, June 1, and will be played at the Scarlet Course hosted by The Ohio State University. The field is comprised of 30 teams and six individuals. The Lobos, ranked 23rd in the *Golfweek* poll, qualified for the NCAA Championships by winning the West Regional May 16-18 in Albuquerque. UNM is back in the NCAA Championships for the first time since 2000 and the second time in four years, after qualifying nine straight years from 1990-98.

THE COURSE: The NCAA Championships are being played at The Ohio State University Scarlet Course. Established in 1938 and designed by Dr. Alister MacKenzie, The Scarlet Course has been host to the USGA Junior Championship, U.S. Open Qualifier, AJGA Tournament of Champions, Big Ten Championships, and nine NCAA Championships. The par-71, 7,236-yard Scarlet Course has a competitive record of 66 and a noncompetitive record of 64.

THE FIELD: The NCAA Championships consist of 30 teams and six individuals which all qualified through regional play May 16-18. Twenty of the teams are ranked in the *Golfweek* Top-25. The field consists of (ranking in parentheses): Georgia Tech (1), Clemson (2), Florida (4), Oklahoma St. (5), Texas (6), TCU (7), Auburn (9), Georgia (10), N .C. State (11), Washington (13), Fresno St. (15), Augusta St. (16), Toledo (17), Virginia Tech (18), Purdue (19), Pepperdine (20), Baylor (21), Minnesota (22), New Mexico (23), Arizona (24), Alabama-Birmingham, Colorado, Georgia Southern, Illinois, UNLV, North Carolina, Pacific, Texas Tech, Tulsa, and VCU. The individuals who qualified are: Brandt Snedeker-Vanderbilt (24), Eric Jorgenson-Michigan St. (34), Tom Johnson-Northwestern (53), Franklin Hatchett-SMU (84), John Merrick-UCLA (94), and Mark Warman-San Diego St. (99).

HEAD COACH GLEN MILLICAN: The Lobos began the 2001-02 season with a new head coach in former player Glen Millican. Millican was named UNM's seventh coach since World War II on June 25, 2001, replacing J.T. Higgins, who departed for Texas A&M after four years in the Cherry and Silver. The 26-year old Millican served as the Lobos' assistant from 1998-2001, following his graduation from UNM in 1998. He was a four-year letterwinner for the Lobos and played in the 1997 NCAA Championships. Millican was an Academic All-American in 1997.

He is assisted by another former Lobo, Ryan Murphy (UNM '97). Murphy was also a four-year letterwinner for the Lobos and competed in the NCAA Championships in each of his seasons (1993-96). He was an Academic All-American in 1996 and has been playing professionally the last few years.

NEW MEXICO BACK IN THE BIG DANCE: UNM is returning to the NCAA Men's Golf Championships after a one-year hiatus in 2001. The Lobos did not qualify for nationals last year, finishing tied for 19th of 27 in the West Regional. Prior to this season, UNM had missed the NCAA Championships twice in three years - something that had not happened since 1982-84. The Lobos have now advanced to the NCAA Championships 11 times in the last 13 years. Through the 1998 Championships, New Mexico was one of just eight schools to have made at least nine straight NCAA Championship appearances from 1990-98. UNM has advanced to the national championships 26 times in the 36 years since 1967, and the Lobos have been represented at

22, the Lobos captured their own William H. Tucker Intercollegiate, then for an encore won the Adams Cup in Newport, R.I. It marked the first time in recent school history that UNM had won its first two starts of the season. The Tucker victory was the Lobos' seventh overall and their first since 1992 - and it came in head coach Glen Millican's very first tournament.

THIRD WIN COMES AT REGIONALS: The Lobos picked up their third team victory of the season - actually tying for the title - at the 2002 NCAA West Regionals in Albuquerque May 16-18. UNM earned its second regional co-championship, tying with Washington at 872 (+8). UNM, which was in sixth place heading into Saturday's final round, shot 284 (-4), the lowest one-day team score in the tournament, to surge into the top spot. Scott Hailes led the way, shooting 215 (-1) to finish tied for fourth, and in the third round, no Lobo shot higher than 73. The victory came in UNM head coach Glen Millican's first season; ironically, in 1998, when the Lobos tied Arizona for the West Regional title, then-head coach J.T. Higgins was also in his first season.

2000-01 IN REVIEW: New Mexico had one of the most successful seasons in school history and one of the most frustrating in school history all in the same year. The Lobos set a school record by winning three team titles to secure their spot as one of the elite teams in the nation. However, the momentum came to a screeching halt when UNM failed to qualify for the NCAA Championships - the Lobos were 19th at the regional and needed to finish 10th - for just the third time in 17 years. UNM finished 18th in the national polls and captured team honors in the Pepperdine Intercollegiate, the John Burns Invitational and the Border Olympics. Additionally, senior Rob Kortan captured medalist honors at Pepperdine and Michael Letzig blew away the field at the John Burns by shooting a school-record 199 (-17). In the Mountain West Conference Championships, UNM finished fourth - the first time in 17 years the team failed to crack the top three - then placed 19th in the NCAA West Regional, placing them out of position for a run at the national title. Still, the team had solid individual performances throughout, as Wil Collins and Letzig were named all-conference and senior Joel Hendry had a stroke average of 72.92, eighth-best in school history. Additionally, Collins won the Hogan Award for the nation's top student-athlete male golfer and head coach J.T. Higgins was named MWC Coach of the Year.

GLEN MILLICAN

HEAD COACH NEW MEXICO '98 (FIRST YEAR)

The University of New Mexico men's golf program decided to stay in-house when it hired Glen Millican as its new head coach on June 25, 2001. The 26-year-old Millican becomes just the seventh mentor for Lobo golf since World War II, but he is welcomed with open arms into the small fraternity with which he has much in common. Millican, who played for UNM from 1993-98, joins the ever-growing family tree of former players who have returned to coach their alma mater.

Millican served as an assistant to former coach J.T. Higgins for three years, after spanning his playing career under Higgins (1998) and Fields (1993-97). A 1998 UNM graduate, Millican was a three-year letterwinner for the Lobos, who played in the 1997 NCAA Championships. He was an Academic All-America in 1997 with a 3.34 GPA, and he graduated in the spring of 1998 with degrees in general management and human resources. Millican recently earned his MBA at the Anderson School of Management, graduating in the spring of 2000.

While an assistant coach at UNM, Millican was involved in several aspects of fundraising and recruiting, as well as using his experience on the links to evaluate and teach the game. During his tenure, the Lobos were consistently listed in the top-20, achieving a ranking as high as eighth in 2001, and qualified for the 2000 NCAA Championships. A total of four players earned Academic All-America accolades and two were named All-America for their performance on the course.

Additionally, the Lobos featured the conference Freshman of the Year in both 1999 (Wil Collins) and 2000 (Michael Letzig), as well as the 2001 Hogan Award winner (Collins). All 10 seniors who came to term while Millican was on board graduated, and the team GPA was above 3.00 in each of his six semesters on staff, with a high of 3.30 in the Spring of 2000. The Lobos had some dominating performances on the course as well, including a school-record three tournament victories in 2000-01. The team shattered the school scoring mark at the John Burns Intercollegiate in February, with an 832 (-32), 10 strokes better than the previous UNM record.

During his three years as an assistant, Lobo golf made tremendous strides in improving the state of the program. The Top-100 Club, UNM's golf booster arm, raised over \$250,000 and the Patty Howard Golf Complex was constructed, giving both the men's and women's teams new administrative offices.

Millican had seven top-10 finishes during his playing career from 1994-98. His top showing was a seventh-place tie at the 1994 Red River Classic as a freshman. He also tied for 11th at the 1997 Western Athletic Conference Championships. His career stroke average was 75.06 in 80 rounds. He had a low 18-hole round of 67 and a low 54-hole round of 214 (-2) at the 1996 Red River Classic. He also won the 1997 Albuquerque City Championship. Millican is a 1993 graduate of North Garland HS in Garland, Texas.

Millican is married to the former Megan Precek. The couple celebrated their one-year wedding anniversary in July 2001.



RYAN MURPHY

ASSISTANT COACH NEW MEXICO '97 (FIRST YEAR)

Ryan Murphy begins his first season as an assistant coach for UNM, having played for the Lobos for four years and competed professionally in several local and national tournaments. Murphy is in charge of several administrative duties, in addition to fundraising and recruiting, as well as handling the Top-100 Club functions.

Murphy was a four-year letterwinner for New Mexico from 1993-97 under John Fields. He twice earned academic All-America honors for his performance in the classroom. Murphy had a career stroke average of 75.04 and played in the NCAA Championships each of his four seasons.

A native of Lovington, N.M., Murphy earned his bachelor's degree in criminology and psychology at UNM in 1997. He received his master's degree in Sports Administration in May 2001. Murphy's older brother, Sean, also attended UNM, where he was a four-year letterman on the Lobo golf team from 1985-88. Sean is currently playing on the PGA Tour. Ryan caddied for his older brother at the 1997 U.S. Open.

Scott Hailes (West Bountiful, Utah) is a senior in his third year at UNM after spending his freshman year at Wright State, prior to a two-year Mormon mission. He leads the Lobos with a 72.24 stroke average, which is the fourth-lowest in school history for a single season. He was named all-Mountain West Conference and he has a streak of five consecutive top-10 showings coming into to the tournament, the longest since Tim Herron did so in 1991-92. Hailes best finish of the year was second at the Mountain West

Conference Championships, and his best score was 208 (-8) at the ASU Thunderbird/Savane Invitational, in which he placed seventh. Hailes low round on the year is a 66, which he shot at Arizona State.

Wil Collins (Rapid City, S.D.) is a senior who was an All-American as a freshman and has been named all-conference three times (1999, 2001, 2002) during his career. He also won the 2001 Hogan Award, given to the top student-athlete men's golfer in the nation. He is third on the team with a 73.03 stroke average and he is second on the team with 17 rounds at par or better and 11 rounds at 70 or better. Collins won the individual crown at the Adams Cup in Newport, R.I., in October, shooting 207 (-4), and he has three wins in his career. His low tournament of the season is the 207 he shot in Rhode Island, and his low round of the year is a 67 at the Tucker.
