# 2007-08 Rifle Season Preview

## Mids face the challenge of replacing two four-time All-Americans.

Navy rifle head coach Bill Kelley knows the challenge that faces him and the Navy rifle squad this year.

After all, it is not too often you have to replace a four-time All-American, let alone two of them. But that is the challenge staring at Kelley this year as he enters his ninth year in charge.

"Obviously, losing Sarah Bergman and Chris Schneider after what they did here for four years is going to be a blow for us. They were very, very successful here and were a big reason in what we accomplished over the last four years," said Kelley. "But we can't dwell on it. We have to attack this year the same way we would attack any year. There are talented shooters on this team and they just need to rise up and take control. I am confident they will do that."

Despite the loss of Bergman and Schneider, Kelley still has reason for optimism, returning four letterwinners from last year's squad.

"This group has been working hard and many of them have match experience," said Kelley. "Putting it all together will be the key."

"Our goals are going to be the same year in and year out," continued Kelley. "Beating Army, making the NCAA Tournament and then finishing in the top four at NCAA's are our goals every year. Those are realistic challenges, providing that this team can work hard and perform at a high level."

For Navy to reach those goals, the smallbore discipline must improve.

"We struggled at times in the smallbore discipline last year, especially late in the season," said Kelley. "For us to have a successful year, we have to be better in smallbore. Our air rifle is right up there with the top teams in the country, but the smallbore discipline needs to get better."

Leading the way will be the 2007 NCAA Smallbore Champion, Josh Albright. Albright was Navy's first NCAA champion of any kind since 1996 and just the second NCAA rifle champion in school history. Albright had a good junior year, then turned it on at the NCAA Championships, surging ahead on the ninth shot of the 10-shot final round in claiming the NCAA title.

Albright averaged a 576.8 in smallbore a year ago, ranking fifth on the all-time 60-shot list at Navy, and he has recorded two of the top five all-time overall aggregate scores.

"Albright obviously had a strong year last year and we are hoping for more of the same," said Kelley. "He is a senior this year, so we are hoping for more leadership from him. He has had a strong offseason, so we really need him to step up all year and perform the way he can."

Team captain

Monica Amagna returns for her senior season after a strong junior year. Amagna recorded a 578.8 average in air rifle (fifth on the team) a year ago, while compiling a 564.9 average in smallbore for an overall of 1144.6.

Other seniors that will contribute this year are Luke Marion (1127.5 overall average last year) and Christina Schade

(1123.5 overall average last year). Schade was particularly strong in air rifle, compiling a 570.7 average.

Leading the juniors is Constantia, N.Y., native Lisa Kunzelman. Kunzelman has had a remarkable career already in the air rifle, earning a pair of All-America honors, and ranking third and fourth on the 60-shot air rifle school record list. She averaged a 585.4 as a freshman, before coming in with a 584.9 last year as a sophomore. Her score of 594 against University of the Sciences last year was the second-best air rifle score in school history.

As a freshman, her overall aggregate average of 1159.6 was the fifth-best mark in school history.

"She has had a fantastic career already, and with her improvement in smallbore, she is becoming very well-rounded," said Kelley. "We are looking for big things from her this year."

Another junior Alex Karacsonyi competed at the NCAA Tournament last year, excelling in the air rifle by posting 10 scores over 580. However, Karacsonyi struggled late in the year in the smallbore. In his first 11 matches a year ago in smallbore, Karacsonyi averaged 567.8. However, in his last three matches, including the NCAA Championships, Karacsonyi averaged just 544.7. Kelley is hoping for better consistency out of the junior.

"He has having a great year going last year until the last two matches," said Kelley. "We are hoping he can regain his form from early in the year and really be able to contribute in both disciplines."

Junior Crystal Piraino (567.0 air rifle average) may also contribute, especially in the air rifle discipline.

None of the four sophomores on the roster saw significant action last year, with no one appearing in more than seven matches. However, Kelley thinks the talent is there for someone in the group to step up.

"There is definitely some talent there, but they just need to prove it," said Kelley. "They have had good preseason workouts, but they need to step up and prove themselves in matches."

Kelley is also hoping that six freshmen may also be able to contribute. The most likely of candidates is Chris Burleson or Kenan Wang, but it may be too early to tell what either of them can do.

The Mids once again face a challenging schedule, highlighted by matches against defending champion Alaska-Fairbanks and Army. Kelley is once again hoping for improvement as the year goes on, a trademark of Kelley-coached teams.

"The last couple of years we have started slow, but really picked it up in the second half of the season," said Kelley. "If we can have the same kind of improvement, I will be pretty pleased. It is just going to be a different kind of year this year. The last four years, we had two constants in our lineup. We knew what we were getting. This year, we don't have that, so different people may be contributing every week. It creates some competition between us and, hopefully, can drive some shooters to improve."

# Head Coach Bill Kelley

**9th Year as Navy Head Coach - Gardner-Webb (1974)**

**Career Record: 84-10 Record at Navy: 84-10**

Navy head coach Bill Kelley enters his ninth year at the helm of the Navy rifle program, posting an outstanding 84-10 (.894) record. In his short time at Navy, Kelley has transformed the Mids into a national power, competing for the NCAA title all eight years that Kelley has been in charge.

Last year, the Mids placed seventh overall at the NCAA Championships. After a disappointing team performance in the smallbore discipline on day one, Navy rallied on day two to finish fifth in the air rifle discipline. However, senior Josh Albright became Navy's first national champion since 1996, when he won the smallbore competition at the NCAA Championship, rallying in the 10-shot finals. He had entered the finals in second, but surged ahead with his ninth shot in the finals, then held on with his final shot for the victory.

Two years ago, the Mids placed fourth overall at the NCAA Championships, Navy's third consecutive top-five finish. In addition to the high placing at NAAs, Kelley guided Navy to a 9-2 record and another MAC title. Perhaps the most telling statistic of Navy's resurgence in rifle is its 6-2 record under Kelley against Army.

In 2005, the Mids placed fifth at the NCAA Championship, posted an 11-0 dual-meet record and defeated Alaska-Fairbanks and Army in highly-anticipated dual meets.

In 2004, Navy rifle posted another impressive season, finishing third at the NCAA Championship as five Mids took home All-America honors. Kelley's Mids posted a second-place finish in air rifle.

In his previous five years, Kelley led the Mids to a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Championships in 2002 and a sixth-place finish in the NCAA Air Rifle Championship in 2003.

In his first year on The Yard, Kelley coached Navy to an undefeated season.

Thirteen different athletes have earned All-America honors during Kelley's tenure, including current team members, senior Josh Albright and junior Lisa Kunzelman.

Chris Schneider and Sarah Bergman, both 2007 grads, became just the third and fourth shooters in school history to be named to the All-America squad four times.

In addition to the All-Americans, Kelley has coached several shooters to Junior Olympic and AAU victories. Last summer, he helped a relatively unrecruited shooter, Lisa Kunzelman, earn a spot on U.S. Junior World Team and a top-30 finish at the World Championships in her first international competition.

Prior to joining the Naval Academy family, Kelley served as the rifle coach at

Cresap Rifle Club in Frederick, Md. While there, he trained countless highly successful shooters at local, regional and national matches. He also coached the fifth-ranked finalist at the National Junior Olympic Shooting Championship.

In 1992-95, Kelley coached the Maryland resident qualifier in the Junior Olympic Shooting Championship, and in 1995 he co-coached the National Intermediate Junior Champion Rifle Team.

In 1996, Kelley worked on the production staff for shooting events at the Olympic Games and World Cup in Atlanta. He received the Diploma of Honour Award from the Union Internationale de Tir (international Olympic governing body) for service to the shooting sports that same year.

Kelley is certified by the National Rifle Association (NRA) as a smallbore rifle coach. He was selected as one of approximately 30 coaches in the United States to train other coaches as a member of the National Coach Development Staff.

He authored Shooting is Fun...At Least it Used to Be, which addresses the problem of burnout among collegiate shooters and suggests remedies. The NRA Shooting Sports USA and NRA Shooting Education Update accepted the article for publication.

Kelley resides in Frederick, Md., with his wife, Liz. Kelley's youngest son, Josh, is a 2000 graduate of the Naval Academy and was a two-time All-American in rifle. Coach Kelley is the founder and owner of the Gun Center, a full-time retail store in Frederick, Md.

**2006-07:** Albright capped off a strong junior year by winning the individual smallbore title at the NCAA Championship, becoming the first Navy shooter since 1996 to win the smallbore title ... despite winning the NCAA title, was named a second-team All-American in smallbore ...with the national title, Albright received an automatic spot on the United States National Developmental Team ... scored four of Navy's top 10 smallbore scores and two of Navy's top air rifle scores ... led the Mids with a 576.8 smallbore average and was fourth with a 581.5 air rifle average ... his smallbore season average was the fifth-best 60-shot scoring average in school history ... was the MAC Champion in smallbore (580), air rifle (590) and overall (1170) ... shot at least 580 four times in smallbore and at least 590 in air rifle twice ... his overall score of 1170 against both Alaska-Fairbanks and Akron led Navy in 2006-07, and he recorded four of the top 10 overall scores. **2005-06:** Was the only Navy shooter to earn All-America accolades in both disciplines, garnering second-team honors in smallbore and honorable mention in air rifle ... was named named first-team All-MAC in both disciplines ... ranked second in the MAC in smallbore average and third in air rifle ... had a strong NCAA Tournament, leading the Mids in both disciplines (580 smallbore; 586 air rifle) ... fired a season-best 587 in smallbore against John Jay ... shot a 590 against the Coast Guard and added 589s twice in air rifle ... was under 580 just once in air rifle and just three times in smallbore. **2004-05:** Albright had a strong freshman campaign, earning All-MAC accolades ... Albright competed in 12 matches during the year, including in smallbore at the NCAA Tournament, where he shot a 581 ... claimed top honors at the President's Trophy in smallbore with a career-best 588 ... tallied an 1171 (586 in sb, 585 in air) against Alaska-Fairbanks ... his 585 against the Nanooks was a career high ... was over 580 five times in smallbore ... medaled at the USA Shooting National Championships in the 50-meter prone competition ... finished third at the National Junior Olympics 50-meter three-position competition. **High School:** Member of National Honor Society and Student Council in high school. **Personal:** Son of Jeff and Melanie Albright ... brother, Matt, was an three-time All-American at Navy (2003-05) ... born May 14, 1985. ... majoring in mechanical engineering.

# Scoring and Gun Specifications

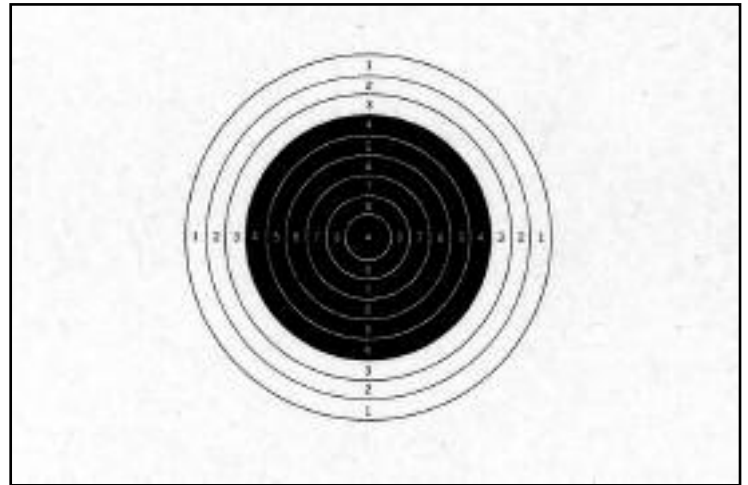
## Air Rifle

**Overview:** Competitors stand and shoot lead pellets from .177 caliber guns at targets 10 meters away. The bull's-eye, or 10-dot, is one-half millimeter wide (about the size of the period at the end of this sentence).

**The rifles:** Air rifles can be either air or gas-powered and weigh up to 12 pounds by NCAA regulations. The rifles have metallic sights.

**Course of fire:** Depending on the type of target changing system used, competitors have 65 or 80 minutes for 60 shots from the standing position.

**Perfect match score:** A perfect score of 600 is the maximum for air rifle.



## Smallbore

**Overview:** In smallbore or three-position rifle, athletes fire .22-caliber smallbore rifles from the prone, standing and kneeling positions at targets 50 feet downrange. The bull's-eye is one-third of a millimeter (slightly larger than the period at the end of this sentence).

**The rifles:** Athletes shoot free rifles (weight limit 17.6 pounds) that can be customized with special accessories and/or alterations that fit the shooter's size and preferences. The rifles have metallic sights.

**Course of fire:** Athletes fire 20 rounds per position for a total of 60 shots. The total time limit is 135 minutes.

**Perfect match score:** A perfect score of 600 is the maximum for smallbore.



# Glossary of Rifle Terms

---

**Air rifle:** A weapon that uses a .177 caliber lead pellet propelled by compressed air or gas instead of a gunpowder charge. The rifles can weigh up to 12.12 pounds.

**Bull:** Short for bull's-eye. There are 12 bulls per target, 10 for competition and two for sighting shots. The 10-ring is actually a dot in the center of the bull's-eye. In smallbore, the 10-dot is slightly smaller than in the air rifle.

**Center 10:** When the shot hole is tangent to or completely takes out the 10-dot in the target.

**Cleaned:** A perfect target, in which the shooter hits a 10 on each of the 10 targets on the sheet for a perfect score of 100. Can also be used to refer to a perfect match.

**Finals:** The top-eight competitors advance to a 10-shot final round with 75 seconds allotted per shot. In the smallbore, the shots are fired in the standing position. The final is calculated in tenths of a point and added to the match score to determine winners. A perfect final score is 109.

**Front sight:** The sight attached to the end of the barrel of the rifle, holding the front aperture.

**Full course:** In smallbore, a full course consists of 120-record shots, 40 in each position, fired in the following order: prone, standing, kneeling. In air rifle, a full course is 40 shots.

**Half course:** In smallbore, a half course consists of 60 shots, 20 in each position (offhand, kneeling and prone). There is no half course in air rifle.

**Inner 10:** An inner 10 in smallbore is a shot that when plugged with an inward scoring gauge is touching the 10-dot and is tangent to the outside edge of the eight-ring or closer to the center. An inner 10 with air rifle is a shot in which the 10-dot is completely covered by the inward scoring gauge. Also known as 'center 10' or an 'X'. Inner 10's are scored to break ties.

**Iron sights:** Sights that employ no magnification.

**Junior:** Standing held until Jan. 1 of the calendar year in which the shooter becomes 21 years old. Juniors can compete in senior events.

**Kneeling:** Shooting from a kneeling position with the offhand (non-trigger side) supported by the off knee.

**Offhand:** The unsupported standing position (shooting 'off the hand' rather than with the non-trigger arm supported on a knee or the floor).

**Outer plug:** A device used for scoring to determine the actual location of a shot.

**Perfect match score:** In air rifle, 400 is perfect, while in smallbore, 1200 is perfect.

**Plug:** A metal device the same size as the shot hole, used to score targets. Variations include the 'inner plug' and 'outer plug.' With the inner plug, the scored is determined by the contact point of the outside edge of the plug with the inside of the next lowest scoring ring. With an outer plug, the score is determined by the contact point of the outer edge of the plug with the inside of the scoring ring.

**Prone:** Shooting from a lying position.

**Range officer:** The person in charge of timing the match and 'running the line,' which includes assisting shooters who are having difficulties and enforcing rules governing the match.

**Record shots:** Also known as 'for record shots,' those shots that are counted toward the match score, with 'sighters' not included.

**Relay:** Shooters firing the match at once at a designated time.

**Shooting glove:** A padded glove or mitt, with or without fingers, used to ensure the comfort of the non-dominant hand (i.e., a right-handed shooter wears a glove on the left hand) as the shooter supports the rifle.

**Shooting jacket:** The jacket is made of leather or canvas and provides support and pads the shooter to minimize the effect of pulse and recoil. There are strict guidelines regarding the thickness.

**Shooting shoes:** Street-like or light athletic shoes designed for rifle shooting. They often have the toe end of the sole and the heel cut flat for stability.

**Shooting trousers:** Snug canvas and/or leather pants usually worn over another pair of comfortable pants. They often have padded reinforcements sewn on both knees and the seat to prevent the slipping of elbows and knees when firing from the kneeling position.

**Sighting shots/sighters:** Practice shots taken before going 'for record shots.' Sighting shots are unlimited and may be fired before the beginning of each position. Once the first record shot in a position has been fired, no further sighting shots are permitted.

**Sling:** Adjustable straps with buckle adjustments and arm cuffs that provide stability. A sling is attached to the rifle and helps to support it.

**Smallbore:** A .22 caliber weapon with a metallic sight used in competition. It can be customized with special accessories and/or alterations (barrel length and style, stock, design, etc.) to fit the shooter's needs and comforts.

**Spotting scope:** A type of telescope used to locate shot holes.

**Tie breaking:** In NCAA competition, ties are broken as follows: 1) by the highest number of inner 10s, 2) by the highest number of 10s, 9s, 8s, etc.

# Rear Admiral Willis A. Lee, USN

## Class of 1908

The modern Navy rifle team owes much of its purpose and recognition in the sport to one man - Rear Adm. Willis A. Lee. Lee was a graduate of the Naval Academy in 1908, just 63 years after its founding in 1845. His accomplishments, both on the rifle range and on the ships of World War II, have often been forgotten in the annals of history. However, his successes in both arenas have allowed for the Midshipmen of today to live their dreams and become the next great Naval war heroes.

Willis Augustus Lee, Jr., was born in Natlee, Kentucky, on May 11, 1888. Following his graduation from the Academy, he was assigned to the battleship Idaho from October 1908 - May 1909 until returning to the Navy rifle team in the summer of 1909. The next few years saw him serve on numerous battleships around the world, while also making time to return to Annapolis to be a member of the Naval rifle squad.

In the summer of 1920, he earned a spot on the American Olympic team at the Summer Olympics in Antwerp, Belgium. His experiences as a sharpshooter at the Academy paid off. He was one of the most successful Olympians of all time with his seven medal (five golds, one silver and one bronze) effort at the games. Lee also teamed with Capt. Cyrus T. Osburn to win an additional four gold, one silver and one bronze during the same Olympic games.

Following his summer in Europe, Lee returned to ship duty and was promoted to command of William B. Preston in Newport, R.I., in June 1921 and led it to the Asiatic Station via the Suez Canal.

It was not until the Spring of 1929 that Lee completed the senior course at the Navy War College, which was done in the midst of serving other duties and also returning to Annapolis as captain of the All-Navy rifle team.

During the time of the Fall of 1930 into the Spring of 1931, he again served duty in various tasks, including in the Division of Fleet Training and Office of the Chief of Naval Operations before joining the flagship of the U.S. Fleet, Pennsylvania, as its navigator and later commanding officer.

Once again, he bounced between jobs on the battleships and office jobs in Washington, D.C. Then he earned a place on the staff of Concord, which was led by Rear Adm. Harold R. Stark, Cmdr., Cruisers, Battle Force. From December 1938 to May 1939, he served as the Chief of Staff under Rear Adm. Stark.

Prior to his deployment to the Pacific theater in World War II, in August 1942, he was appointed as the assistant chief of staff to the Commander in Chief, U.S. Fleet. By the time he had entered the war as commander of the Pacific Fleet's battleships, he earned the title of Rear Admiral and was given the duties of commander to the Battleship Division six and Battleship Squadron two.

On the Pacific Front on November 14-15, 1942, he led a task force that throttled

the Japanese attempts to recapture lost positions on Guadalcanal. His command proved to be a decisive victory for the U.S., as his flagship, Washington, used 16-inch guns to destroy and sink the Japanese battleship Kirishima.

Teaming with strong carrier aircraft, Lee led the U.S. forces to the capture of the

Gilbert Islands and attack of Nauru Island in November 1943. His leadership proved vital to the U.S. Pacific victory, as the battleships moved across the water swiftly and strongly and served as floating anti-aircraft batteries.

The battleships also were used as screens to carriers and troops engaging in the war in the Saipan-Tinian area in the Summer of 1944. Two weeks after American forces began the two-front war with D-Day, the American Task Force 38 was under attack from the Japanese carrier-based planes during the Battle of the Philippine Sea. At this instance, he directed the deployment of battleships that resulted in many of the enemy planes being shot down.

A very humble person who never bragged about his accomplishments, Lee received the Navy Cross, the Legion of Merit, the Distinguished Service Medal (DSM) and a gold star in lieu of a second DSM.

While returning to his flagship Wyoming, he died unexpectedly of a heart attack on August 25, 1945 off the coast of Maine. He has since been buried with honors in Section six of Arlington National Cemetery.

On October 5, 1954, the USS Willis A. Lee (DL-4) destroyer was commissioned and served duty along the Atlantic and Caribbean seaboards before its final voyage on June 5, 1973.

Each year, on the anniversary of his death, the Navy rifle team pays tribute to Lee by visiting his grave and laying a wreath in his honor. It is a vivid reminder to the Midshipmen of today that without Willis A. Lee, the U.S. Navy might have been forever changed in World War II.

# NAVAL ACADEMY

## ANNAPOLIS

The City of Annapolis has been home to the Naval Academy for all but four years since the founding of the school in 1845 on the grounds of what originally was the Army's Fort Severn. The Academy moved its location to Newport, Rhode Island, from 1861-1865 during the Civil War.

## ANCHORS AWEIGH

"Anchors Aweigh" was written by Lt. Charles Zimmerman, musical director of the Naval Academy, in 1906, with the lyrics provided by Alfred H. Miles '06 as a fight song for the 1907 graduating class. The song made its debut at the 1906 Army-Navy game and when the Mids won, the song became traditional at the contest.

Stand Navy down the field,  
Sails set to the sky,  
We'll never change our course,  
So Army you steer shy.  
Roll up the score, Navy,  
Anchors Aweigh,  
Sail Navy down the field,  
And sink the Army,  
And sink the Army Grey

## BANCROFT HALL

Named after the former Secretary of the Navy (1845-46) and founder of the Naval Academy George Bancroft, Bancroft Hall serves as the dormitory for the entire Brigade of Midshipmen. Its 33 acres of floor space and nearly five miles of hallways makes it one of the largest dorms in the world.

## BRIGADE OF MIDSHIPMEN

The 4,200-member student body at the Naval Academy is called the Brigade of Midshipmen.

The Brigade is organized into ...

- 2 regiments
- 6 battalions
- 30 companies

## BILL THE GOAT

The first recorded use of a goat as the mascot for Navy teams was in 1893 when an animal named El Cid (the Chief) was presented to the Brigade by officers of the USS New York. El Cid helped Navy to a 6-4 win over Army that year and a goat became the permanent mascot of the Academy in 1904.



## BLUE & GOLD

Now, colleges from sea to sea  
May sing of colors true;  
But who has better right than we

## CLASS RANKS

First-year students at the Naval Academy are referred to as "plebes" during their initial or "Fourth Class" year in school, while sophomores at Navy, members of the "Third Class," are called "youngsters." Juniors at the school are designated as "Second Class," with seniors called "Firsties" in reference to their "First Class" year.

## CO-ED

Women were first admitted to the Naval Academy during the summer of 1976. Today, women comprise roughly 15 percent of the student body.

## COMMISSIONED OFFICERS

When a student graduates from the Naval Academy, they have the option to enter either the Navy or the Marine Corps as an officer. If they choose to join the Navy, they are commissioned as Ensigns, while those entering the Marine Corps are given the rank of Second Lieutenant.

## JOHN PAUL JONES

The crypt of John Paul Jones, considered America's first naval leader and hero, is located below the Naval Academy Chapel.

The native of Scotland was born in 1747, and travelled to the colonies to assist America during the Revolutionary War. His ship never lost a battle as he reached a rank of captain in the Continental Navy.

Jones died in 1792 in Paris, France, and was buried there. His remains were returned to the United States in 1905 and he was interred at the Naval Academy eight years later.

## MARINE CORPS

Those officers entering the Marine Corps have the choice of service selecting one of the following fields ...

- Aviation -- air command and control, anti-air warfare, aviation maintenance, aviation supply, pilot, naval flight officer.
- Ground -- armor, artillery, communications (information systems), engineering, financial management, infantry\*, logistics, military police



## MIDSHIPMAN

The original 17th Century meaning of the word "midshipmen" designated those men who stood watch "amidships", or in the middle portion of a ship. The middle "s" was later dropped to give the current form of the word.

Midshipmen were originally young boys who were apprenticed to sea captains to learn the trade.

In the early days of the Navy, midshipmen were trained aboard ship until they were commissioned as ensigns.

## NAVY

Graduates of the Naval Academy entering the Navy have the following service options available to them ...

- Aviation -- flight officer, pilot
- Nuclear Propulsion -- ships, submarines
- Restricted Line and Staff Corps -- civil engineering, cryptology, intelligence, maintenance, medicine, meteorology/oceanography, supply
- Special Operations -- explosive ordinance disposal, explosive ordinance management, mine countermeasures, operational diving and salvage,
- Navy SEALs
- Surface Warfare -- conventional, nuclear powered
- Submarines



## NICKNAME

The official nickname for all of Navy's athletic teams is Midshipmen. "Mids" is an appropriate nickname, while "Middie" is inappropriate.

## N-STAR

Members of varsity teams who qualify for the varsity letter receive an N-Star for their letter sweaters if they participate in a victory over Army in any sport-designated Star Game.

The varsity N and corresponding N-Star were initiated during the early 1890s.

## SCHOOL COLORS

Each class at the Naval Academy produced their own set of class colors until 1892 when Navy Blue and Gold were established as the official colors for the entire Naval Academy.

## SUMMER TRAINING

Summers remain a busy and challenging time of year for midshipmen. Their initial tenure at the Naval Academy begins around July 1 prior to the start of the freshman year at the school with "Plebe Summer." Instead of taking academic classes, plebes receive military indoctrination and learn basic seamanship and sailing.

The summer following plebe year is spent aboard various ships to gain knowledge and experience of the workings of the Navy. Included in this time is a three-week cruise aboard either a 44-foot Naval Academy sailboat or a Yard Patrol craft traveling on the East Coast.

Portions of the summer before the start of a second-class year is spent visiting bases of both the Navy and the Marine Corps. That leads up to the next summer when midshipmen join an operational unit of the Navy or Marine Corps for several weeks. In addition, rising firsties also begin to accept leadership roles at either the Naval Academy for plebe summer, the Naval Academy Prep School (Newport, R.I.) or aboard a yard patrol or sailing cruise.

## TECUMSEH

Tecumseh is the Native American figurehead which has been facing Bancroft Hall since 1866.

The statue originally was the figurehead of the USS Delaware and named after Tamanend, a Delaware chief. The name was later changed to Tecumseh after a Shawnee chieftain who lived from 1768-1813.

The original wooden statue was replaced after 50 years by the current bronze version.

Tecumseh is painted prior to football games and during Commissioning Week he is adorned with the shoulder boards of a Navy ensign on one side and that of a Marine Corps second lieutenant on the other.

## THE YARD


"The Yard" is another name for the grounds of the Naval Academy. Originally just 10 acres, The Yard has grown to a size of 338 acres.

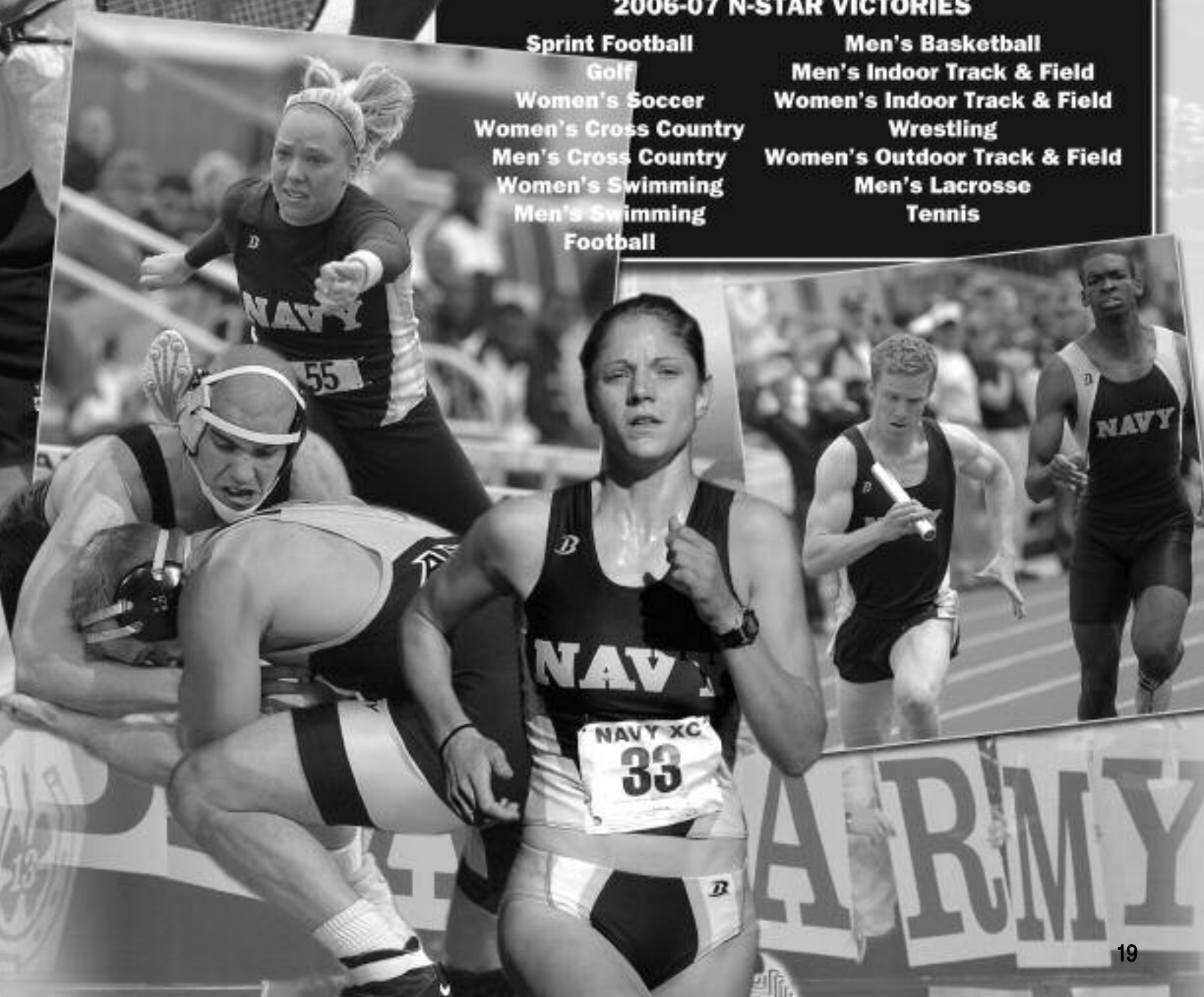

# Success IN THE CLASSROOM

## MAJORS

Students at the Naval Academy can select one of 43 different majors within the following 19 fields of study:

### Division of Engineering & Weapons

Aerospace Engineering, Electrical Engineering, General Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Naval Architecture, Ocean Engineering, Systems Engineering

### Division of Math & Science

Chemistry, Computer Science, General Science, Information Technology, Math, Oceanography, Physics, Quantitative Economics

### Division of Humanities & Social Science

Economics, English, History, Political Science

In addition to graduating with a Bachelor's of Science, students can also attain a minor in one of seven different languages.

## GRADUATE SCHOOL

There are no graduate school classes offered at the Naval Academy, but opportunities for midshipmen to attain a postgraduate degree at a civilian school or university are available. The ability to attend medical school, as former Navy football player **Terrence Anderson '00** did, is another option.

In addition to furthering their education at schools across the country, students at the Naval Academy annually are in competition for one of the prestigious Rhodes Scholarships to study at the University of Oxford in England.

Since Navy's first Rhodes Scholar, E. Van Meter '28, a total of 43 Naval Academy graduates have received the Rhodes Scholarship, including 10 over the last six years. Among Navy's recent recipients is former baseball player **Trevor Thompson '05**.

## COSIDA ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Naval Academy student-athletes have been selected as an Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors of America 48 times over the years, with Mids garnering 22 awards since 2000.

The list of recent honorees includes two-time Academic All-American **Courtney Davidson** (women's basketball, 2003 & '04), first-team recipient **Trevor Thompson** (baseball, 2005), and third-team honorees Sean Blackman (gymnastics, 2006) and Kirsten Andrews (cross country/track & field, 2006).

Navy student-athletes garnered six Academic All-America awards last season with women's soccer player Lizzie Barnes and track athlete Kirsten Andrews landing on the first team, women's soccer's **Kari Weniger**, Michael Niemi of the track team and Chris Renninger of golf earning second team honors, and Kelly Zahalka (swimming) on the third team.

## ACADEMIC PROGRESS RATES

The APR is the fulcrum upon which the entire academic-reform structure rests. Developed as a more real-time assessment of teams' academic performance than the six-year graduation-rate calculation provides, the APR awards two points each term to student-athletes who meet academic-eligibility standards and who remain with the institution. A team's APR is the total points earned by the team at a given time divided by the total points possible.
