Temple, under the direction of second-year head coach Al Golden, kicks off its 2007 season by hosting Navy Friday night (7:30 p.m.). It marks the first college football night game at Lincoln Financial Field. The Midshipmen are a very familiar foe for the Owls as Temple ended its 2006 campaign against Navy at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium.

Friday's game will be televised by ESPNU, with Beth Mowins handling play-by-play and David Diaz-Infante serving as color analyst. The Owls' radio broadcast will air on WYSP 94.1 FM with Harry Donahue calling the play-by-play and Steve Joachim providing color analysis. Live gametracker stats and audio streaming will be available on the Temple Athletics website, www.owlssports.com.

The Owls return eight starters on offense and seven on defense from their 43 returnees with game day experience. After playing the most true freshmen (22) in the nation in '06, Temple will again have a young squad. The Owls feature 16 true freshmen on their depth chart with six holding down starting roles heading into the opener. Temple has just two scholarship seniors on its roster, the fewest of any school in the Football Bowl Subdivision.

Redshirt junior Adam DiMichele won a closely-contested battle with sophomore Vaughn Charlton at quarterback. Named the starting signal-caller on August 23, DiMichele started nine games in '06 – his first season as an Owl – completing 135 of 220 passes for 1,518 yards and 10 touchdowns. Rimington Trophy candidate redshirt junior center Alex Derenthal, last year's team MVP, will be delivering the ball into DiMichele's hands.

The Cherry and White defense will be spearheaded by redshirt junior defensive end Leyon Azubuike and sophomore cornerback Anthony Ferla. The two join DiMichele and Derenthal as team captains with redshirt senior Abioye Oyeyemi captaining the special teams.

Redshirt junior Travis Shelton, a preseason First Team All-America kick-returner, is back. Shelton averaged a NCAA- best 196.7 all-purpose yards despite playing in just six games.

Navy, under the direction of sixth-year head coach Paul Johnson, returns 26 lettermen, including nine starters from last year's team that posted a 9-4 record. The Midshipmen defeated the Owls, 42-6, on Nov. 18, 2006 and ended their campaign with a 25-24 loss to Boston College in the Meineke Car Care Bowl.

Utilizing the spread offense, Navy led the nation in rushing offense, averaging 327 yards per game. The team's top two running backs, seniors Adam Ballard (792 yards, 3 TDs) and Reggie Campbell (706 yards, 5 TDS) return as does junior quarterback Kaiponoa Kaheaku-Enhada, who rushed for 507 yards and a team-high 10 TDs.

Navy leads the series, which began in 1988, 4-3. The teams will meet in each of the following two seasons.

TEMPLE-NAVY: THE SERIES

Friday's game will mark the eighth meeting between the Owlshippers with Temple holding a 4-3 advantage in the series. Temple defeated the Owls 42-6 last season at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium in what was the final regular season game for Temple. It marked the second straight season that Temple closed its season with a loss at Navy (38-17, 2005). Prior to the 2005 season, the Owls had won two straight under head coach Bobby Wallace, defeating Charlie Weatherbie led teams in Annapolis in 2000 (17-6) and at Franklin Field in 2001 (45-26). The Midshipmen beat the Ron Dickerson-led Owls 49-17 in 1997 to earn their first win in the series. Temple won the first meeting by a 12-7 margin in 1988 under Bruce Arians before capturing the second meeting by a 21-14 score in 1991 under Jerry Berndt. The Cherry & White is 2-3 all-time in Annapolis.

Notes Sophomore quarterback Kalpo-Noa Kaheaku-Enhada rushed for 116 yards and two touchdowns to lead Navy to a 42-6 win over Temple on Monday, November 13, 2006 in front of 33,927 fans at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium. The nation's top rushing team at 324.5 yards per game, Navy had 148 carries the ball on the ground against the young Owl defense. Kaheaku-Enhada and the Midshipmen offense that rushed for five touchdowns and 263 first downs, building a 35-0 halftime lead. Kaheaku-Enhada gained 116 yards in the first half and scored both touchdowns in the opening two quarters. Shun White carried six times for 116 yards in the opening half while Trey Hines added a nine-yard TD run. Byron McCoy scored his first career touchdown in his final home game, plunging to cap the scoring with 38 seconds remaining in the half. Offensively, the Owls struggled to move the ball, making just two total yards in the first half. DiMichele nearly found pay dirt on a senior wide receiver Nick Santa Cruz on a third-down play, but the pass fell incomplete in the end zone. Temple turned the ball over on downs on the next play.

Tim Brown struggled against a stingy Midshipmen defense in his final game, carrying the ball 12 times for 24 yards. He made a team-high 11 yards. Mike Holley had a career-high 78 receiving yards while matching with five catches in his final game at Temple.

Freshman quarterback Vaughn Charlton entered the game with 1:31 remaining in the third quarter following a fumble recovery by Georg Coleman. He completed six consecutive passes, leading the Owls on their best drive of the game, an eight-play, 65-yarder that was capped by a 12-yard touchdown pass to Bundy to make the score 35-6 with 13:39 remaining.

Weekly Media Luncheon: Al Golden's weekly media luncheon is held each Tuesday beginning August 29 at the Diamond Club on the main campus (lower level of Mitten Hall & Berks Mall) starting at 11:30 a.m. Effort will be made to have player(s) at the luncheons depending on individual class schedules.

YOUNG AT HEART: After playing the most true freshmen (22) in the nation last year, Temple will again have a young squad in head coach Al Golden's second season at the helm. The Owls feature 16 true freshmen on its depth chart with six holding down starting roles for the team's opener against Navy on August 31. Temple has just two scholarship seniors on its roster, the fewest of any school in the Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Division I-A).

NEW KIDS IN TOWN: The 2007 campaign marks Temple's first season in the Mid-American Conference. The Owls played the 2005 and 2006 season as an affiliate league member. Temple will compete in the MAC East Division with Akron, Bowling Green, Buffalo, Kent State, Miami and Ohio.

PAST FORWARD: In addition to a new league, the Owls will also have a new game day apparel in 2007. The jerseys are solid cherry or white, with collar and sleeve trim in the opposite requisite color. The collars will be trimmed with diamonds to reference Temple founder Russell H. Conwell's "Acres of Diamonds" lecture. The Temple "T" will be featured at the "V" of the collar. As per Golden's directive last season, player names will not be on the jersey backs. The pants will resemble those worn during the Wayne Hardin Era from 1970 to 1982, featuring a white base with cherry blocks down the legs. Actor, comedian and former Temple football player Bill Cosby helped Temple debut its new "old" look on August 1 at Lincoln Financial Field.

HARDIN HOT SPOT: Wayne Hardin has the unique distinction of serving as head coach at both Temple (1970-82, 80-52-3 record) and Navy (1959-64, 38-22-2). A "Dream Game" for the coaching legend, Hardin spearheaded a campaign dubbed "Mission Possible" to promote attendance at the Temple-Navy game. The winningest football coach in Temple history, Hardin led the Owls to a 10-2 record and a Garden State Bowl victory over California in 1979, as Temple was ranked No. 17 in both the AP and UPI final polls. Prior to his arrival in Owl Country, Hardin led the Midshipmen to a #2 ranking in 1963. Overall, he had a 118-74-5 mark as a collegiate head coach.

CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAINS: Temple head coach Al Golden announced the selection of redshirt junior QB Adam DiMichele, junior C Alex Derenthal, redshirt junior DE Leyon Azubuike, sophomore CB Anthony Ferla and redshirt senior DB Abioye Oyeyemi as team captains for the 2007 season. "We thought long and hard as a staff to decide if we were going to select captains because we are so young, but we decided to take a (team) vote and I was very pleased with the wide range of players that received a vote or multiple votes to be captain," Golden said. "On the defense, Leyon Azubuike and Anthony Ferla garnered the most votes. On the offensive side it was Alex Derenthal and Adam DiMichele, and everyone has a lot of respect for Abioye Oyeyemi on special teams." Three of the five team captains will serve as game captains for each contest with a fourth, selected from the pool of players that also received votes to be captain, chosen each game.

BAD BREAKS: Two Temple players redshirt freshman Dale Parris and true freshman Joe Jones suffered season-ending injuries during the preseason training camp. Jones went down with a torn left achilles tendon while Parris fractured his right ankle. Both players are expected to make full recoveries.

• **R-Junior DE (#93) Leyon Azubuike** has trained in boxing since childhood under former welterweight contender Vince Shomo. Azubuike's cousin, Kellen, declared for the 2005 NBA Draft as a junior out of Kentucky. Leyon's father, Ifeanyi, was a 15-year old soldier in the Biafran Army during Nigeria's civil war in the late 1960's before coming to America in 1981 to study psychology. Ifeanyi later earned two master's degrees and a Ph.D.

• **Sophomore TE (#83) Marcus Brown** played HS football at DeMatha Catholic under head coach Bill McGregor, the 2004 NFL National High School Coach of the Year. Since 1991 over 270 of his players have been awarded Division I full football scholarships. The school has produced multiple NFL players, including current Philadelphia Eagles RB Brian Westbrook. Brown is active in the Member Share Foundation, which feeds elderly and poor in the community, and the Ward 7 activist group that strives to keep children from violence. His cousin, Tiffany Brown, was a three-year starter at point guard for Maryland and earned All-ACC honors in 2000.

• **R-Sophomore FB (#40) Bryce Bufaloe** is a Temple track & field athlete who walked-on to the program this past spring. He is the school record holder in the indoor weight throw with a 56-11 1/2 toss and finished third in the event at the 2006 A-10 Indoor Championships. He finished sixth in the shot put (43-4 1/4) and weight throw (51-3) at the 2007 A-10 Indoor Championships and was an IC4A Qualifier.

• **Senior FB (#39) Josh Bundy's** sister Gina was an All-America track athlete at Saint Joseph's and was a member of the United States Bobsled Team.

• **Sophomore WR (#20) A.J. Bunton's** mother Christina was a sprinter at the University of Alabama and was a member of the 1980 U.S. 4x400 that boycotted the 1980 Olympics. A.J.'s godfather is William Thomas, a former two-time All-Pro linebacker with the Philadelphia Eagles. Bunton was a

teammate of brothers Jake and John Brownell on consecutive undefeated state championship teams under coach Clyde Folsom at West Deptford (N.J.) HS.

• **Sophomore OL (#62) Bryce Carter** has performed community service with Toys for Tots and aided in Freehold's (N.J.) relief effort for Hurricane Katrina victims. His father, Ronald, was a two-year baseball letterwinner at Missouri.

• **Junior CB (#28) Evan Cooper, Jr's** father starred at Michigan before playing DB and returning kickoff's for the Philadelphia Eagles from 1984- 87.

• **R-Sophomore QB (#8) Colin Clancy** was coached in Prep School by former Owl signal-caller Tim Riordan. Riordan threw for 3,679 yards and 20TDs from 1981-83 before playing with the USFL's Philadelphia Stars and the NFL's New Orleans Saints.

• **R-Junior QB (#12) Adam DiMichele** was selected in the 38th round of the 2005 MLB Draft by the Toronto Blue Jays out of Okaloosa-Walton CC in Niceville, Fla. DiMichele, who originally signed an NLI to play football at Penn State in 2004 was a First Team All-State choice in three sports (baseball, basketball, football) at Sto-Rox HS and was the state player of the year in both football and basketball. The all-time passing leader in WPIAL history with 6,471 career yards, his younger brother, (#33) Alex DiMichele, a freshman fullback with the Owls in 2006.

• **Sophomore CB (#9) Anthony Ferla's** father played baseball at the University of Virginia. Anthony's brother, Bobby was a pitcher at Northwestern ('07).

• **Sophomore LB (#46) John Haley** is the second cousin of former five-time NFL Pro Bowl defensive lineman Charles Haley.

* **R-Junior OL (#67) Marcos Hanna** played his high school football and won the state 4A title at North Penn HS under former Temple letterwinner (OL, 1987-90) and team captain Dick Beck.

• **R-Junior TE (#80) Marques Henderson** is on active duty as a sergeant in the United States Marine Corps, attending the University via the Marine Enlisted Commissioning Education program. He served in Iraq in 2003 at the beginning of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Prior to Temple, he last played competitive football at the Pop Warner level. His brother plays TE at Delaware Valley College.

• **Freshman WR (#3) Marquise Liverpool** played three seasons of minor league baseball in the Seattle Mariners system after being selected in the 33rd round of the 2004 Amateur Draft. A Superprep All-America at Don Bosco Prep ('04), he had originally signed an NLI to attend Boston College before opting for a career in professional baseball.

• **R-Junior TE (#85) Travis Manger** is a volunteer with the Special Olympics. He is a third cousin of former Major League pitcher and Ball Four author Jim Bouton.

• **R-Junior OL (#75) Brison Manor III's** father played DE at Arkansas and in the NFL with Denver (1977-84) and Tampa Bay (1984).

• **Sophomore DL (#98) Andre Neblett** is a youth coach for Rahway (N.J.) Pop Warner Football and volunteers in the town community center as a youth mentor.

• **Sophomore OL (#69) Dave Nwasike** is an active member of the Obasi Developments Association, a group that raises funds for the reconstruction of his father's birth place in Nigeria.

• **R-Junior WR (#22) Travis Shelton** is one of the fastest players at Temple and the Mid-American Conference. He moonlighted a sprinter at Temple, competing in the 100m during the 2004-05 season. Most people are surprised that Shelton is able to have such elite speed despite having asthma. Shelton is the first cousin of current Chicago Bears CB and former Miami Hurricane

Devin Hester and current Cleveland Browns LB and former Florida Gator Andra Davis.

CENTER OF ATTENTION: Redshirt junior center Alex Derenthal earned the distinction of being the first Temple sophomore to be named the recipient of the Owl Award as the team MVP. A Rimington Trophy candidate, the 2006 ECAC All-Star has been named preseason all-MAC by multiple publications. As a redshirt sophomore he played every snap in 11 games and graded 90 percent or better in all 12 contests.

SPEED OF SHELTON: A 2007 First Team Preseason All-America selection by Phil Steele's College Football Preview, Travis Shelton is one of the nation's most dangerous return men. A first cousin of Chicago Bear return specialist Devin Hester, Shelton averaged 28.8 yards per kickoff return which would have ranked fifth nationally but he failed to play in the required 75 percent of the team's games. He also averaged 196.7 all-purpose yards which would have led the nation. The speedy wide receiver caught 20 passes for 344 yards and three touchdowns and also returned a kickoff 96 yards to paydirt in the Owls' lone win of the season against Bowling Green. The Ft. Lauderdale, FL native earned Wrangler College Football National Player of the Week honors for his efforts in that contest. Shelton also set the school record, and had the second most return yards in the NCAA, when he returned five kickoffs for 205 yards vs. Clemson in his first action since the 2004 campaign. As a receiver, he became the second Temple player to have a 200-yard game, catching seven passes for 204 yards and two TDs at Northern Illinois.

LOCAL 215: When Al Golden was appointed head football at Temple, one of his top priorities was to establish a walk-on program unrivaled on the regional and state level; one that afforded players the opportunity to be a part of the resurgence of Temple Football. The end product was the organization of the LOCAL 215 program. Much like the unions that support the great city of Philadelphia, the LOCAL 215 represents the tough, disciplined and blue-collar student-athletes who believe they have what it takes to play Division I football and build the Owls into a program representative of a first-rate university and a first-class city. The LOCAL 215 walk-on program is an exceptional opportunity for regional student-athletes to not only earn a roster spot, but the chance to compete for playing time and ultimately earn a scholarship. Numerous LOCAL 215 members are actively contributing to the team and several more have already earned a scholarship. Among them are current Owls junior WR Bruce Francis, redshirt junior OL Marcos Hanna and redshirt sophomore PK Jake Brownell.

BUILDING A TEAM WITH SWEAT AND STEEL: Temple football strength and conditioning, under the direction of 1998 strength coach of the year Tony Decker, is a free weight, Olympic-based program that utilizes worldwide performance concepts. The goals are to increase strength, speed and power via football energy system adaptation. Most exercises are multi-joint with a high speed emphasis designed to move weight fast. The Owls do not train to be track & field athletes or body builders; they train specifically for football. As such, Temple players have the energy system demands that the game requires. This past summer, over 75 players participated in voluntary workouts and 95 percent of the team met its August weight goal at the onset of preseason camp. The Owls also posted very positive gains in their preseason testing one rep max results on bench, squat and clean.
