Weather Mostly cloudy, highs in mid-70s

Overview

Wake Forest, winners of four straight games, will travel to Navy on Saturday, Oct. 20 . . . The Deacons are coming off a 24-21 win over 21st-ranked Florida State on ESPN on Oct. 11 . . . Navy has won three straight games including a 48-45 double overtime win at Pittsburgh on Oct. 10 . . . Wake Forest is receiving votes in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll . . . The Deacs will be aiming for a fifth straight victory . . . In 2006, Wake Forest opened the season with five straight wins . . . WFU has never had five-game win streaks in consecutive seasons . . . RB Josh Adams was named the ACC Rookie of the Week and P/PK Sam Swank is this week's ACC Special Teams Player of the Week.

Series

Wake Forest holds a 5-2 lead in the series that dates back to 1929 . . . Wake Forest has won three straight and five of the last six meetings since 1991 . . . At Annapolis, the Deacs are 3-1 and have won three straight . . . Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe has a 1-0 record against the Midshipmen as a head coach, posting a 30-27 win at home in 2002 . . . Navy head coach Paul Johnson has an 0-1 record vs. Wake Forest, having lost that game in 2002.

Head Coaches

Wake Forest head coach **Jim Grobe (Virginia '75)** is in his seventh season with the Deacons and has a record of 41-37 including last year's 11-3 mark . . . Grobe, who spent six seasons at Ohio University, is in his 13th season overall as a head coach and has a career mark of 74-70-1 . . . Grobe was the unanimous choice as the ACC Coach of the Year in 2006 and was honored as the National Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association, the Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBS Sportsline.com.

Navy head coach **Paul Johnson (Western Carolina '79)** is in his sixth season with the Midshipmen and has a record of 41-27 including a 4-2 mark this year . . . Johnson has taken Navy to four straight bowl games and four consecutive seasons of eight or more wins . . . Johnson was the head coach at Georgia Southern where he led the Eagles to five Southern Conference championships and two Football Championship Subdivision (nee Division I-AA) titles . . . Johnson is also a former

The Matchup

Both teams enter Saturday's game with winning streaks . . . Wake Forest has won four straight while Navy has won three in a row . . . Navy is the top rushing team in the country, averaging 345.3 yards per game . . . Wake Forest is 22nd in the nation in rushing defense, holding opponents to 100.3 yards per game . . . Navy is last in the nation in passing efficiency defense, allowing opposing quarterbacks to complete 68.5% of their passes . . . WFU's Riley Skinner is completing 70.5% of his pass attempts this season . . . Navy's defense is 102nd nationally, yielding 447.7 YPG . . . WFU's offense is 89th in the country at 347.5 YPG . . . Wake Forest's defense is 41st in the country in sacks with 2.3 per game . . . Navy's offensive line is allowing just 1.17 sacks per contest.

Last Meeting with Navy

- Wake Forest posted a 30-27 win over the Naval Academy on Nov. 23, 2002.
- The win was the sixth of the year for the Deacons and made them bowl-eligible.
- Paul Johnson was in his first season with the Middies.
- The win assured head coach Jim Grobe of his second winning season.
- The Deacons were coming off an unusual two week layoff.
- Quarterback James MacPherson threw for 210 yards and a touchdown including a 70-yard score to Jason Anderson.
- Anderson finished the game with three catches for 119 yards.
- RB Tarence Williams rushed for 95 yards and a touchdown on 23 carries.
- Current graduate assistant coach Mark Moroz started at left tackle vs. Navy.

Wake Forest vs. The Academies

- Wake Forest has an all-time record of 11-7 against the United States service academies.
- The Deacons are 6-4 all-time vs. Army, 5-2 vs. Navy and 0-1 vs. Air Force.

Jim Grobe vs. The Academies

- Wake Forest head coach Jim Grobe spent 11 years as an assistant coach at the Air Force Academy from 1984 to 1994.
- During that time, the Falcons went 10-1 vs. Navy while winning seven Commander-in-Chief Trophies.
- At Wake Forest, Grobe is 2-0 vs. the academies with a win this year over Army and a 2002 win over Navy.

Swank, Adams earn ACC Honors

- Josh Adams was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on Oct. 15 for his efforts vs. Florida State.
- Adams carried 18 times for a career-high 140 yards in Wake Forest's 24-21 win over 21st-ranked Florida State on Oct. 11.
- Adams raced 83 yards in the second quarter to give the Deacons a 7-0 lead.
- It was the longest run of his career and the longest rush by a Deacon since Freddie Summers went 90 yards against Maryland on Nov. 2, 1968.
- It is tied for the fourth-longest run in school history.
- Adams also caught a team-high six passes for 29 yards including a 6-yard scoring pass from Riley Skinner.
- Adams recorded his first 100-yard rushing game and his first career multi-touchdown game.
- He finished the game with a game-high 169 all-purpose yards.
- Sam Swank earned ACC Special Teams Player of the Week honors on Oct. 15.
- Swank booted a season-best 48-yard field goal with 1:40 to play in the game to give the Deacons a 24-14 lead over Florida State.
- Swank converted all three PATs to give him 83 consecutive PATs.
- Swank improved to 5 for 5 on field goal tries this year and has made six straight dating back to last season.
- Swank punted seven times for 285 yards, a 40.7 average.

Many Happy (Interception) Returns

- Wake Forest has returned an interception for a touchdown in three of its last four games.
- Alphonso Smith had a 21-yard return vs. BC, a 100-yarder vs. Maryland and a 30-yarder vs. Duke.
- Smith's return vs. Maryland sparked the Deacons to a 28-point run resulting in a 31-24 OT win.
- Smith intercepted a pass in the end zone vs. Florida State for his fourth pick of the year.
- Smith has now intercepted a pass in three straight games and four of six contests this season.
- Smith's 100-yarder vs. the Terps is the school record for longest interception return.
- Aaron Curry's 84-yard TD return vs. Army extended Wake Forest's lead from 14-7 to 21-7.
- Curry's 84-yard return stands as the fourth-longest in school history.

- Aaron Curry has an interception return, Chip Vaughn a fumble return and Kenny Moore a punt return.
- Wake and Virginia Tech share the ACC lead for non-offensive touchdowns with six each.
- Virginia Tech has three interception returns, two punt returns and one kickoff return.
- Under Jim Grobe, the Deacons have scored 28 non-offensive touchdowns in seven seasons.

Smith Sets Career Interception Yardage Mark

- Alphonso Smith had an interception in the end zone vs. Florida State.
- Smith now has 10 career interceptions good for 201 yards and four touchdowns.
- He is the school's all-time leader in career interception yardage.
- Previously, Ronnie Burgess (1981-84) held the career yardage mark at 176.
- Smith owns the school record and has tied the ACC mark for career touchdowns on interceptions with four.
- Smith also owns the school's season yardage mark with 151 yards, breaking A.J. Green's 1987 mark of 128.

Points off Turnovers

- Wake Forest has scored 54 points off turnovers this season.
- Of the 18 turnovers the Deacons have received this year, they have converted 10 into points.
- Wake Forest has turned the turnovers into six touchdowns and four field goals.
- Wake's opponents have turned eight of 17 turnovers into 48 points.

Moore-Moore-Moore

- Kenny Moore leads the Deacons in receiving with 41 catches and is second in rushing.
- Moore has 229 rushing yards on just 27 attempts, an 8.5 YPC average.
- He is the ACC's leading receiver with 41 catches, an average of 6.8 per game.
- Moore is third the ACC in all-purpose yards with an average of 147.7 per game.
- He has three 100-yard games this season: 126 receiving yards vs. BC, 119 rushing yards vs. Nebraska, and 100 receiving yards vs. Duke.
- Moore's 15 receptions vs. BC tied the school record and was one shy of the ACC record.
- In 2007, Moore has scored three rushing touchdowns, two by reception and one punt return.
- He is the only player among the top 10 scorers in the ACC with a rushing, receiving and return TD.

Moore Punt Returns

- Kenny Moore's 55-yard punt return for a touchdown against Army was the first "true" punt return for a score since Willie Idlette went 50 yards with a punt for a score against North Carolina State on Sept. 6, 2003.
- In 2006, Alphonso Smith returned a blocked punt 16 yards for a touchdown against North Carolina.
- Moore's punt return, the first PR touchdown of his career, ranks as the ninth-longest punt return in Deacon history.

Scoring Spurts

Scoring spurts are usually associated with basketball but in the last few games, Wake Forest has gone on a long scoring streak:

- Trailing Florida State 14-7, Wake ran off 17 straight points to take a 24-14 lead before winning 24-21.
- At Duke on Oct. 6, the Deacons trailed 9-0 before scoring 34 straight points to lead 34-9 in the third quarter.
- At home with Maryland on Sept. 22, WFU trailed 24-3 before scoring 28 unanswered points to win 31-24 in OT.

Good Stretch

- Since the start of the 2006 season, Wake Forest is 15-5.
- This is the most successful 20-game streak since the Deacons went 15-4-1 from Oct. 20, 1945 to Oct. 25, 1947.
- The Deacons also had a 15-5 run from 1922-25 and from 1942-44.

Future Navy Dates

- Wake Forest and Navy are scheduled to meet in each of the next three seasons.
- Navy visits Wake Forest on Sept. 27, 2008.
- Wake Forest returns to Annapolis on Sept. 26, 2009.
- The Deacons host the Midshipmen on Sept. 25, 2010.

Poll Vault

- Wake Forest is receiving votes in both the Associated Press poll and the USA Today Coaches Poll.
- The Deacons received 18 votes from the media to rank tied for 31st this week.
- Wake received 12 votes from the coaches to place 36th.
- The Deacons finished the 2006 season 18th in the AP poll and 17th in the USA Today poll.
- Wake was ranked as high as 14th in each poll in 2006.

Selmon A Draddy Semifinalist

- Senior tight end Zac Selmon has been named a semifinalist for the Draddy Award.
- A total of 153 college football players were nominated for the award.
- The award is sponsored by the National Football Foundation and the College Hall of Fame (NFF).
- Nominees must have a 3.2 GPA or higher, be a starter, and have exemplified citizenship and leadership.
- Selmon started the Shine Foundation, an organization to provide for orphans in Liberia.
- The Draddy is considered the "Academic Heisman Trophy."

Home Attendance

- Through Wake Forest's first four home games, the Deacons have drawn 129,495 fans.
- Wake Forest is averaging 32,374 fans per home game.
- The season record for total attendance is 197,911 set in 2003 (seven games).
- Wake Forest's current home average of 32,374 is on pace to be the second-highest in school history.
- The record for average attendance was set in 2006 with 32,519.

Trends

- Wake Forest has won four straight games.
- The Deacons have won nine of their last 12 ACC games since the start of the 2006 season.
- Wake has won three straight home games and eight of its last 11 at BB&T Field.
- The Deacons are 1-1 on the road this season and have won seven of their last eight road games since the start of 2006.

Ray McCartney, Keith Henry and Jeff Mullen have been members of Grobe's staff in each of his 13 seasons as a head coach, including six years at Ohio University and seven at Wake Forest . . . Assistant head coach Billy Mitchell coached with Grobe for 11 years at Air Force and joined the Ohio staff in 1997, a year after Grobe took over . . . The only two coaches to leave Wake Forest's staff since Grobe came on board were Troy Calhoun who returned to the Air Force Academy and succeeded Fisher DeBerry as the Falcons' head coach following the 2006 season . . . Calhoun was replaced by Elrod . . . Wide receiver coach Kevin Sherman left after the 2005 campaign to accept a similar position at Virginia Tech and was replaced by Billings.

This Date in Wake Forest History

Oct. 20, 1990: For the first time in BB&T Field history, the number one ranked team in the country paid a visit. Virginia entered the game ranked #1 and handed the Deacons a 49-14 defeat. Virginia's Heisman Trophy-candidate quarterback Shawn Moore compiled 306 yards of total offense and threw for two touchdowns while the tailback tandem of Nikki Fisher (132 yards) and Terry Kirby (101) did the damage on the ground. Wake Forest's points came on a 60-yard pass from Phil Barnhill to Darrell France and a seven-yard run by Tony Rogers. WFU held a 14-9 lead midway through the second quarter but could not hold on. Anthony Williams collected 96 yards rushing through the first three quarters before leaving with a leg bruise.

Oct. 20, 1984: The Deacons had their chances for an ACC title ended as the host Virginia Cavaliers utilized a potent offense and aggressive defense to secure a 28-9 win in Charlottesville. The Cavs piled up 355 yards rushing while Wake's normally solid running game was limited to 102 yards and Deac quarterbacks were sacked four times. WFU's points came on a five-yard run by Topper Clemmons and on a 25-yard field goal from Danny Nolan.

Oct. 20, 1979: Wake Forest defeated Maryland 25-17 at BB&T Field to improve to 6-1 on the season. The Deacons would finish the year 8-4 with a trip to the Tangerine Bowl. On this day, quarterback Jay Venuto threw a pair of touchdown passes including a 12-yarder to Wayne Baumgardner and a six-yarder to Bill Ruffner. James McDougald added a five yard scoring run and Phil Denfeld nailed a 40-yard field goal.

Redshirt freshman Josh Adams was named the conference's Rookie of the Week for his 91 yards rushing on 20 carries and his game-winning overtime touchdown vs. the Terps.

Grobe Holds School ACC Win Mark

Jim Grobe's 22 Atlantic Coast Conference victories are the most by any Demon Deacon head football coach . . . Bill Dooley won 14 conference games in his six seasons from 1987-92 . . . Jim Caldwell (1993-2000) and Bill Tate (1964-68) each won 12 ACC contests.

Going Down To The Wire

In the six-plus seasons since Jim Grobe arrived at Wake Forest, the Deacons have played 78 games . . . A total of 41 of the 78 have been decided by eight points or fewer and four have gone to overtime . . . Wake Forest is 22-19 in games decided by eight points or fewer since Grobe arrived in 2001 . . . The Deacons posted a 5-4 mark in 2001, 4-3 in 2002, 1-3 in 2003, 2-6 in 2004, 2-2 in 2005, and 5-0 in 2006 . . . WFU is 3-1 in 2007 with a 20-17 loss to Nebraska, a 31-24 overtime win over Maryland, a 41-36 win at Duke and a 24-21 win over Florida State.

When Riley Skinner suffered a separated shoulder in the season-opener at Boston College, a feeling of déjà vu permeated the injury . . . In the 2006 season opener, Skinner came off the bench to lead the Deacons to a 20-10 win over Syracuse . . . Skinner got the call after starting QB Benjamin Mauk suffered a dislocated shoulder and broken arm while diving for a fumble . . . And Skinner was the number two quarterback because Brett Hodges had suffered a shoulder separation in the weeks leading up to the 2006 season.

Noting the Florida State Game

Wake Forest defeated #21 Florida State 24-21 on ESPN on Oct. 11 at BB&T Field . . . The crowd of 32,906 was the largest home crowd of the season . . . Sam Swank's 48-yard field goal was his longest of the season and gave the Deacons a 24-14 win . . . The Deacons have now defeated Florida State in consecutive years for the first time in school history . . . Wake Forest suffered a blocked punt for the first time since Sept. 4, 2004 at Clemson . . . Chip Vaughn recorded his first career interception . . . Wake held FSU to 47 yards rushing . . . WFU was 6-of-17 on third down conversions including 6-of-11 in the second half . . . In the season opener against Boston College, Wake Forest kicked off to start the game . . . On BC's first play from scrimmage, WFU cornerback Alphonso Smith intercepted Matt Ryan's pass and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown . . . That play came with just 14 seconds elapsed off the game clock . . . That tied for the second-quickest score in school history . . . The Deacs also scored 14 seconds into a game against Virginia Tech in 1975 when they returned a fumble for a score . . . The fastest score in Deacon annals occurred in 1975 when Virginia fumbled the opening kickoff and WFU scored a safety . . . That came just six seconds into the game.

Attendance Soars

A crowd of 32,483 attended the home-opener between Wake Forest and Nebraska at BB&T Field on Sept. 8 . . . That marked the 16th-largest crowd ever at BB&T Field . . . The attendance at the Sept. 15 game against Army was 32,142, the 19-largest crowd in BB&T Field history . . . WFU posted the 15th-largest crowd in school history with 32,906 vs. Florida State on Oct. 11 . . . The Deacons averaged 32,515 fans per home game last year to break the school record for season average . . . WFU has broken its season attendance average in three of the last four years.

Grobe: National Coach of the Year

In his sixth season at Wake Forest, coach Jim Grobe's Deacons were picked to finish last in the Atlantic Division . . . Then Wake Forest lost its top pass rusher, its starting quarterback and its preseason All-ACC running back — all to season-ending injuries . . . But Grobe led the Deacons through the adversity and all the way to an ACC Championship, its first in 36 years . . . Grobe, who became the first Wake Forest coach to take the Deacons to a pair of bowl games in the ACC era, was named national coach of the year by his peers and the media . . . The media outlets and organizations that honored Grobe were the American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, Bobby Dodd Foundation, CBS Sportsline and The Sporting News . . . Legendary coach and current ESPN analyst Lou Holtz noted, "Among fellow coaches, there was no doubt that Jim Grobe was a special coach. He didn't need a season like this to validate himself. To the media, yes. To the fans, yes. But to fellow coaches, no."

Skinner Named ACC Rookie of the Year

Quarterback Riley Skinner was voted the ACC's Rookie of the Year in 2006 as he led the league in three passing categories . . . He received 48 of a possible 80 votes from the league's media . . . The Jacksonville, Fla. native led the ACC in passing efficiency, completion percentage and interception rate . . . Skinner and Texas' Colt McCoy were the only freshmen quarterbacks in the country to post 10 wins as a starter . . . Clemson running back C.J. Spiller was the runner-up with 25 votes . . . Darrius Heyward-Bey of Maryland, North Carolina's Hakeem Nicks and Myron Rolle of Florida State each received two votes . . . Skinner became the third Wake Forest player to win the ACC's Rookie of the Year award . . . He joined James McDougald (1976) and Michael Ramseur (1982).

All-ACC Selections

Wake Forest set a school record by placing nine players on the All-Atlantic Coast Conference team in 2006 . . . Five Deacons were named first team All-ACC, tying Clemson for the most first-team selections . . . The selections are made by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association . . . Wake's nine selections broke a school record of six shared by the 1970 ACC championship team and the 1992 Deacon team . . . Earning All-ACC honors in 2006 were senior offensive tackle Steve Vallos, senior safety Josh Gattis and junior linebacker Jon Abbate . . . All three have departed . . . The lone first team selections returning are center Steve Justice and placekicker Sam Swank . . . Swank was one of just five sophomores to earn first team All-ACC . . . He was also named honorable mention as a punter . . . QB Riley Skinner was a second team selection despite not being on the ballot . . . Skinner received enough write-in votes to be chosen second team . . . Two other departed seniors, defensive end Jyles Tucker and safety Patrick Ghee, also earned honorable mention status.



Temporary Press Box Tower

Wake Forest is in the midst of a football stadium renovation with the construction of Deacon Tower . . . Phase Three of the BB&T Field renovation project began in January with the demolition of the former press box . . . Construction is well underway on the 123,000-square foot Deacon Tower project which will stand seven stories and 125 feet high and will include premium seating, a new President's box and upgraded press accommodations . . . Phase Three also includes ground level concessions and a signature entry point for the stadium . . . Phases One and Two, which included cosmetic and structural improvements to the stadium and installation of FieldTurf, were completed prior to the start of the 2006 season.

Grobe Signs New Contract

Head coach Jim Grobe signed a new 10-year contract on February 27, 2007 . . . Athletic director Ron Wellman made the surprise announcement at the conclusion of the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year banquet that night.

North Carolina Legislature

The North Carolina State Legislature honored the Wake Forest football team in Raleigh on March 7, 2007 as State Senators Fred Smith and John Snow, both Wake Forest graduates and

former members of the Demon Deacon football team in the 1960's, presented a joint resolution that recognized Wake Forest's ACC Championship and berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl. Head coach Jim Grobe and the entire Wake Forest football team bussed to Raleigh to be on hand for the presentation.

The Nation's Biggest Turnaround

Wake Forest won seven more games in 2006 than it did in 2005 . . . In terms of actual wins and losses, the Deacons enjoyed the biggest positive turnaround in the nation . . . The Deacons went 4-7 in 2005, but returned 18 starters, including 10 on defense . . . Wake Forest went 11-3 in 2006 . . . This was not Grobe's first turnaround at Wake Forest . . . He inherited a Deacon squad that went 2-9 in 2000, but led the 2001 Wake Forest team to a 6-5 mark . . . Grobe came to Wake Forest after building Ohio University into a perennial contender in the Mid-American Conference . . . He inherited an Ohio program that had won 17 games in the 10 seasons prior to Grobe's arrival. Grobe coached there for six seasons and led the Bobcats to a 33-33-1 record.

Poll Position in 2006

The Deacons finished 18th in the 2006 AP poll, 17th in the *USA Today* poll and 14th in the BCS . . . Wake was in the top 25 for nine straight

weeks, the longest streak in program history.

Successful Spans In History

Wake Forest won 24 games in the four seasons from 2003 to 2006, the most in a four-year stretch since 1944-47 under head coach D.C. "Peahead" Walker . . . Wake Forest went to the first-ever Gator Bowl on January 1, 1946 . . . The most wins in any four-year period in Wake Forest history is 25, set in 1939-42 and 1944-47 . . . Wake Forest's 37 wins in Grobe's first six years in Winston-Salem ties for the most wins in any six-year span in program history (1939-44).

Four Key Players Return

In 2006, Wake Forest should benefit from the return of senior running back Micah Andrews, senior defensive end Matt Robinson, junior wide receiver Demir Boldin and sophomore defensive back Brandon Ghee . . . Andrews, Boldin and Robinson were all projected starters last season . . . Technically, the trio does not count toward Wake Forest's returning starter total . . . If they did, the Deacons would have 18 starters back, including 10 on offense. Both numbers would

rank second in the ACC . . . Andrews, a 2006 preseason All-ACC running back, missed the majority of last season with a torn ACL injury suffered on September 16 at Connecticut . . . Robinson was the team's leading pass rusher as a freshman and sophomore in 2004 and 2005. But the lingering effects of a broken kneecap, suffered in the 2005 finale against Miami, caused him to miss all of the 2006 campaign . . . Boldin and Ghee did not participate in any football-related activities in 2006 because of academics . . . In 2005, Boldin played sparingly as a freshman in the first half of the season . . . By season's end, he was an emerging talent . . . Boldin ranked second on the team in receiving yards, fourth in receptions and yards and led the team with 14.9 yards per catch . . . Boldin was also the best blocker of all the receivers, which helped bolster the run . . . Ghee, a heavily recruited player, was expected to play a large role last season as a redshirt freshman, particularly on special teams . . . Following the graduation of three starters in the secondary, one of which was his older brother, Patrick, the younger Ghee has seen increased playing time this fall.

Attendance Record Falls

Wake Forest broke its season average home attendance record last year . . . An average of

32,515 fans saw the Deacons go 4-2 at BB&T Field where the capacity is 31,500 . . . Wake Forest has broken its season average attendance record in three of the last four years.

Prone To Picking Off Passes

Wake Forest intercepted 22 passes in 2006 to rank second in the nation . . . A total of 10 different Deacons picked off passes . . . Wake Forest had four players with three or more interceptions, including Josh Gattis (5), Riley Swanson (4), Patrick Ghee (3) and Alphonso Smith (3) . . . The Deacons intercepted a pass in 11 straight games, a streak that ended in the Orange Bowl.

Turnover Story

Wake Forest ranked second in the ACC and sixth nationally last year with a plus-13 turnover ratio . . . The Deacons had 31 takeaways and only 18 giveaways . . . Wake Forest forced a turnover in every game last season.

Keeping Everyone On The Shelf

The Demon Deacons did not play a true freshman in 2006 . . . Wake Forest and Colorado State were the only two teams in the country that could make that claim.

True Freshmen In The Jim Grobe Era

Jim Grobe has signed seven classes (123 total players) since coming to Wake in December 2000 . . . Since then, only nine players have seen action as true freshmen — seven percent . . . Before putting a rookie on the field, Grobe and his staff have planned for each true freshman to make a legitimate impact . . . Those nine players have certainly done that . . . In fact, all four that have exhausted their eligibility went on to play pro football — three in the NFL and one in Canada.

Head Coach Jim Grobe

In his first five years at Wake Forest, Jim Grobe brought respectability back to the Demon Deacon football program. In his sixth year, Grobe brought an ACC Championship and a berth in the FedEx Orange Bowl.

Long regarded as a coach who “gets the most out of his talent,” Grobe and his staff are now recognized as great coaches who coach great players.



And the accolades poured in.

In 2006, Grobe was the unanimous choice as the ACC’s Coach of the Year in a vote by the league’s media. He

was selected as the National Coach of the Year by American Football Coaches Association, Bobby Dodd Foundation, the Associated Press, The Sporting News and CBS Sportsline.com.

In 2006, Grobe’s Deacons broke nearly every school record imaginable and reached several milestones.

Consider:

- Wake Forest won only its second ACC title and its first since 1970.
- The Deacons won the ACC’s Atlantic Division after being picked to finish last by the league’s media in the preseason.
- With 11 wins, Wake Forest shattered the school record for most victories in a season.
- The previous record was eight (1944, 1979 and 1992). Wake Forest was the first team in history (out of 113) to go 6-0 in road games.
- Wake Forest was the most improved team in America, winning seven more games in 2006 than in 2005. The 2005 Deacons went 4-7 and the 2006 Deacons went 11-3.
- The Deacons were ranked in the AP top 25 for nine straight weeks, the longest stretch in history. Wake Forest swept its ACC Tobacco Road rivals for the first time since 1987.
- Wake beat Florida State in Tallahassee for the first time since 1959, NC State in Raleigh for the first time since 1984 and Maryland for the first since 1998.

It hasn’t been easy.

Grobe was hired in December 2000 to take over a Demon Deacon football program long regarded as an afterthought in the ACC.

Grobe inherited a Wake Forest program that won only 38 games in the 1990’s.

In six seasons, Grobe’s teams have won 37 contests, earned two bowl berths and won an ACC Championship.

That is particularly impressive given the recent ACC expansion that introduced three nationally-prominent programs to the league.

Even with the rising level of play in the conference, making the ACC arguably the nation’s best football league, Wake Forest has become even more competitive and successful.

Football observers have already recognized Grobe’s efforts in transforming Wake Forest as one of the rising programs, not just in the ACC, but on a regional and national basis.

The levels of excitement and expectation surrounding Demon Deacon football have reached unprecedented heights. That is a tribute to Grobe and his staff who believe the best is yet to come.

Grobe, who turned 55 in February, has gained a national reputation as a builder of programs.

He came to Wake Forest after turning a struggling Ohio University program into a contender for the Mid-American Conference championship.

In the seasons before Grobe left his assistant’s position at the Air Force Academy to become Ohio University’s head coach, the Bobcats won 17 games. In the six years under Grobe, they won 33 and finished with winning records in the Mid-American Conference five straight seasons.

Grobe coached at Ohio for six years (1995-2000). After taking over the reigns of a program that went 0-11 and was ranked last among Division I-A programs in 1994, Grobe led the Bobcats to a cumulative six-year record of 33-33-1.

A 1975 University of Virginia graduate, Grobe gained valuable experience as an assistant to Fisher DeBerry at the Air Force Academy prior to going to Ohio. He served as linebackers coach from 1984 to 1994, during which the Falcons produced a record of 84-50 and appeared in seven bowl games.

Grobe was born on Feb. 17, 1952. A native of Huntington, W. Va., Grobe earned his undergraduate degree (B.S.) in education from Virginia in 1975 and earned a Master’s degree in guidance and counseling in 1978.

2007 Game Recaps

Boston College 38, Wake Forest 28
Saturday, September 1, 2007

CHESTNUT HILL, MA - Boston College's Matt Ryan threw four touchdown passes to lead the Eagles to a season-opening 38-28 win over Wake Forest on Sept. 1 at Alumni Stadium.

Wake Forest built a 14-0 first quarter lead. Alphonso Smith intercepted Ryan on the first play from scrimmage and returned it 21 yards for a touchdown. Kenneth Moore added a five-yard scoring catch from Riley Skinner with 8:05 to play in the first to stake the Deacons to a 14-0 lead.

Ryan threw scoring passes on two of BC's next three possessions. He hit Kevin Challenger on a 19-yard pass with 4:38 to play in the first. Following a 22-yard WFU pass that gave BC the ball at the WFU 38, Ryan's first pass went 38 yards to Rich Gunnell for a touchdown to tie the game at 14.

The Deacons went on top 21-14 when Smith forced a fumble from A.J. Brooks and Chip Vaughn scooped it up and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown. The Eagles knotted the game at 21 just before halftime when Ryan hit Clarence Megwa for a 22-yard scoring pass with 55 seconds remaining.

BC went ahead 28-21 midway through the third quarter when Ryan hit Brandon Robinson with a 10-yard scoring pass for a 28-21 lead. The Eagles increased the margin to 35-21 with 2:39 to play in the third when Ryan and Gunnell connected on a 5-yard touchdown pass.

Wake Forest cut the margin to 35-28 early in the fourth quarter when quarterback Brett Hodges, filling in for Skinner who suffered a separated shoulder in the third quarter, threw 12 yards to Kevin Harris.

BC finished the scoring when Steve Aponavicius booted a 27-yard field goal with 1:46 to play in the game.

WINSTON-SALEM, NC - Wake Forest held advantages in most offensive categories except for the final score in a 20-17 loss to 16th-ranked Nebraska on Sept. 8 at BB&T Field.

WFU outgained the Huskers 236 to 115 on the ground and held a 376-373 advantage in total offense.

Nebraska took a 3-0 lead midway through the first quarter on a 22-yard field goal by Alex Henery. WFU's Sam Swank knotted the score with a 25-yard field goal early in the second quarter. The Cornhuskers went up 6-3 on Henery's 22-yarder with 7:41 to play in the second. Wake Forest took its first lead of the game with 5:13 to play when Hodges ran over from the one.

Following a WFU punt, Nebraska started from its own 20 and quarterback Sam Keller drove the Huskers to the WFU 25. He then hit Sean Hill for 25 yards and the touchdown giving NU a 13-10 halftime advantage.

Kenny Moore's five-yard scoring run with 10:52 to play in the third put Wake Forest ahead 17-13. Moore helped set up the score with a 38-yard run from scrimmage on a first-and-10 from the NU 47.

Nebraska regained the lead with 8:13 to play in the third when Marlon Lucky, who finished the game with 90 yards rushing, raced 22 yards for a score to give Nebraska a 20-17 lead.

Wake Forest had a prime opportunity to take the lead — or at least tie the score — midway through the fourth, when John Russell intercepted a pass at the Nebraska 10-yard line. The Huskers got the ball back three plays later when Zack Bowman stepped in front of Hodges's pass with 6:05 to play.

Wake Forest's last chance came after stopping Nebraska on downs with 1:54 to play. Ben Eisenhart seemed to intercept Hodges's third-down pass near midfield, but replay officials reversed the ruling. It did not matter — Hodges's final pass missed Kenny Moore, allowing the Huskers to run out the clock.

Nebraska — which rushed for 413 yards in a season-opening rout of Nevada — managed only 27 on the ground by halftime against Wake and finished with 115. Lucky, who had a career-high 233 yards rushing last week, had 90 yards on 24 carries.

Wake Forest 31, Maryland 24 Saturday, September 22, 2007

WINSTON-SALEM, NC - In one of the most remarkable comebacks in school history, Wake Forest eliminated a 24-3 deficit late in the third quarter to post a 31-24 win over Maryland in overtime at BB&T Field.

Maryland built a 24-3 lead on rushing touchdowns by Lance Ball, Cory Jackson and Keon Lattimore. Following a 54-yard run by Darrius Heyward-Bey, the Terps faced 1st-and-goal at the Wake 3 with an opportunity to go ahead 31-3. But Alphonso Smith stepped in front of a Jordan Steffy pass and returned it 100-yards for a touchdown, the longest interception return in WFU history.

That interception sparked the Deacons. Riley Skinner closed the gap to 24-17 with a 1-yard plunge with 7:55 to play and then found tight end John Tereshinski in the end zone with three seconds left to pull Wake to within one at 24-23. Sam Swank knotted the game with his PAT.

In overtime, Wake Forest handed the ball to Josh Adams on three consecutive carries, the final one the winning touchdown from 6 yards out. On Maryland's overtime possession, Stanley Arnoux and Chantz McClinic sacked Steffy on third down before Jeremy Thompson sacked him on fourth down.

DURHAM, NC - Wake Forest fell behind 9-0 less than four minutes into the game then roared back by scoring 34 unanswered points in a 41-36 win at Duke on Oct. 6.

The win was Wake Forest's third straight win and left the Deacons with a 3-2 overall record and a 2-1 mark in the ACC.

After taking a 34-9 lead midway through the third quarter, Wake Forest yielded three straight touchdowns to the Blue Devils who managed to cut the margin to just five points at 34-29 with 11:05 to play in the game. Kenny Moore's 53-yard touchdown sprint with 2:24 left in the game sealed the win for the Deacons, despite a late touchdown by Duke that made the final margin just five points.

Micah Andrews' four-yard run with eight seconds left in the second quarter gave Wake Forest a 24-9 halftime lead.

In the third quarter, Swank hit an 18-yard field goal before Alphonso Smith intercepted a Lewis pass and returned it 30 yards for a touchdown, his third of the year.

Duke rallied behind Lewis who threw a two-yard scoring pass to Riley and a 31-yarder to Jomar Wright sandwiched between a three-yard run by Justin Boyle. After Moore's 53-yard touchdown run cemented the win, Duke added a late score on a 19-yard pass from Lewis to Austin Kelly. MacPherson threw for 210 yards and one score, a 70-yard TD pass to Jason Anderson on a one-play scoring drive in the first quarter.

Anderson finished with three catches for 119 yards and Matt Wisnosky made field goals of 41, 28, and 30 yards.

Michael Brimage ran for a career-high 171 yards for the Midshipmen, who last won their season opener against Southern Methodist on Aug. 31.
