U.S. Naval Academy '96

First Year as Head Coach

Maj. Jake Jenkins, USMC, is in his first season as the head coach of the Navy sprint football team. He inherits a program that has won more CSFL/ELFL titles (31) and the highest winning percentage (.819) among any other school in league history.

Maj. Jenkins is no stranger to the ranks of the sprint football community, as he was a three-year letterwinner on Navy's sprint football squad from 1993-95. A two-time all-league defensive lineman, Maj. Jenkins served as the defensive team captain of a 1995 squad that posted a perfect 6-0 record and claimed the ELFL title.

"Given Maj. Jenkins's experience, leadership and past success with the Navy sprint football team, we expect the same level of commitment and enthusiasm that has been a trademark of the program throughout its entire history," stated Naval Academy Director of Athletics Chet Gladchuk. "A program as steeped in tradition as sprint football aspires to nothing less than the national championship every year."

"I am proud to return to my alma mater to give back to a team that meant so much to me as a midshipman," stated Jenkins. "The tradition is long and rich here and I look forward to adding what I can to the legacy of the team. The league is extremely competitive and adds to the foundation of experiences that will shape these future leaders."

Following commissioning from the Naval Academy in 1996, Maj. Jenkins graduated from The Basic School in March 1997 and Infantry Officers Course in August 1997. From there, he was assigned to 3rd Battalion 5th Marines where he held the billets of Rifle Platoon Commander, Rifle Company Executive Officer and CAAT Platoon Commander. As a Rifle Platoon Commander he deployed as part of the boat company in the 31st MEU and participated in the joint Exercise Cobra Gold in Thailand.

In February of 2000, he was assigned to Recruiting Station Baltimore where he held the billet of Operations Officer.



After graduating from the Expeditionary Warfare School in May 2004, he reported to 1st Battalion 8th Marines, where he assumed command of Headquarters and Service Company and deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom II. Upon return from Iraq, he assumed command of Charlie Company.

While in Command of Charlie Company, Maj. Jenkins was deployed in support of JTF Katrina in order to assist with search and recovery, and humanitarian assistance. He later deployed as part of the 24th MEU and participated in the evacuation of 15,000 American Citizens from war-torn Lebanon. Charlie Company was entrusted with providing security for the U.S. Embassy in Beirut throughout the evolution. He also took part in Operation Infinite Moonlight, a bilateral event with the Jordanian Army.

Personal decorations include Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement medal with combat distinguishing device and Combat Action Ribbon.

Maj. Jenkins, 35, is married to the former Kristen Corbett of Catonsville, Md. They have three daughters, Ryleigh (4), Mackenna (3) and Haidyn (7 months).

With a program as entrenched in success as the Navy sprint football program, the objectives for the 2007 squad are no different than any other team to don the Navy blue and gold – win the CSFL title and beat Army.

This season, the Midshipmen will be under the guidance of first-year head coach **Maj. Jake Jenkins, USMC**, an individual accustomed to winning during his sprint football playing career with Navy a decade ago. Helping Jenkins reach the annual goals set forth is a group of 31 letterwinners from last season, 11 of which served as starters.

QUARTERBACKS

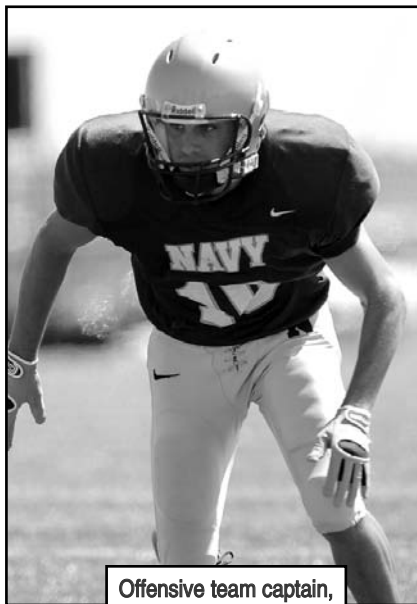
For the fourth-consecutive season, Navy will turn to a new starting quarterback to take the snaps from center. However, the Mids will not be inexperienced in this regard, as **D.J. Green** saw action in four games last season. The junior from Indianapolis completed 10 of his 20 pass attempts for 117 with a touchdown for the 2006 squad. Also competing for time as the signal caller are **Matthew Mitchelson** and **Jon DeWitt**. Mitchelson spent some time at wide receiver one year ago, hauling in a 23-yard touchdown pass against Princeton.

Perhaps the highlight of the returning Midshipmen this season is the rushing attack, as **Richard Engel** and **Enrique Harris** they teamed up for 993 yards on the ground with 12 touchdowns. Engel, a first-team all-league running back in 2006, churned out 659 yards on 115 carries with nine scores. The Navy senior posted three 100-yard efforts on the year, two of which came against arch rival Army. Harris, a second-team all-league running back, tallied 334 yards with three touchdowns on 52 rushing attempts and also had a 100-yard performance against Penn. **Nate Stewart**, **Steve Benson** and **Alfonso Meidus** all saw playing time in 2006 and will be expected to serve again in 2007. The trio of running backs totaled 206 yards and a touchdown on 45 carries.

RECEIVERS

The aerial game will have several capable targets to haul in passes and make defenders miss. Leading the cast of receivers is **Tommy Tellson**, who earned second-team all-league honors after making 18 receptions for 273 yards and two touchdowns last year. Offensive team captain **Todd Barriger** will also provide the Mids with a deep threat, as he averaged 26.8 yards per catch in 2006. **Nash Bagby** and **Brad Cash** both saw time at wide out during the 2006 campaign and are expected to contribute again this year.



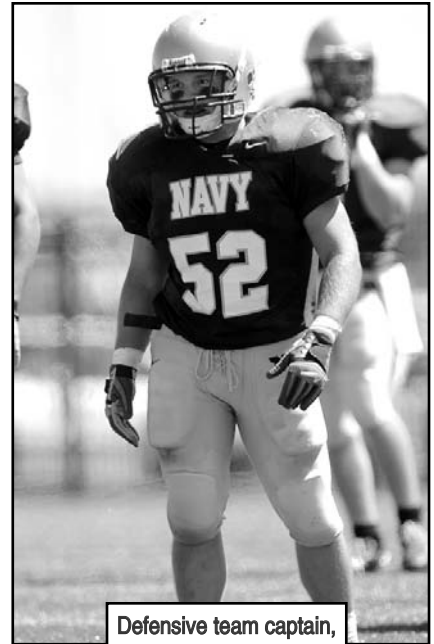

Despite the graduation of Ryan Engle and Danny Davis from last year's team, Navy's linebackers in 2007 are reloaded for success. **Brian Smith** led the team in tackles with 39 one year ago, and was such an electric force that he earned second-team all-league distinction and the team's Special Forces Award. **Tyler Hawkins** stepped up during his freshman campaign to make an immediate impact last year, as he made 21 tackles, 14 of which came in a start at Cornell. **Chris Combellick** also saw action in four games in his first season with the sprint football team in 2006 and will be counted on for additional help this year.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Navy's secondary heading into the season returns plenty of athleticism and covering ability this year, despite losing two starters from a year ago due to graduation. **James Campbell** earned all-league recognition in 2006, as he led the team with three interceptions and four pass breakups, while also accumulating nine tackles and forcing a fumble. **Andrew Wright** joined Campbell in the starting cast, as he totaled 22 tackles and swatted away three passes en route to all-league honors. **Hunter Armour** could also be counted on to immediately produce for the Mids, as he spent his first two seasons in Annapolis playing for the junior varsity team.

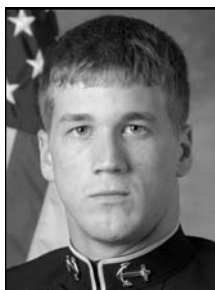

WHAT IS SPRINT FOOTBALL?

2007 NAVY SPRINT FOOTBALL

What is sprint football?

Well ... it's quite simple. It's the same as regular football.

Helmet, shoulder pads, cleats, oblong-shaped ball, 100-yard field, field goal posts, sidelines, end zones ... and the list goes on.

You name it and it's in the game.

The only difference between sprint and varsity is that the players who compete in sprint must weigh no more than 172 pounds 48 hours prior to kickoff.

But don't be fooled by the size for a second, because these guys can play.

The History

The evolution of 150-pound football was started in the early 1930s by a Penn president to assure the small student-athlete an opportunity to compete in football on the intercollegiate level.

Founded as the Eastern 150-Pound Football League in 1934, the original league had seven members: Cornell, Lafayette, Pennsylvania, Princeton, Rutgers, Villanova and Yale. Throughout the years, a number of teams have either joined or resigned their presence in the league. In 1946, Navy fielded its first squad, with Army following suit in 1957.

During the next 25 years, athletes became bigger forcing the weight limit to increase from 150 pounds to 154 pounds, and later to 159 pounds. At that time, the league was called the Eastern Lightweight Football League. Prior to the 1996 season, the ELFL increased the weight limit again, this time to 165 pounds just two days before the first game of the season. In 2004, the league made another change to the weight requirement when it upped the maximum weight to 166 pounds. Again in 2005, the weight maximum increased to 172 pounds.

The 1998 season marked the elimination of the term "Lightweight" and replaced with the word "Sprint," a word that expresses the quickness, speed and caliber of play in the league, while serving as a marketing tool to attract new teams. That year the league was renamed the Collegiate Sprint Football League (CSFL). Five teams comprise the current CSFL and include: Army, Cornell, Navy, Pennsylvania and Princeton.

The league has also produced some heavyweight alums, including Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld, who was a former standout as he played for Princeton in 1954. The league is not just limited to government officials but standout coaching legends as well. George Allen, who began

his coaching career in 1947 as an assistant on the now-disbanded Michigan 150-pound team, went on to become head coach of the Washington Redskins.

The Players

At weigh-ins, which are done two days in advance of kickoff, players must report under the maximum allowed weight of 172 pounds. Sprint is very similar to wrestling in that the players constantly watch their diets. In addition to all the football drills that take place during practice, athletes will run several times throughout practice and in their free time to keep the weight in check.

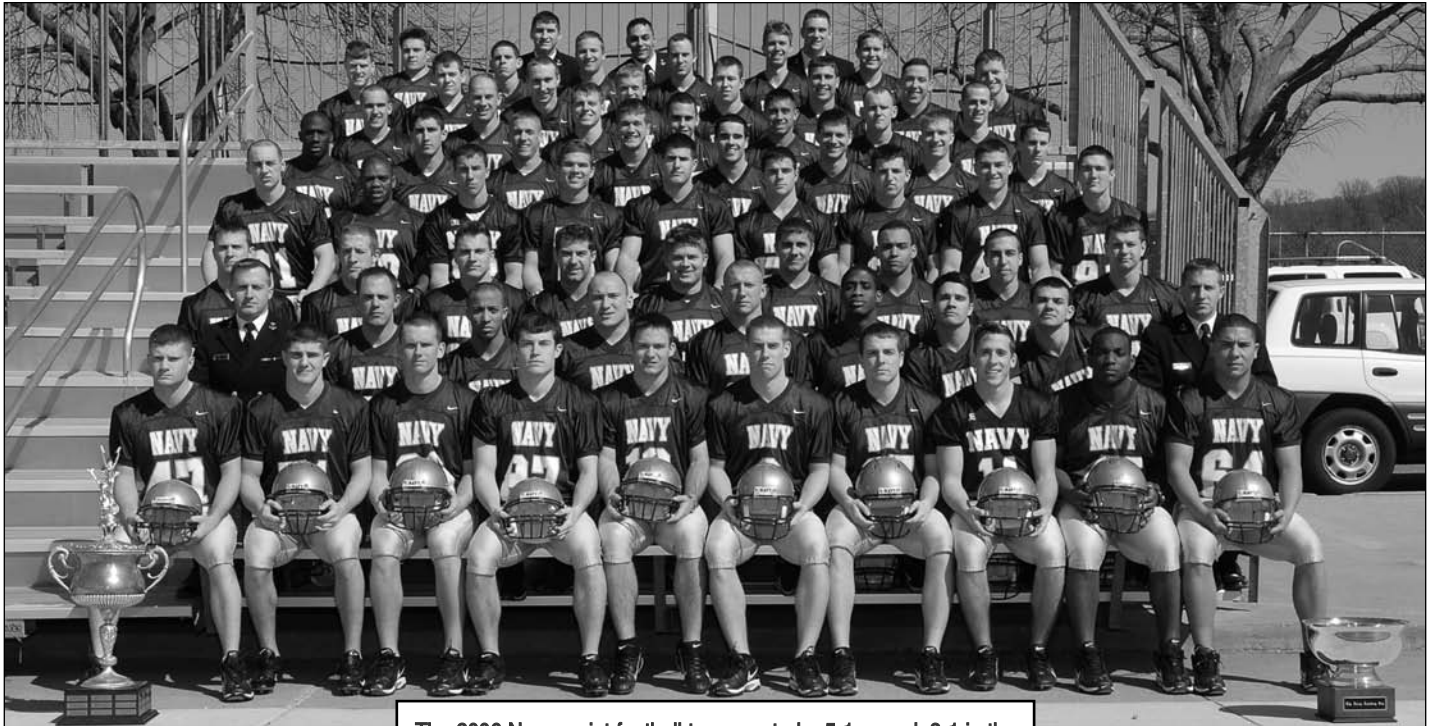
"After high school, I figured I would never play another snap of football in my life," former Navy quarterback and two-time CSFL MVP Chris Ashinhurst (Class of '04) said. "I thought sprint was just like intramural. After the first practice, I was like, 'This is pretty intense stuff.' We have to cut weight, run like a track team and hit like a football team."

However, after weigh-ins, players can eat what they want as most reach 175 pounds by game day. The average weight for the athletes during the season ranges between 155 to 175 pounds.

During the off-season, players' weights fluctuate with some going as high

as 185 pounds. However, as summer practice approaches, players go through their own training programs to make weight safely and get ready for the new season. Height doesn't matter in the league. Most of the players are generally between 5'6" and 6'0" tall, but there are always exceptions to the rule as some are as tall as 6'3".

The league is a perfect opportunity for players to continue competing in the sport they love. Most of the players in the league were told throughout their high school careers that they were too small to play at the intercollegiate level. However, this sport gives them the chance to fulfill their dreams.

"It was perfect for me because I didn't think I would play football after high school," former Navy running back Trevor Garabedian-Prophet (Class of '06) said. "I didn't weigh enough to play with the big boys, but this is right up my alley."

And these are not just ordinary players. Some earned team or individual honors with their high school football and variety of other teams. Navy's 2007 offensive captain, Todd Barriger, was the team captain of both his football and basketball team and won two district championships on the gridiron. Taylor Brashear, Navy's 2007 defensive captain, was an all-state selection in Tennessee and was twice named to the all-region team.

Because of the players' size, proper technique and execution are taught rather than just bulking up. Due to this element, sprint teams regularly beat Division III junior varsity teams that have 300 pounders scattered throughout the roster.

Naval Academy Tradition

There are few schools that can match the tradition of sprint football at the U.S. Naval Academy.

The Midshipmen have won 24 outright and 31 total league championships, both of which are the most in CSFL history.

In their 61 years of competing in the sport, the Midshipmen have totaled an impressive 297-62-9 record for an .819 winning percentage. In addition to those impressive numbers, Navy has also outscored its opponents by an all-time score of 9,878-3,484.

In a rivalry as intense as the 'big boy' counterparts, Navy and Army have battled in sprint football 64 times, with the Midshipmen coming away victorious 33 times with one tie.

For the 11th-consecutive season, Navy and Army will square off twice in the same season. This year, the Mids and the Black Knights will compete in the Allegiance Bowl in Saratoga Springs, N.Y., before battling for the N-Star at West Point in November.

"This lighter side of Army-Navy is no joke," Sports Illustrated writer John Walters said in his article about the sport in a November 2003 issue of Sports Illustrated on Campus.

Navy's 2006 head coach Maj. Joseph R. Clearfield, USMC, concurs, "It's just unbelievable how hard these guys (Navy and Army) play. This was how football was meant to be played, with 11 guys flying around with reckless abandon."

NAVAL ACADEMY

ANNAPOLIS

The City of Annapolis has been home to the Naval Academy for all but four years since the founding of the school in 1845 on the grounds of what originally was the Army's Fort Severn. The Academy moved its location to Newport, Rhode Island, from 1861-1865 during the Civil War.

ANCHORS AWEIGH

"Anchors Aweigh" was written by Lt. Charles Zimmerman, musical director of the Naval Academy, in 1906, with the lyrics provided by Alfred H. Miles '06 as a fight song for the 1907 graduating class. The song made its debut at the 1906 Army-Navy game and when the Mids won, the song became traditional at the contest.

Stand Navy down the field,
Sails set to the sky,
We'll never change our course,
So Army you steer shy.
Roll up the score, Navy,
Anchors Aweigh,
Sail Navy down the field,
And sink the Army,
sink the Army Grey

BANCROFT HALL

Named after the former Secretary of the Navy (1845-46) and founder of the Naval Academy George Bancroft, Bancroft Hall serves as the dormitory for the entire Brigade of Midshipmen. Its 33 acres of floor space and nearly five miles of hallways makes it one of the largest dorms in the world.

BRIGADE OF MIDSHIPMEN

The 4,200-member student body at the Naval Academy is called the Brigade of Midshipmen.

The Brigade is organized into ...

- 2 regiments
- 6 battalions
- 30 companies

BILL THE GOAT

The first recorded use of a goat as the mascot for Navy teams was in 1893 when an animal named El Cid (the Chief) was presented to the Brigade by officers of the USS New York. El Cid helped Navy to a 6-4 win over Army that year and a goat became the permanent mascot of the Academy in 1904.



BLUE & GOLD

Now, colleges from sea to sea
May sing of colors true;
But who has better right than we
To hoist a symbol hue?
For sailors brave in battle fair,
Since fighting days of old,

CLASS RANKS

First-year students at the Naval Academy are referred to as "plebes" during their initial or "Fourth Class" year in school, while sophomores at Navy, members of the "Third Class," are called "youngsters." Juniors at the school are designated as "Second Class," with seniors called "Firsties" in reference to their "First Class" year.

CO-ED

Women were first admitted to the Naval Academy during the summer of 1976. Today, women comprise roughly 15 percent of the student body.

COMMISSIONED OFFICERS

When a student graduates from the Naval Academy, they have the option to enter either the Navy or the Marine Corps as an officer. If they choose to join the Navy, they are commissioned as Ensigns, while those entering the Marine Corps are given the rank of Second Lieutenant.

JOHN PAUL JONES

The crypt of John Paul Jones, considered America's first naval leader and hero, is located below the Naval Academy Chapel.

The native of Scotland was born in 1747, and travelled to the colonies to assist America during the Revolutionary War. His ship never lost a battle as he reached a rank of captain in the Continental Navy.

Jones died in 1792 in Paris, France, and was buried there. His remains were returned to the United States in 1905 and he was interred at the Naval Academy eight years later.

MARINE CORPS

Those officers entering the Marine Corps have the choice of service selecting one of the following fields ...

- Aviation -- air command and control, anti-air warfare, aviation maintenance, aviation supply, pilot, naval flight officer.
- Ground -- armor, artillery, communications (information systems), engineering, financial management, infantry*, logistics, military police



MIDSHIPMAN

The original 17th Century meaning of the word "midshipmen" designated those men who stood watch "amidships", or in the middle portion of a ship. The middle "s" was later dropped to give the current form of the word.

Midshipmen were originally young boys who were apprenticed to sea captains to learn the trade.

In the early days of the Navy, midshipmen were trained aboard ship until they were commissioned as ensigns.

NAVY

Graduates of the Naval Academy entering the Navy have the following service options available to them ...

- Aviation -- flight officer, pilot
- Nuclear Propulsion -- ships, submarines
- Restricted Line and Staff Corps -- civil engineering, cryptology, intelligence, maintenance, medicine, meteorology/oceanography, supply
- Special Operations -- explosive ordinance disposal, explosive ordinance management, mine countermeasures, operational diving and salvage,
- Navy SEALs
- Surface Warfare -- conventional, nuclear powered
- Submarines



NICKNAME

The official nickname for all of Navy's athletic teams is Midshipmen. "Mids" is an appropriate nickname, while "Middie" is inappropriate.

N-STAR

Members of varsity teams who qualify for the varsity letter receive an N-Star for their letter sweaters if they participate in a victory over Army in any sport-designated Star Game.

The varsity N and corresponding N-Star were initiated during the early 1890s.

SCHOOL COLORS

Each class at the Naval Academy produced their own set of class colors until 1892 when Navy Blue and Gold were established as the official colors for the entire Naval Academy.

SUMMER TRAINING

Summers remain a busy and challenging time of year for midshipmen. Their initial tenure at the Naval Academy begins around July 1 prior to the start of the freshman year at the school with "Plebe Summer." Instead of taking academic classes, plebes receive military indoctrination and learn basic seamanship and sailing.

The summer following plebe year is spent aboard various ships to gain knowledge and experience of the workings of the Navy. Included in this time is a three-week cruise aboard either a 44-foot Naval Academy sailboat or a Yard Patrol craft traveling on the East Coast.

Portions of the summer before the start of a second-class year is spent visiting bases of both the Navy and the Marine Corps. That leads up to the next summer when midshipmen join an operational unit of the Navy or Marine Corps for several weeks. In addition, rising firsties also begin to accept leadership roles at either the Naval Academy for plebe summer, the Naval Academy Prep School (Newport, R.I.) or aboard a yard patrol or sailing cruise.

TECUMSEH

Tecumseh is the Native American figurehead which has been facing Bancroft Hall since 1866.

The statue originally was the figurehead of the USS Delaware and named after Tamanend, a Delaware chief. The name was later changed to Tecumseh after a Shawnee chieftain who lived from 1768-1813.

The original wooden statue was replaced after 50 years by the current bronze version.

Tecumseh is painted prior to football games and during Commissioning Week he is adorned with the shoulder boards of a Navy ensign on one side and that of a Marine Corps second lieutenant on the other.

THE YARD

"The Yard" is another name for the grounds of the Naval Academy. Originally just 10 acres, The Yard has grown to a size of 338 acres.
