The BIG EAST Conference

After celebrating its 25th anniversary a year ago, the BIG EAST Conference moves forward in 2004-05 with new members poised to join a conference that gives unequivocal importance to providing student-athletes with opportunities to excel against the nation's best.

In 2005-06, the league will add five new members: the University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, the University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 24 national championships in six different sports and 122 student-athletes have won individual national titles. The BIG EAST always has been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 300 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors.

In 2003-04, three BIG EAST student-athletes were named the national scholar-athlete of the year in their respective sports –

Connecticut's Emeka Okafor in men's basketball, Notre Dame's Vanessa Pruzinsky in women's soccer and St. John's Chris Wingert in men's soccer.

BIG EAST student-athletes also have continued their success after leaving the classrooms and playing fields. Former Connecticut women's basketball standout Dr. Leigh Curl was inducted into the Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 1999. Former Georgetown men's basketball star Dikembe Mutombo was named a winner of the President's Service Award, the highest honor in the U.S. for volunteer service.

The BIG EAST continued to thrive on the playing fields and in the playing arenas in 2003-04. In basketball, Connecticut won the men's and women's NCAA titles. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women also grabbing NCAA crowns the previous season, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won the last five women's basketball titles.

Also in '03-04, St. John's played in the NCAA men's soccer national championship game while Connecticut made it to the women's soccer final and Georgetown played in its third women's NCAA lacrosse semifinal in the last four years. Providence placed third in women's cross country

and league member Syracuse won the national title in men's lacrosse, though it is not a BIG EAST sport.

Whether it's the student-athletes or the league as a whole, moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse to its growing list of sports. The inaugural women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.



The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates, and their record of scholastic achievement notably shows a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization enjoys outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of the BIG EAST football conference.

BIG EAST sports attract the interest of followers in the nation's largest media markets including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, Washington, D.C., Pittsburgh and Hartford. When the new schools are added in 2005-06, the BIG EAST markets will contain almost one-fourth of all television households in the U.S.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has long-range television contracts with CBS, ESPN and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual BIG EAST Championship in

Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 500 BIG EAST athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence, where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

BIG EAST Timeline

Notre Dame took a landmark step in 1995-96 when its basketball team began competing as a member of the BIG EAST Conference. Since the inaugural season in 1898, the Irish program had enjoyed tremendous success as a basketball independent.

The 2004-05 season marks the 10th anniversary of Notre Dame's entrance into the BIG EAST Conference. While the first five years saw moderate success, the last four seasons have signaled a resurgence as the Irish have become one of the league's most successful teams. Since the arrival of head coach Mike Brey, Notre Dame has won 62.5 percent of its regular-season games.

The Irish hung a championship banner for the first time in the program's history in the Joyce Center when they won the BIG EAST West Division title in 2001. On three occasions, Notre Dame has produced the league's player of the year and twice has had the conference's rookie of the year, in addition to six first-team all-BIG EAST honorees.

July 11, 1994 — The BIG EAST announces the extension of its invitation to Notre Dame, along with Rutgers and West Virginia, to join the conference.

July 1, 1995 — Notre Dame's 90-year reign as a basketball independent ends when the Irish become an official BIG EAST member and join Boston College, Connecticut, Georgetown, Miami, Pittsburgh, Providence, Rutgers, St. John's, Seton Hall, Syracuse, Villanova and West Virginia in the 12-team powerhouse league.

December 2, 1995 — Notre Dame suffers an 86-80 overtime loss at Rutgers in the BIG EAST opener for both schools. Ryan Hoover leads four Irish players in double figures as he scores 20 points.

December 6, 1995 — The Irish drop an 85-65 decision to ninth-ranked Connecticut in the first-ever BIG EAST regular-season contest at the Joyce Center. Pat Garrity and Phil Hickey score 18 and 16 points, respectively, in the loss.

January 20, 1996 — After an 0-6 start in BIG EAST play, Notre Dame earns its first-ever conference regular-season win with a 79-67 victory over Rutgers at the Joyce Center. Ryan Hoover (26 points) and Pat Garrity (23 points) combined for 49 points in the victory.

January 31, 1996 — Notre Dame picks up its first BIG EAST road win with an 86-83 victory over St. John's at Madison Square Garden.

March 4, 1996 — Pat Garrity becomes Notre Dame's first all-conference honoree when he is named to the all-BIG EAST third team.

March 6, 1996 — Notre Dame falls to Syracuse 76-55 in the first round of the BIG EAST Men's Championship at Madison Square Garden.

January 2, 1997 — Pat Garrity scores 27 points to lead the Irish in a 69-52 victory over Syracuse at the Joyce Center, marking the first-ever win against the Orange in a BIG EAST game.

January 18, 1997 — Notre Dame, behind a 22-point performance by Pat Garrity, defeats Syracuse for the second time during the 1996-97 season as the Irish earn a 73-58 victory at the Carrier Dome. It marked Notre Dame's first sweep in BIG EAST regular-season play.

February 4-11, 1997 — In a span of seven days, for the first time in school history Notre Dame wins three straight BIG EAST games as the Irish register wins at home against St. John's (75-70), Connecticut (71-65) and West Virginia (90-76).

February 22, 1997 — With five players in double figures, Notre Dame beat Providence 86-74 in overtime at the Joyce Center. The 22 points scored by the Irish in overtime (they outscored the Friars 22-10) were the second-highest total in an overtime period by one team in BIG EAST history.

March 4, 1997 — Pat Garrity is named the BIG EAST Conference Player of the Year, in addition to earning first-team all-conference honors.

January 15, 1998 — Notre Dame registers its first win over a ranked opponent since February 17, 1994 when the Irish defeat West Virginia, 74-72, in Morgantown, W. Va. Pat Garrity scores 27 points and grabs 10 rebounds in the win.

January 31, 1998 — With a 73-65 victory over St. John's at Madison Square Garden, Notre Dame claims its third BIG EAST Conference road win, surpassing the total number of road victories the Irish had on the road in their first two seasons.

February 17, 1998 — Pat Garrity becomes the 19th player in BIG EAST history to score 1,000-plus points in league regular-season play by scoring a game-high 31 points in an 88-79 loss to Connecticut at the Joyce Center. Garrity would go on to conclude his career 15th on the league's all-time career scoring list, while his 20.5 career BIG EAST scoring average tied him for fifth all-time.

March 2, 1998 — Pat Garrity is named a first-team all-BIG EAST selection for the second consecutive year, while Martin Ingelsby is selected to the league's all-rookie team.

December 8, 1998 — Behind Troy Murphy's 30 points and 11 rebounds, Notre Dame wins its BIG EAST opener 83-80 on the road at Providence. The 30 points tied Allen Iverson's record for most points in first career BIG EAST game.

January 5, 1999 — For the second time during the 1998-99 season, Troy Murphy nets 30 points in a BIG EAST game as Notre Dame defeats Pittsburgh 87-64 at the Joyce Center. Murphy became the first player in conference history to score 30 or more points in two league games during a rookie season.

February 14, 1999 — Troy Murphy tops the 30-point mark for the third time during the 1998-99 campaign with a 32-point performance in an 85-80 loss to West Virginia.

March 2, 1999 — Troy Murphy is honored as the BIG EAST Rookie of the Year. In addition he is a second-team all-conference selection. He finished third in the league in scoring with a 19.2 scoring average in conference games and became the first freshman to lead the BIG EAST in rebounding with a 10.3 average.

January 5, 2000 — In Matt Doherty's BIG EAST coaching debut, Notre Dame defeats second-ranked and defending national champion Connecticut 75-70 at the Hartford Civic Center. Troy Murphy's 33 points and 16 rebounds lead the Irish.

January 12, 2000 — Notre Dame is 2-0 in BIG EAST play for the first time since becoming a conference member following an 86-77 victory at the Joyce Center against Boston College.

February 12, 2000 — Notre Dame defeats Connecticut 68-66 for the second time in 1999-2000.

March 7, 2000 — After earning a record-tying six BIG EAST player-of-the-week honors, Troy Murphy is named the league's player of the year as he became the first player in conference history to lead the BIG EAST in both scoring (22.7) and rebounding (10.3).

March 8, 2000 — Behind Troy Murphy's 25 points and 14 rebounds, Notre Dame defeats Rutgers in the first round of the 2000 BIG EAST Championship for its first-ever tournament victory.

March 9, 2000 — Notre Dame falls to Miami 61-58 in its BIG EAST Championship quarterfinal game.

January 2, 2001 — The Irish lose to Syracuse for the fifth straight time in Mike Brey's BIG EAST coaching debut at the Carrier Dome.

January 6, 2001 — Troy Murphy scores 37 points in giving Mike Brey his first BIG EAST win as the Irish defeat Rutgers 87-80 at the Joyce Center.



Chris Thomas scored 24 points and dished off eight assists in Notre Dame's 66-64 victory over Pittsburgh at the Joyce Center on February 9, 2003. The Panthers entered the game ranked fourth in the country, while the Irish were 10th. The contest marked the first matchup between two top-10 teams at the Joyce Center in more than 23 years.

January 27, 2001 — Notre Dame's 78-71 win at Georgetown marked the first-ever four-game win streak for an Irish team in BIG EAST play.

February 3, 2001 — Following its 78-71 victory on the road at Georgetown, Notre Dame wins back-to-back BIG EAST road games for the first time in school history with a 75-67 win at Pittsburgh.

February 14, 2001 — Notre Dame extends its BIG EAST win streak (its best ever) to eight games with an 81-59 victory at Rutgers.

February 24, 2001 — The Irish clinch the BIG EAST West Division for the school's first-ever league regular-season title one before the conclusion of the season with an 85-61 victory at Virginia Tech. Notre Dame's 24-point margin of victory was the largest ever (at the time) for an Irish team in a BIG EAST game.

March 6, 2001 — Troy Murphy shares BIG EAST player-of-the-year honors with Boston College's Troy Bell to become just the fourth player in league history to win the award twice.

January 9, 2002 — Notre Dame rallies from a 15-point halftime deficit (its largest ever in a BIG EAST game) to defeat West Virginia 67-64 in Morgantown.

February 9, 2002 — Notre Dame and Georgetown play the first four-overtime game in BIG EAST history and in the 96-year history of the program. The Irish prevail 116-111 at the MCI Center in Washington, D.C. A record four Notre Dame players record a double-double. Chris Thomas plays all 60 minutes and finishes with 22 points and 12 rebounds, while Matt Carroll scores 30 points and grabs 10 rebounds. Georgetown's Michael Sweetney records the first "30-20" in conference history as he scores 35 points and grabs 20 rebounds.

March 5, 2002 — A record three players are BIG EAST all-conference team selections. Ryan Humphrey cops first-team honors marking the third straight year a Notre Dame player has been named to the first team. Chris Thomas earns third-team and is a unanimous selection to the all-rookie team, while David Graves is named to the honorable mention team.

March 6, 2002 — Chris Thomas becomes the second player in Notre Dame history named the BIG EAST Rookie of the Year.

March 7, 2002 — Notre Dame earns a spot in the BIG EAST Championship semifinals for the first time in seven seasons as a league member. After a first-round bye, the Irish defeat St. John's 83-63 in quarterfinal action to record just its second victory ever in the conference championship and earn a matchup with Connecticut.

February 1, 2003 — For the second time in as many meetings, overtime decided the outcome in the first contest of the regular-season between Notre Dame and Georgetown. Matt Carroll scored a career-high 36 points in leading the Irish to the 93-92 double-overtime victory.

February 9, 2003 — Torin Francis scored the game-winning basket with 0.6 seconds remaining as No. 10 Notre Dame beat No. 4 Pittsburgh. The contest marked the first matchup between two top-10 teams at the Joyce Center since December 9, 1980. It also was the first victory for an Irish team against a top-five opponent at the Joyce Center since February of 1994.

February 22, 2003 — Notre Dame wins its 16th straight at the Joyce Center, its second-longest win streak in school history with a 98-76 victory over Virginia Tech.

March 10, 2003 — For the fourth straight year, Notre Dame has a player selected to the all-conference first team. Matt Carroll is the latest Irish player named as an all-BIG EAST first-team selection. Chris Thomas is a second-team selection and Torin Francis is named to the all-rookie team.

January 10, 2004 — For just the second time ever since joining the BIG EAST, Notre Dame is 2-0 to start league play. Following a 63-52 victory over West Virginia, the Irish beat Villanova 82-78 on the road. The win was the first-ever by an Irish team over the Wildcats in BIG EAST play, snapping an eight-game conference losing streak.

February 9, 2004 — Chris Thomas scores 31 points in leading the Irish to an 80-74 victory over eventual national champion Connecticut at the Joyce Center.

February 16, 2004 — Chris Thomas and Chris Quinn combine for 47 points, scoring 25 and 22 points, respectively, as Notre Dame snaps a five-game losing streak to Syracuse in beating the defending national champions 84-72. It was the first victory at the Carrier Dome for an Irish team since January 18, 1997.

March 4, 2004 — Notre Dame allows just 48 points, the fewest in a BIG EAST game spanning 161 contests, as the Irish beat Georgetown 61-48.

March 6, 2004 — Notre Dame's 89-62 victory over St. John's is the largest margin of victory in a BIG EAST game.

March 10, 2004 — Notre Dame wins a first round BIG EAST tournament game for just the second time and advances to the quarterfinals for the third time since becoming a league member following a 65-64 win over West Virginia. Colin Falls hit the game-winning shot with 15.8 seconds remaining in the contest.
