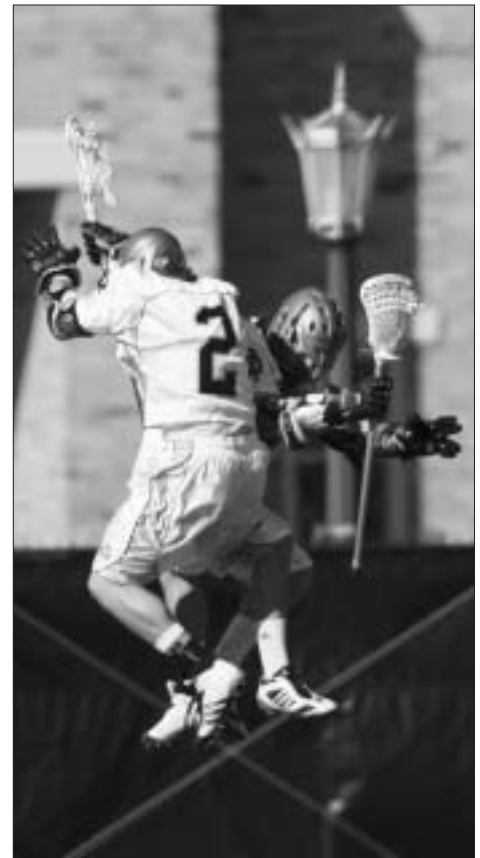

Moose Krause Stadium has been the home of Notre Dame lacrosse since its construction in 1988. The venue has seen a multitude of big games and top players.

The facility, named after former director of athletics Edward W. "Moose" Krause, is located just east of the Joyce Center on the Cartier Field complex and has a seating capacity of 5,000 and also is used by the Irish track and field squads.

Krause Stadium features 2,500 permanent bleachers on both sides of the 70 x 120-yard grass field. The stands are raised so that the first row of seats measures six feet above field level for better viewing, and there is ample room for wheelchair seating. The field itself is surrounded by a nine-lane Mondo track, the fastest surface of its kind in the world.

The Irish have had considerable success at home, posting a 89-26 (.774) record since Krause Stadium was built. That includes six undefeated campaigns and 20 victories over ranked opponents. Each of the first six ranked opponents to travel to Krause Stadium were defeated by the Irish. The biggest win at Krause Stadium was a 10-9 victory over #4 Hofstra on April 4, 1997.

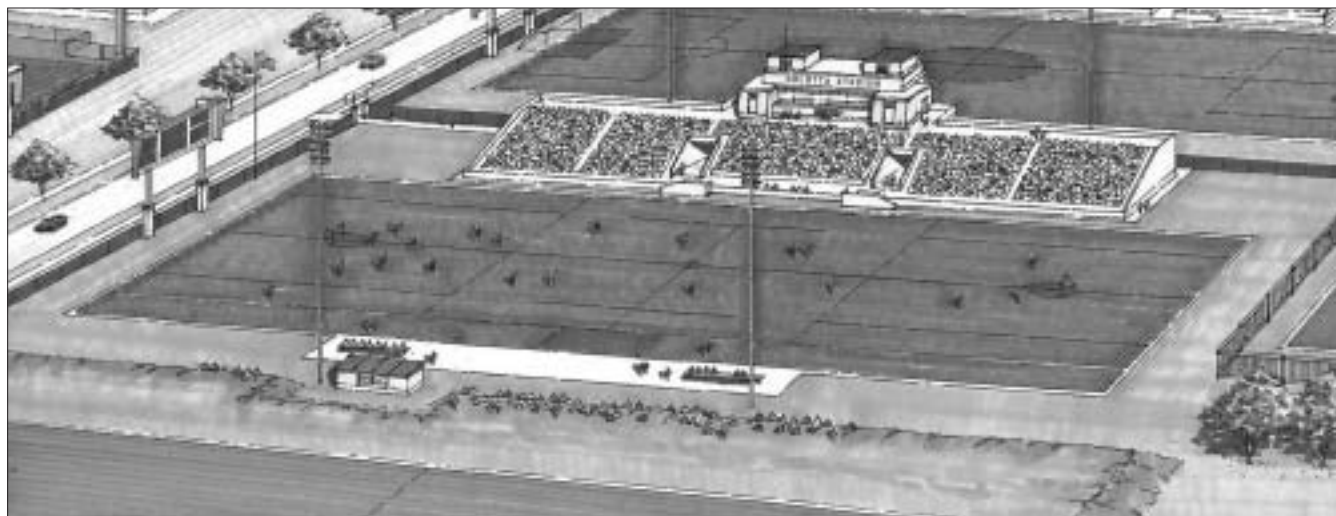

## Arlotta Stadium

Arlotta Stadium will become the new home for the Notre Dame men's and women's lacrosse programs upon completion, which is scheduled for June of 2009. Construction of the facility will begin in August of 2008. Conceptual plans suggest a 2,000-seat, lighted stadium that would include an artificial-turf field, locker rooms, restrooms and concession areas.

The state-of-the-art facility is named after Notre Dame graduate John Arlotta, president and chief executive officer of Denver-based

Coram Inc. He and his wife Bobbie pledged the lead gift toward the stadium to be built to the east of the Joyce Center as part of the University's new athletics quadrangle. The Arlotta children - Mindy, Andy and Jon - also have pledged an additional gift from The Arlotta Family Foundation toward the project. In addition to their generous donation, alumni and friends of the lacrosse programs have donated over two million dollars.



# Loftus Sports Center

The Loftus Sports Center combines with Krause Stadium to give the University of Notre Dame some of the top lacrosse facilities in the country. Constructed in 1988, it is one of just six indoor facilities in the country that plays host to Division I men's lacrosse games.

The Loftus Center provides Notre Dame with one of the top multi-purpose indoor facilities in the nation. Complete with the 120-yard synthetic turf Meyo Field, six-lane 352-yard Mondo indoor track and a 9,000-square-foot weight room, it is used by several Irish athletic programs.



*The Isban Auditorium within the Guglielmino Athletics Complex provides an ideal setting for team meetings. The auditorium can seat up to 150 people in large chairback seats.*



*The Haggar Fitness Center, which is shared by both the Loftus Center and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex, features 25,000 square feet of strength and conditioning space with state-of-the-art weight equipment, a 50-yard Mondo track for speed training, a 45-yard by 18-yard Prestige Turf athletic surface for team workouts and an updated sound and lighting system that features six plasma television screens.*

The building is named after John R. Loftus of St. Charles, Ill., a 1949 graduate of the University. Loftus is chief executive of JRL, a real estate, investment and construction firm. Loftus is also a member of the Notre Dame Monogram Club, having played on the varsity basketball team in 1944, 1948 and 1949.

The Meyo Field in the Loftus Center offers Irish lacrosse a 55-by-110 yard synthetic turf playing surface. It was revamped in the summer of 2003 with the addition of Prestige field turf. The field and surrounding track are named for Ray and Marie Meyo of Brecksville, Ohio. Meyo, who graduated from Notre Dame in 1964, is president and chief executive officer of Telxon Corp. in Akron, Ohio, the world's largest manufacturer of portable tele-transaction computers.

The Meyo Field is permanently marked for lacrosse competition and is used as a backup site for games in the event of inclement weather. The Irish have played several contests in the Loftus Center.

In addition to the Meyo Track and Field in the Loftus Center, the Irish lacrosse squad also benefits from the Haggar Fitness Center located in the facility. Equipped with more than 40,000 pounds of free weights, it is four times the size of the weight room in the Joyce Center. It is considered by national strength coaches to be one of the largest, and finest, college training facilities in the nation.

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## A Championship with Meaning

I had a tough start to my experience with the World Team. My office was in 7 World Trade Center and was destroyed due to the attack on Sept. 11. I was sitting at my desk at the time the first plane impacted the World Trade Center. After hearing the explosion we evacuated the building.

At this time a few agents and I ran towards the bottom of the World Trade Center to set up a triage center. While waiting for the injured to come out, we had to move under a walkway to avoid being hit by people and debris falling from the top floors. I remember bandaging a lady's hand, then hearing the second plane accelerate right before it exploded above us. I just hugged the pylon that held up the walkway in hope that the plane wouldn't crash down on us.

At this point I ran a block north to help with all of the emergency personnel trying to get closer. About 15 minutes later I ran from the first tower that fell.

A number of agents regrouped and returned to look for survivors. We got about a block and a half away from the remaining tower when I saw the top floor drop. I turned and started running for my life. All I could think of was my dad saying "when you have the ball, never look back because it makes you run slower." I thought I was going to get crushed. If the tower would have fallen a little more towards the Hudson River I would not be here today. I feel very fortunate to have survived this attack. The victims of Sept. 11 are in my thoughts and prayers every day.

I spent the next four weeks at Ground Zero while almost everyone else on my U.S. team was taking part in fall practice. The fall tournament was probably the worst time for me to be playing lacrosse. I don't even recall all of the teams that we played.

Though I was not ready to play then, I knew there would be no better time to wear red, white, and blue. I think every athlete has a dream at one time or another to wear his or her country's jersey. I remember when all this started Darren Lowe said, "Don't ever underestimate someone playing for his or her country." Every time I put my jersey on, I thought of someone from Sept. 11, or someone who told me, "You can't," or my family who traveled around the world to watch me play a game that I love.

This team was motivated by the so-called lacrosse scholars that predicted us to lose. I took criticism more personally than most of the others on the team. Growing up in Illinois, I have always had to battle the critics. I have six motivational letters at my house. The first is a rejection letter from the University of Notre Dame. After giving up a year of competitive lacrosse and spending a year at Holy Cross College in Indiana, I now have an acceptance letter from Notre Dame. The third letter is a rejection letter from the United States Secret Service based on lack of

experience. Two years later I was employed by the USSS. Finally I have a letter from U.S. Lacrosse explaining how I didn't make the cut for a tryout for the 1998 U.S. Team. Now there is a letter saying I made the team and a gold medal that sits with that rejection letter.

This experience was so enjoyable because the team was told that we were the underdogs from the start. Someone e-mailed me and said that we were being displayed as the "Bad News Bears." We had to bond together.

There was not one guy on our team trying to be a superstar, well at least on the field - some could argue Ryan Mollett and Ryan Boyle were superstars in the social arena. At times on defense, Mollett, John Glatzel, and I were begging someone to shoot the ball. The offense was so unselfish

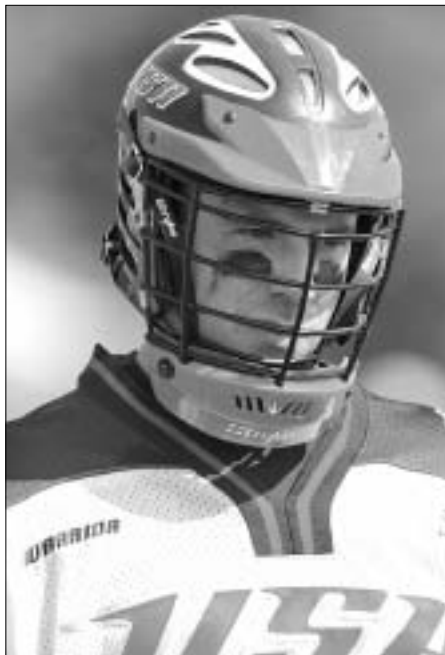
in its play, its motto seemed to be, "I don't want to shoot. You shoot."

We played our first game against the Iroquois Nationals and won 22-6. Then we read an Australian newspaper with some not-so-favorable quotes from the Australian coach, along the lines that it was the Australians' year and the U.S. team is over-rated and under-talented. In warm-ups, instead of running around their half of the field, the Australians took a lap all the way around to our bench. Putting it lightly, I don't think many of our guys, especially Nicky Polanco, appreciated it. From then on it seemed as though the game was over before it started, and we won 22-7. Not too bad for being over-rated and under-talented.

Then we had to get geared up for Canada. This game was the worst display of lacrosse that I have ever seen. Canada had nearly 30 minutes of penalties. Canada was taking cheap shots and late hits to take some of our players out of the game. At one point we had a 6-on-2. We won 14-9, but everyone was disappointed with the victory due to the way that the game was played.

Next we beat England and then the Iroquois in the semi-finals to set up another game with Canada for the championship.

We had a team meeting and went over the match-ups. I was going to cover Paul Gait. I think one way or another every lacrosse player models their game after one of the Gait brothers. I had a

poster of them next to my bed when I was in high school. For me, a kid from Northfield, Ill., covering Paul Gait in his last game for the world championship, even playing with the flu, I was still excited for the match-up.

We started the game with a three-goal lead. Then Canada made some plays to come back. It was back and forth until Canada pulled ahead by two to end the half. It was the first time this Team USA was trailing, and we were getting a little hesitant.

After regrouping we pulled ahead in the third quarter. Doug Shanahan played out of his mind in the fourth quarter. Canada realized they were short on time and called a stick check on Mike Powell. Mike's stick was illegal, and then Jimmy Butler (our team

stick doctor) countered their move with a stick check on Canada's John Tavares. It was found illegal and since he scored the last goal it was taken off the board. From there we were able to run off the clock and ended up winning 18-15.

At the beginning of this quest for the gold medal we were picked to finish second or third. "Team USA can't win," said the writers. I kept all the articles. I, along with this team, took the challenge. I am happy to say we are the World Champions! Memories of Nicky Polanco in leopard-skin sandals and a red, white and blue head band, as well as the punishment Trevor Tierney had after he couldn't get past the ladies tee on the golf course will be hard memories to forget. I miss sitting on the bus and playing what-if scenarios about the Secret Service with Matt Streibel, Scott Doyle and Ryan Boyle. It was a classy group of guys that I will never forget. I can't indicate how much pride I had I wearing a USA jersey after my 9-11 experience. I hope my World Team experience motivates all those who at one time have been told that they "can't."

## Staying on Top

*Irish bring back most of 2007 GWLL title team for another run*



Alex Wharton had a breakthrough season in 2007 as he registered eight goals and 10 assists. The senior will be looked upon to help bolster the Irish attacking unit again in 2008.

Notre Dame enters the 2008 campaign, the 28th season of varsity lacrosse at the University, with more answers than questions. The Irish return the bulk of the '07 squad that won the Great Western Lacrosse League (GWLL) title with a perfect 5-0 conference record. Overall, the Irish went 11-4 and fell to eventual national champion Johns Hopkins, 11-10, in overtime during the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Seven starters and 17 letterwinners are back for Notre Dame, including four All-America honorees in seniors Joey Kemp, Michael Podgajny and Sean Dougherty along with sophomore Will Yeatman. Three of Notre Dame's top four goal scorers return, including Ryan Hoff, who notched a team-high 40 goals last season en route to garnering first-team all-GWLL honors.

Kemp was named the 2007 GWLL player of the year and Yeatman collected newcomer of the year honors from the league. Yeatman registered a stellar freshman season as he led the Irish in assists (25) and total points (46).

One question that the Irish will face is if they can regain the same form that helped them run off eight straight victories in '07 before the season-ending loss to the Blue Jays.

"Unfortunately, we don't get to pick up playing where we were at the end of last year," says head coach Kevin Corrigan, the 2007 GWLL coach of the year. "We start over and rebuild. We have a lot of different guys that I think can contribute at both ends of the field. We're working through those competitive situations and figuring out what the best way to put guys

in to be successful. That's the challenge for us in the preseason."

Not everyone returns for the Fighting Irish, who will have to replace All-America honoree Brian Hubschmann along with Lucius Polk in the midfield. Hubschmann notched 39 points (27g, 12a) last season, while Polk also contributed a career-high 27 (18g, 9a) for the Irish, who ranked fourth nationally with an 11.65 goals per game average.

"Where the holes are from the end of last year are in the midfield," adds Corrigan. "How we fill those will say a lot about us. With that said, we're not looking at last year's team and saying how we're different. We're a whole new group. We have a whole new group of guys and we know we have a lot of guys coming back who've proven they can play at this level."

Corrigan sees good things for Notre Dame's specialty units. In 2007, the Irish man-up offense finished the season ranked third in the nation by converting on 50 percent (29 of 58) on its opportunities.

"Our specialty units last year, our man-down and man-up and faceoff group, were very good," states Corrigan. "We have to find the right people to be successful in those areas again. We were very successful with those at the end of last season."

The Fighting Irish defense ranked fourth nationally last season by allowing just 6.66 goals per game and the majority of that group returns. Dougherty and fellow senior Ross Zimmerman will team up with Kemp

and look to lock down opponents once again.

In 2007, Kemp ranked fourth among all NCAA Division I goalies in goals-against average (6.78) and save percentage (.614). He and senior faceoff specialist Taylor Claggett will solidify the Fighting Irish up the middle of the field.

"We feel like we're strong up the middle when you look at the goalie and the faceoff," says Corrigan. "We're confident going in that we think we should be able to compete at a high level, but we also know we have the challenge of forming this group into everything that it can be."

### ATTACK

Notre Dame boasts the same attack corps from last season that was one of the top units in the country. The duo of Hoff and Yeatman provide a potent one-two punch as they combined for 61 goals and 90 points in 2007. Hoff is valuable around the net and Yeatman along with the rest of the

Fighting Irish offense will look to find him in the crease.

"Ryan Hoff had a terrific sophomore year," states Corrigan. "One of the things about Ryan is that he's depending on us to play good offense. If we play good offense, Ryan is going to be successful. Hopefully we get to that point where we're playing effectively on offense because if we are then Ryan will score goals. He's as good as there is in the middle of the offense."

Hoff tied a Notre Dame record with seven goals in a 16-5 win over #19 Drexel last season. He also produced a five-goal and six-goal game and notched at least one point in 14 of 15 games. Yeatman and Podgajny were the only two Irish players to notch a point in every contest in 2007.

"Will Yeatman is obviously a tremendous threat," adds Corrigan. "We need to find different ways to use him and not just use him but the threat of him is going to be important."

Senior Alex Wharton and junior Duncan Swezey will also be key components for the Irish. Wharton, who will serve as a team co-captain along with Kemp, registered a career-best season one year ago as he tallied eight goals and ten assists, both career-high totals. He played in all but one game last season and made starts in eight of those contests. Wharton and Swezey, who also appeared in 14 games in '07, should help the Irish offense get on the same track as last season.

"Duncan Swezey played a little bit as a freshman and some more as a sophomore and is going to play an even bigger role this season," says the Irish head coach. "Alex Wharton is coming off a year when he played a lot as a junior after not playing as much prior to that. That year of experience for both of those guys is going to make a big difference for what they're able to do."

Providing crucial depth to the attack will be junior Dan Gibson along with sophomores Neal Hicks and Colin Igoe. Gibson saw action in 11 games last season and notched one goal, while Hicks tallied a goal and an assist in 11 contests. Igoe is a transfer from the University of Massachusetts. He appeared in one game for the Minutemen in '07 as he battled an injury.

"Hicks and Gibson were both guys that were here a year ago and we're looking for them to step up and play bigger roles but we're not sure what those roles are going to be right now, between attack and mid-field," comments Corrigan. "It's the same thing with Colin Igoe. We have to figure out what the best role for him is. I think all of those guys are going to play for us in some capacity but we aren't sure where that's going to be. But they could certainly contribute at the attack position."

Sloan Smith, a senior, has not seen a lot of game time during his Notre Dame tenure, but

Corrigan loves what he brings to the team. "Sloan Smith is absolutely great for our team. He's a hard worker and he's willing to do anything for our team to be successful. He's a very selfless guy who cares about our team and in the meantime is playing the best lacrosse that we've seen him play."

Sophomore Matt Ciambella did not see action during his rookie campaign, yet he should find his way onto the field in 2008. He had a solid fall season and the coaching staff expects that to continue into the spring as he works his way into the attack mix.

Notre Dame features one freshman on the attack, Tom Connor. Connor brings versatility to the Irish offense and he will look to find a role during his rookie season.

## MIDFIELD

Arguably the biggest question facing Notre Dame entering the 2008 season is in the midfield. The losses of Hubschmann and Polk are holes to fill yet the Irish have the weapons in place to not miss a beat.

Podgajny is the most experienced member of the Fighting Irish midfield unit with 37 career games played and 70 points (43g, 27a). Last season, he ranked third on the team with 26 goals to go with 13 assists. He also was a key cog in the nation's third-best man-up unit as he registered nine man-up goals, which were a team-high total. Podgajny was the only Irish player to score a goal in every game during the '07 season.

"In the midfield obviously we start with Mike Podgajny as a returning All-American but also as a guy who each year he's been here, he's gotten more effective," states Corrigan. "He's added something to his game and he's playing with a poise now and a confidence that a guy with his experience should play with. We expect big things out of Mike. Whether that's big numbers or not, I'm not really worried about that. I just expect that he's going to be the guy that anchors that first midfield. I know he's an excellent shooter so he'll get his opportunities."

Anson Fraser is a veteran who will look to see an expanded role during his senior campaign. Fraser has appeared in 16 career games, including four last season.

"Anson is playing the best lacrosse that we've seen him play," says Corrigan. "He's playing better defense and I think he gives us some depth in the midfield in a variety of different roles."

Junior Peter Christman has seen time in both the attack and midfield during his first two seasons with the Irish. This season he is in the midfield, where he provides valuable experience alongside Podgajny.

"Peter Christman is moving to the midfield this year," says Corrigan. "He has played some midfield and some attack for us in the last couple of years, but I really think that he's doing a good job from playing up top. He seems very comfortable up there right now after going through the fall. He's even surprising us with his play in the middle of the field and defensively. We're excited to see him in that role."

Fellow juniors Davey Malera (formerly Davey Leach), Dan Gibson and Kevin Cullinane will bring versatility to the midfield corps. Malera played in 14 games one season ago and was valuable from his defensive midfield position in addition to racking up five points on three goals and two assists. Gibson appeared in 11 games, including one start, as a sophomore and tallied one goal. Cullinane played in six games last season and notched an assist. He is also capable of aiding Claggett in the faceoff department.

Claggett will be looked upon to provide the Irish with more possessions through his faceoff prowess. The senior has been hampered by injuries over the past two seasons, but Corrigan expects a healthy Claggett to be a key to the team's success.

"Taylor Claggett has a chance to be on of the best faceoff guys in the country," states Corrigan. "He's as good as anyone out there. He's finally healthy and hopefully he stays that way. Another thing is that we have some more depth at that faceoff position this year and maybe that'll help him from getting worn down. Once you get worn down, that's when you become more vulnerable to injuries. Maybe with that depth we can protect him a little bit in terms of not putting him out there if he's tired."

Also adding depth to the faceoff position is sophomore Kelly McKenna, who saw time in 14 games last season. McKenna had 25 faceoff attempts in '07 in addition to dishing out an assist. He played well as a defensive midfielder and will continue in that role this season.

McKenna's classmate, Grant Krebs, also produced a solid rookie campaign as he notched four points on three goals and one assist in 12 games.

"Grant played really well for us this fall," says Corrigan. "His play was a little erratic as a freshman and that's typical of a freshman in a lot of ways. He's playing with great confidence right now and is doing a lot of different things. That's the thing about Grant, he's kind of the jack-of-all-trades. He handles the ball well offensively, he can dodge with it in his stick, he can cut without it, he can play defense and he can get the ball off the ground."

Adam Felicetti saw limited time as a freshman but the coaching staff has seen him make big strides and he will be pushing for more playing time as a sophomore in '08. He possesses versatility and can play anywhere along the midfield. With a year under his belt, he is now playing with more confidence and determination. Fellow

sophomore midfielder Trever Sipperly did not see game action as a freshman, yet he is a capable player who can provide additional depth at the faceoff X. Just like Felicetti, Sipperly has made huge developments since arriving at Notre Dame.

The Fighting Irish boast six midfielders in the freshman class. Twins Patrick and Billy Maloney may be similar in appearance, yet they have different elements in their games. A common thread is that they both have good poise and a high IQ for the game.

Zach Brenneman brings a physical presence along with a good skill set to the midfield unit. One of his biggest challenges will be getting acclimated to the level of play that the Irish will face. Brenneman has played alongside quality competition over the past two summers while competing with the New York Empire team. The coaching staff sees a bright future for him once his talents are maximized.

David Earl is another player that can do a variety of things on the field. He brings athleticism to the team and has the ability to help the Irish in some capacity and he will compete for playing time as a freshman.

Also bringing a great deal of athletic ability to the midfield is rookie Jake Marmul. Corrigan feels he is as good of an athlete that the Fighting Irish have on the roster. Marmul is still struggling with an injury that he suffered at the end of his 2007 high school campaign. He possesses a lot of upside, yet Corrigan is not sure if that will be unleashed this season due to the injury.

Taylor Tripucka rounds out the freshman midfielders. Tripucka completed a high school post-graduate year in 2006-07 and he is still adjusting to the level of play at college, yet he brings with him a good sense and feel for the game.

## DEFENSE

The Notre Dame defense experienced a record-setting season in 2007 and many pieces from that unit are back. Dougherty and Zimmerman will anchor the group as they did last year along with departed senior starter Joey Rallo.

Experience is abundant when it comes to the senior duo. Dougherty and Zimmerman have both played in all 41 games during their Fighting Irish careers. Dougherty has registered 30 starts, while Zimmerman

has 28 on his resume.

"We are going to go where Ross Zimmerman and Sean Dougherty take us defensively," comments Corrigan. "I think both of them are guys who know how to play the game at this level, but they've learned how they play best and how they're most effective. They both play with a lot of confidence in themselves. They are going to be our leaders at that end of the field. Ross is more of the guy that's a quarterback for our defense and a good communicator. Sean is someone who we feel can shut-down anyone in the country."

Joining them in the defensive rotation will be their classmates Dave Caperna and Dan Scolaro. Both have seen limited duty during their Notre Dame careers, yet both could be valuable components to this year's team. Caperna will once again help out in man-down situations just as he did last season. Scolaro has moved from attack to midfield and now resides in the defensive unit. He is a hard worker that played well for the Irish during the fall '07 season and he hopes to continue that progress into the spring.

The lone junior in the defense is Regis McDermott. McDermott has been a key member of the stout Irish defense since his freshman campaign and he will be looked upon to have an even bigger role this season with the improvement of his strength and conditioning in the off season.

"Regis had a great sophomore year," says Corrigan. "He's come back physically in better shape and stronger than he's ever been and I think it's going to make a difference for him. His strength is his decision making out on the field. He just has a knack for making plays. He's going to play a huge role for us, plus he has the versatility of playing as a long-stick middle or on close defense and I think that's going to be a plus as well."

Five student-athletes in the sophomore class are capable of providing strength to the defense. Headlining the group is Mike Creighton. After overcoming an injury, Creighton played in eight games during his freshman season and tallied one goal. Just like McDermott, he is capable of playing close or up top in the defense. Creighton will look to use his experience as a freshman combined with a year of growth to excel for the Irish in '08.

Sam Barnes and Chip Lanser both appeared in five games during their rookie seasons in 2007. Lanser missed fall ball in '07 with an injury and he is still working his way back from that in hopes of making contributions to the Irish this year. Barnes produced a solid fall campaign and Corrigan feels that he has improved more than anyone on the team and he will compete for time as a long-stick midfielder in the spring.

Fellow sophomore Sean Callinan appeared in two games last season and he will provide depth from the close defense position. He brings a great attitude to the team and he is reforming his body to become quicker to fit the college game.

Brant Howell comes to Notre Dame from Connecticut College, where he played his freshman season. Howell gives the Irish another option as a long-stick midfielder and he has a good work ethic and a positive and mature demeanor that spreads throughout the team.

Tim Bemer, Andrew Irving, Kevin Ridgway and Dan Schmitt are all freshmen that bring different elements to the Fighting Irish defense. Bemer can play both the short-stick defensive midfield and long-stick defensive midfield positions. He has a high IQ for the game and is very competitive and will look for time on the field.

Irving is a clever, crafty and smart player that has a knack for making plays. Corrigan feels he is as good of a ground ball player that is on the team. Irving will compete for time as a long-stick midfielder.

Maybe the first freshman to see time on the defense will be Ridgway.

"Kevin Ridgway was an outstanding high school player," states Corrigan. "He's another big, lanky kid. He's still maturing physically and he's just going to get better and better. (Assistant coach) Gerry (Byrne) is a great mentor for him because they are a similar size. He's really learning. He's going to play for us this year and he's going to give us some depth at the close defense. He'll get some playing time there and I expect to see his continual development over the next four years. I think he has a chance to be really good."

Schmitt brings toughness to the Irish along with being a smart player. He is still making the adjustment to the top-notch college game, yet his determination should yield good results during his Notre Dame career.

## GOAL

No one would argue that the Fighting Irish are not in good shape between the pipes. Kemp, a two-time All-America honoree, is back for his senior campaign. Last season, Kemp was named the GWLL player of the year as he ranked fourth nationally in both goals-against average (6.78) and save percentage (.614).

For his career, Kemp has made 39 straight starts, while posting a 26-11 record with a 7.43 goals-against average and a .618 save percentage. He ranks first in Fighting Irish history in goals-against average and is fourth in career victories.

"Obviously in goal Joey Kemp is terrific," comments Corrigan. "I think he's completed the arch for a goalie of his caliber. He came in with great hands and the ability to stop the ball and he developed into a better clearer and field general. He's acquired the knowledge of our defense and how we want to do things and what we expect of everyone at that end of the field as well as himself. He's assumed the leadership of a two-time All-American and two-time captain and field presence has come with that. He's got all of the pieces now and I expect him to have a good year because he's very focused on that and he has the same expectations of himself that we do."

Junior Scott Rodgers is a very talented and capable back-up for Kemp. Rodgers appeared in a career-high five games last season and registered a 4.62 goals-against average and .833 save percentage in 52 minutes of play.

"In Scott Rodgers, we feel like we have the best back up goalie in the country," says Corrigan. "He works hard and has an unbelievably positive attitude. He has a great impact on our team every day in the way he approaches what he's doing. We couldn't be happier with Scott and we know if anything happens to Joey Kemp, Scott is going to step in and we're not going to miss a beat. We have great confidence in him."

The third goaltender on the Notre Dame roster is sophomore Brendan Moore. Moore did not see game action during his freshman season, yet Corrigan has

seen him make great improvements over the past year. He possesses quick hands the ability to stop the ball and the coaching staff envisions great things for him in the years to come.

## SCHEDULE

The Fighting Irish are slated for 13 regular-season games and this year will mark the inaugural GWLL tournament in Birmingham, Mich. The ledger will be highlighted with three games against NCAA Tournament teams from last season in Loyola, Albany and North Carolina. Both Albany and North Carolina advanced to the tournament's quarterfinal round. The Irish will also have contests in Atlanta (vs. Dartmouth) and Chicago (vs. Denver).

"We are excited with the quality of this schedule," states Corrigan. "We start with a rush of good teams that were excellent a year ago. We are also excited about our two games against Dartmouth and Denver in Atlanta and Chicago, respectively. We are going to be a part of lacrosse events in those communities. I think that's a neat thing and it's fun for the guys to play in those environments when you get those big crowds and enthusiastic lacrosse supporters."

Notre Dame opens the regular season at Loyola (Md.) on Feb. 16. The Irish captured a 9-7 season-opening victory over the Greyhounds last season.

The Irish will begin the home portion of their slate against rival Penn State on Feb. 24. Notre Dame will then welcome the University at Albany on March 1. That will mark the first-ever meeting between the Fighting Irish and the Great Danes.

Four straight games away from home await the Irish next. Notre Dame will have road trips to Villanova (March 4) and North Carolina (March 8) before playing Dartmouth in Atlanta on March 15. League play will commence with a showdown at Air Force on March 22. The Fighting Irish return home for a date with Drexel on March 25 before hitting the road once again with a conference clash at Bellarmine on March 29.

Notre Dame faces league foe Denver in Chicago on April 5 and then stays in conference play with a home tilt against Quinnipiac on April 18. It will be a quick turnaround as the Irish step away from league action with a contest at Lehigh on April 20. The regular season will wrap up as Ohio State visits the Irish on April 27.

"Our league is going to be stronger than ever because I think Denver and Ohio State are excellent this year, and Air Force and Bellarmine will be improved as will Quinnipiac," says Corrigan. "I think across the board our league is going to be better."

The semifinals of the GWLL tournament are slated for Friday, May 2, with the finals to take place on Sunday, May 4.

"The GWLL tournament is definitely going to add something to our season," states Corrigan. "It's going to be something new and we're going to have to adapt to that final weekend. But we're excited about it. With the strength of our league I think it's going to be a tremendous tournament."

The 2008 NCAA Championship gets underway with first-round action on May 10-11 at campus sites and the quarterfinals will be held at Annapolis, Md. and Ithaca, N.Y. on May 17 and 18. The semifinals and finals will take place in Foxboro, Mass. on May 24 and 26, respectively.
