Now in his 23rd season at the helm of the Irish program, head coach Tim Welsh enters the season with an overall record of 405-238-1, including a 190-97 mark while leading the Notre Dame men's swimming and diving program.

Already one of the most respected coaches in the nation, Tim Welsh has taken the Notre Dame men's swimming and diving program to unprecedented levels and on the verge of becoming a national force. Under his guidance, the Fighting Irish captured the program's first BIG EAST title in 2005 and repeated the feat in 2006 before finishing runner-up last season. Notre Dame has sent competitors to the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships in two of the past three seasons and more appear to be on their way in the near future.

Welsh is not unaccustomed to success, as student-athletes and teams under his care have exceeded expectations and broken barriers throughout his 30-year career as a head coach.

Welsh's squads have experienced great team success over the years. In 1978 and '79, he helped Johns Hopkins to back-to-back Division III national championships, being named National Coach of the Year on the latter occasion. In all, Welsh has coached 26 teams that have claimed conference championships and 20 that have won nine or more dual meets in a season.

Since arriving at Notre Dame in 1985, Welsh has seen his teams post a 283-148 (.662) dual-meet record, while winning 18 league titles (Midwestern

Collegiate - 15, BIG EAST - 2, North Star - 1) and taking second place on five occasions (2 MCC, 3 BIG EAST). His student-athletes also have been accomplished, earning 13 invitations to the NCAA Championships, gaining All-America honors on three occasions, and capturing 13 BIG EAST individual titles. With a victory over St. Bonaventure on Jan. 29, 2005, Welsh surpassed Dennis Stark's mark of 167 career dual-meet victories at Notre Dame. Stark, the only other head coach in Fighting Irish swimming and diving history, was at the helm of the program from 1958 until Welsh took over in 1985.

The most apparent reality of the Welsh era at Notre Dame is the almost every-day occurrence that breaking University records has become. In his tenure, Welsh has seen his student-athletes break the Notre Dame record in every event - on both the men's and women's sides - on multiple occasions. In all, more than 200 University records have been set under Welsh's tutelage, with the bar continuing to be raised all the time. The Irish established 12 marks during the 2004-05 season alone and seven more in 2005-06. In the lists of the top 10 performers in each swimming event in Notre Dame men's history, no names remain from the pre-Welsh era.

The Irish swimming and diving program entered a new era under Welsh, as well. In his first 17 years at Notre Dame, the men's swimming and diving team had little access to scholarship aide. The Notre Dame Athletic Department decided in December 2002 to fully fund all of its varsity sports, giving the Irish a tool with which to compete with the best schools in the nation. Working now with a fully-funded program, Welsh has welcomed the top five freshman classes in the program's history over the last five years.

There is no doubt that the Irish program is on the rise. Notre Dame has finished in the top four at the BIG EAST Championships for eight consecutive seasons, including three runner-up results (1999, 2000, '04). The Fighting Irish finally broke through and captured the program's first BIG EAST title in 2005 by defeating Pittsburgh, the eight-time defending conference champion, by 275 points. Increased expectations were placed on the Irish in 2005-06 and the squad delivered with another BIG EAST title in dominating fashion.

Rewriting of the record books has been a common theme for Notre Dame under Welsh. All but two current University records has been set since 1999, and the Irish have combined to knock out 19 records over the past two seasons. The past two campaigns have been the most successful in the history of Notre Dame swimming and diving. The Irish have sent competitors to the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships in each of the past two seasons, along with posting identical 10-2 dual meet records.

Coming off a BIG EAST title in 2005, a lot of expectations were placed upon the 2005-06 team and they delivered with a second straight league championship. The Fighting Irish claimed three event titles at the conference meet and produced 13 all-BIG EAST performers en route to the 224.5-point victory over Pittsburgh and the rest of the 11-team field. A total of seven school records were set during the season. Freshman diver Michael Bulfin became just the third student-athlete in program history to qualify for the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships and the second in as many seasons, following swimmer Tim Kegelman, who did so in 2005.



In the fall of 2004, Notre Dame appeared in the CSCAA dual meet rankings for the first time ever as the Irish debuted at No. 21. In 2005-06, the Irish climbed to No. 18 in the rankings, which was a program-best mark.

The 2004-05 season also witnessed Notre Dame's first NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships participant in the Welsh era, and just the second in the history of the program. Kegelman swam in the 100-yard butterfly, 200-yard butterfly and the 200-yard IM at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships in Minneapolis, Minn. The sophomore was also one of six Notre Dame swimmers to take home BIG EAST titles in '04-'05. For his team's accomplishments, Welsh was named a BIG EAST Coach of the Year for the third time in six years.

A key factor behind the success of the Fighting Irish program during the 2004-05 season was senior Frank Krakowski. He left Notre Dame holding five University records, along with being a six-time all-BIG EAST performer. Krakowski was also tabbed as a CSCAA All-Academic swimmer.

The 2003-04 campaign provided a glimpse of the bright future of Notre Dame men's swimming and diving. The Irish faced their toughest schedule in school history and responded by setting eight school records. Notre Dame posted 584 points at the BIG EAST Championship to finish as conference runner-up. Among the highlights of that meet were the first-ever Irish 1-2 finish in the meet, as Jamie Lutkus and David Moisan topped the field in the 400-yard individual medley.

Notre Dame also posted runner-up finishes in the 1999 and 2000 BIG EAST Championships. The Irish delivered a school-record time in '99 to win the final event of the meet, the 400 freestyle relay, to edge Syracuse by one point for second place. Notre Dame won its first three conference titles that year en route to its best-ever finish. Welsh was named the BIG EAST Coach of the Year, capping a season in which the Irish broke 16 of 19 University records.

Notre Dame reset eight varsity records in 1999-2000 in finishing second in the BIG EAST Championships once again.



The Welsh Factor

Since his arrival at Notre Dame in 1985, Tim Welsh has seen his student-athletes continually shatter every University record, annually setting a new standard of excellence. A glance at some of the most dramatic improvements in school-record performances:

Other highlights of Welsh's tenure as men's coach at Notre Dame are 10 seasons with 10 or more dual-meet victories, including a 12-1 mark in 1989-90, the best record in school history. The Irish also were 11-1 in 1997-98 and set the school record for wins in a season in both 1987-88 and 1990-91 with identical 13-3 marks.

Prior to joining the BIG EAST in 1995-96, Welsh's Irish won six Midwestern Collegiate Conference championships in seven years (1986-92) and took six consecutive titles in the National Catholic Invitational (1989-94).

The Irish women's coach from 1985-86 through 1994-95, Welsh's teams won MCC titles every year the Irish were in the conference, from 1987-95. His teams also claimed the Eastern Intercollegiate championship twice. The first title came in 1990

and the second in 1995, when the last women's program Welsh coached finished with the best record in school history, 14-1. During his 10 years at the helm of the women's program, Welsh sent 11 swimmers to the NCAA Championships, including three-time All-American Tanya Williams. In that span, every Irish women's University record was broken.

Prior to coming to Notre Dame in 1985, Welsh spent eight years as the head men's and women's coach at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore, Md. The New York native led the men's squad to a mark of 65-36, including two NCAA Division III national championships and eight Middle Atlantic Conference titles. The women's team also was successful under Welsh, earning a Middle Atlantic Conference championship while achieving six seasons at .500 or better.

Welsh graduated magna cum laude from Providence College in 1966. He went on to earn his master's degree at the University of Virginia in 1967. Welsh became the men's assistant coach at Syracuse in 1974 after leaving Winthrop College (S.C.), where he had taught English. During his four years at Syracuse, Welsh continued to teach English, as well as designed and ran the training program before joining the Hopkins swimming program.

Welsh was awarded the Richard E. Steadman Award by the College Swim Coaches Association in 1993. The award, given annually to a swimming or diving coach in the high school, club or university ranks who, in the opinion of the International Swimming Hall of Fame, Inc., and the College Swim Coaches Association, has done the most to spread joy and happiness in swimming.

Welsh continued a career of world travel, as he took his team to Ireland during the winter of the 2004-05 season. Previously, he traveled to Bogota, Colombia in the spring of 1985 as a clinician and instructor for

Sports America Program of the U.S. State Department and took his Irish squad to Portugal in the summer of 1991. Welsh and the 1996-97 Irish ventured to Brazil over Christmas break for a nationally-televised meet featuring international Olympic swimmers.

Welsh's student-athletes have been traditionally strong in the classroom, as well as in the Rolfs Aquatic Center. Perennially on Collegiate Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) All-Academic list (which ranks teams according to grade-point average), the Irish claimed the top spot in the 1999 season and have been in the top 10 eight times since 1990.

In his 23rd season as head coach at Notre Dame, Welsh ranks behind only track and field's Joe Piane (32 seasons) as the longest-serving program leader at the University. He also was awarded an honorary monogram from Notre Dame's National Monogram Club and has seen five of his swimmers garner the Byron V. Kanaley Award, the most prestigious honor an Irish student-athlete can achieve.

In 2002, Welsh was featured in the ASCA newsletter in appreciation for his dedication as a member of the ASCA's Board of Directors (this was the Bob Ousley Award for Service to ASCA, and was presented at the ASCA world Clinic in 2002). One of Welsh's key developments is the ASCA Fellows Program – which is designed to professionally and thoroughly prepare the next generation of coaching leaders.

A published writer and master motivator, Welsh and his wife, Jacqueline (who works on campus as a curator of education in the Snite Museum of Art), are the parents of two sons. Tim, a 2002 Notre Dame graduate, participated in the University's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) program before enrolling in an English Ph.D. program at the University of Washington. John is a 2005 Notre Dame graduate, who is currently enrolled in a Master's Degree Program in Italian at the University of Virginia.

In his 30-year career as a diving coach, Caiming Xie has helped his protégés win BIG EAST titles, All-America honors, and gold medals. A proven winner, Caiming's experience reaches the world over, he is entering his 12th season as head men's and women's diving coach at Notre Dame in 2007-08.

During his tenure, he has coached two All-Americans on the women's side, as well as the top two men's divers in school history. Caiming's male divers have posted each of the top seven scores in school history in one-meter championship diving, as well as eight of the top 10 off the three-meter board.

He was named the BIG EAST Men's Diving Coach of the year for the third-straight season in 2007 after helping

Xie tutored Steven Crowe to an appearance at the 2007 NCAA Zone C Diving Championships after a solid showing at the BIG EAST meet, where he placed sixth of the one-meter board and eighth off the three-meter. He also captured his first-career win as he took the three-meter competition in a dual meet at Louisville.

The 2005-06 season was one of the finest for men's diving at Notre Dame. Bulfin became just the second diver in program history to qualify for the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships. Bulfin also earned all-BIG EAST honors off the one-meter board, while his teammate Stoner garnered all-conference honors in the three-meter competition. Both Bulfin and Stoner competed at the NCAA Zone C Diving Championships. Bulfin qualified for the NCAAs with his fourth-place showing off the three-meter board at the Zone competition. He would also finish ninth off the one-meter board, while Stoner was 10th, after registering a 17th-place showing in the three-meter. The success of his diver's helped Caiming garner the BIG EAST Conference Men's Diving Coach of the Year Award for the fourth time. He also collected the honor in 1999, 2004 and 2005.

In 2005, Stoner placed fifth at the BIG EAST Championships off both boards and would go on to finish 17th out of the 32-diver field at the NCAA Zone C Diving Championships. That marked the top finish for an Irish rookie in one-meter action in the meet since Andy Maggio was 14th in 2000.

Caiming, the first full-time diving coach in Notre Dame history, recruited and developed three divers in the class of 2003. The group, which went undefeated in 2001-02, was a key to Notre Dame's dual-meet fortunes over a four-year span, and all three left among the best eight divers in school history on the one-meter board.

Maggio was the most dominant Irish men's diver ever, holding three of the five University diving records. In 2002, he finished fourth at the NCAA Zone Diving Meet, missing by just six points Notre Dame's first berth to the NCAA Men's Championships in 27 years.

Joe Miller and Tong Xie, Caiming's son, each delivered career-best performances in their final seasons, a sign of Caiming's ability to help divers improve dramatically during their time with him.

Caiming also tutored 2001 graduate Herb Huesman throughout his career, which ended with him as the holder of three varsity records.

On the women's side, Caiming was responsible for the development of Heather Mattingly and Meghan Perry-Eaton, the first two diving All-Americans in Notre Dame history.

The last four seasons have been the most successful in Irish women's diving history, featuring five BIG EAST titles, four All-America honors, and a trio of BIG EAST Championships Most Outstanding Diver awards. In 2003-04, Perry-Eaton turned in the most impressive campaign ever by an Irish diver, as she was beaten just one time during the regular season

before sweeping the springboard events at the BIG EAST Championships by more than 40 points each en route to being tabbed the meet's top diver. Perry-Eaton then became the first Notre Dame diver ever to win a title at the NCAA Zone C Championships, taking first off the one-meter board. At the NCAA Championships, she delivered the highest-ever finish for a Notre Dame swimmer or diver, taking third in that event, ending up just 3.30 points behind the national champion and securing All-America honors. She followed that up with two more conference titles (for a BIG EAST record five in her career), her third conference diver-of-the-year award, and two more All-American honors. She was fifth at NCAAs in one-meter and 15th in three-meter.

In 2002-03, Perry-Eaton became the first Notre Dame diver – and first non-University of Miami diver since 1996 – to win a conference championship, placing first in the one-meter competition. She also was second on the three-meter board and was named the BIG EAST's top diver. Perry-Eaton then qualified for the NCAA Championships, where she placed ninth in the one-meter event and 20th on the three-meter board to earn honorable mention All-America honors.

In 2001-02, Heather Mattingly became the first Irish diver to earn All-America honors, finishing eighth in the three-meter competition at the NCAA Championships. Mattingly also earned honorable mention on the one-meter board, taking 12th. She was the first Notre Dame diver to qualify for the NCAAs in four consecutive years – also earning honorable mention All-America in 2001 (13th in 3m) and 2000 (12th in 1m, 12th in 3m).

Before coming to Notre Dame, Caiming was the head diving coach for three years at the University of Toledo, earning Mid-American Conference diving coach-of-the-year laurels in each of his last two seasons. Prior to his stint with the Rockets, Caiming served as an assistant coach for the '91-92 season at Pittsburgh.

Boasting a wealth of international experience on his resume, Caiming served as the 1980 Chinese Olympic diving coach. He also has served as a technical consultant for United States Diving since 1994 and has held clinics and presentations for the United States Diving national team.

The Chinese national team coach from 1977-90, Caiming coached Sun Shu-Wei, a gold medalist in the men's platform competition at the '92 Olympics in Barcelona, Spain, and Zhu Jin-Hong, who finished fourth in the women's platform in Barcelona.

Caiming's divers also have earned medals at the Asian Games, World Cup, World University Games and World Championships.

A competitive diver in his own right, Caiming won the springboard competition at the Asian Games in 1974 and earned first place in the platform and second in the springboard competition at the National Games of China in 1975.

A 1985 graduate of the Beijing Institute of Physical Education, he also won numerous Chinese diving championships.

Caiming and his wife, Ping Tong, have one son, Tong, who graduated from Notre Dame in 2003 after a successful career as an Irish diver.

In 2007, Matt Tallman is entering his seventh season at Notre Dame and his second as associate head coach. Tallman spent his first five campaigns serving as assistant coach for the Fighting Irish before his promotion in July of 2006. His recruiting efforts have produced some of the top classes in the history of the program, which in turn has made Notre Dame a factor on the national scene.

Tallman joined the Irish staff in 2001, shortly after the Notre Dame Athletic Department announced that all its sports would receive full funding. With increased scholarship aide, he has made the Irish competitive with the top programs in the nation on the recruiting front.

The efforts of Tallman have paid dividends in the pool, as the Irish have broken 40 University records over the last six years. This year's squad appears poised to establish even more new marks with 13 record-holders already on the roster.

Tallman helped guide the Irish to their first BIG EAST championship in program history in 2005 and the Irish repeated as champions in 2006. Those two campaigns were the most successful in the history of Notre Dame swimming and diving.

The 2005 squad earned a meet-record 902.5 points in the conference meet to defeat Pittsburgh, the eight-time defending champion, by 275 points. That same year, Notre Dame sent its first swimmer, and second student-athlete ever, to the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships as Kegelman, a sophomore, swam the 100-yard butterfly, 200-yard butterfly and the 200 IM at the national meet. In all, the 2004-05 team eclipsed 12 school records, claimed four individual BIG EAST titles, and entered the national rankings for the first time.

Tallman has been a key in the growth of the Irish program, and his first six seasons have seen a number of superlatives. In his first campaign, Notre Dame matched the third-highest win total in the history of the program, ending up 11-3 in dual meets. After failing to win their own Notre Dame Invitational for the first time in four years the season prior to Tallman's arrival, that meet has

seen five Irish victories, including an impressive 2003 performance that featured Notre Dame setting a then meet record for points scored and claiming a 710-point triumph over a talented second-place Harvard team. The Irish have similarly been dominant in the Notre Dame/Dennis Stark Relays, setting all 11 meet records since Tallman's arrival. The 2003-04 season also featured the Irish posting their highest-ever point total in the BIG EAST Championships to that point, en route to their first runner-up result in four years. Among the high points of that meet was Notre Dame's first-ever 1-2 finish in the meet, which took place in the 400 IM.

In addition to recruiting, Tallman assists head coach Tim Welsh in all facets of the Irish swimming and diving program, including on-deck coaching and teaching, training, supervising dryland workouts, and day-to-day operations.

Prior to his stint at Notre Dame, Tallman served as an assistant at the University of Maryland in 2000-01. He helped the Terrapins send a school-record number of female qualifiers to the NCAA Championships. Maryland peaked at 16th in the national rankings that season, its highest listing in school history.

Before his season at Maryland, Tallman spent two years as the head swimming coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. While at IUP, he was selected as the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1999 after helping the women's team to the PSAC title, ending Clarion University's 23-year stranglehold on the championship. He also helped the IUP women's team to sixth- and seventh-place finishes at the NCAA Division II championships. In his two seasons at IUP, the women's squad was 18-0 in dual meets.

Fifteen IUP swimmers achieved All-America honors under Tallman's tutelage while 18 swimmers earned all-PSAC accolades and five student-athletes were named academic All-Americans.

A 1997 graduate of The Catholic University of America, Tallman swam for four seasons and captured 11 titles at the Capital Athletic Conference Championships. He set school and conference records in the 100 and 200 breaststroke, along with the 200 and 400 medley relays.

Born Sept. 24, 1973, in Camden, N.J., Tallman has a number of Notre Dame connections. His father Dennis is a '73 graduate and his grandfather, Edgar F. Bailey, played football for the Irish in the 1940s.

Tallman married the former Heather Grzeskowiak in the summer of 2006. The couple, along with her daughter Hannah, and their son, Martin, resides in Mishawaka, Ind.

Josh Skube is in his eighth season as a volunteer assistant coach for Notre Dame swimming and diving and his third working with the men's team. Also in his eighth year as a faculty member in the physical education department, Skube assists in all aspects of home practices and meets.

Skube swam collegiately for Ball State University from 1994-96 before earning a bachelor's degree in kinesiology ('98) and a master's degree in exercise physiology from Indiana University.

A member of the American College of Sport Medicine, Skube also has served as an assistant coach for Bloomington North High School (1999-2000) and the Duneland Swim Club (1995-97). Known for his deep technical knowledge of the sport, he also has been published in Swim Technique magazine.
