Byron V. Kanaley Award

Perhaps the most prestigious honor awarded to Notre Dame student-athletes is the Bryron V. Kanaley Award. Presented each year since 1927 at commencement exercises, the Kanaley Awards go to the senior monogram athletes who have been most exemplary as students and leaders.

The awards, selected by the Faculty Board on Athletics, are named in honor of a 1904 Notre Dame graduate who was a member of the baseball team as an undergraduate. Kanaley went on to a successful banking career in Chicago and served the University in the Alumni Association as a lay trustee from 1915 until his death in 1960.

A two-year monogram winner and 2000 graduate, Katrina Ten Eyck has been the lone Irish rower to earn the award. An all-Central Region honoree, she was a Dean's List student who majored in the Program of Liberal Studies.

Christopher Zorich Award

The Christopher Zorich Award was created to recognize the contributions of student-athletes to the University community and the community at-large. The award is given annually each spring and bears the name of Christopher Zorich, two-time football All-American and a 1991 graduate of the University of Notre Dame.

Meghan Boyle (Pittsburgh, Pa.) and Maria Romano (River Forest, Ill.), both members of Notre Dame's record-setting varsity eight crew in 2006 and 2007 were one of four recipients of the Zorich Award in '07 and the first two Irish rowers to receive the honor.

Rowing History

Women's rowing became Notre Dame's 26th and newest varsity sport at the start of the 1998-99 school year.

Over the course of the past nine seasons, the growth of the program has been remarkable as the Irish have enjoyed success at both the national and regional levels.

Each of the last two seasons — 2005-06 and 2006-07— have seen Notre Dame earn a team berth in the NCAA Championships and finish ninth and 12th, respectively, in the final scoring. The results of the past two years have certainly been the product of the hard work and dedication that Martin Stone has poured into the program since being named its first and only head coach in October of 1997.

In addition to earning a second consecutive NCAA team berth in '07, the Irish squad won an unprecedented fourth consecutive BIG EAST Championship title by claiming gold medals in the varsity eight, varsity four and novice four races.

Notre Dame's varsity eight crew finished sixth in the final Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA)/USRowing ranking after reaching a program-best third in the poll. The Irish varsity eight boat achieved a program first when it defeated five consecutive top-10 boats over the course of four races. Notre Dame earned wins over No. 5 California, No. 7 Stanford and No. 9 UCLA at the Windemere Classic and then topped No. 5 Virginia and No. 7 Princeton on the Tigers' home course in New Jersey.

As a team, the Irish were fifth at the Central/South Region Championships, while the varsity eight took third in the Grand Finals.

Notre Dame's breakout on the national scene came during the '05-'06 campaign when it produced many firsts in the program's history. The Irish earned a first-ever team berth in the NCAA Championships and finished ninth overall in the team competition which was bolstered by its varsity eight crew winning the Petite Final to finish seventh overall. The varsity four boat finished 11th, while the second varsity eight took 12th.

Notre Dame won its third consecutive BIG EAST title and finished a program-best third at the Central/South Region Championship.

The varsity eight crew, after starting the year unranked, finished fifth in the final Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA)/US Rowing Poll to achieve the highest ranking in school history. Among the other notable achievements was a fourth-place finish (highest in the program's his-

tory) in the prestigious Jessop-Whittier Cup race at the San Diego Crew Classic

Prior to gaining varsity status, rowing was a long-standing club sport at the University since co-education in the '70s, rowing was granted varsity status in the spring of 1996, along with women's lacrosse.

The first rowing team (all male) at Notre Dame was founded in 1964 by a group of students. Women's rowing was established in the spring of 1973, the same year women were admitted into the University. The club team was founded by Frank "Clete" Graham, and first earned national recognition when it won back-to-back titles at the Midwest Sprints in 1973 and 1974, and placed second in the Eastern Sprints in '74.

As a club sport for 25 years, women's rowing experienced tremendous success. Annually, an average of 50 women participated in the school's club program. While it received limited funds from the University for operational costs to maintain its sport, the club was dependent on financial support from alumni and parents to purchase new boats, equipment and uniforms.

Martin Stone, following a successful stint as head coach of the women's rowing team at the U.S. Naval Academy, was named the school's first varsity head coach in the fall of 1997.

Team and individual accomplishments have highlighted the two most successful back-to-back campaigns in '05-'06 and '06-'07.

In '07, junior Amanda Polk earned CRCA All-America honors for the third time in her career as she garnered first-team accolades for the second consecutive year, while teammate Allison Marsh earned second-team All-America accolades for first time in her career.

Notre Dame also placed five on the CRCA all-Central Region team. Polk was selected to the first team for the third consecutive year, while Maria Romano was a first-team selection for the second straight year. Joining Polk and Romano on the first team was Marsh, while Meghan Boyle and Laura Pearson were named to the second team.

In '06 a record three rowers earning All-America honors and five rowers garnering all-Central Region accolades.

Polk garnered first-team CRCA All-America honors and became just the second Irish first-team honoree and first two-time All-American (after earning second-team honors during her freshman year). In addition, senior Sarah Palandech and classmate Julie Sobolewski garnered second-team recognition to give Notre Dame a record number of All-Americans in a single year.

Polk, Palandech, Sobolewski were joined by junior coxswain Maria Romano as first team CRCA all-Central region honorees, while senior Melissa Felker was honored as a second-team selection, giving Notre Dame its most all-regional honorees.

Stone was named the Central Region Coach of the Year in '06. He and his staff

(assistants Joe Schlosberg and Marnie Stahl) have copped BIG EAST Staff of the Year honors in each of the past two seasons.

In claiming their third consecutive BIG EAST title, the Irish won four of six races — varsity eight, second varsity eight, varsity four and second varsity four — to win their third consecutive BIG EAST title.

In 2004-05, Notre Dame won its second BIG EAST crown with victories in the second varsity eight, varsity four, second varsity four and novice four races. Polk became the first Irish freshman to earn CRCA All-America honors as a second-team selection and also was named to the CRCA all-Central Region team.

Seniors Katie Chenoweth and Maureen Gibbons received the CRCA Scholar-Athlete Awards.

Prior to the '05-'06 campaign, the 2003-04 season was undoubtedly the most successful in school history as the Irish claimed its first-ever BIG EAST Rowing Challenge and tied a championship mark by winning four races as Stone was named the coach of the year. Notre Dame's varsity eight second varsity eight, varsity four and second varsity four all won gold medals.

The varsity eight boat earned an at-large berth and competed at the NCAA championships. After a 16th-place finish in 2002, the Irish advanced to the semifinals and finished 16th overall.

In her final collegiate season, Natalie Ladine became the second rower in school history to earn All-America honors from the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA). She also earned all-Central region honors for the second consecutive year. Alice Bartek also garnered all-regional accolades. In addition, Ladine, Katie Chenoweth and Jacqueline Hazen earned CRCA Scholar-Athlete awards.

In its first year of competition, Notre Dame showed that it would become a major force in the sport of rowing. The Notre Dame lightweight eight boat finished the season ranked 12th in the nation after finishing third at the Midwest Championships. The Irish also made great headway in the varsity eight, placing fourth at the Georgetown Invitational, which features the BIG EAST schools that offer rowing. At the same regatta, the novice eight boat placed second and was also second at the Midwest Championships, showing the incredible depth that the program had in only its first year.

In year two, Notre Dame made progress in catching up to the more established programs in the nation. The Irish just missed the grand finals at the Central Region Championships in the varsity eight boat, while the novice eight boat placed third. At the Georgetown Invitational, the second novice eight won a gold medal, winning by over nine seconds. Notre Dame also placed all seven boats in the grand finals of the

Midwest Sprints and finished in the top five in six of seven finals at the SIRA Championships.

The Irish also received a number of individual accolades in 1999-2000 as senior Katrina Ten Eyck earned all-Central Region honors, becoming the first Notre Dame rower to earn such distinction. Ten Eyck was also invited to the U.S. Rowing Training Center in Chula Vista, Calif., to train with the national team.

Academically, Ten Eyck and sophomore Katherine Burnett were also honored with the National Scholar-Athlete Award and Ten Eyck was one of five winners of the Byron Kanaley Award, the most prestigious honor given to a Notre Dame student-athlete.

The 2000-01 campaign, its third year of competition as a varsity sport, has proved to be the springboard for success the past three years as the Irish achieved its first national ranking in school history.

During that year, Notre Dame won its first varsity eight race of major proportions at the Head of the Elk regatta and was victorious in five of eight during the spring. The Irish were invited to the prestigious San Diego Crew Classic and compete in the Jessop-Whittier Cup. In addition, they finished second at the BIG EAST Championship and fifth at the Central Regions, just missing out on an invitation to the NAAs. Ashlee Warren and Michelle Olsgard earned CRCA all-Central Region honors.

Notre Dame also won three gold medals at the '03 BIG EAST Rowing Challenge - the second most in the history of the program - as the second varsity eight and the first and second varsity four were victorious. Notre Dame was also invited to compete in the prestigious Windermere Cup in Seattle. The Irish placed third in the Cup, as over 100,000 people helped the University of Washington celebrate 100 years of rowing.

The Irish also had many award winners in 2003 as Warren earned all-region recognition for the third consecutive season, while Ladine was honored for the second straight year. Warren, Markstahler and Katie Chenoweth earned National Scholar-Athlete accolades, while Warren was named the 2003 BIG EAST/Aéropostale Notre Dame Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

The Irish also had tremendous success off the water as senior Leah Ashe was named the program's first Academic All-American, receiving second-team honors. Also, 24 rowers were named to the BIG EAST Academic All-Star team. Katherine Burnett, Ann Marie Dillhoff, Becky Luckett and Warren won CRCA Scholar-Athlete honors. Luckett and Warren were also named to the US Rowing Collegiate Honor Roll, becoming the first Notre Dame athletes to earn such distinction.

The following year, in 2001-02 Notre Dame improved on the previous season's success when the varsity eight qualified for the 2002 NCAA Rowing Championships in Indianapolis, Ind. - its first invitation to the national regatta. Notre Dame placed 16th at the NCAA meet, but more importantly it provided valuable experience to the rowers who make up the program's future.

The Irish finished the campaign ranked 13th in the nation - after being ranked as high as ninth in the country following a fifth-place finish at the San Diego Crew Classic, defeating such national powerhouses as Virginia, USC, Texas and Oregon State. For the second straight year, Notre Dame also placed second at the BIG EAST Challenge.

The Irish also boasted a program-high four all-Central Region honorees in first-teamers Olsgard and Warren and second-teamers Burnett and Ladine. Warren also made history, as she became the first rower

in Notre Dame lore to earn Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association All-America honors when she was named to the second team.

In the classroom, Notre Dame broke a number of records as six women were named to the CRCA National Scholar-Athlete roster, including Burnett (a three-time winner), Katie Besson, Ladine, Luckett (a two-time winner), Cassie Markstahler and Diane Price. The Irish had 25 student-athletes earn BIG EAST Academic All-Star honors. For his efforts in 2002, Stone was also named one of six finalists for CRCA National Coach of Year honors and was the Central Region Coach of the Year.

The 2002-03 season also saw some record-setting performances to add to the history books as the second varsity four became the first Notre

Amanda Polk is only rower in the program's history to earn CRCA All-America honors three times during her career. A first-team honoree in 2007 and 2006, she was a second-team selection following her freshman year in 2005.

1973 – The club rowing squad is founded by Frank "Clete" Graham.

1973 & 1974 – Notre Dame wins back-to-back titles at the Midwest Sprints.

1996 – Rowing was granted varsity status.

1997 – Martin Stone was hired as the first head coach at Notre Dame.

Fall of 1998 – Notre Dame competes in its first regatta.

1999 – The Irish place third in the lightweight eight and second in the novice eight at the Midwest Championships ... The lightweight eight boat finishes the season ranked 12th in the nation.

2000 – The second novice eight wins the Georgetown Invitational ... finished second to Syracuse in women's team competition.

Fall of 2000 – Notre Dame wins the varsity eight race at the Head of the Elk and claims four gold medals overall.

Fall of 2001 – The BIG EAST Conference announces it will sponsor the BIG EAST Women's Rowing Challenge on Sunday, April 29, 2001, at Lake Quinsigamond in Worcester, Mass. ... Notre Dame athletic director Kevin White announces rowing will receive the full compliment of scholarships under the NCAA guidelines by the year 2004-05.

2001 – The Irish finish the season ranked 16th in the nation, the highest final ranking ever for the program ... Michelle Olsgard and Ashlee Warren earn all-Central Region honors ... Katherine Burnett, Ann Marie Dillhoff, Becky Luckett and Warren are recipients of the CRCA Scholar-Athlete award, Luckett and Warren become the first Irish rowers to earn US Rowing Collegiate Honor Roll accolades ... Leah Ashe becomes the program's first CoSIDA Academic All-American earning second-team honors.

2002 – The varsity four places first at the 2002 BIG EAST Rowing Challenge, the first crew in Irish history to claim a gold medal at the conference regatta as Notre Dame earns a second-place finish ... The novice eight boat finishes third at the Central Regions, the first medal for any boat at that regatta ... Notre Dame's varsity eight receives an invitation to the 2002 NCAA Rowing Championships in Indianapolis ... The Irish placed 16th at the NCAAs and finished the season ranked 13th as a team ... Ashlee Warren becomes the programs first All-American, while Michelle Olsgard, Warren, Burnett and Ladine garner CRCA all-Central Region honors ... Six rowers — Katie Besson, Katherine Burnett, Ladine, Luckett, Cassie Markstahler and Diane Price — are named CRCA National Scholar-Athletes ... Head coach Martin Stone was named one of six finalists for the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association Coach of the Year award.

2003 – The second varsity four wins a gold medal at the 2003 Central Region, marking the first gold medal of any kind for an Irish crew at that regatta ... Notre Dame wins three gold medals at the BIG EAST Rowing Challenge and finishes second in the team competition for the third straight year ... The Irish first and second varsity eight and varsity crews compete at the Windermere Cup in Seattle in front of 100,000 fans ... Assistant coach Pam Mork is a finalist for CRCA National Assistant Coach of the Year honors after receiving Central Region Assistant coach-of-the-year accolades ... Ashlee Warren receives her third consecutive CRCA all-Central Region honor and her second CRCA National Scholar-Athlete of the Year award and becomes the first in Irish history to win the BIG EAST/Aéropostale Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

2004 – After three consecutive, second-place finishes, Notre Dame wins the team title at the BIG EAST Rowing Challenge with a record four boats placing first ... The Irish varsity eight crew participates in the NCAAs for the second time in school

history, earning an at-large berth, and finishes 16th in the final US Rowing/CRCA poll ... Natalie Ladine becomes program's second All-American and first first-team honoree ... Ladine and Alice Bartek, garner all-Central Region honors ... Ladine, Katie Chenoweth and Jacqueline Hazen receive the CRCA Scholar-Athlete awards ... Martin Stone is named BIG EAST Coach of the Year.

2005 – Notre Dame wins its second consecutive BIG EAST with victories in the second varsity eight, varsity four, second varsity four and novice four ... The Irish finished seventh overall at the Central/South Region Championships ... Amanda Polk becomes the first freshman to earn CRCA All-America and all-Central Region honors as a second-team and first-team honoree, respectively ... Katie Chenoweth and Maureen Gibbons receive the CRCA Scholar-Athlete awards.

2006 – Notre Dame completes the most historic season in school history with a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Championships ... The Irish varsity eight boat wins the Petite Final and finishes seventh overall while the second varsity eight and varsity four garner 12th and 11th-place finishes, respectively ... The varsity boat begins the season unranked, but end the season fifth in the final CRCA/US Rowing Poll to post the highest finish in school history after winning gold medals at the Central/South Region Championships and BIG EAST ... The Irish win their third straight BIG EAST crown and finish a program-best third at the Central/South Region Championships ... Amanda Polk is named to the CRCA All-America first team (the second rower to earn first-team honors) and is joined by Sarah Palandech and Julie Sobolewski who earn second-team accolades ... Polk, Palandech and Sobolewski, along with Maria Romano are named to the CRCA All-Central Region first team, while Melissa Felker garners second-team honors ... Martin Stone and his staff (Joe Schlosberg and Marnie Stahl) are named the BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year, while Stone is named the Central Region Coach of the Year.

2007 – Notre Dame earns its second consecutive team bid to the NCAA Championship and finishes 12th as the varsity eight and second varsity eight place 12th overall, while the varsity four places 11th ... Following five consecutive wins at mid-season against No. 5 California, No. 7 Stanford, No. 9 UCLA, No. 5 Virginia and No. 7 Princeton, Notre Dame's varsity eight crew climbs to third in the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA)/USRowing Poll and earns a final ranking of sixth, its second straight top-10 final ranking ... The Irish win an unprecedented fourth straight BIG EAST crown with the varsity eight, varsity four and novice four crews all claiming gold medals ... Martin Stone, along with assistants along with assistants Joe Schlosberg and Marnie Stahl are named the BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year for the second time in as many seasons ... Five Notre Dame rowers are selected for CRCA all-Central Region honors ... Amanda Polk and Maria Romano are named to the first team for the second consecutive while Allison Marsh also earns a spot on the first team ... Laura Pearson and Meghan Boyle capture second-team honors ... Polk is tabbed as a first-team All-America selection for the second straight year and garners her third All-America accolade and Marsh is named to the second team.

Notre Dame won an unprecedented fourth consecutive BIG EAST Championship in 2007 as the Irish captured gold medals in the varsity eight, varsity four and novice four races. All six of the Irish boats advanced to the Grand Final of their respective races. The second varsity eight, second varsity four and novice eight all earned runner-up finishes at the meet.

A year ago, Notre Dame's three consecutive conference crowns equaled the mark set by Syracuse during the 2001-03 seasons.

For the second consecutive year, Notre Dame's coach staff of head coach Martin Stone and assistant coaches Joe Schlosberg and Marnie Stahl were honored as the BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year.

Stone also earned the coach-of-the-year accolades in 2004 for the first time in his career.
