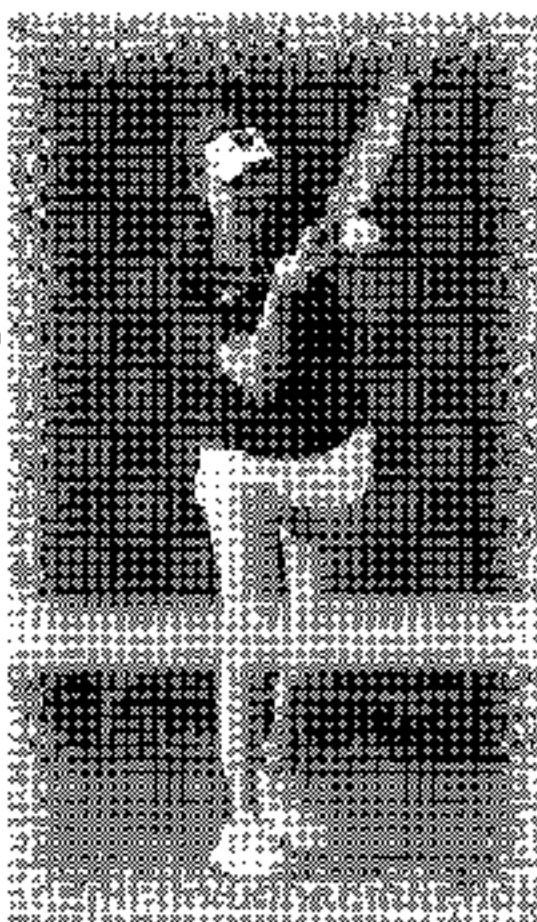


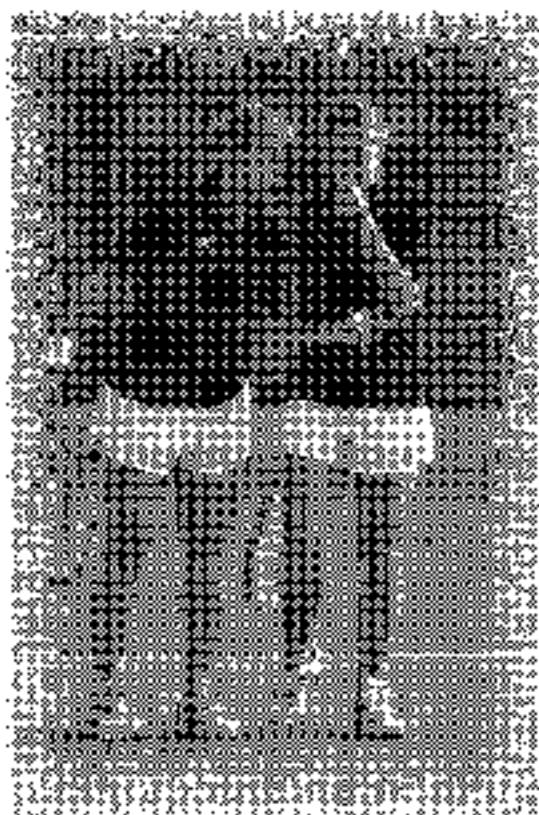

THREE IRISH PLAYERS HEAD TO GEORGIA FOR NCAA INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS: Irish senior co-captain Alliea Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) will open play in the NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Singles Championship on Monday, while twins Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Cathrine Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) are first all-freshman team to participate in the event since 1996, when she took part in the NCAA Doubles Championship when it commences a day later. Both tournaments will be conducted at the Dunwoody Tennis Complex in Athens, Ga. It marks the 10th time in the last 12 years that Notre Dame has had at least two players in both NCAA individual championships.

IRISH IN THE NCAA SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP: The NCAA Singles Championship is a 64-player single-elimination tournament of the top players in the country. It begins on Monday, May 24 and proceeds with one round per day until the final, slated for May 29. The 16 seeded players, as well as any competitors that win two matches to reach the round of 16, automatically assure themselves of All-American honors. The top 20 in the final ITA rankings also are All-Americans.

This is the 14th time in the last 15 years that Notre Dame has had at least one player qualify for the NCAA Singles Championship. CaDe Cahill was the first Irish player to qualify for the tournament, in 1989. Melissa Harris became the first Notre Dame player to win a match in the event, beating Northwestern's Lindsay Matthews in three sets in '91. Jennifer Hall reached the round of 16 in 1996, which stood as the best result by an Irish competitor before current assistant coach Michelle Dasso advanced to the semifinals in 2001 before losing to eventual national champion Laura Granville of Stanford, who is now ranked among the top 50 in the world. Alliea Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) is taking part in the NCAA singles for the second consecutive year, becoming the sixth Irish player to participate multiple times, joining Dasso, Hall, Harris, Wendy Crabtree, and Tracy Barton. Last year, Salas fell 7-5, 6-0 to Northwestern's Cristelle Oger in the first round, while Gaylen Leske (Newport Beach, Calif./Corona del Mar H.S.), who suffered a season-ending ankle injury last September but is expected to return for a fifth year of action, fell 4-1, 6-0 to Darcielle Fichte of William & Mary. No Irish player has won a match in the event since Dasso's run in '01.

IRISH IN THE NCAA DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP: The NCAA Doubles Championship is a 32-team single-elimination tournament of the top duos in the country. It begins on Tuesday, May 25 and proceeds with one round per day until the final, slated for May 29. The eight seeded teams, as well as any pairs that win two matches to reach the quarterfinals, automatically assure themselves of All-American honors. The top 10 in the final ITA rankings also are All-Americans.

After not having a team participate for the first time in 11 years last season, Notre Dame will be represented once again in 2004 with twins Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Cathrine Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) becoming the first all-freshman team since 1983 to earn a bid. The first Irish duo to participate was Wendy Crabtree and Lisa Thelen in 1993. Though they fell in the opening round, the same pair upset the eighth seed and reached the quarterfinals in 1994, in 1998. Tiffany Gates and Jennifer Hall duplicated that feat before losing to the tournament's second seed. Hall and current assistant coach Michelle Dasso advanced to the round of eight in '98 before losing to the top-seeded pair. The last Notre Dame team to participate was Katie Cunha and Lindsay Green, which lost to the second-seeded team in 2002. The last pair to win a match in the tournament was Dasso and Becky Vannum, who reached the round of 16 in '01.

THOMPSONS FIRST ALL-FRESHMAN TEAM IN NCAA DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP SINCE 1983: Twins Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Cathrine Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) comprise the first all-freshman doubles team to gain an invitation to the NCAA Doubles Championship since Marlene Nedelkova and Andrea Ondrisova of FSU in 1980. The Thompsons join Wendy Crabtree (four-time participant from 1993-98) as the lone Irish rookies to participate in the NCAA doubles tournament.

SALAS EARNS SECOND CONSECUTIVE BID TO NCAA SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP: Senior co-captain Alliea Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) earned a bid to the NCAA Singles Championship for the second consecutive season. She is the sixth Notre Dame player to earn multiple bids to the NCAA Singles Championship during her career, joining four-time qualifiers Michelle Dasso (1998-2001) and Jennifer Hall (1996-98), five-time participant Wendy Crabtree (1993-00), and Melissa Harris (1991-92) and Tracy Barton (1990-01), who both qualified twice.

SALAS NAMED REGIONAL SENIOR PLAYER OF THE YEAR, WINS MIDWEST'S DISSE, LEARY SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD: Irish senior co-captain Alliea Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) won two of the three intercollegiate Tennis Association regional awards she was eligible for when the honors were announced earlier this week. Salas was named the Midwest Region's ITA Senior Player of the Year, while also winning the ITA/Globe Leary Sportsmanship Award. The former honor recognizes the top senior in the region, which includes at least one (Midwest) or two Big Ten teams, as well as various other squads from Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa. The latter accolade recognizes a player who displays inspiring dedication and commitment to her team, which has enhanced her team's performance and exemplified the spirit of college tennis. Salas and the winners from each of the other seven regions are now eligible for the national awards, which will be presented May 29 in Athens, Ga. The other regional Senior Players of the Year were Ohio State's Nataly Cabrera, Duke's Amanda Johnson, Florida State's Anna Dumitrescu, Oklahoma's Anna Periano, Texas A&M's Joselyn Rainoff, California's Raquel Guadalupe-Jones, and San Diego State's Katalina Romero. Other regional recipients of the Disse Leary award were Harvard's Susanna Lightfoot, Furman's Mary Nell Hagood, Miami's Megan Bradley, BYU's Li Gaoqi, Rice's Karen Chao, California's Jody Shvedt, and Arizona State's Cindy Saraphong. Salas and Jonack were the only players to win two awards, as the Blue Devils was with the Senior Player of the Year and the winner of the ITA/Arthur Ashe Jr. Award for Leadership and Sportsmanship in the Southeast Region.

SALAS IS THE THIRD NOTRE DAME STUDENT-ATHLETE (LAST SINCE 1957) TO BE NAMED THE MIDWEST REGION'S TOP SENIOR PLAYER, joining Jennifer Hall (06) and current assistant coach Michelle Dasso (01), who also won the national honor. **Salas joins Kelly Zalunek (00)** as Notre Dame winners of the Oskia Luary Award.

SALAS COMPLETES PARTICIPATION IN GRAND SLAM: Senior co-captain Alicia Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.), a qualifier in the first two legs of the collegiate grand slam last fall, became just the fourth player in men's history to qualify for each of the grand slam tournaments in a season. Both current assistant coach Michelle Dasso (1996-99 & 2000-01) and Wendy Crabtree (1965-64 & 1994-95) accomplished the feat by co- while Jennifer Hall did it in 1997-98. Salas won three qualifying matches to reach the main draw of the USTA/ITA American Championships in September and then gained entrance to the 32-player ITA National elite collegiate Indoor Championships via her runner-up result in the ITA Midwest Championships. She lost in the first round in a consolation match at the All-American.

THOMPSONS BECOME JUST SECOND AND THIRD IRISH FRESHMEN TO PLAY IN NCAA DOUBLES: Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) are the first all-freshman Notre Dame doubles team to earn a bid to the NCAA Doubles Championship. Prior to this year, only one Irish rookie, Wendy Crabtree in 1990, had ever gained an invitation to the tournament.

THOMPSONS FIRST ALL-FRESHMAN TEAM TO PLAY NO. 1 FOR IRISH SINCE 1993: Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) received No. 1 doubles at spring, compiling a 12-11 record. It marked the first time two rookies had played No. 1 doubles for Notre Dame since Wendy Crabtree and Holly Lee did so in 1988, winning in their only appearance together at the position.

CHRISTIAN THOMPSON FIRST ROOKIE IN TOP TWO OF SINGLES LINEUP SINCE 1998: Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) played No. 2 singles for the Irish all spring, compiling a 13-0 record. It marks the first time a freshman had played in the top two singles positions for Notre Dame since current assistant coach Michelle Dasso was 2-1-0 at No. 2 as a rookie in 1995.

SALAS vs. NCAA SINGLES CHAMPIONSHIP FIELD: Senior co-captain Alicia Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) has previously faced 17 other NCAA singles qualifiers in collegiate action, including 16 of them this season. In 2003-04, more than half of her matches -- 22 of 42 -- were against players that earned invitations or were named teammates to the NCAA Singles Championship. Salas was 9-13 in those contests this season. In her career, she holds a 14-17 mark against the field and opponents.

THOMPSONS vs. NCAA DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP FIELD: Freshman Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) played nine matches this season against teams that earned bids to the NCAA Doubles Championship, winning twice. Additionally, the Thompsons faced five other teams featuring one player who is in the NCAA doubles tournament being victorious on three occasions.

THOMPSONS HIGHEST-RANKED ALL-FRESHMAN DOUBLES TEAM IN NATION: Freshman twins Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) moved up 14 spots to 36th in the most recent USTA/ITA collegiate Tennis Association national doubles rankings, remaining the highest-ranked all-freshman team in the nation. Iowa freshmen Hilary Wittz and Meg Sabotta moved into the rankings at 65th to be the only other all-rookie team in the rankings. The Thompsons are 21-16 this season, including 12-11 at No. 1. The Thompsons have four wins over ranked ones, including a 3-0 (7-5) victory against the nation's second-ranked team of Cristelle Crier and Jessica Rush of Northwestern on April 15.

THOMPSONS UPSET NATION'S #2 DOUBLES TEAM: Freshman twins Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) defeated the #2 doubles team of the nation, Cristelle Crier and Jessica Rush of Northwestern, in dual-match play at No. 1 on April 16 at the Courtney Tennis Center. The Thompsons were victorious 5-8 (7-5), winning in a comeback for the first time in five tries. The last time an Irish team upset one of the nation's top four doubles teams was Feb. 17, 2001, when current assistant coach Michelle Dasso and Becky Vernum, former 1st, best Pepperdine's top-ranked pair of Lori Sanchez and Marta Pazenda 3-5 at No. 4 in 6-1 Irish victory in consolation play of the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championships.

SALAS, THOMPSONS EARN BIG EAST ALL-TOURNAMENT HONORS: Senior co-captain Alicia Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) and freshman Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) were both named to the BIG EAST Conference all-tournament team in singles, while Thompson and her twin sister, Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.), gained mention in doubles, when the league awards were announced earlier this month. The teams were designated by voting of conference head coaches, who were prohibited from voting for their own players.

This is just the second year the BIG EAST has named an all-tournament team, and Salas is one of four players (also Miami's Megan Bradley, Mari Toro, and Melissa Appelbaum) to earn singles honors on both occasions. Christian Thompson is the lone freshman on this year's singles all-tournament squad, joining Miami's Melissa Appelbaum as the only rookies ever to be so honored. The Thompsons are the first all-freshman doubles team to earn all-BIG EAST Championship mention.

SALAS NAMED TEAM MVP, ROCKNE STUDENT-ATHLETE: Senior co-captain Alicia Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) swept the two major team awards, announced last month. For the second time in three seasons, she was named the Irish MVP, while also winning the Knute Rockne Student-Athlete Award for the second consecutive year. Salas, who is 24-17 and ranked 22nd nationally in singles, was voted the most valuable player by her teammates, while the latter award honors her as the squad's top student.

SALAS, THOMPSONS ALL-AMERICA CANDIDATES: Senior co-captain Alicia Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) and freshman twins Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) all have opportunities to earn All-American accolades with strong performances at the NCAA's. Salas is a candidate in singles, where one must 1) earn one of the 16 seeds in the NCAA Singles Championship; 2) win two matches to reach the round of 16 in the NCAA Singles Championship; or 3) finish in the top 20 of the final USTA/ITA national rankings. It is unlikely Salas, currently ranked 23rd after being as high as 10th, will earn a spot in the NCAA singles tournament, so she will need to fulfill one of the two criteria. The Thompsons, ranked 36th and the only all-freshman team to gain entry to the NCAA Doubles Championship, figure to need to win a pair of matches to reach the quarterfinals of that event to gain All-American honors. It is unlikely that they have much chance of fulfilling either of the other two ways to become an All-American: earn one of the eight seeds in the NCAA Doubles tournament or finish among the top 10 in the ITA national doubles rankings.

Since moving up to the Division I level in 1985-86, Notre Dame student-athletes have earned singles All-American honors on five occasions, and doubles accolades four times. Most recently, current assistant coach Michelle Dasso was a double All-American in her final season, fulfilling of three criteria in singles and a pair in doubles, along with Becky Vernum (02).

SALAS AN ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA NOMINEE: Senior co-captain Allie Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) was one of three Irish female student-athletes nominated as CoSIDA Academic All-America candidates this month in the college program. Each school is eligible to nominate a total of three male and three female student-athletes in the category, which encompasses athletes from 25 sports, including 12 Irish varsity programs: fencing (MW), golf (MW), ice hockey (M), lacrosse (MW), rowing (M), swimming & diving (MW), and tennis (MW). Other Notre Dame nominees were junior Alicia Kyzanski, hockey player Ron Gobbe and Cory McCann, and two male players Stewart Crossland and Meredith Simon. After voting by members of the College Sports Information Directors of America in the district, the Academic All-District V team will be released on May 27, and those honorees will be sent on to the national ballot. The CoSIDA Academic All-America team will be announced June 17. Salas, who has been ranked as high as 10th in the national singles rankings, holds a 3.639 cumulative grade-point average for a pre-professional studies/biotechnology major in the College of Arts & Letters. She is trying to join Wendy Grabtree (1993, third team) and Jennifer Hall (1995, third team) as Irish women's tennis Academic All-Americans.

SALAS HONORED WITH BYRON V. KANALEY AWARD: Senior co-captain Allie Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) was one of five Notre Dame seniors honored with the Byron V. Kanaley Award last month. The Kanaley Award, the most prestigious honor presented to student-athletes, has been given each year since 1937 to senior men's program athletes who have been most exemplary as both students and leaders. Chosen by the University's Faculty Board on Athletics, the awards are named in honor of Byron V. Kanaley, a 1904 Notre Dame graduate who was a member of the Irish basketball team as an undergraduate. Kanaley went on to a successful banking career in Chicago and earned the University an \$1.5 million trust for his death in 1960. Other 2004 recipients were women's golfer Shannon Byrne, men's tennis player Luke Hadcock, women's soccer standout Vanessa Prusinski, and women's volleyball player Kristen Kinder. Salas is the sixth women's tennis player since 1995 - and third since '99 - to win the Kanaley award, marking the third by any sport during that span.

SALAS HEADED TO CHINA WITH TA ALL-STAR TEAM: Senior co-captain Allie Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.) was one of 10 players (five women, five men) selected by the International Tennis Association to represent the United States on the 2004 American Express Collegiate All-Star Team in two exhibition team matches in China June 16-21. The trip is being hosted by the Chinese Tennis Association, and the U.S. squad will be competing against teams selected by the CIA, consisting of the best young players in China, ages 17-23. The team will make stops in Hong Kong, Tianjin, and Beijing, participating in several clinics and enjoying sightseeing excursions, in addition to the exhibition matches. The other women's players selected for the team were Zoëlie Goleponova of Armstrong Atlantic State (Ga.), Amanda Johnson of Duke, Jennifer Magley of Florida, and Jennifer McGaffigan of Illinois. Philozou's L. J. Gengler will serve as the women's coach, while tennis legend Steve Smith will be the honorary coach.

SALAS ESTABLISHING HERSELF AS ONE OF NATION'S TOP PLAYERS: Senior co-captain Allie Salas (Englewood, Colo./Cherry Creek H.S.), currently ranked 72nd after being a career-high 10th earlier this spring, has established herself as one of the elite players in college tennis this season. She stands 24-17 in singles, having defeated 15 ranked opponents. She has victories over #1 Amanda Johnson of Duke, #14 Jennifer McGaffigan of Illinois, #15 Lizzy Hurlbut of USC, #24 Tamiya Enchi of Tennessee, #28 Clarissa Hollands of Arizona, #30 Dora Vasilev of Indiana, #35 Alicia Kyzanski of Columbia, #37 Elizabeth Exon of Michigan, #50 Megan Muth of Wake Forest & Mary, #42 Jessica Rush of Northwestern, #43 Barbara Zelenko of BYU, #68 Andree Yung of Northeastern, #78 Shane McEry of Wisconsin, #85 Ashley Schmeier of Vanderbilt, and #110 Meg Rapke of Iowa. In addition, three more of Salas' victories were against players that were unranked at the time of the match but now carry national rankings. She posted a victory over Wisconsin's Katie McGaffigan (now 73rd), as well as wins vs. Exon (now #36) and Rapke (now #102) when they were unranked.

Last fall, she kept through qualifying to reach the main draw of the ITA All-American Championships in October and then gained entrance to the ITA national intercollegiate Indoor Champ on the following month due to her runner-up result in the ITA Midwest Championship. She is just the fourth Notre Dame player ever to take part in the final two legs of the collegiate grand slam, joining Melissa Hanks ('92), Wendy Grabtree ('96), Jennifer Hall ('99), and current Irish assistant Michelle Dasaro ('01). When she moved up to 10th in the ITA national singles rankings, Salas joined three other players as the only Notre Dame players listed among the top 10 players in college tennis since the Irish moved up to the Division I level in 1985-86.

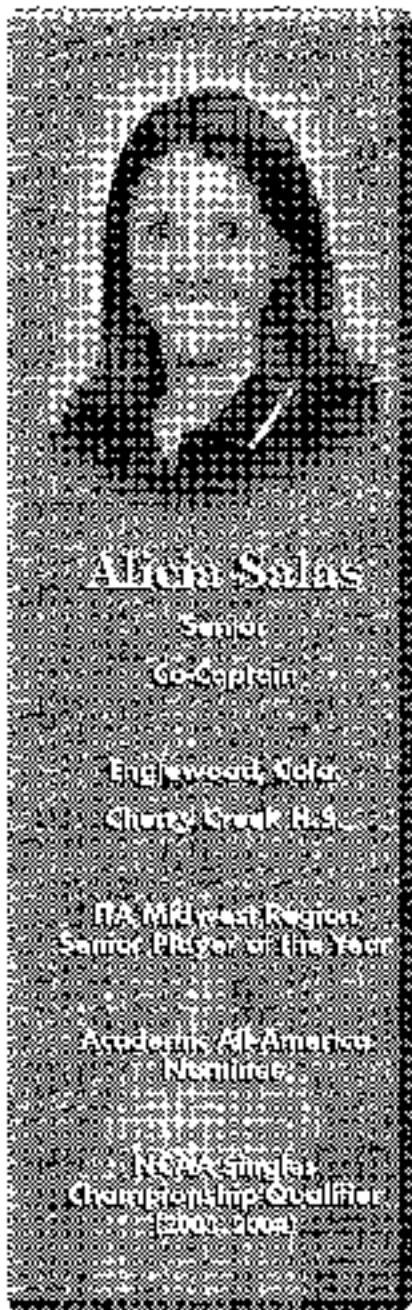
Salas has a career 95-42 (.691) record in singles and 64-38 (.629) mark in doubles. She is 12th on the Irish career singles victories list.

IRISH HEAD COACH: Jay Louderback is in his 15th season at Notre Dame with a 287-136 (.681) record and his 25th year as a collegiate coach with a 471-314 (.600) mark. He ranks fifth among active NCAA Division I coaches in career victories. Louderback's Irish have finished in the national top 30 in each of the last 21 seasons, have won 11 conference titles and registered 26 or more victories five times in the last eight campaigns. Since the preseason of the 1992-93 season, Louderback's teams have been ranked in the national top 30 in 185 of 187 sets of rankings. After taking over a program looking for its first NCAA tournament appearance, Louderback has helped Notre Dame to the NCAA's 16 times in the last 12 years, including five appearances in the round of 16 and a 1998 quarterfinal finish. Louderback, a four-time Midwest Region coach of the year, has been honored as his conference's top coach six straight seasons, including five times in rare years in the BIG EAST. In his time at Notre Dame, Louderback's players have earned All-America honors 13 times, won three national ITA awards, and earned 19 invitations to the NCAA singles championship and 16 to the NCAA doubles tournament. His players have dominated the University awards during Louderback's tenure, leading all sports in both Byron V. Kanaley awards (six) and Francis Patrick O'Connor awards (five). His family was honored with the United States Tennis Association (USTA) Tennis Family of the Year Award for 2002. The Arkansas City, Kan., native, and 1976 graduate of Wichita State arrived at Notre Dame prior to the 1989-91 season after coaching for seven years at his alma mater and three years (men and women) at Iowa State.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS ON TV: The 2004 NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championships will receive more television coverage than ever before. The women's team final will air on a tape-delayed basis on ESPN2 on May 25 at 3 p.m. (EDT) (2 p.m. in South Bend). The Tennis Channel will provide tape-delayed coverage of the final of the NCAA Singles and Doubles Championships, slated to premiere on June 4 at 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. (EDT) and re-air numerous times.

SISTER ACT: For the second straight season, Notre Dame has an unprecedented two girls' captains on its roster in 2003-04. In 2002-03, Liz Donchup (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Lauren Connolly (Oklahoma City, Okla./Bishop McGuinness H.S.) joined the Notre Dame squad as freshmen, combining with sisters Maggie Donchup and Sarah Jane Connolly (Oklahoma City, Okla./Bishop McGuinness H.S.) to mark the first time in school history that a team captured two sets of titles at the same time. Though Maggie Donchup graduated in '03, the Connollys are joined this season by freshman twins Catrina Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) and Christian Thompson (Las Vegas, Nev./Bishop Gorman H.S.) to give Notre Dame two sets of sisters once again. A total of six sets of sisters have earned invitations in women's tennis, by far the most of any of the 13 Irish women's sports.

Queen of Aces

In the span of her freshman year, Alicia Sales encountered something for the first time in her tennis career—a bench. Sales, a tennis star at Cherry Creek High School in Englewood, Colo., described her high school status as being “the big fish in the small pond.” However, reality struck Sales when she did not start for the Fighting Irish her first year. Highly motivated, Sales worked on all aspects of her game over the next three years, eventually gaining her current No. 14 ranking in the nation, and becoming one of the best tennis players in Notre Dame history. Despite her transitional freshman year, Sales showed great potential, compiling an 11-3 singles record and an 11-8 doubles record. Even in her college debut, Sales showed that she had the ability to be elite when she reached the final in the Maryland Invitational. Nonetheless, Sales was still not an everyday player, as she desired.

“I had never really sat out in my life, and not playing in the lineup really motivated me a lot,” Sales says. “I went home over the summer and worked on some things and came back and was so hungry to play I went into every practice saying, ‘I want to make the lineup, I want to play.’”

And play she did. Sales was remarkable in the middle of the Irish lineup during her sophomore year, compiling a 24-3 dual-match record—tying the Notre Dame record—as well as having a 31-6 overall singles record. Sales also led the team in doubles wins with 26. By February, Sales had broken into the national rankings, reaching No. 123. With a combined 57-18 record her sophomore year, Sales earned team MVP honors.

In her junior year, she moved to the top of the lineup, often starting in the No. 1 spot but finally settling in the No. 2. With a 24-15 record against tough opponents, Sales peaked at No. 65 before finishing ranked 98th in the nation and sixth in the Midwest. Sales’ junior season had a number of highlights, including a second place finish in the Ohio State Prince Cup and a blue flight championship in the Eck Classic. Sales also competed well in doubles matches, pairing almost exclusively with then-freshman Lauren Connelly. The duo went 17-0 and notched two upsets in the NCAA A team tournament over the No. 15 and No. 3 doubles teams from Missouri and Vanderbilt, respectively.

“Junior year was again a transition year for me,” Sales reflects, “because I had played so well the previous year that there was a lot of pressure that I had to come out and be a consistent winner, and now I was playing at a higher level, in the No. 1 and 2 positions. I just had to get used to playing at an entirely different level.”

Coming into her senior year, Sales had a fall preseason rank of 64th in the nation in singles and 76th in doubles with Lauren Connelly. She was selected as co-captain of the Irish with senior Caylen Leslie. Sales also went into the fall season with the eighth highest singles winning percentage in Notre Dame history at .746 (71-25).

On Sept. 25, 2003, Sales opened her senior year at the Adidas Invitational in Peachtree, Ga. With wins over Kristin Cargill of Duke and Ashley Richards of Tennessee, Sales advanced to the semifinals. However, No. 8 Alexis Gordon of Florida was too much for Sales to handle, eliminating the Irish captain in three sets. Likewise, the Sales/Connelly tandem fell in the semifinals to Florida’s Jennifer Magley and Serena Reyes.

On Oct. 7, Sales returned to singles action at the Riviera Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) Women’s All-American Championship in Pacific Palisades, Calif. Beating No. 85 Ashley Scovelbas of Vanderbilt and No. 33 Ally Lavelle of Clemson, Sales advanced to face No. 39 Megan Mull of William & Mary. In only two sets, Sales defeated her ranked foe and advanced to the field of 32. However, Sales was topped by No. 27 Tammy Escoto of Tennessee. Nonetheless, Sales’ three wins in the tournament automatically qualified her for the All-American Championship, a goal she had set at the beginning of the season.

“Just making the All-American Championship was really special for me,” Sales says, “because it was something that I always aspired to do but never thought I’d have a chance at.”

Still the underdog in the All-American Championship, Sales continued to prevail, taking down No. 29 Dianne Flohds of Arizona in the first round. However, Sales did not advance past the second round where No. 7 Daria Panova of Creighton eliminated her from the tournament.

At the ITA Midwest Championship on Oct. 26, Sales made quick work of her first round opponent, beating her in straight sets. On the following day, Sales dropped both Elizabeth Exon of Michigan and No. 42 Jessica Rush of Northwestern to advance to the finals. However, No. 4

Christelle Girard of Northwestern simply outplayed Salas in the championship, beating her in two sets. Nonetheless, Salas qualified for the National Indoor Championship.

On Nov. 6, Salas had a first round rematch against No. 8 Alexis Gordon of Florida in the National Indoor Championship at the University of Michigan. Despite the change of venue, the result was the same with Gordon defeating Salas in a three-set battle. On the

next day, Salas fell to Sasha Pedjicuzins of California in the consolation bracket, ending Salas' fall season. Still, Salas' impressive 12-6 record in the No. 1 position on the team earned her a spring preseason singles rank of 14th, and helped elevate her team to 21st in the nation.

"I just have to go out there and keep playing the way I've been playing," Salas says about the upcoming spring schedule. "I've been pretty relaxed, and I'm just going to put everything out of my mind and have fun with it; that's what has been working so far. I haven't felt a whole lot of pressure or anxious or nervous because I am looking at it as my last season, and I want to go out and make the best of it because this is my last opportunity."

On Jan. 29, 2004, Salas was certainly able to clear her head in the Irish's season-opening dual match at No. 34 Michigan. Despite Notre Dame's ineffectiveness against the Wolverines, Salas played two great matches. In singles action, Salas defeated No. 37 Elizabeth Evon, as she had when they faced each other in the October ITA Midwest Championship.

Then, Salas and Connelly picked up where the autumn season left off, adding a doubles win for the Irish. Nevertheless, Notre Dame lost to Michigan, 6-7.

The Irish then went on to win

their next two home matches against No. 48 Ohio State and No. 64 Wisconsin. Salas remained undefeated during the spring season, winning a singles match against Ohio State as well as a singles and a doubles match against Wisconsin. Her win in a singles match against Wisconsin's Katie McGaffigan was payback for the last time the two met. In the 2002

NCAA Tournament, it was McGaffigan who ended Salas' dream season, during which she had posted a

school-record 24 wins.

On Feb. 13, 2004, multiple streaks ended at No. 14 Virginia Commonwealth. The Rams were handed their first home-court defeat in almost five years at the hands of the Fighting Irish. However, VCU's Olga Bernova ended Salas' undefeated streak this spring with a two set victory over the Irish co-captain. Salas did not exit empty-handed though, as she combined with partner Connelly to win a doubles match.

Although Salas lost for the first time this season in Richmond, Va., Notre Dame's winning streak continued. Over a two-week span, beginning on Valentine's Day, Notre Dame notched four more dual-match wins. The Irish topped Boston College, No. 69 Virginia Tech, No. 20 BYU, and No. 26 Indiana. Through these four games, Salas posted a 3-2 singles record, including a match-clinching victory over BYU's No. 13 Barbara Zaharova.

The Irish then went on their worst skid of the season at the beginning of March. In 10 days, the Irish lost three consecutive matches to No. 17 Illinois, No. 6 Duke, and No. 26 Tennessee. However, Salas gave a good effort in keeping the team motivated by playing her best all season. Salas defeated No. 14 Jennifer McGaffigan of Illinois, No. 5 Amanda Johnson of Duke, and No. 24 Tammy Encina of Tennessee.

Despite this rough patch, Salas looks at the positive side of the situation. "I think [these] were my best matches this season, against Amanda Johnson from Duke and Tammy Encina from Tennessee," Salas

says. "I had lost to Tammy Encina earlier in the fall, so it was nice to come back and win that match in the spring."

Recently, the Irish broke their three-game losing streak with a home win over No. 47 Iowa. Salas won both the singles match and the doubles match as the Irish went on to win, 6-1. This improved Salas to 22-8 on the combined fall and spring seasons, and it moved her to 13th in the national rankings. Salas looks to lead the No. 21 Fighting Irish throughout the rest of the dual season and into the postseason. With high hopes for the Big East Championship, Salas says: "It's an exciting environment; the fans really get into it. It can be hard at times, but also motivating at others. We have always been able to play well there and come through."

Salas is also looking forward to an exciting summer of tennis after she graduates. Salas was one of 10 collegiate tennis players selected to tour China as a member of the Intercollegiate Tennis Association All-Star team. In the fall, Salas will attend the University of Colorado Dental School, a fitting occupational choice for someone who has had so much to smile about during her impressive tennis career at Notre Dame. □

Salas set to shine in final season with Irish

Alicia Salas knew she didn't belong on the sidelines.

But as a freshman, the now nationally ranked senior didn't make the starting lineup of the Irish tennis team.

"I was always used to playing in high school, so not being able to compete my freshman year was frustrating," Salas recalled. "I was sick of sitting on the sidelines."

That was all the motivation she needed.

Over the summer following her freshman year, Salas played tournaments and honed her skills in preparation for an eventful sophomore season. Head coach Jay Louderback noted a significant change in her abilities.

"She was very consistent as a freshman, but she didn't have a whole lot of power," he said. "She didn't come to the net a lot. As a sophomore, she hit the ball with a lot more pace."

Playing the majority of the season at No. 4 her sophomore year, Salas posted a nearly flawless singles record for dual meets at 24-3 to lead the team in singles and doubles wins. In April of that year, she garnered her first career national ranking, placed at #23rd. Her success that year culminated in a combined total of 57 victories in singles and doubles, earning her the title of team MVP.

Salas saw similar success her junior year, starting the season at No. 1 singles before returning to the No. 2 spot after teammate Caylan Leslie returned from an injury. Despite a shoulder injury later in the season, Salas finished with a 9-5 dual meet singles record and a 17-9 overall doubles record with current doubles partner Lauren Connally. She finished the season ranked 98th, with a Big East Championship all-tournament team title to her name.

Now, as a senior, her coaches can't praise her enough.

"She has great control and placement; she can really put the ball anywhere she wants to," assistant coach Michelle Dasso said. "She can move the ball on a dime and makes very few errors. It's hard to beat her because of that."

Salas' success this fall bore witness to Dasso's observation. This fall, she earned a 12-6 record, claiming eight victories over ranked opponents. Four of her losses came at the hands of top-10 ranked competitors. She has started the spring season strong, remaining undefeated after matches against Big Ten schools Michigan, Wisconsin and Ohio State. This past weekend, she avenged her loss last season to Wisconsin's Katie McGaffigan, defeating her rival 7-6 (7-3), 6-3.

Both Dasso and Louderback are confident her winning ways will continue.

"I think she'll do well this season," Louderback said. "She'll probably go quite a ways in the NCAA tournament. She's competitive. She doesn't like to lose."

For Salas, It's Life In The Fast Lane

Senior co-captain Alicia Salas has covered a lot of ground in her four years at Notre Dame. Ranked 14th nationally in singles, Salas has come a long way from the No. 8 position she occupied in the Irish line-up as a freshman.

Salas was 12-6 in the fall of '03, registering eight wins over ranked opponents. She knocked off three ranked foes to qualify for the Riviera/TTA All-American Championships, the first leg of the collegiate grand slam, in October and then reached the final in the IFA Midwest Championships.

As a freshman, Salas, a 2000 graduate of Cherry Creek High School in Englewood Colo., did not see much time on the courts. Head coach Jay Landerback notes that there were other players with more experience and that Salas had to work on a few things in her game.

"Coming from Denver, Alicia was used to playing in high altitude. She worked on hitting the ball deeper, hitting it harder and getting more pace on it. She worked on being more aggressive and we changed her volleys."

A solid work ethic and some playing time in summer tournaments allowed Salas to make her presence known as a sophomore. Playing mostly at the No. 4 position, Salas posted a 24-3 dual match record in singles, tying the Notre Dame record for wins in a season.

Landerback cites Salas' ability to adapt and make transitions as essential to her success. "Alicia is a great competitor. During her freshman year, she really wanted to be out playing. Each time she has moved up, her ability to compete well has helped her make those transitions."

For a competitor like Salas, who won four Colorado state titles watching the action from the sidelines is not much fun. However, she was able to use the lessons she learned as a freshman to her advantage.

"By my sophomore year I had learned what I needed to do in order to play in the lineup and the level I needed to compete at. By then I was excited and really motivated."

Despite her success as a sophomore, Salas was not content to settle in at the middle of the Irish lineup, she kept up the quick pace, making the transition from No. 4 to the top two positions in 2003. She had to adjust to tougher competition and facing the nation's best players on a daily basis.

Salas feels the experience of the move has allowed her to improve in responding to the competition.

"I feel like I have learned a lot from playing at the top two positions last year," Salas says. "I've realized what kind of competitors I'll be facing, and I've learned how to play a different kind of game. I've built off those two transition years and I've learned a lot from them." The wide range of experiences throughout her Notre Dame career shaped Salas' leadership skills as well as her game.

"She works really hard and is just a great example," Lunderback notes. "For the girls not in the lineup, all they need to do is look at what Alicia did. She did things the right way. It's given her a lot of credibility with everyone on the team because she has come so far."

Salas feels she can draw on the last three years in her role as a team captain.

"One of the things I've been able to do is relate to everyone on the team because I've been at most of those positions in my career. I've been through quite a range of emotions and through successes and failures in my four years, so as a captain, I can be understanding of the other players and what they are going through."

Salas hopes to continue on the same path in the upcoming dual-match season.

"I know it is my last season, so part of me is trying to put everything out of my head and just have fun with it. No matter what happens, I am going to go out and enjoy it because the experience has been so valuable to me that I want to end on a good note."

According to Lunderback, ending on a good note should not be too difficult for Salas. "This is my 25th year coaching, and she has improved more than anyone I've ever had. She came in playing No. 8 as a freshman, and now she has a chance to be an All-American, which would be an amazing feat, especially because she has done it so fast."

Salas dominates singles court over spring break

Salas won 10 matches against Duke's Amanda Johnson and Tennessee's Tammy Encina. All of the numbers say the same thing - Alicia Salas's opponents are simply overmatched against the No. 13 senior.

Over spring break, Salas upended No. 5 Amanda Johnson of Duke 2-6, 6-1, 6-3. She chased that success with a hard-fought win against No. 24 Tammy Encina of Tennessee 6-4, 4-6, 1-0 (10-7) in singles.

Encina and Salas had met twice earlier this year, with Encina winning both matches.

Each of Salas's last four wins pitted the senior against top-30 ranked players. Salas is 6-0 this year at No. 1 against ranked opponents and 9-2 overall.

"She's really played well all year," Irish coach Jay Louderback said. "She's a real competitor. We're just asking her to keep doing what she's doing and to stay aggressive by coming to the net when she can."

Salas's success came amidst tough losses to No. 6 Duke 6-1 and No. 36 Tennessee 6-1 in Hawaii.

"Going from indoor to outdoor courts was a lot to adjust to, I think," Louderback said. "You have to worry about the sun and wind and the balls don't travel as fast outside."

The No. 18 Irish, currently 7-4, took on Duke (7-1) first, where they faced tough matches at every position. At No. 3 doubles, junior Sarah Jane Connelly and sophomore Kristina Slastoy were first off the courts after a close 8-5 loss to Kristen Cargill and Jennifer Zika.

The No. 2 doubles team of Lauren Connelly and Salas lost 8-4 to Saras Arasu and Jonson.

At No. 1 doubles, freshmen Catrina and Christian Thompson, ranked No. 37 nationally, knocked off the tandem of Julia Smith and Tary Zawacki, 8-6. The Thompsons are 16-8 this season and have won five of their last six matches.

Salas followed up with the lone win in singles at No. 1 against Johnson 2-6, 6-1, 6-3.

"Duke is solid all the way down the lineup, but I think we played well. We had a solid chance at each position," Louderback said.

Against No. 36 Tennessee (9-8), Notre Dame faced tough opponents again, with four of the matches settled in tiebreakers. At No. 2 doubles, Sarah Jane Connelly and Slastoy outlasted Tennessee's Majen Imvink and Breanna Kray 9-8 (7-4).

Sabita Maharaj, ranked No. 73 in singles, and Ashley Roberts defeated Lauren Connelly and Salas 8-3 at No. 2. At No. 1, the Thompsons also met tough opponents in Encina and Melissa Schaub, falling short of a win 9-8 (7-5) in a tiebreaker.

"Our No. 1 and No. 3 doubles matches were really tight," Louderback said. "As a team overall, we didn't play with a lot of enthusiasm."

No. 84 Catrina Thompson's defeat against Roberts was also determined by a tiebreaking match at No. 3 4-6, 6-2, 1-0 (10-6).

Salas garnered the only singles win, edging out Encina 6-4, 4-6, 1-0 (10-7).

The Irish are set to host No. 44 Iowa on Thursday at 6 p.m.

You have also both been ranked nationally in singles and doubles. These are very notable accomplishments for any player and you hold these slots as freshman. Did you know that you were going to be able to make such an impact when you got here and what has the season meant to you so far?

Christian- It is important to understand that our team is very deep. Our No. 6 player could easily play No. 1 for us. Conditioning has been a big factor in our transition here as well. Conditioning is very different between juniors and college and every day in practice, we are playing with the best. It is different than what we had in Las Vegas. I know that our confidence has grown because of our conditioning here and hopefully we can keep it up.

Catrina- Our team is very deep. We probably had a little bit of luck in the fall tournaments that helped us out a bit. Our team is just so deep and so talented. It is great to play at the Nos. 2 and 3 positions, but it is understandable that anyone could fill those slots. I think that one of the reasons that we play No. 1 doubles is that we have played together for so long. It is different and difficult to start playing with a new doubles partner. We have been playing together for so long that we know what each other is doing and we have moves that are able to set ourselves apart. It is fortunate that when we go to practice we get to play with some of the best players in the country.

14. Notre Dame women's tennis team is unique in that it has two sets of sisters on the team, a distinction that had not happened on any Irish athletics team until women's tennis accomplished the feat a year ago. Describe the added dynamic that adds to the team atmosphere and what sort of positive impact that has on the team?

Christian- When you watch Sarah Jane and Lauren Connelly in practice and on the court, you begin to notice the little things. In a way, they lighten up the mood in practice by just seeing their small fights where they are just joking around. We are very quiet in practice because we are the freshmen but those two are really funny. You can see the support that is involved within both Sarah Jane's and Lauren's relationship as well as within our relationship. We are all very supportive of each other and I think that the relationships of sisters bring the team closer together.

Catrina- We talk with Liz Donohue, who played with her sister for the last few years [until Maggie Donohue graduated], and she told us about how tough the adjustment has been not having her sister here this year. I don't think I could be here without Christian for an entire year. With sisters, you have the support of someone else out there, and you can really see that support in our relationships.

15. How do you prepare for matches both mentally and physically?

Catrina- Mentally, before matches I get a little nervous. To calm myself down I usually try to talk to my parents or listen to music. It really helps to talk with the team and it takes your mind off things when you are joking around. Physically, we usually just warm up with the team. We go for a jog and hit for about an hour before the match. We do a doubles drill which really gets me going because it is fun and it gets you into the mode to play.

Christian- Getting ready mentally is the hardest part about getting prepared. The team really helps you to get pumped up. We have a warm up tape that gets you going. The song "Here Come the Irish" is on the tape and that gets you going, knowing that you play for Notre Dame. Before the match when the team gets together to do a short "Irish" cheer, it gets you ready to compete. I guess there is no real way to prepare for matches except to keep your confidence up and to keep up your intensity level. Physically, some of the more fun drills in warm-ups really get you going as you are listening to music in the background. Right before a match you are as physically prepared as you are going to be, and it is important to stay intense.

16. What is your sister's best attribute on and off the tennis court?

Catrina- Christian may not show it all of the time, but she would do anything for me. She is always there for me. Because I am the shyier of the two of us, she acts as the older sister and will include me in things when she doesn't have to. On the tennis court, Christian's quickness and her footwork are admirable. She is very athletic and at times when I watch her play she comes up with shots that not many people could get.

Christian- I am sometimes pretty lazy and Catrina does a good job of getting me going. I would have to say that she acts more like the older sister. I ask for her advice in everything that I do. She is an extremely loving person and I would also have to say that she would do anything for me. I respect her and I really don't know what I would do without her. I think I would be lost. On the court, Catrina's desire to win along with her power is what really stands out.

17. If you could pick a famous partnership to describe yourselves together whom would it be and why?

Catrina- I would have to say Bob and Mike Bryan. They are the number-one-ranked doubles team in the world for men. We actually had a chance to meet them when we were 14. Ever since then, at least for me, they have been my role models. Being twins themselves, they have an understanding of what Christian and I go through. They have been so nice to us. We have kept in touch through e-mail and we have actually been able to hit with them. We have played doubles with them a few times. I just think that their relationship and what they have gone through is similar to what we have gone through. In a relationship such as ours, it is nice to know that someone knows what you are going through and that you always have a hitting partner and someone to support you.

Christian- I am going to say Venus and Serena Williams. When you see them, when they are down and out of it, as rare as that happens, you see something happen where they always seem to come back and win the match. Whether that is because they have played together so long or because they have such a bond, I don't know, but they have that great ability to comeback. The rivalry that they share is similar to what we had growing up. As of late, Serena has been the better of the two sisters, and we have been through periods where one of us has been the better out of the two. It is important to be able to leave those thoughts off of the court when you are playing doubles. We know that by playing with each other we make each other better and I know that is how Venus and Serena are. I don't think that we would be where we are now without each other.

18. What is your most memorable athletic moment?

Christian- It would be playing at the Junior U.S. Open. We actually played on the courts of the U.S. Open. Just the experience of that was unbelievable even though we lost. We were able to interact with the real players and we shared a locker room and lounge with the other players. All I wanted to do was sit there and watch all the players walk by. That was by far the highlight of my career so far. I really hope to be able to go back.

Catrina- The U.S. Open was a highlight, but a memorable moment for me was winning our first national doubles tournament together at the Easter Bowl in Palm Springs. The feeling of winning that first tournament and saying that you won a national championship was such an amazing moment. Sharing the title made it even more enjoyable.

19. College tennis is unique in that it takes a very individual sport and incorporates it into a team setting. Individually, how are you able to feed off of each other in a singles setting and as a doubles team? Secondly, in a team setting how important is it for you to have the support of not only your sister, but also your teammates?

Catrina- When we play singles matches here at home, Christian and I play on opposite sides of the court from each other and sometimes I find myself wondering what the score is. I think it has been good playing on different sides because I know that I have to concentrate on my match and not worry about if she is winning or losing. As a team, we definitely try to pump each other up. I look around to see the scores of other matches and whether or not someone is up or down in their match, you always try to help them to stay in the match.

Christian- The hardest part about playing for a team is that you want the team to win so badly. You know that winning your match will help the team, but it is also about supporting your teammates and helping them through their matches as well as getting through yours. There is a fine line between focusing on your match and seeing when your teammates need some support to get through their own matches. You have to be able to find a median between yourself and the team.

20. If you were on an island and you could only have one meal, only listen to one song and spend your time with only one person for the rest of your life, what and who would you pick?

Catrina- My meal would be candy orange slices. We basically live off junk food and probably do not have the best diets. It is not a meal but everyone that knows us, knows that we love candy. My song would be "Here Without You" by Three Doors Down. It makes me think of all of the people that I am missing. It is also the song that we shared with our older sister when we left home. The person I would spend my time with would have to be Christian. We have spent the most time together. We are just never apart, and I think that if we had to be apart it would never work. I don't think that I could live without her.

Bonus: What are you looking to accomplish, as athletes here at Notre Dame and what are your career goals in life outside of Notre Dame?

Catrina- My top goal is to win the NCAA championship as a team and hopefully in doubles. Our goal in college is to add to the team as much as possible. I want to be all that I can be in a team setting. Career wise, I would like to try to play professionally. When I take that as far as I can go, I will still have a Notre Dame degree, and that is just as rewarding as professional tennis.

Christian- The biggest goal as a team is to win the NCAA championship. It is a tough goal but I think that with the depth and talent of our team it is possible. Winning the NCAA doubles title would be the icing on the cake but I want to be able to fill my role on the team as best I can. I want to be supportive of my team members and I want to be there for them on and off the court. Once we are done with college, I would like to play some professional tournaments. That has been our goal since we started playing. I want to try to succeed in everything that I do and to be the best person I can be.

When I interview siblings, I always try to treat them as individuals. I find this to be more necessary with twins. **Catrina and Christian Thompson** are different. While they are definitely two individual people with different personalities, they have no problem with being "the Thompson twins."



I have been a fan of the **Thompson twins** since I first saw them play at the US Open Junior Championships. They are excellent players, they display wonderful sportsmanship and, most of all, they are nice girls. Players like to be on the court with them and tournament directors (like **Andrea Norman**, who gave the girls the **Hardcourts Sportsmanship Award**) find them a pleasure to have around.

Catrina & Christian have taken home national doubles titles from the Super National Hardcourts (3rd place 2003 & 2001), the Super National Claycourts (2nd place 2002; 1st place 2001), the International Grasscourts (1st place 2002), the Super National Winter Championships (1st place 2001; 2nd place 2000) and the Easter Bowl (1st 1998; 2nd place 2001). Though the only national singles title between them is **Christian's** win at the 1999 Penn Fiesta Bowl, they have each placed in enough tournaments to keep themselves in the top 100 of the singles rankings year after year.

I sat down with **Catrina & Christian Thompson** at what was their fourth consecutive Girls' 18 National Hardcourts appearance. They were a little disappointed about not winning the doubles tournament and the wildcard into the US Open main draw, but they were excited about going off to college.

Catrina: We love the coach and it's a team we know. They have great statistics

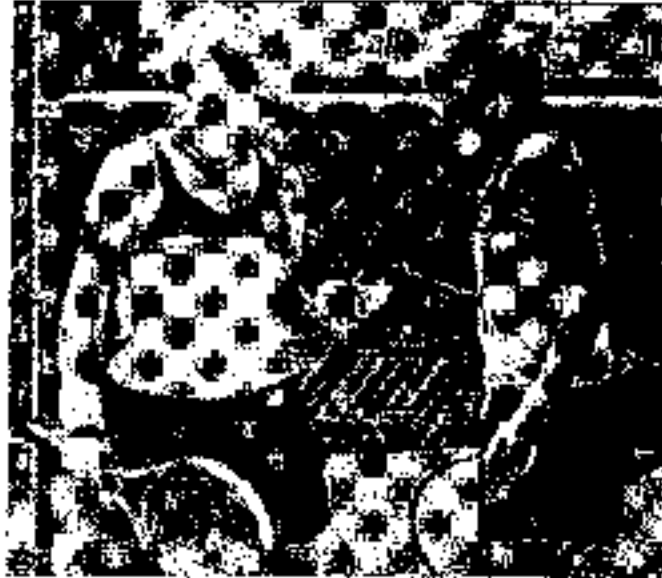

Q: What tournament did you have the most fun at?

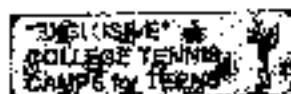
