LOBO POLE VAULTERS SET FOR NCAA OUTDOOR CHAMPIONSHIPS DEBUT ALL-AMERICA CANDIDATES MACKEL AND CALDWELL COMPETE WEDNESDAY AT 5:45 P.M. (MST).

UPCOMING

University of New Mexico senior Derek Mackel and junior Robert Caldwell will represent their homestate in the men's pole vault competition this week at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships in Sacramento, Calif. Both men competed at the 2006 NCAA Indoor Championships, where Caldwell earned All-America honors, but are making their first appearance at the outdoor national meet. Mackel (Albuquerque Sandia HS) enters the meet as the No. 4 seed, while Caldwell (Socorro, N.M.) has the 20th-best mark. The duo begins qualifying competition on Wednesday at 5:45 p.m. (MST).

Schedule: Qualifying begins in the men's pole vault at 5:45 p.m. (MST) on Wednesday, June 7. The top 13 individuals in the qualifying round will move on to the finals, which begin at 5:30 p.m. (MST) on Friday, June 9.

UNM Men At The NCAA Outdoor Championships: New Mexico has sent a pair of men to the outdoor national meet each of the past three seasons and have had at least one qualifier each year since 2003. The Lobos had just one men's athlete qualify twice in the eight years (1993-2000) prior to sixth-year head coach Matt Henry's arrival.

New Mexicans At The NCAA Outdoor Championships: Seven of the nine NCAA Outdoor Championship qualifiers under sixth-year head coach Matt Henry have been from the state of New Mexico. All five men and women that have qualified over the last two years hail from the Land of Enchantment.

Lobo Pole Vaulters At The NCAA Championships: Mackel and Caldwell are the first New Mexico pole vaulters to advance to the NCAA Outdoor Championships since 1991 and just the third and fourth Lobos ever to qualify for nationals in the event.

Joe Powdrell (Albuquerque, N.M.) and Simon Arkell (Adelaide, Australia) were the first two UNM vaulters to compete at the NCAA meet. Powdrell tied for 12th with a height of 15' at the 1967 NCAA Outdoor Championships, twenty years before Arkell made his debut on the national stage.

Arkell qualified four times between 1987-91, earning All-America honors as a sophomore, junior and senior. After finishing with no height in '87, Arkell placed sixth in '89 (17' 10 1/4"), third in '90 (18' 1/2") and tied for fifth in '91 (18' 1/2").

Two In The Same Event: It's been thirty years since two Lobos competed in the same event at the NCAA Outdoor Championship meet and the fifth time its happened in program history. In 1976, Michael Solomon and Charles Dramiga both earned All-America honors in the 400 at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

UNM Outdoor All-Americans: Twenty-five individuals and one relay team have combined to earn outdoor All-American honors 34 times since Buster Charles (decathlon) became the first

NEW MEXICO POLE VAULTING

Sixth-year assistant coach Scott Steffan has established one of the premier men's and women's pole vaulting programs in the nation at New Mexico. A former teammate of three-time All-American and school record holder Simon Arkell, Steffan rebuilt the vault crew from the ground up after returning to Albuquerque. Under his watch, three New Mexico pole vaulters have competed at the NCAA Championship meet and UNM has had at least three athletes qualify for the NCAA Regional meet outdoors each of the past four years. The Lobo vaulters have also earned all-MWC honors eight times since 2003. Since 2002, UNM has boasted seven 16-foot vaulters on the men's side, including three that have cleared 17 feet and one over the 18-foot mark. Five women have surpassed the 12 foot mark, including two over 13 feet. Four have also been nationally ranked in the event by Trackwire.com

Led by NCAA Championship qualifiers Derek Mackel and Robert Caldwell, the Lobo vaulters have enjoyed perhaps their best year in 2006. Caldwell earned All-America honors with his eighth place finish at the NCAA Indoor meet, while Mackel became the second Lobo ever to win an event at the NCAA Midwest Regional Championships. Mackel (18-01.00 outdoors), Caldwell (17-07.25 indoors) and women's outdoor record holder Whitney Johnson (13-01.50 indoors) have highlighted several career performances for New Mexico's vaulters in '06. Senior Zach Bingham (16-00.00 indoor), sophomore Zach Graham (16-02.75 indoor), junior Nicole Huyge (12-00.75 indoor) and junior Stefany Setliff (11-09.75 outdoor), a first-year vaulter, also recorded their career bests this year.

LOBO TRACK & FIELD ALUMNI CLUB

Championship track and field programs are not built overnight. They are constructed gradually, built upon a strong foundation of pride, tradition and a commitment to excellence. The University of New Mexico track and field program has built its legacy with the same championship formula.

Since 1930, New Mexico athletes have earned All-America honors 69 times, won 11 NCAA Championship events and claimed 197 conference events. Perhaps the most exceptional group of athletes ever to compete in any sport at UNM were on legendary coach Hugh Hackett's track and field teams of the 1960s.

A large group of Lobo legends from that era, including coach Hackett and former national champions Adolph Plummer and Art Baxter, reunited in Albuquerque on Jan. 20 for a memorable evening spent sharing memories and reaffirming a commitment to New Mexico track and field excellence. That night, reunion organizer Rene Matison, a two-time All-American at UNM, announced the founding of the Lobo Track and Field Alumni Club.

The Alumni Club seeks to unite all the men and women from the 1960s, '70s, '80s, '90s and even the 2000s who have been part of New Mexico's proud track and field history. Its goals include celebrating and preserving the program's proud tradition while helping current and future generations of Lobo track and field athletes establish a championship legacy of their own through facility and equipment upgrades and donations to the track and field scholarship fund.

NEW MEXICO: Midwest Regional Championships record holder and a three-time all-Mountain West Conference honoree who is making his second NCAA Championships appearance, but first outdoors...a remarkable

rags to riches story who has gone from marginal walk-on to one of the top pole vault threats in the country over the past three years...was probably the most improved athlete on the team in 2005 and has improved by more than five feet since joining the program in '02...has had to battle through chronic pain in his knees throughout his career, but entered the 2006 season 100 percent healthy and solidified his place as one of the best competitors in the country...two-time MWC Athlete of the Week award winner...earned his degree in University Studies in May of '06 and plans to return to UNM next year as a volunteer pole vault coach...second degree black belt in tae kwon do.

2006: (outdoor) Won the Midwest Regional title in Austin, Texas with a regional record-setting vault of 18-01.00 to advance to the NCAA Championships for the first time outdoors...entered the meet with the eighth-best mark in the event...he had gone 0-6 on his attempts at the regional championships over the past two years and needed his third and final attempts to clear 17-01.00 and 17-05.00 at the '06 meet...cleared his previous outdoor PR of 17-09.00 on his first attempt and the 18-01.00 bar on his second run to become the second Lobo ever to win an event at the Midwest Regional meet...was also the second UNM pole vaulter ever to surpass the 18-foot mark, missing the 15-year-old school record by one inch...cleared 17 feet in six of his eight competitions during the spring, including a runner-up finish at the MWC Championships - the highest of his career at the conference meet...earned three victories (USC, UNM and Midwest Regional Championships)...lone no-height came after a four-hour bus ride to UTEP...(indoor) Cleared 17 feet and finished among the top-3 in each of his five meet appearances...soared a career-best 17-11.00, the second best mark in UNM history, to tie defending NCAA outdoor champion Robison Pratt of BYU on Jan. 21 at the Modrall Sperling Lobo Invitational in Albuquerque...Pratt won the event with fewer misses, but Mackel was named MWC Men's Athlete of the Week for his performance...surpassed the NCAA provisional mark (17-00.50) three times during the winter...notched two victories and was third at the MWC Championship meet (17-03.50), just behind junior teammate Robert Caldwell, to earn indoor all-conference honors for the second straight season...missed all three attempts at his opening height of 17-00.50 in his NCAA Championships debut.

2005: (outdoor) Outdoor career-best mark of 17-08.50 en route to a third place finish in the section A competition at the Texas Relays...UNM record holder Simon Arkell is the only person in program history to go higher...defeated two nationally ranked vaulters in Austin and was ranked as high as No. 7 in the event by Trackwire.com...top mark was ranked 4th in the MWC and No. 8 in the region, both among the best pole vaulting divisions in the nation...had a feast-or-famine season and struggled with his consistency, largely due to the pain in his knees...cleared 17 feet and finished among the top-3 in 3 meets, including wins at UTEP and the home Don Kirby Invite, but failed to clear the opening height in the other 5 competitions, including the MWC Championships and NCAA Midwest Regionals...(indoor) Was one of the last men left out of the NCAA Championship field...owned the 18th-best mark in the country, clearing a then career-best 17-05.50 in an all-conference (3rd) performance

at the MWC Championships...became the first Lobo to earn all-MWC honors in the men's pole vault...surpassed the 17-foot mark twice during the winter...won the event at Texas Tech...also cleared 17 feet to win the exhibition opener in Albuquerque.

2004: (outdoor) Tied freshman Robert Caldwell for the Lobos' second-highest pole vault mark of the year...recorded a career-best and regional qualifying mark of 16-04.75 to finish third at the Mesa Classic...height was ranked seventh in the conference and 17th in the region...notched top-5 finishes in his first three meets, but struggled a bit down the stretch, failing to clear the minimum height at the MWC and Midwest Region Championship meets...(indoor) MWC finalist in the pole vault, placing eighth with a mark of 15-07.25...cleared 16 feet for the first time in his career at Texas Tech, placing fourth with a mark of 16-01.25.

2003: (outdoor) Redshirt season...(indoor) Competed at three meets in the pole vault and 60 meters...notched the team's third-best mark at the MWC Championships, clearing 15-09.00 (T10th).

2002: (outdoor) Appeared in two meets with a top mark of 15-01.00 at UTEP...tied for fifth at the Lobo Open...(indoor) Redshirt season.

HIGH SCHOOL: Two-year letterwinner in track and field at Albuquerque Sandia High School, under head coach Blaine Clarke...Sandia won the district title and was the state runner-up in 2000...also lettered one year in cross country...former baseball player who tried several different events in track and field before finding the pole vault late in his prep career.

NEW MEXICO: All-American and Mountain West Conference runner-up during the 2006 indoor season...is making his second trip to the NCAA Championships, but first outdoors...has made dramatic strides over the past two years, improving by two feet since his freshman year, and developing into one of the top pole vaulters in the country...had been bothered by painful muscle spasms leading up to the Midwest Regional meet, but enters the NCAA Outdoor Championships healthy and ready to compete.

2006: (outdoor) Earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Championship meet after placing sixth at the Midwest Regionals in Austin with an outdoor PR of 17-05.00...entered the meet as the No. 11 seed and fought through painful muscle spasms during the week to record the highest mark and finish in his three regional meet appearances...cleared 17 feet twice during the spring, including at the MWC Championships where he placed fourth (17-00.75)...notched a pair top-3 finishes, but got off to a bit of a slow start with two uncharacteristic no heights in his first three meets...**(indoor)** Became the second Lobo ever to earn All-America honors in the pole vault, finishing in a three-way tie for eighth in his NCAA Championship meet debut...cleared 17-06.50 on his second attempt before bowing out at 17-10.50...competed six times during the regular season, finishing among the top-2 in five meets...cleared the 17-foot mark five times as well...surpassed the NCAA provisional qualifying standard four times and really came up big in one of his last chances to earn an NCAA berth...cleared a career-best height of 17-07.25 in a runner-up finish at the Mountain West Conference Championships behind defending outdoor national champion Robison Pratt of BYU and one spot ahead of senior teammate Derek Mackel...performance earned him all-conference honors for the first time in his career.

2005: (outdoor) Punched his ticket to NCAA Midwest Regional meet with a career-best vault of 17-00.75 in the section B competition at the Texas Relays (3rd)...mark was the second-best on the team behind junior Derek Mackel...finished T15th at regionals with a mark of 16-07.25...surpassed 16 feet six times and had just one meet without a clearance...notched regional qualifying marks in 3 of his final 5 regular season competitions and placed fifth at the MWC Championships, the nation's premier pole vaulting conference, with a mark of 16-09.50...five top-5 finishes...**(indoor)** Got off to a slow start, recording no heights in his first two meets, but cleared 16 feet in his final two competitions, including an indoor PR of 16-01.75 at the MWC Championships (9th).

HENRY**

**Head Coach – Distance/Middle Distance/Cross Country
Sixth Year – University of New Mexico, 1975**

When Matt Henry was named head track and field coach at his alma mater in June of 2000, he was presented with a challenging task: lead what had been a stagnant program up the Mountain West Conference rankings and

back to the national stage it starred upon throughout much of the 1960s, '70s and '80s.

Thanks to the leadership and dedication of Henry and his staff, the University of New Mexico now boasts one of the most improved track and field programs in the country. Built upon a foundation of elite in-state talent with a blend of premier national and international competitors, the Lobos continue to reach new heights each year. Under Henry's tutelage UNM athletes have gone to the NCAA Championship meet four years in a row, earned three All-America awards, won 21 MWC event titles and claimed all-MWC honors 100 times since 2001. Henry's fellow coaches, meanwhile, have recognized his accomplishments, naming him MWC Coach of the Year for men's outdoor track in 2002 and again in 2005 for women's cross country.

An aggressive campaign by Henry and his staff have helped to make dramatic improvements to New Mexico's track and field facilities. With a state-of-the-art indoor facility located in the heart of downtown set to officially open in the winter of 2006 and renovations underway at Great Friends of UNM Track Stadium, Albuquerque is once again one of the top track and field destinations in America.

For Henry and his twin brother, associate head coach Mark Henry, the chance to return to their alma mater to lead the Lobo track and field program into the 21st century was a once in a lifetime opportunity.

"I'm really proud to be the track and cross country coach at UNM," said Matt Henry. "It's a dream that I thought would never come true. It's a privilege to be at the school where I got my education and competed. We may not have a big name yet, but there's something going right here at New Mexico. We have tremendous tradition here, we're very proud to be Lobos and we think this is a very special place to be."

An outstanding middle distance man himself in the early 1970s, Henry has returned New Mexico to its traditional place among the nation's top distance running schools. Just a few years after his return to UNM, Henry's homegrown track and cross country runners established themselves as one of the premier distance forces in the country.

Under Henry's tutelage, Santa Fe High School product Matt Gonzales has become one of America's top young distance prospects. Gonzales was one of most decorated runners in UNM history, earning All-America honors twice in cross country and three times on the track. He also led all collegiate runners by finishing sixth in the 5,000 at the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials and was 11th in the 10,000 at the 2003 USA Championships.

Since turning pro in the summer of '05, Gonzales has continued to train under Henry. Last November, he placed second at the U.S. 10K Championships road race and went on to help Team USA notch its highest finish ever (3rd) at the 2005 International Chiba Ekiden in Japan.

Henry's runners have earned a combined 22 all-MWC awards on the track in the distance and middle distance events, including 4 conference titles. The Lobos have set school indoor records in the 3,000 (women), 5,000 (men) and distance medley relay (men and women), and outdoor records in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (women) and 5,000 (men) during Henry's tenure. New Mexico has also earned all-MWC cross country honors 13 times, all-Mountain Region eight times and sent five individuals and one team to the NCAA Cross Country Championships.

In 2004, Henry put together the finest cross country team in school history. Led by two All-Americans in Gonzales (2nd) and freshman Shadrack Kiptoo-Biwott (14th), the men of New Mexico placed a program-best ninth at the NCAA Championship meet. True to the blue collar character of the program, it was a dramatic late surge by the team's fifth scoring running, fifth-year walk-on Sean Flaherty, that propelled the Lobos into the top-10.

Prior to taking over the cross country and track and field programs, Henry had been the head coach of the boy's and girl's track and cross country teams at La Cueva High School in Albuquerque since the school opened in 1986. While at La Cueva, he led the Bears to four straight boy's state track titles from 1997-2000, three state boy's cross country championships (1995-96, '98) and a pair in girl's cross country (1994-95). Henry's success earned him National High School Track Coach of the Year honors in 1999.

Matt and Mark Henry are part of a great lineage with extensive ties to the University of New Mexico. Their father, Gwinn "Bub" Henry, spent 30 years at UNM, most of that time as the Director of the Alumni Association. Bub and all five of his sons attended the University of New Mexico. Bub's father, Gwinn, was the Lobos' athletics director, head football coach and head track coach for three seasons from 1934-36. Gwinn Henry compiled a 16-12 record on the gridiron, including a Border Conference championship in 1934 with an 8-1 mark.

Track has long been a part of the Henry family. Gwinn Henry was declared the fastest man in the world in 1911. Matt's older brother, Pat, now in his second year at Texas A&M, was previously the head track coach at LSU, a program that captured 27 NCAA titles during his 17-year tenure.

Matt Henry was a four-year varsity letterman for the UNM from 1971-74, competing in the 440-yard dash and the 880-yard run. He was also part of the Lobos' "all-Albuquerque" two-mile relay team that earned All-America honors at the 1972 NCAA Indoor Championships. Henry's relay team captured back-to-back Western Athletic Conference titles in 1972 and '73, including a WAC record time of 7:34.70 in '72.

Henry, 53, received a bachelor's degree in Physical Education from UNM in 1975 and his master's degree in 1980. He and his wife, Lisa, have three boys: Kenny, 25, Kurt, 19, and Kyle, 17. Kenny is currently the head track and field coach at Albuquerque's Cibola High School, while Kurt is a sophomore middle distance runner for the Lobos.
