# Golfweek's All-Time Rankings (1999-2005)

The staff at *Golfweek* magazine put together their all-time men's golf rankings based on their performance over the last six years. The staff took its Golfweek/Sagarin Performance Index rankings over the last six years to come up with the poll. According to the poll, Georgia Tech has been the best team in the last six seasons when it comes to the Golfweek/Sagarin Performance Index, while New Mexico was ranked 13th in the prestigious poll.

New Mexico over this time has won 14 tournaments including three Mountain West Conference titles. UNM has also produced six All-Americans. The Lobos have advanced to the NCAA Championships five times over the last six years, including a fifth place finish last season. In the last six years New Mexico has a head-to-head record of 880-389-21, which is a winning percentage of .682.

# Louis Caldera

University President

Louis Caldera has served as the University of New Mexico's 18<sup>th</sup> president since August 2003.

During a period of rising demand for the university's education and healthcare services, he has outlined a vision for excellence at UNM that includes new initiatives in recruitment, undergraduate programs, sponsored research and high impact public service for New Mexico and the region.

Under President Caldera's leadership, UNM is meeting the challenges of growth through significant expansion of its education, research and healthcare capacities. \$150 million worth of capital projects on the main campus, including new facilities for the School of Architecture and Planning and the School of Engineering, have been funded and are scheduled to begin construction shortly. New buildings are also underway at

UNM's Health Sciences Center, including a six-story, 476,000 square foot hospital expansion, the Barbara and Bill Richardson Pavilion, which broke ground in October 2004 and is slated for completion by the end of 2007.

President Caldera brings to UNM a distinguished background in public service, beginning with his election to the California State Assembly in 1992. In 1997 he was appointed by President Bill Clinton to the post of Managing Director and Chief Operating Officer of the Corporation for National and Community Service. In 1998, President Clinton asked Caldera to serve as Secretary of the United States Army through the end of his administration in 2001, with statutory responsibility for manpower, personnel, weapons systems, equipment, communications, and the financial management of its \$70 billion budget.

Prior to assuming his duties at UNM, Caldera was Vice Chancellor for University Advancement and President of the Foundation of The California State University System, with headquarters in Long Beach and 23 campuses across the state.

His portfolio there included system-wide fundraising and development programs, legislative affairs, community relations, alumni affairs, public affairs and communications.

President Caldera is a member of the prestigious Council on Foreign Relations, and the governing boards of numerous educational organizations and corporations. His service on national commissions includes the National Task Force on Public Education, the National Commission on the Senior Year in High School, and the Panama Canal Commission. His recent honors include the Department of Defense Distinguished Civilian Award, the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Chairman's Award, and numerous citations as one of the nation's most influential Hispanic leaders by Hispanic Business and Latino Leaders magazines.

Caldera holds a Bachelor of Science degree from West Point, an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School and a Juris Doctor from Harvard Law School. He is married to Eva Orlebeke Caldera and has three daughters, Allegra, Sophia and Camille.

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# Rudy Davalos

## Director of Athletics

Rudy Davalos is in his 13th year as director of athletics at the University of New Mexico. Only Roy Johnson

(1920-49) and Pete McDavid (1956-74) have served the office longer. Davalos is the 11th person to hold the position after being named to the post on November 16, 1992.

Davalos currently serves on the NCAA Div. I Women's Basketball Committee and the Executive Committee of NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics). Davalos was recognized by *Sports Illustrated* in 2002 as one of the 101 Most Influential Minorities in Sports. Davalos' many accomplishments while at UNM:

### Academics

- The student-athletes representing the Lobos' 21 sports compiled a school-record 3.05 GPA during the 2004 fall semester and a 3.02 in the spring of 2005, the sixth straight semester the Lobos have surpassed a 3.0...16 student-athletes were named to academic All-America teams in 2004-05, and 93 have gained national academic recognition since 1993...the department's highest combined student-athlete GPA prior to 1992 was a 2.73 on two occasions

### Athletics Competition in 2004-05

- UNM finished 48<sup>th</sup> nationally in the Sports Academy Director's Cup, the second-best ranking in school history
- A school-record 15 teams represented UNM at NCAA postseason competition
- UNM was one of just 11 NCAA Div. I institutions to have its football team play in a bowl game and also have both its men's and women's basketball teams qualify for the NCAA Tournament

### Athletics Competition (1993-2004)

- The UNM ski team won the 2004 NCAA championship, the first Lobo program to claim a national title
- In the 10 years before Davalos came to UNM, only five sports combined to win or share 10 conference titles...since his arrival, eight teams have won or shared 35 regular-season or postseason conference championships...UNM has been represented at NCAA postseason competition 112 times, while 147 student-athletes have earned All-America recognition
- From 1983-92, football was 29-88 overall and 15-61 in conference play...since 1993, the overall mark is 70-73, 45-45 in league...the record stands at 28-22 the past four years, including 19-9 in MWC action with three straight bowl appearances for the first time in program history
- Men's basketball has made 10 trips to postseason since 1993, including seven NCAA Tournaments...from 1983-92, the Lobos advanced to the NAAs only once
- All of the women's basketball postseason showings have occurred in the past eight years with five NCAA Tournament appearances, including a Sweet 16 in 2003, and three NITs

### Attendance

- Lobo football averaged 37,282 fans in 2004, setting a season record for the third time in the past four years...in 2003, records for single-game (44,075 vs. New Mexico State) and total attendance (245,891) were set
- Average attendance for football since 1993 is 28,474 compared to just 17,502 from 1983-92...the average is 33,547 the past four years
- Lobo men's and women's basketball have both ranked in the top-15 in national average attendance each of the past seven years...the women were fourth in 2004-05 at 10,674 a game, the men 14<sup>th</sup> at 14,308

### Facilities

- With the tremendous aid of the governors, New Mexico state legislature, local businesses and private contributors, virtually every UNM athletics facility has received a facelift...thanks to current governor Bill Richardson, the most recent construction include a \$4.2 million men's and women's basketball practice facility, plus improvements at Lobo Field for softball and at the UNM track
- At the northeast corner of University Stadium, new restrooms, ticket booths, concessions and novelty stands, and a new entrance were completed before the 2004 season...overall capacity was increased to more than 37,000 prior to the 2001 season with the addition of seats in the north end zone...a new scoreboard and LoboVision videoboard were also installed
- The Tow Diehm Athletics Facility - which houses the weight room, sports medicine and the Lobo football team - rates as one of the premier training centers in intercollegiate athletics
- Additional improvements include lights for the football practice fields, renovations and exterior landscaping at The Pit, new locker rooms for men's and women's basketball and the Olympic sports programs, two tennis bubbles, new infield grass and lights for the soccer and track stadium and significant improvements to the softball field

### Financial

- Not once has UNM finished a fiscal year over budget since Davalos took over
- When Davalos started in 1992, the department's budget was \$9.4 million...the Lobos will operate the 2005-06 fiscal year with a budget of more than \$22 million

### Fund-Raising

- UNM's nationally-respected marketing and promotions program and fund-raising organization (Lobo Club) produces more than \$6 million annually...12 years ago it was less than one-third of that and corporate sponsorships did not exist
- Davalos has been the leader behind several projects that benefit UNM student-athletes like the implementation of skysuites at University Stadium and the Lobo Level seating at The Pit, which adds nearly \$500,000 a year to the scholarship fund

Hired to be the athletics director at Houston in January of 1987, Davalos was credited with the procurement of gift-in-kind donation to the Cougar athletics department in excess of \$32 million. He spearheaded projects at UH that led to a state-of-the-art athletics facility, a baseball stadium, tennis courts and renovation of departmental offices.

With Davalos at the controls of the UH athletics department, the Cougar program enjoyed enormous success. The Houston football program produced a Heisman Trophy winner (Andre Ware in 1989) during the Davalos tenure.

While at Houston, Davalos served on the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee from the Midwest Region. He was relieved of those duties when he took the New Mexico job, but returned to the committee on September 1, 1994, an appointment that ended in 1999. He has also served on the NCAA Championship Competition Cabinet and the NCAA Div. I Baseball Committee.

Davalos' administrative career on the collegiate level began in 1975 as the athletics director at the University of Texas-San Antonio. He spent nine years (1975-84) as the leader of the Roadrunner athletics department before being hired at Houston.

Davalos returned to San Antonio to serve as the director of community relations for the San Antonio Spurs of the National Basketball Association. Davalos also worked as a television and radio commentator for the Spurs. He spent one season with the NBA team until his return to Houston as the athletics director in 1987.

Before Davalos entered the ranks of athletics administration he was a long time basketball coach. His coaching career began in 1961 as an assistant coach at Georgetown (Ky.) College. He also had assistant coaching stints at Kentucky (1962) and Auburn (1963-70) before being named head men's basketball coach at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee, in 1970. He was the head coach at South for three seasons (1970-73).

Davalos led the Tigers to the College Athletic Conference championship and produced the best single-season record in the school's history with a 23-4 mark in 1972-73.

Davalos moved to the San Antonio Spurs of the NBA in 1973. He was an assistant coach and Director of Player Personnel for three years, until his move to the University of Texas-San Antonio.

Davalos' leadership in college athletics began as early as 1960, when he was the captain of the Southwest Texas State basketball team. An All-American point guard for the Bobcats, Davalos led SWTS to an NAIA national title. He was inducted into the NAIA Basketball Hall of Fame in 1977, the Southwest Texas State Hall of Fame in 1983, the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame in 1999 and the San Antonio Sports Hall of Fame in 2002. He was also named a Southwest Texas State Distinguished Alumnus in 2001.

A native of San Antonio, Texas, Davalos graduated from Southwest Texas State in 1960 with a degree in Education. He received his master's degree in Education from Georgetown (Ky.) College in 1962.

Always a leader in the community, Davalos was twice (1984, 1986) chairman of the San Antonio Summer Youth Games. He previously served on the board of directors of the San Antonio Boys Club of America and the San Antonio YMCA. Davalos currently serves on the Albuquerque Sports Council board of directors.

Davalos has been recognized repeatedly throughout his career for his efforts on behalf of young people. In 1976 he received the Catholic Youth Organization's "Man in Youth" award. He is also a former president of the San Antonio Quarterback Club.

Davalos, 66, is married to the former Gail Marlin. They have three children, Dave, Doug and Deana.



## Conrad Colbert

### Deputy Director of Athletics

Conrad Colbert came out of retirement on July 1, 2002, to reassume the duties of senior associate athletics director. He was named deputy director of athletics in 2003. Colbert was UNM's senior associate for six years before retiring on June 30, 1999, however, he remained on staff in the capacity of legislative liaison. Colbert has played a large part in helping UNM secure more than \$10 million from the state legislature for the expansion and renovation of athletics facilities. He oversees all daily operations of the department.

Overall, Colbert is in his 39th year of intercollegiate athletics. A 1960 graduate of the University of Iowa, Colbert worked in athletics administration at his alma mater for 10 years, serving as an administrative assistant and assistant business manager. He went into private business before becoming the assistant athletics director at Kansas State for nine years (1977-85). Colbert was director of athletics at UT-Pan American in 1986, then joined current UNM athletics director Rudy Davalos at the University of Houston in 1987. Colbert came to the University of New Mexico in February of 1993.

Colbert and his wife JoAnn have four grown children: sons, Craig, Chris and Cary, and a daughter, Catherine, and five grandchildren: Austin, Cash, Gabrielle, Brigitah and Chance.



## Janice Ruggiero

### Associate Athletics Director

Janice Ruggiero is in her sixth year as UNM's Senior Woman Administrator. She serves as the school's director of Administration and Compliance while overseeing athletics academic advisement. Ruggiero was a member of the NCAA Div. I Women's Basketball Committee from 2003-04.

Ruggiero was promoted to associate athletics director on July 1, 2000. She is the lead administrator for men's golf, skiing, men's and women's soccer, softball, women's swimming, men's and women's tennis and volleyball. Prior to her recent appointment, Ruggiero spent four years in charge of compliance.

Ruggiero was a member of the UNM women's basketball team as both a player and a coach. She played for the Lobos from 1984-87 until the program was discontinued, then transferred to the University of Hawaii for her senior season. Ruggiero was an assistant coach at UNM after the program's reinstatement from 1991-93.

Ruggiero graduated from UNM in 1989 with a bachelor's degree in Marketing and General Management. She completed her master's degree in Sports Administration during the summer of 1997. Ruggiero and her husband, Lenny, have two sons; Leonard Jordan (LJ) and Alex.



## George Trujeque

### Director of Golf

George Trujeque (pronounced true-HECK-ee) is in his fifth year as the Director of Golf Operations at the UNM Championship Course. Trujeque's main function is to oversee maintenance of the two UNM golf facilities (North Course and South Course).

Trujeque came to UNM after a five-year stint as the general manager and head professional at Tierra del Sol Golf Course in Belen. He got his start in golf course management in Hermosea, Mexico, in 1993, after earning his PGA credential earlier in the year. Trujeque attended the San Diego Golf Academy in 1990.

Prior to his career in golf, Trujeque was a coach and teacher in both the Belen and Los Lunas school systems. He coached baseball, football, golf and volleyball during an 18-year tenure.

Trujeque is a 1971 graduate of the University of New Mexico. He earned his bachelor's degree in Physical Education with a minor in Biology. He played for the Lobo football team from 1964-66 and lettered as a linebacker/guard in 1966.

Trujeque and his wife, Diane, have been married for 34 years. The couple's only child, Aaron, passed away in 1985 at the age of 12. The Trujeques run an annual golf tournament in his honor to raise money for the Children's Cancer Fund.



## THIS IS THE MOUNTAIN WEST

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West Conference has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MWC continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its seventh year, the MWC has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West) and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of the MWC's newest member, TCU.

## MWC WELCOMES TCU

The MWC navigated through the changing landscape of intercollegiate athletics when it announced in January 2004 that TCU would become the league's ninth member beginning with the 2005-06 athletic season. As realignment swept through several NCAA Division I conferences, the MWC remained focused in its mission and objectives, strengthening its membership for the road ahead. Founded in 1873, TCU will participate in all 19 Mountain West Conference sports. The Horned Frogs have captured 16 conference championships the last four years, and their athletic tradition reaches back to their first season of football in 1897.

## EXPOSURE

Through the league's first six years, excluding institutional local packages, 574 football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball events have aired on television, with 116 football games and over 100 men's basketball contests broadcast nationally. Cur-

rently in the final year of a seven-year deal with ESPN, the MWC has remained steadfast in its mission to promote the league's athletic events to national and regional television audiences.

With the advent of an in-house production entity in 2001, the MWC assured itself of a wide-range of television exposure for volleyball and women's basketball. In fact, the MWC is the only conference to have televised all contests from its volleyball and women's basketball championships each of the past five years. The Conference network includes a combination of over-the-air cable affiliates and local outlets throughout the Rocky Mountain region and western United States.

A new era begins in the fall of 2006 as College Sports Television (CSTV) becomes the official television partner for the Conference. The MWC forged a potential 14-year agreement with CSTV, giving the fastest-growing independent cable network exclusive rights to Mountain West Conference football and men's basketball,

plus coverage for all other MWC sports. With a "fans first" focus, CSTV has assured that MWC constituents will see more MWC sports at more convenient times and in more media platforms than ever before.

The agreement incorporates all Conference-related media and marketing rights, including all television, national over-the-air and satellite radio, video-on-demand, and online and broadband rights. The multi-media

partnership also includes Mountain West TV, the first-ever regional sports network dedicated solely to an intercollegiate athletic conference.

## EDUCATION INITIATIVES

Not only is the MWC committed to the highest academic standards for its member institutions, the league also launched an education initiative utilizing the platform of college athletics to provide a relevant teaching resource for Kindergarten-through-8th grade students. This web-based learning program is available to every public and private, elementary and middle school in the seven-state MWC region, impacting more than 6.5 million students. Designed by Learning Through Sports, Inc., "Kid's College" captivates and motivates children using their favorite sports with Mountain West teams and mascots reinforcing skills taught in the classroom.

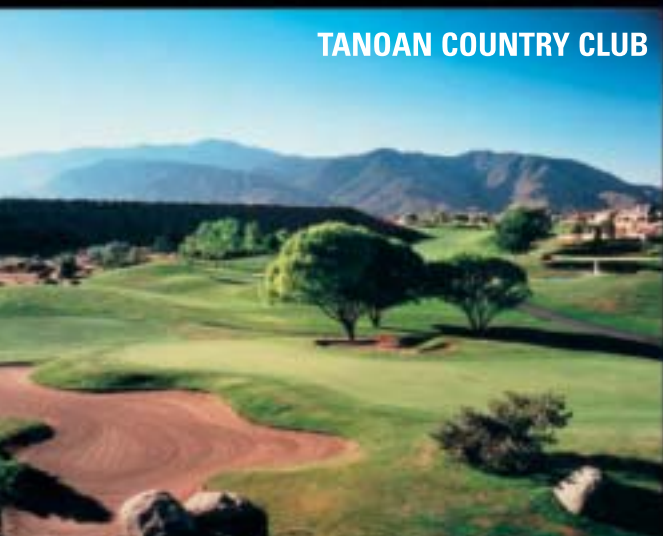
