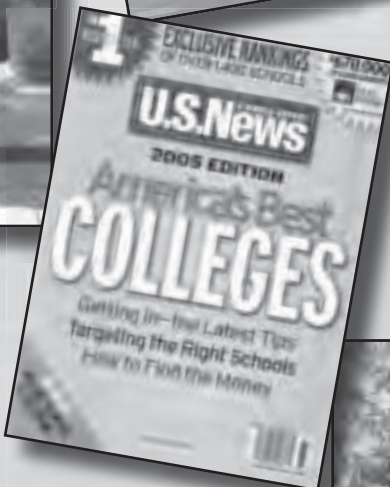
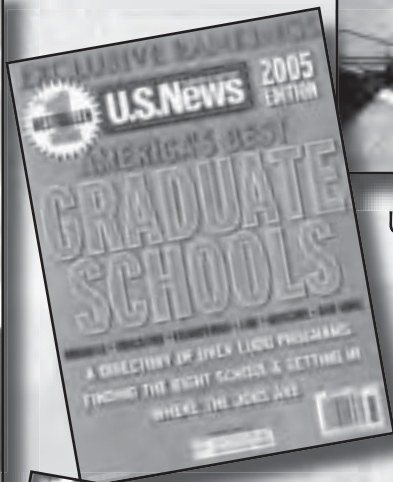


UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO



UNM's School of Law is ranked in the Top-100 Law Schools in the 2005 U.S. News and World Report Guide to America's Best Graduate Schools. U.S. News and World Report also lists the UNM School of Law as one of the most diverse programs in the nation.



UNM's Farris Engineering School has been ranked in the top-50 for engineering schools in the country by U.S. News and World Report. Farris offers degrees in chemical and nuclear engineering, civil engineering, computer science, electrical and computer engineering and mechanical engineering.

The School of Medicine's Rural Medicine program is ranked No. 2 in the nation while its Primary Care program is ranked 12th in the nation by the 2005 U.S. News and World Report Guide to America's Best Graduate Schools.



Popejoy Hall is New Mexico's grandest multi-use theater, serving as the home for the Ovation Series and the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra. UNM's Master's of Fine Arts program is ranked in the Top-50 in the nation by the 2005 U.S. News and World Report Guide to America's Best Graduate Schools.

In addition to its role as the state's premier educational institution, UNM is also a primary cultural and recreational resource. Dane Smith Hall is UNM's newest classroom building.



There is an officially chartered student organization for just about every interest, including student government, academic honoraries, religious, athletic and cultural groups.



The Robert O. Anderson Schools of management offer a variety of business degrees at both the bachelor's and master's level.



The Duck Pond is a campus gathering spot as well as a frequent location for weddings and photos.



UNM's Zimmerman Library is frequently cited as the best example of the Spanish-Pueblo revival that characterizes the campus. It is the largest and most comprehensive library in the state.



UNM's Student Union Building reopened its doors in 2003 after a \$25 million reconstruction. The new SUB features nine different food venues, offices for student organizations, study areas with wireless networking, a state-of-the-art computer lab, pool hall, movie theater and spacious lounges for socializing between class.



Louis Caldera

University President

Louis Caldera has served as the University of New Mexico's 18th president since August 2003. During a period of rising demand for the university's education and healthcare services, he has outlined a vision for excellence at UNM that includes new initiatives in recruitment, undergraduate programs, sponsored research and high impact public service for New Mexico and the region.

Under President Caldera's leadership, UNM is meeting the challenges of growth through significant expansion of its education, research and healthcare capacities. \$150 million worth of capital projects on the main campus, including new facilities for the School of Architecture and Planning and the School of Engineering, have been funded and

are scheduled to begin construction shortly. New buildings are also underway at UNM's Health Sciences Center, including a six-story, 476,000 square foot hospital expansion, the Barbara and Bill Richardson Pavilion, which broke ground in October 2004 and is slated for completion by the end of 2007.

President Caldera brings to UNM a distinguished background in public service, beginning with his election to the California State Assembly in 1992. In 1997 he was appointed by President Bill Clinton to the post of Managing Director and Chief Operating Officer of the Corporation for National and Community Service. In 1998, President Clinton asked Caldera to serve as Secretary of the United States Army through the end of his administration in 2001, with statutory responsibility for manpower, personnel, weapons systems, equipment, communications, and the financial management of its \$70 billion budget.

Prior to assuming his duties at UNM, Caldera was Vice Chancellor for University Advancement and President of the Foundation of The California State University System, with headquarters in Long Beach and

23 campuses across the state. His portfolio there included system-wide fundraising and development programs, legislative affairs, community relations, alumni affairs, public affairs and communications.

President Caldera is a member of the prestigious Council on Foreign Relations, and the governing boards of numerous educational organizations and corporations. His service on national commissions includes the National Task Force on Public Education, the National Commission on the Senior Year in High School, and the Panama Canal Commission. His recent honors include the Department of Defense Distinguished Civilian Award, the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce Chairman's Award, and numerous citations as one of the nation's most influential Hispanic leaders by Hispanic Business and Latino Leaders magazines.

Caldera holds a Bachelor of Science degree from West Point, an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School and a Juris Doctor from Harvard Law School. He is married to Eva Orlebeke Caldera and has three daughters, Allegra, Sophia and Camille.

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Rudy Davalos

Director of Athletics

Rudy Davalos is in his 13th year as director of athletics at the University of New Mexico. Only Roy Johnson (1920-49) and Pete McDavid (1956-74) have served the office longer. Davalos is the 11th person to hold the position after being named to the post on November 16, 1992.

Davalos currently serves on the NCAA Div. I Women's Basketball Committee and the Executive Committee of NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics). Davalos was recognized by *Sports Illustrated* in 2002 as one of the 101 Most Influential Minorities in Sports. Davalos' many accomplishments while at UNM:

Academics

- The student-athletes representing the Lobos' 21 sports compiled a school-record 3.05 GPA during the 2004 fall semester and a 3.02 in the spring of 2005, the sixth straight semester the Lobos have surpassed a 3.0...16 student-athletes were named to academic All-America teams in 2004-05, and 93 have gained national academic recognition since 1993...the department's highest combined student-athlete GPA prior to 1992 was a 2.73 on two occasions

Athletics Competition in 2004-05

- UNM finished 48th nationally in the Sports Academy Director's Cup, the second-best ranking in school history
- A school-record 15 teams represented UNM at NCAA postseason competition
- UNM was one of just 11 NCAA Div. I institutions to have its football team play in a bowl game and also have both its men's and women's basketball teams qualify for the NCAA Tournament

Athletics Competition (1993-2004)

- The UNM ski team won the 2004 NCAA championship, the first Lobo program to claim a national title
- In the 10 years before Davalos came to UNM, only five sports combined to win or share 10 conference titles...since his arrival, eight teams have won or shared 35 regular-season or postseason conference championships...UNM has been represented at NCAA postseason competition 112 times, while 147 student-athletes have earned All-America recognition
- From 1983-92, football was 29-88 overall and 15-61 in conference play...since 1993, the overall mark is 70-73, 45-45 in league...the record stands at 28-22 the past four years, including 19-9 in MWC action with three straight bowl appearances for the first time in program history
- Men's basketball has made 10 trips to postseason since 1993, including seven NCAA Tournaments...from 1983-92, the Lobos advanced to the NAAs only once
- All of the women's basketball postseason showings have occurred in the past eight years with five NCAA Tournament appearances, including a Sweet 16 in 2003, and three NITs

Attendance

- Lobo football averaged 37,282 fans in 2004, setting a season record for the third time in the past four years...in 2003, records for single-game (44,075 vs. New Mexico State) and total attendance (245,891) were set
- Average attendance for football since 1993 is 28,474 compared to just 17,502 from 1983-92...the average is 33,547 the past four years
- Lobo men's and women's basketball have both ranked in the top-15 in national average attendance each of the past seven years...the women were fourth in 2004-05 at 10,674 a game, the men 14th at 14,308

Facilities

- With the tremendous aid of the governors, New Mexico state legislature, local businesses and private contributors, virtually every UNM athletics facility has received a facelift...thanks to current governor Bill Richardson, the most recent construction include a \$4.2 million men's and women's basketball practice facility, plus improvements at Lobo Field for softball and at the UNM track
- At the northeast corner of University Stadium, new restrooms, ticket booths, concessions and novelty stands, and a new entrance were completed before the 2004 season...overall capacity was increased to more than 37,000 prior to the 2001 season with the addition of seats in the north end zone...a new scoreboard and LoboVision videoboard were also installed
- The Tow Diehm Athletics Facility - which houses the weight room, sports medicine and the Lobo football team - rates as one of the premier training centers in intercollegiate athletics
- Additional improvements include lights for the football practice fields, renovations and exterior landscaping at The Pit, new locker rooms for men's and women's basketball and the Olympic sports programs, two tennis bubbles, new infield grass and lights for the soccer and track stadium and significant improvements to the softball field

Financial

- Not once has UNM finished a fiscal year over budget since Davalos took over
- When Davalos started in 1992, the department's budget was \$9.4 million...the Lobos will operate the 2005-06 fiscal year with a budget of more than \$22 million

Fund-Raising

- UNM's nationally-respected marketing and promotions program and fund-raising organization (Lobo Club) produces more than \$6 million annually...12 years ago it was less than one-third of that and corporate sponsorships did not exist
- Davalos has been the leader behind several projects that benefit UNM student-athletes like the implementation of skysuites at University Stadium and the Lobo Level seating at The Pit, which adds nearly \$500,000 a year to the scholarship fund

Hired to be the athletics director at Houston in January of 1987, Davalos was credited with the procurement of gift-in-kind donation to the Cougar athletics department in excess of \$32 million. He spearheaded projects at UH that led to a state-of-the-art athletics facility, a baseball stadium, tennis courts and renovation of departmental offices.

With Davalos at the controls of the UH athletics department, the Cougar program enjoyed enormous success. The Houston football program pro-

duced a Heisman Trophy winner (Andre Ware in 1989) during the Davalos tenure.

While at Houston, Davalos served on the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee from the Midwest Region. He was relieved of those duties when he took the New Mexico job, but returned to the committee on September 1, 1994, an appointment that ended in 1999. He has also served on the NCAA Championship Competition Cabinet and the NCAA Div. I Baseball Committee.

Davalos' administrative career on the collegiate level began in 1975 as the athletics director at the University of Texas-San Antonio. He spent nine years (1975-84) as the leader of the Roadrunner athletics department before being hired at Houston.

Davalos returned to San Antonio to serve as the director of community relations for the San Antonio Spurs of the National Basketball Association. Davalos also worked as a television and radio commentator for the Spurs. He spent one season with the NBA team until his return to Houston as the athletics director in 1987.

Before Davalos entered the ranks of athletics administration he was a long time basketball coach. His coaching career began in 1961 as an assistant coach at Georgetown (Ky.) College. He also had assistant coaching stints at Kentucky (1962) and Auburn (1963-70) before being named head men's basketball coach at the University of the South in Seawane, Tennessee, in 1970. He was the head coach at South for three seasons (1970-73).

Davalos led the Tigers to the College Athletic Conference championship and produced the best single-season record in the school's history with a 23-4 mark in 1972-73.

Davalos moved to the San Antonio Spurs of the NBA in 1973. He was an assistant coach and Director of Player Personnel for three years, until his move to the University of Texas-San Antonio.

Davalos' leadership in college athletics began as early as 1960, when he was the captain of the Southwest Texas State basketball team. An All-American point guard for the Bobcats, Davalos led SWTS to an NAIA national title. He was inducted into the NAIA Basketball Hall of Fame in 1977, the Southwest Texas State Hall of Fame in 1983, the Texas High School Basketball Hall of Fame in 1999 and the San Antonio Sports Hall of Fame in 2002. He was also named a Southwest Texas State Distinguished Alumnus in 2001.

A native of San Antonio, Texas, Davalos graduated from Southwest Texas State in 1960 with a degree in Education. He received his master's degree in Education from Georgetown (Ky.) College in 1962.

Always a leader in the community, Davalos was twice (1984, 1986) chairman of the San Antonio Summer Youth Games. He previously served on the board of directors of the San Antonio Boys Club of America and the San Antonio YMCA. Davalos currently serves on the Albuquerque Sports Council board of directors.

Davalos has been recognized repeatedly throughout his career for his efforts on behalf of young people. In 1976 he received the Catholic Youth Organization's "Man in Youth" award. He is also a former president of the San Antonio Quarterback Club.

Davalos, 66, is married to the former Gail Marlin. They have three children, Dave, Doug and Deana.

Reasons for Joining the Lobo Club...

As a member of the Lobo Club, you will play a direct role in the continuing success of UNM Athletics. At the same time, you will assist outstanding student-athletes in obtaining a college education at one of America's leading universities.

Members take personal pride in the high level of athletic success achieved at the University. In 2004-05, the Lobos were one of 11 schools to have its football team play in a bowl game and also have both its men's and women's basketball teams qualify for the NCAA Tournament.

The success of Lobo student-athletes is not limited to the playing field. The progressive achievements reached in the classroom, including six consecutive semesters above a 3.0 GPA and 11 straight at 2.90 or better, are achievements where Lobo Club members can see their support hard at work.

In addition to personal gratification and valuable networking opportunities, members receive valuable benefits at the various giving levels. Among those rewards are parking priority, season and special event ticket priority and of course an educational tax deduction since the Lobo Club is a tax-exempt organization covered under Section 501 (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Service Code.



The University of New Mexico women's basketball program places a tremendous amount of emphasis on the "student" aspect of "student-athlete." The Lobos have an intricate support system through academic services which guarantees a player will have the opportunity to make the most of her education. In head coach Don Flanagan's 10 years at UNM, all players who have completed their eligibility under him have received their degree. Additionally, 26 players have been named to the all-conference academic team, and the team grade point average has been above 2.97 in each of the last 15 semesters (Fall '98 - Spring '05).

Academic services monitors all classes for Lobo basketball players to ensure that the student-athlete is keeping up with her work. Any player with less than a 2.7 cumulative grade point average is required to attend a total of 10 hours of study hall per week. All freshmen as well, regardless of GPA, are required to attend 10 hours of study hall per week, assuring that they remain eligible and work toward the completion of their degree. Tutors are provided for any student-athlete who requests one or by decision of the coaching staff, and all players meet once a week with

assistant coaches on their academic progress and development. Additionally, mandatory two-hour study sessions for all players are conducted on all road trips, and players have access to laptop computers when they travel as well.

The academic services staff is also responsible for ensuring that all players meet NCAA initial eligibility requirements and have been certified by the NCAA Clearinghouse. They also assist with scheduling classes so that minimal work is missed during the season, and they are constantly available in an advisement capacity.



David Fox

Women's Basketball Academic Advisor

David Fox is in his ninth year at the University of New Mexico as the women's basketball academic advisor. Fox served two years as a graduate assistant under former head football coach Dennis Franchione from 1995-96. Under Fox's watch the Lobo women's basketball team combined to post a 3.52 grade-point-average during the 2002 fall semester. That's the highest semester GPA by the UNM women's basketball team since the school began charting grades in 1988. Since Fox and Don Flanagan have been at UNM the women's basketball team continues to push its GPA higher and higher.

Fox is a 1986 graduate of Garden City (Kan.) High School. He played defensive back two years at Garden City Community College (1986-87).

Fox went to Drake University for two years (1988-89) where he was a two-year starter at defensive back. Fox graduated from Drake in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in biology.

Fox's coaching career began at his alma mater. He spent two years (1990-91) at Drake as a graduate assistant then three seasons (1992-94) as the Bulldogs' wide receivers coach. Fox earned his master's degree in Higher Education from Drake in 1994.

Fox's younger brother, Mark, is the head men's basketball coach at the University of Nevada. His older brother, Lt. Colonel Scott Fox, is the Chief of Safety for the 341st Space wing at the United States Air Force Space Command at Malstrom Air Force Base in Great Falls, Mont. The 37-year old Fox is single.



With over 170 accredited disciplines to choose from, the University of New Mexico offers something for everyone in a unique learning environment. UNM's programs in Latin American studies, laser optics, environmental studies, photography and lithography have all earned international acclaim. Graduate programs in arts and sciences, business, education, engineering and fine arts are also available.

UNM offers several degree programs, most requiring four years for completion, that are offered nowhere else in New Mexico. These include computer engineering, dental hygiene, physical therapy, nursing, pharmacy, architecture and dance.

The University College is the first academic home for all freshmen and many transfer students. Freshmen must complete 26 hours of credit within UC before transferring to the college of their major area of study. This allows students an opportunity to adjust to college life and take a variety of courses before having to decide what degree to pursue.

After completing approximately one year of college, students may begin fine tuning their academic interests in one of the following programs: the School of Architecture and Planning, College of Arts and Sciences, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Fine Arts, Schools of Management, College of Nursing, College of Pharmacy, Division of Dental Programs or School of Medicine. If no single college or program offers what a student needs, he or she may elect to remain in University College and design an individualized Bachelor of University Studies degree.

NCAA LIFE SKILLS

All University of New Mexico student-athletes participate in NCAA Life Skills, a comprehensive program that aids in the transition of college life academically, athletically and socially.

Specific topics include study skills, goal-setting, time management, values, fiscal responsibility, stress management, nutrition, substance abuse and community outreach.

Upperclassmen are given guidance regarding internships, career development and how to prepare for an interview.

It's also a way for student-athletes to give back to the community. A small sampling of Lobo women's basketball players' activities include speaking to elementary and middle school kids about staying in school and assisting with the department's successful Read with the Lobos program.

LOBO ACADEMICS UNDER DON FLANAGAN

Since the arrival of head coach Don Flanagan, not only has the women's basketball team's performance improved on the court, it has also improved in the classroom. The overall GPA steadily increased in the first couple of years and is now maintained year after year.

The women's basketball team combined to post a 3.52 grade-point-average during the 2002 fall semester, the highest in school history. In fact, all the top GPA performances for the Lobos have occurred since Don Flanagan took over at UNM in the spring of 1995. UNM has been charting grades since the fall of 1988.

Since Flanagan's arrival at UNM, New Mexico has had 26 players claim academic all-conference honors, and several of those players have earned the honor more than once. Last season the team produced 10 honorees, the most since UNM began charting grades.

The 2004-05 athletics season was one of the best ever at the University of New Mexico as a school-record 14 sports were represented by either individual or team at NCAA championship events. UNM placed 48th in the Sports Academy Director's Cup, the school's second-best finish since the competition began in 1994.

It was another historic year in the classroom as UNM student-athletes compiled a 3.05 GPA during the 2004 fall semester and 2005 spring semester, the sixth straight term the Lobos have surpassed a 3.0.

2004-05 SPORT-BY-SPORT HIGHLIGHTS

Baseball (Rich Alday, head coach) • 26-32, 15-15 MWC (4th)

- Sophomore Chris Carlson became the third Lobo to earn All-America and Academic All-America in the same season...Carlson hit .395 with 15 homers and 79 RBI, led the MWC in runs, walks and slugging percentage
- 2B Jordan Pacheco was the first freshman in school history to garner All-America accolades...a third-team selection, Pacheco led the team with a .408 average and hit 15 homers with 52 RBI
- Danny Ray Herrera led the MWC with eight wins, earning All-MWC honors along with Carlson, Herrera, Pacheco and Garrick Haymore

Men's Basketball (Ritchie McKay, head coach) • 26-7, 10-4 MWC (2nd)

- UNM posted the second most wins in school history on its way to a MWC Tournament title and an appearance in the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1999...Danny Granger and Alfred Neale were named to the MWC all-tournament team with Granger earning tournament MVP honors
- Granger was named first team all-MWC, honorable mention All-American by the Associated press and third-team All-American by Basketball Times
- David Chiotti and Troy DeVries earned third-team All-MWC honors while Mark Walters and Alfred Neale were honorable mention All-MWC

Women's Basketball (Don Flanagan, head coach) • 26-5, 12-2 MWC (1st)

- The Lobos won both the MWC regular season and tournament championships for the second consecutive season...UNM advanced to the NCAA tournament for the fourth straight season, its eighth straight postseason appearance
- Head coach Don Flanagan was named MWC Coach of the Year...senior Lindsey Arndt was named first team All-MWC...senior Mandi Moore became the first player in UNM history with 1,000 points, 500 rebounds and 500 assists in her career and was named second team All-MWC...freshman Dionne Marsh was named MWC Newcomer of the Year, third team All-MWC and MVP of the MWC Tournament
- UNM finished fourth nationally in attendance for the third straight season with an average of 10,674

Cross Country (Matt Henry, head coach) • 9th in the NCAA (Men)

- The men's team finished a program-best ninth at the NCAA Championships...senior Matt Gonzales (2nd) and freshman Shadrack Kiptoo-Biwott (14th) earned All-America honors...Gonzales crossed the line 3.2 seconds behind the winner en route to the best NCAA finish ever by a Lobo
- Kiptoo-Biwott and Gonzales finished 1-2 at the MWC Championships to lead UNM to a third place finish...both men earned All-MWC honors, while Kiptoo-Biwott took home both Runner of the Year and Freshman of the Year, becoming the first Lobo in 38 years to win a conference crown
- Senior Jacquelyne Gallegos earned her second trip to the NCAA Championships and finished a career-best 69th. Gallegos earned first team all-conference with a fourth place finish, the best by a Lobo woman since 1992

Football (Rocky Long, head coach) • 7-5, 5-2 MWC (2nd)

- UNM won its last five regular-season games and played in a third straight bowl game for the first time in school history, losing to Navy 34-19 in the

Emerald Bowl in San Francisco

- Lobos set a season attendance record for the third time in the past four seasons, averaging 37,282 fans for five games...UNM also set a new standard with 15,729 season tickets sold
- UNM - along with Oklahoma and Texas - finished in the top-30 in the nation in total defense for the fifth straight season
- CB Brandon Payne named 2nd Team All-American, while Payne, C Ryan Cook, TB DonTrell Moore, NT Marcus Parker, LB Nick Speegle and OT Claude Terrell earned 1st Team all-MWC...DE Michael Tuohy chosen Freshman All-American
- Terrell (St. Louis) and Speegle (Cleveland) taken in the NFL Draft

Men's Golf (Glen Millican, head coach) • 5th in the NCAA, 1st in the MWC

- New Mexico advanced to the NCAA Championships for the 14th time in the past 16 years...UNM finished 5th, the best finish by a Lobo team since 1979
- The Lobos won their third straight MWC title...UNM won five team titles and finished in the top-5 in 10 tournaments...the Lobos earned their first ever No. 1 ranking early in 2004 after winning the Topy Cup
- Spencer Levin was named a PING first team All-American and Glen Millican the MWC Coach of the Year and Eaton Golf Pride Southwest Regional Coach of the Year
- Levin won three tournaments and finished in the top-10 10 times to finish 2005 ranked No. 2 in the country...he also represented the United States at both the World Amateur and Walker Cup...he turned pro after the NCAAAs

Women's Golf (Jackie Booth, head coach) • 2nd in the MWC

- New Mexico earned its 13th consecutive postseason bid with a berth in the NCAA Central Regional as the No. 3 seed after being ranked in the top 20 all season
- UNM won two tournaments: the Landfall Tradition in Wilmington, N.C., in October, and the Lady Gamecock Classic in Blythewood, S.C., in March...the Lobos have won 12 tournaments the past four years
- Senior Kailin Downs became the first four-time all-conference honoree in MWC women's golf history...she closed her career as the all-time scoring average leader in UNM history with a 74.38 average
- The Lobos placed three golfers on the All-MWC team (Downs, Christine Fernandez and Ashley Rollins) for the fifth straight year

Skiiing (George Brooks, head coach) • 4th in the NCAA

- The Lobos placed fourth at the NCAA Championships in Stowe, Vermont...it was the school's seventh straight top-5 finish at the NCAA's
- Dirk Grimm, Lars Loeseth, Trine Lundamo, Martina Stursova and Gladys Weidt all earned All-American honors with top-10 finishes
- Lundamo, Stursova and Pirkko Pulkkanen won the women's 15K Freestyle event at the NCAAAs, the third consecutive win in the Freestyle by the Lobo women's Nordic team
- 10 Lobos were honored with Academic All-NCAA awards.

Men's Soccer (Jeremy Fishbein, head coach) • 17-1-2, 10-1-1 MPSF (1st)

- The Lobos advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament for the first time in school history...UNM just missed the Final Eight, falling at Virginia on penalty kicks, 6-5...the Lobos were ranked No. 1 in the final Soccer America top-25 for the first time in school history...UNM also claimed its third MPSF title in four years
- Junior Jeff Rowland became the fifth All-American in school history, posting a school-record 45 points on 19 goals and seven assists
- Eight Lobos were named All-MPSF, including Rowland, Andrew Boyens, Lance Watson and Andrew Weber on the first team...Brandon Moss was a second team selection while Jeff Krause, Ben Ashwill and Hans Bevers were honorable mention honorees
- Rowland and Boyens were MPSF co-Players of the Year with Boyens also earning Newcomer of the Year honors

Women's Soccer (Kit Vela, head coach) • 5-12, 1-5 MWC (6th)

- Junior goalkeeper Kristen Winters broke the record for most career wins at UNM with 20
- Sophomore midfielder Brittany Emerson and freshman midfielder Anna Neu made the All-MWC second team
- The Lobos placed 14 players on the Academic All-MWC team and finished the fall semester with their highest cumulative team G.P.A. ever at 3.50

Softball (Kim Newbern, head coach) • 16-34, 5-15 MWC (5th)

- UNM came up just shy of knocking off the eventual MWC champions, BYU, in the MWC Tournament...the Lobos fell to the Cougars 2-1 in 10 innings in the second round
- Senior Ashley Perkins was named to the MWC championship all-tournament team
- Freshman Lindsey Elcess was recognized by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association, placing on the NFCA All-West Region second team as a designated player...sophomore Ryanne Hodgins made the ESPN the Magazine/CoSIDA Academic all-district VI first team...junior Kristina Schmallen made the all-MWC team

Swimming-Diving (Bill Spahn, head coach)

- Senior Becca Barras became the University of New Mexico's first women's diving All-American, placing 15th at the NCAA Championships
- The Lobos collected 15 honors at the MWC Championships...Barras was awarded the Co-Diver of the Year and Senior Recognition award while senior Nicole Overeem earned the first annual Sportsmanship Award...Barras, juniors Kelsey Leckovic and Robyn Miller, sophomore Jenna Syverson and freshman Tori Clarridge were named to the All-MWC first team while Clarridge, Leckovic, Miller, senior Aimee Dunavant, junior Whitney Thomson, sophomore Jen Hale and freshmen Carrie Quinn and Andrea Zarins made the all-MWC second team
- Head coach Bill Spahn announced his retirement following 24 seasons at New Mexico...assistant coach Tracy Ljone was named the new head swim coach on May 5

Men's Tennis (Alan Dils, head coach) • 9-8, 3-2 MWC (3rd)

- Seniors David Kowalski and Ryan Stotland were the first doubles team to represent the Lobos in a national tournament finale, appearing in the championship match of the ITA All-American Championships in October...as a result, the duo was ranked No. 3 in the nation to start the spring season, the highest ranking any UNM tandem has ever received...Kowalski also tied the UNM record for most career doubles wins, recording his 98th in the opening match of the MWC Championships
- Max Jones became the first Lobo honored as the MWC's Freshman of the Year after going 23-10 overall and 12-4 in dual match singles...Jones also was honored on the all-MWC singles team, the only freshman to make the cut...Stotland and Kowalski both made the all-MWC singles and doubles teams
- Assistant coach Loren Dils was named the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Assistant Coach of the Year for the third time

Women's Tennis (Kathy Kolankiewicz, head coach) • 15-9, 6-1 MWC (2nd)

- UNM was ranked No. 50 in the final national poll
- The doubles team of junior Maja Kovacek and sophomore Iva Gersic reached the highest national ranking ever at UNM earlier with a No. 4 mark...Kovacek also reached the highest singles ranking a Lobo has had at No. 24
- Kovacek and Gersic earned an automatic bid to the NCAA doubles championship...Kovacek also qualified in singles, making her the first Lobo to be an NCAA participant in singles and doubles two years straight
- Kovacek and Gersic were named MWC Co-Players of the Year...both earned first team all-MWC in singles and doubles...senior Michelle Heidbrink was first team all-MWC and was all-league with fellow senior Tiffany Robertson in doubles

- Assistant coach Roy Canada was named ITA Central Region Assistant Coach of the Year...Kovacek was named ITA Central Region Player to Watch

Indoor Track (Matt Henry, head coach)

- Senior Matt Gonzales downed six higher-ranked runners in a fourth place finish in the men's 5,000 at the NCAA Championships...Gonzales improved his own school record with a time of 13:45.72 and finished less than three seconds behind the winner to become the Lobos' first indoor All-American in 15 years
- The UNM men enjoyed their best scoring output in 15 years en route to a fifth place finish at the MWC Championships (67 points)...the Lobo women finished seventh...the two squads combined to earn all-conference honors in eight events, including conference titles by Gonzales in the 3,000 and senior Ben Ortega in the 5,000

Outdoor Track (Matt Henry, head coach)

- The Lobo men finished 4th (107.5 pts.) at the MWC Championships, the team's second-highest output since 1990...the women placed 6th (64.5 pts.), their best finish since 2001...UNM received 11 all-conference honors, including first-place finishes by Dan Feltman (decathlon) and Matt Keeran (javelin)
- Twelve Lobos qualified for the NCAA Midwest Regional while three native New Mexicans - Feltman, Keeran and Amanda Barnes (shot put) - qualified for the NCAA Championships
- Jamie Fishencord was a second team Academic All-District VI selection

Volleyball (Kelley Sliva-McKee, head coach) • 9-17, 3-11 MWC (8th)

- The Lobos claimed the Albuquerque Marriott Lobo Volleyball Classic...Nicole Ryan was named Most Valuable Player
- Adah Burke was named a second-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American as presented by CoSIDA, and earned first-team CoSIDA All-District VI honors for the second straight year
- Freshman Samie Weber led the team in blocks with 110 (1.22 per game)...her 105 block assists ranked fourth best in a UNM season...senior Monica Meihack finished her career sixth all-time in the UNM record book with 2,840 career assists

LOBO FACTS

New Mexico has won 20 or more games in five consecutive seasons and seven out of the last eight. Prior to Don Flanagan's arrival the Lobos never had a 20-win season. Since years 1997-98, New Mexico is 185-70, an average of 23.1 wins a season.

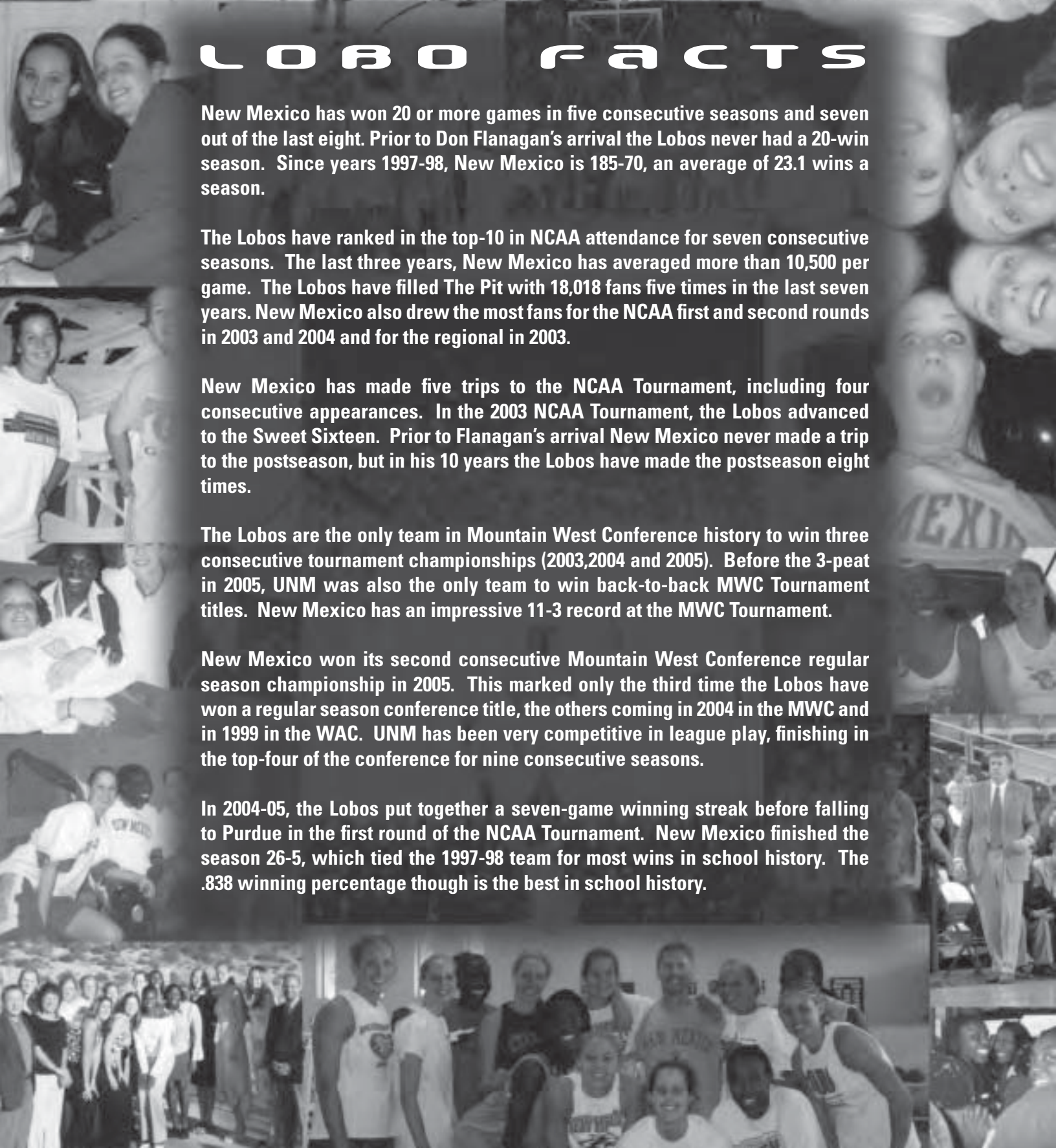
The Lobos have ranked in the top-10 in NCAA attendance for seven consecutive seasons. The last three years, New Mexico has averaged more than 10,500 per game. The Lobos have filled The Pit with 18,018 fans five times in the last seven years. New Mexico also drew the most fans for the NCAA first and second rounds in 2003 and 2004 and for the regional in 2003.

New Mexico has made five trips to the NCAA Tournament, including four consecutive appearances. In the 2003 NCAA Tournament, the Lobos advanced to the Sweet Sixteen. Prior to Flanagan's arrival New Mexico never made a trip to the postseason, but in his 10 years the Lobos have made the postseason eight times.

The Lobos are the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win three consecutive tournament championships (2003, 2004 and 2005). Before the 3-peat in 2005, UNM was also the only team to win back-to-back MWC Tournament titles. New Mexico has an impressive 11-3 record at the MWC Tournament.

New Mexico won its second consecutive Mountain West Conference regular season championship in 2005. This marked only the third time the Lobos have won a regular season conference title, the others coming in 2004 in the MWC and in 1999 in the WAC. UNM has been very competitive in league play, finishing in the top-four of the conference for nine consecutive seasons.

In 2004-05, the Lobos put together a seven-game winning streak before falling to Purdue in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. New Mexico finished the season 26-5, which tied the 1997-98 team for most wins in school history. The .838 winning percentage though is the best in school history.





Don Flanagan is the winningest coach in New Mexico women's basketball history. Flanagan has amassed an impressive 217-94 record in 10 seasons good for a .682 winning percentage. Before arriving at UNM, Flanagan posted a 401-13 record at Albuquerque Eldorado High School.



The Pit is one of the best home courts in college basketball. The Lobos not only average over 10,000 screaming fans a game, but have put together an impressive 142-29 (.830) record over the last 10 years at home. Currently New Mexico is on a 14-game home winning streak, 10 wins shy of the all-time mark of 24 set between 1998-99.



Mandi Moore became the first player in the University of New Mexico men's or women's basketball history to record 1,000 points, 500 rebounds and 500 assists. Moore finished her career with 1,057 points, 651 assists and 603 rebounds.



In 2003-04, New Mexico was the top ranked defense in the country. The Lobos led the country in both field goal percentage defense (.333) and scoring defense (51.1). It's the first time UNM has been ranked No. 1 in any statistical category.



The Lobos have placed a player on an all-conference team for 11 consecutive seasons. In the Don Flanagan Era a Lobo has been named all-conference every season, including 11 first team selections. New Mexico has also had four conference tournament most valuable players, including the last three (Jordan Adams, Lindsey Arndt and Dionne Marsh).

New Mexico is as successful off the court as it is on the court. The Lobos have recorded a team GPA of 3.00 or better for 10 consecutive semesters. UNM's highest team GPA was 3.52 in the fall of 2002. Under Don Flanagan, New Mexico has earned 58 academic all-conference honors, including 26 different players receiving recognition.



In 2005 New Mexico was one of 11 schools to send their football team to a bowl game and both their men's and women's basketball teams to the NCAA Tournament. Joining the Lobos on that list is Connecticut, Iowa State, Boston College, North Carolina, Texas Tech, Minnesota, LSU, Texas, Utah and Oklahoma.
