Baylor returns to action Saturday, Oct. 4, hosting top-ranked Oklahoma in the Big 12 Conference opener for both teams. Kickoff between the Bears and Sooners is scheduled for 11:40 a.m. CDT at Floyd Casey Stadium. Saturday's game will be televised nationally on FSN, Baylor's fourth televised game this season.

The Bears (2-2, 0-0 Big 12) enjoyed one of two open dates on their 2008 schedule last weekend. Baylor has not played since a 31-28 loss Sept. 19 at Connecticut. The Bears are 2-1 at home this season, falling to then-No. 23 Wake Forest and defeating Northwestern State and Washington State.

The Sooners (4-0, 0-0 Big 12) defeated then-No. 24 TCU 35-10 at home last Saturday. Oklahoma also defeated Chattanooga, Cincinnati and Washington this season. The Sooners are 1-0 on the road in 2008, winning 55-14 at Washington three weeks ago. Oklahoma is ranked first nationally in both the Associated Press Top 25 and the USA Today Coaches' Poll.

All Baylor football games are broadcast live on the Baylor/ISP Sports Radio Network; Waco's 1660 ESPN Radio is the network's flagship station. Saturday's game also will be carried on Sirius Radio 161. Live streaming audio and GameTracker also are available for all Baylor football games online at www.BaylorBears.com, the official website of Baylor Athletics and a member of the CBS College Sports network.

BAYLOR-OKLAHOMA SERIES

This is the 18th meeting between Baylor and Oklahoma; the Sooners have dominated the series, winning each of the first 17 meetings. Oklahoma's 37-30 double-overtime win at Norman in 2005 was the closest game in the series since the Sooners' 24-23 victory at Norman in 1997.

While Oklahoma has won every game in the series, not all have been handily. In fact, the first three meetings as Big 12 foes were decided by a total of 17 points, including scores of 28-24 and 24-23 in the first two meetings.

Baylor and Oklahoma first met Oct. 26, 1901; the Sooners left Waco that day with a 17-6 victory. The teams did not play again until 1973.

SERIES NOTES: Oklahoma is the only Big 12 team Baylor has never defeated. In fact, Oklahoma is the only team Baylor has played at least five times without at least one win. ... This is the eighth time in the last nine meetings that Oklahoma has been ranked when playing Baylor and the third time in that span that the Sooners have been ranked No. 1. Oklahoma is the only top-ranked team Baylor has played since the 2000 Nebraska game. ... When Baylor faced top-ranked Oklahoma in 2000, it was the Bears' second game against the nation's top-ranked team in a 15-day span. Two weeks prior, Baylor played then-No. 1 Nebraska. ... Baylor held Oklahoma to 56 yards rushing in the 2003 meeting, a season low for the Sooners and the fewest yards rushing allowed by a Baylor team since 1995. In fact, Oklahoma had negative rushing yards until late in the third quarter. ... In the 1989 season opener for both teams, then-No. 8 Oklahoma ran the ball on 70 of 72 plays en route to a 33-7 victory at Norman. The Sooners were 0-of-2 passing, the fourth and most recent time a Baylor opponent did not complete a pass. ... **Randy Davis** returned a kickoff 93 yards for a TD against the Sooners in 2001. That still stands as the eighth-longest kickoff return in Baylor history. ... **Pete Rutter's** 81-yard punt against Oklahoma in 1989 still ranks fifth all-time at Baylor.

PRACTICE COVERAGE

Baylor's practices are closed to the media and the general public. Media are allowed to attend the first 15 minutes of practice; still and video photography are allowed during this time.

QUICK NOTES

- The NCAA ranks the Bears' schedule as the nation's third-toughest. Baylor's Division I FBS opponents currently have a 26-9 combined record against Division I FBS opponents.
- Both Baylor losses this season have come against teams currently ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 and the USA Today Coaches' Poll.
- Baylor is 45-42-4 (.516) all-time in conference openers, including a 3-9 mark in Big 12 openers.
- Baylor is 41-153-6 all-time against ranked opponents, including a 0-10-1 mark against top-ranked teams.
- Baylor is 38-75-2 all-time in televised games.
- Baylor is 7-0 in takeaways-turnovers over the last two games.
- Baylor ranks 13th nationally in rushing (224.0 ypg) and 22nd in passing efficiency (152.06).
- Baylor is 26th nationally in total offense (429.8 ypg) and 30th in scoring offense (34.4 ppg).
- Baylor is 13th nationally in net punting (39.4 ypp).
- Baylor is tied for 13th nationally in turnover margin (plus-1.25 tpg).
- Baylor ranks is tied for 14th nationally with 2.75 sacks per game.
- QB **Robert Griffin** ranks sixth in the Big 12 and 54th nationally in rushing (83.5 ypg). He also ranks 10th nationally and sixth in the Big 12 in passing efficiency (171.29), and he is 27th nationally and eighth in the league in total offense (272.5 ypg).
- RB **Jay Finley** ranks seventh in the Big 12 and 57th nationally in rushing (79.3 ypg).
- LB **Joe Pawelek** is tied for fourth nationally and first in the Big 12 in tackles (12.0 tpg). He also is tied for 24th nationally and third in the league in interceptions (0.5 ipg).
- P **Derek Epperson** ranks 20th nationally and second in the Big 12 in punting (43.5 ypp).
- LB **Antonio Jones** is tied for ninth in the Big 12 in tackles (7.3 tpg).
- DE **Leon Freeman** is tied for 18th nationally and fourth in the conference with 1.5 tackles for loss per game.
- Four Bears have started at least 20 consecutive games: RT **Dan Gay** (26), Pawelek (25), DT **Vincent Rhodes** (24) and DE **Jason Lamb** (22).
- Three Baylor true freshmen are listed first at their respective positions: Griffin, PK **Ben Parks** and WR **Kendall Wright**.

OKLAHOMA GAME BEGINS TOUGH STRETCH

Beginning with Saturday's game against Oklahoma, four of Baylor's next six games are against teams ranked nationally in this week's polls. In fact, three of the four are against teams ranked in the top 10. After facing No. 1 Oklahoma this week, the Bears host Iowa State before traveling to No. 21/22 Oklahoma State in two weeks. Baylor then travels to Nebraska before hosting No. 5 Texas and traveling to No. 4/3 Missouri.

LAST TIME vs. OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA 52, BAYLOR 21

NOV. 10, 2007 • GAYLORD FAMILY OKLAHOMA MEMORIAL STADIUM • NORMAN, OKLA.

Two redzone turnovers and an Oklahoma kickoff return for a touchdown proved fatal for Baylor in a 52-21 loss to the fourth-ranked Sooners.

After the teams traded punts on their first possessions, Baylor drove to the Oklahoma 3 thanks to **Brandon Whitaker's** 57-yard run. However, **Blake Szymanski** was intercepted in the end zone on the next play, thwarting Baylor's first scoring chance of the game.

The Bears again forced the Sooners to punt and responded with a five-play, 65-yard scoring drive. Whitaker's 46-yard touchdown run capped the drive.

Baylor's lead was short-lived, though, as Oklahoma marched 72 yards on seven plays and scored in 2:28. DeMarco Murray's first of three touchdown runs ended the drive, this one from 25 yards out.

After the Bears went three-and-out on their ensuing possession, Oklahoma quickly took the lead. Sam Bradford connected with Malcolm Kelly for a 51-yard touchdown pass on the Sooners' first play from scrimmage.

Oklahoma pushed its lead to 21-7 with 10:24 remaining in the second quarter. Baylor got back in the game with a 75-yard Szymanski-to-**Thomas White** touchdown pass with 60 seconds to play in the quarter. However, the Sooners again answered quickly as Murray returned the ensuing kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown.

The Sooners scored on the first drive of the second half, but Baylor had a chance to answer. The Bears had second-and-goal at the Oklahoma seven; however, a false start cost Baylor five yards, and Szymanski was intercepted on the next play. Bradford recorded his third touchdown pass of the game on the ensuing drive, giving Oklahoma a 42-14 lead.

Szymanski again connected with White for a touchdown pass late in the third quarter, this time from 42 yards out. That was the end of the scoring for Baylor, though. Oklahoma added a 27-yard Garrett Hartley field goal and a Murray 21-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

Whitaker finished with 149 yards rushing on 15 carries, the second 100-yard rushing game of his career. At the time, it was Baylor's first 100-yard rushing effort since the 2005 Texas A&M game and the Bears' best rushing performance since **Rashad Armstrong's** 166-yard tally against Colorado in 2003. Whitaker's rushing total was Baylor's best ever against Oklahoma. He also had 10 receptions for 68 yards, finishing with 217 all-purpose yards.

Szymanski was 25-of-42 for 280 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. During the game, he established Baylor single-season records for total yards, passing yards and passing touchdowns.

BAYLOR IN CONFERENCE OPENERS

Baylor is 45-42-4 (.516) all-time in conference openers. The Bears are 3-9 in Big 12 Conference openers, going 3-2 when opening Big 12 play at home. Baylor won its Big 12 opener in 2002 (def. Kansas 35-32), in 2003 (def. Colorado 42-30) and in 2006 (def. Kansas State 17-3). Baylor has never won a Big 12 opener on the road (1996 at Texas Tech, 1998 at Colorado, 1999 at Oklahoma, 2001 at Iowa State, 2004 at Texas, 2005 at Texas A&M).

This is only the second time Baylor has played Oklahoma in its Big 12 opener; the Bears suffered a 41-10 loss at Norman in 1999. Baylor opened Big 12 play against Colorado, Iowa State, Texas A&M and Texas Tech twice each, and against Kansas, Kansas State and Texas once each.

In 79 seasons as a member of the Southwest Conference, Baylor was 42-33-4 (.557) in league openers. The Bears won six of their last seven, 10 of their last 12 and 14 of their last 17 such SWC games.

HEAD COACH ART BRILES



Art Briles, a native West Texan who resurrected the University of Houston's football program during his five seasons along the Cougars' sideline, was introduced as Baylor University's 25th head football coach Nov. 28, 2007.

Briles, who inherited a Houston program that was just two years removed from an 0-11 season and won just eight games from 2000 to 2003, posted a 34-28 record with the Cougars and guided them to four bowl games.

Briles led Houston to an 8-4 regular-season record in his final season along the Cougar sideline and a Texas Bowl invitation (he did not coach the Cougars in the bowl game). In 2006, Briles earned Conference USA and Sportex Division I-A National Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Cougars to a Conference USA title, a Liberty Bowl appearance and the program's first 10-win season since 1990 (10-4). Briles' 2005 Cougar team finished 6-6 overall, led Conference USA in total offense and played in the Fort Worth Bowl, while his 2004 squad was 3-8. His rookie season at UH saw the Cougars make school history, finishing 7-6 and earning a Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl berth.

Briles spent three years (2000-02) as running backs coach at Texas Tech. Prior to moving into the collegiate coaching ranks at Texas Tech, Briles spent 12 seasons (1988-99) as head coach and athletic director at Stephenville [Texas] High School. His Yellowjacket teams won four state championships, capturing back-to-back crowns in 1993 and 1994 and repeating that feat in 1998 and 1999.

Briles, a former Texas High School Coaches Association president, has spent his entire coaching career in the state of Texas. Following in his father's footsteps, Briles began his coaching career as an assistant at Sundown High School in 1979 before moving to Sweetwater High School as an assistant from 1980-83. He landed his first head coaching job at Hamlin High School (1984-86), where he also served as athletic director.

From Hamlin, Briles went to Georgetown High School as head coach and athletic director for two seasons (1986-87) before moving to Stephenville in 1988. While coaching in the high school ranks, Briles developed six Division I quarterbacks and had five signal callers throw for over 3,000 yards in a season.

Briles posted a 98-9-1 record in seven seasons as a high school head coach, including an 84-8-1 mark in six seasons at Stephenville. Five of his nine career losses were in one season, and his teams were undefeated three times.

A former wide receiver at Houston from 1974 to 1977, Briles was a member of the 1976 Cougar squad that captured the Southwest Conference championship in UH's first season in the league. He later played in the 1977 Cotton Bowl against fifth-ranked Maryland, a game the Cougars won 30-21.

He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Texas Tech in 1979 and a Masters of Education degree from Abilene Christian in 1984. A recent inductee into the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame for his West Texas exploits, Briles and his wife, Jan, have three children: Jancy, Kendal and Staley. Briles was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame in April 2008.

BAYLOR vs. RANKED OPPONENTS

Baylor is 41-153-6 all-time against ranked opponents, 26-134-5 when unranked and playing a ranked opponent. The Bears are 2-39 against ranked opponents since the inception of the Big 12 Conference (33-30 vs. 20th-ranked North Carolina State in 1998, and 35-34 in overtime vs. 16th-ranked Texas A&M in 2004). Baylor has lost 13 straight to ranked foes since the 2004 victory over Texas A&M, including a season-opening loss to then-No. 23 Wake Forest.

Since the Associated Press began conducting weekly polls in 1936, Baylor has played at least one ranked opponent every season except 1987. Baylor has played at least one top-10 team every season since 1993.

BAYLOR vs. TOP-RANKED OPPONENTS

Saturday is 12th game against an opponent ranked No. 1 nationally by the Associated Press; the Bears are 0-10-1 in such contests. This is Baylor's first game against a top-ranked opponent since 2003 when the Bears lost 41-3 at Oklahoma despite sacking eventual Heisman Trophy winner Jason White five times (he had been sacked 12 times in 10 games all season entering the game) and holding the Sooners to a season-low 56 yards rushing.

In 2000, Baylor played the nation's top-ranked team twice in a three-game span, falling first at Nebraska and then at home to Oklahoma two weeks later. Prior to that, Baylor had not faced a No. 1 team since a 29-7 loss at Texas in 1977.

Baylor's first game against a No. 1 team was in 1941, a 7-7 tie against Texas that was voted the biggest upset in the history of the Southwest Conference by a panel of sportswriters in 1950. Only once has a ranked Baylor team faced a top-ranked opponent; the 20th-ranked Bears lost 20-6 at top-ranked Maryland in 1955.

The highest-ranked team ever defeated by Baylor was Tennessee; the Bears defeated the then-No. 2 Volunteers 13-7 at the 1957 Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, La.

BAYLOR IN TELEVISED GAMES

Saturday's game is the 116th televised game in Baylor football history; the Bears are 38-75-2 all-time in televised games. Baylor snapped a 16-game losing streak in televised games with its 45-17 victory over Washington State earlier this season.

This is Baylor's fourth televised game this season; the Bears are 1-2 in the previous three games. Baylor has played at least four nationally televised games each of the last four seasons.

Baylor is 3-27 all-time on FSN, including its subsidiaries Fox College Sports and FSN-PayPerView. The Bears are 1-1 on FSN this season, falling to Wake Forest and defeating Washington State.

RUSHING GAME VASTLY IMPROVED

Through four games this season, Baylor has rushed for 896 yards. That is just 38 yards shy of the Bears' 2007 12-game season total. Furthermore, Baylor has 11 rushing touchdowns this season, already eclipsing last year's season total (5).

Baylor rushed for 426 yards on 42 carries against Washington State. It was Baylor's third 400-yard rushing game ever and its first since the Bears rushed for a school-record 482 yards at SMU in 1993, a game in which Baylor did not throw a pass. The Bears rushed for 207 yards against Northwestern State the previous week. It marked the first time Baylor had rushed for 200-plus yards in consecutive games since 1997 (Texas, Texas A&M and Missouri). In fact, it was the first back-to-back 100-yard rushing games for Baylor since 2005 (Texas Tech, Texas).

The Bears continued the rushing success in their next game at Connecticut, gaining 169 yards on 43 carries. It marked Baylor's first three consecutive 100-yard rushing games since a five-game span to open the 2005 season.

The Bears' five rushing touchdowns against Washington State were their most in a game since scoring five against Samford in 2002. It was Baylor's most rushing touchdowns against a Division I FBS opponent since a five-touchdown game against SMU in 1995.

GRIFFIN MAKES NAME FOR HIMSELF

Attention on Baylor freshman QB **Robert Griffin** has not been confined to Central Texas or even the Central U.S. ESPN.com columnist Bruce Feldman called Griffin the nation's sixth-biggest surprise through the first third of the season.

Griffin is the only true freshman starting quarterback in the nation, and his 7-to-0 touchdown-to-interception ratio is best nationally among quarterbacks with at least 75 pass attempts. In fact, Griffin and 2008 Heisman Trophy Winner Tim Tebow (six touchdown passes) of Florida are the only quarterbacks in the nation to have thrown at least five touchdown passes this season without throwing an interception.

Furthermore, Griffin is one of only 10 quarterbacks nationally who leads his team in both passing yardage and rushing yardage. He was named Big 12 Conference Offensive Player of the Week following his performance against Washington State.

PAWELEK CRACKS TACKLES LIST

With 10 tackle assists against Connecticut, LB **Joe Pawelek** cracked Baylor's career list in that category. He now has 136 career tackle assists, tying **James Francis** (1986-89) for ninth on Baylor's all-time list.

Further ascention up the list should come quickly for Pawelek. He needs two tackle assists to move into sole possession of seventh place, nine to move into sixth place, 10 to move into fifth place, 11 to move into fourth place, 14 to move into third place and 31 to move into second place. However, the school record still is distant; **Mike Singletary** (1977-80) tallied 311 in his career.

BEARS MAKE GOOD USE OF COMPLETIONS

Baylor has completed 56 passes this season, 38 of which have resulted in first downs (67.9 percent). Two weeks ago at Connecticut, 12 of the Bears' 14 completions moved the chains (85.7 percent). Last season, Baylor established a school record with 280 completions; however, only 148 resulted in first downs (52.9 percent).

Furthermore, Baylor completions have resulted in touchdowns 14.3 percent of the time this season (8-of-56). Last season, only 7.5 percent the Bears' completions resulted in touchdowns (21-of-280).

SCHEDULE AMONG NATION'S TOUGHEST

Baylor's 2008 schedule ranks as the nation's third-most difficult by the NCAA as the Bears face eight opponents who participated in bowl games last season. The Bears' schedule ranks as the nation's fifth-toughest, according to ESPN.com, and *Phil Steele's College Football Preview* magazine ranks the Bears' schedule as the nation's seventh-toughest. Both outlets have Baylor's slate as the Big 12 Conference's toughest.

In fact, Baylor is one of only three schools from BCS conferences to play at least three non-conference games against other teams from BCS conferences. Coincidentally, the Bears play both of the other such teams — Connecticut and Wake Forest (Washington State is the Bears' other BCS non-conference opponent).

Five of Baylor's 12 opponents were ranked nationally to start the season: Oklahoma, Missouri, Texas, Texas Tech and Wake Forest; two others — Connecticut and Oklahoma State — have since joined that quintet in the national rankings. Baylor has not played more than four opponents ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 at time of game in one season since facing five such teams in 1998.

Baylor's 2008 opponents currently tout a 26-9 (.743) combined record against Division I FBS competition. That ranks as the third-toughest schedule nationally behind only Kansas (25-7, .781) and Georgia (29-9, .763).

QUICK-STRIKE OFFENSE

Baylor has eight touchdown drives of five plays or less this season, tied for 11th nationally. Oklahoma State, Oregon and Tulsa leads all teams with 11 such drives each, while Missouri has 10. Meanwhile, the Bears have seven touchdown drives of less than two minutes, tied for 19th nationally. Oregon leads all teams with 16 such drives, followed by Tulsa (15), Missouri (14) and Rice (11).

Baylor enjoyed four plays of 50-plus yards in the Washington State game — three runs (57, 58, 58) and one pass (61). The Bears had five plays of 50-plus yards in 12 games last season. In fact, the four such plays in the Washington State game were more than Baylor had in 2003 (three), 2004 (two) or 2005 (three). Baylor had seven such plays in 2006.

NOTES FROM THE CONNECTICUT GAME

- The loss snapped Baylor's five-game winning streak in non-conference games against unranked opponents.
- Baylor has rushed for 100-plus yards in three straight games for the first time since a five-game run to open the 2005 season.
- LG **John Jones** made his first career start.
- QB **Robert Griffin** tied his career high with three touchdown passes.
- Griffin tied his career high with four total touchdowns (three passing, one rushing).
- LB **Joe Pawelek** posted the ninth double-digit tackle game of his career; he has accomplished the feat in all four games this season.
- WR **Kendall Wright** established career highs with six receptions and 114 receiving yards. He also recorded his first career touchdown reception.
- TE **Justin Akers** caught two touchdown passes for the second time in his career (Rice, 2007).
- LB **Antonio Johnson** established a career high with nine tackles.
- S **Jeremy Williams** tied his career high with eight tackles.
- CB **Antareis Bryan**'s third-quarter interception was the second of his career.

WHITE CRACKS TOUCHDOWN RECEPTION CHART

WR **Thomas White**'s third-quarter touchdown reception against Northwestern State earlier this season was the 11th of his career. He moved into an eighth-place tie on Baylor's career chart, matching **Stanley Williams** (1949-51), **George Cheshire** (1965-67) and **Marques Roberts** (2001-04). Seven of White's touchdown receptions have come in his last seven games.

White needs two touchdown receptions to tie **Bruce Davis** (1980-83) and **Dominique Zeigler** (2003-06) for sixth all-time at Baylor. **Lawrence Elkins** (1962-64) and **Melvin Bonner** (1989-92) hold Baylor's career record; each had 19 touchdown receptions.

BAYLOR ISP SPORTS NETWORK

The "Voice of the Bears," John Morris (Baylor, 1980) enters his 22nd year broadcasting Baylor football and men's basketball in 2008-09. The Kentucky native also produces the daily "State Farm Baylor SportsBeat," daily Big 12 reports and co-hosts the award-winning "Inside Baylor Sports" television show. Morris also hosts "The Central National Bank Art Briles Show" in the fall, the "State Farm Baylor Hour" January through May and a daily 60-minute program, "The John Morris Show," on Waco's 1660 ESPN Radio. This is Morris' 14th year as signature voice of Baylor athletics since succeeding the legendary Frank Fallon. In November 2002, he was presented the Frank Fallon Sportsmanship Award by the Greater Waco Chamber of Commerce.

Three-time Academic All-American J.J. Joe returns for his fifth season as color analyst. The Bears' leading passer for four consecutive seasons from 1990-1993, Joe graduated as Baylor's career passing and total offense leader and is one of the school's most decorated student-athletes as a three-time Academic All-American. He was inducted into the Baylor Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

Ricky Thompson returns for his ninth season providing sideline color and analysis. Thompson is a former SWC long jump champion and was the Bears' leading receiver in 1975 before embarking on a seven-year NFL career. He is also a member of the Baylor Athletic Hall of Fame.

Baylor's radio team also includes the multi-talented Craig Harper, who, in his 22nd year as a member of the crew, serves as executive producer of the football broadcasts.

- WR **Thomas White** needs two touchdown receptions to move into a sixth-place tie on Baylor's career chart.
- White also needs 81 yards to become Baylor's 24th 1,000-yard receiver.
- WR **David Gettis** needs one kickoff returns and 24 kickoff return yards to crack Baylor's career top 10 lists in those categories.
- QB **Blake Szymanski** needs 16 pass attempts to move into eighth place on Baylor's career list.
- With his next touchdown pass, Szymanski will move into a seventh-place tie on Baylor's career list. He needs three scoring passes to move into a fifth-place tie.
- Szymanski needs 234 yards to crack Baylor's career passing yardage top 10 chart.

TIDBITS

- Baylor is 11-12 all-time when 2-2, including a 7-6 mark when 2-2 following a loss.
- Baylor is 200-198-22 all-time in October; however, the Bears have lost five consecutive October games and are 9-43 within the month since the inception of the Big 12 Conference in 1996.
- Baylor is 51-37-5 all-time on the first weekend of October, including an 8-5 mark on Oct. 4.

THOSE GOOD OLD BAYLOR LINES

For the first time in several years, Baylor fields veteran units on both the offensive and defensive lines. The Bears' five starting offensive linemen have combined for 90 career starts; LT **Jason Smith** leads the way with 31 career starts, followed by RT **Dan Gay** with 26 starts. Meanwhile, the Bears four starting defensive linemen have combined for 71 career starts; DT **Vincent Rhodes** leads the way with 26 career starts, while DE **Jason Lamb** has 24 career starts.

All nine of those players had started at least one game prior to this season. In fact, only DE **Leon Freeman** (one start prior to this season) and LG **Jordan Hearvey** (six starts prior to this season) had fewer than 12 starts under their belts entering the 2008 campaign. Five of Baylor's nine starting linemen have started every game since the start of last season.

NICKNAME GAME

Baylor head coach **Art Briles** has a penchant for giving his players nicknames. Virtually every player on the Bears' roster has a nickname. Some came to Baylor with their nickname, and some have been given nicknames by Briles. Some of the more commonly heard nicknames from Briles are Shazam (QB **Blake Szymanski**), Romeo (IR **Romie Blaylock**), All-Star (PK **Ben Parks**), Diego (BS **Larry Washington**), Motown (RB **Jeremy Sanders**), Swerve (LG **Jordan Hearvey**) J-Willy (S **Jeremy Williams**), Yosemite Sam or Yo-Yo (RB **Ray Sims**) and Marty Akins (TE **Justin Akers**).

Here are some other nickname tidbits:

- Sanders' pre-Baylor nickname was J-Mo. Briles morphed J-Mo into "Motown."
- Griffin, who is referred to as Rambo by teammates, is called Cream by Briles (as in "rises to the top").
- CB **Dwain Crawford** is called Fish, as in crawfish.
- Briles calls true freshman WR **Kendall Wright** "My Dubbie," which came from K-Dub.
- DT **Vincent Rhodes** is called "Big Vin."
- DE **Jason Lamb** is called "Lambo."

HOME SWEET HOME

Baylor plays seven home games this season for only the sixth time since Floyd Casey Stadium opened in 1950. The Bears open with three straight home games for the first time since 1992 and only the second time since 1945.

In all, Baylor has played at least three straight home games to open a season 13 times: 1899 (all four games that season were at home), 1904 (first six and seven of eight games that season were at home), 1909 (first six and seven of eight games that season were at home), 1913 (three), 1918 (three), 1919 (three), 1923 (three), 1928 (three), 1929 (four), 1935 (three), 1945 (three), 1992 (three) and 2008 (three).

TRANSFERS FIND HOME AT BAYLOR

Baylor's 2008 roster features six student-athletes who began their collegiate careers at other NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision universities: LS **Casey Cooper** (Alabama), QB **Kirby Freeman** (Miami-FL), DE **Adam Geib** (Air Force), CB **Drew Kerr** (Houston), DT **Phillip Taylor** (Penn State) and C **J.D. Walton** (Arizona State). Freeman and Walton both started in the Wake Forest game; it was Walton's 13th consecutive start for the Bears. Taylor will be eligible next season.

DEGREE IN HAND

Five members of Baylor's 2008 football squad already have received their undergraduate degrees: QB **Kirby Freeman**, LB **Ben Hixson**, DT **Vincent Rhodes**, QB **Ryan Roberts** and LT **Jason Smith**. That leads the Big 12 Conference and ties for 13th nationally along with Louisiana Tech, Ole Miss, Syracuse and UCF. Miami-FL leads all schools with 13 such players, followed by Boston College and Virginia Tech — each with 10 such players. Maryland has nine, while Auburn, Clemson and Pittsburgh each have eight. Arizona State, Memphis, Ohio State and Penn State each have seven, and Northwestern has six.

FORMER SIGNAL CALLERS FIND NEW HOMES

Baylor's 2008 roster features 10 student-athletes who were starting quarterbacks in high school, including two former signal callers who played quarterback beyond high school.

Inside receiver **John David Weed** was on Baylor's depth chart at quarterback last fall and saw action in three games during the 2007 season; he also was the starting quarterback at Tyler [Texas] Junior College during the 2005 and 2006 seasons.

Another junior college transfer — running back **Jeremy Sanders** — made the move to another position after playing quarterback beyond high school. Sanders, a product of Marlin [Texas] High School, spent two seasons as the starting quarterback at Navarro [Texas] College before transferring to Baylor this season.

The most interesting position change was that of **Zac Scotton**, who now plays defensive end. The six-foot-six, 255-pound Scotton made the switch away from quarterback prior to his junior season at Houston's Cypress Creek High School after out-growing the position.

TRADING PLACES

During spring practice, 10 Baylor players changed positions from last season. An 11th player made a position change during preseason drills as **Jeremy Sanders** moved from quarterback to running back.

Position changes made during the spring were as follows: **Mikail Baker** (wide receiver to inside receiver), **Krys Buerck** (wide receiver to cornerback), **Elliott Coffey** (safety to linebacker), **Dwain Crawford** (rover to cornerback), **Antonio Johnson** (defensive end to linebacker), **V.J. McElroy** (cornerback to inside receiver), **Ray Sims** (outside safety to running back), **Matt Singletary** (defensive end to inside receiver), **Sam Sledge** (offensive line to defensive line) and **John David Weed** (quarterback to inside receiver).

SEVERAL BEARS EARN PRESEASON ACCOLADES

Four Baylor student-athletes were named preseason All-Big 12 Conference by various outlets: wide receiver **David Gettis**, free safety **Jordan Lake**, linebacker **Joe Pawelek** and left tackle **Jason Smith**.

Lake was the most highly decorated, also earning honorable mention All-America honors from *The Sporting News*. He was named all-conference by the league's coaches, and he was a first-team all-conference selection by *Lindy's*, *The Sporting News*, *Blue Ribbon Yearbook* and *CollegeFootballNews*. Lake also earned second-team all-Big 12 honors from *Athlon* and *Phil Steele*.

Pawelek, who joined Lake on the coaches' preseason All-Big 12 team, was a first-team all-conference selection by *Athlon*, *Lindy's*, *The Sporting News* and *CollegeFootballNews*. He was tabbed second-team all-league by *Phil Steele*.

Smith earned second-team all-Big 12 honors from *Athlon* and *Lindy's*, while he was a fourth-team all-conference pick by *Phil Steele*. Gettis was named third-team all-Big 12 by *Phil Steele*.

EPPERSON NAMED TO RAY GUY AWARD WATCH LIST

P **Derek Epperson** was one of 46 student-athletes named to the 2008 Ray Guy Award Watch List, announced Tuesday by the Greater Augusta Sports Council. The Ray Guy Award is given annually to the nation's top collegiate punter. Baylor's **Daniel Sepulveda** is the award's only two-time winner, picking up the hardware in 2004 and 2006.

Epperson is one of only 11 sophomores and one of seven punters from the Big 12 Conference on the list. He ranks second in the Big 12 and ninth nationally with a 45.4-yard average on 11 punts with five inside the opponent's 20, four punts of 50-plus yards and two punts of 60-plus yards. As a team, Baylor ranks third in the Big 12 and fifth nationally in net punting (41.8 average).

Three of Epperson's last five punts have been 50-plus yards, and the other two were downed inside the opponent's 10. Through only three games of his sophomore season, Epperson already ranks 10th in Baylor history with 12 career punts of 50-plus yards and ninth with three career punts of 60-plus yards. A product of Keller [Texas] High School, Epperson earned freshman All-Big 12 and honorable mention Freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News last season.

LAKE NAMED TO THORPE AWARD WATCH LIST

Jordan Lake is one of 40 student-athletes included on the 2008 Jim Thorpe Award Watch List. The award is given annually to the nation's best defensive back.

A consensus second-team All-Big 12 honoree as a sophomore in 2007, Lake registered six double-digit tackle games a year ago and finished the season with 120 total tackles, the most by a Baylor player since 2003. He ranked third in the Big 12 (first among defensive backs) and 30th nationally with 10.0 tackles per game last season.

A screening committee will meet Oct. 3 to narrow the field to 10 or 12 semifinalists. Three finalists will be selected Nov. 24. The names of these finalists will be submitted to a national panel of sports writers, sportscasters, coaches and former players who vote to determine the winner. The winner will be announced at the ESPN College Football Awards Show.

Formal presentation of the Jim Thorpe Award takes place at ceremonies in Oklahoma City on the first Tuesday in February following the national signing date for college football recruits.

PAWELEK ON BUTKUS AWARD WATCH LIST

Joe Pawelek was named to the 2008 Butkus Award Watch List; the award is given annually to the nation's top collegiate linebacker. Pawelek, a 2006 Freshman All-American, is one of 66 student-athletes on the initial watch list, including 2007 winner James Laurinaitis.

A product of Smithson Valley High School in Spring Branch, Texas, Pawelek has been among Baylor's leaders in tackles each of the past two seasons. He led the Bears with 86 stops as a freshman in 2006 and was second on the team with 99 tackles last year. A 2007 All-Big 12 Conference selection, Pawelek tallied eight tackles for loss, including two sacks, forced three fumbles, recovered two fumbles and had one interception last season.

Pawelek is one of only four linebackers from the Big 12 on the Butkus Award Watch List, joining Joe Mortensen of Kansas, Ryan Reynolds of Oklahoma and Sean Witherspoon of Missouri.

WALTON IN RUNNING FOR RIMINGTON TROPHY

J.D. Walton is one of 42 players on the Rimington Trophy's 2008 watch list. He is one of seven Big 12 Conference student-athletes on the list. The Rimington Trophy annually recognizes the nation's top center.

One of three Baylor offensive linemen to start every 2007 game, Walton was a key cog along a Bears' line which yielded just 21 sacks (on a school-record 561 pass attempts), the program's fewest since 1995. He shared the team's 2007 Best Offensive Lineman Award with tackle **Jason Smith**.

Walton saw action on 65 or more plays in 10 games with a high of 97 at Buffalo. For the season, he played 911 snaps, most by a Baylor offensive performer in 2007, and second-most overall behind free safety **Jordan Lake's** 974.

Included on the 2008 Spring Watch List are two finalists from the 2007 Watch List, as well as the award's 2007 winner in Arkansas' Jonathan Luigs. The 2008 winner will be honored at the Rimington Trophy presentation banquet Jan. 17 at the Rococo Theatre in Lincoln, Neb.

BAYLOR AMONG TOP UNIVERSITIES

In a recent *Forbes Magazine* study, Baylor ranked as the nation's 34th-best university and the top university in the Big 12 Conference. The *Forbes* list ranked 127 universities. Baylor ranked as the third-best university in the state of Texas behind only SMU (13th) and Rice (24th). Baylor was the 19th-ranked non-Ivy League private university in the nation, sixth among schools with religious affiliations.

Other Big 12 schools in the *Forbes* rankings were Texas (44th), Texas A&M (49th), Missouri (53rd), Colorado (62nd), Kansas (67th), Oklahoma (73rd), Kansas State (108th), Iowa State (120th) and Nebraska (123rd). Oklahoma State and Texas Tech were not ranked.

U.S. News & World Report recently ranked Baylor at No. 76 — only one point from tying five other universities at No. 71 — among the nation's top national doctoral-granting universities. The ranking in the magazine's 2009 edition of "America's Best Colleges" represents Baylor's second-highest overall *U.S. News* ranking, just behind last year's ranking at No. 75. The magazine evaluated more than 1,400 accredited four-year schools.

Universities in the state of Texas continue to lead the Big 12 among the publication's "Best National Universities." Among Big 12 schools, Baylor is the third highest-ranked university behind only Texas (47th) and Texas A&M (64th). Other Big 12 schools ranked were Colorado (77th); Iowa State, Kansas and Nebraska (tied for 89th); Missouri (96th); Oklahoma (108th); and Kansas State (130th). Oklahoma State and Texas Tech both are in the third tier.

FORMER WALK-ONS EARN SCHOLARSHIPS

Seven former walk-ons have been awarded scholarships for the 2008-09 academic year: **Joe Bennett**, **Carter Brunelle**, **Ty Findley**, **Chris Greisenbeck**, **Ryan Roberts**, **Sam Sledge** and **Larry Washington**. Baylor has awarded 37 former walk-ons with scholarships since 2003. Most notable of that group was punter **Daniel Sepulveda**, who was the first two-time winner of the Ray Guy Award and was drafted in fourth round by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2007.

Five Baylor turnovers led to 21 Wake Forest points as the Bears dropped a 41-13 decision to the 23rd-ranked Demon Deacons at Floyd Casey Stadium. It was the season opener for both teams; Baylor dropped its season opener for the sixth time in the last seven years.

The loss also spoiled the debut of Baylor head coach **Art Briles**, who became the sixth Bears' coach in the program's last seven to lose his inaugural game with Baylor.

Wake Forest built a 10-0 lead by the end of the first quarter. Sam Swank's 40-yard field goal broke a scoreless tie at the 12:19 mark. Riley Skinner connected with Chip Brinkman on a 12-yard touchdown pass with seven minutes remaining in the quarter.

Brandon Pendergrass plunged into the end zone from three yards out early in the second quarter, pushing the Deacons' lead to 17-0.

Baylor cracked the scoreboard with 2:54 remaining before halftime. **Robert Griffin's** nifty 22-yard scramble down the left sideline gave the Bears a first down at the Wake Forest 12. On the next play, **Jacoby Jones** found the end zone for the first rushing touchdown of his career. However, freshman kicker **Ben Parks'** extra point missed wide right.

Swank added a 42-yard field with 53 seconds remaining in the second quarter, pushing the Deacons' lead to 20-6 at the half.

A pair of third-quarter touchdowns gave Wake Forest a comfortable 34-6 lead. Skinner connected with Brinkman on an eight-yard strike and then hit Ben Wooster on a 43-yard streak for the second score.

Griffin had a five-yard touchdown run early in the fourth quarter. That was as close as the Bears would get, though. Wake Forest recovered a muffed punt deep in the Bears' territory; three plays later, Josh Adams scored on a four-yard run to cap the scoring.

Kirby Freeman started at quarterback for the Bears and finished 4-of-11 for 31 yards with two interceptions. Griffin, who came into the game on the Bears' fourth series, was 11-of-19 for 125 yards; he also had 29 yards on 11 rushes and one touchdown.

David Gettis led all Baylor receivers with five catches, going for 46 yards.

Joe Pawelek tallied 15 tackles, a career high and the most by a Baylor linebacker since 2000.

Skinner finished 27-of-36 for 220 yards and three touchdowns.

Robert Griffin tossed three touchdown passes and rushed for another, and Baylor posted its largest margin of victory since 1989 in a 51-6 victory over Northwestern State at Floyd Casey Stadium.

In his first career start, Griffin was 15-of-19 passing for 294 yards and no interceptions. He also rushed 10 times for 42 yards. Griffin's 336 yards of total offense tied for the 13th-best tally in school history, second all-time at Baylor by a freshman. His passing yardage total ranked 21st in school history.

Meanwhile, **Jay Finley** paced Baylor's rushing attack with 91 yards on eight carries and two touchdowns. Finley also a 47-yard touchdown reception.

Baylor got out of the gates quickly, building a 23-0 lead after one quarter. It was the most first-quarter points by a Baylor team since the Bears established a school record with 35 points in a 54-20 victory at San Jose State in 1994.

Griffin started the scoring with a 49-yard touchdown pass to **Ernest Smith**, but the extra point failed. Less than three minutes later, Finley found the end zone from 40 yards out; it was a career-long run. After **Ben Parks'** 20-yard field goal pushed the Bears' lead to 16-0, Griffin scored on a three-yard run with 1:11 remaining in the opening period.

Finley extended the Bears' lead to 30-0 with a 35-yard touchdown run early in the second quarter. Northwestern State got on the board and capped the first-half scoring with a pair of second-quarter field goals, but that was the end of the scoring for the Demons.

Griffin added scoring passes of 32 yards and 47 yards to **Thomas White** and **Jay Finley**, respectively, before exiting the game late in the third quarter. **Kirby Freeman** connected with **Jay Finley** for a 4-yard touchdown pass with 2:46 remaining in the game to conclude the scoring.

Baylor tallied 537 yards of total offense, its best outing since a 546-yard performance against Samford in 2002.

Finley became the first Baylor player to record a touchdown rushing and receiving since **Paul Masley** accomplished the feat at Oklahoma State in 2004.

Meanwhile, the Baylor defense held Northwestern State to 190 yards — the best team effort since holding Arkansas State to 172 yards in 2001.

Joe Pawelek led the way defensively with 10 tackles, his second consecutive double-digit tackle game and the seventh such outing of his career. His final tackle was his 200th career tackle.

White's touchdown reception was the 11th of his career, moving him into an eighth-place tie on Baylor's all-time list.

In just his second career start and third career game, **Robert Griffin** turned in one of the best individual performances in program history in leading Baylor to a 45-17 win over Washington State at Floyd Casey Stadium. The victory was Baylor's first against a non-Big 12 BCS opponent since defeating North Carolina State in 1996, snapping a six-game skid.

Griffin established a Baylor single-game record with 217 yards rushing on 11 carries and scored twice. His 19.7 yards-per-carry average shattered both the Baylor (**Walter Abercrombie**, 11.4) and Big 12 (Marlon Lucky, Nebraska, 15.6) single-game marks for a minimum of 10 carries. Griffin became the first player in Baylor history with three runs of 50-plus yards, galloping 57 yards once and 58 yards twice.

Additionally, Griffin was 7-of-15 passing for 129 yards and a touchdown with no interceptions. His 346 yards of total offense ranked 12th in school history, second all-time by a Baylor freshman.

Washington State took the game's opening kickoff and scored on a Chantz Staden 1-yard run. The Bears answered with two touchdowns in a 63-minute span later in the quarter. Griffin plunged in from 1-yard out to tie the game. After a Washington State fumble, Griffin connected with **Ernest Smith** for a 27-yard scoring strike.

The Cougars knotted the score at 14-14 with 8:00 remaining in the second quarter, but the Bears were quick to answer. On Baylor's first play from scrimmage after the tying score, Griffin raced 57 yards to the Washington State 13. **Jeremy Sanders** scored his first career touchdown on the next play, rushing around right end. The Bears never trailed again.

Jay Finley added a 46-yard touchdown run with 5:12 remaining in the second, and Baylor took a 28-14 halftime lead. A Griffin 58-yard touchdown run and a **Kendall Wright** 10-yard end-around touchdown scamper pushed Baylor's lead to 42-14 before the teams traded fourth-quarter field goals to cap the scoring.

Finley finished with 119 yards on 10 carries; it was the first 100-yard game of his career. He, too, eclipsed Abercrombie's former school record for yards per carry in a game.

As a team, Baylor rushed for 426 yards on 42 carries. It was the third 400-yard rushing game in school history and the program's first since the Bears rushed for a school-record 482 yards at SMU in 1993, a game in which Baylor did not throw a pass.

Joe Pawelek led all players with 10 tackles.

Freshman quarterback **Robert Griffin** had accomplished a lot in his first two career starts. Leading the Bears to a fourth-quarter comeback in his third would only add to his lore. Griffin came up just short in that effort as Baylor dropped a heart-breaking 31-28 decision Friday at Connecticut on ESPN.

The game was billed as a showcase for Griffin and Connecticut running back Donald Brown, and neither disappointed.

Brown ran for 150 yards and two touchdowns, while Griffin threw for 208 yards and three touchdowns and ran for another. Griffin consistently scrambled his way out of trouble and drove the Bears to the UConn 39 with under a minute to play before his fourth-down pass fell incomplete, just past the out-stretched hands of a diving **Kendall Wright** along the left sideline.

UConn quarterback Tyler Lorenzen showed he also can run. Lorenzen carried the ball eight times for 73 yards and two touchdowns, including a 34-yard quarterback draw that gave the Huskies a 24-21 lead. He passed for 125 yards, but threw two interceptions.

There were six lead changes, the final one when Brown took a toss and ran 3 yards for a touchdown with just over 6 minutes remaining. The run completed a 30-yard drive set up by Connecticut's defense, which almost caught Griffin in the end zone for a safety. UConn instead forced a punt and got the ball back on the Baylor 30 after a kick-catch interference penalty was called on the Bears.

Griffin gave Baylor its final lead, 28-24, with 11:13 left when he hit Wright over the middle from 19 yards out. The drive appeared to be stopped when Danna Deleston made a diving interception at the UConn 20. But cornerback Darius Butler, who was blitzing on the play, was called for roughing Griffin, keeping the drive alive.

Wright had six catches for 114 yards and the score.

Griffin completed his first four passes, including a 16-yard touchdown toss to **Justin Akers**.

Brown carried seven times during a 12-play, 80-yard drive that tied it at 7 early in the second quarter. Lorenzen took the ball in on a 7-yard quarterback draw. Griffin found Akers again, running free over the middle from 14 yards out with 8:38 left in the half to make it 14-7.

UConn then went on an 11-play, 53-yard drive, giving the ball to Brown on eight of those plays, including the 1-yard plunge that tied it.
