Fisher, 'Noles hit the road for intersectional showdown

Florida State returns to Oklahoma for the first time in 35 years for a nationally-televised showdown (ABC, 3:30 p.m., ET) of nationally ranked teams. The Seminoles (No. 17 AP/No. 18 USA Today Coaches) carry their highest ranking in two seasons into the showdown with the Sooners (No. 10 AP/Coaches).

First-year FSU coach Jimbo Fisher (1-0) will try and score his first win against a nationally-ranked opponent. Ironically, his predecessor – College Football Hall of Fame coach Bobby Bowden – had the same opportunity when his first-year Seminoles visited No. 4 Oklahoma on Sept. 25, 1976. Bowden's Seminoles came up short 24-9 in the third game of his 34-year Florida State tenure.

Oklahoma leads the all-time series 4-1 and four of those meetings – including the last three – have come in the Orange Bowl. Current Sooners' coach Bob Stoops led his team to a 13-2 victory in the 2001 Orange Bowl, securing his storied programs' seventh national championship on Jan. 3, 2001 in the last meeting between the schools.

The Seminoles' lone victory over the Sooners came in the 1965 Gator Bowl, 36-19.

- The Seminoles are looking for their third road victory against a Top 10 opponent in their last four attempts. FSU defeated No. 7 BYU last season in Provo, Utah, 54-28, snapping the Cougars' 18-game home winning streak. In 2007, the Seminoles won at No. 2 Boston College, 27-17. Fisher was the offensive coordinator for both of those games.

- For the first time in Stoops family history, two of the four football-coaching brothers will square off on the field. First-year FSU

The Last Time They Met

MIAMI, FL - Case closed. The Oklahoma Sooners are more than OK, they're national champions.

A smothering defense shut down Florida State and Josh Heupel generated enough offense to give No. 1 Oklahoma a startling 13-2 victory in the Orange Bowl on Wednesday night and its first national title in 15 years.

Oklahoma (13-0) completed a perfect season and made the issue of a split title a moot point.

Finishing as the nation's only unbeaten team, the Sooners were automatically crowned national champs in the coaches' poll under the Bowl Championship Series format.

Oklahoma awaited The Associated Press media poll's release early Thursday, confirming the Sooners as undisputed champs.

No. 3 Florida State (11-2) came into the game as 10 1/2 point favorites and were hoping to become the first team to repeat as national champions since Nebraska in 1994-95. Had the Seminoles won, No. 2 Miami (11-1) would have staked a claim to a share of the title.

Heupel completed 25 of 39 passes for 214 yards and kept the Seminoles' defense off balance all night.

Tim Duncan kicked two field goals and Quentin Griffin scored the clinching touchdown on a 10 yard run up the middle with 8:30 left in the game. Florida State avoided its first shutout in 12 seasons when Stanford Samuels tackled Oklahoma punter Jeff Ferguson in the end zone for a safety with 55 seconds remaining.

Florida State got the ball back on the ensuing free kick, but Weinke's 29 yard pass into the end zone was intercepted by Ontei Jones with 16 seconds left and the celebration began.

After Heupel took a knee and the clock ran down, The Pride of Oklahoma Band broke out in yet another rendition of "Boomer Sooner" and the players and fans converged on the field to celebrate.

The Seminoles offense was a mess. Without All-American receiver Snoop Minnis, suspended for failing grades, and offensive coordinator Mark Richt perhaps preoccupied with his new job as Georgia's new coach, Florida State generated just 301 total yards, 248 under its average.

Weinke was 25 of 51 for 274 yards and two interceptions and a fumble. He did not throw a touchdown pass for the first time this season. Oklahoma's ferocious defense was the reason. Led by Orange Bowl MVP Torrance Marshall, the Sooners time and again forced Weinke into bad decisions. At least a half dozen passes were in the hands of Sooner defenders but dropped.

Marshall finished with 11 tackles, one interception and one batted ball. With Oklahoma ahead by only 6-0 in the fourth quarter, All-American linebacker Rocky Calmus made his presence felt. He knocked the ball out of Weinke's hands, safety Roy Williams recovered and two plays later, Griffin ran for his touchdown.

Series Notes

- **The Sooners used a 31-24 victory over Utah State on Saturday to extend their winning streak at the Gaylord Family – Oklahoma Memorial Stadium to 31 games.**
- **Oklahoma holds the longest winning streak in NCAA major college history with 47 consecutive triumphs between 1953-1957.**
- **Oklahoma has spent 97 weeks ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press Poll, the most of any major college program. Conversely, FSU has spent 60 weeks at No. 1, which ranks seventh all-time, ahead of Texas (45 weeks), Florida (41) and Alabama (39).**

About the Oklahoma Sooners

One of the most historic football programs in all of college football, Oklahoma claims seven National Championships, five Heisman trophy winners and 42 conference titles, including six Big 12 Championships. Head Coach Bob Stoops, now in his 12th season with the Sooners, has a 118-29 record. His second Oklahoma team defeated Florida State 13-2 in the Orange Bowl, securing the 2000 National Championship and kicking off a decade of dominance. The Sooners posted a 110-24 record this past decade. Sophomore quarterback Landry Jones, who started 10 games in 2009 following the season-ending injury to Sam Bradford, passed for 3,198 yards and 26 touchdowns to set a new freshman record. The Sooners had seven players selected in the 2010 NFL Draft, including four first-rounders led by Bradford, the No. 1 pick overall. Defensive tackle Gerald McCoy (No. 3), offensive tackle Trent Williams (No. 4) and tight end Jermaine Gresham (No. 19) followed suit. Oklahoma's offense is led by Landry, junior wide receiver Ryan Broyles and senior running back Demarco Murray, while end Jeremy Beal, linebacker Travis Lewis and safety Quinton Carter headline the defense.

Series History

Oklahoma leads the all-time series with Florida State, 4-1. The series dates back to the 1965 Gator Bowl, where FSU quarterback Steve Tensi and All-American wide receiver Fred Biletnikoff hooked up four four TD passes in the Seminoles' 36-19 win in Jacksonville. The Sooners have won the last four meetings, including a 24-9 triumph at home in 1976, which was FSU coach Bobby Bowden's first season. The last three meetings have taken place in the Orange Bowl. Oklahoma denied the 'Noles an unbeaten season in 1979 with a 24-7 win. A year later FSU carried a 10-1 record and a No. 2 ranking into the rematch but came up short, 18-17. Twenty years later, they met again in the 2001 Orange Bowl with the Sooners prevailing 13-2, denying FSU consecutive National Championships.

Florida State-Oklahoma connections

- Over 3,000 Florida Seminoles were forced to move west under Andrew Jackson's Indian Removal Act of 1830. Many of their ancestors moved to Oklahoma and became the present-day Seminole Nation of Oklahoma.
- FSU defensive coordinator Mark Stoops is the brother of Oklahoma head coach Bob Stoops. Bob Stoops was the Florida defensive coordinator from 1996 to 1998.
- Oklahoma assistant coach Josh Heupel was the starting quarterback for Sooners when they defeated FSU in the 2000 national title game. He was the Heisman runner-up to Chris Weinke. Heupel was on head coach Mike Stoops' Arizona staff in 2005, when Mark Stoops was the defensive coordinator.

The Highlights

- As FSU's offensive coordinator the past three seasons, the Seminoles have improved each season to rank among the ACC leaders in total offense
- Responsible for developing FSU QB Christian Ponder who, as a second-year starter, led the ACC in total offense and passing yards per game last season
- Offensive coordinator for the 2003 National Champion LSU Tigers
- Coached three LSU players selected in the first round of the 2007 NFL Draft including No. 1 overall pick JaMarcus Russell
- Five LSU quarterbacks in seven years were NFL Draft picks (Josh Booty, Rohan Davey, Craig Nall, Matt Mauck and Russell)
- Tigers posted a 70-20 record and went to seven bowl games with Fisher as offensive coordinator. The 70 wins and seven bowl appearances are the most in any seven-year stretch in LSU history
- While at LSU, the Tigers won two SEC titles and played in three BCS Bowl games

Fisher secures historic win No. 1

Jimbo Fisher, the ninth coach in Florida State's 64-year football history, became just the fourth man to make a winning debut when the Seminoles opened the 2010 season with a 59-6 victory over Samford on Sept. 4. That's something a pair of College Football Hall of Famers - Bobby Bowden and Darrell Mudra - did not accomplish. Neither did Ed Williamson, Tom Nugent or Perry Moss. Prior to Fisher's opening triumph, the last coach to lead FSU to victory in his first game was Larry Jones, whose Seminoles defeated Southern Miss, 24-9 on Sept. 11, 1971.

defensive coordinator Mark Stoops will be across the field from his brother Bob, the Sooners' head coach. Another brother, Mike, is the head coach at Arizona, while Ron is the secondary coach at Youngstown State. Their late father, Ron Sr., was an assistant coach at Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio.

• Oklahoma carries a 31-game winning streak at Gaylord Family-Oklahoma Memorial Stadium, which dates to a Sept. 1, 2005, 31-15 win over Tulsa. The Sooners are expected to tie a school record with their 70th consecutive home sellout.

It's a match-up of two of the nation's richest traditions. The Sooners secured their 800th career victory with a 31-24 win over Utah State last week. OU has seven national championships, 43 bowl appearances and 42 conference titles on its 115-year resume. Florida State has 467 wins in just 64 seasons to go along with two national titles, 39 bowl appearances - including a nation-leading streak of 28 consecutive appearances - and 12 ACC titles.

A season worth remembering

Christian Ponder's junior season was cut short by injury, but it remains one of the best quarterback campaigns in FSU history. By failing to play in 75 percent of the Seminoles' 13 games, he did not meet the minimum standards to qualify for the final NCAA rankings. That, however, did not prevent Ponder from posting the sixth-best season in ACC history for total offense (321.8 ypg), which put him in the company of former FSU greats and Heisman Trophy winners Charlie Ward and Chris Weinke, as well as NC State's Philip Rivers, Georgia Tech's Joe Hamilton and Boston College's Matt Ryan. Here's a look at how his 2009 campaign stacked up historically:

- His 2,717 passing yards ranked as the 13th-best season in school history;
- With 227 pass completions he tied Danny Kanell ('94) for the seventh-best season on the books;
- He tied the school record with three consecutive 300-yard passing games;
- His four 300-yard passing games ties him for 10th on the career list, and;
- Ponder's 68.8 completion percentage is second only to Charlie Ward's 69.5 in '93.

Taking aim on the record books

Ponder begins the 2010 season positioned to make a significant run up the Florida State career record books, although the Seminoles daunting schedule

will provide a significant challenge to that assault.

With 4,995 **career passing yards**, he currently ranks eighth in school history, but could become just the fourth Seminole to eclipse the 7,000-yard standard. Weinke's leading 9,839 yards appears to be safe, but Chris Rix (8,390) and Drew Weatherford (7,567) are approachable if Ponder authors a big finish. His next targets are:

- 7. **Charlie Ward (89-93) 5,747 yards**
- 6. **Thad Busby (94-97) 5,916 yards**

Ponder's best shot at establishing a new school record is likely for **career completions**. His 227 completions in '09, his career total to 424, which ranks seventh all-time. Front-runners Weinke (650) and Weatherford (644) are well within striking distance for Ponder, who should be among the top five in short order. Next up:

- 6. **Gary Huff (70-72) 436**
- 5. **Charlie Ward (89-93) 473**

As a dual-threat behind center, Ponder figures to make significant headway up the **career total offense** list. His 5,655 yards entering the Oklahoma games ranks eight all-time at FSU. Once again Weinke (9,473) and Rix (9,213) are way out in front, but third-ranked Weatherford (7,604) should be in Ponder's cross-hairs. That march starts with:

- 7. **Thad Busby (94-97) 5,883**

FSU tabbed Atlantic favorite; Ponder preseason POY pick

GREENSBORO, N.C. – Once again Florida State football was the ACC Football Kickoff media's choice to win the Atlantic Division and advance to the league championship game.

The Seminoles garnered 78 first place votes from a record 98 voters at the Grandover Resort. Monday's announcement marked the 18th time in 19 seasons of Atlantic Coast Conference membership that Florida State was selected to win either the division or outright league title.

Florida State senior quarterback Christian Ponder was the runaway winner in preseason balloting for ACC Player of the Year honors. Ponder collected 45 votes and easily out-distanced Virginia Tech tailback Ryan Williams (16).

"It's all expectation and it creates a different perspective on how you deal with having success," first-year coach FSU Jimbo Fisher said of the media vote. "I guess we're always going to be there. I don't put a lot of stock in [preseason polls] all the time because each team has its own personality."

Fisher said he does appreciate the fact that the Seminoles enter the 2010 season as the divisional favorite, despite coming off a 7-6 season.

"I think that's good," Fisher said. "Some people say, 'Well, that high expectations.' That's what you want. You want expectations. You can't run from expectations, but you learn how to deal with it and remember that expectation doesn't win a game. It's what you do on the field, how you play and how you prepare to play. That's the message I still want to make sure we send; that we prepare to have success and we follow the process the results will be there."

Virginia Tech was selected as both the favorite to win the Coastal Division and defeat Florida State at the December 4 ACC Championship game, which will be played in Charlotte, N.C. for the first time.

Ponder said winning an ACC championship is something he expected to do – more than once – in his Florida State career.

"It is where we want to be," Ponder said. "Our whole goal is to reach that ACC Championship game and win it all. That's why I'm here at Florida State, to win it all."

The Colleyville, Texas native admitted he was a bit surprised to be tabbed as a heavy favorite to capture Player of the Year honors. Quarterback Chris Weinke was the last FSU player to claim the honor in 2000.

6. Gary Huff (70-72) 6,086

The *career 300-yard passing games* standard held by Weinke (14) could be a tempting carrot, considering Ponder averaged 301 yards a game in '09, but there's a long climb from his four – which is tied for 10th - to the top, but multiple ties along the way. In order, the list reads:

- 9. Bill Cappleman (67-69) 5
- 8. Charlie Ward (89-93) 6

Weinke's 79 *career touchdown passes* is virtually untouchable into the foreseeable future, especially for Ponder, who trails the 2000 Heisman Trophy winner by a whopping 46. With 33 career TD tosses ties Ponder with Peter Tom Willis for 12th all-time, but he could move into the top five, which must begin with:

- 11. Chip Ferguson (85-88) 34
- 10. Drew Weatherford (04-07) 37

Among other marks Ponder could challenge as he closes his career, one is especially important as he hopes to deliver the Seminoles back into the national spotlight. With 14 *career victories*, he ranks 10th on FSU's all-time list. With the top two spots statistically unattainable, Ward's 22 triumphs as a starting quarterback would be a prime target. Ponder doesn't have far to go to reach the top for *career completion percentage*, entering the season ranked second and just .4 percent behind Ward' 62.3 percent.

FSU QB experience second to none

Heisman Trophy candidate Christian Ponder (23 games played/4,828 career yards passing) and Gator Bowl MVP EJ Manuel (7 games played/817 career yards passing) return as one of the most experienced quarterback tandems in all of college football. Their productivity led *Sporting News* to select Florida State's quarterbacks as the top unit in the country for the 2010 season. While Manuel led the Seminoles past No. 18 West Virginia, 33-21 in the 2010 Gator Bowl, Ponder guided the team to a 42-13 victory over Wisconsin in the 2008 Champs Sports Bowl. Over the past three seasons Ponder and Manuel have combined for 5,645 passing yards and 31 touchdowns.

Offensive Notes:

Jones rolls for 107 in opener

Florida State junior running back Ty Jones

rushed for a 107 yards and one touchdown in the Seminoles' 59-6 victory over Samford. It marked the second consecutive game a Seminole back has eclipsed the century mark, following Jermaine Thomas' 121-yard performance in FSU's Gator Bowl victory over West Virginia. Jones' 107-yard effort was the 13th of 100 or more by an FSU back dating to the 2007 season. FSU is 9-4 in games when a Seminole runs for 100 or more yards.

Jones averages a Baker's Dozen

With 107 rushing yards on just eight carries, junior tailback Ty Jones averaged 13.4 yards a carry in the Seminoles' win over Samford. He did the bulk of his damage with a 57-yard touchdown run for FSU's eighth touchdown of the game, which pushed the lead to 49-6. The scoring burst was Jones' longest career run from scrimmage, even though he has shown a knack for breaking off large chunks of real estate at a time. He needed just 12 carries to post a career-high 108 yards (9.0 ypc) in last season's 54-28 win at BYU. In his career-high 108-yard rushing performance at BYU last season. Jones capped his freshman season with 55 yards on four carries (13.8) against Wisconsin in the Champs Sports Bowl, including his previous long TD run of 14 yards.

No loss of yardage here

Florida State's four primary ball carriers - Ty Jones, Jermaine Thomas, Chris Thompson and Debrale Smiley – combined for 21 carries for 164 yards against Samford (7.8 ypc), behind the Seminoles' veteran offensive line. Even more impressive, none of them were dropped behind the line of scrimmage for negative yards by the Bulldogs defense.

FSU backs finding the paint

For the fourth time in Florida State's last five games the Seminoles rumbled into the end zone three times for rushing touchdowns against Samford. Starter Jermaine Thomas, who led the 'Noles with nine rushing touchdowns in 2009, broke the plane first and was followed by Ty Jones and Chris Thompson. Beginning with its 41-28 win at Wake Forest on Nov. 14, 2009, FSU closed out last season with three rushing scores against the Demon Deacons, four against Maryland and three more against West Virginia in the Gator Bowl.

QBs connect with remarkable accuracy

Florida State Heisman Trophy candidate Christian Ponder (12-14-1, .857) and EJ Manuel (10-13-1, .769) made a serious run at the single-game school mark for completion percentage against Samford. They combined to complete .815 percent (22 of 27) against the Bulldogs, which ranks among the best days in school history. Ponder was responsible for the single-game, team completion percentage mark last season at North Carolina when he went 33 of 40 (.825) on Oct. 22, 2009 in a 30-27, come-from-behind victory.

Ponder working on completion streak

Christian Ponder carries a streak of 10 consecutive completions into the Oklahoma game. The fifth-year senior played only one half against Samford and was at his best in the second quarter. The Texas native was a perfect six of six for 76 yards and three touchdowns, after completing his final four attempts of the first quarter, including a 4-yard scoring toss to Lonnie Pryor. EJ Manuel played most of the second half before redshirt freshman Will Secord came in for the final series.

Spreading the ball around

Four different FSU receivers were the recipients of Christian Ponder's 12 first half completions as he moved the ball around generously against Samford. Fullback Lonnie Pryor collected three receptions for 23 yards and two touchdowns, while wideout Taiwan Easterling also caught three balls for 39 yards and a score. Bert Reed and Chris Thompson added two receptions each. EJ Manuel was even better in the second half, spreading his 10 completions among eight different receivers. In all, nine Seminoles finished the day with at least one reception.

Reed leads all receivers in opener

Junior wide receiver Bert Reed caught a team-high five passes for 50 yards and one touchdown in the Seminoles' victory over Samford. Reed also got back in to the scoring column with a receiving touchdown in the second quarter, which gave the Seminoles a 14-0 lead. The Panama City native caught 60 passes for 710 yards last season – tops among returnees – but finally found his way into the end zone by collecting a 15-yard strike from Christian Ponder early in the second quarter. It was his first touchdown recep-

tion since Oct. 16, 2008 against N.C.

State – a span of 21 games – and just the fourth of his career.

Easterling: From Diamond to Gridiron

Junior wide receiver Taiwan Easterling, who has caught 65 passes for 764 yards and three touchdowns as a Seminole football player, was a member of Florida State's ACC Championship baseball team which advanced to the College World Series in Omaha, Neb. As a receiver for the 2009 football team he posted career-highs for receptions (35) and yards (442) as the Seminoles capped the season by winning the 2010 Gator Bowl. A reserve outfielder for the baseball team in 2010, he played in 23 games and earned 23 at bats. Despite not participating in spring practice with the football team, Easterling is expected to start in the opener against Samford.

Offensive Line paves the way

Florida State's offensive line, generally considered one of the top starting units in all of college football, helped the Seminoles pile up 5,478 total yards and 43 touchdowns during the 2009 season. Florida State ranked second in the ACC and 28th in the nation in total offense (421.4 yards per game). The Seminoles were third in the ACC (25th nationally) in passing offense (271.8 ypg) and fourth in the ACC (59th nationally) in rushing offense (149.5 ypg). FSU has improved its total offense output each of the past three seasons. Senior guard Rodney Hudson and senior center Ryan McMahon enter

their fourth season as starters, while tackles Andrew Datko and Zebrie Sanders and guard David Spurlock - all juniors - are third-year starters who have contributed significantly to that improvement. Collectively the unit boasts 147 career starts.

Hudson in elite ACC company

All-American offensive guard Rodney Hudson enters the 2010 season looking to become only the seventh player in ACC history to earn All-ACC honors in each of his four seasons. He earned All-ACC First Team honors in 2008 and 2009 and All-ACC Second Team honors in 2007. Only one player - Ted Brown of NC State - has earned All-ACC First Team honors in each of his four seasons. Only six players - three non-kickers - have earned All-ACC First or Second Team honors entering the 2010 season. Two of the players who have earned All-ACC honors four times are Seminoles - Travis Minor and Brett Williams - making FSU the only ACC school with multiple four-time selections.

Iron Ryan eyes perfection

Fifth-year senior center Ryan McMahon has battled injury and bigger opponents throughout his career, but remains the rock in the middle of position coach Rick Trickett's segment. McMahon, who made the transition from defensive tackle to center in 2007, is working on a string of 40 consecutive starts entering the Oklahoma game. A Rimington Award candidate for a third consecutive season, McMahon is poised to become Florida State's all-time leader in games started and played. Over the course of his career he has handled all but a handful of snaps to start the Seminole offense.

Thomas hoping to double-up

Junior running back Jermaine Thomas, who led the Seminoles with a career-high 832 rushing yards in 2009, returns to a very productive backfield rotation. Thomas' rushing total was the most by a Seminole since Leon Washington rushed for 951 yards during the 2004 season. Thomas enters the 2010 season looking to lead the Seminoles in rushing for a second consecutive season, which would mark the 10th time for an FSU player since 1990 and 1991. Six Florida State players have led the team in rushing in consecutive seasons since the 1990 and 1991 seasons, including Travis Minor, who led the Seminoles in rushing in four consecutive seasons (1997-2000).

Top seven rushers return

Led by Jermaine Thomas, the Seminoles' top seven rushers are back on the roster

for the 2010 season. Thomas (832 yards) leads a pack of players including Ty Jones (251), EJ Manuel (196), Christian Ponder (179), Lonnie Pryor (156), Chris Thompson (120) and Bert Reed (94). They combined for 1,828 yards last season. In all, returning Seminoles produced 1,839 of last season's 1,944 yards (94.6 percent). The Seminoles lost only one runner (Tavares Pressley to injury) who gained more than 50 yards rushing in 2009.

Offense operates with Ginsu precision

Florida State returns 10 starters from its 2009 offense, which at time was also the Seminoles' best defense. With quarterbacks Christian Ponder and EJ Manuel at the controls, FSU put together 21 scoring drives of 10 or more plays; 14 of which resulted in touchdowns. It registered a season-best 17-play TD drive at BYU which covered 86 yards and chewed a season-high 8:19 off the clock - one of four on the day the win in Provo, Utah. The Seminoles' proficiency was easily identifiable in other quantitative ways as well. Their furthest sustained drive covered 98 yards in 12 plays, resulting in a TD against NC State. Of the 21 double-digit scoring drives, 15 of them extended five minutes or longer. On the season the 'Noles put together three scoring drives of 90 or more yards, eight between 80-89 yards, 10 between 70-79 yards and 14 from 60-69 yards.

Getting behind the enemy's line

Florida State registered 10 tackles for loss against Samford for a total of minus-47 yards. The Seminoles only hit double-digit tackles for loss twice all last season, with the high of 11 coming against Maryland. FSU posted three against Miami in last year's opener.

Seminoles double their sack pleasure

The Seminoles registered four sacks in Saturday's season opener against Samford; a significant upgrade from their 2009 standards. FSU managed just 26 sacks in 13 games last season – two a game – and managed more than four sacks only twice. Defensive ends Bjoern Werner and Brandon Jenkins combined for 1 ½ sacks against the Bulldogs. Last season, FSU ends totaled just four sacks on the season.

Amp it up

Redshirt sophomore defensive tackle Anthony "Amp" McCloud didn't take long to make an impact at FSU. The junior college transfer tied for the team lead in tackles – along with veteran leader Nigel Bradham – against Samford. McCloud, a former star at Thomasville (Ga.) County Central, had four solo stops and finished with six. Bradham, last season's team leader in tackles, also added six stops, including four solos.

Jenije makes move to free safety

Fifth-year senior Ochuko Jenije came into the season as the lone returning secondary starter for the Seminoles, after starting all 13 contests in 2009 at cornerback. The second-year graduate school student made his 14th consecutive start against Samford, but this one came at free safety. The Tallahassee native seems to have found a home in first-year FSU defensive coordinator Mark Stoops' scheme. He had three tackles against Samford from his new position.

Harris gets season's first takeaway

Just like fellow junior college transfer Anthony McCloud, cornerback Mike Harris showed up to play in his first game as a 'Nole. Used primarily as the third cornerback in nickel situations for the FSU defense, Harris intercepted a pass from Samford's Dustin Taliaferro midway through the second quarter. The Miami native, who came to FSU from El Camino

(Cal.) Community college returned the theft 10 yards to the Samford eight.

Quarterback Christian Ponder tossed an 8-yard touchdown pass to Lonnie Pryor on the very next play to give the Seminoles a 35-0 lead.

Triumphant return for Williams

Redshirt sophomore middle linebacker Vince Williams, who was forced to miss all of 2009 with a back injury, made his grand return against the Bulldogs in the opener. Williams appeared to be around the ball all afternoon and finished third on the team with five tackles and also added a quarterback hurry. His four solo stops also shared the team lead.

A reason to call him Mister

Florida State senior linebacker Mister Alexander has spent much of his career battling injuries while jockeying between the safety and outside linebacker positions. But a breakthrough 2009 campaign as a reserve linebacker has opened the door for him to open 2010 as the starting strongside linebacker. Alexander finished the '09 season with only 17 tackles, but he made the most of them. The Aldine, Texas native is FSU's top returner with five quarterback sacks and ranks third with six tackles for loss; numbers which should improve with more playing time for one of the Seminoles most athletic players. Alexander had three tackles, but one of those was behind the line against Samford.

Reid-y for the big time ... on defense

Greg Reid burst on to the scene as a true freshman last year thanks to his electrifying ability to make magic happen in the return game. Reid made his first career start at cornerback against Samford and delivered four tackles (3 solos) and a touchdown-denying, pass break-up in the end zone.

Special Teams Notes:

Reid off to the races

The goal for Samford's special teams unit was to keep the ball away from No. 5 Greg Reid. After being successful at their plan for most of the afternoon, the Bulldogs allowed the nation's top punt returner to field one punt, and the rest was history. With 8:17 remaining in the second quarter, Reid fielded a punt toward the right sideline at the FSU 26 and scampered for a 74-yard touchdown, tying for

the 12th-longest return in school history. It was the second career punt-return touchdown for the Valdosta, Ga., native, who also had a 68-yard TD return last season against Wake Forest.

No punting for Powell

Junior punter Shawn Powell is ready for a big season with the Seminoles, as the 6-foot-4, 235-pound specialist has his sights set on the Ray Guy Award. However, Powell will wait for his chance to get on the field in week two after not registering a punt in FSU's 59-6 win over Samford. It is the first time the Seminoles have not punted in a game since Nov. 7, 1992, when they defeated Maryland 69-21 on Homecoming Day.

Touchback territory

Sophomore kicker Dustin Hopkins showed off his booming leg in FSU's season-opening win, recording six touchbacks in 10 kickoff attempts. The Houston, Texas, native totaled 68.2 yards per kickoff, as well as 47.2 net yards. Hopkins prevented Samford from gaining advantageous field position, as the Bulldogs started on their 21-yard line on average. In all seven of his kickoffs reached the end zone and an eighth reached the 1-yard line as Hopkins averaged 4.2 seconds of hang time. He also connected on all eight point-after attempts, and made his only field goal attempt (24 yards) to finish with 11 points.

Special teams were just that - special

Florida State's special teams units got off to an auspicious beginning last weekend against Samford. Perhaps the most impressive aspects were the punt return and punt block units. Aside from Reid's 74-yard touchdown return on his first touch of the season, FSU also registered a punt block at Samford's 16-yard line by tailback Chris Thompson, which was recovered by safety Terrance Parks. The turnover led to an FSU touchdown two plays later. Thompson's big play was FSU's first blocked punt since the 2008 season, when former standout Dekoda Watson blocked one against Colorado on Sept. 27, 2008, in a 39-21 victory

Hopkins' hot start

In many cases, the most pressure-packed position in football is the place kicker. Should FSU need to rely on the leg of Dustin Hopkins, chances are the outcome will be favorable for the Seminoles. In his

young career, Hopkins is 20 of 28 in field goal attempts, making nearly 72 percent of his tries. Although he does not yet qualify for the school's career list, his field goal percentage would put him in fourth place behind Seminole greats Sebastian Janikowski, Gary Cismesia and Xavier Bietia. Hopkins is already tied for 12th on the school's single-game list for longest field goals, nailing a 52-yard attempt in last year's season-opener versus Miami.

A new Block Party begins

Special teams coordinator Eddie Gran is widely regarded as one of the best in the business, and his units got off to a great start in the 2010 opener. Chris Thompson's second quarter blocked punt against Samford set up a touchdown and continued FSU's long-standing reputation as one of the most dangerous programs in the nation when it comes to blocking kicks. Throughout Bobby Bowden's tenure (1976-2009) the Seminoles combined for 128 blocked punts and kicks, often coming at the most opportune time.
