TIGERS, SOONERS SQUARE OFF IN BATTLE OF 1ST-PLACE TEAMS

After successfully navigating a road trip for the first time this season, thanks to a solid 30-9 win at Texas A&M last Saturday, the Missouri Tigers (6-0 overall, 2-0 in Big 12 Conference play) return home for a game with a rather large stature. The Tigers will play host to the Oklahoma Sooners (6-0, 2-0) Saturday night at Faurot Field/Memorial Stadium, in a nationally-televised ABC game which will kick off at 7:00 p.m.

Both teams stand in first place in their division, as the Tigers are the only undefeated team remaining in the North Division, both overall, as well as in league play. The Sooners are tied atop the South Division standings entering Saturday, with their in-state rival Oklahoma State.

But the national landscape is just as prominent in this matchup as pecking order within the Big 12 Conference. Missouri comes into the game ranked 11th in the BCS rankings, released for the first time this season on Sunday evening. The Tigers also find themselves ranked 16th in the USA Today Coaches poll, and 18th in the Associated Press rankings.

The Sooners come to Columbia toting the #1 BCS ranking with them, thanks to their perfect start to the season, which included a very impressive 52-0 whitewashing of Iowa State this past Saturday in Norman, Okla. In the human polls, Oklahoma enters Saturday's game ranked third in both the USA Today Coaches' poll, as well as the Associated Press poll.

BIG WEEKEND IN STORE WITH HOMECOMING & ESPN GAMEDAY

It's Homecoming Week at Ol' Mizzou — the birthplace of the Homecoming tradition, when it began on the MU campus in 1911 (more on that later) — and if that wasn't enough to stir the excitement for Tiger alumni and fans, it was announced on Sunday that the wildly-popular ESPN College GameDay show will originate from the Mizzou campus for the first time ever.

The set will be constructed at Francis Quadrangle, and Tiger fans are encouraged to come out in droves to show their support for the Tigers, as well as the GameDay show. ESPN officials have said that the biggest crowd ever assembled for a Saturday GameDay show was 15,800 at Nebraska, so Tiger fans have the bar set high.

Saturday's show will air live from 8-9 a.m. on ESPN-U, and then it will swith over to ESPN, where it will continue live from The Quad from 9-11 a.m.

It will be the perfect opportunity for Tiger fans already used to coming downtown Saturday morning for the annual Homecoming Parade, as Mizzou Alumni Association officials have graciously agreed to push back the start time of the parade to accommodate fans who want to make a big showing at GameDay. With final details still to be determined, the Homecoming parade will not start until shortly after the conclusion of the GameDay window, which ends at 11 a.m.

Mizzou has been part of the feature GameDay (which began in 1993 with a Florida State-at Notre Dame contest) game four times previously — all away from home. Three of the appearances came during Mizzou's magical 2007 season, as the Tigers were part of GameDay for games at Oklahoma, versus rival Kansas at Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium, and again versus Oklahoma in a rematch as part of the Big 12 Championship Game in San Antonio's Alamodome. The last appearance with GameDay was in 2008 at Texas. Mizzou went 1-3 in those games, claiming the win over 2nd-ranked Kansas in an epic 36-28 game which propelled the Tigers to #1 in the BCS and virtually every poll around.

Of course, one of the most talked-about features of GameDay is the weekly head gear segment, where analyst and former Coach Lee Corso dons the headgear of the mascot from the school he feels will win the game. For the history buffs out there, Coach Corso has put on Truman the Tiger's head twice in the previous four MU GameDay appearances — in 2007 versus Kansas and at the 2007 Big 12 Championship Game.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

BCS RANKING IS HIGHEST DEBUT POSITION FOR MIZZOU

When the first BCS ranking came out this Sunday, it had Mizzou ranked at #11 overall, and that represented the highest debut position ever for the Tigers.

Since the BCS rankings originated in 2000, Mizzou has made the initial list three times previously, including three straight years, from 2006-08.

Here's a quick look at that those three years:

- 2006 — Debuted at #24 in initial BCS ranking; unranked in final ranking
- 2007 — Debuted at #16 in initial BCS ranking; finished 6th in final ranking
- 2008 — Debuted at #15 in initial BCS ranking; finished 21st in final ranking

HOMECOMING RETURNS TO ITS BIRTHPLACE AT MIZZOU

Legend says that the Homecoming tradition got its start at the University of Missouri in 1911, thanks to the vision and efforts of Chester L. Brewer, MU's Director of Athletics at the time. Although Illinois staged a similar celebration in 1910, Missouri claims its 1911 effort as the first formal Homecoming celebration surrounding a football game.

That year, the Missouri-Kansas game was to be played on a college campus for the first time ever. Previously, the game had been played in either Kansas City or St. Joseph, and Missouri trailed in the series by a 12-5-3 count at the time.

Brewer wanted to add some spice to the season-ending game in Columbia, so he issued a plea to Mizzou alumni and especially to former Tiger football players to "Come Home" for the game. They did just that, with a record crowd of 9,000 overflowing old Rollins Field.

With four minutes to play, and MU trailing by three, Tiger captain Glen Shuck booted a tying field goal from a difficult angle. Then, little Billy Blees caught a rampaging KU fullback in the open field in the final seconds to preserve the tie, and was carried off the field a hero.

Hence, "Homecoming" was born. MU has a 56-37-5 record in Homecoming games over the years. Not surprisingly, rival Kansas has been its most common opponent for the game — with MU holding an 18-7-2 edge in 27 such meetings — although the two did not meet on Homecoming from 1960 until 2000 in Columbia.

Saturday's opponent, Oklahoma, has served as MU's Homecoming opponent 14 times previously, and Mizzou holds an 8-6 overall mark against the Sooners for Homecoming. That includes getting a win over OU in the last time the Sooners were the Homecoming opponent — in 1998 (a 20-6 MU win).

MIZZOU GETS COMPLETE EFFORT IN 30-9 WIN AT TEXAS A&M

Mizzou improved to 6-0 (2-0 in Big 12 Conference play) last Saturday, as it earned an impressive 30-9 win at Texas A&M, in what marked the very first road game of the season for the Tigers. Despite being the very last of the 120 FBS schools to play a road game in 2010, the Tigers put together perhaps their most complete outing of the season, as all phases of the game contributed heavily to the win.

The Tigers entered the game as underdogs, but never played like it. The defense held A&M's explosive offense in check for most of the first half, and the Tigers' offense clicked to the tune of a 16-0 halftime lead, thanks to a Blaine Gabbert-to-Wes Kemp TD pass in the 1st quarter (5 yards, point after was blocked), followed by a 2-yard TD run by Texas native TB Kendial Lawrence (2 yards). A Grant Ressel 21-yard field goal with :05 seconds left in the half put the Tigers on top 16-0.

A&M began the third quarter by putting together a promising drive that reached MU territory, but the Tiger defense stiffened and sacked Aggie QB Jerrod Johnson on three straight plays to end the threat. Mizzou QB Blaine Gabbert then led the offense on a crisp drive that ended with his 10-yard TD pass to Kemp to make it 23-0 with 7:25 left. After an Aggie field goal to break the shutout, the offense responded with another TD drive to make it 30-3, thanks to Gabbert's 3rd TD of the day, a 20-yarder to WR T.J. Moe.

The Aggies were able to find the endzone eventually in the 4th quarter, on a 26-yard TD pass, but the game was long over by that point. At the end of the 3rd quarter, the ballgame was well in hand, as MU held a 30-3 lead, and had outgained the Aggies by a 394-to-204 margin in total offense.

For the game, the Tiger offense put up 417 total yards, while A&M managed 379, but 175 of that came in mop-up time in the 4th quarter.

GABBERT, MADISON, GRABNER WERE MU STANDOUTS AT A&M

Our picks for players of the week in Mizzou's 30-9 win at Texas A&M included QB Blaine Gabbert on offense, DE Brad Madison on defense and P Matt Grabner for special teams...

- Gabbert had the Mizzou offense humming along nicely, and that was a key to the Tigers' 30-9 win at Texas A&M on Saturday, a win which moved MU to 6-0 for only the 5th time in program history (first since 2006). Gabbert, playing despite suffering a high hip pointer last week against Colorado, completed 31-of-47 passes for 361 yards and 3 TDs (tying a career high in scores)...

- With the outcome of the game in the balance, Gabbert was at his best. He directed the Tigers to a 16-0 halftime lead, thanks to a crisp 22-of-33 first-half performance, for 233 yards and 1 TD. In MU's opening drive of the 3rd quarter, Gabbert was 4-of-6 for 76 yards and a TD that effectively killed any chance of A&M getting back into the game, as it gave MU a commanding 23-0 lead. To that point, Gabbert's numbers read 26-of-39 for 309 yards and 2 TDs, and he attempted only 5 passes in the final quarter-and-a-half as the Tigers cruised to the big win...

- Madison continued his outstanding and disruptive work as he racked up a career-high 3 QB sacks off the bench of Texas A&M's Jerrod Johnson in Mizzou's 30-9 win on the road. He totaled 28 yards in losses for the three sacks, and his efforts were indicative of a great day of pressure applied by the Tiger defense as a whole. Mizzou notched 7 sacks in all on the elusive Johnson...

- Madison's contributions were much welcomed, as the Tiger defense played its 3rd-straight game without the services of 2009 Big 12 Defensive Freshman/Newcomer of the Year Aldon Smith, who has been out suffering a cracked fibula at the end of the San Diego State game on Sept. 18th...

- Madison now has a team-best 4.0 sacks on the year (34 yards), and he ranks 4th in the Big 12 Conference, and 44th nationally, in the category. He also has 7.0 tackles for loss on the year (of his 13 total tackles), and he ranks 5th in the league and 61st nationally in that category, as well...

- The Tiger defense managed a whopping 7 sacks of Aggie QB Jerrod Johnson, and that propelled Mizzou up the national rankings to #4 in sacks, with a new average of 3.33 per game...

- Grabner continued his outstanding work in his first year on the field for Missouri, as he averaged 43.3 yards per punt on 6 attempts in Mizzou's 30-9 win at Texas A&M. His work early on in the game was crucial to the Tigers keeping the Aggies pinned deep in their own territory, as his first kick traveled 46 yards and was returned just 2 yards to the Aggie 14-yardline. His second kick went 50 yards and was downed at the Aggie 7-yardline...

- Three of Grabner's punts on Saturday ended up inside the Aggie 20-yardline. For the season, 11 of Grabner's 26 punts have ended inside the opponent 20-yardline, and his average of 43.15 yards per punt ranks him 33rd nationally...

- Grabner's work is best noticed by Mizzou's net punting average, which is now 41.04 for the season as a team after Saturday's performance. That average ranks the Tigers 6th in the country (1st in the Big 12 Conference) in team net punting, one season after MU ranked 4th nationally (40.48 avg.) in the same category in 13 games in 2009...

MORE NEWS & NOTES FROM A&M VICTORY

Some random musings about Mizzou's 30-9 win last Saturday at Texas A&M...

- Mizzou's win over A&M rings even more impressive considering the fact that the Aggies didn't turn the ball over once (neither did the Tigers, for that matter). A&M came into the game having turned the ball over 18 times in their previous 4 games, but the explosive Aggie offense was held in check by Mizzou's underappreciated defense, which pitched a shutout until 2:32 left in the 3rd quarter, when A&M kicked a 24-yard field goal to make it 23-3...

- Coupled with MU's shutout of Colorado the week before, the Tiger defense strung together 6 consecutive shutout quarters against conference opposition, and that marked the longest string of shutout quarters against league foes by MU since 1967, when the Tigers shutout Oklahoma in the final half of a 7-0 loss, before MU shutout Oklahoma State the next week in a 7-0 Tiger win...

- Junior WR Wes Kemp had a huge day, as he caught a career-high 10 passes for 89 yards and 2 TDs. Kemp's previous career-high in receptions was 4 (several times), and it marked his first multi-TD game of his career. Kemp nearly doubled his season reception total on Saturday, as he entered the game with 13 catches for 142 yards and 1 TD. He also had a potential 3rd TD reception taken away by replay, as he was ruled to have scored initially late in the 2nd quarter on a catch-and-run just before halftime, but replay officials overturned the call and said he was down before crossing the goalline...

- Kemp was joined in double figure receptions by TE Michael Egnew, who added 10 catches of his own for 87 yards. Egnew now ranks 4th in the Big 12, and 6th nationally (1st among all tight ends) with his 8.17 receptions per game average (49 catches, 437 yards, 3 TDs in all)...

- Sophomore WR T.J. Moe caught a season-low 6 passes at A&M, but he was still very effective, as he turned those catches into 110 yards and 1 TD, including a nice 20-yard score at the end of the 3rd quarter that made it 30-3.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

Moe ranks 3rd in the Big 12, and 5th nationally, with his 8.33 receptions per game, and his yardage average of 98.17 is 3rd in the league and 9th nationally so far. For the season, Moe has 50 catches for 589 yards and 3 TDs...

• — True freshman TB Marcus Murphy had a nice day returning kickoffs, as he ran back 3 kicks for 28.7 yards on average, going for 86 yards total. He returned the opening kick of the game for 25 yards, and then had a 39-yarder (tying a season-best) in the 3rd quarter that he nearly broke for the distance. He now ranks 7th in the Big 12 and 73rd nationally with an average of 23.11 yards per kickoff return...

TIGERS GUNNING FOR 1ST 7-0 START SINCE 1960

It's been a full 50 years since the Missouri Tigers have started a season 7-0, but that's just what the 2010 squad will be shooting for this Saturday when they play host to 3rd-ranked Oklahoma. After moving to 6-0 for only the 5th time in school history, after last week's impressive 30-9 win at Texas A&M, Mizzou is looking for its first 7-0 start since 1960.

That 1960 team — which actually was honored with a player/coach reunion earlier this season — has been considered one of the top teams in school history. That's thanks to an 11-0 season that saw them win the first of two eventual Big Eight Conference titles under Hall of Fame Coach Dan Devine (the other came in 1969). Devine's 1960 Mizzou squad rose to #1 in the rankings late in the season, only to suffer a loss in the regular-season finale to rival Kansas (23-7), which was later forfeited back to MU thanks to the use of ineligible players by the Jayhawks. Mizzou recovered to beat 4th-ranked Navy in the 1961 Orange Bowl, 21-14, and finished with a #5 national ranking.

Mizzou's current 6-0 start is only the 5th in school history (1899, 1960, 1973, 2006, 2010). The 1899 squad was the only Tiger team other than the 11-0 1960 team to win game #7.

Under Head Coach Gary Pinkel, Mizzou has managed to start 5-0 four times in the past five years (2006, 2007, 2008 and 2010), and those four make up nearly half of the 10 times in MU history MU has started 5-0.

Here's a look at the previous seasons in which MU has started a season 7-0, with the 1st number in parentheses the start and the 2nd number the end record for the season...

- - 1899 (7-0 / 9-2)
- - 1960 (11-0 / 11-0)#-Won Big Eight Championship

AND THEN THERE WERE 10 (UNDEFEATEDS)

Entering this week's games, Mizzou stands as one of 10 undefeated teams left standing. Seven teams entered the week at a perfect 6-0, with another six touting 5-0 marks. Four of the unbeaten hail from the Big 12 Conference, with Nebraska, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State also checking in at an unblemished 5-0.

We know going into the week that at least two undefeated teams will be knocked out, as two games feature battles of unbeaten teams, including the Mizzou-Oklahoma game, as well as LSU at Auburn. Just how many are left standing unbeaten come Sunday is up for grabs. Here's a look at the undefeated teams:

TIGERS RANK 1ST IN BIG 12, 2ND IN NCAA IN SCORING DEFENSE

A glance at the latest batch of statistics shows that Mizzou's improved defense leads the Big 12 Conference, and ranks 2nd in the nation, in scoring defense. Through 6 games, the Tigers, under 2nd-year Defensive Coordinator Dave Steckel, are allowing an average of just 10.83 points per game. TCU currently leads the nation with a 9.29 average, followed by Mizzou at #2, then Boise State (#3, 12.33), West Virginia (#3, 12.33) and Alabama (#5, 12.86).

While pitching a shutout against the Buffaloes undoubtedly helped propel the Tigers up the rankings, it wasn't a one-game deal, as Mizzou entered the CU game ranked 10th nationally in scoring defense. Mizzou entered the CU game allowing 14.0 points per game.

That was followed with a stifling defensive effort that held Texas A&M's potent offense to a season-low 9 points on their home field. A&M came into the game averaging 35.00 points per game (ranked 27th in NCAA). Mizzou held the Aggies to 379 yards of offense, nearly 100 yards below their average of 472.60 coming in, which ranked them 15th nationally in total offense at the time.

The 65 points allowed by MU through 6 games is the lowest by a Tiger defense since the 1973 season, when Mizzou permitted 49 points in its first 6 games (also a 6-0 start).

TIGER RED ZONE DEFENSE ALSO TIED FOR 1ST NATIONALLY

It would stand to figure that a good scoring defense performs well in the red zone, and that has definitely been the case for Mizzou's defense to this point. Through 6 games, Mizzou's defense is tied for 1st nationally in red zone defense, as opponents have scored just 53% of the time they've gotten inside the 20-yardline. Here's a look at the details:

The 8 scores allowed have been split evenly, between 4 TDs and 4 FGs. Illinois was 2-of-2 in the red zone against Mizzou (1 TD/1 FG), while McNeese State was 1-of-2 (1 TD). San Diego State and Miami (Ohio) each went 2-of-3 against MU (1 TD/1 FG apiece), while Colorado was shut out all 3 times (1 missed FG, 1 blocked FG, 1 stopped on downs). Last Saturday at Texas A&M, Mizzou's defense allowed only 2 redzone penetrations, with the Aggies converting one into a field goal, and being stopped on downs on the other threat.

COMPARING THE DEFENSIVE NUMBERS

Coaches aren't real fond about comparing stats from different years, since each team is its own reality. But, that never stopped us from doing it, so with that, let's take a look at the numbers which show Mizzou's defense, through 6 games in 2010, is a much-improved unit overall...

TIGERS HAVE WON 28 STRAIGHT WHEN WINNING TURNOVER BATTLE

Tiger Head Coach Gary Pinkel always touts the importance of turnovers, and how no other statistic can more directly impact the outcome of ballgames. Mizzou's emphasis on both taking care of the ball on offense, and getting it out on defense, have led to outstanding results in 2010 thus far.

Through 6 games, Mizzou ranks 19th in the nation in turnover margin, at +0.83 per game and is among the nation's best defenses at forcing takeaways (14), including 9 interceptions gained, which is already one more than the 8 that Mizzou picked off in 13 games in 2009. Mizzou is picking off a pass once in every 25.1 pass attempts so far in 2010 (9 INTs in 226 attempts), and that's a huge improvement from the ratio of once every 59.4 pass attempts by opponents in 2009 (8 INTs in 475 attempts).

Research shows that when MU is on the plus side of the turnover equation in a game, the results are astoundingly good. Coming into Saturday's game against Oklahoma, Mizzou has won 28 straight games when it has been at least +1 in turnover margin. The last time Mizzou dropped a game in which it was positive in turnovers was in 2005 at Kansas, when MU was +1, but lost, 13-3.

In 2010, MU has been plus in 3-of-6 games, beginning the year by finishing +3 against both Illinois and McNeese State, and going +2 against Miami (Ohio). The Tigers were minus-2 in turnovers against San Diego State (including three 4th-quarter turnovers), which contributed heavily to the need for posting a comeback win. In Big 12 play, the Tigers were actually minus-1 against Colorado (2 turnovers/1 takeaway), but still managed the shutout win, and that followed an even-Steven outing last Saturday at A&M, as both teams were turnover free.

The streak of 28 wins includes the 3 aforementioned games in 2010, plus all 7 games in 2009 when MU was plus in turnover margin, 3 in 2008, 9 in 2007, 5 in 2006, and the last instance in 2005, which was the 2005 Independence Bowl victory over South Carolina.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

PINKEL STANDS 3RD ON ALLTIME MU COACHING WINS LIST

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 10th season at MU (20th overall as a head coach) and touts a career record of 146-83-3 (63.6%).

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 51-21 (70.8%) over the past 5+ seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008 and 2009, has a 10-year record in Columbia of 73-46 (61.4%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has won 45 of his last 61 games overall (73.8%).

MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 73.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

Here's a quick look at the top winning coaches in MU history...

For his efforts in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was also named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007.

Mizzou's bowl appearance in 2009 means that Pinkel has led MU to 6 bowl games overall, and he now joins Devine as the only other coach to guide MU to 6 bowl games.

Pinkel has directed Mizzou to 6 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 12-2 in 2007, 10-4 in 2008 and 8-5 in 2009), with those representing 6 of MU's 8 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

The Big 12 North Division titles won by Mizzou in 2007 and 2008 represent the first football conference title of any kind Mizzou has won since 1969 — the last time it claimed a share of the old Big Eight Conference crown.

In November of 2008, Pinkel agreed to a new seven-year contract, meaning he'll patrol the Tiger sidelines through the 2015 season.

THIRD QUARTERS HAVE KEYED TIGER WINS

Whenever he's asked about halftime adjustments, MU Coach Gary Pinkel is fond of saying that if you're waiting until halftime to make adjustments, you're waiting too long.

Even with that being the case, Mizzou has been coming out of the lockerroom for the second half in dominating fashion. Through 6 games, Mizzou has now outscored opponents by a 64-6 margin in the 3rd quarter, and the Tigers are one of only two teams through games of Oct. 16th to not allow a touchdown in the 3rd quarter of play — Iowa is the other team.

Last Saturday in College Station, Mizzou outscored Texas A&M 14-3 in the 3rd quarter, to extend a 16-0 halftime lead to an insurmountable 30-3 advantage.

The tone was set in the season opener, when the Tigers trailed rival Illinois, 13-3 at halftime, only to come out looking like a new team in the 3rd quarter. Thanks to a 7-0 3rd-quarter (which was more lopsided than the score might indicate), the Tigers went on to a 23-13 win. Mizzou outscored McNeese State by a 17-0 margin in the 3rd quarter of game #2 to pull away for a 50-6 win. On Sept. 25th, Mizzou held a solid 28-3 halftime lead over Miami (Ohio), but they quickly removed any doubt about the eventual outcome of the game, thanks to a sterling 23-3 blitz in the 3rd quarter that led to MU's 51-13 win.

• — In fact, one could say that Coach Gary Pinkel and staff have done an outstanding job of having their team prepared to play coming out of the lockerroom all year long, as the Tigers have outscored opponents in the 1st and 3rd quarter combined by a whopping 120-16 margin (56-10 in 1st quarter, 64-6 in 3rd quarter)...

TIGERS ARE 37-10 AT 'THE ZOU' SINCE 2003 SEASON

Since nicknaming Faurot Field/Memorial Stadium "The Zou" prior to the 2003 season, Gary Pinkel's Tigers have done a nice job of defending their home turf (FieldTurf surface, which was also installed prior to the '03 season, by coincidence).

Since 2003, the Tigers are an impressive 37-10 at home, good for a winning percentage of 78.7%, including 19-9 during that time in Big 12 competition (67.9%). That breaks down to records of 6-0 in 2003, 3-3 in 2004, 4-2 in 2005, 6-1 in 2006, 6-0 in 2007, 5-1 in 2008, 3-3 in 2009 and 4-0 in 2010.

In fact, the record book shows that Mizzou has dominated at home against fellow Big 12 North foes. The Tigers have lost at home to a Big 12 North opponent only once since 2005, when it dropped a 27-12 contest to rival Nebraska last season. In all, MU has won 11 of its last 12 home games over Big 12 North foes. Here's a rundown:

TIGERS HAVE BEEN TOPS IN THE BIG 12 NORTH THE PAST 3+ SEASONS

Over the last 3-plus seasons (2007-10), no team in the Big 12 North Division has been more successful than Mizzou. The Tigers rank 3rd-best in the league in overall wins (36) and Big 12 wins (18) during the period, and that is also tops among North Division schools by a 4-game margin. MIZZOU-OKLAHOMA SERIES HISTORY

The series history between Mizzou and Oklahoma has been decidedly in the favor of the Sooners over the years, but that really shouldn't come as a surprise, what with OU being one of college football's most successful programs of all time.

Oklahoma holds a 66-23-5 edge over the years against the Tigers in the previous 94 matchups. Each of the last two meetings between the schools have come in the Big 12 Championship Game. The Sooners got the best of Mizzou in both of those title bouts, winning 62-21 in Kansas City in 2008, and taking a 38-17 score in San Antonio in 2007, in a game that saw Mizzou enter as the #1-ranked team in the nation and playing for a bid in the BCS National Championship Game.

The Tigers will be looking to break a stronghold that OU has held over them of late, as the Sooners come into Saturday's game having won 7 straight games against Mizzou, with MU's only win since the inception of the Big 12 coming in their first meeting as members of the new league, in 1998 (20-6 in Columbia). Since then, OU has rolled to 7 straight victories.

Oklahoma has won 19 of the last 20 games in the series, dating back to 1984, and if you take it back to 1970, they've won 31 of the last 34 meetings between the two schools. Since 1946, the series stands in OU's favor by a whopping 50-7-1 margin — that's when the separation really began by the Sooners from the Tigers, as in 1945, a Mizzou 14-6 win over OU evened the series at 16-16-1 at the time.

MU's record against OU in Columbia over the years has been 32-15-0. The last four meetings in Columbia have been competitive, with OU claiming a 26-10 in 2006, which was preceded by a narrow OU 31-24 win here in 2002 (when OU used a fake field goal to secure their #3 national ranking), MU's last win in the series (a 20-6 Tiger win in 1998) and in 1995, which ended as a 13-9 win by the #23 Sooners.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

MOE RANKS #5 IN NCAA IN RECEPTIONS, EGNEW RANKS #6 (1ST FOR TE'S)

It was pretty clear to observers during fall training camp that QB Blaine Gabbert was in the process of developing a good chemistry with sophomore WR T.J. Moe and junior TE Michael Egnew. That comfort level has most definitely transferred to the season, as Gabbert has connected with Moe for 50 completions in 6 games, while Egnew's 49 catches are right behind.

Moe, who caught all of 2 passes as a true freshman in 2009, currently finds himself as the nation's #5 most prolific pass catcher through 6 games, as his 50 receptions (for 589 yards and 3 TDs) are ranked 5th nationally entering Saturday's game against Oklahoma. His yardage average of 98.17 also ranks him 9th in the nation. Moe, who was initially pegged to play safety when he first came to Mizzou, made his 1st career start in the 2010 opener vs. Illinois, and made 13 catches for 101 yards and 1 TD, and he followed with a 10-catch, 79-yard outing against McNeese State. Of course, his legend at Mizzou will be forever cemented in the history books after his 7-catch, 119-yard outing in week #3 against San Diego State, most notably for his 68-yard catch-and-run score with just :51 seconds left that gave Mizzou a dramatic 27-24 win. Moe followed by catching 7 passes for 95 yards against Miami (Ohio), despite not seeing the field much after halftime due to the lopsided score, and had a 7-catch, 85-yard outing against Colorado. He's coming off a very efficient day at Texas A&M, where he notched 110 yards and 1 TD (a 20-yarder in the 3rd-quarter) on just 6 receptions (a season low).

Egnew is in a similar situation, in that he's relatively new to being a focal point of the passing attack. After catching a total of 7 passes for 47 yards (0 TDs) in 2008 and 2009 combined, Egnew has emerged as a weapon, with 49 receptions for 437 yards and 3 TDs through 6 games. Egnew ranks 6th in the NCAA among all players with his 8.17 receptions per game average, and his 49 receptions are most in the nation among tight ends, 18 more than the next on the list (Iowa State's Collin Franklin, with 31). He is also tops in the nation among tight ends in receiving yardage per game, at 72.83 yards entering Saturday's game against Oklahoma.

He began the season by snagging 10 catches for 60 yards and 1 TD against Illinois, and followed with 6 grabs for 52 yards against McNeese.

Egnew had an outstanding game against SDSU in game #3, as he finished the night with career highs in receptions (13) and yards (145). Both totals represented school single-game records for tight ends at Mizzou, with the old standards being 12 catches for 140 yards by former All-American Chase Coffman at Texas in 2008. He had a more pedestrian 4-catch, 41-yard outing in limited time in MU's 51-13 blowout win over Miami (Ohio), but came back with an impactful 2-TD night against Colorado, when he caught 6 passes for 52 yards, including his pair of 10-yard and 7-yard TD grabs. He's coming off a standout game at Texas A&M, where he caught 10 passes for 87 yards.

GABBERT IMPROVES TO 14-5 AS A STARTER

The old adage is that quarterbacks will be judged in the history books by how many games they help their teams win, not by the records and stats they accumulate.

Junior QB Blaine Gabbert is off to a great start in the winning category, as he's helped guide Mizzou to a 14-5 record in his 19 career starts (73.7%). Win number 14 came last time out at Texas A&M (he's now 4-1 as a starter in road games), in what was among the best performances of his career. Gabbert was a solid 31-of-47 passing for 361 yards and 3 TDs, with no interceptions as he helped lead MU to a 16-0 halftime lead, and an insurmountable 30-3 lead through 3 quarters of play. He did all of that while playing with a sore right hip/side area, after sustaining a high hip pointer the previous week against Colorado.

Against the Buffaloes, Gabbert helped guide the Tigers to a 26-0 shutout win when he put up 17-for-29 passing figures for 191 yards and 2 TDs (with zero INTs), before leaving the game early in the 4th quarter due to a high hip (right) pointer sustained earlier in the game.

For the season, Gabbert's passing yards average of 265.17 ypg ranks him 20th in the NCAA currently, and he's also 31st in the nation in total offense (260.83 avg.). Gabbert has completed 151-of-227 passes so far for 1,591 yards and 10 TDs, in helping lead MU to just the 5th 6-0 start in school history.

Against Miami (Ohio), Gabbert had an efficient day which included 15-of-21 passing for 187 yards and 1 TD (with 1 INT) in MU's 51-13 win. He retired for the day early in the 3rd quarter but managed a QB rating of 152.42 before grabbing the headset for good — his second-highest rating of the season (154.13 vs. McNeese State is tops thus far).

Gabbert threw for a season-high 351 yards in the win over San Diego State, as he completed 28-of-51 passes, including the game-winning TD to T.J. Moe covering 68 yards with just :51 seconds left. He became the first Tiger QB to throw a game-winning TD in the final minute of play since Pete Woods beat 2nd-ranked Ohio State in Columbus in 1976 (a 22-21 win with :12 seconds left).

Gabbert did throw his first two interceptions of the season in the 4th quarter against SDSU, but he also helped stake the Tigers to a 17-7 lead late in the first half when he scrambled 11 yards for his first rushing TD of the season, on a play where all his receivers were covered.

In limited action against McNeese State, Gabbert completed his first 15 passes, and eventually finished the game 26-of-31 (220 yards, 1 TD) to break the MU single-game completion percentage record with a mark of 83.9%, breaking the old standard of 83.8% set in 2008 by Chase Daniel vs. Buffalo.

In the opener against Illinois, Gabbert helped lead the Tigers to a 20-point 2nd half as MU rallied for its 23-13 win over Illinois in St. Louis. Gabbert finished the game 34-of-48 for 281 yards and two TDs. While he was solid in the first half (14-of-20 passing, 114 yards, QB rating of 117.88), he enjoyed a more effective 2nd half, as he completed 20-of-28 passes for 167 yards and 2 TDs (QB rating of 145.10).

Gabbert ended 2009 ranked 2nd in the Big 12 Conference (29th nationally) in passing efficiency, with a rating of 140.45. He was also 4th in the Big 12 and 11th in the NCAA in total offense, averaging 292.08 yards per game.

The fourth QB to start for 10th-year Head Coach Gary Pinkel in his Mizzou tenure, Gabbert hopes he can continue a trend his predecessors Brad Smith and Chase Daniel achieved — increasing the win totals dramatically from the first year to the second year as a starter.

Smith started as a redshirt freshman in 2002 and helped the Tigers to a 5-7 record. In his second year as a starter, the Tigers went 8-5 in 2003 — an improvement of 3 wins. Daniel started for the first time in 2006 as a true sophomore, and he helped take the Tigers to an 8-5 record. In his 2nd year running the show, the Tigers exploded for a school-record 12-2 record — an improvement of 4 wins.

TIGER GROUND GAME GETS BIG CHUNKS BY COMMITTEE

Mizzou's rushing attack doesn't garner the attention its aerial game does in the spread offense MU has employed since installing it prior to the 2005 season. However, the Tigers have shown in 2010 that their ground game is something to be aware of, as it's been very efficient and effective when called upon thus far. Here are some basic factoids regarding the Tiger ground game...

- — It's been a tailback by committee approach thus far, with the bulk of the carries being split by junior De'Vion Moore (40 carries, 200 yards, 3 TDs, 5.0 avg.), true freshman Henry Josey (36-255, 4 TDs, 7.1 avg.), sophomore Kendial Lawrence (33-165, 2 TDs, 5.0 avg. in 5 games), and true freshman Marcus Murphy (15-96, 1 TD, 6.4 avg. in 5 games). Lawrence missed the McNeese State game due to an injury, and Murphy did not play in the season opener against Illinois...

- — Those four backs have been very potent, as they've combined to average a solid 5.78 yards per attempt (124 combined carries, 716 yards, 10 TDs)...

- — Mizzou has 13 rushing TDs through 6 games in 2010, and that is just 2 shy of MU's 13-game total of 15 rushing TDs in all of 2009...

- — The Tigers have 13 rushing TDs in 181 attempts in 2010, good for a TD per 13.92 attempts. In 2009, MU had 15 rushing TDs in 444 attempts, for a ratio of one rushing TD per every 29.6 attempts...

- — Mizzou's average of 4.37 per rush ranks 54th in the NCAA (through games of Oct. 9th), which is a jump from 2009, when MU ranked 83rd nationally with a per-rush average of 3.72 yards...

"MID-MOE MIRACLE" MOVES TIGERS TO 3-0

Mid-Missouri has seen its share of some memorable finishes over the years at Mizzou's Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field, but Tiger fans would argue that the most memorable ones have gone against MU.

In the 3rd game of the season, perhaps any lingering pain from events such as The Fifth Down (vs. Colorado in 1990) and the "Flea Kicker" (vs. Nebraska in 1997) will be erased, thanks to what might be called the "Mid-Moe Miracle."

With Mizzou at its own 12-yardline and trailing, 24-20, with just 1:21 to play, the Tigers needed a miracle comeback to avoid the upset loss. The Tiger offense hadn't seen the endzone since late in the 2nd quarter, and things just didn't look promising. But QB Blaine Gabbert, who had been intercepted on the last two possessions, got the Tigers out of a hole when he hit WR Jerrell Jackson for a 20-yard gain to the MU 32-yardline.

What happened next will likely go down in history books as one of the more incredible plays in Tiger football history. Gabbert hit sophomore WR T.J. Moe on a quick 7-yard out, and Moe did a stutter-step to juke a would-be tackler to the ground. Moe looked to get out of bounds, but all of a sudden he got a block from WR Jerrell Jackson that took two Aztecs out at once, and it was off to the races. Moe raced down the left sideline untouched for an improbable touchdown with just :51 seconds left to put MU up, 27-24.

After the Tiger defense prevented San Diego State from moving into field goal position, Mizzou had its miracle finish that was very historic in nature. It marked the first time since 1976 that Missouri had scored a touchdown in the final minute of play when trailing to win a ballgame. The last time came in 1976 in Columbus, Ohio, when Missouri's Pete Woods threw a TD pass to Leo Lewis with :12 seconds left to give MU a 22-21 win over the 2nd-ranked Buckeyes.

San Diego State has gone on to post a 4-2 record through Oct. 16th, including an upset win this last Saturday over 23rd-ranked Air Force.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

RESSEL CONTINUING HIS DEPENDABLE PRESENCE

In 2009, Mizzou took to the field with the daunting task of having to replace departed PK Jeff Wolfert, who, in his three seasons (2006-08), set the NCAA combined kicking accuracy record, as he made a combined 244-of-257 kicks (59-of-72 FGs, plus 185-of-185 PATs), for a career percentage of 94.9%.

In stepped sophomore Grant Ressel, who won the kicking job in the final week of training camp, and who took the field in the 2009 season opener with exactly zero career kicks under his belt. All Ressel did during his sophomore season was establish himself as the most accurate kicker in the nation, as he made a combined 65-of-66 total kicks (98.5%) — a mark which broke the NCAA single-season record for best combined kick accuracy.

Ressel also led the NCAA in FG percentage among those with 13 or more attempts (96.3%). For the season, Ressel, who joined Mizzou in 2007 as a walk-on (he's now on scholarship), made 26-of-27 FGs, and was perfect on 39-of-39 PATs.

Through 6 games in 2010, Ressel has picked up where he left off, although he did start the year with an uncharacteristic miss against Illinois, when a high snap threw the timing off of his first attempt of the season, and his 37-yarder went just wide. After that, he's been perfect on field goals, as he connected 33, 27 and 34 against Illinois (the last two which came with the game still in the balance in the 4th quarter), then from 27 and 32 yards against McNeese State, followed by makes from 34 and 38 yards against San Diego State.

Against Miami (Ohio), he had a mixed bag of a day, as he nailed a 50-yard field goal in the 3rd quarter, which represented his first career make of 50 yards or more. That followed a shocking miss on an extra point attempt in the 3rd quarter where he simply pushed the kick right and banged it off the right upright. That miss broke a string of 252 consecutive made extra points by Mizzou (dating back to 2005), which left them just 10 shy of the alltime NCAA record of 262 consecutive PATs made by a school (Syracuse).

He followed that by making a 47-yarder in his only try against Colorado and hit a 21-yarder at Texas A&M last Saturday right before halftime, and that gave him 12 consecutive games with a made field goal. He did have an extra point blocked at A&M, which was the first blocked PAT against MU since the 2005 season.

For the 2010 season, Ressel is 10-of-11 on FGs and 23-of-25 on PATs, making him 36-of-38 on FGs (94.7%) and 62-of-64 on PATs (96.9%) for his career.

He forever etched his name fondly into the hearts of Tiger fans in the 2009 regular-season finale against arch-rival Kansas, when he made four FGs (43, 28, 37, 27 yards), including the game-winning 27-yarder as time expired to give Mizzou a comeback 41-39 win. Ressel's only miss on the year was a 43-yard attempt against Nebraska in terrible downpour conditions, on a play where the snap that was off a bit, which threw off the timing of the kick.

For his efforts, Ressel was named a 1st-Team All-American by Sports Illustrated, becoming MU's first-ever kicker to achieve 1st-Team All-American status.

GRABNER QUIETLY STANDING OUT IN BIG 12'S TOP PUNT GAME

Senior P Matt Grabner is making quite an impression in his first year on the field for Mizzou. After initially attending Ole Miss, the Alton, Ill. native transferred to Mizzou and focused on school and playing club soccer. After being convinced by friends that he should take his strong kicking leg and try out for the Tiger football team, Grabner did so prior to the 2009 season, and he was invited to join the team as a preferred walk-on.

After watching the Tigers rank 4th in the NCAA in 2009 as a team in net punting (40.5 avg.) thanks to the outstanding year put together by P Jake Harry IV, Grabner had big shoes to fill in 2010. He's doing just that, and then some. For the season, Grabner has an average of 43.15 yards per kick, which ranks him 6th in the Big 12 Conference, and 33rd in the NCAA. The net of his punting has been even more effective, as the Tigers rank 1st in the league, and 6th nationally, in team net punting, with an average of 41.04 yards per punt.

Eleven of Grabner's 26 punts this season have been downed inside the opponent 20-yardline, including 4 inside the 2-yardline.

Grabner punted 6 times last week at Texas A&M, and he averaged 43.3 yards per kick, including three which ended inside the Aggie 20-yardline, including his first two boots that kept A&M bottled up deep in their own territory early on.

The previous week against Colorado, Grabner punted 4 times, and averaged a solid 43.2 yards per kick, including a 51-yarder, and another sky kick that was downed at the CU 1-yardline, which led to a safety on the very next snap for the Tiger defense.

Grabner was called into action extensively in game #3 against San Diego State, and he delivered in fine fashion, as he averaged 45.4 yards on 8 punts. Three of his punts finished inside the Aztec 20-yardline, including one which was downed at the 1-yardline — marking the third straight game he'd gotten a punt down on the opponent 1-yardline.

Grabner's 3 punts in the 4th quarter when the game was on the line were stellar, as he had kicks of 46 yards, 58 yards (a career-long) and 47 yards. The Aztecs tried to return 4 punts in the game, but could manage only 16 yards in returns.

2010 SENIOR CLASS JUST 2 WINS SHY OF SCHOOL WINS RECORD

Mizzou's senior class isn't very big (just 16 in all) but they've no doubt played a big role in helping the Tigers elevate the overall standing of the program in their time at MU. The 2010 senior class entered the season having collected 30 wins over the previous three years, and with 6 wins so far in 2010, that puts them within reach of the school record of 38 wins over a four-year period, which was established by the 2009 class.

The 2009 class one-upped the record of 37, which had been established just the previous year by the 2008 class. The 2010 class has been a very key group of players and leaders who have helped push Mizzou to new heights. They have been part of two Big 12 North Division championship teams (2007, 2008), they've helped lead Mizzou to bowl games in each of the past four seasons overall (2006 Sun, 2008 Cotton, 2008 Alamo, 2009 Texas), and they were also part of the 2007 team which ascended to #1 in the BCS polls on Nov. 25th, 2007.

If the 2010 team can reach a bowl game, this senior class will become only the fourth in MU history to play in four bowl games in a four-year span. The only previous classes to achieve that feat were the 1981 senior class, followed by the last two classes to come through (2008 & 2009).

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Blaine Gabbert rallied Missouri from a 10-point halftime deficit with two touchdown passes and Carl Gettis made a leaping one-handed interception and downed a punt at the 1 in the fourth quarter of a season-opening 23-13 victory over Illinois.

T.J. Moe had 13 receptions for 101 yards and a touchdown, and the Tigers' defense shut out Illinois in the second half. Kenji Jackson also intercepted Nathan Scheelhaase in the fourth quarter to help seal it for Missouri, which finished the neutral-site Arch Rivalry series with six straight victories.

Mikel Leshoure had 112 yards on 20 carries for Illinois, coming off a 3-9 season. Scheelhaase, a redshirt freshman, was 9 for 23 for 81 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions. He also rushed for 76 yards on 16 carries and lost a fumble in his first career start.

Missouri was a sizeable favorite after totaling 129 points the previous three meetings, but the Tigers couldn't get untracked offensively in the first half. Illinois controlled the clock for nearly 18 minutes and scored twice in the final 2:10 to take a 13-3 lead on A.J. Jenkins' 10-yard catch and Derek Dimke's career-best 52-yard field goal to end the half.

Illinois was held to 85 yards and four first downs in the second half.

Gabbert was 34 for 48 for 281 yards, 167 of them coming in the second half.

Gettis leaped high to steal the ball away from Jenkins at the Illinois 45 early in the fourth quarter, halting Illinois' first possession after Michael Egnew's 6-yard catch put the Tigers ahead 17-13.

After Missouri's ensuing drive stalled, Gettis downed Matt Grabner's punt at the 1. That led to a three-and-out for Illinois.

Illinois took advantage of a tough two-play sequence by Mizzou in the first half. A wide open Wes Kemp couldn't haul in a pass at the Illinois 25, a gain that would have been at least 25 yards, and Gabbert was subsequently sacked on the next play for a 14-yard loss to force a punt.

Illinois' last drive ended after Leshoure was ruled out of bounds on a potential first-down catch at the Missouri 46 after officials reviewed the play. Grant Ressel added a 35-yard field goal in the final minute.

Missouri had 98 yards rushing and were led by junior De'Vion Moore, who had 78 yards on 16 carries.

Sophomore DE Aldon Smith led the way defensively for Missouri, with 10 tackles. The 2009 Big 12 Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year also had three tackles for loss and two quarterback sacks, including one which came on third down in Illinois' opening series of the 3rd quarter that appeared to give the Tigers momentum they lacked in the first half.

Gabbert then drove the Tigers 77 yards on 10 plays, and found Moe in the back of the endzone on 3rd-and-goal from the 7-yardline with 9:38 left in the 3rd quarter to cut the deficit to 13-10.

Moe's 13 receptions were just three shy of the MU single-game record of 16, set in 2002 by Justin Gage against Bowling Green.

Mizzou outgained Illinois in the 3rd quarter by a whopping margin of 147-to-10 in total yards.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) -Freshman Henry Josey scored on three of his first four carries and Blaine Gabbert completed his first 15 passes in Missouri's 50-6 rout of McNeese State at Memorial Stadium.

Josey had 112 yards on seven carries, 105 coming in the first half. He was untouched on a 62-yard scoring run, had a 34-yarder for his first carry of the game, and scored twice - both times untouched - from 6 yards for Missouri (2-0).

Josey began the game as the third-string tailback, a position already minus starter Kendial Lawrence, who was unable to play versus McNeese due to a shoulder bruise suffered the previous week against Illinois. Josey, who had one carry for 10 yards in the opener, became Missouri's first freshman to score three touchdowns since quarterback Corby Jones in 1995 against Iowa State.

His 62-yard burst also marked the longest run from scrimmage by a Tiger since the 2006 Sun Bowl, when former standout Tony Temple ran 65 yards for a touchdown against Oregon State.

Gabbert was 15 for 15 for 129 yards before his first incomplection early in the second quarter. He finished 26 for 31 for 220 yards and a touchdown. Gabbert threw a 24-yard scoring pass to Jerrell Jackson on his lone series of the third quarter for a 43-0 lead before being relieved by true freshman James Franklin.

Missouri scored touchdowns on its first four drives and added a safety for a 30-0 cushion with 10:03 left in the half en route to its fifth straight home opening victory. Michael Sam tackled quarterback Jacob Bower for the safety and later blocked a punt in the third quarter to set up one of Grant Ressel's two chip shot field goals.

Even the Tigers' first punt was a success, downed at the 1 in the second quarter. Missouri led 43-0 with 11:54 to go in the third quarter against a school ranked 13th in the FCS, and is 10-0 against teams from the lower division.

Jacob Bower was 11 for 19 for 99 yards and three interceptions for McNeese State (1-1), co-champions of the Southland Conference last year. Wes Briscoe caught a touchdown pass early in the fourth quarter for the Cowboys, who trailed 33-0 at halftime.

The Tigers' T.J. Moe reached double figures in receptions for the second straight game, catching 10 passes for 79 yards. Franklin scored on an 8-yard run late in the third quarter in what was his first collegiate game.

Leading 50-0 at the end of the third quarter, Tiger Coach Gary Pinkel called off the dogs, and instructed his team to be conservative, in hopes of not running up the score against the overmatched foe.

Mizzou's resurgent defense stifled the Cowboy offense most of the night, as 85 of McNeese's 245 total yards of offense came in the fourth quarter against reserves. McNeese was held to just 65 rushing yards on 33 attempts — just 2.0 yards per carry, and when they went to the air, the Tiger defense was up to the challenge, picking off three passes on the evening to raise the two-game season total for interceptions to six. That's only two fewer pass interceptions than Mizzou gained during the entire 2009 season in 13 games.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — T.J. Moe came to Missouri a year ago as a decorated high school quarterback. A last-minute, 68-yard touchdown catch to lift the Tigers to a 24-20 win over San Diego State entrenched him as a star receiver.

Moe executed a backward stutter step more commonly seen on the Mizzou Arena basketball court that left Aztecs defensive back Brandon Davis on the ground clutching for air. Then Moe turned the short sideline pass from quarterback Blaine Gabbert into a score with just 51 seconds left, thanks to the help of fellow receiver Jerrell Jackson, whose block caused two San Diego State defenders to collide.

Missouri (3-0) had fallen behind by four points after a 32-yard field goal by San Diego State (2-1) with just over two minutes remaining.

Moe was modest about the play that sent Memorial Stadium into a frenzy.

"I just wanted to catch the ball and get out of bounds," Moe said. "The first thing I did was go over and thank Jerrell. Blaine and I gave him a big hug."

The St. Louis-area prep star entered the night with 23 catches in Missouri's first two games, tied for first in the country. But he was overshadowed for most of the game by his teammate, tight end Michael Egnew, who caught 13 passes for 145 yards. Moe finished with seven catches for 119 yards.

Missouri coach Gary Pinkel was more forthright with his praise for Moe, who during his first season in Columbia struggled with the position change and a lingering foot injury from high school.

"He knows he's good now," said a relieved Pinkel.

Moe's electrifying score also helped Missouri overcome an up-and-down night from Gabbert, who was 28-of-51 for 351 yards but threw two interceptions in the final five minutes. Other than his scoring toss to Moe, Gabbert's best play of the night may have been an 11-yard, first-half touchdown scamper in which

he outran three defenders while scrambling to his left to cross into the end zone untouched.

The dramatic win offset a career day by San Diego State freshman Ronnie Hillman, who ran for 228 yards and touchdowns covering 75 and 93 yards. He overshadowed his first-year counterpart Henry Josey, who had 44 yards on 10 carries for a Missouri team that totaled just 89 rushing yards.

Missouri appeared to be in control after Kevin Rutland's goal line interception following a Tiger fumble deep in their own territory preserved a 20-14 lead early in the fourth quarter.

But Memorial Stadium grew quiet after Hillman's full-field burst gave the Aztecs a one-point lead just two minutes later. Hillman's first long TD run with 35 seconds remaining in the first half similarly silenced the home crowd, trimming what had been a 10-point Missouri lead to 17-14.

Mizzou got the win despite turning the ball over three times in the fourth quarter in its own territory. But the Tiger defense — which played very well overall, aside from the two long scoring runs allowed — clamped down in crunch time and allowed only three points total by the Aztecs in their three possessions. One drive, which began at the Tiger 7-yardline after a fumble recovery by SDSU, ended when CB Kevin Rutland intercepted a pass at the goal line. The second resulted in a 25-yard field goal that made it 24-20 SDSU with 2:03 to play. The last one was a 3-and-out on a series that began at the MU 37-yardline and which forced a punt.

That last punt set up Moe for his heroics. His winning touchdown with under a minute to play marked the first time Mizzou had won a game with a touchdown in the final minute of play when trailing since 1976 at Ohio State.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP)- Carl Gettis returned a fumble 19 yards for a score on the first play of the game and was among seven Missouri players getting a touchdown apiece in a 51-13 rout of visiting Miami (Ohio).

Missouri (4-0) scored on runs of 39 yards by Kendial Lawrence and 28 yards by Henry Josey while going ahead 21-0 in the first quarter. Blaine Gabbert threw a touchdown pass and scored on a 1-yard sneak for the Tigers, who ended suspense immediately a week after getting a last-minute touchdown to beat San Diego State.

Missouri finished its pre-Big 12 schedule unbeaten for the fifth straight year after polishing off Miami of Ohio (2-2) and will get a week off before opening conference play Oct. 9 at home against Colorado. The Tigers have won 21 straight non-conference games in the regular season since 2005 and won easily without top pass rusher Aldon Smith, out with a broken bone in his right leg.

The Tigers were without four starters in all for the game, as Smith was joined on the sideline by starting LB Luke Lambert (hamstring), FS Jasper Simmons (knee) and WR Jerrell Jackson (thigh).

The lone blemish was a missed extra point kick by Grant Ressel early in the third quarter, ending the school's string of 252 in a row since 2005 by three kickers. Ressel hit the right goalpost after Wes Kemp's 33-yard scoring reception for a 34-3 lead, but recovered quickly and hit a career-long 50-yard field later in the quarter.

Armand Robinson had 10 receptions for 99 yards for Miami of Ohio, which had three turnovers in the first half and had five fumbles, losing two of them. All three turnovers led to Missouri touchdowns, starting with Gettis' tightrope walk down the left sideline after Andrew Gachkar forced a fumble on a reception by

Thomas Merriweather on the first play of the game.

Records have not been kept related to the quickest score in school history, but Mizzou officials believe the touchdown is possibly the quickest touchdown ever scored at MU.

Trevor Cook had two field goals for the RedHawks, including a career-long 40-yarder in the third quarter. The lone touchdown came on a 12-yard reception by Jamal Rodgers with 1:40 to go.

Missouri had five carries of 10 yards or better in the first quarter, two each by Josey and Lawrence. Michael Sam's interception gave the school eight overall, matching last season's total. T.J. Moe had seven catches for 95 yards

Missouri had 236 yards rushing with an average gain of 6.2 yards per carry, including 63 on six carries by Lawrence, 54 yards on eight carries by Josey, 48 yards on four carries by backup Marcus Murphy and 39 yards on three attempts by De'Vion Moore.

COLUMBIA, Mo. – Blaine Gabbert played with a hip pointer as long as he could, finally coming out at the start of the fourth quarter.

No. 24 Missouri did more than enough long before losing their quarterback, capitalizing on several big plays on special teams and a defense that had four sacks without their top pass rusher in a 26-0 victory over Colorado in a Big 12 opener. It also was the final conference meeting before the Buffaloes join the Pac-10 next year.

Gabbert was 17 for 29 for 191 yards and two touchdown passes, but was only 2 for 6 for 10 yards in the third quarter. Coach Gary Pinkel said Gabbert was hurt when hit on both sides at the start of the third quarter, and wasn't ready to project Gabbert's availability for next week at Texas A&M.

"He could hardly breath. He's a tough guy, tough, tough guy," coach Gary Pinkel said.

The Tigers (5-0, 1-0 Big 12) had four sacks and an interception in their fifth straight victory over Colorado (3-2, 0-1) by a total score of 203-40. Linebacker Zaviar Gooden had a sack among his two tackles for loss and deflected a pass to lead the charge.

This one came just a few days after the 20th anniversary of the infamous Fifth Down game in 1990, which helped the Buffaloes win their only national championship.

Missouri found the going tough most of the game offensively other than a 97-yard, 15-play drive capped by Gabbert's 10-yard touchdown pass to Michael Egnew near the end of the half. Those woes were masked by a blocked field goal, blocked punt, fake punt and safety in the school's first shutout since blanking the Buffaloes 58-0 Oct. 25, 2008 at home.

Punter Trey Barrow's 26-yard run on a fake was enough to lead Missouri until backup quarterback James Franklin passed him in the fourth quarter, finishing with 37 yards on four carries and throwing a 10-yard touchdown pass to Egnew.

Missouri was held to a season-low 116 yards rushing overall with tailbacks De'Vion Moore, Marcus Murphy, Henry Josey and Kendial Lawrence totaling 51 yards on 18 carries.

Rodney Stewart had 91 yards on 18 carries for Colorado, but quarterback Tyler Hansen was yanked near the end of the third quarter. The Buffaloes advanced to the Missouri 18 with backup Cody Hawkins before running out of downs near the end of the game.

Penalties helped to doom two fourth down chances in Missouri territory for Colorado, which has been outscored 78-7 in two road games this season.

Colorado trailed 19-0 at the half, and was outscored 86-3 the first half the last three years in the series.

Barrow and Matt Grabner had punts downed at the 2 and 1 in the first half. Eric Waters partially deflected a punt in the first half and pressure by Luke Lambert on the pass rush forced Hansen's intentional grounding call for the safety. Terrell Resonno blocked a 39-yard field goal attempt in the second quarter.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) – Blaine Gabbert moved Missouri’s offense with ease and the Tigers’ defense left Jerrod Johnson and Texas A&M’s high-powered offense stunned. It was the perfect combination to keep No. 21 Missouri undefeated with a 30-9 win over the Aggies.

Gabbert threw for 361 yards and three touchdowns, connecting with Wes Kemp for touchdowns in the first and third quarters to help the Tigers (6-0, 2-0 Big 12) improve to 6-0 for the fifth time in school history.

“I don’t know how many superstars we have, but we have a lot of good players, I guarantee you that,” Missouri coach Gary Pinkel said. “When we play well as a football team we’re pretty good.”

Missouri’s defense held quarterback Johnson and Texas A&M’s spread offense in check for most of the game, harassing him into a 7 for 21 first half and sacking him seven times overall.

Texas A&M (3-3, 0-2) finally got going in the fourth quarter, with Johnson throwing a 26-yard touchdown pass to Jeff Fuller, but it was much too late to avoid a third straight loss. It was the fewest points the Aggies scored this season.

Gabbert’s third touchdown pass was a 20-yard strike to T.J. Moe that made it 30-3 in the third quarter. Moe finished with six receptions for 110 yards.

The Tigers got the ball in the second half after Johnson was sacked three times on Texas A&M’s first possession after halftime. Gabbert hit Kemp for his second touchdown on a 10-yard pass that pushed Missouri’s lead to 23-0.

Gabbert suffered a hip pointer in the fourth quarter of last week’s game and spent the week trying to get healthy.

“I worked hard all week to get my body back to what it should be,” he said. “It’s mind over matter. When you’re focused on a specific goal nothing else matters. We were focused on the ‘W’ and we got that.”

Texas A&M had first-and-goal from the 10 after that, but the offense stalled

again and the Aggies kicked a 24-yard field goal to make it 23-3. That score ended a streak of six straight shutout quarters for Missouri’s defense after a 26-0 win over Colorado last week.

It was the first time since 1967 that Missouri had held conference opponents scoreless for six straight quarters.

Johnson finished 27 of 48 for 322 yards, but was just 15 of 31 for 141 yards entering the fourth quarter.

Texas A&M didn’t turn the ball over this week after losing the ball nine times in the last two games to up its season total to 18, but the offense sputtered anyway.

The Aggies punted on their first six possessions as Johnson struggled through tough first half. Texas A&M finally got a drive going on its last possession of the first half. But it stalled at the Missouri 43 after three straight incompletions from Johnson, including one on fourth down where he badly overthrew his receiver.

That gave Missouri the ball back with about 1 1/2 minutes before halftime. The Tigers marched down the field and looked to have scored on a reception by Kemp, but the TD was taken away after a review giving them the ball at the 1. Texas A&M’s defense held and Missouri settled for a 21-yard field goal and a 16-0 halftime lead.

Pinkel likes the focus of his team and is impressed by its development.

“We are a lot better football team now than we were three weeks ago, and we’re getting better,” he said. “Hopefully we continue to do that.”

Kendal Lawrence pushed Missouri’s lead to 13-0 when he scored from two yards out early in the second quarter. That score was set up by a 24-yard reception by Kemp.

Gabbert found Kemp on a 5-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter, but the extra point attempt was blocked so the Tigers led 6-0. It was the first time Missouri had an extra point attempt blocked since 2005.
