2005: Earned second team All-Big East...became the first placekicker in Pitt history to twice be selected to the All-Big East Team...led Pitt in scoring with 61 points...finished his two-year Pitt career with 150 points to rank 14th (tied) in school history...as a senior, connected on 14-of-19 field goals (.737) and each of his 19 PATs...his career-long 49-yard field goal against Notre Dame matched the longest field goal ever kicked at Heinz Field — NFL or college...the Baltimore Ravens' Matt Stover also kicked a 49-yarder against the Pittsburgh Steelers...Cummings ranked 16th nationally in field goals (1.56 FG/game) in 2005...among Big East kickers, he ranked first in field goals, field goal percentage (.737) and PAT percentage (tied at 100%) and ranked third in the conference in kick scoring (6.8 points/game)...played in nine games, missing consecutive contests (Sept. 24 Youngstown State and Sept. 30 Rutgers games) due to in-season knee surgery on his right (kicking) leg...returned to active duty for the Oct. 8 Cincinnati contest...was impressive versus Cincinnati by hitting all six of his placements for a career-high 12 points...connected on field goals of 27, 39 and 45 yards and all three of his PATs versus the Bearcats...against South Florida, hit all four PATs and his lone FG (27 yards) for seven points...scored 10 points versus Syracuse, connecting on 2-of-3 FG (39 and 30 yards) and all four PATs...accounted for eight points at Louisville, hitting all four of his placements (two PATs and field goals of 40 and 25 yards)...was perfect versus Notre Dame, connecting on two field goals (49 and 23 yards) and his lone extra-point try...his 49-yard field goal was a career long...hit his lone PAT and a 27-yard FG with seven seconds left in regulation to force OT at Ohio.

2004: Joined Pitt as a junior-college transfer and went on to play a vital role in the team's run to the Fiesta Bowl...first team All-Big East...shared Pitt's Special Teams MVP award with punter Adam Graessle...led Pitt in scoring with 89 points...was just 10 points shy of Pitt's single-season scoring record for a kicker set by Carson Long, who had a school-best 99 during the Panthers' 1976 national championship campaign...Cummings' 18 field goals tied Pitt's single-season record established by Long in 1976...Cummings had a long field goal of 47 yards (Rutgers)...was 35 of 37 in PATs...had made his first 30 PATs of the year before having two blocked at South Florida...ranked 13th nationally in field goals (1.50 FG/game)...ranked second in the Big East in kick scoring (7.4 pts./game) and field goals (1.50 FG/game)...ranked third in the Big East in overall scoring (7.4 pts./game) and field goal percentage (66.7%, 18 of 27)...matched his career high with 11 points at Notre Dame...was a perfect 5 of 5 in PATs and 2 of 2 in FGs (27, 32)...his 32-yard FG with one second left gave the Panthers a 41-38 victory, their first at Notre Dame since 1986...scored a career-high (tied) 11 points versus Furman, connecting on all five PATs and two field goal attempts (37, 27)...his 37-

yarder in overtime versus Furman was the game winner...named Big East Special Teams Player of the Week for his Furman performance...also provided a game-winning FG in overtime versus Boston College (27 yards)...matched his career high in points (11) against Rutgers, hitting all five PATs and both field goal attempts (47, 40)...his 47-yarder was a career long...named Big East Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts against Rutgers...had 10 points with a career-high three FGs (37, 35, 20) and one PAT against West Virginia...made both of his FG attempts, including a 45-yarder, and all three of his PATs versus Temple...earned coaching staff's Special Teams Player of the Game honor four times (Notre Dame, Rutgers, Temple and Furman).

Junior College: Converted 15-of-21 field goals (.714) and 47-of-51 extra points (.922) at College of the Canyons (Calif.) in 2003...also averaged 39 yards on 10 punts...had a long field goal of 50 yards...helped College of the Canyons to an 11-1 record, the Western State Conference Bowl championship and the semifinals of the Southern California playoffs...College of the Canyons reached No. 4 in the J.C. Gridwire national rankings...J.C. Gridwire third team All-American...played under COC coach Chuck Lyon...Chris Sailer National Kicking Competition champion in field goals, kickoffs and punting...prior to his junior-college stint, Cummings spent one season at Oregon (2001).

Hart High, set a single-season school record by making 11 field goals...51-yard field goal also was a school best...compiled 120 touchbacks in two seasons as a kickoff specialist...first team All-CIF Southern Section and All-Foothill League...named All-San Fernando Valley by the Los Angeles Times and San Fernando Valley Daily News...helped team to the CIF Division 3 championship with a 12-2 record his senior year...team also won the CIF title his junior year with a 14-0 mark and reached No. 13 in the USA Today rankings...played under Hart coach Mike Herrington...earned three football letters and two soccer letters at Hart.

2005: Earned his fourth letter, playing in five games...contributed as a reserve tailback and kick returner...rushed five times for 10 yards on the season...had six kick returns for 94 yards...had four kick returns for 80 yards (20.0 avg.) against Notre Dame.

2004: Contributed as a reserve tailback and starting kick returner...played in 11 games, starting one...lone start came at Notre Dame as part of a four-receiver set...missed the Oct. 23 Rutgers game with a left knee injury...highly effective receiver out of the backfield with 27 catches for 243 yards (9.0 avg.) and one TD...reception total ranked third on the team...rushed for 116 yards on 37 carries (3.1 avg.)...averaged 22 yards per kick return (25 returns for 551 yards) with a long of 96 (for a TD versus Nebraska)...had a solid all-around game at Notre Dame, compiling 92 yards on four kick returns (23.0 avg.), 53 receiving yards on four catches and 16 rushing yards on three carries...with Pitt trailing, 35-31, late in the fourth, Furman kept a TD drive alive by catching a nine-yard pass from Tyler Palko to convert a fourth-and-four and move the sticks to the ND 24...six plays later Pitt scored to go up 38-35 with 2:24 left...also had a key 11-yard rush with under 30 seconds left to set up Josh Cummings' game-winning 32-yard field goal...had a 96-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Nebraska...it marked the first return for a TD of his career and the first for Pitt since Torrie Cox went 86 yards for a score against Rutgers on 9/23/00...named coaching staff's Co-Special Teams Player of the Game versus Nebraska...had two kickoff returns for 62 yards (31.0 avg.) at Temple while also throwing a halfback pass for 43 yards to Greg Lee...named coaching staff's Co-Special Teams Player of the Game versus Temple...had nine receptions for 63 yards, both career highs, against Syracuse...had his first career receiving TD in the South Florida game, taking a screen pass 11 yards for a score.

2003: Was preparing to make the transition from offense to the secondary until a left hip injury midway through spring drills sidelined him...underwent surgery during the offseason and ultimately redshirted.

2002: Played in all 13 games, serving on special teams and as a reserve tailback...played receiver in the Insight Bowl due to attrition at that position and caught two passes for 17 yards in the victory over Oregon State...on the year, rushed for 75 yards on 30 carries...caught eight passes for 67 yards...had two starting assignments on the year, including the Texas A&M game (at tailback) and Insight Bowl versus Oregon State (at receiver)...scored his first career TD with a six-yard run against Rutgers...finished the game with seven rushes for 22 yards...had two tackles on special teams for the year. 2001: Lettered as a true freshman, playing in eight regular-season games and the Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl...rushed for 243 yards on 42 attempts (5.8 avg.) during the regular season...totaled nine receptions for 59 yards (6.6 avg.)...took over the starting tailback duties late in the season when Raymond Kirkley was

injured...was a hero in the 23-17 victory over West Virginia...Furman rushed for a game-high 72 yards on just nine carries, an average of eight yards per rush...his biggest run was a 44-yard scamper late in the fourth quarter that helped the Panthers run out the clock...Furman also contributed to the passing game versus WVU...early in the second quarter, he took a pitch from quarterback David Priestley, pulled up and tossed a 13-yard scoring strike to tight end Kris Wilson, putting the Panthers ahead 7-0...received Offensive Player of the Game honors from the coaching staff for his efforts versus West Virginia...facing UAB's top-ranked rushing defense in the regular-season finale, Furman made his first collegiate start...rushed for a game-high 71 yards on 17 attempts (4.2 avg.) against the Blazers and caught three passes for 30 yards...also started the Visit Florida Tangerine Bowl versus NC State...gained 33 yards on seven carries (4.7 avg.) and caught two passes for 37 yards (18.5 avg.)...one of his receptions came on a swing pass out of the backfield that provided highlight-film material...Furman made a beautiful spin move to elude an NC State tackler and went on to pick up 32 yards on the play, setting up a second-quarter touchdown that put the Panthers up for good.

2005: Starter at tight end for second consecutive season...earned his fourth career letter...played in every contest during his four active seasons (49 games from 2002-05)...as a senior played in all 11 games, starting nine contests...finished with 21 receptions for 244 yards (11.6 avg.) and one TD...had a season-high four catches for 58 yards (14.5 avg.) at West Virginia...had 47 receiving yards on two catches versus Connecticut...had three catches for 26 yards versus Notre Dame...had two catches for 12 yards and a three-yard TD versus YSU.

2004: After being a backup the year prior, Gill started all 12 games and earned Most Improved Offensive Player honors from the coaching staff...ranked third on the team in receiving yards (433) and fourth in receptions (25)...ranked second in TD catches (tied with four) and yards per catch (17.3 avg.)...caught a TD pass in four of the last five regular-season games...had the longest reception by a tight end in Pitt history when he caught an 80-yard TD at South Florida...play ranks as the sixth longest pass play (tied) in school history overall...finished with two catches for a career-high 126 yards (63.0 avg.) versus the Bulls...one of the heroes of the Notre Dame win with six receptions for 89 yards and a touchdown...named the John Mackey Tight End of the Week for his effort...his nine-yard TD reception with 2:24 remaining put the Panthers ahead, 38-35...after the Irish tied it with a field goal with 1:11 left, Gill made three critical catches on Pitt's game-winning drive...the first was a 36-yard scamper in which he ripped a pass from an Irish defender and raced down the sideline to the ND 33...after a one-yard catch on the next play, Gill then followed up with a diving eight-yard grab on the 24-yard line to help set up Josh Cummings' game-winning FG three plays later...coaching staff's Co-Offensive Player of the Game for the Notre Dame contest...his 36-yard catch-and-run versus the Irish was voted the "Pontiac Game Changing Performance of the Week" by online voters at ESPN.com...was also the coaching staff's Offensive Player of the Game for the Syracuse contest...had two catches for 33 yards (16.5 avg.) with a 15-yard TD and also caught a two-point conversion pass versus the Orange...earned the coaching staff's Blocker of the Game award for the Furman contest...hailed in his first career TD reception, a 21-yarder, against Rutgers.

2003: Played in all 13 games for the second consecutive season...earned second letter serving as the primary backup to tight end Kris Wilson and playing special teams...finished the season with one catch for 15 yards (versus Ball State).

2002: In his first active collegiate season, Gill played in all 13 games...served as the chief reserve at tight end and saw significant special teams work...lone catch of the season was an eight-yard reception to the one-yard line against Texas A&M, setting up Pitt's first touchdown.
