Head Coach Paul Pooley enters his 10th season at the helm of the Providence College men's hockey team, marking the second longest tenure of a head coach in PC men's hockey history.

In 1994, Pooley took over a team which had lost 19 games the prior season. In his rookie year behind the Friars' bench, Pooley's squad experienced the ups and downs of a long season before the team meshed late in the year as PC made a run at the HOCKEY EAST title. Pooley saw his team come together the last 10 games and post a 5-2-3 mark, including upset wins over seventh-ranked New Hampshire and top-ranked Maine in the HOCKEY EAST playoffs. Pooley became the first rookie coach in HOCKEY EAST history to bring his team to the finals, where PC's magical run ended with a 3-2 loss to eventual national champion Boston University.

In 1995-96, the Friars were one of the biggest surprises in college hockey. Picked to finish seventh in the Preseason HOCKEY EAST Coaches' Poll, the Friars registered a 12-9-3 mark in league play and earned a fourth-place finish. Again Pooley led the underdog Friars on a late-season run as they swept Boston College in a HOCKEY EAST Quarterfinal series, upset top-ranked Boston University in the Semifinals and defeated Maine in the Finals to earn their first HOCKEY EAST title since 1985. With the win, Pooley, the 10th head coach in the history of Providence College, became only the second Friar head coach to lead PC to a HOCKEY EAST title and the first to guide the team to two con-

secutive HOCKEY EAST Championship Game appearances.

In addition to winning the 1996 HOCKEY EAST Championship, Pooley's amazing Friars made their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1991. Although the Friars were defeated, 5-1, in the West Regionals by Minnesota, Pooley's squad finished the year with a 21-15-3 mark. Coaching in only his second season, Pooley had led his team to one of the most successful seasons in the history of Providence College hockey.

In 1996-97, Pooley led his team on yet another late season run in which the Friars recorded a 6-2 mark in February, including a 3-2 win against third-ranked New Hampshire. With the strong finish in February, PC concluded the season with a 12-11-1 mark in HOCKEY EAST play and wrapped up its second-straight fourth-place finish in league play. The 12-11-1 record marked the first time since 1992 that PC had put together consecutive winning seasons in HOCKEY EAST action.

In 1997-98, Pooley saw his team jump out to an 11-3-1 mark and a No. 10 national ranking. Although the Friars struggled the second half of the season, the young team gained experience and confidence which proved to be valuable in 1998-99.

In 1998-99, PC recorded the 11th 20-win campaign in the history of PC hockey with a 20-17-1 mark. The Friars, who finished the regular season in fourth place, advanced to the HOCKEY

EAST final four at the FleetCenter for the third time in Pooley's five years as the head coach. Pooley also guided the Friars to one of the team's top offensive performances of all-time.

With 159 tallies, PC produced its highest goal total since 1992 and its 10th highest total of all-time. The Friars finished fourth in the nation in scoring, averaging 4.18 goals per game. The team also had the nation's top-ranked power play at 25.4 percent.

Pooley guided the 1999-00 Friars to an 18-18-2 mark and a fifth-place finish in the HOCKEY EAST standings. Included in the team's record was a remarkable seven wins against ranked teams.

In 2000-01, Pooley's Friars were picked to finish sixth in the HOCKEY EAST coaches' poll. PC opened the season with a pair of wins and jumped into the national rankings. The Friars remained ranked among the nation's elite for 22-consecutive weeks, peaking at No. 8 along the way to their most wins ever under Pooley.

The final 22-13-5 overall record and 13-8-3 mark in league play had the Friars tied for second place in HOCKEY EAST -- their highest

league finish ever.

The Friars survived the HOCKEY EAST quarterfinals matchup with Boston University, as the third and final game of the best-of-three series went 96 minutes. PC then defeated Maine in the semifinals to make their third appearance in the HOCKEY EAST Championship game in Pooley's seven years.

The championship game against Boston College did not go Providence's way as the Friars were defeated, 5-3, but the Friars season turned heads and PC earned the school's ninth appearance in the NCAA Tournament and the second appearance under Pooley. For his team's success, Pooley was named the HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year and New England Hockey Writers' Coach of the Year.

In 2001-02, Pooley's squad posted a 13-20-5 record, including an 8-13-3 finish in HOCKEY EAST play. The Friars recorded a 4-3 victory at third-ranked New Hampshire. PC also defeated Brown, 4-3, to capture the third Mayor's Cup under Pooley.

Last season, the Friars finished with a 19-14-3 overall mark and tied for fourth-place in league play with a 12-9-3 record. Providence just missed out on its third NCAA Tournament bid under Pooley, but there were many highlights to the season. The Friars, who were ranked as high as No. 8 nationally, posted their best start in school history with seven consecutive victories.

On January 24, Pooley became just the third head coach in Providence College history to record 150 or more wins as the Friars defeated Boston College, 4-1, in Chestnut Hill, Mass. Pooley has 157 wins, which is second all-time at Providence, behind legendary coach Lou Lamoriello. Pooley's squad also went undefeated (6-0-2) in the month of February for the first time since the 1988-89 season. The season also was highlighted by PC's 5-1 victory at Maine on February 14. The win marked the Friars' first triumph at Maine's Alford Arena since 1989. The Friars also earned a 4-2 victory over the Black Bears at Schneider Arena on January 3, when Maine was ranked No. 1 nationally. The victories over Maine were among the six wins the Friars had against ranked opponents in 2002-03. In addition, Pooley led the Friars to their second consecutive Mayor's Cup with a 3-1 win over cross-town rival Brown on January 28.

Prior to arriving at Providence College, Pooley spent three seasons at Lake Superior State. He was the associate head coach for the 1994 NCAA Champions at Lake Superior. In each of

his three seasons as an assistant to Jeff Jackson, the Lakers advanced to the NCAA championship game, winning in 1992 and 1994.

It was these winning qualities and his strong commitment to academic achievement which brought Pooley together with Providence College. In making the announcement of Pooley's hiring on July 28, 1994, Providence College President, Reverend Philip A. Smith, O.P. said, "Providence sought a coach supportive of its mission as an educational institution who could also lead our ice hockey program to the highest competitive level possible. Paul's academic background obviously underscores his commitment to this mission and his ice hockey accomplishments prove his ability to balance excellence on two fronts."

Pooley got his start in collegiate hockey coaching at his alma mater, Ohio State, after retiring from professional hockey. He served as an

assistant to Jerry Welsh with the Buckeyes from 1988-91.

As a player at Ohio State, Pooley and his twin brother, Perry, played for some of the most successful teams in Buckeye history. Paul finished his career as Ohio State's all-time leader in goals (114), assists (156) and points (270). He was the Central Collegiate Hockey League's Player of the Year and the Bauer Player of the Year as college hockey's leading scorer with 32 goals and 64 assists for 96 points in 41 games. He graduated cum laude with degrees in accounting and marketing. In September of 1994, the high scoring forward was named to Ohio State's Athletic Hall of Fame.

A three-time member of the CCHA's All-Academic Team, he was an Academic All-American in 1984. Among his other accomplishments in the CCHA was Co-Rookie of the Year honors in 1981 and First Team All-Star in 1984. Pooley

is the league's third all-time leading scorer with 207 career points on 82 goals and 125 assists.

Following his college career, Pooley was signed by the Winnipeg Jets of the National Hockey League. He played two seasons with the Sherbrooke Canadiens of the American Hockey League, playing on a Calder Cup Champion in 1985. In 1986, Paul moved on to Fort Wayne of the International Hockey League where he served as co-captain and led the Komets to a regular season title. During his three professional seasons, Pooley saw action in 15 NHL games collecting three assists for Winnipeg. After the 1986-87 season he retired from pro hockey to go into private business with his brother.

A hard working, highly organized bench boss, Pooley and his wife, Kelly reside in North Providence, Rhode Island with their 9-year-old son, Scott, and 6-year-old daughter, Taylor.

**DAVID BERARD -- ASSISTANT COACH**

David Berard enters his 12th season overall in college hockey and his sixth-consecutive season as the top assistant at Providence College. A Coventry, R.I. native, Berard graduated from PC in 1992 with a bachelor's degree in marketing.

With the Friars, Berard oversees a variety of roles, including serving as the program's recruiting coordinator, monitoring all NCAA Compliance issues, working directly with the Friar goaltenders and defensemen and overseeing the team's penalty-killing unit. In addition, he also is the staff liaison for all Friar Hockey Alumni Events.

Known as one of the top recruiters in the country, Berard has been instrumental in bringing in a number of talented players to Providence over the past four years. During this time, seven Friar players have been selected in the NHL Entry Draft. In 2000-01, Devin Rask and Nolan Schaefer were named to the Hockey East All-Star Teams, as well as, Second Team All-America. In the past three seasons, Friar freshmen skaters have made a significant impact in Hockey East play with Peter Fregoe (2000) and Regan Kelly (2001) making the Hockey East All-Rookie Team, in addition to playing runner-up in Rookie of the Year balloting in their rookie years.

The 32-year old Berard returned to Providence College before the start of the 1998-99 season after serving for two years as the top assistant at Lake Superior State University of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association. At Lake Superior, Berard served as the recruiting coordinator for then Head Coach, Scott Borek, a former Friar assistant. Berard began his coaching career at Colby College in Waterville, Maine during the 1992-93 season. After two successful rebuilding years, Berard returned to his alma mater to serve as an assistant coach for then first-year Head Coach, Paul Pooley. In his first two years at Providence, he helped guide the Friars to two consecutive trips to the Hockey East Championship Game, finishing runner-up in 1995 and winning the Hockey East Championship in 1996. For their efforts, the Friars earned an automatic berth to the 1996 NCAA Ice Hockey Tournament, West Regional in East Lansing, Mich. In 2000-2001, Berard also helped lead the Friars to their best finish ever in the Hockey East Regular Season Standings, a berth in the Hockey East Championship Game and an at-large bid to the NCAA Ice Hockey Tournament, West Regional in Grand Rapids, Mich.

In four out of the seven years that Berard has served as an assistant coach at Providence College, the Friars have advanced to the Hockey East Semifinals at the FleetCenter in Boston, Mass., playing in three Hockey East Championship Games. Furthermore, two of those Friar teams have advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

During the past nine years, Berard has worked for the New England District at the USA Hockey Select Festivals. In the summer of 2001, Berard was appointed the Director of Player Development and Select Coaching for the New England District. He also begins his fourth year as the Rhode Island Coach-In-Chief for the USA Hockey Coaching Education Program.

A former goaltender in his playing days at Providence College, Berard was a member of one of the most successful classes to ever wear a Friar uniform, amassing a total of 87 wins over their four year career. Berard was a member of three teams that reached the Hockey East Championship Tournament and two teams that qualified for the NCAA Ice Hockey Tournament.

David is married to former PC field hockey player, Lynne Campbell. David and Lynne currently reside in Coventry, R.I. with their 10-month-old son, Bret.

RICK BENNETT -- ASSISTANT COACH

Rick Bennett enters his fourth season as an assistant at Providence College.

A native of Springfield, Mass., Bennett is very familiar with Providence College hockey. A 1990 graduate of the College, Bennett ranks 21st all-time in scoring at PC with 134 points (50 goals, 84 assists). In 1988-89, he notched 46 points (14 goals, 32 assists) and earned Second Team All-America honors. As a senior at Providence, Bennett recorded 36 points (12 goals, 24 assists) and was a Hobey Baker Finalist. He also earned Second Team All-HOCKEY EAST accolades in 1990.

After graduating from Providence, Bennett played professional hockey. From 1990-93, Bennett played for the Binghamton Rangers of the AHL and saw action in 15 games for the New York Rangers (NHL). After leaving Binghamton, he spent two seasons with the Springfield Indians of the AHL. Bennett played his final four seasons of professional hockey (1995-99) for the Jacksonville Lizard Kings (ECHL) and the Pee Dee Pride (ECHL). In addition to playing for the Lizard Kings and the Pride, Bennett also served as an assistant coach for each team.

Bennett is involved with all aspects of on ice instruction for the Friars. He also works with PC's defensemen, assists with recruiting and monitors the team's academic progress.

Upon hiring Bennett, Head Coach Paul Pooley stated, "We are very excited to have Rick join our coaching staff at PC. He was one of the top players in the history of Friar hockey. Rick brings a great passion and enthusiasm to the position, as well as an incredible knowledge of the game."

Bennett, Pooley and Friar Volunteer Coach Rob Gaudreau all were Hobey Baker Finalists, giving Providence the distinct honor of being the only program in the country with three Finalists on its coaching staff.

The 35-year-old Bennett and his wife, Karyn, have four children, Hayley, Brooke, Race and Laken.

Last season, the Friars posted a 19-14-3 overall record and a 12-9-3 mark in Hockey East play to finish tied for fourth in the league. Led by seniors Jon DiSalvatore (S. Windsor, Conn.), Devin Rask (Parkside, Sask.), Nolan Schaefer (Yellow Grass, Sask.), Shawn Weiman (Marshall, Sask.), Doug Wright (Kamsack, Sask.), Mike Lucci (Parma, Ohio) and graduate student Peter Fregoe (Massena, N.Y.), the Friars made a strong run towards the end of the season, going undefeated (6-0-2) in the month of February for the first time since the 1988-89 season. However, Providence just missed out on an NCAA Tournament berth as it was defeated, 2-0, in a best-of-three Hockey East Quarterfinal series versus Boston University.

The trio of DiSalvatore, Fregoe and Rask accounted for 60 of PC's 126 goals last season, while Schaefer was strong in net, posting a 13-8-2 record and a .909 save percentage. While it will be hard to replace the senior class, this season's

squad is "very hungry" for the upcoming season.

"It's going to be a collective team effort and hard work has to be a staple for us," Pooley said. "Defense is our No. 1 priority."

Pooley, who is entering his 10th season as head coach of the Friars, will rely on the six seniors to lead the team this season. Seniors Jonathan Goodwin (Taunton, Mass.), Cody Loughlean (Innisfail, Sask.), Jason Platt (Portola Valley, Calif.), Mike Robinson (Biggar, Sask.), Stephen Wood (Sudbury, Mass.) and Peter Zingoni (Newtown, Conn.) all had career-highs in points in 2002-03 and will look to continue their success in the upcoming season. The team also will have six juniors, six sophomores and seven newcomers.

"We will have more balance this season," Pooley said. "We'll have four lines going."

THE DEFENSE Returning 7; Lost 1; Newcomers 1

Defense will be the key for the Friars this season. The Friars will have eight defensemen and two talented netminders on the 2003-04 team. The defensive unit is a combination of size, talent and experience. Leading the way

for the Friars will be senior Stephen Wood (Sudbury, Mass.), who is coming off his best season as a Friar, earning Second Team All-Hockey East honors. The 6-foot-3 inch, 210-pound blue liner was instrumental in PC's late season run. Wood was named Hockey East Player of the Month for February, posting four goals and eight assists for 12 points (four multiple-point games) as the Friars went 6-0-2 in February. Always a threat on the power play with his hard slap shots from the blue line, Wood finished the season ranked fourth on the team with nine goals and 20 assists for 29 points. He had three games in which he posted three assists, including a three-assist performance in a 5-1 victory at Maine, marking the team's first triumph at Maine's Alford Arena since 1989. In addition, Wood led the Friars with plus/minus rating of +21, the highest rating for a Friar since Fernando Pisani was +22 in 1997.

Jason Platt (Portola Valley, Calif.)



is one of two senior defensemen on the Friars. Platt, one of the more physical players on the squad, has played in 93 games in his three seasons at Providence. Last season, he played in 30 of the team's 36 games as he battled several injuries. He tallied a career-high eight points (one goal and seven assists). Juniors Eric Lundberg (Vernon, Conn.) and Jeff Mason (Easthampton, Mass.) bring a wealth of experience to the team, having seen significant action in their first two seasons at PC. Lundberg played in 33 games in 2002-03 and recorded six assists as well as a plus/minus rating of +14. Mason saw action in the first 21 games and registered one goal and seven assists, but missed the rest of the season because of an injury.

Sophomores James Pemberton (Cumberland, R.I.), Luke Irwin (Bloomington, Minn.) and Matt Mannina (Schaumburg, Ill.) are the other returning defensemen. Pemberton, a 6-foot-4 inch, 215-pound blue liner, enjoyed an impressive first season with the Friars and will look to build on last season's success. He played in 33 of 36 games and recorded 11 points (two goals and nine assists). In addition, he had a plus/minus rating of +13. Irwin, who played in 22 games including 20 consecutive contests in the second half of the season, tallied four assists last season. Mannina saw action in seven games and recorded one assist as he battled an illness for the second half of the season. Dinos Stamoulis (Carle Place, N.Y.) is the lone rookie on the defense for the Friars. Stamoulis, a smart player, played for the Texas Tornado of the North American Hockey League last season. He finished fourth on the team and first among defensemen in scoring with 54 points (14 goals, 40 assists) in 53 games. For his efforts, Stamoulis earned the team's Best Defenseman Award and the Texas Tornado Award.

Goaltending will be the key to having a strong defense. The Friars have two returning goaltenders in sophomore Bobby Goepfert (Kings Park, N.Y.) and junior David Cacciola (Burlington, Mass.). In 13 games last season, Goepfert posted a 6-6-1 mark, a 2.39 goals against average and a .924 save percentage. Goepfert also represented the United States in the World Junior Championships, where he was impressive. He posted the second best save percentage (.937) in U.S. history at the Championships and the third best goals against average (1.77). Goepfert, who was named PC's Most Valuable Freshman, posted a 4-1 record in five starts at the World Juniors.

Cacciola, who patiently has waited his turn, will get the opportunity to show his talents this season. He played in five games in his freshman season and was impressive. Cacciola posted a 2-2 record, a 3.22 goals against average and a .897 save percentage. Last season, he did not see any action but he improved his game in practice and is poised to make a significant contribution this season.

Mike Wolfe (Milford, Conn.), a junior transfer from Fairfield University, will add more depth to the goaltending crew. Wolfe played two years with the Stags and posted a 3.31 goals against average in 22 games.

Coach Pooley believes that balanced scoring will be one of the keys to a successful season. With the group of returning and rookie forwards this season, the Friars will have plenty of balance. Leading the way will be a quartet of seniors, who had their best season in a Friar uniform in 2002-03. Seniors Pe-

ter Zingoni (Newtown, Conn.), Jonathan Goodwin (Taunton, Mass.), Cody Loughlean (Innisfail, Alta.) and Mike Robinson (Biggar, Sask.) all posted career-highs in scoring last season and are looking to continue that trend in the upcoming year.

Zingoni, one of PC's fastest skaters, recorded 25 points last season (12 goals, 13 assists), which doubled his output from his previous two seasons with the Friars. He finished fifth on the team with 25 points and fifth with three power-play goals. Zingoni, who was bothered with an injury for the second half of the season, has the ability to be PC's leading scorer this season and he will be a catalyst on the Friars' power play.

Goodwin began last season playing on the fourth line, but by the end of the season he was on the first line, where he enjoyed much success. For the season, Goodwin tallied 17 points (four goals, 13 assists) which ranked fourth on the team. In his first two seasons at Providence, Goodwin had totaled 12 points, but he had an outstanding 2002-03 season and earned the team's Unsung Hero Award.

Loughlean, a tenacious right winger, also emerged as one of PC's top scorers last season, posting seven goals and five assists for 12 points. Four of Loughlean's seven goals were game winners, including three in Hockey East action. Loughlean, who played in all 36 games last season, will be one of the Friar leaders in 2003-04.

Junior Chris Chaput (Pawtucket, R.I.) will be a key contributor to the team this season. The 5-foot-10-inch, 190-pound center, played in 33 games last season and registered 18 points (three goals, 15 assists). Chaput is a very skilled player who won over 63 percent

of his faceoffs last season. He has gained great experience in his two seasons with the Friars, playing in 71 games in that span. Classmate David Carpentier (Faribault, Minn.) saw action in 16 games last season and tallied one goal and four assists for five points.

Sophomores Torry Gajda (Westfield, Mass.) and Nate Meyers (Maple Glen, Pa.) gained significant experience as freshmen. Gajda is a hard working left winger, who played in 27 games last season. He tallied six goals and three assists for nine points. Gajda, who is one of the top penalty killers on the team, scored two short-handed goals to lead the squad in 2002-03. Meyers is a physical right winger, who played in 18 games last season and registered five points (two goals, three assists).

Junior Tom Gallagher (Concord, Mass.) joined the Friars last season as a walk-on. At 6-foot-4 inch, 200 pounds, he will add more depth and size at left wing.

Providence welcomes five rookie forwards to the 2003-04 team. The freshmen bring a combination of speed and tenacity. The rookies include: Kevin Brooks (Stow, Mass.), Bill McCreary (Howell, Mich.), Colin McDonald (Wethersfield, Conn.), Chase Watson (Media, Pa.) and Tony Zancanaro (Trenton, Mich.).

Brooks, a gritty competitor, played for the Cedar Rapids Roughriders of the United States Hockey League for two years. Last season, he was named team captain of the Roughriders and finished sixth on the team with 14 goals and 12 assists for 26 points.

McCreary is another left winger, who played for the Texas Tornado last season, along with Stamoulis. McCreary led the Tornado in scoring

with 60 points (27 goals, 33 assists) despite missing 11 games because of an injury. McCreary, an assistant captain with the Tornado, is a very skilled, tenacious player. Last season, he was named the Tornado's team MVP.

McDonald comes to Providence after a stellar season with the New England Coyotes of the Eastern Junior Hockey League. McDonald, the captain of the Coyotes, led the EJHL in scoring with 78 points (35 goals, 43 assists) last season. For his efforts, he was named league MVP and earned the league's Best Forward Award. The 6-foot-3 inch, 190-pound right winger brings size, talent and versatility to the Friar lineup.

Watson, a center with good hockey sense, played together with Brooks on the Roughriders. Watson led his team in scoring and finished 14th in the USHL last season with 52 points (19 goals, 33 assists).

Zancanaro rounds out the list of rookie forwards. Zancanaro, whose twin brother, Brad, plays at Boston University, was team captain of the NAHL's Springfield (Mo.) Spirit. He is solid all-around player, who excels in faceoff opportunities. He led the Spirit in scoring last season with 56 points (18 goals, 38 assists). The Spirit retired his No. 5 jersey, becoming the first ever jersey to be retired by the Spirit.

THE SCHEDULE

In addition to the always difficult 24 regular-season games versus Hockey East foes, the Friars also will have a tough non-conference schedule. Providence opens the regular season at Schneider Arena against Sacred Heart on October 11 and Rensselaer on Octo-

ber 12. The Friars then will travel to Minnesota State University for two games on October 17-18. The Mavericks made two trips to Providence last season as they played the Friars in October and returned in March for the NCAA Regionals at the Dunkin' Donuts Center. The conference schedule begins on October 24 at home versus Boston University, which eliminated Providence from the Hockey East Tournament last season. The league schedule includes two games at Maine (Feb. 20-21) and two games at Boston College (Nov. 21, Jan. 30). The Friars will host 2003 NCAA runner-up New Hampshire twice (Nov. 14, Jan. 9). Massachusetts, Merrimack, UMass Lowell and Northeastern add to the grueling Hockey East schedule, which is considered one of the best leagues in the nation.

PC also will host Brown for the annual Mayor's Cup on November 25 at Schneider Arena. On December 27-28, Providence College and the Dunkin' Donuts Center will host a holiday tournament, which will feature St. Cloud State, Harvard and Clarkson. Providence also will host Quinnipiac on January 3 and will travel to Michigan to face Lake Superior State for two games on January 23-24.

WRAP UP

Playing as a team and the importance of team defense will be the focal points for the Friars this season. The Friars will need balanced scoring and a consistently strong defensive effort in order to contend for the Hockey East title. Pooley, along with assistant coaches David Berard and Rick Bennett, believe they have a solid core of experienced veterans and a talented crop of newcomers that have unlimited potential.

The Providence College men's hockey team finished the 2002-03 season with a 19-14-3 overall record and a 12-9-3 HOCKEY EAST record, which was good for fourth-place in the league.

Led by seniors Jon DiSalvatore (S. Windsor, Conn.), Devin Rask (Parkside, Sask.) and graduate student Peter Fregoe (Massena, N.Y.), the Friars began the season with a school record seven-game winning streak, culminating with an 8-1 victory over Princeton on November 3 at Schneider Arena. During the seven-game winning streak the Friars outscored their opponents, 42-13. Providence then struggled as they posted a 2-6-1 in their next nine games. After a 28-day layoff, the Friars began the second half of the season with an impressive 4-2 victory over Maine, which at the time was ranked No. 1 nationally.

In the month of January, the Friars posted a 4-6 record, but three of their four wins were against ranked teams, including road victories over No. 10 Boston University (3-2 OT on Jan. 9) and No. 6 Boston College (4-1 on Jan. 25). The win over the Eagles on January 25 was Head Coach Paul Pooley's 150th victory at Providence, making him the third coach at Providence College to record 150 or more wins. The Friars also defeated Brown, 3-1, on January 28 to capture their second consecutive Mayor's Cup.

After dropping a 3-1 home loss against Northeastern on January 30, the Friars began a season long eight-game unbeaten streak through the month of February. On the first day of February, the Friars erased a 3-1 deficit and defeated Massachusetts, 5-3. PC then skated passed UMass Lowell, 6-1, on February 7 and defeated No. 4 New Hampshire, 5-2, on February 9. In order to maintain their streak, the Friars had the tough task of winning at Maine, a feat they had not achieved since 1989. However, 2003 proved to be the year the Friars ended their drought at Maine. They scored three goals in the first period and cruised to a 5-1 victory over the third-ranked Black Bears on Febru-

ary 14. Fregoe scored two goals, but junior Mike Robinson's and DiSalvatore's goals sealed the win for the Friars. Senior Nolan Schaefer (Yellow Grass, Sask.) was stellar in net as he made 33 saves. The following night, the Friars and the Black Bears tied 2-2 as Maine scored the equalizer in the third period.

PC's next game was an exciting 5-4 overtime victory over the ninth-ranked Boston University Terriers at Schneider Arena on February 21. The Friars led 4-1 with seven minutes left in the third period, but BU battled back to tie the game and send it into overtime. The Ter-

riers controlled most of the extra session and it appeared that they were headed for victory when they went on a power play. However, it was the Friars' DiSalvatore who scored the game-winning goal with 45 seconds remaining. Providence then completed the regular season series versus the Terriers the following night, skating to a 3-3 overtime tie in Boston. The Friars ended the month with a 6-0-2 record by defeating UMass Lowell, 3-1, on February 28 in

the final regular season game. The win marked the first time since the 1988-89 season that the Friars went undefeated in the month of February. The Friars' strong finish earned them a fourth place in HOCKEY EAST and home ice advantage in the league quarterfinals against Boston University. However, PC was eliminated from the playoffs when BU swept a best-of-three series. In the first game on March 7, the Terriers outlasted the Friars, 5-4, in overtime. The Terriers were again victorious in the second game as they cruised, 7-1, on March 8 in the second

game. The Friars' 19-14-3 overall record was not good enough as PC just missed out at an NCAA Tournament bid.

Despite missing the NCAA's, the Friars had many highlights in 2002-03. DiSalvatore and Fregoe enjoyed career highs in scoring as they posted 48 and 44 points, respectively. DiSalvatore (19 goals and 29 assists) led the team in points and power-play goals (seven). He earned the team's Most Valuable Player Award for the second consecutive sea-



son and also was the recipient of the Friar Award. Fregoe was second on the team in points and first with 23 goals, including five game winners. He also was HOCKEY EAST Player of the Month for October, recording two hat tricks in that month. Fregoe and DiSalvatore earned HOCKEY EAST Honorable Mention All-Star honors. Not to be overlooked was Rask, who also had 44 points (18 goals, 26 assists), including a career-high four goals against Princeton on November 3. Rask was a Second Team All-American in 2001 and completed his career at Providence ranked 14th all-time in scoring with 151 points (64 goals, 87 assists). Fregoe ranks 15th all-time in scoring with 148 points (68 goals and 80 assists) and DiSalvatore ranks 18th with 142 points (59 goals, 83 assists). DiSalvatore, Fregoe and Rask proved to be one of the most successful trios in PC hockey history.

Another senior who made a tremendous impact on the team was Schaefer, who finished the season with a 13-8-2 record, a 2.96 goals against average and a .909 save percentage. His play in February was most impressive as he recorded a 6-0-2 mark, 2.06 goals against average and a .936 save percentage. He made a career-high 46 saves as the Friars defeated fourth-ranked New Hampshire, 5-2, on February 9. Schaefer, a 2001 Second-Team All-American, finished his career at Providence with a record 2,848 saves. In addition, he also was named to the Hockey East Honorable Mention All-Star Team in 2003 and earned the team's Best Defensive Player of the Year Award as well as the Academic Award. Seniors Mike Lucci (Parma, Ohio), Shawn Weiman (Marshall, Sask.) and Doug Wright (Kamsack, Sask.) provided great contributions and experience to the team. Lucci tallied six points (five goals, one assist) in 29 games, Weiman finished with seven points (two goals, five assists) in 34 games and Wright posted eight points (five goals, three assists) in 34 games.

Five juniors had their best years at Providence led by defenseman Stephen Wood (Sudbury, Mass.) who finished fourth on the team in scoring with a career-high 29 points (nine goals, 20 assists). He led the team with plus/minus rating of +21. Wood, who was named HOCKEY EAST Player of the Month for February, earned Second Team All HOCKEY EAST honors. Peter Zingoni (Newtown, Conn.) had 25 points during his first two seasons at Providence, but in 2002-03 he equaled that amount with 25 points (12 goals, 13 assists) despite battling an injury for the second half of the season. Two of Zingoni's goals came on January 3 as the Friars defeated top-ranked Maine, 4-2. Jonathan Goodwin (Taunton, Mass.) more than doubled his output from his first two seasons at Providence, tallying a career-high 17 points (four goals, 13 assists), including one goal and one assist in a 5-2 victory over fourth-ranked New Hampshire on February 9. Goodwin earned the Team's Unsung Hero Award. Cody Loughlean (Innisfail, Alta.) emerged as a leader for the Friars, recording a career-high seven goals and 12 points. Four of his seven goals were game winners as he finished second on the team in that category. Mike Robinson (Kamsack, Sask.) also had a career season with eight points (three goals and five assists). Defenseman Jason Platt (Portola Valley, Calif.) battled through an injury riddled season, but managed to play in 30 games and record eight points (one goal, seven assists).

Sophomore forward Chris Chaput (Pawtucket, R.I.) finished sixth on the team in scoring with 18 points (three goals and 15 assists), including the game-winning goal in overtime as the Friars overcame a 2-0 deficit to defeat No. 10 Boston University, 3-2, on January 9. Chaput's game-winning goal was featured on ESPN's SportsCenter Top 10 Plays on January 10. Sophomore defensemen Eric Lundberg (Vernon, Conn.) and Jeff Mason (Easthampton, Mass.) were steady performers for the

Friars in 2002-03. Mason played in 21 games and posted eight points (one goal and seven assists) before sustaining an injury that caused him to miss the rest of the season. Lundberg played in 33 games and recorded six points. David Carpentier (Faribault, Minn.) played in 16 games and tallied five points.

The freshman class made an immediate impact on this season's team. Defenseman James Pemberton (Cumberland, R.I.) played in 33 games and recorded two goals and nine assists. Forward Torry Gajda (Westfield, Mass.) had a solid season as he tallied nine points and six goals, including two short-handed goals. Netminder Bobby Goepfert (Kings Park, N.Y.) started 13 games and posted a 6-6-1 record with a 2.39 goals against average and a .924 save percentage. Goepfert, who earned the Team's Most Valuable Freshman Award, took time off from the team in early January as he was selected to the U.S. Junior National Team, which competed at the International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship in Nova Scotia. At the Championship, Goepfert was one of the best players for the U.S. as he posted a 4-1 record, a 1.77 goals against average and a .937 save percentage. His save percentage was the second-highest ever by a U.S. goaltender and his goals against average was the third-highest by a U.S. netminder.

The freshman class also consisted of forward Bryan Horan (Unionville, Conn.), defensemen Luke Irwin (Bloomington, Minn.) and Matt Mannina (Schaumburg, Ill.) as well as forward Nate Meyers (Maple Glen, Pa.). Horan appeared in 15 games and recorded three assists, while Irwin played in 22 games and had four assists. Mannina played in seven games, but missed the second half of the season because of an illness. Meyers saw action in 18 games and recorded five points (two goals, three assists). Sophomore Tom Gallagher (Concord, Mass.), a walk-on on the 2002-03 team, did not see any action this season, but is poised to make an impact next season.
