THIS WEEKEND'S GAMES:

The Friars play a home-and-home series with Boston University this weekend, travelling to Walter Brown Arena to face the Terriers on Friday, February 22 and then hosting BU on Saturday, February 23 at Schneider Arena in seniors Marc Suderman and Drew Omicioli's final regular-season home game.

NEXT WEEK:

The Friars travel to UMass Lowell for the final regular-season game against the River Hawks on Friday, March 1st at 7:00 p.m.

PROVIDENCE-BU SERIES:

The Friars and Terriers meet for the 128th time in the all-time series Friday night and are playing the second of this season's three games. BU leads the all-time series over Providence, holding a 77-41-9 advantage, but the Friars have gone 3-1-2 in the last six meetings. In this season's only meeting, the Friars battled back from a two-goal deficit to claim a 5-5 tie. PC juniors Devin Rask and Jon DiSalvatore each scored in the final 6:18 of the contest. Rask scored on the power-play with 6:18 remaining and DiSalvatore scored his second goal of the contest with 1:11 left in regulation.

PROVIDENCE VS. THE HOCKEY EAST:

The Friars have an all-time record of **186-217-47** in HOCKEY EAST league competition. Last year, the Friars had their best record in HOCKEY EAST play since the inaugural 1984-85 season when PC went 15-14-5 and won the HOCKEY EAST Championship. Last year, PC was 13-8-3 and finished tied for second in the regular season standings, Providence's highest finish ever in league play. In the Friars' league games this season, PC has posted an 8-10-3 record. Providence has wins over UMass Amherst, 3-2 twice, Merrimack, 3-2 and 4-1, Northeastern, 5-3, a 4-3 upset win at third-ranked UNH and a pair of wins over Boston College (6-4 and 5-2). The Friars were defeated in league games by UMass Lowell, UMass Amherst, Northeastern twice, Boston College, New Hampshire twice, Merrimack and Maine twice. PC's ties came against Boston University, 5-5, on January 11, UMass Lowell, 3-3, on Feb. 8 and Maine on February 16.

PROVIDENCE VERSUS NON-LEAGUE OPPONENTS:

This season, the Friars are 5-5-2 against non-league opponents. PC opened the season by falling to third-ranked Michigan (6-3) and 12th-ranked Nebraska-Omaha (4-3 OT) at the Maverick Stampede. PC defeated Sacred Heart (8-1) on October 19 in its next non-conference contest. The Friars then played three consecutive games against teams from the ECAC, skating to a 4-4 tie on November 20 at Union College, losing, 4-3, in overtime to St. Lawrence on November 23 and defeating Clarkson, 4-2 on November 24. PC defeated Quinnipiac University, 5-2, on Friday, December 7 and at the Mariucci Classic, the Friars defeated Western Michigan, 4-1, in the first game and were defeated, 6-1, in the championship game against second-ranked Minnesota. On Friday, January 18, the Friars skated to a 2-2 overtime tie with the University of Connecticut and on Saturday, January 19, the Friars were defeated by No. 2-

ranked St. Cloud State, 5-2. Providence won its final non-league game of the season, defeating Brown in the 16th annual Mayor's Cup game, 4-3, in overtime. Last season, the Friars compiled a 6-3-2 record against non-league opponents. PC posted a 1-1 record against ECAC teams, a 2-0 record against MAAC teams, a 0-2-2 record against WCHA teams and a 3-0-0 record against CCHA teams. PC earned non-conference victories over Ferris St., Holy Cross, Iona, Lake Superior St., Miami (Ohio) and Union.

FRIARS VERSUS RANKED TEAMS:

The Friars picked up their first win of the season against a ranked team on Sunday, January 13 when PC upset the third-ranked UNH

Wildcats, 4-3, in Durham, N.H. This season, the Friars have lost 15 games with nine of the 15 losses against teams ranked in the top-15 in the national polls. In the season-opener against Michigan, the Wolverines were ranked third in the nation and defeated the Friars, 6-3. In the second contest against Nebraska-Omaha, the Mavericks were ranked 12th in the nation and defeated PC, 4-3, in overtime. At UMass Lowell on October 26, the River Hawks were ranked 13th and defeated Providence, 4-3. Against eighth-ranked New Hampshire in Providence on November 17, the Friars were defeated, 5-1. The Friars were defeated, 6-1, by second-ranked Minnesota in the Championship game of the Mariucci Classic. PC lost to 11th-ranked Maine, 5-4, on Jan. 4th in Orono. PC was defeated, 5-2, by second-ranked St. Cloud State on Saturday, January 19, lost, 5-2, at third-ranked New Hampshire and on February 15, was defeated, 1-0, by #10 Maine. The Friars' ties with ranked teams this season were against BU (5-5), UMass Lowell (3-3) and 10th-ranked Maine (3-3).

RASK, FREGOE REACH 100-CAREER POINTS:

Providence College junior Devin Rask (Parkside, Sask.) and senior Peter Fregoe (Massena, N.Y.) became the 45th and 46th players in the history of Providence College Hockey to total 100 career points on Friday, February 8 against UMass Lowell. Rask became the 45th to reach the milestone with his assist on sophomore Cody Loughlean's (Innisfail, Alta.) first-period goal. Fregoe reached the milestone in the third period by assisting on sophomore Peter Zingoni's (Newtown, Conn.) goal and scoring his own.

SCHAEFER NAMED DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK:

Providence College men's ice hockey junior goaltender Nolan Schaefer (Yellow Grass, Sask.) was named the HOCKEY EAST Defensive Player of the Week for backstopping the Friars to a 0-1-1 weekend with Maine. Schaefer made 26 saves on Friday, February 15 as Maine defeated PC, 1-0. On Saturday, February 16, Schaefer tied his career-high with 44 saves in a 3-3 overtime tie. On the weekend, Schaefer stopped 70 of 74 shots. For the year, Schaefer has posted 3.23 goals against average, a .903 save percentage and an 11-14-5 record. The Friars are 13-15-5 overall and 8-6-4 in HOCKEY EAST play.

SPECIAL TEAMS PLAY:

The Friars scored their 20th power-play goal of the season on Friday, February 1 at North-eastern. PC has converted on 20-of-149 (0.134) man-advantage situations. PC's opponents have scored 30 power play goals, and the Friars have spoiled 133-of-163 (0.816) chances. Providence's Devin Rask leads the Friars with six power-play goals on the season. Team-mates Jon DiSalvatore and Peter Fregoe have four power-play goals each. Senior Drew Omicioli and sophomore defenseman Stephen Wood have two power-play goals each while Doug Wright, Mike Lucci and Chris Chaput each have one power-play goal. DiSalvatore and Drew Omicioli have two short-handed goals while Rask and junior Mike Lucci each have one short-handed goal.

STARTING A TREND:

The Friars have scored first in eight of the last 13 games, which is a reversal of the first half of the season, where PC rarely scored first. On the season, PC has scored the game's first goal 11 times: vs. Merrimack College (11/3); vs. Clarkson University (11/24); vs. Western Michigan (12/28); vs. Boston University (1/11); at UNH (1/13); vs. Connecticut (1/18); vs. St. Cloud (1/19); vs. Boston College (1/25); at UMass Amherst (2/2); against UMass Lowell (2/8); and against Maine (2/16). Providence has posted a 6-1-4 record in games where they scored first.

REVERSAL OF JANUARY FORTUNES:

Traditionally in the tenure of Paul Pooley, the Friars have struggled in the month of January. In eight Januaries, Pooley's teams have compiled a 27-37-5 (0.428) record. In the last two years, though, PC's squads have posted 4-2-2 and 4-2-1 records, respectively. In January play under Pooley, PC has had a winning first month just three times: January of 1999 (6-4-0), January of 2001 (4-2-1) and this past January, where the Friars were 4-2-2.

FRIARS HAVE STATISTICALLY SUCCESSFUL JANUARY:

Several members of the Friars had a successful January, helping lead Providence to a 4-2-2 month. Junior co-captain Jon DiSalvatore led the Friars with 15 points in the eight-game month. DiSalvatore scored four goals and added 11 assists and was named the HOCKEY EAST Offensive Player of the Month for his efforts. His classmate and co-captain Devin Rask scored seven goals for the month and chipped in with six assists for 13 points. Senior center Peter Fregoe also totalled 13 points in the month, scoring four goals and adding nine assists. Senior forward Drew Omicioli totalled four goals and three assists for seven points in eight games last month while sophomore leftwing Peter Zingoni totalled four goals and two assists for six points in just five January games.

DISALVATORE LEADING PC SCORER:

Junior forward Jon DiSalvatore (South Windsor, Conn.) is the leading scorer on the Friars this season through 33 games. DiSalvatore has totalled 14 goals and has a team-leading 23 assists for 37 points, which also ranks him third in the HOCKEY EAST. DiSalvatore has scored in every game except Friday and Saturday's Maine games since the start of January, totalling four goals and 16 assists for 20 points. DiSalvatore has been named HOCKEY EAST Offensive Player of the Week, U.S. College Hockey Online Offensive Player of the Week and HOCKEY EAST Offensive Player of the Month for January. Last season, DiSalvatore finished sixth on the squad in scoring, totalling nine goals and 16 assists for 25 points in 36 games. He also played for the U.S. World Junior Team, where he tied for the team lead in scoring with six goals and three assists for nine points.

DISALVATORE NAMED OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH:

Junior forward Jon DiSalvatore (South Windsor, Conn.) was named the HOCKEY EAST Offensive Player of the Month for January on Wednesday, January 31 by the league office. DiSalvatore led the Friars to a 4-2-2 record in January and totalled four goals and 11 assists for 15 points.

DISALVATORE NAMED FINALIST FOR WALTER BROWN AWARD:

Providence College men's ice hockey junior forward Jon DiSalvatore (South Windsor, Conn.) was named one of 12 finalists for the 50th Walter Brown Award, given annually to top American-born Division I college hockey player in New England. DiSalvatore is one of eight players named from HOCKEY EAST schools. DiSalvatore joins Boston College sophomores Tony Voce and Ben Eaves, Northeastern's Jim Fahey and Mike Ryan, UNH's Sean Collins, BU's Mike Pandolfo and Maine's Mike Morrison as HOCKEY EAST players chosen as finalists for the Walter Brown Award. Harvard's Peter Capouch, Yale's Dan Lombard, Dartmouth's Mike Maturo and Holy Cross' Pat Rissmiller round out the finalists. Four Providence College men's ice hockey players have earned the Walter Brown Award in the 50-year history of the award, with the last being Mike Omicioli of West Warwick, R.I., who shared the honor in 1999 with Boston College's Mike Mottau. Current PC Volunteer Coach Rob Gaudreau won the award in 1992 as a senior, Tim Army won the award in 1985 and Ron Wilson was the first Friar to win the award when he was honored in 1975. The 2002 Walter Brown Award will be presented at the New England Hockey Writers' Dinner on April 10 in Saugus, Mass.

FREGOE SECOND ON FRIARS:

Senior center Peter Fregoe (Massena, N.Y.) is second on the team in scoring for the Friars through 33 games this season with a team-leading 15 goals and 20 assists for 35 points. Fregoe also has scored four power-play goals and is second in that category. Last season as a junior, Fregoe totalled 16 goals and 21 assists for 37 points in 40 games. Fregoe also is excelling at winning faceoffs this season. The center iceman has won 63% of his draws, posting a 518-308 faceoff record. In HOCKEY EAST games, Fregoe has won 66% of his faceoffs, posting a 356-182 record. *Fregoe became the 46th player in Providence College Hockey history to reach 100-career points, doing so with a goal and assist on Friday, February 8 against*

UMass Lowell. Fregoe has amassed 45 career goals and 56 career assists for 101 career points.

RASK HEATING UP AROUND THE GOAL:

Junior left wing Devin Rask (Parkside, Sask.) is third on the team in scoring with 14 goals and 17 assists for 31 points in 32 games. Rask leads all PC players with six power-play goals and also has a short-handed goal on the season. Last season, Rask earned All-America and First Team All-HOCKEY EAST honors for his 23 goals and 28 assists for a 51-point season. *Rask became the 45th player in Providence College Hockey history to score 100 career points when he tallied a first-period assist against UMass Lowell on Friday, February 8. In 108 career games, Rask has amassed 44 career goals and 59 career assists for 103 career points.*

OMICIOLI FOURTH ON FRIARS IN SCORING:

PC senior Drew Omicioli (West Warwick, R.I.) is fourth in scoring for the Friars this season with 13 goals and 16 assists for 29 points in 32 games this season. Omicioli has scored two shorthanded goals this season after he ranked second in the nation last season with four shorthanded goals. Three weeks ago, Omicioli scored four goals and added two assists as PC won all three games it played. Omicioli scored the game-winning goal in each of last week's games, and was named HOCKEY EAST's Co-Offensive Player of the Week and USCHO's Offensive Player of the Week. *In 130 career games, Omicioli has amassed 44 career goals and 52 career assists for 96 career points. He needs four points to become the 47th player in Friar history to record 100 or more points.*

Wood ranks fifth on the team in scoring this season, he is tied for third in scoring among HOCKEY EAST defensemen and has posted a +10 plus/minus rating, which ranks him second on the team. Last year, Wood totalled three goals and four assists for seven points while playing in 36 games.

SCHNEIDER ARENA:

Providence College's Schneider Arena is in its 29th season this year, and fans at Schneider have seen the PC Friars win 61 percent of their

games at Schneider. Opened in 1973 with a 1-0 win over visiting Pennsylvania, the Friars have totalled a **279-170-32 (0.613)** overall record. During the 2000-01 season, the Friars posted their best home record since 1989-90 when PC posted a 13-4-2 mark. Last year, the Friars' home record was 15-4-1. This season, the Friars are 8-6-4 at Schneider with wins over Sacred Heart, UMass Amherst, Merrimack (twice), Clarkson, Quinnipiac, Brown and Boston College. PC has losses at home to UMass Amherst, Northeastern, New Hampshire, St. Lawrence, St. Cloud State and Maine. The Friars' ties came against Boston University, Connecticut, UMass Lowell and Maine.

FRIARS TIE #10 MAINE, 3-3:

The Providence College men's hockey team skated to a 3-3 overtime tie with 10th-ranked Maine on Saturday, February 16 at PC's Schneider Arena. PC's Devin Rask scored all three goals for the Friars, completing his first hat trick of the year in the third period to give the Friars a 3-2 lead. The Friars opened the scoring in the contest when Providence junior co-captain Devin Rask (Parkside, Sask.) flipped a backhand between Maine goaltender Mike Morrison's right arm and the post for his 12th goal of the season. Rask's goal was set up by sophomore Cody Loughlean (Innisfail, Alta.) and Dominic Torretti (Ludlow, Mass.) as Torretti carried the puck into the offensive zone and Loughlean cycled the puck around the back of the net to Rask. Rask tallied again for the Friars at the 10:51 mark of the first period, as he skated in on Morrison and beat the Black Bears' keeper with a quick wrist-shot through the pads. PC caught Maine on a line change, leading to Rask's second of the game and 13th of the season with assists going to freshmen David Carpentier (Faribault, Minn.) and Jeff Mason (Easthampton, Mass.). PC and Maine skated through a scoreless second period, as the Black Bears outshot the Friars, 12-3. The third period was when the scoring began for real, as Maine scored all three of their tallies in the final 20 minutes. Francis Nault got the Black Bears on the scoreboard at the 8:53 mark of the third period when he scored on the power play. The Friars' Peter Fregoe (Massena, N.Y.) was whistled for hook-

ing at the same time, giving Maine back-to-back man-advantage situations. Nault capitalized for the Bears less than 60 seconds later, beating PC goaltender Nolan Schaefer (Yellow Grass, Sask.) to tie the score for Maine. With just 1:29 remaining in the contest, Rask skated in on Morrison for the Friars and was able to stuff his shot under the pads of the Maine goaltender to give Providence what seemed like the game-winning goal. Loughlean fed Rask, collecting the puck off a Maine turnover in the neutral zone. Rask's heroics would not stand up, though, as Maine - with Morrison pulled in favor of the extra attacker - scored 18 seconds later to once again knot the score, this time for good at 3-3. Neither team was able to score in overtime. Schaefer tied his career-high with 44 saves - the fourth time he has recorded 44 stops this season - while Morrison made 23 saves as Maine outshot the Friars', 47-26.

FRIARS DEFEATED BY #10 MAINE, 1-0:

The 10th-ranked Maine Black Bears defeated the Providence College Friars, 1-0, in HOCKEY EAST action on Friday, February 15 at Providence, R.I. Maine opened the scoring in the game at the 6:34 mark of the first period when Lucas Lawson fired a quick wrist-shot past PC goaltender Nolan Schaefer (Yellow Grass, Sask.). The goal came off a Providence turnover in the neutral zone and Martin Kariya and Troy Barnes assisted on the score. Lucas' first-period goal proved to be the only scoring in the contest as neither Maine nor Providence could score in the second and third periods. The Friars had an excellent opportunity to even the score with four minutes remaining in the game and PC defenseman Regan Kelly (Imperial, Sask.) poised to fire the puck into an open Maine goal, but Peter Metcalf pushed the net off the moorings and was whistled for delay of game. PC could not capitalize on the power play opportunity, though. Mike Morrison finished the game with 24 saves in the shutout. Schaefer registered 26 stops for Providence.

FRIARS SIGN THREE RECRUITS TO NLI'S:

Providence College men's hockey coach Paul Pooley announced on Friday, November 30 the signing of three recruits to National Letters of Intent to play for the Friar men's hockey team during the 2002-03 season. The three recruits are: Bobby Goepfert (Kings Park, N.Y./Cedar Rapids Roughriders-USHL), Torry Gajda (Westfield, Mass./New England Coyotes-EJHL) and Bryan Horan (Farmingham, Conn./New England Coyotes-EJHL).

"All three of these players bring a level of enthusiasm, experience and excitement to our team," PC coach Paul Pooley said. "Their signing is an indication of the Providence program continuing to move forward."

Goepfert is a 5-foot-10-inch, 165-pound goaltender, who is in his second year playing for the Cedar Rapids Roughriders of the United States Hockey League. In 2000-01, Goepfert was named to the USHL All-Rookie team, voted USHL Goalie of the Year and participated in the USHL All-Star game. This season, Goepfert leads the USHL in almost all major goaltending statistics. He recently was selected to participate in the Top Prospects' Tournament to represent the United States in an international tournament in early January. He is also a prospect to make the 2002 U.S. Junior National Team.

Gajda is in his third year playing for the New England Junior Coyotes of the Eastern Junior Hockey League. He is a 5-foot-9-inch, 185-pound left wing who is a co-captain for the Coyotes this season. Last season, Gajda had a breakthrough year, leading his team in

scoring with 110 points, being named First Team All-EJHL and making the EJHL All-Star game. This year, he is currently one of the top scorers in the league, despite being sidelined with an injury.

The final signee is Horan, who is also in his third year playing with the New England Coyotes of the EJHL. In 2000-01, the 6-foot-1-inch, 175-pound forward was the third leading scorer for the Coyotes behind Gajda and current Friar Chris Chaput. He was selected to participate in the 2001 EJHL All-Star game and also was selected to play for the U.S. Select Under-18 team that played in Germany last summer. This year, Horan was named co-captain of the Coyotes. He only has seen action in seven games due to a wrist injury.

The three signees will join the Friars next fall and will add to the former Coyotes and Roughriders already on the PC roster. Gajda and Horan will join six other former Coyotes and Goepfert will join a former Roughrider. Gajda and Horan will join junior Jon DiSalvatore (South Windsor, Conn.) sophomore Peter Zingoni (Newtown, Conn.) and freshmen Eric Lundberg (Vernon, Conn.), Chris Chaput (Pawtucket, R.I.) and Jeff Mason (Easthampton, Mass.). Goepfert will join freshman David Carpentier (Faribault, Minn.), who played for the Roughriders last season.

WRAP-UP OF 2000-01 SEASON:

The 2000-01 Providence College Hockey Team celebrated the 50th season of Friar hockey in style, competing in the HOCKEY EAST Championship game and reaching the NCAA Tournament. The Friars' overall record of 22-13-5 was the best in Head Coach Paul Pooley's seven years at PC. The team tied for second place in the HOCKEY EAST standings after a 13-8-3 league record, which is the highest a Providence team has ever finished. Captains Matt Libby and Jay Leach led a young PC team all the way to the HOCKEY EAST Championship game and to the NCAA's while All-American Devin Rask led the scoring effort with 23 goals and 28 assists for 51 points. His teammate and fellow All-American, Nolan Schaefer, anchored the defense in goal for the Friars. Schaefer posted a 2.47 goals against average, a 0.915 save percentage and a 15-8-2 record last season.

FRIARS ALL-TIME:

In 51 seasons of Friar hockey, PC has posted a **732-673-76 (.520)** mark. In Paul Pooley's seven-plus seasons as the Friars' Head Coach the team has recorded a 138-133-25 mark.

HEAD COACH PAUL POOLEY:

Pooley is the 10th coach in the history of Providence College Hockey. Since 1994, Pooley has compiled an **138-133-26** record and brought the Friars to three HOCKEY EAST Finals and two NCAA Tournament appearances. Last season, Pooley was named HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year after leading the Friars to their highest finish ever in league play (tied for second) with a 13-8-3 record. In 1994-95, Pooley became the first head coach to bring a team to the HOCKEY EAST Championship in his inaugural season behind the bench. In 1995-96 he guided the Friars to their second HOCKEY EAST title and first since 1985. Pooley also led the team to its eighth appearance in the NCAA Tournament. He came to Providence after spending three years as an assistant coach at Lake Superior State University (1991-94). Pooley began his coaching career at his alma-mater, Ohio State, where he served as an assistant to Jerry Welsh from 1988-91. On January 22, Pooley was named Ohio State's top men's hockey player of all time at the Buckeye's "Century Night." At OSU's Century Night, the Touchdown Club of Columbus announced their "All-Century" teams paying tribute to all 36 varsity sports.
