WHO, WHEN, WHERE... The Providence College women's basketball team will face St. John's in BIG EAST Conference action, on Wednesday, February 6 at 4:30 p.m. The game is scheduled to be played at Alumni Hall in Jamaica, New York.

PROVIDENCE VERSUS ST. JOHN'S... The Friars and Red Storm will meet for the 45th time on February 6. Providence leads the all-time series 24-20. In the teams' most recent match-up on February 7, 2001, the Friars took a 83-63 victory over the Red Storm, in Providence, R.I. The last time St. John's defeated PC, was on January 29, 2000, when the Red Storm earned a 79-67 victory in Providence, R.I.

ALL-TIME RECORDS... The Friars and Red Storm have met 44 times in the 27-year history of PC women's basketball. Providence leads the all-time series 24-20. The Friars are 10-10 all-time versus St. John's when playing at Alumni Hall in Providence, R.I.; 11-9 when playing St. John's in Jamaica, N.Y.; and 3-1 versus the Red Storm when playing on a neutral court.

HISTORY LESSON... Providence and St. John's women's basketball clashed for the first time on January 8, 1978 in Providence, Rhode Island. St. John's earned a 43-42 victory over the Friars.

POINT DIFFERENTIAL... The Friars and Red Storm have met 44 times to date. Seventeen of the 44 games have been decided by five points or less. St. John's won the only overtime game between the two schools, 93-90, on February 27, 1988, in Providence, R.I.

HEAD COACH JIM JABIR VERSUS ST. JOHN'S... Providence College head coach Jim Jabir is 5-4 against St. John's, in his 16 years as a collegiate head coach.

2001-2002 PROVIDENCE COLLEGE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL NOTES

SCOUTING THE RED STORM... The St. John's Red Storm enter Wednesday afternoon's game with a 3-18 overall record and a 0-10 mark in BIG EAST Conference play. In recent action on February 2, the Red Storm fell to West Virginia, 69-47, in Jamaica, N.Y. Mary Pat Statler led St. John's in scoring with 17 points. Patrycja Gulak pulled down seven rebounds. Rasheedah Brown leads the Red Storm in scoring through 21 games, averaging 14.8 points per game. Brown also leads the team in assists (63 / 4.0 apg) and steals (32 / 2.0 spg), and is second on the team in rebounding, averaging 4.8 boards per game. Gulak is second on the team in scoring (9.5 ppg), and first in rebounding (5.7 rpg).

THE FRIARS LAST TIME OUT... The Providence College women's basketball team is in the midst of a five-game losing streak. In the Friars' last game (2/3/02), PC fell to #1-ranked Connecticut, 85-61, in Providence, R.I., in front of a capacity crowd (2,574). The Friars were outscored by just two points in the second half (40-38). Freshman Michal Epstein (Rehovot, Israel) registered a game and career-high 23 points and eight rebounds. Grad student Dani Trippany tallied nine points.

HOW THE FRIARS HAVE FARED THIS SEASON... The Providence College women's basketball team enters its 21st game of the 2001-02 season, with a 8-12 overall record, and a 2-7 mark in the BIG EAST. The Friars are 3-8 on the road, 0-1 on a neutral court, and 5-3 on their home court (Alumni Hall), in Providence, R.I. Against BIG EAST opponents, PC is 2-2 at home and 0-5 on the road.

BIG EAST RESULTS... The Friars have played eight BIG EAST games this season, and hold a record of 2-6. On December 5, the Friars were defeated by Rutgers, 71-61, in Piscataway, N.J. PC evened its conference record (1-1), with a 59-55 win over Georgetown, in Providence, R.I. on January 2. On January 5, Providence fell to 1-2 in the conference, with a 72-66 loss to Notre Dame, in Notre Dame, Indiana. On January 9, PC moved to 2-2 in conference play with a 62-49 win over Villanova, in Providence, R.I. The Friars fell to 2-3 in BIG EAST play with an 81-52 loss at Syracuse on January 12. PC lost it's second-straight game of the season, and fell to 2-4 in the conference, with a 69-49 loss at Boston College on January 12. PC lost it's third-straight game, 69-41, at home against Notre Dame on January 19. The Friars extended their losing streak to four games, with a 64-54 loss at Seton Hall on January 26. On February 3, PC fell to #1-ranked UConn, 85-61, in Providence, R.I. In BIG EAST Conference games, the Friars are 2-2 at home in Alumni Hall, and 0-5 on the road.

OVERALL STATISTICAL LEADERS... The Providence College women's basketball team enters its 20th game of the season with a 8-11 overall record, and a 2-6 mark in BIG EAST action. Graduate student Dani Trippany (Massena, N.Y.) leads the Friars with 10.6 points and 6.4 rebounds per game. Trippany also ranks first in field-goal percentage (.467/70-150), three-point field-goal percentage (.500/15-30) and free-throw percentage (.810/47-58). Senior guard Chrissy Vozab (Amenia, N.Y.) leads the Friars in assists (2.4 apg), steals (1.4 spg) and minutes played (527 - 29.3 mpg). Freshman Jessica Simmonds (South Orange, N.J.) leads the Friars in blocked shots (1.4 bpg), and is second on the team in steals, averaging 1.4 spg.

STATISTICAL LEADERS IN BIG EAST PLAY... The Friars are 2-7 in BIG EAST Conference action this season. Grad student Dani Trippany (Massena, N.Y.) leads the Friars versus conference opponents, averaging 11.4 points and 6.4 rebounds. She also leads the team in three-point field goal percentage (.625, 10-16) and free-throw percentage (.931, 27-29). Freshmen Michal Epstein (Rehovot, Israel) is second among her Friar teammates in scoring versus conference opponents, averaging 10.1 points per game. Freshman Jessica Simmonds (South Orange, N.J.) ranks second in rebounding (6.0 rpg) and third in scoring (7.0 ppg).

2001-2002 PROVIDENCE COLLEGE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL NOTES

THE STREAK ENDS... Senior guard Chrissy Vozab (Amenia, N.Y.) was not in the Providence College starting line-up for the first time in her four-year career, as the Friars tipped off against Montana in the first round of the Lady Griz Holiday Classic, in Missoula, Montana on December 28. Since missing her first start versus Montana, Vozab has missed five other starts. On January 12, Vozab missed her first career game, versus Boston College. She is scheduled to play limited minutes until further notice, due to a stress fracture in her foot.

SEVERAL NOTES ON THE PLAYERS TO WATCH

VOZAB RANKS 10TH ALL-TIME IN ASSISTS... Senior guard Chrissy Vozab (Amenia, N.Y.) is ranked 10th all-time in career assists for the Providence College women's basketball team. She moved into the top 10, after dishing out three assists in a, 67-53, win at Brown on Thursday, November 29 at the Pizzitola Sports Center in Providence, R.I. She is averaging 2.3 assists per game this season (2001-02). Vozab currently has 321 assists in her career, with 7 regular-season games remaining on the 2001-02 schedule. Vozab needs 4 assists to move past Mary Ann McCoy '80 and into ninth-place all-time. McCoy finished her career at Providence with 324 assists. Shayna Evans '91 is PC's all-time career assist leader, with 978.

VOZAB INCHING CLOSER TO THE 1,000 POINT PLATEAU...

Senior guard Chrissy Vozab (Amenia, N.Y.) needs 140 points, to reach 1,000 career points as a member of the Providence women's basketball team. Prior to the start of the 2001-02 season, Vozab recorded 724 career points in three seasons with the Friars. This season, Vozab has registered 136 points, to bring her career total to 860. Vozab is currently ranked fourth on the team in scoring (2001-02), averaging 7.2 points per game.

2001-2002 PROVIDENCE COLLEGE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL NOTES

SEEING DOUBLE... Graduate student Dani Trippany (Massena, N.Y.) earned the first double-double of her career during the 2001-02 season, on November 27, at home against the University of Rhode Island (13 points, 13 rebounds). Since then, Trippany has registered double-doubles against Idaho (12 points, 10 rebounds) on December 29 and Georgetown on January 2, for a total of three career double-doubles. Trippany leads the Friars this season in scoring (10.6 ppg) and rebounding (6.4 rpg).

HEAD OF THE CLASS... Freshman forward/center Jessica Simmonds (South Orange, N.J.) leads her freshmen teammates in scoring (7.8 ppg), rebounding (5.8 rpg), steals (1.4 spg) and blocks (1.3 bpg). Overall, Simmonds is ranked third among her active teammates in scoring, second in rebounding and first in steals and blocks.

TRIPPANY SETS PERSONAL BEST MARK FOR REBOUNDING IN A SINGLE SEASON...

Grad student Dani Trippany (Massena, N.Y.) has pulled down 121 rebounds this season, through 20 games, which marks a single-season career best. During the 2000-01 season, Trippany recorded a season-best total of 98 rebounds. Trippany pulled down her 99th board of the 2001-02 season, in a 81-52 loss to Syracuse, in Syracuse, N.Y., on January 12. On February 3, Trippany did not register a single rebound versus Connecticut. It was the first time all season that Trippany finished with zero rebounds.

EPSTEIN GETS COMFORTABLE... Freshman guard Michal Epstein (Rehovot, Israel) has appeared in 15 of the Friars' 20 games during the 2001-02 season, making 10 appearances in the starting line-up. Epstein, who started the season off slowly, has come on down the stretch. She has worked her way up to second on the team in scoring (8.1 ppg), third in rebounding (3.7 rpg) and third in assists (2.0 apg). Epstein played for the Israeli National Team prior to joining the Friars this fall (2001). Epstein has averaged 14.0 points, 4.3 rebounds and 1.0 assists per game in PC's last four contests. On February 3, Epstein set career highs in points (23) and rebounds (8) versus #1-ranked Connecticut, in Providence, R.I. The UConn game marked the first time in her career that she surpassed the 20-point mark. Prior to the match-up with the Huskies, Epstein registered a career high of 15 points on January 19, versus Notre Dame, in Providence, R.I.

2001-2002 PROVIDENCE COLLEGE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL NOTES

HEAD COACH JIM JABIR

Jim Jabir enters his sixth season leading the Providence College women's basketball program. This season he has the players to start making a mark in the BIG EAST Conference. The Friars made a big stride last winter, defeating Seton Hall University, 72-61, in the first round of the 2001 BIG EAST Conference Tournament and advancing to the quarterfinal round for the first time under Jabir.

Known for his ability to attract high-caliber student-athletes, Jabir has two of the top sophomores returning in sophomore point guard Kristin Quinn and sophomore post-player Jenese Wilcox. Added to the two super-sophs is a quality recruiting class of athletes who figure to make immediate impact on the court this season.

After a 2-3 start last season, Jabir engineered five-straight non-conference victories to enter the conference season. The growth of two rookies in the starting lineup and some near-upsets of nationally ranked Rutgers, Notre Dame and Virginia Tech led to a pair of victories in the squad's last three contests and a final 11-17 overall record.

Jabir owns a career record of 207-208 in 15 years as a Division I head coach. The personable and well-liked Jabir is dedicated to the program and to its resurgence in the BIG EAST.

Providence College welcomed Jabir into the Friar family on May 21, 1996 as he was named the sixth head coach in the 22-year history of the program.

In 15 seasons as a collegiate head coach, eight of his teams have posted winning records. In the last five seasons, the Friars have taken important steps toward rebuilding, and are now poised to advance in the BIG EAST standings. In 1996-97, the Friars posted a 13-13 regular season record and lost to Villanova in the first round of the BIG EAST Championship. The following season, PC went 10-17 and exited the BIG EAST Tournament in the first round at the hands of Boston College. Injuries played a role in the win-loss ratio during the 1998-99 season as the Friars found themselves at a 5-22 overall record when the BIG EAST Tournament ended with a 69-68 loss to Villanova. In 1999-2000, PC was still plagued with injuries but doubled their win total from the previous year with a 10-17 overall mark.

Prior to coming to Providence, Jabir spent six years at Marquette, where he became the most successful coach in the history of the program and elevated the Golden Eagles into the national spotlight.

Under his high-powered offense, Jabir established a program that earned respect from people in Milwaukee, in the nation and in the ranks of women's basketball.

After posting a 7-20 record during his inaugural year (1990-91) with the Golden Eagles, Jabir guided his team to four consecutive winning seasons, two 20-plus winning seasons and three straight post-season appearances, including back-to-back bids to the NCAA Tournament.

In 1994-95, Marquette won the Great Midwest Conference Tournament, the first tournament championship in school history. This followed the 1993-94 season in which Jabir compiled a program-best 22-7 overall record and its first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Just four years after Jabir's arrival at Marquette, the program made its way onto the national scene as it earned its first-ever trip to the NCAA Tournament. Seeded 14th, Marquette was four points shy of pulling off an upset over No. 5 Colorado. The Lady Buffs needed three last-second free throws to earn the 77-74 victory.

In 1994-95 Marquette received a No. 10 seed and the chance to play No. 7 seed North Carolina State on a neutral court at Penn State. Despite a grand effort, MU fell to the Wolfpack, 77-62.

Jabir matriculated to Marquette from Siena College, where he served as the head coach of the Lady Saints for three seasons (1987-90) and compiled a 50-20 overall record. Jabir's teams posted three consecutive winning seasons and his 1989-90 team was a semifinalist in the

Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) post-season tournament.

Prior to his stint at Siena, Jabir was the head coach at Buffalo State during the 1986-87 season at the young age of 24. He led that team to a 14-11 record. Jabir guided the Bengals to the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) championship and an appearance in the NCAA Division III South Regional Tournament.

The Brooklyn, N.Y. native began his coaching career as an assistant at Nazareth College (1984-85) and at Buffalo State (1985-86). Jabir was instrumental in leading the Bengals to a 23-3 slate, the SUNYAC title, a 22-game winning streak, an NCAA regional tournament appearance and a national ranking (#3) during the 1985-86 season.
