HEAD COACH BOB DERANEY

Head Coach Bob Deraney enters his fourth season as head coach of the women's ice hockey program at Providence College. In his three seasons at Providence, Deraney has continued the level of excellence that the hockey program has experienced over the last 28 years. Last season, Deraney led the Friars to their seventh ECAC Tournament title and their first since 1995. En route to capturing the 2002 ECAC Eastern League crown, the Friars defeated second-ranked Niagara and fifth-ranked Northeastern. The Friars also posted their 11th 20-win season, the second in Deraney's three-year tenure. The Friars finished 20-13-4.

In 2000-01, Deraney guided the Friars to their eighteenth consecutive ECAC Tournament appearance as they finished the season with an 18-14-3 record. The Friars were ranked as high as ninth in the USA Today/American Hockey Magazine Women's College Hockey Poll and advanced to the quarterfinals of the ECAC Tournament, before falling in overtime to eventual Frozen Four semifinalists, Harvard.

In his first season, Deraney led the Friars to their 10th 20-win season in the 26-year history of PC Women's Hockey with a 20-10-3 mark. Deraney's first season saw many high points, including an eight game unbeaten streak, a road victory over No. 1 ranked Harvard and a shutout win over eventual National Champion, the University of Minnesota.

The Friars reached the ECAC playoffs for the 17th consecutive year. The squad traveled to Dartmouth for the ECAC quarterfinals, and after 85 minutes of scoreless play, the Friars season

came to an end, as they fell to the Big Green, 1-0 in double overtime.

Deraney, who graduated from Boston University in 1987, has extensive experience in college hockey. As a goaltender, he had an opportunity to play for some of Head Coach Jack Parker's greatest teams at Boston University. In 1984-85, Deraney was named Most Improved Player on the Terrier squad. During that season, he helped the team to a 24-14-4 record and a second-place finish in HOCKEY EAST. The following year, 1985-86, was the most successful during his time at BU. The Terriers captured the Beanpot and HOCKEY EAST titles with a 25-14-4 record, as they earned a spot in the NCAA Championship for the 15th time in school history. As a senior, Terriers captured their second Beanpot title in as many years, finishing with an overall record of 19-15-3.

Prior to entering the coaching ranks, Deraney spent a brief time playing professional hockey after graduating from BU with a Bachelor's Degree in Economics and a minor in business. He played for the Johnstown Chiefs of the East Coast Hockey League (ECHL) in 1987-88 and moved on to the Flint Spirits of the International Hockey League (IHL) the following year. Deraney was rewarded for his success at BU and in the minor leagues when he earned invites to the training camps of the New York Rangers (1987) and the Boston Bruins (1988) of the National Hockey League (NHL). Deraney returned to his alma mater to begin his coaching career in 1987.

During the 1987-88 hockey season, he served as the assistant coach on the BU junior varsity team. In 1988-89, he was promoted to head coach of the junior varsity team.

Deraney left the Terrier program in 1989 and moved across town to serve as an assistant/goalie coach at Northeastern University.

After one season at Northeastern, Deraney joined the staff at Dartmouth College. It was there that he really became involved in the day-to-day coaching operations of a collegiate hockey program. He spent three seasons at Dartmouth as the recruiting coordinator and working with the team's forwards, defensemen and goaltenders. During that period, the program experienced a significant turnaround, going from the 45th-ranked team in the country in 1990 to No. 29 in 1993. His first season at Dartmouth, Deraney was an assistant under Ben Smith, the current head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team.

He went on to become the top assistant coach at UMass-Amherst from 1993-98. His responsibilities at UMass included working with the defense and goaltenders, recruiting and acting as the program's university liaison. Deraney was instrumental in helping rebuild the hockey program at UMass which was re-instituted in 1993.

In addition to his coaching duties at the collegiate level, Deraney has coached at various levels with USA Hockey, including assisting Head Coach Ben Smith with the USA Women's National Camp in Lake Placid, N.Y. in August of 1998. Deraney helped select the 1998 USA Select Team, which competed at the IIHF A Pool World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Deraney also worked closely with the 1996 U.S. World Junior National Team and has been involved with all levels of national player development since 1990.

Deraney, a native of West Roxbury, Mass., resides in Shrewsbury with his wife, Michelle, and their two daughters, Danielle and Alexa.

Friar Highlights Under Bob Deraney

July 23, 1999 - Bob Deraney becomes the fifth coach in the history of Providence women's hockey.

October 24, 1999 - The Friars defeated eventual National Champion Minnesota, 1-0, at Schneider Arena as Bob Deraney earned his first victory as a head coach.

November 28, 1999-January 16, 2000 - Deraney's squad played their best hockey of the season during a two-month span around the new millenium that included an eight-game unbeaten streak. The streak began on November 28 with a 6-0 win over Maine and it ended on January 16 with a 3-1 loss at New Hampshire.

January 8-9, 2000 - In a weekend series versus ECAC powers Harvard and Brown, the Friars skated away with 1-1 and 0-0 ties, respectively.

February 6, 2000 - PC knocked off top-ranked Harvard, 1-0, at the Bright Hockey Center. It was the first time that any Providence College team defeated a No. 1 ranked opponent since the men's hockey team defeated Boston University in the 1996 HOCKEY EAST Semifinals.

March 4, 2000 - The Friars earned their 20th win of the season with a 5-4 victory at Dartmouth. Jess Tabb netted a hat trick as the squad posted their 10th 20-win season in 26 years.

March 11, 2000 - Third-seeded Dartmouth Big Green defeated the Friars, 1-0, in double overtime, in the ECAC Quarterfinals. It marked the 17th time PC had earned a spot in the ECAC playoffs.

March 10, 2001 - Friars made 18th consecutive trip to the ECAC Tournament. Harvard, which eventually advanced to the Frozen Four, defeated PC, 4-3, in overtime.

March 15, 2002 - The Friars defeated second-ranked Niagara, 3-2, in double overtime in the semifinals of the ECAC Eastern League Tournament. Danielle Culgin scored 1:06 into the second overtime for the win.

March 16, 2002 - Providence defeated Northeastern, 1-0, to capture the school's seventh ECAC Tournament title. Jackie Tamsin scored the lone goal in the first period.



Bob Bellemore Assistant Coach

One of the top goaltenders to ever play at Providence College, Bob Bellemore is entering his 12th season as an assistant coach with the women's hockey team. In addition to working with the goaltenders, he assists with scouting and other various duties.

A 1966 graduate of the College, Bellemore still holds the single season (2.47) and career (3.12) goals against average records for the men's team. As a sophomore in 1964, he helped the Friars win their first ECAC title and earn their first berth in the NCAA Final Four. Bellemore also starred on the school's baseball team and served as the team's captain his senior year. In 1984, he was inducted into the Providence College Athletic Hall of Fame.

Bellemore began coaching as a part-time assistant for PC's men's hockey team. In 1972, he joined head coach Lou Lamoriello's staff as a full-time assistant - a position he held until 1986. In 1986-87, Bellemore held the title of Arena Director and was in charge of the day-to-day operations of Schneider Arena. Bellemore left Providence College in 1987 to serve as the goaltender coach for the New Jersey Devils. In 1991, he left New Jersey to pursue his master's degree at PC. Since earning his master's degree in special education, Bellemore has been employed as a special education instructor at South Kingston High School. He now serves as a guidance counselor at South Kingston High.

A native of Smithfield, R.I., Bellemore resides in Westerly, R.I., with his wife Marguerite. He has one son, Bruce, a 1991 graduate of PC, who played hockey for two seasons for the Friars. He also is the grandfather of five.

Marnie Hill Assistant Coach

Marnie Hill enters her fourth season as an assistant coach with the Providence College women's hockey team. She assists Head Coach Bob Deraney with various on ice coaching duties and analyzes the team's game film. Hill also is involved with recruiting, academics and monitoring NCAA compliance issues.

In 2000, Hill helped bring Darlene Stephenson to Providence College. Stephenson, who was named to the ECAC All-Rookie Team in 2001, is only the second player in Providence College history who hails from Canada. Hill also assisted in the recruiting of standout defenseman Meredith Roth. In 2001, Hill helped bring an impressive class, which consisted of eight skaters and one goaltender. During the 2001-02 season, the freshman class accounted for 39 goals and 44 assists as they played a major role in the team's ECAC Eastern League title. In 2002-03, the Friars will welcome the third Canadian player to Providence as goaltender Jana Bugden will begin her first season.

A 1997 graduate of the University of New Mexico, Hill came to Providence after working for the Dallas Stars Hockey Club since 1995. She served as a coach for the Dallas Junior Stars Hockey Camps, conducting on ice drills and as a power skating instructor. Hill also worked as a strength and conditioning specialist at Athletic Enhancement Systems of Dallas, Texas.

Hill also served as a coach for the Stars' adult league and the Junior Stars pee wee and bantam league teams. Upon taking over the Junior Stars pee wee team in 1997, Hill led the squad to the 1997-98 T.A.H.A title. For three seasons, she worked as a coach for USA Hockey at the Women's Rocky Mountain Regional District Festival. Hill was responsible for evaluating talent and organizing off-ice conditioning.

In 2001-02, Hill helped the Friars post the school's 11th 20-win season and capture the 2002 ECAC Eastern League. It marked the seventh ECAC Tournament crown for the Friars.

A native of Campbell River, British Columbia, Hill resides in Providence, R.I.

PLAYERS IN CAPS PLAYED DURING 2001-02 SEASON

*Designates seasons played at Providence

Head Coach Bob Deraney and the 2002-03 women's hockey team will look to continue where they left off last season. The Friars capped off the 2001-02 season with a 1-0 victory over fifth-ranked Northeastern in the ECAC Eastern League Championship game to win the school's seventh ECAC title.

After posting a 5-8-2 record during the first half of the season, the Friars registered an impressive 15-5-2 mark during the second half, including a 7-0-1 record during the month of January. PC finished the regular season by falling 1-0 to Boston College on March 9. The Friars then won three consecutive games, including a 3-2 double overtime victory over second-ranked Niagara in the ECAC Eastern League Semifinals.

The Friars lost six seniors from last season's team to graduation, but welcome four incoming freshman who will add more talent to an already skilled and committed squad. The six seniors include forward Kim Mathias (Ballston Lake, N.Y.) who finished fifth on the team with five goals and 22 assists (27 points). Forward Jackie Tamsin (North Branford, Conn.) also completed her final season at Providence in 2001-02. Tamsin scored the only goal in the Friars' 1-0 victory over Northeastern in the championship game of the ECAC Eastern League Tournament. Defensemen Angela Hill (Pascoag, R.I.) and Christa Talbot (Lake Forest, Calif.) provided leadership to the Friar squad and were key contributors to last season's team. Forwards Jennifer Kranz (Waukesha, Wis.) and Beth Wolff (Hibbing, Minn.) posted solid final seasons for the Friars.

The 2002-03 season will mark the first for the newly formed Women's HOCKEY EAST. The six team league will include Boston College, Connecticut, Maine, New Hampshire, Northeastern and Providence. Despite the change of conferences, the goal for the Friars' remains the same - improve, capture the conference title and reach the NCAA Frozen Four.

The FORWARDS: Returning 8; Lost 4; Newcomers 1

Providence was one of the most potent offensive teams in the nation. They led the ECAC Eastern League and ranked eighth nationally in scoring with 123 goals last season. Seniors Jenn Butsch (Berlin, Vt.) and Danielle Culgin (Framingham, Mass.) had breakout seasons in 2001-02 to lead the Friars. Butsch, who was named Providence College Female Athlete of the Year for Team Sports and the Team's Most Valuable Player, registered career highs of 16 goals

and 15 assists for 31 points. Butsch also led the team with four game-winning goals and finished second with six power-play tallies. Culgin finished second on the team with career highs of 14 goals and 15 assists for 29 points, including a team best seven power-play goals. She earned the team's Seventh Player Award, which is given to the player who has performed above and beyond all expectations. Culgin's 14th goal of the season was the game winner in a 3-2 double overtime semifinal game against second-ranked Niagara. For her efforts, she was named to the ECAC Eastern League All-Tournament Team.

Junior Darlene Stephenson (Virden, Manitoba) is another talented forward who is coming off a strong sophomore season. Stephenson finished tied for third on the squad with 28 points (13 goals and 15 assists). She was named ECAC Eastern League Player of the Week on January 27, 2002 and led the team with a plus/minus rating of +23.

Adding to the Friar attack will be sophomores Rush Zimmerman (Grosse Pointe, Mich.) and Hilary Greaves (Cranston, R.I.). Zimmerman led

all freshmen in scoring last season with 10 goals and 12 assists (22 points). Of Zimmerman's 22 points, 18 points (nine goals, nine assists) came during the second

half of the season. The 5-foot-11 inch forward was named ECAC Rookie of the Week on February 18, 2002. Greaves, who was the recipient of the team's Most Improved Player Award last season, scored 11 goals and added nine assists (20 points). She also was named ECAC Rookie of the Week on October 15, 2001 after scoring one goal in her collegiate debut against defending NCAA champion Minnesota-Duluth on October 12.

Junior Sarah Youlen (Potsdam, N.Y.) has been a steady presence in the Friar lineup over the past two seasons. Last season, she played in all 37 games and recorded five goals and six assists (11

points). She scored two game-winning goals and will be counted on for her tenacious style of play.

Sophomores Ashley Payton (Chesterfield, Mo.) and Christina Redmond (Dorchester, Mass.) also were part of last season's impressive freshman class. Payton posted nine goals and eight assists (17 points), including three game-winning tallies. Head Coach Bob Deraney feels that his team can play any style, whether it is playing physical, with finesse or with speed. Redmond is perhaps the fastest skater on the team and will add to a versatile team in 2002-03. Last season, she scored one goal as she battled a leg injury.

Freshman Katelynn Laffin (Norwell, Mass.) has the ability to produce offensively. Laffin was a three-sport athlete (hockey, soccer, softball) at Pomfret School in Pomfret, Conn. She led the hockey team in scoring last season and earned Hockey Night In Boston (HNIB) senior Award for Leadership and Dedication. Laffin will participate in the U.S. Select 18-19 Camps in Lake Placid, N.Y. in the summer of 2002.

The DEFENSE: Returning 6; Lost 2; Newcomers 2

Despite the loss of Hill and Talbot, the Friars will have a solid defensive core in 2002-03. Leading the way will be senior Melanie Ruzzi (Burnsville, Minn.) who also had a breakout season in 2001-02. Ruzzi finished the season with a career-best 21 points (six goals, 15 assists). She earned the team's Unsung Hero Award, which is presented annually to the player who consistently contributed to the team and its success, but did not receive the deserved acknowledgement.

Juniors Kelli Halcisak (Grosse Ile, Mich.) and Meredith Roth (Dubuque, Iowa) will be major factors for the Friars at both ends of the ice. Halcisak finished tied for third on the team in scoring with nine goals and 19 assists (28 points) in her first season at Providence. Halcisak, who has one of the hardest slap shots in the nation, is always a threat on the ice. She earned ECAC Eastern League First Team All-Conference honors and New England Hockey Writers All-Star honors. Roth is coming off a solid season despite battling an illness in the second half of the season. She played in 27 games and recorded seven goals and 11 assists (18 points). She finished third on the team with five power-play goals. She came on strong towards the end of the season, earning ECAC All-Tournament Team honors.

Sophomores Mara Amrhein (Waukesha, Wis.), Danielle Bourgette (Anaheim, Calif.) and Emily Gryp (Lexington, Mass.) all gained valuable experience in 2001-02 and contributed to the team's success. Amrhein played in 32 games and posted five assists. She earned the team's

Co-Most Improved Player Award. Bourgette saw action in 29 games and improved with each game. She scored one goal and added three assists. In addition,

she posted a plus/minus rating of +12. Gryp enjoyed a strong freshman season, posting two assists in 27 games.

To compliment the veteran defensemen, the Friars will welcome two freshmen. Gretchen Gottwald (Stoneham, Mass.) and Melissa Smith (Hudson, Mass.) could make immediate contributions to the Friars. Gottwald played at Kimball Union Academy in Meriden, N.H. while Smith played at the North American Hockey Academy in Stowe, Vt. Gottwald and Smith are intelligent players with good hockey backgrounds. Smith also will participate in the U.S. Select 18-19 Camps in Lake Placid, N.Y. in the summer of 2002.

In GOAL: Returning 2; Lost 0; Newcomers 1

The goaltending position will be very competitive this season as three skilled goaltenders will compete for the starting spot. Junior Amy Quinlan (Baton Rouge, La.) finished her sophomore season in impressive fashion by posting a shutout in the ECAC Eastern League finals on March 16 against Northeastern. Quinlan was just as impressive in the Semifinals, stopping 31 shots in a 3-2 double overtime win over Niagara. For the season, she registered a 10-8-3 season, a 2.14 goals against average and earned ECAC Eastern League

Goaltender of the Week honors on October 15.

Sophomore Amy Thomas (Austin, Texas) registered a 10-5-1 record and a 2.44 goals against average in her first season with the Friars. Thomas, who played in 24 games, was named ECAC Eastern League Goaltender of the Week on January 7. Freshman Jana Bugden (Corner Brook, Newfoundland) rounds out the goaltending crew. Bugden comes to Providence after an outstanding career at Hebron Academy in Hebron, Maine. Last season, she posted an 18-5-1 record, including nine shutouts and .945 save percentage. She earned the 2001 Outstanding Goalie Award at HNIB and New England Division II MVP honors.

WRAP-UP:

The Friars have high expectations on the upcoming season after winning the ECAC Eastern League title in 2002. PC is a well-rounded team with an array of weapons. Even though PC lost six seniors to graduation, the Friars welcome four talented newcomers. Again PC will have one of the toughest schedules in the nation in 2002-03. The Friars will play Brown and Dartmouth twice and Niagara three times. The Friars open the season against two-time NCAA champion Minnesota-Duluth on October 12 at Schneider Arena. Deraney hopes the Friars continue to use the confidence they displayed at the end of the 2001-02 season and continue their winning ways as they begin a new era in the HOCKEY EAST.

2001-02 SEASON IN REVIEW

The Providence College women's hockey team finished the 2001-02 season with a 20-13-4 record and an 11-7-3 mark in the ECAC Eastern League. The Friars capped off the season on March 16 with a 1-0 victory against Northeastern to win the school's seventh ECAC Tournament title and their first since 1995.

During the first half of the season, the Friars posted a 5-8-2 record, but rebounded in the second half with a 15-5-2 mark to finish the season ranked 10th in the USCHO.com Poll and the USA Today/American Hockey Magazine Poll. For Providence, it marked the 11th 20-win season all-time and the second under third-year Head Coach Bob Deraney.

The Friars, who were ranked as high as fifth in the USA Today/American Hockey Magazine Poll, opened the season with a pair of losses to defending NCAA champion Minnesota-Duluth on October 12-13 in Duluth, Minn. However, PC defeated Finland, 4-2, to earn its first win of the season on October 26. During the first half of the season, the Friars posted two impressive victories. PC defeated 10th-ranked Harvard, 6-0, on November 25 in Cambridge, Mass. to end a five-game winless streak. The Friars also defeated eighth-ranked Niagara, 6-2, on December 8.

The Friars began the new year with a 7-0-1 record in January, capped off by a 2-1 victory over nationally ranked Wisconsin at Schneider Arena on January 27. After a 4-4-1 mark in February, the Friars finished the regular season on March 3, losing 1-0 to Boston College. PC finished fourth in the ECAC Eastern League with an 11-7-3 mark and defeated Maine, 5-3, in the quarterfinals of the conference tournament on March 9. The Friars advanced to semifinals of the ECAC tournament for the first time since 1997. In the semifinals, the Friars defeated second-ranked Niagara, 3-2, in double overtime.

Junior assistant captain Jenn Butsch (Berlin, Vt.) led the Friars in scoring with career-highs of 15 goals and 16 assists for 31 points. Butsch, who was selected to the ECAC All-Academic Team for the second consecutive season, was named team MVP and Providence College Female Athlete of the Year for Team Sports. The Friars also were led by junior Danielle Culgin (Framingham, Mass.) who tallied career highs of 14 goals and 15 assists for 29 points. Culgin's 14th goal was the biggest of her career, scoring the game-winning goal in the 3-2 double overtime ECAC semifinal win over Niagara.

Kim Mathias (Ballston Lake, N.Y.) was one of six seniors on the team this season. Mathias finished fifth on the team in points (27) and led the team with 22 assists. In addition, she became the 22nd player in Providence College history to record 100 or more points. Mathias finished her career with 105 points (42 goals, 63 assists). Jackie Tamsin (Branford, Conn.) completed her final season at Providence with six goals and six assists, including the game-winning tally in the ECAC Eastern League Championship game. Senior defenseman Christa Talbot (Forrest Hills, Calif.) and Angela Hill played key roles in the Friars' successful season. Talbot played in all 37 games and recorded nine assists. Hill also played in 37 games and registered one goal and three assists. Jennifer Kranz (Waukesha, Wis.) and Beth Wolff (Hibbing, Minn.) round out the senior group. Kranz appeared in 23 games and posted two assists, while Wolff played in 25 games and scored two goals and one assist.

Sophomores Kelli Halcisak (Grosse Ile, Mich.) and Darlene Stephenson (Virden, Manitoba) finished tied for the team lead with 28 points each. Halcisak, a transfer student from Ohio State, led all Friar defensemen in points and was named to the ECAC Eastern League All-Conference Team. In addition, she was named the New England Hockey Writers All-Star Team. Junior Melanie Ruzzi (Burnsville, Minn.) also had a breakthrough season, finishing seventh on the team with a career-best 21 points on six goals and 15 assists.

The Friar freshman class was an important contributor to the success this

season. The eight skaters combined to record 39 goals and 44 assists for 83 points. Rush Zimmerman (Grosse Pointe, Mich.) led all first year players and finished sixth on the team with 22 points (10 goals, 12 assists), while Hilary Greaves (Cranston, R.I.) tallied 20 points on 11 goals and nine assists. Ashley Payton (Chesterfield, Mo.) finished with 17 points. Defensemen Mara Amrhein (Waukesha, Wis.), Danielle Bourgette (Anaheim, Calif.), Emily Gryp (Lexington, Mass.) and forward Christina Redmond (Dorchester, Mass.) all had significant contributions to this season's team.

In net, sophomore Amy Quinlan (Baton Rouge, La.) led the Friars with a 10-8-3 record, including a 1-0 victory in the ECAC Eastern League finals. Amy Thomas (Austin, Texas) posted a 10-5-1 record in her first season.

Sophomores Meredith Roth (Dubuque, Iowa) and Sarah Youlen (Potsdam, N.Y.) had solid seasons. Roth played in 26 games and finished with 18 points as a defenseman. Youlen played in all 37 games and tallied 11 points.

The Friars had seven players make the ECAC Eastern League All-Academic Team, which was tied for most in the league of eight teams. In all, 36 student-athletes were honored.

Despite the loss of six seniors to graduation, the Friars will return 16 players next season as they will attempt to reach the NCAA Frozen Four for the first time in school history.
