THE SERIES: The Nittany Lions and Spartans first met in 1914 and Penn State leads the series, 13-12-1.

With Penn State's entry into the Big Ten in 1993, the teams have played in the regular season finale the past 16 years, with the winner claiming the Land Grant Trophy.

The Nittany Lions won, 49-18, last year in Beaver Stadium in a battle for the Big Ten Championship.

THIS WEEK

Penn State visits Michigan State in the regular season finale for both teams. The winner claims the Land Grant Trophy. The contest is Joe Paterno's 525th as head coach of the Nittany Lions.

The No. 14 Nittany Lions are coming off a 31-20 win over Indiana, while the Spartans are coming off a 40-37 comeback win at Purdue.

Penn State has a 49-13 (79.0) record since the start of 2005, the nation's ninth-best record over that span.

LIONS HALT HOOSIERS ON SENIOR DAY

Penn State overcame a 10-0 first quarter deficit to beat Indiana, 31-20, on Senior Day last Saturday in Beaver Stadium.

It was a pair of juniors, though, that helped spark the Nittany Lions to their 19th Senior Day win in the last 20 tries.

Linebacker Navorro Bowman grabbed his second interception of the season and returned it

73 yards for his second defensive touchdown to break a 10-10 third quarter tie. The All-America candidate recorded a team-high 12 tackles, with 2.0 TFL, a sack and a pass break-up to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors and lead another stellar defensive effort. The Nittany Lions limited the Hoosiers to 48 rushing yards on 24 attempts, as Penn State held its sixth opponent of the season to 65 or fewer yards on the ground.

Tailback Evan Royster accumulated 134 all-purpose yards and scored twice. He gained 95 yards on 17 carries (5.6), moving within 10 yards of becoming the seventh Nittany Lion all-time with multiple 1,000-yard seasons.

Penn State posted its 29th season with at least nine wins under Joe Paterno.

The Nittany Lions improved to 11-1 in their next game after a loss since the start of the 2005 season, 12-1 if including the 2009 season opening win over Akron.

MICHIGAN STATE GAME NOTES

123RD SEASON OF GRIDIRON EXCELLENCE; ONE OF SEVEN WITH 800 WINS

Penn State is in its 123rd season of intercollegiate football and owns a 809-351-42 record, to rank tied for sixth nationally in all-time victories.

Penn State became just the sixth school in the nation to win 800 games with its victory over Michigan State in 2008, joining Michigan (876), Texas (842), Notre Dame (837), Nebraska (824) and Ohio State (817). Alabama (809) became the seventh school earlier this season.

IN TOP 10 FOR WINS OVER LAST FIVE SEASONS

Since the start of the 2005 season, the Nittany Lions are 49-13 (79.0), good for No. 9 in the nation in winning percentage over the past five seasons. (see page 5 for list).

The Nittany Lions have won 51 of their past 64 games overall (79.7 pct.) dating to the final two games of the 2004 season. Ohio State is the only Big Ten team with a better record than Penn State over the past 64 contests.

BOUNCING BACK

Penn State is 11-1 in its next game after a loss since the start of the 2005 season. The Nittany Lions are 12-1 after a loss if the 2009 season opening win over Akron is included.

LOOKING TO CONTINUE ROAD SUCCESS

With their 34-13 win at Northwestern on Oct. 31, the Nittany Lions have a 7-1 record on the road the past two seasons, with a 3-0 mark this year.

Penn State has won at least three Big Ten road games for the ninth time in its 17th season of conference play, including three times since 2005.

The only time Penn State has gone 4-0 on the road in Big Ten play was during its 12-0 campaign in 1994.

LIONS IN TOP 15 IN RANKINGS

Penn State was No. 12 in the USA Today Coaches and Harris Interactive polls and No. 13 in the Nov. 15 Associated Press poll.

The Nittany Lions were No. 14 in the Nov. 15 Bowl Championship Series rankings.

SEEKING 21ST 10-WIN SEASON UNDER PATERNO

Penn State will be looking to earn its 21st season with at least 10 wins under Joe Paterno.

The Nittany Lions have reached the 10-win mark twice in the past four seasons. Last year, Penn State was 11-1 in the regular season, winning the Big Ten Championship and playing USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

In 2005, Penn State was 10-1 in the regular season, winning the Big Ten title and beating Florida State in the FedEx Orange Bowl to finish 11-1.

The Nittany Lions have won at least 10 games in multiple seasons over five decades under the Hall of Fame coach:

1960's (2); 1970's (6); 1980's (5); 1990's (5); 2000's (2).

Penn State has won at least nine games in a season for the 29th time under Paterno, including each of the past five years.

LIONS CONTINUE SENIOR DAY SUCCESS

With their win over Indiana, the Nittany Lions have won 19 of their 20 Senior Day games since 1990. The lone loss came to Michigan in 1999.

BOWMAN'S INTERCEPTION TD RETURN & 12 HITS BRING BIG TEN WEEKLY HONORS

The Nittany Lion who made the game-changing play in Penn State's 31-20 win over Indiana on Saturday has been honored by the Big Ten Conference.

Junior linebacker Navorro Bowman (District Heights, Md.) recorded 12 tackles and returned an interception 73 yards for a touchdown to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week accolades. The conference honor is the second of his career.

A semifinalist for the Bednarik Award, presented to the nation's top defensive player, Bowman broke a 10-10 tie in the third quarter by grabbing his second interception of the season and returning 73 yards to pump-up the Beaver Stadium Senior Day crowd of 107,379. The pick was the third of his career.

An All-America and Nagurski Trophy candidate, Bowman recorded a team-high 12 tackles, with 2.0 TFL, a sack and a pass break-up to lead another stellar defensive effort. The Nittany Lions

limited the Hoosiers to 48 rushing yards on 24 attempts, as Penn State held its sixth opponent of the season to 65 or fewer yards on the ground.

Bowman played only the first two series of season opener and missed the next two games with a pulled groin. The 2008 first team all-conference selection is second on team with 12.0 TFL and 74 tackles (8.2 avg.), two sacks, tied for team lead with two interceptions and two fumble recoveries and has two pass break-ups. The former Suitland High School standout is No. 7 in Big Ten in Tackles per game (8.2 avg.).

A member of ESPN.com's 2008-09 All-Bowl Team, Bowman's 1.33 TFL per game average is No. 2 in nation among all linebackers.

Bowman's honor marks the fifth time this season a Nittany Lion has been selected Big Ten Player of the Week, joining quarterback Daryll Clark (twice), linebacker Sean Lee and punter Jeremy Boone.

BEACHUM SIDELINED WITH KNEE INJURY

Running back Brandon Beachum (Youngstown, Ohio) will miss the remainder of the 2009 season after suffering a serious knee injury in Saturday's 31-20 victory over Indiana.

A sophomore, Beachum tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee during Penn State's kickoff return to begin the second half, according to Dr. Wayne Sebastianelli, Penn State Director of Athletic Medicine. Beachum will have surgery within the next two weeks and rehabilitation will take a minimum of nine months, according to Sebastianelli.

Beachum has played in every game this season on offense and special teams and has been an effective runner, receiver and blocker. He is fourth on the team in rushing with 113 yards on 24 carries (4.7) with one touchdown. Beachum scored on a two-yard run in the Nittany Lions' 34-13 win at

Northwestern, gaining 25 yards on just four carries. He also has three receptions for 29 yards.

The former Cardinal Mooney High School standout played as a true freshman last year after enrolling in the University in January, 2008.

LIONS ELIGIBLE FOR 36TH BOWL UNDER ALL-TIME BOWL LEADER PATERNO

Penn State is eligible for its 36th bowl game in Joe Paterno's 44th season as head coach. Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl appearances (35) and wins with a 23-11-1 record.

The Nittany Lions have a 26-13-2 record in bowl games and their winning percentage of 65.8 is third in the nation among schools with a minimum of 10 bowl wins. Penn State is third nationally in bowl wins, while its 41 bowl appearances are eighth-highest.

Penn State leads all Big Ten schools in bowl wins, appearances and winning percentage.

"GREAT SHOW" = GREAT RESULTS

The Nittany Lions have won 33 of their last 37 (89.2 pct.) games in Beaver Stadium, dating to a 37-13 win over Michigan State on Senior Day on Nov. 20, 2004.

The only setbacks over the past 37 home games have come to No. 4 Michigan in 2006, No. 1 Ohio State in 2007, Iowa on Sept. 26 and the No. 15 Buckeyes on Nov. 7.

Penn State at home the past four seasons: 2005 (7-0), 2006 (6-1), 2007 (6-1), 2008 (7-0), 2009 (6-2).

Penn State has a 242-59 record (80.4) in Beaver Stadium since the facility was erected in 1960, including 15 unbeaten seasons.

The Nittany Lions have earned a 217-41 (84.1) home record under Joe Paterno since he became head coach in 1966, with 14 undefeated seasons.

LIONS' FOUR ACADEMIC ALL-DISTRICT HONOREES SECOND-HIGHEST IN NATION

Four members of the Penn State football team were selected to the 2009 ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District® Football Team. The Nittany Lions' total is second-highest in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision teams.

The group is led by three Nittany Lions who earned ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America® honors in 2008. Senior linebacker Josh Hull (Millheim) and senior kick snapper Andrew Pitz (Bettendorf, Iowa) were first team Academic All-Americans® and junior center Stefan Wisniewski (Bridgeville) was selected a second team Academic All-American® last year.

They are joined on the 2009 Academic All-District® team by senior punter Jeremy Boone (Mechanicsburg), who earns the honor for the second consecutive year.

All four football student-athletes will be eligible for consideration for the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America® Team. Hull and Pitz have an opportunity to become just the seventh and eighth Penn State football student-athletes to earn Academic All-America® accolades twice. Tackle Gerald Cadogan became the sixth when he did so in 2007 and '08.

Penn State was second among all FBS schools with its quartet of 2009 Academic All-District® selections. Fresno State led all FBS schools with five. Dayton and Marist also had five honorees within the University Division and North Dakota and South Dakota State joined Penn State with four honorees in the University Division.

Indiana and Northwestern were second among Big Ten Conference institutions with three Academic All-District® choices.

A three-year starter, Boone graduated in May, 2009 with a 3.56 grade point average in elementary and kindergarten education. He is a substitute teacher in the State College Area School District this fall.

A starter at middle linebacker in all 24 games the past two years, Hull owns a 3.56 GPA in environmental systems engineering. Winner of Penn State's prestigious Eric A. Walker Award last spring, the former Penns Valley High School standout is on schedule to graduate in December.

Pitz has effectively served as he long snapper on all kicking plays this season and handled snaps on all placements in 2008. He owns the squad's highest grade point average, graduating last May with a 3.93 in journalism. He is working on a second degree, in telecommunications.

Wisniewski is in his first year as the Nittany Lions' starting center after starting 12 games at guard last year. He is enrolled in the Schreyer Honors College and has a 3.89 grade point average in secondary education.

The *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District and All-America® Teams are selected by the 1,800 members of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve and maintain a cumulative GPA of at least 3.30 on a scale of 4.00.

The Penn State football team has had at least one Academic All-American® in each of the past seven seasons, with Paul Posluszny being selected the 2006 Academic All-American® of the Year for the University Division. In 2008, Penn State had a school record four Academic All-Americans®.

During Joe Paterno's tenure, Penn State has had 42 Academic All-Americans®, with 31 earning first team honors. The Nittany Lions' all-time total of 44 Academic All-America® football players ranks third among all FBS institutions.

THREE BIG TEN TITLES THIS FALL FOR PENN STATE; NO. 1 VOLLEYBALL WIN STREAK HITS 92, ON CUSP OF CONF. CROWN

Penn State won four Big Ten Championships during the Fall of 2008 and has an opportunity to win up to four again this year.

The No. 1 ranked Penn State women's volleyball team won its 92nd consecutive match Nov. 14 vs. Northwestern. The win streak is tied for second-longest in NCAA Division I history with the North Carolina women's soccer team (1990-94). The two-time defending NCAA Champions are 28-0 overall and 16-0 in the Big Ten, having won a conference record 61 consecutive matches.

Penn State would clinch its seventh consecutive outright Big Ten Championship with wins at Purdue and Indiana this weekend.

The Penn State women's soccer team won its 12th consecutive Big Ten Championship with a 7-1-1 record. The 12th-straight title puts Penn State in elite territory, joining the Michigan swimming & diving teams of the late 1990s as only one other Big Ten women's team to win 12 straight conference titles. The Nittany Lions also earned their 14th-straight NCAA Tournament berth and lost to Virginia in the second round on Nov. 15.

The Penn State's women's cross country team captured its first Big Ten crown on Nov. 1, as senior Bridget Franek won the individual crown. The Nittany Lions qualified for the NCAA Championships, to be held Nov. 23 at Indiana State.

The Penn State men's soccer team was the No. 2 seed in the Big Ten Tournament and fell to top-seeded Ohio State, 1-0, in the championship match. The NCAA Championship field will be announced Monday night.

The Nittany Lion football team enters this week one game behind Big Ten leader Ohio State, as Penn State seeks a share of its third Big Ten title in the past five seasons.

DEFENSE LEADS BIG TEN IN THREE OF PRIMARY CATEGORIES

Over the past five seasons, entering the 2009 campaign, Penn State ranked No. 5 in the nation in

total defense (293.7 ypg) and No. 5 in scoring defense (15.7 ppg).

The Nittany Lion defense again has been superb all season. Penn State leads the Big Ten in three of the six primary defensive statistical categories and is second in the other two.

The Nittany Lions lead the conference in: scoring defense (11.6 ppg), tackles for losses (91, 8.3 avg.) and sacks (34, 3.1 avg.). Penn State is second in rushing yards per game (93.9 avg.) and total defense (272.0 ypg) and third in passing yards per game (178.1 avg.).

Penn State also leads the Big Ten in red zone defense (64, 16 of 25), a category the Nittany Lions lead the nation in.

DEFENSE RANKED IN NATION'S TOP 20 IN SIX PRIMARY CATEGORIES

The Penn State defense is ranked in the Top 20 nationally in all the major statistical categories: scoring (4th), rushing (8th), passing (17th) and total defense (9th), as well as TFL (7th) and sacks (9th).

Penn State leads the nation with 91 tackles for loss, but six other teams that have not played 11 contests have a higher per game average.

The Nittany Lions held seven of their first nine opponents to 13 points or less for the first time since 1989.

ONE OF ONLY THREE TEAMS IN TOP 20 OF SIX PRIMARY DEFENSIVE CATEGORIES

Penn State, Alabama and Oklahoma are the nation's only teams ranked in the Top 20 in all six of the primary defensive categories.

The Nittany Lions also lead the nation in Red Zone defense (64 pct., 16 of 25), permitting 9 TD and 7 FG.

NO 100-YARD RUSHERS ALLOWED LAST 14 GAMES

Penn State is one of only six teams in the nation that has yet to allow a 100-yard rusher this season.

The Nittany Lions have not permitted an opponent to hit the century mark over the last 14 contests. Iowa's Shonn Greene was the last to do so, gaining 117 yards on 28 carries on Nov. 8, 2008.

Iowa's Adam Robinson's 88 yards are the most against Penn State this season. The Nittany Lions have held six opponents to 65 rushing yards or less this year.

ONLY BIG TEN OFFENSE IN TOP FIVE OF FOUR PRIMARY CATEGORIES

Under the direction of senior quarterback Daryll Clark, the Nittany Lions are the only Big Ten team ranked in the conference's top five in the four primary team statistical categories: rushing, passing, total and scoring offense.

Penn State is third in the Big Ten in total offense (403.5 ypg), second in pass efficiency (137.5 rating), fifth in scoring (28.5 ppg), fifth in passing offense (231.2 ypg) and fifth in rushing

(172.3 ypg).

COACH JOE PATERNO

In his 44th season as head coach of the Nittany Lions and 60th year on the coaching staff, Joe Paterno is the leader in all-time victories among major college coaches. A 1950 graduate of Brown University, Paterno owns a career record of 392-129-3 for a winning percentage of 75.1.

He ranks second in winning percentage among active Football Bowl Subdivision coaches with 10 or more years as a head coach.

Paterno is the longest serving head coach at one school in major college football history. Amos Alonzo Stagg served as head coach at the University of Chicago for 41 years (1892-1932) during his 57-year tenure as a head coach.

Paterno has led the Nittany Lions to two national championships (1982 and '86) and five undefeated seasons (1968, '69, '73, '86 and '94). Selected the AFCA National Coach of the Year an unprecedented five times, Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl wins with a record of 23-11-1.

He has guided Penn State to three Big Ten Championships and has been selected the Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year three times, the award's second-highest total.

He is one of only nine coaches in NCAA history (five in Division I-A) to win 300 games and reached the milestone faster than anyone (380 games). He also is the only FBS head coach with 300 victories at one school.

Paterno was inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in December 2007 and was among the first three active coaches to be inducted.

PATERNO LONGEVITY AMAZING

Since Joe Paterno became head coach in 1966, there have been 842 head coaching changes in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division I-A), an average of more than six changes per institution! (Total includes four changes thus far in 2009).

There have been 32 head coaches at the other Big Ten institutions since Penn State began conference play in 1993. Paterno is the dean of Big Ten coaches by six years over all his conference counterparts, with Iowa's Kirk Ferentz second in longevity (started in 1999).

PATERNO AMONG CANDIDATES FOR BRYANT COACH OF THE YEAR AWARD

Joe Paterno has been named to the Paul "Bear" Bryant College Football Coach of the Year Watch List. He is among a distinguished list of Football Bowl Subdivision coaches nominated for the 2009 honor.

Paterno was the recipient of the inaugural Bryant Coach of the Year Award in 1986 and was a finalist in 1994 and 2005. He also won the award in 1978 and '82 before the Bryant-American Heart Association sponsorship began. Paterno is a candidate for the honor for the second consecutive year, having led Penn State to an 11-2 record and the Big Ten Championship and Rose Bowl berth in 2008.

Al Golden, Temple's head coach and a former Nittany Lion player and assistant coach, also is among the candidates for the award.

The Bryant Coach of the Year finalists will be announced in December and attend an awards dinner in Houston on Jan. 14, 2010. The winner will be announced that evening. The recipient of the

MICHIGAN STATE COACH MARK DANTONIO

Mark Dantonio has a 22-15 record in his third year as coach of the Spartans and a 40-32 mark in his sixth year overall. Dantonio was a Michigan State assistant from 1995-2000 and was head coach at Cincinnati from 2004-06. He is a 1979 graduate of South Carolina.

WINNER CLAIMS LAND GRANT TROPHY

When the Penn State-Michigan State series was renewed with the Nittany Lions' entrance into the Big Ten in 1993, the Land Grant Trophy was established to go to the winner in what is expected to be each school's annual season finale.

The Land Grant Trophy honors Penn State's and Michigan State's unique places in history as the two pioneer land-grant institutions in the United States. Each school was founded in 1855, Michigan State on February 12 and Penn State on Feb. 22. The schools were the prototypes after which the land-grant system was patterned. Each institution brought to American education the new dimensions of service and outreach in addition to education and research.

The Land Grant Trophy joins the Governor's Victory Bell, presented to the Penn State-Minnesota victor, as the other trophy the Nittany Lions play for in Big Ten competition. The Big Ten leads all conference with 15 trophy games.

LIONS-SPARTANS SERIES

The Nittany Lions and Spartans first met in 1914 and Penn State leads the series, 13-12-1. Penn State has played Michigan State more than any other Big Ten opponent, having met 10 times before joining the Big Ten Conference.

With Penn State's entry into the Big Ten in 1993, the teams have played in the regular season finale the past 16 years, with the winner claiming the Land Grant Trophy.

The teams have combined to score 1004 points in their 16 conference clashes (62.7 ppg).

The teams will next meet on Nov. 27, 2010 in Beaver Stadium.

SCOUTING THE SPARTANS

Michigan State improved to 6-5 overall (4-3 in the Big Ten) last Saturday with a 40-37 come-from-behind victory at Purdue.

Down 11 points early in the fourth quarter, the Spartans erased the deficit by outscoring Purdue 17-3 in the game's final 11:34. En route to its third 40-point offensive output of the season, Michigan State gained 362 yards on offense and added 229 yards on kickoff returns.

Sophomore quarterback Kirk Cousins leads the Michigan State attack, which is ranked No. 1 in the Big Ten in passing (274.1) and total offense (413.8). The conference's leader in passing efficiency (149.7), he has thrown for 2,305 yards, completing 61.9 percent of his passes (169-273), with 17 touchdowns and four interceptions.

Wide receiver Blair White, who is fourth in the Big Ten with 61 receptions, is Cousins' primary target. His 854 receiving yards and eight touchdowns lead the team. B.J. Cunningham (44-602-4),

Mark Dell (24-405-1), and tight end Brian Linthicum (18-259-2) are also key figures in the Spartans' passing game.

Wide receiver Keshawn Martin leads MSU with 1,067 all-purpose yards. He has 12 catches for 251 yards (20.9) and three touchdowns, has run for 217 yards on only 14 carries (15.5) with one score and is No. 3 in the Big Ten in kickoff returns with a 31.7 average and one touchdown on 14 returns.

Freshman running back Larry Caper is MSU's leading ground gainer, totaling 411 yards on 101 carries (4.1 avg.) and six touchdowns.

Linebacker Greg Jones headlines a Michigan State defense that is allowing 23.5 points per game. Jones tops the Big Ten in tackles with 126 and leads the team in tackles for loss (11.0) and sacks (7.5). Eric Gordon (79 tackles, 7.5 TFLs, and 3.5 sacks) and Brandon Denson (54 tackles, 1 INT) combine with Jones to provide MSU with a formidable linebacking corps. Defensive end Trevor Anderson (43 tackles, 7.5 TFLs, 4 sacks) and tackle Jerel Worthy (30 tackles, 8.5 TFLs, 4.5 sacks) star up front for the Spartans. Junior cornerback Chris L. Rucker leads the defensive backs with 51 tackles (2 TFLs), one interception, seven pass break-ups, two forced fumbles, and one fumble recovery.

Senior kicker Brett Swenson has connected on a conference-high 18 of 20 (90.0) field goals this season, with a long of 52 yards. He is the Big Ten's leader in scorer with 92 points. Junior punter Aaron Bates averages 42.1 yards per kick and has placed 18 of his 50 punts inside the 20-yard line.

LAST MEETING

Penn State gained 557 yards, including a school record 419 passing yards, as the No. 8 Nittany Lions beat No. 15 Michigan State, 49-18, on Nov. 22, 2008 to claim the Big Ten title and a berth in the Rose Bowl.

The Nittany Lions improved to 11-1 overall and 7-1 in the Big Ten in front of boisterous, but chilly Senior Day throng of 109,845.

The victory was Penn State's 800th all-time, as the Nittany Lions became just the sixth school in the nation to achieve the mark.

The Nittany Lions delivered an impressive performance on both sides of the ball. Penn State limited Michigan State to just 35 rushing yards. Javon Ringer was held to a season-low 42 yards, 98.7 yards below his average. Ringer entered the game ranked third in the NCAA in rushing averaging 140.7 yards per game and was fourth in all-purpose yards (173.2 ypg).

MORE THAN 30 NITTANY LIONS ON NFL ROSTERS

A total of 31 Penn State football alumni were populating the rosters of National Football League teams during Season Kickoff Week, again among the top 15 totals in the nation.

Since Season Kickoff Week, Chicago has signed LB Tim Shaw, Philadelphia signed WR Jordan Norwood to the practice squad and DE Maurice Evans was released by Tampa Bay, signed to Carolina's practice squad and re-signed with the Buccaneers on Oct. 7.

The Buffalo Bills feature three former Nittany Lions on their roster and rookie Lydell Sargeant is on injured reserve. The Bills have veterans Bryan Scott and Paul Posluszny and 2009 first round pick Aaron Maybin. The Kansas City Chiefs' roster includes veterans Bobby Engram, Tamba Hali and Larry Johnson.

Quarterback Kerry Collins (Tennessee) leads the former Lions in NFL experience, in his 15th season. Wide receiver Bobby Engram (Kansas City) is in his 14th season. Collins and Engram were first team All-Americans on Penn State's 12-0 Big Ten Championship squad in 1994.

New York Giants' defensive tackle Jay Alford suffered a torn MCL and partially torn ACL during a pre-season game and will miss the 2009 season.

Former Nittany Lions Sean McHugh (Pittsburgh), Tyler Reed (Chicago) and Lydell Sargeant (Buffalo) also are on the injured reserve list.

More than 350 Nittany Lions have signed NFL contracts since Joe Paterno became head coach in 1966. The Hall of Fame coach has seen 239 of his players drafted by NFL squads.

Thirty-two Nittany Lions have been NFL first round draft choices since 1966, including defensive end Aaron Maybin, whom the Bills selected with the No. 11 overall pick in 2009.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team in 39 of 43 title games, including Sean McHugh and Scott Paxson with the Super Bowl XLIII Champion Pittsburgh Steelers. Thirty-two former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 48 Super Bowl rings.

First team All-Big Ten quarterback Daryll Clark led the Nittany Lions to a season-high nine plays of 20 yards or more from scrimmage -- eight passing and one rushing. Among them were plays of 70, 59, 49, 37, 33 and 32 yards, all through the air. The Lions averaged 8.4 yards per play.

Clark threw for a career-high 341 yards and four touchdowns, the sixth-highest passing yardage in school history, to earn Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week.

Clark was 16 of 26 and averaged an impressive 21.3 yards per completion. He was 11 of 18 for 215 yards and two scores the first half.

Deon Butler made a career-best three touchdown receptions, including catches of 70 and 59 yards. All three of his catches (133 yards) went for touchdowns, bringing his career TD total to 22, third-highest in school history.

SERIES HAS PRODUCED OFFENSIVE FIREWORKS

Although Penn State has won 12 of the 16 games vs. Michigan State since starting Big Ten play in 1993, seven of the games have been decided by seven points or less and all 16 have been high scoring.

During the 16 games, PSU and MSU have combined to score 1,004 points, an average of 62.7 points per game. The Lions have scored 566 points, an average of 35.3 ppg, while the Spartans have tallied 438 (27.3 ppg).

1993-Trailing 37-17 late in the third quarter, the Lions staged a dramatic rally, the second-biggest under Joe Paterno. Kerry Collins hit Bobby Engram for 40 and 52-yard TD passes sandwiching a three-yard run by Brian O'Neal for three scores in five minutes to take a 38-37 lead with less than 12 minutes to play. The Spartans managed just three first downs and the Lions recorded three sacks on their last three possessions to seal the win at Spartan Stadium and a Citrus Bowl bid.

1994-Penn State completed the first undefeated regular season by a Big Ten squad since Ohio State in 1979 with a 59-31 win over MSU in Beaver Stadium, tied for the second-highest scoring game in the Joe Paterno era. Ki-Jana Carter rushed for 227 yards and five touchdowns as the Lions completed their seventh unbeaten, untied regular season under Paterno. Kerry Collins was 16 of 24 for 289 yards and Bobby Engram made eight catches for 169 yards and a TD.

1995-Once again the Lions were forced to rally in East Lansing, with Bobby Engram again providing the clutch plays. His 53-yard TD catch from Wally Richardson forged a 17-17 tie with 9:48 to play, but the Spartans kicked a field goal for a 20-

17 lead. MSU got the ball back, but the Lion defense stopped three straight runs, using all three of their timeouts, to get the ball at the PSU 27 with 1:45 to play. Richardson was magnificent on the decisive march, going 11 of 15, including two spikes. With the ball on the MSU four-yard-line with 13 seconds left, Engram took a screen pass, ducked under two would-be tacklers and slammed the ball across the goal line with just :08 to play. Engram made eight catches for 109 yards and Richardson was 16 of 21 in the fourth stanza with two scores.

1996-Brett Conway's 30-yard field goal with 12 seconds remaining lifted PSU to a 32-29 win and a Fiesta Bowl berth in a back-and-forth game. With the tilt knotted at 29-all, the Lions got the ball on their own 20 with 4:27 to play. QB Wally Richardson directed an 11-play, 67-yard drive to get the Lions well within Conway's range. Richardson was 21 of 31 for 281 yards and a TD and the Lions forced three turnovers.

1997-Tied at 14-all early in the third quarter, the Spartans scored on their next five possessions en route to a 49-14 thumping in East Lansing. Michigan State's 49 points were tied for the second-highest ever against a Joe Paterno-coached team. The Spartans rushed for 452 yards, most ever against Penn State, with Sedrick Irvin (238) and Marc Renaud (203) breaking the NCAA record for most combined yards by two runners over 200 yards.

1998-Tailback Eric McCoo rushed for 206 yards, a record for a Penn State true freshman, to lead the Lions past Michigan State, 51-28 in Beaver Stadium. Travis Forney tied the school and Big Ten records with five field goals and his 19 kicking points were a school record in a game. The Spartans were limited to 71 yards rushing and David Macklin and Anthony King returned interceptions for scores.

1999-The Lions rallied from deficits of 21-0 and 28-7 to gain a tie at 28, but T.J. Duckett's fourth touchdown of the game gave Michigan State a 35-28 win at Spartan Stadium. The Spartans led 28-7 at halftime, but a pair of Eddie Drummond TD catches and two Travis Forney field goals knotted the score.

The Lions fumbled at their own 38-yard-line to set-up Duckett's game-winning score with 2:30 to play.

2000-Penn State scored 28 points in the first 8:56 of the game to quickly take control en route to a 42-23 win over Michigan State in Beaver Stadium. The Lions gained 462 yards (244 rushing and 218 passing) against the Big Ten's top-rated defense, a unit which entered the game allowing 19.1 ppg and 303.9 ypg. Quarterback Rashard Casey accounted for five touchdowns, going 11 of 18 for 218 yards and three scores and rushing for 37 yards and two more TD.

2001 - Trailing Michigan State by 17 points, and in need of a win to keep its bowl hopes alive, Zack Mills came off the bench to lead Penn State to his third comeback victory of the season, as the Nittany Lions scored 28 unanswered points to post a dramatic 42-37 win in the Spartan Stadium. With the win, the Lions evened their record at 5-5 after an 0-4 start.

Mills entered the game on the Lions' first possession of the second quarter and with MSU leading, 17-7. The Spartans extended their lead to 24-7, but from that point on the Lions mounted their comeback, as Mills directed five consecutive touchdown drives. Michigan State led 31-14 with 5:33 left in the first

PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN RECORD 89 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to statistical information released in October 2008 by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a record Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 89 percent compared to a 78 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 1998-99 through 2001-02.

This is the 18th release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. The NCAA releases the data collected by the U.S. Department of Education. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes as it has for the past 18 years. Among the 2001-02 entering freshman class, a record 84 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, significantly above the 64 percent for all Division I institutions.

Penn State's 84 percent figure was tied for second-highest among Big Ten Conference institutions with Michigan, trailing only Northwestern (89). The graduation rate for all Penn State students also was 84 percent in the entering class of 2001-02.

Penn State's previous high federal graduation rate for student-athletes was 83 percent, earned by the entering classes of 1999-2000, 1997-98 and 1989-90.

The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 82 percent, again well above the national average of 63 percent, and second to Northwestern (88) in the Big Ten. The four-year average for University Park students was 84 percent, also far exceeding the 61 percent rate for all students nationwide.

The NCAA data revealed that student-athletes from 22 of Penn State's 25 teams (track/cross country teams combined) earned a Graduation Success Rate at or above the national GSR average of 78 percent. Eleven Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent, one higher than last year, and 21 Nittany Lion teams earned a GSR higher than the national average for their respective sport.

African-American student-athletes at Penn State continue to graduate at much higher percentages than at other Division I institutions. Seventy-nine percent of African-American student-athletes that entered Penn State in 2001-02 graduated, highest among Big Ten schools, and far above the national Division I average of 53 percent.

Penn State's four-year federal graduation rate for African-American student-athletes was 76 percent, marking the 18th consecutive year the Nittany Lions topped the Division I national average. At all Division I institutions in the NCAA compilation, the African-American four-year graduation percentile was 53 percent.

The University's African-American student-athlete GSR was 80 percent, again significantly above the Division I national GSR average of 62 percent. Penn State was second only to Northwestern among Big Ten schools in the African-American federal graduation rate and GSR.

Of the Penn State student-athletes in the NCAA studies from 1992-93 through 2001-02 who exhausted their eligibility, 96 percent left with their diplomas.

half, but PSU scored the next 28 points to take a 42-31 lead late in the third quarter.

The Spartans closed to within 42-37 and on fourth and seven from the PSU 14, Jeff Smoker completed a pass to Charles Rogers at the nine, but linebacker Deryck Toles wrapped him up two yards short and the Lions ran out the clock on the big win.

2002 - Needing 264 yards to become just the ninth player in NCAA Division I-A history to rush for 2,000 yards, Penn State tailback Larry Johnson ran for an amazing 279 yards and four touchdowns in the first half to lead the Nittany Lions to a 61-7 win on November 23, 2002 in Beaver Stadium.

Johnson scored on runs of 11, 78, 11 and 38 yards, breaking past the 2,000-yard mark on his final score. The consensus All-American gained his 279 yards on just 19 carries, averaging a staggering 14.7 yards per carry. He did not carry the ball in the second half, becoming the first player in the 107-year history of the Big Ten to rush for 2,000 yards in the regular season, leading PSU to a 48-0 halftime lead.

Bryant Johnson caught a 41-yard touchdown pass from Zack Mills and returned a punt 81 yards for another score. He accumulated a career-high 201 all-purpose yards.

2003 - Penn State took a 3-0 lead but could not sustain its momentum from its Senior Day win, as the Spartans rolled to a 41-10 decision in East Lansing.

Following a Robbie Gould field goal, MSU took a 14-3 lead. Facing a third-and-three from its own three, Jeff Smoker threw a 40-yard completion to Kyle Brown and the Spartans marched 94 yards to take a 21-3 halftime lead.

Michael Robinson totaled 159 yards of offense, as he was 5 of 8 passing for 69 yards and a touchdown, rushed for 54 yards and made three catches for 36 yards.

2004 -The Nittany Lions once again demonstrated their resiliency, responding to a 6-3 halftime deficit by scoring 28 points in the third quarter en route to a 37-13 win over Michigan State on Nov. 20, 2004 in Beaver Stadium.

The defense and special teams came up with four big plays in the decisive third period and the offense took advantage. The Lions scored four touchdowns in a span of 8:37 to take a commanding 37-13 lead into the fourth quarter.

Penn State took the second half kickoff and marched 75 yards, with Tony Hunt scoring from one yard with 8:58 to play to begin the barrage. On MSU's second play, Tamba Hali grabbed his first career interception and returned it to the MSU 8, setting up a Zack Mills touchdown run on the next play for a 17-6 lead.

Two possessions later, Paul Posluszny grabbed an interception and returned it 17 yards to the MSU 10. On the next play, Mills darted for a 10-yard TD.

The Spartans' next drive also ended abruptly, as Donnie Johnson blocked a punt, giving the Lions the ball at the MSU 22. Mills then lofted a six-yard TD pass to Robinson in the corner of the end zone for a 31-6 margin.

2005 - Penn State's stalwart defense again rose to the challenge of facing one of the nation's top offenses, stopping Michigan State three times inside the Red Zone en route to a 31-22 victory on Nov.19, 2005 at Spartan Stadium.

With the win, the Nittany Lions claimed a share of their second Big Ten Championship and earned the conference's automatic berth into the Bowl Championship Series, landing in the FedEx Orange Bowl.

A veteran defense, with seven senior starters, and the special teams delivered another impressive performance.

The Lions grabbed a season-high four interceptions, three by cornerback Alan Zemaitis, and blocked a punt that was recovered for a touchdown to ignite the rest of the team. The Nittany Lions held MSU 105 yards below its Big Ten-leading average of 506.9 ypg. The Spartans came into the game averaging 35.0 ppg and were held to 22, which included a touchdown and two point conversion with :53 to play.

Zemaitis became the first Nittany Lion with a trio of picks since Darren Perry against Boston College in 1991.

2006 - An energized crowd of 108,607 thanked 24 Nittany Lion seniors in a pre-game ceremony and then saw visiting Michigan State take its shot at knocking Penn State out of a New Year's Day bowl.

Penn State lost four first half fumbles, including three in the first quarter, and the Spartans tallied 13 points off the miscues for a 13-7 halftime lead. But, the Lions did not turn the ball over in the second half and used another superlative defensive effort to record a 17-13 win on Nov. 18, 2006, to lock up a berth in the Outback Bowl.

Midway through the third period, Anthony Morelli guided the Lions on an 80-yard scoring drive in just seven plays, connecting with Derrick Williams (23 yards), Tony Hunt (23) and Quarless (29) to take the ball to the MSU 6. On the next play, Morelli hit Jordan Norwood and Penn State had a 14-13 lead.

Michigan State crossed midfield only one more time, on its last possession, but Tim Shaw recorded his second sack of the drive on fourth-and-two from the PSU 38 to effectively seal the game.

The Spartans gained 14 yards rushing yards, the fewest allowed by Penn State in 2006. The Spartans attempted only 15 rushes, the fewest by a Penn State opponent in the Joe Paterno era.

2007 - Michigan State scored the final 14 points of the game to hand Penn State a heart-breaking 35-31 setback in Spartan Stadium on Nov. 17, 2007.

The Lions finished the regular season with an 8-4 record and earned a berth in the Alamo Bowl.

Penn State took a 24-7 lead early in the third quarter on a fake field goal for a touchdown, but from that point, was out-scored 28-7 by the Spartans.

Tailback Rodney Kinlaw ran for a game-high 125 yards and scored two touchdowns, earning his fifth 100-yard rushing game of the season. Anthony Morelli was 16 of 35 for 188 yards, with one touchdown and no interceptions.

The Lions did not turn the ball over the first time in 2007 and ran 77 plays to Michigan State's 61.

The Penn State defense forced three turnovers and limited the Spartans to 145 rushing yards, well below their season average of 205.4 yards per game, and forced three turnovers. But, Michigan State quarterback Brian Hoyer was 16 of 21 for 257 yards, with four touchdowns and two interceptions. The Spartans had eight pass plays of 20 yards or more, with seven coming in the second half. The Nittany Lions turned the three turnovers in to 17 points.

VERSUS MICHIGAN SCHOOLS

Penn State has a 20-22-1 record against teams from the state of Michigan. The Nittany Lions have played Michigan State more than any other Michigan school (26 games), with the two original Land Grant institutions meeting every year since Penn State began Big Ten play in 1993.

Penn State football team produced another superb academic performance, according to the NCAA Graduation Rates Report, released in October 2008.

The Nittany Lions' four-year Graduation Success Rate of 78 percent was No. 2 among the teams ranked in the final 2008 Associated Press Top 25 and easily exceeded the 67 percent Division I average. Penn State trailed only Texas Tech (79 percent).

The Penn State football team earned a graduation rate of 77 percent for the 2001-02 freshmen class, 21 points higher than the national Division I average of 56 percent. The Nittany Lions' four-year graduation average was 75 percent, again easily surpassing the 55 percent national average.

Penn State was second to Northwestern among Big Ten institutions in all three football graduation categories.

Twenty Penn State seniors played their final game in Beaver Stadium vs. Indiana.

Over the past four years, the group has been instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions win the 2008 Big Ten Championship and Rose Bowl berth, the 2007 Outback Bowl and the 2007 Valero Alamo Bowl, with the possibility of a third January bowl game this season.

The seniors have helped the Nittany Lions earn a 38-12 record since the start of the 2006 season, among the best marks in nation.

Among the 20 seniors are 10 players who have been starters for most of the season (five on defense, four on offense, one specialist).

ODRICK EARNS MID-SEASON ALL-AMERICA NOTICE

Senior defensive tackle Jared Odrick earned a pair of Mid-Season All-America recognitions. The 2008 first team All-Big Ten selection was named a second team All-American by Collegefootballnews.com and a third team All-American by Phil Steele's College Football.

Odrick made a season-high five solo tackles in the 34-13 win at Northwestern, including a 10-yard sack on NU's first play of the third quarter to set the tone for a scoreless second half for the Wildcats.

Odrick's block of a 37-yard Northwestern field goal late in the first half was the first by a Penn State player since Odrick blocked a 29-yard attempt vs. Florida International in the first game of the 2007 season.

For the season, Odrick leads the Nittany Lions with 6.0 sacks for minus-45 yards, good for sixth in the Big Ten. The former Lebanon High School All-American is third on the squad with 10.0 tackles for losses (minus-56). Odrick is fifth on the team with 39 tackles overall, with two quarterback hurries, a pass break-up and the blocked field goal.

PATERNO AND BOWMAN SEMIFINALISTS FOR MUNGER & BEDNARIK AWARDS

Penn State coach Joe Paterno and junior linebacker Navarro Bowman (District Heights, Md.) have been selected as semifinalists for two awards presented by the Maxwell Football Club.

Paterno is among the 15 nominees for the Maxwell Football Club's college coach of the year honor, the George Munger Award. Paterno previously was selected as the George Munger Award recipient in 2005.

Bowman is one of 16 players under consideration for the Chuck Bednarik Award, an honor bestowed upon the nation's top defensive player. The Nittany Lions have had four Bednarik Award winners in the last 10 years, the last being All-America linebacker Dan Connor in 2007, giving Penn State three consecutive honorees. Paul Posluszny became just the second-time two-time winner in 2005 and 2006. Linebacker LaVar Arrington received the Chuck Bednarik Award in 1999.

In its 21st year, the George Munger Award is named for former University of Pennsylvania coach George Munger. The Chuck Bednarik Award was established in 1995 and is presented in honor of linebacking great Chuck Bednarik, a member of both the College Football and NFL Halls of Fame.

Three finalists for the Bednarik and Munger awards will be released on Nov. 23 and a second round of voting will take place at that time. The announcement of the winner of the 15th Bednarik Award will be made during the Home Depot ESPNU College Football Awards Show that will air on ESPN on Thursday, Dec. 10. The Maxwell Football Club will announce the winner of the 21st George Munger Award in December.

The formal presentation of the awards will be

made at the Maxwell Football Club's Awards Dinner, to be held on Friday, March 5, 2010 at the Harrah's Entertainment Complex in Atlantic City, N.J.

CLARK LONE BIG TEN QB IN TOP FOUR OF PRIMARY CATEGORIES; LEADS LEAGUE WITH 19 TOUCHDOWN PASSES

Senior Daryll Clark is the only Big Ten quarterback ranked in the top four in pass efficiency (2nd, 139.7), total offense (3rd, 243.1) and passing yardage (4th, 225.2 ypg).

Clark's 19 touchdown passes lead the conference and are good for a tie for 14th in the nation.

CLARK A CANDIDATE FOR BIG TEN SILVER FOOTBALL

Senior Daryll Clark is 20-4 as Penn State's starting quarterback and has emerged as one of the nation's top signal callers and a candidate for the Big Ten Silver Football, presented to the conference's MVP.

This season, Clark is 195 of 319 (61.1) for 2,477 yards, with 19 touchdowns and 10 interceptions, with just four interceptions in the last seven games. A two-time semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien Award, he has run for 197 yards and has seven rushing touchdowns to lead the team.

Under Clark's direction, the Nittany Lions are the only Big Ten team ranked in the conference's top five in the four primary team statistical categories: rushing, passing, total and scoring offense.

Penn State is third in the Big Ten in total offense (403.5 ypg), second in pass efficiency (137.5 rating), fifth in scoring (28.5 ppg), fifth in passing offense (231.2 ypg) and fifth in rushing (172.3 ypg).

Penn State also leads the conference (4th in nation) in third down conversions (50.0 pct., 75 of 150), is second in average time of possession (31:58) and third in first downs (228).

Clark has thrown 27 touchdown passes in the past 14 games. He had thrown a touchdown pass in seven consecutive games until the Nittany Lions scored five rushing touchdowns at Illinois. Clark has thrown at least one touchdown pass in 12 of the past 14 games.

CLARK CONTINUES RAPID CLIMB ON SCHOOL RECORDS LISTS

Senior quarterback Daryll Clark continues his ascension up numerous Penn State school and career records lists, having started 24 career games and owning a 20-4 record as the starter.

Among the Penn State records Clark owns or is rising in are:

- Clark became the Penn State career leader in career touchdowns responsible for in the 35-10 win at Michigan, surpassing Zack Mills' 52 career touchdowns (41 passing, 11 rushing). Clark has 60 (38 passing, 22 rushing) through the Indiana game.
- His 26 touchdowns responsible for this year (19 passing, 7 rushing) are good for No. 4 on the school season list. He and Lydell Mitchell are tied for the record (29) and Michael Robinson (28) is third.
- Clark's 22 career rushing touchdowns are a record for a Penn State quarterback, breaking a tie with Michael Robinson (20) in the Ohio State game.
- The former Ursuline High School standout

has 407 career completions, good for third place at Penn State. Anthony Morelli is second with 460.

• Clark has moved into third all-time in career total offense at Penn State with 5,821 yards. Only Tony Sacca (6,000) and Zack Mills (7,796) are ahead of him.

• While throwing for 274 yards, fourth-highest of his career (22 of 31) in the win in Evanston, Clark posted his 12th career game with 200-plus passing yards, moving into third all-time at Penn State, which is 11-1 when Clark passes for at least 200 yards. Only Kerry Collins (16) and Zack Mills (16) had more 200-yard efforts.

• Clark's 13-yard TD pass to Evan Royster vs. Indiana moved him into fifth all-time at Penn State with 38 touchdown passes. Kerry Collins is fourth with 39.

• Clark has 19 touchdown passes this the season, just three away from Todd Blackledge's school record of 22 in 1982.

• Clark has 5,216 career passing yards, good for sixth place in school history. Anthony Morelli is fifth with 5,275.

• His 2,477 passing yards this season to rank No. 5 in school history. Tony Sacca (2,488) and Clark's 2008 mark of 2,592 are next on the list.

• Against Iowa, Clark connected with Chaz Powell on a 79-yard scoring strike on Penn State's first play from scrimmage. The 79-yard connection was tied for the eighth-longest pass play in Penn State history and was a career-high for Clark.

A 2,000-YARD PASSER FOR FIFTH CONSECUTIVE SEASON

During Penn State's 34-13 win at Northwestern, Daryll Clark surpassed 2,000 passing yards, giving the Nittany Lions a 2,000-yard passer for the fifth consecutive year and sixth time since 2002.

Clark is 195 of 319 (61.2) for 2,477 yards this season. He threw for 2,592 yards last year and joins Anthony Morelli as the only Nittany Lions to eclipse 2,000 yards twice. Morelli threw for 2,651 yards in 2007 and 2,424 yards in 2006.

During the 2005 season, Michael Robinson threw for 2,350 yards to start the five-year skein.

Penn State has had 14 seasons with a 2,000-yard passer, seven of which have occurred since the 2000 season.

CLARK FUELS FIVE-GAME WIN STREAK

During Penn State's five-game winning streak (Illinois through Northwestern), senior quarterback Daryll Clark was on fire.

Clark was 89 of 134 (66.4) for 1,200 yards, with nine touchdown passes and only one interception over the five contests. He also had five rushing scores during the five games, becoming Penn State's leader in career touchdowns responsible for with 57 (37 passing, 20 rushing).

Clark did not throw an interception in 115 pass attempts, covering 17 quarters, until he threw one in the fourth quarter vs. Ohio State. His previous pick had come in the second quarter vs. Eastern Illinois.

WHITE HOT IN RED ZONE

The Nittany Lions began the season converting just 6 of 11 Red Zone opportunities in the first two games, but over the next eight games they were perfect when advancing to the 20-yard-line.

Penn State was 27 of 27 inside the 20 from the

Temple-Ohio State games, with 20 touchdowns and seven field goals, before turning the ball over after reaching the Indiana 20. The Lions were 4 of 5 in the Red Zone vs. the Hoosiers.

For the season, the Lions are 37 of 43 (86.0) in the Red Zone to rank fourth in the Big Ten after being last in the conference (54.5) after two games.

The Nittany Lion defense also is blazing in the Red Zone, leading the nation by allowing only 16 scores on 25 trips (64.0) inside the Penn State 20. The Lions have allowed nine touchdowns and seven field goals, while forcing three fumbles, grabbing an interception and stopping the opposition on downs four times. The opposition also has missed one field goal in the Red Zone.

FANTASTIC IN FIRST HALF

Penn State was the nation's last team to allow a first half touchdown this season. Michigan became the first opponent to do so in the Nittany Lions' 35-10 win on Oct. 24.

The Nittany Lions have allowed only four first half touchdowns all season.

Penn State has a 180-54 scoring advantage in the first half this year.

The Nittany Lions have allowed a total of 12 touchdowns through 11 games (11 against the defense), tied with LSU fourth-fewest in the nation behind only Florida (10), Alabama and Nebraska (11).

LEE CRACKS TOP FIVE IN CAREER TACKLES

Senior linebacker Sean Lee (Pittsburgh) made a game-high 14 tackles against Ohio State to become just the third Nittany Lion to record 300 career tackles.

Lee's 14 stops were his most since making 14 in the 2007 Valero Alamo Bowl, where he earned Defensive MVP honors.

Back to full strength after suffering a sprained knee in the second half of the Temple game, Lee made 10 hits and had a career-high four pass break-ups in the Senior Day win over Indiana. Lee has 312 career stops and needs three to tie Brian Gelzheiser for fourth with 315.

The Indiana game was Lee's 17th career double figure tackle game.

Having missed the 2008 season with a knee injury, the 2007 All-Big Ten selection has returned to form to make a significant impact for the defense and special teams.

For the season, he has made 73 tackles, with 9.5 TFL (minus-37), with two sacks and seven pass break-ups.

In the 31-6 win over Temple, Lee tallied 12 tackles to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors for the third time in his career. He recorded 2.5 tackles for losses (minus-12), including a sack in the first quarter.

Lee suffered a sprained left knee in the win over Temple and did not play in the fourth quarter vs. the Owls or in the Iowa, Illinois and Eastern Illinois games, with limited duty vs. Minnesota. He made 12 tackles (10 solo) in the 34-13 win at Northwestern on Oct. 31.

LEE NAMED BUTKUS AWARD SEMIFINALIST

Senior Sean Lee has been selected as one of 16 semifinalists for the 25th annual Dick Butkus

Award®, an honor presented to the nation's top linebacker by the Butkus Foundation.

After missing the 2008 season with a knee injury, Lee returned to the field with a vengeance, recording 32 tackles, including 7.5 for a loss, and two sacks during the first three games of this season. But, a knee sprain suffered in the win over Temple forced him to miss the Iowa, Illinois, and Eastern Illinois games. He saw limited duty in the 20-0 win over Minnesota.

Lee combines with Navorro Bowman and Josh Hull to form one of the nation's top linebacking units.

A team co-captain, the former Upper St. Clair High School standout also is a candidate for the Chuck Bednarik Award and the Bronko Nagurski Trophy.

Penn State boasts two Butkus Award® winners in LaVar Arrington (1999) and Paul Posluszny (2005). The list of other Nittany Lion finalists for the honor reads like a roll call of all-time "Linebacker U" greats, including Conlan (1986), Andre Collins (1989), Brandon Short (1999), Posluszny (2006) and Dan Connor (2007).

The Butkus Award® is selected by a 51-person panel comprised of scouts, coaches, and journalists. Finalists for the Butkus Award® will be announced on Nov. 19 and the winner will be notified by Dec. 8. The 2009 recipient will be presented with the award in January, 2010.

Considered one of the greatest players in the history of the game, Dick Butkus was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1979 following an illustrious career with the Chicago Bears and into College Football Hall of Fame in 1983.

ROYSTER CRACKS SCHOOL TOP 10 FOR CAREER RUSHING YARDAGE; NEARS SECOND STRAIGHT 1,000-YARD SEASON

Junior tailback Evan Royster is on the brink of becoming just the seventh Nittany Lion with multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

Royster tallied 134 all-purpose yards vs. Indiana (96 rush, 39 receiving) in the 31-20 victory. He had a two-yard rushing touchdown and a 13-yard receiving touchdown.

For the season, Royster has 990 yards on 175 carries, with six touchdowns. His 5.7 per carry average is best among all Big Ten running backs with at least 90 carries. He ranks second in the Big Ten in rushing and is fifth in all-purpose yardage at 107.7 ypg.

He also has 16 receptions for 187 yards and two scores.

Royster has 2,739 career rushing yards, good for 10th place at Penn State. He trails Matt Suhey (2,818 yards) for ninth place in the school record books.

Royster recorded his 11th career 100-yard rushing game, and his fifth of the season, by gaining 118 yards on 15 carries in the 34-13 win at Northwestern.

He burst up the middle for a 69-yard touchdown early in the fourth quarter vs. the Wildcats, the longest run of his standout career.

Royster has moved into a tie for ninth place on the school career 100-yard rushing game list. Penn State is 11-0 when he rushes for 100 or more yards.

A semifinalist for the 2008 Doak Walker Award, Royster gained a season-high 137 yards on 23 carries (6.0) in the win over Minnesota. He ran for 100 yards in the win at Michigan, including a

41-yard burst to set-up the Lions' first touchdown, as Penn State struck back four plays after Michigan took a 7-0 lead.

MOYE EMERGING AMONG BIG TEN'S BEST WIDEOUTS

Sophomore wide receiver Derek Moyer continues his rise amongst the Big Ten's most dynamic and productive wideouts.

Moyer delivered a back-breaking 53-yard touchdown reception on a beautiful throw from Daryll Clark to give Penn State a 27-13 lead over Northwestern early in the fourth quarter.

For the third consecutive game, Moyer made six catches to tie his career-high and his 123 yards marked his third 100-yard effort of the season.

For the season, Moyer leads Penn State with 41 receptions for 676 yards (16.5) and is tied with Graham Zug for the team lead with five receiving touchdowns. Moyer's 16.5 average is second-best among the Big Ten's top 10 receptions leaders and he ranks 10th in the conference at 61.5 receiving yards per game.

The 6-5 Moyer had a tremendous game vs. Minnesota, tying his career-high with six catches and making a superlative touchdown catch with :35 in the first half for a 13-0 lead.

Moyer's touchdown catch was initially ruled incomplete, the play was reviewed and replays showed that his left foot was in the end zone and he had possession, giving the Lions a two-score cushion.

Moyer earned his second career 100-yard receiving game with his six catches for 120 yards vs. the Golden Gophers. He had six grabs for a career-high 138 yards in the season opener with Akron.

ZUG SETS CAREER-HIGHS VS. OSU; BLISTERS MICHIGAN WITH THREE TD GRABS

Junior wide receiver Graham Zug was a bright spot for the Nittany Lions against Ohio State, setting career-highs with seven receptions for 96 yards. His 31-yard catch late in the first quarter was a season long and helped set-up Daryll Clark's one-yard touchdown run to tie the game at 7-7.

Zug had a tremendous game at Michigan, making a career-high three touchdown catches.

A former walk-on, he made five catches for 59 yards vs. the Wolverines, including touchdown grabs of 10, 11 and 17 yards from Clark.

Zug became the second Nittany Lion in the past two seasons to have three touchdown catches in a game, joining Deon Butler (Michigan State, 2008).

For the season, the former Manheim Central High School standout is second on the team with 38 receptions and 450 yards and is tied for the team lead with five touchdown catches.

BOONE AMONG NATION'S PREMIER PUNTERS

Senior punter Jeremy Boone (Mechanicsburg) averaged 45.8 yards on a career-high 10 punts vs. Ohio State to continue his strong senior season. He had a long punt of 56 yards.

The former Mechanicsburg High School standout is second in the Big Ten with a 44.1-yard average on his 41 punts, with 15 landing inside the 20. Boone is ranked No. 11 in the nation with his 44.1-yard average.

Penn State's career punting average leader,

Boone also is on pace to break the school record for season punting average. The mark is 43.6 yards, set by Ralph Giacomarro in 1981.

Boone averaged 49.5 yards on his four punts vs. Illinois to earn Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week accolades on Oct. 4 for the first time in his outstanding career.

The Big Ten's punting average leader the past two seasons, Boone delivered another impressive performance in Champaign. His first punt of the game traveled 66 yards and was downed at the Illinois 3-yard-line to significantly change the field position early in the game. The punt was the third-longest of his career and was tied for No. 17 on the school's all-time list, giving Boone three of top 20 longest punts in Penn State annals.

Late in the first half, Boone lofted a punt that A.J. Wallace downed at the Illinois 1. His only punt of the second half traveled 60 yards.

OFFENSIVE LINE MAKING GOOD STRIDES

The Penn State offensive line has made steady progress throughout the season despite personnel losses and changes.

A trio of seniors from the unit earned first team All-Big Ten honors last year and the two returning starters - Dennis Landolt and Stefan Wisniewski are playing different positions on the line this season. A three-year starter, Landolt moved from right tackle to left tackle and Wisniewski shifted from right guard to center when the Lions began pre-season camp.

The unit had four different starting combinations in the initial six games of the season, but has made strong strides despite the changes.

In the 31-20 win over Indiana, the line did not allow a sack and helped Penn State gain 181 rushing yards and 194 passing yards.

In the 34-14 win at Northwestern, Penn State averaged 7.5 yards per play, gaining 437 yards. The Lions out-scored the Wildcats, 24-0, in the second half and averaged 6.0 yards on their 27 rushing attempts.

In the 35-10 win at Michigan, Penn State ran for 166 yards, averaging 4.2 yards per carry, and Daryll Clark threw for 230 yards, averaging 14.4 yards per completion. The Lions averaged 5.9 yards per play en route to 396 yards and 34:48 in time of possession.

In the 20-0 win over Minnesota, Penn State gained 464 yards on 75 plays (6.2 avg.), with 287 passing yards and 177 yards on the ground. The Nittany Lions held onto the ball for 41:59, its highest total since the 1991 BYU game, and the O-Line did not allow a sack for the third consecutive game.

In the 52-3 win over Eastern Illinois, fifth-year senior Ako Poti opened the game at right tackle in his first career start, helping the Nittany Lions gain a season-high 553 yards.

In Penn State's 35-17 win at Illinois on Oct. 3, fifth-year senior Nerraw McCormack started at right tackle in his first career start. But, during the game he injured his right ankle, continuing to play with the injury to help the Lions rush for 338 yards, their highest total in three years.

In addition to McCormack and Poti, four other Nittany Lions have made their first career starts on the O-Line this season: RG Lou Eliades, RT DeOn'tae Pannell, LG Matt Stankewitch and LC Johnnie Troutman.

QUARLESS MAKING GREAT STRIDES; CATCHES 60-YARD TD VS. MICHIGAN

Five games into this season, senior tight end Andrew Quarless had already surpassed his receptions total from last year and was well on his way to breaking his season-high total for catches.

Quarless continued his stellar senior season by hauling in a 60-yard catch and run for a huge second quarter touchdown in the 35-10 win at Michigan. The catch was career long, his first touchdown of the season and his sixth career score.

The play also was the longest completion to a PSU tight end since Michael Robinson completed a 73-yard touchdown pass to Matt Kranichick vs. Wisconsin in 2003.

Following Chaz Powell's 54-yard kickoff return to open the second half, Quarless made a 31-yard catch and run to the UM 12. Three plays later, Clark hit Graham Zug for a 25-10 lead.

The 91 receiving yards were a career-high for the John Mackey Award candidate.

The 6-5, 248-pound Quarless tied his career-high with five first half receptions at Illinois.

Quarless is third on the team with a career-best 29 receptions and third in receiving yardage with 386, averaging 13.3 yards per catch. He has started every game this season.

Last year, Quarless made 11 catches for 117 yards, with one touchdown.

His previous season high came as a freshman in 2006, when Quarless made 21 catches for 288 yards (13.7) and two touchdowns.

LINEBACKERS OVERCOME INJURIES

The talented and deep linebacker unit has been forced to work through injuries to four of "Linebacker U's" top six players since pre-season camp began.

The Nittany Lions' three most experienced linebackers - senior OLB Sean Lee, senior MLB Josh Hull and junior OLB Navorro Bowman - had only played together during the first two series of the season until the Michigan game. Lee started at Northwestern, his first start since the Temple game due to a sprained knee.

During the first week of pre-season practice, sophomore Michael Mauti tore the ACL in his right knee. Mauti played as a true freshman in 2008 and has a redshirt year available. He was expected to challenge for a starting assignment.

During the first quarter of the season opener with Akron, Bowman re-aggravated a pre-season injury and missed the rest of the contest, as well as the games against Syracuse and Temple. He returned to the starting line-up vs. Iowa and made a career-high 13 tackles.

In the second half of the Temple contest, Lee suffered a sprained left knee and has missed the Iowa, Illinois and Eastern Illinois games. He saw limited duty vs. Minnesota and more action in the win at Michigan. Junior Bani Gbadyu started vs. Iowa, Illinois and Eastern Illinois and made a career-high eight tackles vs. the Illini.

The week of the Iowa game, sophomore Nate Stupar turned his ankle, which limited his availability for the clash with the Hawkeyes. Stupar had moved into the line-up when Bowman was injured, recording a career-best 12 tackles against Akron. He earned his first career starts vs. Syracuse and Temple.

BOWMAN MAKES RECORD-SETTING 91-YARD FUMBLE RETURN

Junior outside linebacker Navorro Bowman has resumed his high impact play after missing most of the first three contests with an injury.

In the 35-10 win over Michigan, Bowman made a game-high 11 tackles for his second double figure tackle game in the five full games he had played this year at the time. He also had a sack, recovered a fumble in Penn State territory and grabbed his first interception of the season, returning it 13 yards into UM territory

In the win over Eastern Illinois, Bowman delivered a record-setting play along with his five stops, with 2.0 TFL and a pass break-up.

Late in the first half, with the Panthers at the PSU 8, DT Ollie Ogbu hustled to strip the ball from quarterback Jake Christensen. The ball bounced on the turf and was picked up by Bowman at the PSU 8, who hurdled one player and took off down the sideline, escorted by cornerback A.J. Wallace.

Bowman crossed the goal line with :05 left in the half to complete the 91-yard play, Penn State's longest fumble return since the NCAA began permitting fumble returns in 1990. The return was Penn State's first fumble recovery for a touchdown since Tony Davis had an 88-yard fumble return for a fourth quarter score in the 2007 Outback Bowl against Tennessee.

Bowman's return also was just Penn State's fourth defensive return of 90 yards or more all-time, with the previous three all interception returns:

- 98 yds, Wayne Berfield at Boston Univ., 1958
- 91 yds, Mark Robinson at Pitt, 1981
- 90 yds, Alan Zemaitis at Purdue, 2003

Bowman's fumble return is the third-longest in the nation this season, according to STATS:

- 99, Akeem Anifowoshe, Southern Utah vs. Texas State
- 92, Tray Hardaway, New Mexico vs. Tulsa
- 91, Navorro Bowman, Penn State, vs. Eastern Illinois
- 90, J.D. Cecil, Morehead State vs. Dayton

A 2008 first team All-Big Ten selection, Bowman played only the first two series in the season opener with Akron, leaving when he re-aggravated a pulled groin. He did not play against Syracuse and Temple.

HULL ECLIPSES 100 TACKLE MARK

Senior Josh Hull has solidified one the nation's top linebacker units with his play at the middle linebacker position this season.

With Navorro Bowman missing all but the first two series during the first three games and Sean Lee sidelined for three contests, Hull's strong play has been critical for a defense that has been among the nation's best all season.

Hull leads the team in tackles (103) and is fifth in tackles for a loss with 8.5 for minus-25 yards. A former walk-on from nearby Penns Valley High School, he also has two sacks, two interceptions and two pass break-ups. Hull is fourth in the Big Ten in tackles with a 9.4 average.

Hull made eight tackles vs. Indiana to become the 20th different Nittany Lion to record at least 100 hits in a season. He gave Penn State at least one player with 100 tackles for the eighth consecutive year.

Against Ohio State, Hull tied his career-high with 13 stop, including a TFL.

In the win over Michigan, Hull made 10 tackles, including 2.5 TFL for minus-10 yards, for his sixth double figure tackle game of the season. His hits included a seven-yard sack of Tate Forcier.

In the win over Eastern Illinois, Hull recorded a game-high 11 tackles for his fifth consecutive double figure tackle game. He led the Nittany Lions in hits four games (Temple-EIU).

In the 35-17 win at Illinois, Hull led Penn State in tackles for the third straight game, posting 11. He had one tackle for minus-2 yards, leading a unit that held the Illini out of the end zone until less than 9:00 was left in the game and the Lions were leading, 28-3.

Against Iowa, Hull tied his one-week old career-high by recording 13 tackles, including 2.0 TFL for minus-8 yards. He also made 13 tackles vs. Temple on Sept. 19 and had 11 stops vs. Syracuse the week before.

In the 31-6 win over Temple, Hull made a career-high 13 tackles, including 1.5 for a loss, to lead the defense.

In the 28-7 win over Syracuse, Hull tied his then-career best with 11 stops, grabbed his second career interception and added two pass break-ups.

Hull is one of the squad's top students, earning 2008 First Team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America® honors. He brought a 3.56 grade point average in environmental systems engineering into the fall semester and is on schedule to graduate in December.

Hull is a three-time Academic All-Big Ten honoree, earning a 3.92 GPA during the fall 2007 and 2008 semesters. He has earned Dean's List recognition in each of the last six semesters. Last spring, he was awarded the University's prestigious Eric A. Walker Award.

DEFENSIVE LINE TURNS UP PRESSURE

Despite losing its top three defensive ends from last season, the Penn State defensive line has not missed a beat in being a disruptive force.

Headlined by first team All-Big Ten tackle Jared Odrick, the line has helped the Nittany Lions attain the nation's No. 8 ranking in rushing defense, holding opponents to just 2.9 yards per attempt and 93.9 yards per game.

The Penn State defense has allowed five rushing touchdowns and 12 touchdowns overall in the initial 11 games, just four in the first half.

Penn State is seventh in the nation by averaging 8.3 tackles for loss per game (91 total) and has a Big Ten-leading 34 sacks, good for No. 9 in the nation.

An All-America candidate, Odrick has proven to be nearly unblockable, registering 39 tackles, including 10.0 for a loss, and a team-high 6.0 sacks (minus-45) despite frequent double teams. Odrick is among the Big Ten's top 10 in sacks.

Junior DT Ollie Ogbu also has been a productive force inside, registering 26 total tackles (7.0 TFL) and his first two career forced fumbles, with second being returned 91 yards by Navorro Bowman for a touchdown vs. Eastern Illinois.

Sophomore Jack Crawford, a first-year starter at defensive end, leads the Nittany Lions in tackles for loss with 13.5 (minus-65) and has 30 stops. Crawford, who made a career-high five hits vs. Iowa, is second in sacks (5.5). He is among the Big Ten's top 10 in sacks and minus-yardage plays.

Sophomore Eric Latimore has started five

games at defensive end and has 6.0 TFL (minus-22) and 3.5 sacks among his 19 hits. He made a career-best five stops, with 2.0 TFL, in the win at Illinois. Senior DE Jerome Hayes has started six games and has 4.5 TFL and one sack among his 18 stops.

AMONG NATIONAL LEADERS IN THIRD DOWN SUCCESS AND DENIAL

The Penn State offense has been highly effective in converting third downs and the Nittany Lion defense has been equally proficient in preventing them.

The Nittany Lion offense is first in the Big Ten and No. 4 in the nation in third down conversions at 50 percent, going 75 of 150. In the win over Indiana, Penn State was a superlative 8 of 12 on third down and vs. Minnesota, the Lions were 11 of 17 on third down.

On the defensive side, the Nittany Lions are allowing only a 33.3 percent success rate on third down plays, good for second in the conference and No. 16 in the nation. Michigan was just 3 of 15 on third down conversions and the Golden Gophers were 3 of 11.

AMONG NATION'S BEST IN PENALTIES

The Nittany Lions again are among the nation's least penalized teams.

The Lions lead the Big Ten and are No. 3 in the nation at 33.5 penalty yards per game.

Penn State also leads the Big Ten and is No. 3 in the nation in penalties per game with 48 for a 4.36 average per game.

Penn State had just two penalties for a season-low 10 yards vs. Indiana.

EIGHTEEN LIONS HAVE EARNED FIRST START IN '09

Eleven Nittany Lions earned their first career starts in the Akron game, five on offense, five on defense and one on special teams.

Offense: LG Matt Stankiewitch, RG Lou Eliades, RT DeOn'tae Pannell, WR Derek Moye and FB Joe Suhey;

Defense: LE Eric Latimore, RE Jack Crawford, LCB Knowledge Timmons, Hero Nick Sukay and RCB D'Anton Lynn;

Junior placekicker Collin Wagner also got the nod on all placements and kickoffs.

The total rose to 16 when WR Chaz Powell and LB Nate Stupar started the Syracuse game, G Johnnie Troutman started against Temple and WR Curtis Drake and T Nerraw McCormack started at Illinois.

Senior tackle Ako Poti earned his first career start vs. Eastern Illinois to become No. 17. Safety Cedric Jeffries started against Minnesota to become No. 18.

EIGHT FRESHMEN MAKE DEBUT

Six true freshmen made their Penn State debut in the Akron contest: WR Curtis Drake, Saf Gerald Hodges, QB Kevin Newsome, CB Stephon Morris, WR Devon Smith and DE Sean Stanley.

Wideout Justin Brown became the seventh true freshman to play when he saw action vs. Syracuse. Defensive tackle Jordan Hill became the eighth when he played in the Eastern Illinois game.

Hodges and Newsome enrolled at Penn State in January.

NINE GRADUATES ON ROSTER AMONG NATION'S TOP FIVE

Penn State boasts nine players on the 2009 roster that have already graduated, good for the fifth-highest total in the nation.

Alabama leads with 12 graduates, followed by Boston College and Virginia Tech with 10 and Penn State with nine. Six schools have eight graduates: Auburn, East Carolina, Miami (Fla.), Notre Dame, Texas Tech and UNLV.

The nine Nittany Lions that have graduated are either enrolled in a second undergraduate degree or are taking graduate level courses.

The following Nittany Lions have graduated: punter Jeremy Boone, quarterback Daryll Clark, tight end Brennan Coakley, defensive end Jerome Hayes, tackle Dennis Landolt, wide receiver Patrick Mauti, tackle Nerraw McCormack, kick snapper Andrew Pitz and tackle Ako Poti.

SEASON NO. 60 IN HAPPY VALLEY

Joe Paterno is in his 60th campaign as a member of the Penn State coaching staff. He came to Penn State with new head coach Rip Engle before graduating from Brown University in 1950.

After 16 seasons as an assistant coach under Engle, Paterno was named the Nittany Lions' 14th head football coach on February 19, 1966 and is entering his 44th season.

LEADER IN NCAA DIV. I-A CAREER WINS

Joe Paterno is the all-time wins leader among Football Bowl Subdivision college coaches, owning a career record of 392-129-3 (75.1) in his 44th season. Florida State coach Bobby Bowden is second with a 387-128-4 mark (74.9), also in his 44th season.

Penn State's thrilling 29-27 comeback win over Ohio State on Oct. 27, 2001 was Paterno's 324th career victory, moving him past Paul "Bear" Bryant for the lead in career victories among major college coaches. Paterno earned his 324th win in his 421st career game during his 36th season as head coach.

Bowden moved past Paterno for the lead among major college coaches on Oct. 25, 2003. Paterno moved into a tie on Aug. 30, 2008 and passed Bowden on Sept. 20, 2008 with the Nittany Lions' 45-3 win over Temple.

Paterno is in third place in wins among coaches from all NCAA divisions, trailing only John Gagliardi (471), the coach of Division III St. John's (Minn.) and former Grambling coach Eddie Robinson (408).

Paterno's 44 years as head coach are the most at one institution all-time among major college coaches.

NO. 2 IN WINNING PCT. AMONG ACTIVE COACHES

In addition to leading in victories, Joe Paterno ranks second in winning percentage (75.0) among active Football Bowl Subdivision (Division I-A) coaches with 10 or more years as an FBS head coach. Oklahoma's Bob Stoops leads with an 80.4 mark (115-28) in his 11th season, followed by Paterno (75.0, 392-129-3) and Bobby Bowden (74.9, 387-128-4).

ALL-TIME LEADER IN BOWL WINS AND APPEARANCES

Joe Paterno owns a post-season record of 23-11-1, a winning percentage of 67.14, including a 16-7 mark in New Year's bowl games. Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl wins and appearances (35) and his winning percentage is third-best all-time among coaches with at least 12 bowl appearances. He trails only Bobby Dodd (69.2, 9-4) and Bobby Bowden (67.18, 21-10-1).

PATERNO AMONG ELITE GROUP OF BIG TEN COACHES

Joe Paterno is one of just six coaches in Big Ten history to win at least 140 games at one institution.

Paterno has moved into fifth place with 145 wins, passing former Iowa coach Hayden Fry with the Oct. 31 win over Northwestern.

Paterno made his head coaching debut on Sept. 17, 1966, earning a 15-7 win over Maryland before a Beaver Stadium crowd of 40,911.

The Michigan State game will be the 678th contest Joe Paterno has coached in since joining the Nittany Lions' staff in 1950.

In his 60th season as a member of the Penn State staff, Paterno followed Rip Engle from Brown to Penn State after graduating in 1950 and was involved in 155 games as an assistant coach from 1950-65. He was promoted to head coach in 1966.

Paterno has missed just three games in his

career. As an assistant coach, he missed the 1955 game at Army when his father, Angelo, died. As head coach in 1977, Joe and Sue Paterno's son, David, was involved in a serious trampoline accident the day before the Lions' game at Syracuse and Paterno did not attend the contest. Paterno missed the Nov. 11, 2006 game with Temple, which took place five days after he had surgery on his left leg, which was injured in a sideline collision at Wisconsin on Nov. 4, 2006.

Paterno's first game on the Penn State staff was Sept. 30, 1950, a 34-14 win vs. Georgetown. The Nittany Lions have earned a 496-177-7 record with Paterno on the staff, with their 73.4 winning percentage third-best nationally since 1950.

Penn State coach Joe Paterno was featured in the Oct. 26 issue of Sports Illustrated.

A photo of Paterno was on the magazine's cover, along with a photo of LeBron James and Shaquille O'Neal for SI's NBA Preview.

Sports Illustrated Senior Writer Joe Posnanski takes an in-depth look at the life, family and career of Paterno in eight pages of the magazine. Posnanski's profile on the Hall of Fame coach is an elongated thank-you note to Joe's father, Angelo, who allowed Joe to forgo a career as a lawyer and follow his passion—for 60 years and counting.

The issue marks the second time Penn State Football was featured on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* in the past three months. Senior quarterback Daryll Clark and junior center Stefen Wisniewski were one of four regional covers for SI's College Football Preview issue in August.

Penn State made its 14th appearance on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* during Paterno's legendary career, which includes being pictured for his selection as SI's Sportsman of the Year in 1986.

PATERNOS PLEDGE \$1 MILLION TO MOUNT NITTANY MEDICAL CENTER

Joe and Sue Paterno announced a \$1 million pledge before more than 200 guests who gathered June 18, 2009 at Mount Nittany Medical Center to watch the final steel beam hoisted atop the medical center's new east wing. Their gift is part of the most ambitious fundraising effort in the Medical Center's history.

The Paternos' announcement came after they signed the steel beam, and before it was placed at the top of the multi-million dollar East Wing expansion during what the Medical Center dubbed its "sky breaking" ceremony.

As residents of State College for more than 50 years, Joe and Sue Paterno have been long-time supporters of the Medical Center. Most recently and in addition to serving as co-chairs for the campaign, Joe and Sue Paterno were also heavily involved in the employee giving campaign, matching donations made by employees.

"This gift demonstrates our continued pride in this community and gratitude for the profound expertise and care of our physicians, Jon Dranov and Wayne Sebastianelli," said Joe Paterno. "We see great things for this community and its future growth, and we are excited to be part of assuring continued excellence in our local healthcare, now and for generations to come."

A kickoff announced the "Commitment to Distinction" campaign's goal in June, 2008. Significant gifts had already been committed by generous members of the community in support of a vital facilities expansion aimed at improving the patient experience at the Medical Center.

The cornerstone of the expansion will be the three-floor, 42,000 square foot expansion of the existing east wing. Projected to open in 2010, the addition of two in-patient floors and one intensive care floor will offer single-patient rooms and increase intensive care capacity.

PATERNO INDUCTED INTO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Joe Paterno was inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in December 2007, becoming just the third active coach to gain induction. He was formally enshrined into the Hall of Fame in July 2008.

Paterno had been scheduled for induction into the Hall in 2006, but his induction was delayed for one year after sustaining serious leg injuries during the Penn State-Wisconsin game on Nov. 4, 2006

Paterno was the 21st member of the Penn State football family to gain induction into the Hall, joining four former coaches and 16 players, seven of whom he coached - John Cappelletti, Keith Dorney, Jack Ham, Ted Kwalick, Lydell Mitchell, Dennis Onkotz and Mike Reid. Former Nittany Lion coaches Dick Harlow (1915-17), Hugo Bezdek (1918-29), Bob Higgins (1930-48) and Rip Engle (1950-65) also are members of the Hall of Fame.

Running back Curt Warner (1979-82) will be inducted into the Hall of Fame in December.

CLARK A SEMIFINALIST FOR DAVEY O'BRIEN AWARD

For the second consecutive year, Daryll Clark is among the semifinalists for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award®.

Clark and Iowa's Rick Stanzi are the only only Big Ten signal-callers among the 15 semifinalists.

Penn State boasts two past recipients of the prestigious O'Brien Award - Todd Blackledge (1982) and Kerry Collins (1994). Before last season, Michael Robinson was Penn State's last semifinalist, being selected in 2005.

The Davey O'Brien National Selection Committee, an elite group of journalists, broadcasters, commentators and former winners, chose the semifinalists, with the fan vote accounting for five percent of the total vote. The committee is asked to evaluate each candidate on the criteria of his quarterback skills and athletic ability, academics, his reputation as a team player, character, leadership and sportsmanship.

Fans may now help determine which three quarterbacks will advance as finalists by voting as often as once daily at www.VoteOBrien.org. Fan voting will close at 1 p.m. ET on Nov. 22. The three finalists will be announced on Monday, Nov. 23. The fan vote accounts for five percent of each round of the voting process.

The 2009 Davey O'Brien Award winner will be announced on The Home Depot ESPNU College Football Awards Show airing Dec. 10 on ESPN and will be honored at the 33rd Annual Davey O'Brien Awards Dinner held at The Fort Worth Club on Feb. 15, 2010 in Fort Worth, Tex.

CLARK AMONG FINAL 10 CANDIDATES FOR UNITAS GOLDEN ARM AWARD

Daryll Clark is among the final 10 candidates for the 2009 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award.

Named after the player many refer to as the greatest quarterback ever to play the game, the prestigious Golden Arm Award is presented annually to the nation's top senior college quarterback by the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation, Inc. and its presenting sponsor, Transamerica.

Since it hosted its first game on Sept. 17, 1960, a 20-0 victory over Boston University, the Nittany Lion faithful have witnessed 241 wins and cheered on 81 first team All-Americans and teams that have captured two national championships, three Big Ten titles and won 25 bowl games since 1960.

Boasting a seating capacity of 107,282, Beaver Stadium is the largest stadium in the nation. Featuring a student section that numbers more than 21,000 strong, Beaver Stadium is home to "The Greatest Show in College Football" on Saturdays during the fall.

DEFENSIVE GAME-BY-GAME HIGHLIGHTS:

NORTHWESTERN: In Penn State's 34-13 win over Northwestern, the defense held NU to a

season low for points, less than half its season scoring average of 27.2 ppg, forced two turnovers and recorded a season-high six sacks (minus-31), with nine tackles for losses overall.

Northwestern's 13 first half points were the most given up by Penn State in a first half this season and the Wildcats scored just the second first half touchdown against the Lions. But, Penn State held the Wildcats scoreless in the second half, allowing just two yards on nine plays in the third quarter.

Senior linebacker Sean Lee made his first start since the Temple game and the Butkus Award candidate delivered a game-high 12 tackles (10 solo) to lead another outstanding defensive effort.

Junior linebacker Navorro Bowman made nine tackles and sophomore cornerback D'Anton Lynn had a career-high eight stops, including a tackle for loss. Sophomore safety Drew Astorino made six tackles and recovered a fourth quarter fumble and senior cornerback A.J. Wallace also had six hits.

Senior defensive tackle Jared Odrick was outstanding, recording a season-high five solo tackles, including a sack for minus-10-yards, and blocking a field goal in the second quarter that would have given the Wildcats the lead.

MICHIGAN: The Nittany Lion defense was superb in the 35-10 win in Ann Arbor. Penn State forced a season-high four turnovers, double its previous high this year.

Michigan entered the game leading the Big Ten in scoring at 37.3 ppg and was held to a season-low 10 points, 27 below its average. The Lions held Michigan to a season-low 250 yards, 176 yards below its season total average of 426.6 ypg. After Michigan's initial drive of 70 yards, Penn State held the Wolverines to 96 yards on their next 11 possessions.

Michigan entered the game leading the Big Ten in rushing at 235.0 ypg, but was limited to 110 yards on 40 carries (2.8 avg.). After gaining 36 yards on their first possession, the Wolverines were held to 74 rushing yards the rest of the game.

Junior linebacker Navorro Bowman made a game-high 11 tackles for his second double figure tackle game in the five full games he has played this year. He also had a sack, recovered a fumble in Penn State territory and grabbed his first interception of the season (second in career), returning it 13 yards into UM territory.

Senior linebacker Josh Hull made 10 tackles, including 2.5 TFL for minus-10 yards, for his sixth double figure tackle game of the season.

Penn State recorded 11 TFL, with five sacks vs. Michigan. Defensive end Jack Crawford had 3.0 TFL for minus-nine yards, with a sack, a forced a fumble that Bowman recovered in PSU territory. Defensive tackle Devon Still had a career-best 2.0 TFL, including a sack for minus-10 yards. Junior linebacker Bani Gbadyu made five stops and forced a fumble that safety Nick Sukay recovered.

MINNESOTA: Penn State's 20-0 win over Minnesota was its 40th shutout under Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno.

The shutout was the first by the Nittany Lions since winning at Temple, 31-0, in 2007. It was Penn State's first shutout in a Big Ten game since winning at Purdue, 12-0, in 2006, and was Penn State's first shutout in a Big Ten home game since defeating Northwestern, 49-0, on Homecoming in 2002.

Penn State allowed the Golden Gophers only seven first downs, tied for 10th lowest in the Paterno era. It was the fewest first downs allowed

by the Nittany Lions since Penn State gave up six to Indiana last season.

Minnesota was limited to 40 plays, the fewest by a Penn State opponent since at least the 1977 season.

The Golden Gophers' 18 rushing attempts were the second-lowest number of rushing attempts by an opponent against Penn State since Joe Paterno became coach in 1966. Only Michigan State's 15 rushing attempts in 2006 were fewer.

Penn State allowed just 101 passing yards to the Golden Gophers, the fewest passing yards allowed since giving up 57 to Indiana last season. The Lions limited the Big Ten's leading receiver, Eric Decker, to one reception for 42 yards. He entered the contest averaging 7.6 catches for 114.8 yards per game.

The 138 yards given up by Penn State was the lowest total offense by an opponent since Temple had 138 yards last season. The 138 yards were a season low for Minnesota.

The Nittany Lions recorded five tackles-for-loss, led by junior linebacker Navorro Bowman with 2.0 TFL for (minus-4) yards and senior defensive tackle Jared Odrick who had 1.5 TFL for (minus-12) yards, including a sack for (minus-11 yards). Bowman led the Lions with eight tackles and teamed with A.J. Wallace on a huge play in the fourth quarter. Senior linebacker Josh Hull made six stops and grabbed his second interception of the season. Odrick had four stops.

Wallace made four stops, including the initial hit on Kevin Whaley at the Penn State one-yard-line on fourth-and-goal in the final period to keep the shutout intact.

EASTERN ILLINOIS: The Nittany Lions recorded 11 tackles for loss, second-highest total of the season, and A.J. Wallace grabbed an interception, in addition to Navorro Bowman's 91-yard fumble return for a score. Penn State limited EIU to 59 rushing yards and 147 through the air for a total of 206. Eastern Illinois came into the game averaging 29.2 points and 371.6 yards per game.

Defensive tackle Jared Odrick led the charge with two sacks, tying his career-best (Iowa 2008). Odrick recorded a career-high 3.5 tackles-for-loss for (-17) yards. Linebacker Josh Hull made a game-high 11 tackles, the fifth straight game he has had at least 10 tackles, and the fourth straight game he has led the Nittany Lions in hits.

Linebacker Chris Colasanti made career-high six tackles and recorded the first sack of his career in the second quarter. Sophomore cornerback D'Anton Lynn had a career-high five tackles and Wallace made a career-high seven stops in addition to his third career interception.

Bowman made five stops, with 2.0 TFL for minus-four yards. Late in the first half, Ollie Ogbu stripped Panther quarterback Jake Christensen and Bowman picked up the pigskin and ran downfield with Wallace in the convoy. Bowman's return was Penn State's first fumble recovery for a touchdown since Tony Davis had an 88-yard fumble return for a fourth quarter score in the 2007 Outback Bowl against Tennessee.

Bowman's fumble recovery was Penn State's longest scoring fumble recovery since the NCAA began permitting fumble returns in 1990.

ILLINOIS: The Nittany Lion defense kept Illinois out of the end zone until less than nine minutes were left, with Penn State holding a 28-3 lead, en route to the 35-17 road win.

Penn State took command in the third quar-

ter, as the defense held the Illini to just eight yards and no first downs in the period, while the offense gained 208 yards, scored one touchdown and put itself into position to score another TD as the fourth quarter began to open up a 21-3 lead.

Penn State forced two turnovers, including a fumble hit by freshman DE Sean Stanley that was recovered by Jack Crawford at the Illinois 14 to set-up a touchdown.

Senior middle linebacker Josh Hull recorded double figure tackles for the fourth consecutive contest with 11, leading the Nittany Lions in hits for third third straight week. Linebacker Bani Gbadyu started for injured co-captain Sean Lee for the second straight week and made a career-high eight stops.

Defensive end Eric Latimore recorded a career-best five tackles, including a sack. Classmate Jack Crawford had four stops, including a sack for minus-15 yards, and recovered a fumble at the Illinois 14 to set-up Brent Carter's 11-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

On the final play of the first half, freshman CB Stephon Morris grabbed his first career interception at the Penn State 2 and returned it 70 yards before being tackled.

IOWA: Penn State limited the Hawkeyes to 298 total yards, with quarterback Ricky Stanzi going 11 of 26 for 135 yards, with two interceptions and no touchdowns. Iowa was 4 of 14 on third down conversions.

In his first full game this season, junior linebacker Navorro Bowman made a career-high 13 tackles, with 3.0 TFL for minus-7 yards.

Senior linebacker Josh Hull tied his career-high with 13 tackles, including 2.0 TFL for minus-8 yards, vs. the Hawkeyes.

Sophomore safety Nick Sukay recorded a career-high nine tackles vs. Iowa and grabbed his first career interception on a diving effort in the first quarter. He also had a career-best four pass break-ups.

TEMPLE: In the 31-6 win over Temple, the Lions allowed only two field goals and held the Owls to 46 rushing yards on 29 attempts (1.6). Penn State recorded 9.0 tackles for losses, with four sacks.

In addition to Sean Lee's 12 tackles, senior LB Josh Hull recorded a career-high 13 tackles, for his second consecutive double figure tackle game, and added 1.5 tackles for loss. Junior LB Bani Gbadyu posted a career-high six tackles and senior CB Knowledge Timmons had a career high four tackles and a big pass break-up in the end zone. Sophomore DE Jack Crawford had three stops, with 2.5 TFL and a sack.

SYRACUSE: In the 28-7 win over Syracuse, Penn State allowed just 65 rushing yards on 29 carries (2.2) and 135 passing yards, grabbing two interceptions. The Nittany Lions recorded six TFL, giving them 19 for the season. The Orange's lone score came after a Penn State fumble at its own 16-yard-line with less than 5:00 left in the game.

In addition to the efforts of senior LB Sean Lee (13 tkl, 3.0 TFL) against Syracuse, Josh Hull made 11 tackles and grabbed his second career interception. Sophomore safety Drew Astorino made six stops with a TFL and senior defensive tackle Jared Odrick made six tackles, with 0.5 TFL, and deflected a pass that was intercepted by sophomore linebacker Nate Stupar. He returned his first career pick 17 yards to the SU two to set-up a touchdown.

AKRON: The Penn State defense was dominant in its 2009 debut, limiting Akron to 186 total yards (158 passing, 30 rushing) for the game and not allowing the Zips a first down until the third quarter.

At the half, Akron had eight total yards on 22 plays, with 25 passing yards and minus-17 rushing yards. The Zips did not advance past their own 29-yard-line in the first half, with six punts and one interception.

The Nittany Lions recorded 13 tackles for loss for minus-41 yards on just 54 snaps, including four sacks, and sophomore safety Andrew Dailey grabbed his first career interception, returning it 12 yards to the Akron 26-yard-line in the first quarter.

Defensive tackles Ollie Ogbu and Jared Odrick had great efforts. Ogbu made a career-high six tackles, with a personal-best 2.5 TFL for minus-6 yards. Odrick had four stops, including 2.0 TFL for minus-7 yards and combining with DE Kevion Latham on a sack.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

Penn State has a 60-12 (83.3) record in non-conference games overall since starting Big Ten play in 1993, including victories against: Arizona, Auburn, Florida State, Louisville (2), Miami (Fla.), Maryland, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Oregon, Oregon State, Pittsburgh (3), South Florida, Southern California (3), Southern Miss (2), Syracuse (2), Tennessee (2), Texas, Texas A&M (2), Texas Tech, Virginia and UCF (2).

The Nittany Lions saw their 10-game non-conference winning streak end vs. USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

Penn State played Notre Dame in 2006 and '07 and renewed its rivalry with Syracuse last season and again this year. The Nittany Lions will face Alabama in 2010 and '11, Virginia in 2012 and '13 and Rutgers in 2014 and '15.

LIONS MAKE FOURTH APPEARANCE ON BIG TEN NETWORK THIS SEASON

The Nittany Lions' contest with Indiana was televised by the Big Ten Network, Penn State's fourth appearance on the network this year.

The Big Ten Network is airing 35-40 conference football games this season, with each school making at least two appearances.

Most Big Ten Network football games air at 12:00 p.m., with the remainder kicking off during the primetime window. ESPN/ABC have exclusive rights to air games during the 3:30 p.m. window.

The Big Ten Network will televise approximately 350 events in 2009-10, nearly all in HD, including 35-40 football games, 105 men's basketball games, 55 women's basketball games, Olympic sport events and conference championships.

Available to all cable and satellite providers nationwide and in Canada, the Big Ten Network has agreements with more than 250 affiliates, including: DirecTV, DISH Network, AT&T U-Verse, Verizon FiOS, Atlantic Broadband, Cablevision, CATV Service, Comcast, Time Warner, RCN, Service Electric Broadband Cable, Service Electric Cablevision, Service Electric, Inc., D&E Communications, Charter, Cox (Cleveland, Arizona, Arkansas, Kansas), Insight, Kuhn Communications, Mediacom, Nittany Media and Shaw Cable and Shaw Direct (Canada).

NITS AT NIGHT

The Nittany Lions played their lone regular season night game in 2009 against Iowa after playing three primetime contests last season. Penn State had won its last four night games.

Penn State played at least one regular season night game for the 10th consecutive season.

Penn State has a 35-21 overall record in night games, going 7-7 at home, 17-7 on the road, 1-1 at regular season neutral sites and 10-6 in bowl games.

The Lions' night games this decade are: Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007); Michigan (2006), Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005), Minnesota and Boston College (2004), Nebraska (2002 and '03), Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).

PAIR SUFFER SEASON-ENDING INJURIES

A pair of young players expected to be strong contributors for the defense will miss the 2009 season due to serious knee injuries.

During the Blue-White game, redshirt freshman Pete Massaro (Newtown Square) tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee. A defensive end, Massaro was among the top candidates at the position, which lost its top three players from last season. The former Marple Newtown HS standout took a redshirt season in 2008.

During the first week of pre-season practice, sophomore Michael Mauti (Mandeville, La.) tore the ACL in his right knee. Mauti will have surgery soon and rehabilitation will take approximately nine months. Mauti played as a true freshman in 2008 and has a redshirt year available. He was expected to challenge for a starting assignment at linebacker.

A U.S. Army All-American at Mandeville (La.) High School, Mauti was one of three true freshmen to play in every Penn State game last year. Playing defense and special teams, he made 26 tackles, with one minus-yardage stop and one forced fumble.

DEFENSE AMONG NATION'S ELITE

Over the past five seasons, entering the 2009 campaign, Penn State ranked No. 5 in the nation in total defense (293.7 ypg) and No. 5 in scoring defense (15.7 ppg).

During the 2004-08 seasons, the Nittany Lions have ranked in the Top 15 nationally each year in total and scoring defense, with four Top 10 finishes in rushing defense and a trio of Top 15 finishes in pass efficiency defense and sacks.

CLARK & LEE ELECTED CO-CAPTAINS

Quarterback Daryll Clark and linebacker Sean Lee, were elected co-captains of the 2009 Penn State football team in voting by their teammates last spring.

CLARK PARTICIPATES IN PRESTIGIOUS ELITE 11 QUARTERBACK CAMP

Penn State senior Daryll Clark (Youngstown, Ohio) spent several days in July among many of the

nation's finest high school and collegiate players at the prestigious Elite 11 Quarterback Camp.

Clark, the 2008 first team All-Big Ten quarterback, was one of seven collegiate/professional counselors at the camp, which was being held at Soka University in Aliso Viejo, Calif.

Joining Clark as counselors at the Elite 11 Quarterback Camp were: Chase Daniel (Missouri/Washington Redskins), Cody Hawkins (Colorado), Colt McCoy (Texas), Zac Robinson (Oklahoma State), Mark Sanchez (USC/New York Jets) and Juice Williams (Illinois).

**FORMER LION STANDOUT
BRADY JOINS BIG TEN NETWORK**

Former Penn State All-American Kyle Brady has joined the Big Ten Network as an analyst. Brady teams with Rick Pizzo on the set for Big Ten Football Saturday: Pre-Game Show, which airs at 10:30 a.m. ET every Saturday.

The program airs live from one of the Big Ten institutions hosting a game that day. The program originated from Penn State twice this season.

A native of Camp Hill, Pa., Brady earned first team All-America honors as a senior in 1994 as a critical member of one of the most prolific offenses in college football history. The former Cedar Cliff High School standout made 27 receptions for 365 yards and two touchdowns during his senior season to help the Nittany Lions become the first Big Ten team to earn a 12-0 record, capped by a Rose Bowl win over Oregon.

The first team All-Big Ten tight end in 1993 and 1994, Brady helped Penn State lead the nation in total offense (520.2 ypg) and scoring offense (47.8 ppg), which is the ninth highest scoring average in NCAA Division I-A history. Penn State's 48.1 scoring average in Big Ten games remains a conference record.

Selected by the New York Jets with the ninth overall pick of the 1995 NFL Draft, Brady played four seasons in New York and eight years in Jacksonville (1999-2006) before joining the New England Patriots in 2007. In 207 career regular season games, he had 343 receptions for 3,519 yards (10.3) and 25 touchdown catches. He retired after the Patriots' appearance in Super Bowl XLII.

Another former Nittany Lion gridiron standout, All-America wide receiver Kenny Jackson, is a sideline reporter for the Big Ten Network. He was a member of the announce team that called last week's Penn State-Akron telecast.

The Big Ten Network is televising at least four Penn State football games this season.

During the Akron game, Warner was recognized by Penn State and the National Football Foundation, who was represented by Matthew Sign, the NFF's Chief Operating Officer.

Warner will be inducted with other members of the Class of 2009 at the National Football Foundation's 52nd annual awards dinner on December 8 at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City.

"I am deeply honored to have been elected to the College Football Hall of Fame," said Warner, who lives in Camas, Wash., near Portland, Ore. "I am honored and privileged to join such a distinguished group of players and coaches."

Hailing from the small town of Pineville, W. Va., Warner was a standout at Pineville High School, graduating in a class of 90 students. He went on to lead the Nittany Lions in rushing in 1980, '81 and '82, helping Penn State capture its first National Championship in 1982. Warner was instrumental in Penn State's 31-5 record during his final three seasons, which included two Fiesta Bowl wins (Ohio State and USC) and a 27-23 win over Georgia in the 1983 Sugar Bowl for the National Championship.

When Warner's brilliant career ended, he owned 42 school records. His 3,398 career rushing yards and 18 100-yard rushing games remain Penn State records more than 25 years later. The Nittany Lions were 18-0 when he eclipsed the century mark. Warner is the only Penn State running back to be selected a two-time first team All-American and is one of just 14 Nittany Lions all-time to earn first team All-America honors twice.

"Curt Warner was an outstanding running back," said head coach Joe Paterno, who was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2007. "In all my years at Penn State, we have had a lot of exceptional backs, and he is one of the very best of that distinguished group. Curt was a leader for the great teams we had in the early 1980's and played a big part in helping us win our first national championship. Curt was a very good student, has been very loyal to Penn State and has made a positive impact on his community in Washington.

"Curt is most deserving of induction into the College Football Hall of Fame, and we are very pleased that he will be joining its prestigious membership," Paterno added.

In addition to his Penn State career rushing and 100-yard rushing game records, Warner also holds the school record for all-purpose yards in a game,

with 341 at Syracuse in 1981. He ran for a career-best 256 yards vs. the Orange that day. His 280 all-purpose yards vs. Rutgers in 1979 remain a school freshman record. The only Nittany Lion to post more than 1,000 all-purpose yards in all four of his years, Warner is No. 2 in Penn State career all-purpose yards (4,982) and career rushing attempts (649).

Warner earned his Penn State degree in speech communications in 1983.

SEVENTH ANNUAL LIFT FOR LIFE PUSH-ES CONTRIBUTIONS TO NEAR \$400,000 FOR KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

Penn State Football Uplifting Athletes' Seventh Annual Penn State Lift For Life® was a tremendous success, raising the cumulative total in contributions for the Kidney Cancer Association to close to \$400,000.

A record \$81,000 has been raised by Uplifting Athletes, Inc. in 2008-09, whose fiscal year ends in September. The total includes contributions from the Lift For Life® event.

A record-tying total of 96 Nittany Lion football student-athletes tested their strength and endurance on July 10 in an 11-event strength and conditioning challenge in front of several thousand fans, friends and family, who enjoyed the new fan-friendly Lift For Life® layout in Holuba Hall.

The Lift For Life® event is a strength and conditioning challenge that tests the mental and physical endurance of the student-athlete. Athletes are put through a challenging gauntlet of 11 exercises ranging from the traditional bench and leg presses to the less conventional giant tire flip and iron cross.

With the contributions from Lift For Life®, nearly \$400,000 has been raised since 2003 by members of the Penn State football team to aid in the fight against the disease. More than 30,000 Americans are afflicted with kidney cancer each year.

Twenty-four four-person teams competed in 11 events designed to test mental and physical toughness. The exercises for the competitors ranged from the bench press to carrying 100-lb. plates to the giant tire flip.

The winning Lift For Life® team was comprised of linebackers Navorro Bowman (District Heights, Md.), Josh Hull (Millheim) and Sean Lee (Pittsburgh) and tight end Mickey Shuler (Enola). Hull and Shuler were members of the winning unit for the second consecutive year.

Second place was secured by the team of tight end Brennan Coakley (Newtown, Conn.), defensive end Jack Crawford (Longport, N.J.), defensive tackle Jared Odrick (Lebanon) and tight end Andrew Quarless (Uniondale, NY).

The Nittany Lion football team organized all aspects of the event, with Brett Brackett, Jesse Alfreno and Patrick Mauti (Mandeville, La.) primarily heading the effort, along with Coakley, Ryan Gmerek, Mike Farrell, Ty Howle, Stephen Joseph, Shelton McCullough and Matt Stankiewitch, former Nittany Lion and event co-founder Scott Shirley and Deloris Brobeck. The organization's mission is to raise awareness and funds for rare diseases such as kidney cancer as well as to provide a professional enrichment program for the college football student-athlete.

CLARK EARNS FOURTH CAREER BIG TEN OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF WEEK ACCOLADE

Daryll Clark became the first player this season to earn Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors more than once when he was honored on October 26. The conference honor was the fourth career honor for Clark.

The senior quarterback directed the Nittany Lions to a 35-10 thumping of Michigan in Ann Arbor. Penn State won its second straight over the Wolverines in convincing fashion.

Clark was 16 of 27 for 230 yards, with a career-high tying four touchdown passes and no interceptions in the win over Michigan. He threw touchdown passes of 10, 11 and 17 yards to wideout Graham Zug and a beautiful 60-yard scoring strike to tight end Andrew Quarless.

Clark also threw four touchdown passes vs. Michigan State last year.

Clark led Penn State to 396 yards, 34:38 in time of possession and its most points at Michigan Stadium. He became the Nittany Lions' career leader with 55 touchdowns responsible for, surpassing the previous mark of 52 by Zack Mills.

After Michigan scored on the opening possession of the game, Clark and the offense immediately responded, scoring in four plays to tie the game at 7-7 on a 10-yard pass from Clark to Zug. Clark directed Penn State to a 35-3 advantage after the Wolverines' first drive.

NITTANY LIONS DELIVER 40TH SHUTOUT UNDER PATERNO

Penn State's 20-0 win over Minnesota was its 40th shutout under Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno.

The shutout was the first by the Nittany Lions since winning at Temple, 31-0, in 2007. It was Penn State's first shutout in a Big Ten game since winning at Purdue, 12-0, in 2006, and was Penn State's first shutout in a Big Ten home game since defeating Northwestern, 49-0, on Homecoming in 2002.

Penn State allowed the Golden Gophers only

seven first downs, tied for 10th lowest in the Paterno era. It was the fewest first downs allowed by the Nittany Lions since Penn State gave up six to Indiana last season.

Minnesota was limited to 40 plays, the fewest by a Penn State opponent since at least the 1977 season.

MILLEN RETURNS TO PENN STATE AS ABC ANALYST

Former Penn State All-American Matt Millen is in his first season as an ESPN/ABC football analyst and will return to his alma mater for the clashes with Minnesota and Ohio State.

From Whitehall High School in the Lehigh Valley, Millen was a standout defensive tackle for the Nittany Lions from 1976-79, helping PSU to back-to-back 11-1 seasons in 1977 and '78. He was selected a first team All-American as a junior in 1978 by Walter Camp Football Foundation and United Press International. He made 54 tackles, with nine sacks, forced two fumbles and blocked a punt.

Millen was instrumental helping No. 1 Penn State earn an 11-0 regular season and a berth in the 1979 Sugar Bowl vs. Alabama in an epic national championship game, won by the No. 2 Crimson Tide, 14-7.

Millen missed much of his senior season with an injury, but was selected by the Oakland Raiders in the second round of the 1980 NFL Draft. He then embarked on a superb NFL career that saw him earn four Super Bowl rings during his years with Oakland/Los Angeles (1980-88), San Francisco (1989-90) and Washington (1991). He earned All-Pro honors and helped all three teams to at least one Super Bowl crown.

Millen was a highly-acclaimed NFL analyst with CBS and then Fox from 1992-2001 before becoming President and CEO of the Detroit Lions for seven years.

ODRICK RECORDS CAREER-BEST 3.5 TFL TO SET PACE IN WIN OVER PANTHERS

All-America candidate Jared Odrick has proven to be nearly unblockable from his defensive tackle position, being a disruptive force despite frequent double teams.

In the 52-3 win over Eastern Illinois, Odrick had one of the top games of his career, recording a personal best 3.5 tackles for loss to lead the Penn State defense.

A 2008 first team All-Big Ten selection, Odrick had two sacks vs. the Panthers, tying his career-best (Iowa 2008). He recorded a career-high 3.5 tackles-for-loss for (-17) yards.

PANTHERS BECOME 83RD DIFFERENT FOE FOR PATERNO

Penn State and Eastern Illinois met for the first time. Eastern Illinois was the 154th different opponent to face the Nittany Lions in the program's 123rd season. The Panthers were the 83rd different foe Joe Paterno has faced as head coach.

GREEN AND ROYSER FIRST RB DUO TO CRACK 100 YARDS IN BIG TEN PLAY

Stephfon Green and Evan Royster became the first tandem of Penn State running backs to eclipse 100 rushing yards in a Big Ten game with their standout efforts in the win at Illinois.

Green posted his second career 100-yard rush-

ing game, gaining 120 yards on a career-high 13 carries (9.2 avg.). His 52-yard touchdown burst in the second quarter was Penn State's longest running play in 14 games, since Green bolted 69 yards for a score vs. Temple last season.

Royster gained 105 yards on 17 carries (6.2 avg.) and swept around the right side for a 15-yard score early in the fourth quarter. Royster posted his second 100-yard rushing game of the season.

Royster and Green became the first pair of Nittany Lions to rush for 100 yards in the same game since TB Tony Hunt (151) and QB Michael Robinson (125) did so vs. Wisconsin in 2005. The only other time Penn State had two runners with 100 yards in a Big Ten game was when Hunt and Robinson did so against Minnesota in 2005.

The last time two Nittany Lion running backs had gained 100 yards in the same game had been Tony Hunt (137) and Austin Scott (116) vs. Akron in 2004.

COLLEGE GAMEDAY ORIGINATES FROM PENN STATE

ESPN's popular College GameDay Built by the Home Depot program, with host Chris Fowler and analysts Lee Corso, Kirk Herbstreit and Desmond Howard, originated from Penn State on Saturday, Sept. 26, as the Nittany Lions hosted Iowa in a Big Ten showdown to open the conference slate.

This year marks the 16th consecutive season College GameDay Built by the Home Depot is originating from the site of the day's best game. College GameDay airs every Saturday at 10:00 a.m. during the football season. Fowler, Corso and Herbstreit are in their 14th season together on College GameDay.

The Sept. 26 broadcast marked the third time College GameDay has originated from Penn State in the past five seasons and the fifth time overall. College GameDay was in Happy Valley for the 2005 and 2007 Ohio State contests, as well as the 1999 Pigskin Classic against Arizona and the 1997 game against Michigan.

In addition, College GameDay has originated from Penn State's games at Michigan State (2005) and Ohio State (2008) during the past five seasons, with the Nittany Lions winning the Big Ten Championship and a BCS berth both years.

FIRST PLAY SCORING STRIKE JOLTS WHITEHOUSE CROWD

On Penn State's first play from scrimmage vs. Iowa, senior quarterback Daryll Clark faked a handoff to Evan Royster and then launched a perfect strike to WR Chaz Powell, who caught the ball near the Iowa 35 and zipped into the end zone to send the Whitehouse crowd of 109,316 into pandemonium.

The 79-yard scoring strike was tied for the eighth-longest pass play in Penn State history and was the career-long completion and reception for Clark and Powell, respectively.

Combined with Stephfon Green's 80-yard TD catch vs. Michigan last season, two of Penn State's 10 longest pass plays all-time have occurred the past two years.

WHITEHOUSE RETURNS

For just the third time in the 50-year history of Beaver Stadium, all Nittany Lion fans were asked to wear white to the Iowa game to turn the nation's largest facility into the Whitehouse.

The first two all-stadium Whitehouse games, vs.

Notre Dame in 2007 and Illinois in 2008, were a tremendous success, as all but a few thousand opposing fans dressed in white for the contests.

The large and loud Penn State student section has delivered on several Beaver Stadium white outs over the past six seasons, earning notice across the nation for their enthusiasm and solidarity.

THIRD MEETING BETWEEN PATERNO AND FORMER PLAYER

The Temple game marked just the third time that Joe Paterno has coached against one of his former players as a head coach.

The first came on Nov. 10, 2007, when Penn State played AI Golden-led Temple in Philadelphia. The second was last year when the Owls visited Happy Valley.

In the 2006 visit by the Owls to Beaver Stadium, Paterno did not attend the game, as he was recovering from leg surgery as a result of injuries sustained the week before during the Wisconsin game.

The 2006 Temple game was just the third game Paterno has missed during his 60 years as a member of the Penn State coaching staff.

Paterno coached against one of his former assistant coaches, Ron Dickerson, from 1994-97 when he was head coach of the Owls. Paterno also coached against Dick Anderson when he was head coach at Rutgers from 1984-89.

RECORD-SETTING CLARK EARNS THIRD CAREER BIG TEN HONOR

One of the primary catalysts in Penn State's 31-7 victory over Akron in the season opener was honored by the Big Ten Conference.

Senior quarterback Daryll Clark set career highs with a record-breaking 29 of 40 performance for a career-best 353 yards to earn Big Ten Co-Offensive Player of the Week. He tossed three first half touchdown passes.

Clark demonstrated instant chemistry with his new starting receivers, and the entire unit, and played with confidence behind an offensive line with three new starters, delivering a standout, record-breaking performance. The team co-captain guided the Penn State offense to five first half scoring drives. His 29 completions were tied for No. 2 program history (Zack Mills vs. Purdue, 2004) and his passing yardage was fifth-highest in Penn State annals.

In leading the Nittany Lions to a 31-0 halftime lead, Clark was 17-of-25 for 254 yards, breaking the school record for first half passing. The previous mark was 231 yards by Anthony Morelli vs. Florida International in 2007. Clark's 358 yards of total offense also were a career high and were the most by a Nittany Lion since Michael Robinson posted 363 yards (258 pass, 125 rush) against Wisconsin in 2005.

Clark owns the fifth (353) and seventh (341 yards vs. Michigan State, 2008) highest single game passing days in Penn State history and is the only quarterback with two marks in the top seven. He joins Kerry Collins (three) as the only quarterbacks with more than one mark in the top 10 all-time passing yardage games at Penn State.

WIDEOUTS EXCEL IN MOST EXTENSIVE CAREER ACTION

Any questions as to how the Penn State receiv-

ing corps would perform after losing three of its most prolific pass catchers in program history to graduation were quickly answered versus Akron.

In his first career start, sophomore Derek Moyer (Rochester) showed great potential, setting career highs with six receptions for 138 yards and one touchdown. Moyer made four catches of 20 yards or more, including a leaping 42-yard effort to get the Lions deep into Akron territory and set-up a Clark touchdown pass to Graham Zug (Manheim) with :30 left in the half for a 31-0 lead.

Sophomore Chaz Powell (New Freedom) also set career-highs with seven catches for 65 yards, including an eight-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter. Zug hauled in a career best five passes for 62 yards, including a nice 19-yard touchdown grab late in the first half.

STUPAR HAS TOP CAREER GAME

Sophomore Nate Stupar (State College) stepped in to replace All-Big Ten linebacker Navorro Bowman (District Heights, Md.) when he left the Akron game in the first quarter with a minor injury and Stupar made the most of his opportunity.

The State College Area High School graduate was all over the field, collecting a team high and career best 12 tackles, including eight solos, and a sack vs. the Zips.

On Akron's first possession of the third quarter, Stupar stuffed Zips' quarterback Chris Jacquemain on fourth-and-goal from the two to keep the score at 31-0.

Stupar earned starts vs. Syracuse and Temple before Bowman returned to the line-up vs. Iowa.

Stupar is one of the squad's top students, owning a 3.57 grade point average in media studies entering the fall semester.

FOREMAN FOUNDATION MAKES CONTRIBUTION IN HONOR OF BRUNO

During the Penn State-Akron contest, a check for \$35,000 was presented to the Hershey Medical Center by the Foreman Foundation, a charitable organization whose mission is to help find a cure for melanoma.

The Foundation was founded by Phillip G. Foreman, a classmate of former Nittany Lion punter John Bruno, Jr., who died of the malignant form of skin cancer in April, 1992. Since its inception in 1996, the Foreman Foundation has raised more than \$970,000 to support melanoma research at Penn State's College of Medicine at the Milton S. Hershey Medical Center.

Bruno was a standout for the Lions from 1984-86, ranking No. 5 in school career punting average with a 41.7 mark, along with Jeremy Kapinos. Bruno also owns the school's fourth-best season punting average (42.9 in 1985). His 79 punts and 3,273 punting yards in 1984 remain school season records.

BRIEFLY SPEAKING...

Penn State is in its 123rd season of intercollegiate football and owns a 809-351-42 record, tied for sixth nationally in all-time victories.

Lions Halt Hoosiers, 31-20

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Nov. 14 -- Penn State overcame a 10-0 first quarter deficit to beat Indiana, 31-20, on Senior Day, improving to 9-2. Twenty Nittany Lion seniors were introduced during a pre-game ceremony as Beaver Stadium hosted its final game of the season.

It was a pair of juniors, though, that helped spark the Nittany Lions to their 19th Senior Day win in the last 20 tries and boosted their series advantage to 13-0 over Indiana.

Linebacker Navorro Bowman grabbed his second interception of the season and returned it 73 yards for his second defensive touchdown to break a 10-10 third quarter tie. He recorded a team-high 12 tackles, with 2.0 TFL, a sack and a pass break-up to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in his career.

The Nittany Lions limited the Hoosiers to 48 rushing yards on 24 attempts, as Penn State held its sixth opponent of the season to 65 or fewer yards on the ground. The Lions extended their streak of not allowing a 100-yard rusher to the 14 games.

Evan Royster accumulated 134 all-purpose yards and scored twice. He gained 95 yards on 17 carries (5.6), moving within 10 yards of becoming the seventh Lion all-time with multiple 1,000-yard seasons.

The Nittany Lions improved to 11-1 in their next game after a loss since the start of the 2005 season, 12-1 if including the 2009 season opening win over Akron. Penn State posted its 29th season with at least nine wins since Joe Paterno became head coach in 1966.

Penn State tied a season low with two penalties for a season low 10 yards.

Bowman's 73-yard interception return for a touchdown was the first for Penn State since Nolan McCready returned a pick 76 yards at Illinois in 2005. It was Bowman's third career interception. He became the first Penn State defensive player to have two scores in a season for the Nittany Lions since Tony Davis had two fumble returns for touchdowns in 2006.

Senior linebacker Josh Hull made eight tackles, giving him 103 for the season to become the 20th different Nittany Lion player all-time to record at least 100 tackles in a season. Penn State has had at least one player with 100 tackles for eight consecutive seasons.

Senior linebacker Sean Lee made 10 tackles, giving him five games this season with at least 10 tackles. He also had a career-high four pass breakups. Lee has 312 career tackles, good for fifth place at Penn State. Sophomore safety Drew Astorino made a career-high 10 tackles.

Penn State got on the scoreboard on 33-yard field goal by Collin Wagner with 2:52 left in the second quarter to cut the lead to 10-3.

The Hoosiers missed a 47-yard field goal with less than a minute left in the half and Penn State quickly got moving to tie the game. An 18-yard pass from Clark to Brett Brackett was followed by a 26-yard reverse by Curtis Drake. Indiana was penalized for face mask penalty on the play, moving the ball to the IU 13. On second down, Clark hit Royster and he ran it for the touchdown with :06 left in the half. Wagner's PAT tied the game at 10-10, as the Lions marched 70 yards in just :45.

The Nittany Lions had an opportunity to take the lead on their first possession of the second half, but Wagner's 34-yard field goal attempt hit the upright.

Indiana moved into Penn State territory, but the Nittany Lion defense made the momentum-changing play. A Ben Chappell pass was tipped and Navorro Bowman grabbed his second interception of the season, cut up the middle and down the far sideline for a 73-yard touchdown to ignite the crowd of 107,379. Wagner's PAT made it 17-10 with 6:54 left in the third quarter.

The defense forced another punt and the Lions were on the move again from their own 27. Clark threw completions of 10 yards to Andrew Quarless and Joe Suhey to get the ball into IU territory. A nine-yard run by Stephfon Green and an eight-yard effort by Royster helped give Penn State a first-and-goal. On the first play of the fourth quarter, Royster ran it in from two yards to make it 24-10.

Indiana's Nick Freeland connected from 38 yards out to cut the Lions' lead to 24-13 with 10:43 to play. But, Clark and Royster led Penn State downfield for another score. Royster ran three times for 20 yards to get the drive started. Clark then connected with Curtis Drake (28 yards), Derek Moyer (13 yards) and Suhey (9 yards) to get the Lions to the IU 5. On second-and-goal, Clark scored on a one-yard run for his 22nd career rushing touchdown, making it 31-13 with 4:08 to go.

Penn State is 49-13 since the start of the 2005 season, winning 51 of its last 64 contests overall.

PLAYER BIO UPDATES

28 - Drew Astorino, Saf

Astorino recorded three tackles (2 solos) in the season opening win against Akron. The junior safety finished third on the team in tackles, registering six (4 solos), including one for a loss of three yards, in the 28-7 win over Syracuse. In the 31-6 victory against Temple, Astorino led all defensive backs with five stops. He also recovered a fumble of TU quarterback Chester Stewart in the third quarter, which resulted in a field goal and a 24-6 PSU lead. Astorino made five tackles (2 solos) against Iowa and tipped a pass that was intercepted by A.J. Wallace. In the 35-17 win at Illinois, Astorino tied his season-high by making six tackles (3 solos). Astorino registered six tackles (2 solos) and one pass break-up in the 52-3 win over Eastern Illinois. In the shutout of Minnesota, Astorino recorded one pass break-up in helping limit Eric Decker, the Big Ten's leading receiver, to just one catch. He also returned a punt for 10 yards. In the dominating 35-10 win over Michigan, Astorino finished first among all defensive backs with four tackles (3 solo). He also grabbed his first interception of the season and third of his career, picking off Tate Forcier late in the game and returning it 30 yards. Astorino made a season-high five solo tackles (6 total) in the 34-13 win over Northwestern. He also recorded his second fumble recovery of the year, falling on a loose ball caused by a Kevion Latham sack of Dan Persa in the fourth quarter. Against Ohio State, Astorino led all defensive backs and re-tied his season high with six tackles, including five solo. In the 31-20 victory over Indiana, he led all defensive backs by making a career-high 10 tackles (5 solos).

41 - Jeremy Boone, P

Selected Academic All-District for second consecutive year. The Ray Guy Award candidate ranks second in the Big Ten with a 43.5 average this season. In the season opener against Akron, Boone punted twice for 86 yards (43.0 avg.). His 39-yarder in the first quarter pinned the Zips deep in their own territory forcing them to start from the two-yard line. Versus Syracuse, Boone punted three times, averaging 50 yards per kick, with a long of 55. Kicking four times in the 31-6 win over Temple, Boone averaged 47.8 yards per punt and placed two inside the 20-yard line. Against Iowa, Boone punted twice, with a long of 57 yards, but suffered the first blocked kick of his career after 109 punts, which was returned 53 yards for a touchdown. Against Illinois, Boone averaged nearly 50 yards per punt and pinned Illinois inside the five-yard line on two kicks to help Penn State win the field position battle. He totaled 198 yards on four punts, an average of 49.5 yards per attempt, including a long of 66 yards. The 66-yard boot was the third-longest kick of Boone's career and was downed at the Illinois three-yard line to help change the field position in the

first quarter. For his performance, he was honored as Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week for the first time in his career.

With the offense firing on all cylinders in the 52-3 romp over Eastern Illinois, Boone punted just once for 37 yards. In the 20-0 blanking of Minnesota, Boone punted only twice, averaging 34.0 per kick. Versus Michigan, Boone punted six times for 215 yards, a 35.8 average, with a long of 44. Four of his six punts were placed inside the 20-yard line but he also suffered his second block of the season and his career. In the road victory against Northwestern, Boone battled gusty winds to punt five times for 210 yards, for a 42.0 average. Versus Ohio State, Boone had a career-high 10 punts, Penn State's most since kicking 11 times in the 2006 FedEx Orange Bowl, totaling 458 yards (45.8 avg.) with a long of 56. Boone punted just twice versus Indiana, averaging 44.5 yards per kick, with a long of 53 yards. His final punt in Beaver Stadium was a pooch punt that was downed on the IU one-yard-line. He is second in the Big Ten and No. 11 in the nation with a 44.1 avg and is one pace to break the Penn State season and career punting average records.

11 - Navarro Bowman, LB

Named a semifinalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award. Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week on Nov. 16. Bowman was set to begin building off his 2008 first team All-Big Ten season in the season opener versus Akron but re-aggravated a groin injury that forced him from the field in the first quarter. He missed the Syracuse and Temple games with the injury. Bowman returned to the line-up against Iowa, tying for the team lead in tackles with a career-high 13, including three for a loss of seven yards. Versus Illinois, Bowman highlighted a strong defensive effort, recording seven tackles (4 solos), one of which went for a loss of eight yards. In the 52-3 thumping of Eastern Illinois, Bowman punctuated a dominating first half performance by scooping up a fumble from EIU quarterback Jake Christensen and rumbling 91 yards for a touchdown. Penn State's longest play since the NCAA began to allow fumble returns in 1990, gave it a commanding 38-0 halftime lead. Bowman also made five tackles, including two for a loss of five yards, and one pass break up. The following week versus Minnesota, Bowman was once again front and center for the defensive play of the game. On 4th-and-1 from the one-yard line in the fourth quarter, Bowman teamed with A.J. Wallace to stop Gopher running back Kevin Whaley short of the goal line and preserve the shutout. He made a team-high eight tackles (4 solos), including two for a loss of four yards. Bowman fronted a defense that held the potent Michigan offense in check in Penn State's 35-10 romp over the Wolverines, making a game-high 11 tackles for his second double figure tackle game in

the five full games he had played this year. He also had a sack, recovered a fumble in Penn State territory and grabbed his first interception of the season (second in career), returning it 13 yards into UM territory. In the 34-13 victory over Northwestern, Bowman finished second on the team with nine tackles (five solo), helping PSU hold the Wildcats well below their season average of 27.2 ppg. He has moved into the top 10 in tackles in the Big Ten. Bowman recorded nine tackles (5 solos), including one stop for a loss of two yards vs. Ohio State. Bowman notched his third double figure tackle game of the season and eighth of his career in the 31-20 win over Indiana, recording a team-high 12 stops. He made the play of the game in the third quarter when he intercepted Hoosier quarterback Ben Chappell and returned it 73 yards for a touchdown, breaking a 10-10 deadlock. Bowman became the first PSU defensive player to have two scores in a season since cornerback Tony Davis had two fumble returns for touchdowns in 2006. Earned second career Big Ten Player of the Week accolade.

17 - Daryll Clark, QB

Selected a semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award for the second consecutive season. Named one of the final 10 candidates for the 2009 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, presented to the nation's top senior quarterback. With 18 touchdown passes this season, Clark leads the Big Ten and is in a tie for 10th nationally. Clark picked up right where he left off from his first team All-Big Ten season of a year ago in the season opener against Akron, throwing for a career-high 353 yards, including a school record 254 in the first half, and three touchdowns. He also set personal bests for completions (29), attempts (40), and total yards (358) in the 31-7 victory to earn Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week for the third time in his career. Clark threw three touchdown passes for the third time in his career in PSU's 28-7 win over Syracuse. He threw for 240 yards, completing 20 of 31 attempts. Clark led Penn State to its third straight victory, a 31-6 win over Temple, passing for 167 yards and two touchdowns. In the Big Ten opener versus Iowa, Clark electrified the Whitehouse crowd at a packed Beaver Stadium, connecting with Chaz Powell on a career-long touchdown pass of 79 yards on the Lions' first play from scrimmage. Clark would finish the day with 198 yards passing. Clark was an efficient 17 of 25 for 175 yards in leading Penn State to a dominating 35-17 win at Illinois. Clark made his presence felt in the ground game as well, rushing for a career-best 83 yards, including a career-long 51 yard scamper in the third quarter. He also equaled a career high with two rushing TDs when he plunged in from a yard out to start the fourth quarter. Clark's assault on the PSU record book continued in the 52-3 throttling of Eastern Illinois. He threw for 234 yards (13 of 19).

His three touchdown passes (of 2, 51, and 25 yards) gave him 31 for his career. Clark highlighted an impressive offensive effort in Penn State's 20-0 victory over Minnesota by throwing for 287 yards, the third-highest total of his career and one touchdown, a 12-yard second quarter scoring strike to Derek Moyer. Clark was 21 of 32, with no interceptions. He also ran for a score. Clark was superb in the 35-10 win at Michigan, directing an offense that racked up 396 total yards and posted its most points ever at Michigan Stadium. He tied a career record by throwing for four touchdowns, finishing 16 of 27 for 230 yards to earn his fourth career Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week award. Clark also became the Nittany Lions' career leader with 55 total touchdowns, surpassing the previous mark of 52 by Zack Mills. In the 34-13 road victory against Northwestern, Clark continued his exceptional play, completing 22 of 31 passes (71 pct.) for 274 yards and one touchdown, a 53-yard strike to Derek Moyer. He also ran for a two-yard score in the second quarter, his fifth rushing TD of the season. With his effort, Clark moved into third place all-time in 200-yard career passing games (12) and fifth place in career TD passes (37). Against Ohio State, Clark threw for 125 yards. He also rushed for a touchdown, giving him 21 for his career, most all-time for a Penn State quarterback. In his final game in Beaver Stadium, Clark led Penn State to a 31-20 win over Indiana, throwing for 194 yards on 17 of 28 passing with one touchdown and two interceptions. He also scored his team-high seventh rushing touchdown of the season, plunging in from one yard out in the third quarter. With his effort, Clark moved into third place in career completions (407) and single season total offense (2,674), fourth place (tie) in single season touchdown passes (19) and touchdowns responsible for (25), fifth place in career touchdown passes (38) and in single season passing yardage (2,477), and sixth place in single season completions (179). Clark's 19 touchdown passes lead the Big Ten.

81 - Jack Crawford, DE

Crawford is seventh in the Big Ten in tackles for losses (13.5 for minus-65) and tied for seventh with 5.5 sacks. Crawford had an auspicious first career start in the win over Akron, recording two tackles, both for a loss, and his first career sack. He followed up that performance by making four tackles in the 28-7 victory versus Syracuse. Crawford gave his best effort of the early season against Temple, posting three tackles, including 2.5 for a loss, and his second sack of the year. Continuing to build on his solid sophomore season, Crawford registered a career-best five tackles (1.0 TFL) and earned a half a sack versus Iowa. In the 35-17 win at Illinois, Crawford was active again, totaling four tackles, including 1.5 sacks, and recovering a fumble at the Illinois 14 to set-up a touchdown. His third sack of

the year was key, as he dropped Juice Williams for a 15-yard loss late in the first half. Crawford's pressure also forced Williams into an intentional grounding penalty, pushing the Illini out of field goal range. In the non-conference finale with Eastern Illinois, Crawford had two tackles, one of which was a sack of Panther QB Jake Christensen that resulted in a loss of 15 yards. Crawford made three tackles in the 20-0 win against Minnesota, contributing to a dominant defensive effort that limited the Gophers to just 138 total yards, including 37 rushing yards. In the 35-10 pounding of Michigan, Crawford made three tackles, all solos and all for a loss (minus-9 yards). His standout performance included a sack, giving him 5.5 for the season, and a forced fumble of Wolverine running back Carlos Brown in the third quarter. Crawford was active in the win over Northwestern, making two solo tackles, including one for a loss of five yards, and recovering a fumble, his second of the season, by NU QB Mike Kafka on the game's opening drive. The recovery led to a field goal. Crawford started his 11th consecutive game at right defensive end in the 31-20 win against Indiana, recording two pass break-ups.

Green had his best game of the season to date against Temple, gaining 19 yards on the ground on six rushes and catching two passes for 28 yards. Green carried three times for 15 yards against Iowa. Green was instrumental in revitalizing the Penn State rushing attack in its 35-17 win over Illinois, contributing heavily to the 338 yards that the Lions rolled up, their highest rushing total in three years. He got the Lions on the scoreboard with a thrilling 52-yard touchdown burst through the heart of Illini defense in the second quarter. Green posted his second career 100-yard rushing game and had a career high in carries, finishing with 13 rushes for 120 yards. Green carried eight times for 58 yards (7.2 avg.) and notched his third rushing touchdown of the season, a 26-yard scoring romp in the third quarter, in the win over Eastern Illinois. Leads Penn State and is fourth in the Big Ten with 103 tackles. Selected 2008 First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American and 2009 Academic All-District. Hull recorded four tackles and one pass break-up in the season opening win, playing a part in a Penn State defensive effort that held Akron to without a first down in the first half. In the 28-7 victory over Syracuse, Hull made a then-career-best 11 tackles (4 solos) and notched his second career interception. Hull reset his career high in tackles, leading the PSU defense with 13 stops, including 1.5 for a loss, in the 31-6 win over Temple. Against Iowa, Hull tied his career high in tackles with 13 for the second consecutive game, sharing the team lead in stops with Navorro Bowman. He also notched his first sack of the season, good for a seven-yard loss. Hull continued his strong play in the 35-17 thumping of Illinois, reaching double digits in tackles for the fourth consecutive game, notching 11 (1 TFL), leading Penn State in stops for the third straight game. In the 20-0 victory over Minnesota, Hull was second on the team with six tackles and recorded his second interception of the season when he picked off QB Adam Weber late in the first quarter. Hull notched his sixth double figure tackle game of the season in the rout of Michigan, making 10 stops (6 solos), including 2.5 for a loss. He also registered his second sack of the season, taking down Wolverine QB Tate Forcier in the second quarter for a seven yard loss, and teamed with Bani Gbadyu to force a fumble of UM's other quarterback, Denard Robinson, in the third quarter. Versus Northwestern, Hull made three tackles, including two solos. Hull tied his career-high by recording 13 tackles against Ohio State, marking the seventh time this season he reached double digits in stops. Named a semifinalist for the 2009 Butkus Award. Ranks No. 5 in Penn State career tackles with 312. In his first game since suffering an ACL injury before the 2008 season, Lee made a triumphant return to the line-up, recording seven tackles (5 solos), including two for a loss of four yards. The pre-season All-American helped the defense limit Akron to 28 yards rushing, 186 total yards, and just eight first downs (zero in the first half). In the 28-7 win over Syracuse, Lee delivered his fifth career game with at least 13 tackles (6 solo), including three tackles-for-loss and one sack for minus-13 yards. He also moved into Penn State's career top 10

in tackles. Lee continued his standout play in the 31-6 pounding of Temple, registering 12 tackles (2.5 TFLs, 1 sack), but left early in the fourth quarter with a left knee sprain. In recording double figure tackles for the 14th time in his career, he earned Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors for the third time in his career. Lee dressed but did not play in the Big Ten opener versus Iowa or in the following games against Illinois and Eastern Illinois due to the knee injury. Lee made his much-anticipated return to the line-up in the shutout of Minnesota, contributing two tackles and a pass break-up in a superb defensive performance. In the 35-10 drubbing of Michigan, Lee made three tackles in limited duty. Versus Northwestern, Lee made his first start since the Temple game on Sept. 19, picking up his brilliant play right where he left off. The most experienced of the Nittany Lions' offensive linemen, with 37 consecutive starts under his belt, tackle Dennis Landolt anchors the line of an offense ranked No. 2 in the Big Ten, averaging 406.3 yards per game. Behind the protection of Landolt and his line mates, quarterback Daryll Clark ranks No. 1 in the Big Ten and in a tie for No. 10 nationally with 18 touchdown passes. Landolt has anchored a line that had four different starting line-ups in the first six games, but meshed well during the Lions' five-game winning streak. Penn State is tied for second in the Big Ten in fewest sacks allowed, with 12 in 10 games. Penn State started the season with a bang, throwing for a season high 379 yards, a career best for Clark, in a 31-7 rout of Akron. Versus Illinois, PSU rolled up 338 rushing yards, getting 100-yard games from Evan Royster (120) and Stephfon Green (105) and 83 yards from Daryll Clark. In the 52-3 pounding of Eastern Illinois, Penn State displayed dominating balance, racking up 268 yards passing and 285 yards rushing en route to season best yardage total of 553. The Minnesota victory capped a three-week stretch in which Landolt and the PSU offensive line did not allow a sack. Daryll Clark continued to

receive excellent protection from his line against Minnesota, as he threw for 287 yards, the third highest total of his career, and versus Michigan one week later, when he tied a career high by tossing four touchdown passes. In the win over Northwestern, its fifth straight, the Penn State offense gained 301 yards in the second half and 437 for the game, averaging 7.5 yards per play. The Lions were 4 of 4 in the Red Zone vs. the Wildcats, improving to 26 of 26 (19 TD, 7 FG) over the past seven games.
