Now is a good time to be a Boilermaker. Armed with eight returning letterwinners and a heralded newcomer, the 2002-03 Purdue women's tennis team is as ready as ever to make a move up the national rankings and contend for the Big Ten championship.

Head coach Mat Iandolo, now in his 12th year at the helm, believes that this season could prove to be one that serves as a cornerstone for continued success.

"We're real excited for this year because we feel like we have a chance to be really good," Iandolo says. "Our singles lineup from last year returns intact, plus we've got a freshman who may be the best recruit we've ever had at Purdue. We want to be in the top 30 in the country, and we want to finish in the top three in the Big Ten. But we feel like we have a chance to go all the way."

Purdue should be in good shape for the coming season, having lost only one player from its roster of a year ago. Back are All-Big Ten players Gretchen Haynor and Melissa Iqbal, along with senior Missy Wright and junior Melissa Woods. Beyond what they can provide on the court, Iandolo needs those four to serve as team leaders.

"It's our expectation that those young women will set the tone," Iandolo says. "They have the experience to lead us on and off the court."

Experience is the word to describe the Boilermakers this season, and it is what Iandolo considers to be his team's biggest strength.

"We are very happy about the amount of talent that is returning to this team," Iandolo says. "We're the only team in the league that returns two all-conference players, and we have arguably the best recruit in the league coming in. Top to bottom, this is the most talent we've had throughout our roster in some time."

That talent starts with Iqbal and Haynor.

Iqbal, a senior, was Purdue's No. 1 singles player last year. Playing at the top spot, Iqbal was

counted on to go up against every opponent's best player. She proved she was up to the task when she beat three top-50 ranked players, including a 6-3, 6-0 win over No. 29 Marine Piriou of Northwestern in the season finale.

Iqbal also provided solid doubles play, teaming with Lara Burgarello to win 19 pairs matches. Eight of those came in Big Ten play.

Haynor, a junior, played at the No. 2 singles position last season. The hardest worker on the team, Haynor won 16 singles matches and posted an impressive 7-3 mark in conference action. In doubles, Haynor paired with Missy Wright to make up Purdue's No. 1 doubles combo. The duo won 18 matches and advanced to the semifinals of the ITA Midwest Regional semifinals last fall.

Haynor did not relax over the summer. She won the ITA Midwest tournament played at Notre Dame in July, then played at the Evansville \$10,000 Challenger. She beat Stanford All-American Lauren Barnikow and also qualified for the doubles main draw in Evansville.

Playing at No. 3 a season ago was Woods, who returns to the lineup in good condition. Woods has battled through injuries during her Purdue career, but appears to be in good shape heading into her penultimate season. That's good news for the Boilermakers and bad news for their opponents. Woods was a mainstay in the singles rotation as a sophomore, and won 16 matches in doubles.

Known mostly as a doubles player, Wright may have a chance to crack the singles lineup in her final campaign. That would be gravy for the Boilermakers, who will count on Wright to be a factor in pairs play, possibly again teaming with Haynor to form one of Purdue's most formidable tandems.

The experience of those four players should serve the Boilermakers well. But what may be the 'X' factor is the play of Purdue's sophomore class. Last year as rookies, Burgarello, Amy Walgenbach and Shawna Zuccarini earned positions in the singles lineup. Burgarello played at No. 4, winning 18 matches. She also won 21 matches in doubles.

Walgenbach played mostly at No. 6, but also played at No. 4 and 5. All told, she won 15 matches. Zuccarini, who played primarily at No. 5, was the most successful Boilermaker singles player from 2001-02, winning 19 matches.

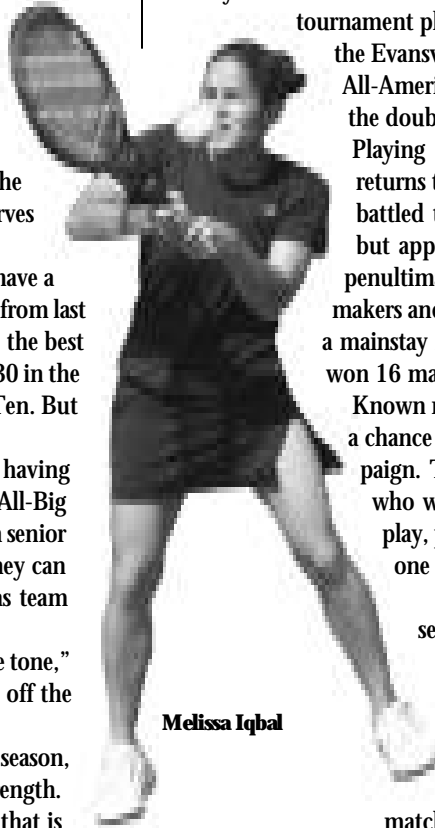
This year, another newcomer will look to make a name for herself. Brittany Reitz, a native of Newport Coast, Calif., should make an immediate impact for the Boilermakers.

"Brittany is going to factor into the top half of the lineup," Iandolo says. "I believe she is capable of beating anyone in the league on any given day. What sets her apart is her competitiveness. When you come to play Britt, you better be ready to compete."

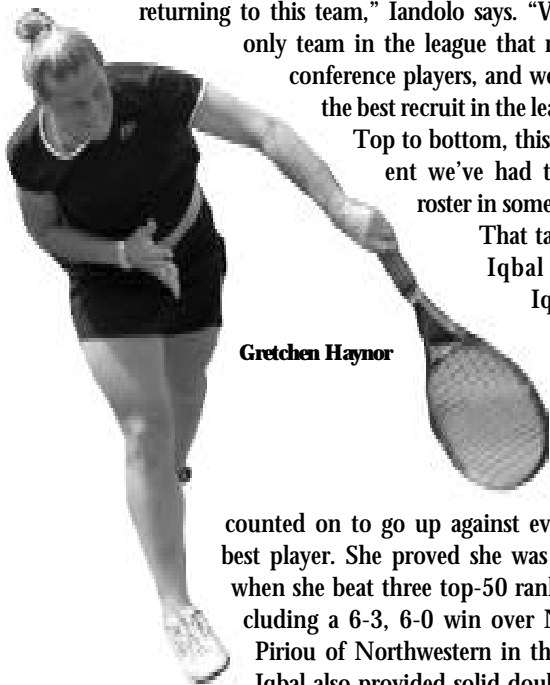
Rounding out the roster are walkons Catie McLevish and Paula Schmidt. McLevish, a sophomore, played 10 singles matches and two doubles matches last fall. Schmidt, a freshman, is a tried and true Boilermaker. Her father and brother are Purdue alumni.

This group of 10 will be tested with a tough schedule that Iandolo purposefully prepared.

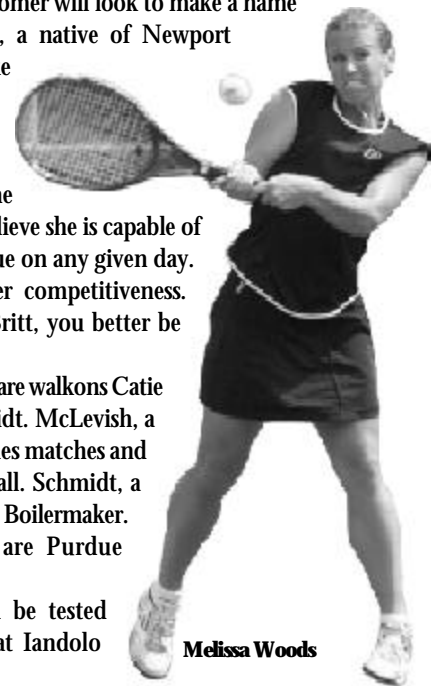
"We believe that in order to become the best you have to schedule the best," Iandolo says. "We want to improve our mental toughness by playing mentally strong teams."

Mat Iandolo, Head Coach

Head coach Mat Iandolo is in his 12th year at the helm of the Boilermaker women's tennis program. After inheriting a program that was on the decline, Iandolo has brought Purdue up the Big Ten Conference standings and onto the national scene.

In his tenure at Purdue, Iandolo has taken a team that had finished no higher than sixth in the Big Ten since 1983 and turned it into a national contender. In

1998, he helped the Boilermakers collect two upsets over top 30-ranked opponents, win their first matches against Northwestern and Indiana, post their best conference record ever (8-2), finish fourth in the Big Ten (tying Purdue's highest finish ever, also 1995) and earn a final national ranking of 44th. For his efforts in that outstanding season, Iandolo garnered Big Ten Coach of the Year honors.

During his tenure, Iandolo has led three teams to NCAA bids (1995, 1996 and 1998), becoming the first coach in Purdue history to lead the Boilermakers to postseason play. He has coached five All-Big Ten players who have received conference honors nine times. Jennifer Embry, a three-time All-Big Ten selection, was the 2000 ITA Midwest Senior Player of the Year. Last season Iandolo placed both Gretchen Haynor and Melissa Iqbal on the all-conference team.

Dedicated to the true student-athlete, Iandolo's players have collected Academic All-Big Ten laurels 44 times. His 1999, 2000 and 2001 teams received ITA All-Academic recognition.

Prior to accepting the position at Purdue in July 1991, Iandolo worked as an assistant tennis coach at Kentucky (1991), UCLA (1986-87), California (1985-86), San Diego State (1983-85) and Weber State (1982-83). Before joining the staff at Kentucky, Iandolo was a tennis professional at Four Lakes Athletic Club in Lisle, Ill., where he was a personal coach to seven nationally ranked junior tennis players and two world-ranked women's professionals.

Iandolo achieved honors as a junior college player at San Diego City College, garnering All-Mission Conference in 1979. After transferring to Weber State in 1980, he led the Wildcats to three Big Sky Conference titles and served as team captain his senior year.

After earning a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1983, Iandolo competed on the USTA Satellite Tour.



Chris Karges-Iandolo, Assistant Coach

Chris Karges-Iandolo is in her 11th season as an assistant coach for the Boilermakers.

Karges-Iandolo has made a dramatic impact while at Purdue, using her playing experience to connect with the athletes. She has been instrumental in helping Purdue improve its status from a Big Ten Conference cellar-dweller to title contender.

Her work in leading Purdue to one of its finest seasons in 1998 earned her the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Assistant Coach of the Year award for the Midwest Region. Karges-Iandolo played an integral part in helping the Boilermakers to a 14-10 record (8-2 Big Ten), a second-place finish in the conference regular-season standings, a No. 2 seed in the Big Ten Championship tournament and an NCAA Championship invitation.

Karges-Iandolo's coaching skills, particularly in doubles, no doubt made an impact on former Purdue All-Big Ten player Jennifer Embry, who qualified with partner Amanda Augustus to compete in the Championships at Wimbledon in July 2001.

Prior to her arrival in West Lafayette, Karges-Iandolo served as an assistant coach at Northwestern from 1990 to 1992. In her three years with the Wildcats, she helped guide them to a second-place and two third-place finishes in the Big Ten.

Karges-Iandolo graduated from Kentucky in 1989 with a bachelor's degree in communications. She won two Southeastern Conference singles championships and one doubles titles, and was a three-time all-conference selection and a four-time NCAA participant for the Wildcats. Additionally, she was honored with the SEC Sportsmanship and SEC Senior Player of the Year awards.

From 1987 to 1990, Karges-Iandolo played on the USTA professional tennis tour. Still a successful player, Karges-Iandolo captured a USTA national championship in 25-and-over doubles with partner Sonia Patrick in 1994.

2001-02 IN REVIEW

The 2001-02 Boilermakers made great strides both individually and as a team. The season began with a trip to Knoxville, Tenn., for the St. Mary's Health Systems Classic. Purdue boasted four singles winners on the first day, then concluded the weekend with five players finishing in the top five of their respective flights.

The team split over the first weekend of October. Junior Melissa Iqbal and sophomore Gretchen Haynor headed to sunny Los Angeles for the Riviera All-American Championships, while the rest of the Boilermakers went east to Providence, R.I., for the Brown Invitational. Both Iqbal and Haynor won their first-round prequalifying matches before falling in the second round. They also competed in doubles at the collegiate grand slam event.

Two weeks later the Boilermakers went back to Tennessee, this time going to Nashville for Vanderbilt's June Stewart Fall Invitational. Freshman Lara Burgarello finished fourth in Flight 4, and teamed with Iqbal to finish second in Flight 3 of doubles. Haynor and junior partner Missy Wright placed third in the top flight.

The fall season concluded with the ITA Midwest Regionals, where Iqbal turned in the best performance by a Boilermaker in the last 12 years. She advanced all the way to the semifinals before falling to Marine Piriou of Northwestern. Burgarello won three matches in qualifying, then won two matches in the main draw over Nina Vaughan of Notre Dame and Larissa Chinwah of Western Michigan before bowing out in the round of 16. Iqbal and Burgarello teamed up to win three matches and advance to the quarterfinals, as did Haynor and Wright.

The spring season began with the Milwaukee Tennis Classic, where senior Lynsey Fick and sophomore Melissa Woods made it to the finals before succumbing to the nation's 38th-ranked combo of Leigh Bradwell and Lauren Rookledge. En route to the title match, Fick and Woods beat teammates Haynor and Wright in the semifinals.

The dual match season started with yet another trip to Tennessee. The Boilermakers dropped a decision to the sixth-ranked Lady Vols, then battled No. 27 LSU in Baton Rouge. Despite a loss to the Lady Tigers, the Boilermakers received a big win from Iqbal, who upset sixth-ranked Bruna Colosio 4-6, 7-6, 7-5.

Purdue got its first win in convincing fashion, sweeping all nine matches against Utah in the Lafayette Sports Center. Following losses to No. 24 Kentucky and a 4-3 heartbreaker to BYU, the Boilermakers just missed another sweep by taking eight of nine matches from Western Michigan.

Purdue put its best foot forward at Iowa, winning the conference season opener 4-3 in Iowa City. Freshman Shawna Zuccarini delivered the match-clinching victory with a three-set win over Deni Alexandrova at No. 5.

The win streak continued with a 5-2 upset of 35th-ranked Illinois on March 9 in Lafayette. Purdue won the doubles point, then Woods came through with the deciding victory — a 6-2, 2-6, 6-2 win over Eva Choe at No. 3. Also winning against the Fighting Illini was Iqbal, who beat 43rd-ranked Jennifer McGaffigan 7-6, 6-3.

Purdue then faced its toughest stretch of the season, with matches against No. 13 Northwestern, No. 12 North Carolina and at No. 9 Arizona State. The Boilermakers dropped all three, but rebounded with an upset of No. 22 Notre Dame on March 21. The Boilermakers beat the Fighting Irish 5-2, first winning the doubles point behind a Haynor/Wright victory over 30th-ranked Lindsey Green and Becky Varnum. Haynor also came through with a singles win, as did Iqbal, Zuccarini and freshman Amy Walgenbach.

Haynor and Walgenbach provided wins at Indiana, but they were not enough to lift Purdue over the 41st-ranked Hoosiers in the first-ever meeting with the newly created Titan Series point on the line. But the Boilermakers again rebounded with a 5-2 win on the road at Minnesota. A chance to move to 4-2 in the conference slipped away by the closest of margins in Madison one day later, however, as Purdue dropped a 4-3 decision to the 37th-ranked Badgers.

The Boilermakers' resiliency got them back in the win column yet again when Purdue returned to the court to smash Illinois State 6-1 in its final non-conference match of the season.

On the second-to-last weekend of the regular season, Purdue split with No. 47 Ohio State and Penn State. And on the final weekend, the Boilermakers split at No. 50 Michigan and at Michigan State to finish in a tie for fifth place.

The Boilermakers beat the Spartans in the first round of the Big Ten Championships in Bloomington, but fell to No. 15 Northwestern in the quarterfinals. The loss to the Wildcats, who went on to win the conference title, was tempered by another upset by Iqbal. In her junior season swan song, Iqbal stunned 29th-ranked Marine Piriou 6-3, 6-0, avenging two straight-set losses to Piriou earlier in the year.

When it came time to hand out honors, it was not surprising that Iqbal and Haynor were recognized by the conference coaches and placed on the All-Big Ten team. As Purdue's No. 1 player, Iqbal proved she had the ability to knock off any player on any day either in singles or doubles. Haynor, Purdue's No. 2 gun, turned in a 7-3 record against conference foes and played on the Boilermakers' top doubles team.

At the conclusion of the season, Fick, Iqbal, Woods and Wright were all named to the Academic All-Big Ten team.

Now boasting more than 300,000 living alumni, Purdue University graduates have been to the moon, to the highest levels of business and government, and to Sweden to receive Nobel Prizes.

The Indiana link in a nationwide chain of 68 land-grant colleges and universities, Purdue owes its origin to the Morrill Act, signed by Abraham Lincoln in 1862 to promote establishment of schools to teach agriculture and the “mechanic arts.”

An act of generosity by Lafayette businessman John Purdue secured the Indiana land-grant college for Lafayette. Purdue pledged money and land for the school. In return, the institution was named for him, and he remained a trustee until his death in 1876.

Classes began in 1874 with a total of 39 students and six faculty members. Since then, enrollment has grown to nearly 68,000 on five campuses and a faculty and staff totaling approximately 14,500. In excess of 37,000 students are enrolled at Purdue’s main campus in West Lafayette, Ind.

Since its inception in 1869, Purdue has attained widespread fame for the quality of its teaching, research and service in a number of fields. Once known primarily as an engineering

and agriculture school, the University now offers nearly 6,700 courses in more than 200 specializations in agriculture; consumer and family sciences; education; engineering; liberal arts; management; pharmacy, nursing, and health sciences; science; technology; and veterinary medicine. Students pursue advanced degrees through the Graduate School. Purdue has one of the largest enrollments of women and minority students in engineering in the country, and the School of Veterinary Medicine is one of only 27 nationwide.

In addition to charting new paths through its instruction, Purdue also blazes new frontiers in research, from unraveling the molecular structure of viruses to designing a self-supporting food system for space colonies to genetically engineering crops and plants for feeding an ever-expanding world.

As one of the 25 largest colleges and universities in the United States, Purdue leaves its mark on the world

— and beyond — on a daily basis. Affectionately known as the “mother of astronauts,” the University boasts 22 graduates — 20 men and two women — who have been selected to participate in the NASA space program. From the 1960s to today, from the Mercury Program to today’s fleet of space shuttles, Purdue alumni have flown on more than one-third of all manned U.S. space flights. Neil Armstrong, the first person to walk on the moon, and Eugene Cernan, the last person to leave it, both call Purdue alma mater. In addition to the astronauts, scores of scientists, engineers and other personnel who help support the space program have graduated from Purdue.

From the steam era to the space age, Purdue has forged a proud tradition of education, research and service to the state, the United States and the world — a tradition that gets stronger every day.



ACADEMICS: A TOP PRIORITY

Students who choose to attend Purdue become a part of its strong tradition and receive the opportunity to carry the torch into tomorrow's legacy. Purdue graduates have consistently left their mark on the world and continue to do so every day. Here dreams are followed and made into reality.

Purdue grants the Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) and Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degrees. Students may also pursue advanced degrees through the Graduate School. Academic diversity is offered through nearly 6,700 courses in 12 schools:

Graduation rates for Purdue student-athletes continue to rank above the national average. A 2001 NCAA study analyzed students who enrolled from 1994-95 through 1999-2000 to determine if they graduated within six years of freshman enrollment. Sixty-seven percent of Purdue student-athletes graduated, compared with 58 percent for NCAA Division I schools.

Moreover, the overall grade-point average of student-athletes has surpassed that of the general Purdue student body for 10 consecutive semesters. Following the 2002 spring semester, the career cumulative GPA of all current Purdue student-athletes was a 2.91.

Academic support services are available to student-athletes in the Jane P. Beering Academic Learning Center. The staff is sensitive to the special needs of student-athletes and is dedicated to the academic success of each individual.

Student-athletes take advantage of the academic support services by learning ways to improve their study skills, time management and learning strategies. Assistance is provided through tutors and degree counseling, as well as general advising to help with the adjustment to college. Freshman progress is more closely monitored to give the student, professors and coaches up-to-date feedback as the student adjusts to the new collegiate environment.

Academic benefits abound at Purdue. Our Business and Industrial Development Center, for example, serves as a nationwide link between Purdue and industry. And the Department of English operates a Writing Lab and Phone-in Grammar Hotline used on a national scale.

Every day, day after day, Purdue continues to uphold and strengthen its reputation as one of the nation's finest academic institutions. The opportunity awaits you to become one of its fine graduates, allowing your dreams to become reality.

THE JANE P. BEERING ACADEMIC LEARNING CENTER

Purdue opened a new Academic Learning Center in August of 1994. It was named in 2000 after former Purdue first lady Jane P. Beering, for her steadfast support of the Boilermakers. The center is located in the Intercollegiate Athletic Facility (between Mackey Arena and the Mollenkopf Athletic Center).

The center features five different study and research areas:

Study Tables

Located in Rooms 201A and 201B, this area has a capacity of 72 student-athletes. It includes 12 large study tables and is monitored from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Thursday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday and from noon to 10 p.m. Sunday.

One-on-One Tutor Rooms

This area in Room 220 has six individual rooms used for one-on-one tutoring. There are also two additional rooms available for tutoring.

Library/Career Resource Center

Recreational and reference reading materials are available as well as career information and assistance with career exploration in Room 224.

Computer Lab

Located in Room 226, the computer lab is operated by the Purdue University Computing Center. It is fully connected to the campus mainframe and has World Wide Web connections. It is staffed by a lab assistant who assists student-athletes with hardware and software problems.

Large Group Study Room

This area holds up to 15 student-athletes and is located in Room 209B. It also houses math walk-in tutors, who are available from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday.



STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Purdue women's tennis had made a continuous commitment to improve in all facets of the game. In the last few years, the Boilermakers have benefitted from hard work in the areas of strength and conditioning.

Heading the strength and conditioning program is Greg Lehman, who works primarily with the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coordinator Tasha Weddle works directly with the women's tennis team, and has played an integral role in the Boilermakers' increased power, speed and stamina.
