## 1937 SUGAR BOWL

SANTA CLARA vs. LOUISIANA STATE

New Orleans, LA

January 1, 1937

Attendance: 42,000

Those boys from the West have just torn down the north goal posts, and quite appropriately, too.

Now the south goal posts are falling prey to small, joy-crazed bands of Santa Clara rooters all the way from northern California.

Their Bronco heroes have just beaten Louisiana State 21 to 14 in the major upset of the post-season.

Three touchdowns to two and all of them on aerials.

All of the Civil War spirit the old South could muster availed nothing against a team led by Nello Falaschi, Phil Dougherty, and Frank "Mississippi" Smith. Old "Mississippi" from up Picayune way was out to show the home folks how they play end out California way. And he showed them plenty.

But the man behind the gun today, kicking the LSU perfectly-matched, stout players back to their own goal zone, was Charley Pavelko. Briefly, here's how Santa Clara topped off its greatest season:

Manny Gomez grabbed a reverse pass from Nello Falaschi, raced five yards more with Morton in pursuit to score in four minutes after the game started. Just seven minutes later Bruno Pellegrini pitched to Norman Finney for 30 yards and a second touchdown. Bruno Pellegrini made both placement points. Coach Bernie Moore's boys scored with one-half minute to go in the second quarter. Bill Crass hit Gaynell Tinsley in the Bronco left flat with a 23-yard pass. He reversed his field, shook off several vicious Bronco tacklers, picked up his blockers and raced 27 yards for the first LSU touchdown.

At half time it was Santa Clara 14, LSU 7.

The Broncos got their third touchdown in the three minutes after resumption of play. From fifteen yards out Pavelko and Falaschi pounded to the five-yard line. There the Broncos pulled a flossy end around with "Mississippi" Smith toting the ball.

Pinched by two big tacklers on the two-yard line, "Mississippi" tossed the ball straight up in the air. Nello Falaschi grabbed it, smashed over the goal line as DeRosa put a block on the Tiger defensive wingback.

The Broncos got careless and with second stringers in, gave the Tigers a chance by punting poorly after Jim Foley gotten the team a 10-year penalty for unnecessary roughness.

Bill Crass hurried to "Rock" Reed for nine yards and he outran Jules Perrin for seven more and the touchdown. Milner place-kicked perfectly to make the final score Santa Clara 21, LSU 14.

There were more things jammed into two hours of football than you normally see in a season.

There were freak pass plays and a pass for the point after touchdown.

But to begin at the beginning. Nello Falaschi set the tempo for the Broncos by rolling back 24 yards with Milner's opening kick off to the Bronco 41.

Pavelko and Crass exchanged punts and the Broncos landed on the Tigers' 44 stripe. DeRosa tried a long pass but it fell incomplete. Then "Waddy" lit out around All-American Tinsley's end, was grabbed but shook loose, reversed his field and whistled around the other flank for 13 yards and first down on the LSU 31.

Crass knocked down DeRosa's pass so Falaschi called the favorite scoring play. Pavelko hit into the line but handed the ball to Falaschi. He raced back in a wide arc and pitched 21 yards to Manny Gomez. The Mexican halfback sped the last five yards to touchdown land. Pellegrini came in to kick the extra point, did it, and the startled South saw its Tigers trailing, 7 to 0.

The second touchdown was nearly as simple. Pavelko whacked the leather 51 yards and out on the one.

Crass kicked out short to LSU's 28. Falaschi pulled a sneaker for four, Pellegrini

made it two at Mr. Strange's tackle but Falaschi was caught trying to pass by Tinsley, and heaved for a seven-yard loss.

On fourth down Pellegrini passed 30 yards to Normal Finney, who had only to step over the goal line for the second score. Pellegrini kicked this one, too, making the score Santa Clara 14, LSU 0, and only 11 minutes of the game gone.

Bernie's boys went 25 minutes before they made a first down. The Santa Clara forwards were meeting the larger Louisiana linesmen head on with a smash you could feel in the press box. Messrs. Crass, Milner, and Rohm were going nowhere hurriedly. But the Tigers were not to be completely choked. Reed intercepted Tommy Gilbert's pass an ran 26 yards, nearly getting away. Leo Artoe brought him down on the Staters' 40.

Crass passed to Mihalich for 12 yards over little Joe Kelly, playing at center for Dougherty, for a first down on the 50-yard line.

Then it happened and Tinsley showed why he is All-American, although he did have some very bad moments.

Tinsley twisted to take a 23-yard throw from Bill Crass. He was in the Bronco left flat, but there were too many Santa Clarans around. He turned and raced to his own left, dangling long enough to let his interference form, then he hit for the corner of the field and make all 27 yards to put the Tigers in the ball game. Crass kicked perfectly for the point and there was the half-time gun with the 4-to-1 favorites trailing 14 to 7.

Pat Coffee helped the Broncos start their third touchdown drive. he fumbled and Dick Bassi recovered on the Louisiana 32 marker. The Broncos couldn't quite do it then and Morton intercepted on of DeRosa's throw meant for Smith. Gomez did the same thing for one of Coffee's best pitches, but ran the ball back 35 yards before Morton nailed him on the State 15.

Pavelko smashed right tackle for three and Falaschi neaked from quarterback for eight and a first down.

You could hardly believe your eyes at what happened next. Gomez ran to his left, passed to his right and barely missed Smith in the end zone. On third down, old "Mississippi" took the ball in his own hands, rambled around from end. He was nipped by two big Louisianians on the two-yard line and it looked like a lost cause.

Up popped the ball, straight in the air like a recalcitrant bar of soap in a shower bath. When it came down, Falaschi was under it. DeRosa smashed down a potential tackler and the All-American stepped across the goal line for the last touchdown for the Broncos.

The Broncos didn't try to sit on their lead. They were winging away. But when "Buck" Shaw relieved his regulars the second team kind of flattened out.

Unnecessary roughness penalty put the Broncos back to their 10-yard line and Jules Perrin tried to kick the ball out but Dumas rushed him and he punted straight up in the air for just about 10 yards to the 20-yard line. Milner rattled through right guard for six yards, but fumbled and recovered for a loss of three yards.

Crass hurled the ball to Reed for a nine-yard gain and the "Rock", a swift, outran Perrin in the seven-yard race for the second LSU touchdown. Milner place-kicked and there was the ball game; Santa Clara 21, LSU 14.

The Bronco brought his sweet tooth with him to the Sugar Bowl this New Year's afternoon. He nuzzled up to the toothsome touchdowns and nibbled off one six-point chunk in the second quarter, then switched his tail to brush off a few obstacles.

The Bronco of Santa Clara, for the second time, defeated Louisiana State, before 40,000, in a light drizzle. The score was 6 to 0.

The score could have been 12 to 0. It might have been more.

But six points, though an uncomfortable margin during the times when the big, bad Bengal was driving within the five-yard line, looks large right now, and they'll be counted and recounted when our Bronco rooters' special starts back to the Bay Area next Monday.

It was really a sensational game, though there was but one score.

Santa Clara's second team not only won the game, but saved it in the final, desperate quarter.

The second team marched and passed to a score midway in the second quarter. The second team held Louisiana State on the three-yard line, when a score might have brought a one-point loss to the Broncos.

The second team was pretty good today.

Its backfield men were so efficient that Buck Shaw allowed several of them to stay in when he put in his first team later in the game.

Coaches Buck Shaw and Bernie Moore played a strategical see-saw battle with their unit substitution idea. Moore warmed up his seconds shortly before the end of the first quarter. Shaw did likewise - and Shaw's substitutes beat Moore's substitutes.

Today Santa Clara stands as one of the major undefeated football teams in the nation. There were 1,500 coaches from all parts of the United States to see the game. Many of them declared the Broncos to be the surprise team to them - they didn't know Shaw had a team as clever and as defensively potent as this one.

It looked sad for Santa Clara in the first few minutes.

The Broncos received the kickoff and Tommy Gilbert took a whack on the dome that kept him out for the remainder of the scrap.

Orv Hanners, Santa Clara's only married man and a recent father, went in for Gilbert.

The Broncos went no place on the first few plays, and Pavelko punted. After two nil plays, Milner punted back and Hanners, handling a wet ball, found it a greased pigskin. He fumbled the slippery ball, picked it up, fumbled again and was finally crunched to the ground as Larry King, LSU end, wrapped his lean frame around the vagrant ball.

That gave the Tigers possession on the Bronco 28. Booth tossed a sharp pass over center to Milner for an 11-yard gain to the 17, and the Broncos looked miserable on pass defense.

On the next play the Bronco line split wide open as Pinky Rohm cut back off left tackle for 13 yards to the four-yard line and a first down. Santa Clara's small band of supporters were afraid to look.

But they did sneak a peek on the next play as Frank Cope splattered Milner into the muddy turf for a one-yard loss, and on the next attempt as Milner drove into right guard for three, to the two-yard line.

Al Wolff, 220 pounds of tackle, chased Milner and caught him from behind on the next stab with nothing at all. Fourth down, two to go, and Rohm punched into the middle to be smacked by Dougherty, Cope, and Farasyn for a mere yard.

The Bronco supporters weren't afraid to look then. They made plenty of noise.

From that time on, Santa Clara battled stoutly and surely upfield in an amazing comeback.

The Broncos won the ball game with an old Santa Clara trick, running to one side of the field and throwing to the other. It worked against LSU last year and it worked again today.

Jim Barlow, another of the Broncos' subs, ran to his extreme left, covering the width of the field, then turned sharply to throw 50 yards diagonally to the right.

Ray McCarthy was there to receive, running three yards more before Bussey nipped him. This maneuver gained 20 yards, and put the ball on the LSU nine.

Smith plowed into right tackle for four. He tried the same spot for one more. On third down, Pellegrini took the pass from center and as quickly let the ball fly to Jim Coughlan, who had sidled over to the deep flat.

Coughlan took the pass over his right shoulder, and made one step over the goal line. The Louisiana State men were all about him, but the play was too quick to be detected.

Pellegrini's attempted placekick, with Barlow holding, was wobbly, and that missed point later caused Bronco rooters some querulous moments.

The fourth quarter was a thriller. Pinky Rohm, LSU's best man, kicked one 56 yards, the ball going out of bounds on the Santa Clara nine, changing the entire complexion of the situation.

Roche then tried right end, but was forced back deeply, and finally tackled by Ogden Bauer, a classy end. Bauer sent Roche rolling over the goal line, but it was called down on the Bronc one.

Barlow was equal to the emergency, his punt out sailing 54 yards, Rohm returning 23, to Santa Clara's 32.

Stuck after three plays, the Tigers brought out a fake punt by Rohm, with Milner taking the ball on a reverse from the rear. Milner ran to the three-yard line, a 23-yard gainer.

And now it was Roche's turn for redemption after he had placed the Broncos in a spot. He cracked in as Rohm attempted a sweep around left end, dumped his man for a seven-yard loss. From there Rohm threw twice over the goal line, the second pass losing the ball. It was very ticklish business, but a marvelous piece of goal-line defense by the Santa Clara team.

It isn't difficult to write about the Broncs today.

The New Orleans newspaper are doing it. The coaches are doing it.

The telegraph operator who is sending this stuff says, "Santa Clara is the best team I've seen in five years," an unsolicited advertisement, too.

You'll notice many unfamiliar names in the story of the Bronco victory. It was the second team that did the damage, proving what a real squad the Santa Clara group has.

Any team that can stave off two goal-line threats, one in the first minute of the game, and come back glowing, is all right.

If the 40,000 fans in the stands today have their say about it, the Broncs will be back next year for the third time.

The Santa Clara Broncos kept their bowl record perfect as they upset the heavily favored Kentucky Wildcats, 21-13, before a record crowd of 64,816 fans in Miami.

The Broncos triumph, following upon back-to-back Sugar Bowl victories in 1937 and '38, gave Santa Clara a 3-0 record in New Year's bowl games and won them almost as many hearts in Miami as they had captured in New Orleans.

Statistics would make it appear that the Wildcats outplayed the Broncos, but they tell an untrue story.

The Broncos collected but eight first downs, made a total of but 233 yards (153 rushing, eighty passing), compared to Kentucky's eighteen first downs, 298 yards total (170 rushing, 128 passing). However, many Kentucky yards were compiled before Santa Clara solved the Wildcat running attack in the first half.

The Broncos were outplayed in the first half, allowing Kentucky to leave the field with a 7-0 break at the intermission. The lead could have easily been greater, but the clock ran out as the Wildcats had the ball on the one foot line. The Broncos came out of the locker room and struck early in the third quarter for the tying touchdown. The score was set up on a 42-yard pass play from quarterback Johnny Pasco to Ellery Williams that gave the Broncos a first down on the Kentucky 12-yard line.

After Hall Haynes ran for three yards, Gus Hakeem ran off left tackle for seven more to give the Broncos a first down at the two yard line. With Santa Clara looking at third down and six inches for a touchdown, Pasco kept the ball on a quarterback sneak to give the Broncos their first score of the day. The point after by 30-year old place kicker Papa Joe Vargas tied the game at 7-7. After Kentucky's next drive stalled, the Broncos took over in excellent field position on the 'Cat 42-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, sophomore end Dick Wiborn snuck behind the Kentucky secondary and Pasco found him for 25-yard gain down to the 17-yard line.

Five plays later, the Broncos were on the one foot line, but umpire Bill Fischer whistled John Justice for holding, driving the Broncos back 15 yards. Forced to go to the air, Pasco's pass in the end zone to Williams was incomplete, but Kentucky was called for pass interference on the play, giving Santa Clara new life.

With the ball at the four yard line, Hakeem got the Broncos closer as he rushed for two yards to set up Hall Haynes two-yard TD plunge. Papa Joe's extra point gave the Broncos a 14-7 lead. No one knew at the time how big that extra point would prove to be.

Shortly after the start of the final quarter, Kentucky quarterback Vito Parilli hooked up with Emery Clark for a 52-yard touchdown pass to cut the lead to 14-13. Robert Brooks, who had made 18 straight extra point attempts to date, came on to give the Wildcats the equalizer, but the kick went wide and the Broncos still hung to a one-point lead with 13 minutes to play.

From that point on, Santa Clara took control of the game.

After Santa Clara's drive stalled, Hall Haynes once again bottled up the Wildcats, punting the ball out of bounds on the 12 yard line. The Broncos defense then rose to the occasion, dropping Kentucky for minus 11-yards on the Wildcats three plays from scrimmage. Kentucky's Dom Fucci was forced to punt from his own end zone. Santa Clara's Abe Dung fielded the ball on the 48 and returned it nine yards to set the stage for the clincher.

With the ball on the Wildcat 16-yard line, Santa Clara's Bernie Vogel went over the left side for the final score of the day. Vargas made his third PAT and Santa Clara claimed its third straight New Year's Day bowl victory.
