Women's Soccer Faces Florida in College Cup Semifinal

This Week

Santa Clara University will face the University of Florida in the second semifinal of the 2001 College Cup. Friday's match will begin at 5:30 p.m. Pacific Time at Gerald J. Ford Stadium on the campus of Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas. The Broncos are the tournament's second overall seed, while the Gators are seeded sixth. SCU (21-2) is making its fifth trip to the College Cup in the last six seasons, and eighth overall.



The Broncos' NCAA History

Santa Clara's appearance in this year's NCAA postseason is the program's 13th straight. The Broncos received an automatic berth in the 2001 Tournament after winning the West Coast Conference Championship on November 4. SCU has reached the semifinals on eight occasions: 1989, '90, '92, '96, '97, '98, '99 and 2001. The Broncos are 24-12 all-time in the 13 tournaments, outscoring opponents 71-33, including 15 shutouts.

On Television

ESPN2 will air the Broncos semifinal match tape-delayed on Dec. 9 at 9 a.m. PT. The first semifinal will be shown a day earlier at the same time. The title game will air twice on ESPN, live on Dec. 9 at 1 p.m. and rebroadcast on Dec. 11 at noon. For those that have access to satellite TV, fans can watch both semifinals live on Friday. Coordinates are as follows: KU Band, SBS 6, Transponder 9.

Live on the Internet

College Cup host SMU is offering fans a chance to follow both semifinal matches and the title game online with a live statistical tracker. The link will be provided to Santa Clara's official athletic website, www.SantaClaraBroncos.com on Wednesday. By logging on, fans can receive real-time updated statistics direct from the official scoring computer.

On Florida

Florida (21-3-1) advances to the semifinals for the second time in the program's six-year history. The Gators advanced with a 1-0 victory over third-seeded UCLA last weekend in Los Angeles. A goal by freshman Monica Hoyles in the final minute of the second overtime made the difference. The Bruins held a 20-4 shot advantage at the end of regulation, with Florida playing its first postseason overtime contest. Hoyles' shot appeared to deflect off an UCLA defender en route to the goal. The Gators played the match without senior all-American defender Keisha Bell, who suffered a left knee sprain on Friday.

This Year's College Cup a Repeat of 1998

The four teams in this year's College Cup mark the same lineup as the 1998 semifinals. North Carolina topped Portland, while Florida defeated Santa Clara, both by 1-0 scores. Florida claimed its first and only national title in the program's young history with a 1-0 victory over North Carolina in the title contest.

On North Carolina and Portland

North Carolina (23-0) and Portland (20-3) will face each other in the other semifinal. The Tar Heels have reached the NCAA College Cup every season of its 20-year existence and own 16 national championships. The Pilots are making their sixth College Cup appearance in the last eight years, and second straight, after losing to UCLA 1-0 in last year's semifinal. SCU is 0-4 against UNC in the NCAA Tournament and winless in one contest against Portland in the postseason.

The Broncos will leave for Dallas on Wednesday, American Airlines flight 2486 from San Jose to Dallas/Fort Worth, arriving at 7:41 p.m. local time. The team returns on Monday, flight 2465 that returns to SJC at 2:25 p.m.

All practices will be held at Pettus Field, just west of Ford Stadium, and are open to the public. Thursday's practice schedule is as follows: North Carolina 10-11:30 a.m. Central Time, Portland 11:30 a.m. - 1 p.m., Santa Clara 1 -2:30 p.m., and Florida 2:30-4 p.m.

Dallas Weather Report

According to weather.com, as of Monday, Dallas is expecting partly cloudy skies through the weekend. Friday's weather calls for a high/low of 68/45 while Saturday will see the temperatures drop to about 64/37. Fans attending Sunday's championship match should expect an even cooler day at 61/41. Dallas' average high for the month of December is 57 degrees, while it's average low is 37 degrees. Precipitation for the month averages 1.9 inches. The record high for the city reached 89 degrees in 1955 while the record low was a chilly 1 degree in 1989.

Soccer Town, USA

Santa Clara is trying to bring the third national championship of the season to the South Bay. The Bay Area CyberRays, one of the country's eight Women's United Soccer Association's teams, won the inaugural Founders Cup in August. The San Jose Earthquakes of Major League Soccer followed suit with its first MLS Cup in October. Two Bronco wins this weekend in Dallas would give the South Bay a new triple crown of sorts that leaves no question in fans minds that the area is Soccer Town, USA.

The Rest of the Field

Of the 64 teams selected, 11 were from the West Coast. Along with Santa Clara, California, Stanford and Saint Mary's were the other three Bay Area teams selected. Additionally, West Coast Conference opponents Portland, Saint Mary's, San Diego and Pepperdine were placed in the draw. SCU went 9-2 against the tournament field during the regular season. Undefeated North Carolina is the tournament's top seed, followed by the Broncos, UCLA, Portland, Stanford, Florida, Notre Dame and Connecticut.

Why the Broncos Didn't Open the Championships at Home

A week before the regular season ended, the NCAA announced that as a result of the September 11 tragedies and concern for the welfare of the student-athletes, the Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and Management Council approved adjustments to seeding, site selection and pairings for the championship. The memo added that the changes were implemented in light of the unstable world climate in order to minimize air travel and mitigate risk, inconvenience and travel delays to the greatest extent possible.

The changes included seeding only eight teams and moving seeds to other regions if there were too many from the same region. That means that the NCAA was not guaranteeing that a top-seeded team would host and that site selection would be based on geographic location. Of the eight seeds, Santa Clara was the only school not hosting the first two rounds.

NCAA Expanded Tournament Field

The NCAA Championships expanded this year from 48 to 64 teams. Three seasons ago, the women's bracket was increased from 32 to 48 teams. In the Championship, 28 conferences were awarded automatic berths with 36 teams receiving at-large selections.

Balancing Finals with the Championship

This week, the Broncos' 22 student-athletes will be balancing preparations for Friday's semifinal match against Florida with finals. Most of the players are trying to take exams before the team leaves for Dallas on Wednesday afternoon. In previous championships, the College Cup would take place one week before finals, but the expansion of this year's tournament, the final three matches of the NCAA soccer season now fall in line with finals week for SCU, which is on the quarter system.

A Postseason Shootout

Including Saturday's match, the Broncos have now outshot their opponents 54-3 in the first half of each round in this year's tournament. Overall, the totals favor SCU 98-13.

Bronco Offense is Second in the Nation

Santa Clara is ranked second in the nation in total offense, averaging 3.3 goals per game with 76 goals in 23 matches. The Bronco defense is also ranked, third with a 0.56 goals-against average. Individually, junior **Aly Wagner** leads the nation in assists, averaging 0.82 per game while she adds 16 goals to her totals. It averages to place her fifth nationally in points per game with a 2.27 average. Freshman **Alyssa Sobolik** is ranked third nationally in goals against average (.50 pg), having allowed only seven goals in 16 matches and 1250 minutes of action. She is one of two freshmen ranked in the top 20.

Wagner Named a Hermann Trophy Finalist

Aly Wagner was named one of four finalists for the Hermann Trophy, announced Monday by collegesoccer.com, the presenting sponsor of the player of the year award. The trophy was presented to Penn State's Christie Welsh on Tuesday. Joining Wagner as finalists were North Carolina's Jena Kluegel and Florida's Abby Wambach. The players were the top four vote-getters out of the 15 semifinalists, which also included Bronco senior defender **Danielle Slaton**. The Hermann Trophy, soccer's equivalent of the Heisman Trophy, has been given annually since 1988 to the nation's best female college soccer player. The Hermann Trophy is named for Robert R. Hermann, the former Chairman of the Executive Committee of the old North American Soccer League and one of that groundbreaking league's founders. Wagner was named one of five finalists for last year's honor while Slaton is a two-time semifinalist. **Mandy**

Clemens became the first Bronco to be honored with the Hermann, when she was announced as the 1999 winner. Clemens was only the second SCU player to capture the title of national player of the year. Former standout Brandi Chastain earned postseason honors following the 1990 season as she was named the 1990 ISAA Player of the Year.

MAC Player of the Year Finalists

Danielle Slaton and **Aly Wagner** were named candidates for the 11th annual Missouri Athletic Club's Collegiate Player of the Year Award, as announced by the Missouri Athletic Club Sports Foundation. Last season, **Slaton** finished fourth while **Wagner** placed fifth in the final ballots. The award is the official National Soccer Coaches Association of America/adidas award for Division I players. The winner will be presented with the award on January 11, 2002 in St. Louis. Former standout **Mandy Clemens** won the award in 1999.

Wagner Notches 50-Point Season

With her three points on Saturday against Virginia, **Aly Wagner** became only the fifth Bronco in program history to post 50 points in a season, joining **Mandy Clemens** (71 - 1999), **Jenny Fechner** (60 - 1982), **Brandi Chastain** (50 - 1990) and **Jacqui Little** (50 - 1999).

NCAA First Round Recap

Reserve **Kristi Candau** lifted Santa Clara to a 3-0 victory over Evansville in the first round of the Championships, held Nov. 16 at the Soccer & Track Stadium at the University of Illinois. Candau took the pass from **Danielle Slaton** in the 59th minute for her second career NCAA game-winner. Despite missing most of training this week after spraining an ankle, Candau collected Slaton's cross in the middle, dribbled in a few feet, and then nailed the score by beating Ace keeper on the right side. Another Bronco substitute, **Taline Tahmassian**, added an insurance goal in the 67th minute. Slaton's throw-in from the left side found freshman forward **Leslie Osborne**, whose header was stopped by the Ace goalie. However, the keeper was unable to collect the ball, with Tahmassian right there to tap it in. Candau scored the final score of the night on a long ball from Tahmassian, that found the top right corner of the net in the 89th minute. Santa Clara ended up with a 36-7 shot advantage on the night, topping its 28-3 shooting night the only other time these schools have met, a 9-0 Bronco victory in 1999.

NCAA Second Round Recap

Osborne scored a goal and an assist to lead Santa Clara to a 4-1 victory over Syracuse in Sunday's second round contest. She scored her 12th goal of the season off a pass by **Kerry Cathcart** in the 47th minute. The Bronco score marked the first goal allowed by Syracuse keeper Shannon Myers in 341:18 minutes. The Broncos scored a second goal in the 59th minute when Aly Wagner converted a penalty kick. The play began with Wagner taking a corner kick on the left side. Osborne went for her serve and was taken down by Syracuse's Candy Reich just to the right of the far post. Just four minutes later, the Broncos scored again. Slaton served a corner kick from the far side, past the goal. Osborne headed the ball to the front of the goal box to teammate **Devvyn Hawkins**, who headed the ball for fourth goal of the season. The Broncos capped their scoring when Candau scored her third goal of the tournament, taking a pass from **Jessica Ballweg**, who was in the corner. Candau deflected the pass into the net, taking the keeper on the near side. The teams played a scoreless first half in which Santa Clara outshot the Orangewomen 11-1 and finished with a 23-2 shot advantage.

NCAA Third Round Recap

Santa Clara earned a 2-0 third-round victory over Dartmouth Saturday afternoon at Buck Shaw Stadium. The Broncos scored their first goal when **Veronica Zepeda** was taken down in the penalty box and awarded a penalty kick. **Aly Wagner** took the kick for the Broncos and netted her 15 goal of the season at 8:42 of the first half. Santa Clara dominated the remainder of the half, taking 19 of their 25 shots in the first stanza, forcing the Dartmouth netminder Julia Shields to make 10 first-half saves. **Danielle Slaton** and the rest of the Santa Clara defense stepped up big in the rain and mud, not allowing a single shot in the first half from Dartmouth, and only one shot in the game. **Erin Sharpe** made the save for the Broncos before giving way to **Alyssa Sobolik**, who saw her first action on the field in nearly three weeks following a knee injury. The

Broncos put the game out of reach in the 58th minute when **Jessica Ballweg** scored on a corner kick that was sent by Slaton and headed to her feet by **Devvyn Hawkins**. Ballweg was no more than five yards outside the goal when she received the pass from Hawkins and slipped it low and under the reach of the Dartmouth keeper.

NCAA Quarterfinal Recap

Santa Clara defeated Virginia Saturday 3-2 to earn a trip to the 2001 NCAA Women's College Cup in Dallas, Texas, December 7 and 9. The Broncos played the first half much like the first halves of each of their first three rounds in this year's tournament, out-shooting the Cavaliers 11-0. **Danielle Slaton** made her first shot count at the 20:28 mark when she took a rebounded **Leslie Osborne** shot and ripped it past Virginia keeper Anne Abernethy. **Veronica Zepeda** increased Santa Clara's lead in the 40th minute when she took a Slaton pass and slipped it past Abernethy. The second half started out much of the same way that the first period ended, with Santa Clara on the offensive. At the 53:44 mark **Aly Wagner** scored off a great heel pass from **Kristi Candau**. Virginia refused to quit however, rallying just six minutes later to score their first goal of the game on their first shot of the game. Lori Lindsey drew the Cavaliers to within one just 77 seconds later as she drilled home a shot from 40 yards out, just clearing the head of Bronco netminder Erin Sharpe, who was inserted just five minutes prior to allowing the first goal.

In the Rankings

Santa Clara is currently ranked second in all four polls: *Soccer America*, NCSAA/adidas, *Soccer Buzz Magazine* and *Soccer Times*. Five of Santa Clara's final seven opponents of the regular season were ranked nationally, including four conference foes. Overall, Santa Clara went 7-2 against ranked opponents, with three wins over top-five foes: No. 2 UCLA, No. 4 Stanford and No. 4 Portland.

Slaton Named One of WCC's 50 Best of All Time

Danielle Slaton was named one of the 50 greatest athletes in West Coast Conference history, league officials announced last week. She is one of eight Bronco standouts that were honored, and is the only selection on the 50-member squad who is currently an active participant. **Mandy Clemens** also of women's soccer, Dennis Awtrey, Steve Nash, Kurt Rambis and Ken Sears from men's basketball, Melissa King from women's basketball and Cameron Rast from men's soccer were also included as some of the greatest student-athletes to ever grace the courts, courses, and fields over the last five decades.

The elite list was compiled by the league as part of the celebration honoring its 50th year of existence. The list includes only individuals from the league's current membership who participated in WCC athletics while the conference sponsored each performer's particular sport. The full list is available at WCCSports.com, the official website of the West Coast Conference.

WCC Champions

Santa Clara returned to the top of the league leaderboard with its fourth West Coast Conference Championship in five years, and fifth overall. The Broncos went 6-1 in league play for the 2001 crown, and earned the WCC's automatic berth into the NCAA Tournament. Santa Clara's other titles came in 1993, '97, '98 and '99.

The Broncos at Buck Shaw Stadium

Santa Clara posted a 140-20-9 record at the 6,800-seat Buck Shaw Stadium over the last 15 seasons, including an 11-0-0 record in 1999. Over the last six seasons, the Broncos are 64-6-3 (.897) at Buck Shaw.

Wagner Moves Up in WCC, SCU Top-10 Lists

With three points on Saturday, **Aly Wagner** moved into a tie for 13th place on the West Coast Conference's career points list, with 96 in 61 matches. This season, she currently leads the league in both goals (16) and assists (18) for 50 points, which is tied for seventh best in the conference for a season. Additionally, her assists is third highest in the league's season list. Wagner is also ninth in Santa Clara's career recordbook in goals (29) and tied for third in assists (38). She's tied for eighth for the season mark in goals and third for assists.

Broncos Name Nine to All-WCC Teams

Jerry Smith was named to his sixth West Coast Conference Coach of the Year honor. Additionally, **Aly Wagner** was named the fifth straight Bronco to garner WCC Player of the Year accolades while **Danielle Slaton** was named the conference's Defender of the Year. Smith shares this year's honors with Saint Mary's Paul Ratcliffe. Smith has also earned the recognition in 1993, '95, '97, '98 and '99.

Wagner becomes this fifth straight Bronco to earn Player of the Year honors. She follows last year's selection in **Heather Aldama** and 1997-99 recipient **Mandy Clemens**. Slaton becomes the first SCU player to earn Defender of the Year honors. In addition to Wagner and Slaton, **Leslie Osborne** and **Veronica Zepeda** earned first-team honors while second-team recognition went to **Devvyn Hawkins** and **Anna Kraus**. Honorable mention honors were received by **Kerry Cathcart**, **Jessica Ballweg** and **Bree Horvath**.

Taking Away Perfection

Santa Clara's 1-0 win over No. 7 Saint Mary's marked the fourth time this season the Broncos have ended a team's undefeated campaign. Including the season-opening win against Cal Poly, SCU also ended Stanford's 7-0 record with a 2-1 overtime win, and UCLA's 11-0 season with a 3-0 victory.

Osborne Strikes Early For Place in Recordbook

Leslie Osborne's goal against Fresno State became the sixth-fastest goal scored ever by a Bronco. She headed in her fifth goal of the season just 37 seconds after the match began. The fastest goal ever was notched just 15 seconds into a 1990 match against Sonoma State by Linda Hoffman.

Preseason All-Americans

Five players were named to Collegiesoccer.com's preseason all-America list, including three on the First Team, more than any other school in the nation. **Danielle Slaton**, **Anna Kraus** and **Aly Wagner** led the way, while **Devvyn Hawkins** was listed as a second team honoree and **Veronica Zepeda** earned honorable mention honors. North Carolina tied the Broncos by also naming five players to all three teams. Slaton was also named a preseason All-American by *Soccer Buzz*.

Zepeda, Tahmassian Combine for Five Goals

Taline Tahmassian registered three assists in her first weekend as a collegiate player, with all three passes resulting in goals scored by **Veronica Zepeda**. Zepeda returned the favor against San Jose State, registering an assist on Tahmassian's first collegiate goal. The two teamed again in the second week of the season, scoring against Florida State in the opening minutes of the second half. Additionally, this duo strikes early. Two goals came within a match's first six minutes, while two others came within the first five minutes of the second half.

Newcomers Outnumber Returning Letterwinners

With the graduation of six seniors and the loss of four more student-athletes, head coach **Jerry Smith** rearmed his squad with the largest recruiting class in Bronco history, signing eight freshmen to his roster during the spring. He gained four more players with three walk-ons and a transfer student-athlete.

Goalkeeper Roster Includes Former Volleyball Standout

After the graduation of school GAA career recordholder **Crystal Gordon** and the loss of her back up, **Alice Gleason**, goalkeeping coach **Eric Yamamoto** found himself with one back up and three newcomers as the last line of Bronco defense. Freshman **Alyssa Sobolik** has earned 15 starts, allowing seven goals for a .50 GAA. She missed three games since injuring her left knee in practice on Nov. 9 but returned for the NCAA Third Round. Junior **Erin Sharpe** has made nine starts and has allowed five goals for a .58 GAA. Also in the mix is freshman **Erin Pearson** and SCU volleyball school recordholder **Ynez Carrasco**. Although the 5-11 outside hitter has never played soccer prior to her spring tryouts, her athletic abilities on the volleyball court will add to the soccer team's depth at this position. She saw her first action of the season Oct. 9 against Fresno State when she was substituted in at the 78th minute. She did not record a save in 12 minutes of action and has seen 57 minutes total, preserving shutouts against Gonzaga and Colorado College.

Recruiting Class Named Fourth Best Nationally

Soccer Buzz Magazine named Santa Clara's 2001 recruiting class the fourth best in the nation. The Broncos' class—ranked first in the West Region for the second time since 1998—includes four *Parade* All-Americans. Santa Clara has been ranked nationally by *Soccer Buzz* during the last four seasons. The 2000 Bronco class ranked fourth best in the West and seventh in the nation while the 1999 class was picked ninth in the region and 33rd overall. In 1998, the magazine honored Santa Clara with the top pick nationally. The WCC was ranked sixth by *Soccer Buzz*, behind the ACC, Pac-10, Big East, Big 12 and SEC. Rounding out the top 10 leagues are the Big 10, Ivy League, WAC and Colonial Conferences.

Wagner Repeats WCC Player of the Month Selection

Aly Wagner was named the West Coast Conference's Women's Soccer Player of the Month for October after registering six goals and six assists to lead the league in both categories. She was also named the league's player of the month in September. Last month, Wagner led Santa Clara to a No. 2 national ranking with wins over three top-seven opponents. Wagner started every match and had a hand in at least one goal for six of those eight contests with a 2.25 points per game average. Three of her goals were game-winners: a free kick against Stanford in overtime, and another in the 89th minute to upset previously undefeated Saint Mary's. Wagner also netted two goals and assisted on a third in the Broncos' 3-0 win over previously unbeaten UCLA. She posted 22 shots on goal and averaged 4.88 shots per game. During the month, she earned two WCC Player of the Week honors, two Soccer Buzz Elite Team of the Week honors and three recognitions on the Soccer America Elite Team of the Week.

Wagner Earns Third WCC Player of the Week Honor

Aly Wagner was named the West Coast Conference's Women's Soccer Player of the Week for the third time this season, after scoring three goals and one assist this weekend in handing both No. 3 UCLA and No. 7 Saint Mary's the first losses of their seasons. Against the Bruins, Wagner had a hand in all three goals, assisting on Danielle Slaton's game-winner in the seventh minute. She added her own goals in the 55th and 70th minutes. On Sunday, she took a free kick 20 yards out in the 89th minute, kicking against the wind, but with enough finesse to bend it in for the game-winner.

Osborne Named WCC Player of the Week

Leslie Osborne was named the West Coast Conference's Player of the Week for her play against Fresno State and WCC opponents San Francisco and Gonzaga this past weekend. Osborne, the third freshman to earn the honor this season, scored four goals on five shots on goal and 12 shots overall while adding five assists. Against Fresno State, she scored just 37 seconds into the match, marking the sixth-fastest goal ever scored by a Bronco. She added two assists to her efforts that night. Against San Francisco, Osborne recorded a goal and an assist within five minutes of each other in SCU's 5-0 victory. She topped the weekend off against Gonzaga, assisting on the Broncos' first two scores, and then adding the Broncos third goal of the match as well as its final score in the 80th minute.

In his 15th season as head coach, **Jerry Smith** (CS Hayward '86) earned his sixth WCC Coach of the Year honor when he was named this year's co-recipient with Saint Mary's Paul Ratcliffe. Smith has compiled an overall record of 240-60-15 (.786) and earned his 50th WCC victory against Gonzaga in mid-October. Additionally, he has coached Santa Clara to 13 straight NCAA Tournament appearances and eight College Cups. The winningest coach in the program's history, Smith is fourth on the all-time NCAA coaching victory list. The Broncos have been ranked among the nation's Top 25 every season during Smith's coaching tenure and have finished among the Top 10 in each of the last 12 campaigns. In 1990, Santa Clara finished the season ranked first nationally. Additionally, he has coached 13 All-Americans, 11 U.S. National Team Players, eight Academic All-Americans and five WCC Freshmen of the Year, including last year's selection **Veronica Zepeda**. He coached 1999 National Player of the Year **Mandy Clemens**.

Beginning this season, the West Coast Conference has adopted an award that will reward the athletic programs within the league that have the top overall performances in conference play. The inaugural "Commissioner's Cup" is an all-sports award that utilizes a point system reflecting the finish of each team in conference standings to determine the top overall athletic program in the WCC. At the end of the year the league will present men and women's all-sports awards as well as the overall Commissioner's Cup to the top performing athletic program. The points will be awarded based on regular-season or conference championship finishes in the league's 13 sponsored sports, with eight points for the champion, seven for second-place and so on.

With that in mind, Smith challenged his player to win the conference championship not just for their team, but for the good of the entire athletic department. The girls requested some fun and Smith agreed to comply, not knowing what he was agreeing to until after the team captured the title. The Broncos won the WCC title on November 4 and during the team's trip to Champaign, Ill., selected players took Smith to a local mall for the dye job and an ear piercing, where a new diamond stud can be found in Smith's left ear. He has promised to maintain the coif through the season and already has scheduled a hair appointment for Monday, December 10. Santa Clara also won conference titles this year in women's cross country and men's soccer, while the men's cross country and volleyball teams placed second, giving the Broncos an 8.5-point lead at the conclusion of the fall sports season.
