South Carolina has seen its star rise again in the collegiate softball world, and head coach Beverly Smith has guided that process since arriving as head coach in July of 2010. She oversees all aspects of the program and works most closely on the field with the pitchers. As a head coach, Smith's overall record entering 2016 was 157-131, becoming only the second Gamecock softball coach with over 100 career wins.

The Gamecocks improved their record for the third-consecutive season in 2015, the only SEC program that can stake that claim. They also appeared in the NCAA Tournament for the third time under Smith. Three more offensive team records fell, including the home-run mark for the fourth-straight season. Now 24 team program marks have either been broken or re-broken by one of her squads. In per-game stats, Smith's teams now hold eight of the 16 categories tracked in the record book.

Smith's squad also produced its first NFCA All-American, as left fielder Alaynie Page garnered a first-team spot after setting five single-season school records and making the All-SEC First Team. Freshman Tiara Duffy also picked up SEC All-Freshman Team honors for South Carolina, who went 38-22 and finished tied for ninth in the grueling SEC.

For the second-consecutive season in 2014, South Carolina played in the NCAA Tournament, going 36-22 on the year. The Gamecocks saw four individual awards come their way after finishing eighth in the Southeastern Conference, led by Ashlyn Masters' second-team NFCA All-Southeast Region accolades. She posted 15 marks in the program's single-season charts, leading the team in 10 offensive categories. Nickie Blue and Kaylea Snaer made the SEC All-Freshman Team, with Blue also garnering recognition the inaugural NFCA Division I Freshman of the Year top-25 listing. Blue tied for the nation's lead in saves, while also topping the squad in innings and appearances.

The 2013 Gamecocks advanced into postseason play for the first time under Smith, earning spots in both the SEC and NCAA Tournaments. The Gamecocks set six team offensive records during the 34-25 campaign. The team scored a record 338 runs, held a .384 on-base percentage and slugged at a .450 clip. Closing the regular season with six wins in nine games, five coming on the road in SEC play, South Carolina defeated Kentucky in the first round. From there, the Gamecocks went to the Austin Regional, where they advanced to championship Sunday with two wins.

Samie Garcia became the second Gamecock under Smith to garner Easton All-America accolades, taking a first-team spot in 2013. Garcia also made the All-SEC second team, joining Lauren Lackey as Gamecocks under Smith to earn both honors. Garcia also garnered a selection in the fourth round of the National Pro Fastpitch Draft, the first Gamecock under Smith to receive that distinction.

Prior to coming to South Carolina, Smith served as the top assistant at North Carolina, working mostly with the pitchers and catchers. The final three years, she was the associate head coach after nine as an assistant. Smith helped the Tar Heels to two Atlantic Coast Conference titles in 2001 and 2008 and eight of their nine NCAA Tournament appearances. She served as the lead recruiter for the Tar Heels during that time, helping to bring in five All-Americans into the UNC program. She also helped North Carolina achieve a top-25 ranking in the USA Today/NFCA Coaches Poll at least once per season from 2006-10.

She coached a pitching staff that ranked in the top 10 in the nation in ERA in three of her final four seasons at North Carolina. Her top pupil was three-time All-American and two-time ACC Player of the Year Danielle Spaulding. During her final three seasons, Spaulding finished in the nation's top six in strikeouts per seven innings. In 2010, Spaulding was the toughest pitcher in the country to hit against, as she yielded just 2.61 hits per seven innings. In 2009, Spaulding led the country with 14.3 strikeouts per seven innings.

Smith's catchers also stood out in the ACC, with three claiming all-conference honors. Ally Blake and Brittany McKinney claimed spots in 2010 and 2009, respectively, while Natalie Anter made the list four times from 1999-2002. Anter also played in the 2004 Athens Olympics with the Italian national team.

A standout player for head coach Donna Papa before joining her staff, Smith was the 1994 ACC Player of the Year. A dual threat, Smith still ranks ninth in Tar Heel history in slugging percentage, second in triples, third in RBI, fifth in shutouts and seventh in ERA. Smith was honored as one of the top 50 softball players in ACC history during the league's 50th-anniversary celebration in 2002.

In addition to her coaching, Smith has been a speaker/clinician at many camps and conventions. She graduated from North Carolina in 1994 with a double major in speech communications and political science.

SOUTH CAROLINA TAKES THIRD STRAIGHT POSTSEASON TRIP TO TALLAHASSEE REGIONAL

- South Carolina begins the 2016 NCAA Tournament in the same place it has spent its last two Mays in the Tallahassee Regional.
- The Gamecocks take on American champ USF in the regional's first game at 12 noon EDT, with the SEC Network providing the coverage.
- The host and No. 8 national seed Florida State faces crosstown foe Florida A&M in Friday's other contest on ESPN3 and the WatchESPN app.
- The winners play on Saturday at 12 noon, with the losers playing the first of Saturday's elimination games at 2:30 p.m. at JoAnne Graf Field.

GAMECOCKS HAVE A RICH HISTORY IN NCAA TOURNAMENT

- South Carolina earned its 19th bid in the NCAA Tournament, its fourth straight under head coach Beverly Smith.
- The Gamecocks are 36-37 in those trips, making three Women's College World Series in their history (1983, 1989 and 1997).
- The program has five AIAW World Series trips in its history as well prior to 1982.
- This season's regional was SC's fourth trip to a regional in Tallahassee and the third straight year the Gamecocks have driven to Florida's capital city.

MORE ON THE TALLAHASSEE REGIONAL

- The Gamecocks, with an RPI of 25, had a better mark than seven of the No. 2 seeds at other sites.
- At 21 in the last RPI report, USF was the fifth-best No. 2 seed in the country, behind Baylor, Fresno State, Texas A&M and Minnesota.
- Florida State received the national No. 8 seed, with MEAC champ Florida A&M filling out the field.
- When looking at each site's top three seeds' average RPI, the Tallahassee Regional is the toughest at 17.3, besting the Lafayette Regional's average of 18.3.
- South Carolina made it to championship Sunday in the regional with two wins over USF, 2-0 in the regional opener and 6-0 in Saturday's second elimination game.
- The Seminoles won the regional, tossing a no-hitter to down Florida A&M on Friday night before besting the Gamecocks twice on Sat. (4-0) and Sun. (2-1).

SOUTH CAROLINA'S OFFENSE PRODUCING EARLY

- South Carolina's offense clicked early, and it starts with leadoff batters reaching base at a .409 clip.
- On 12 occasions did the Gamecocks not get the leadoff runner on more than once, including in eight losses: in series openers to No. 17/15 Kentucky, No. 12/12 Georgia and No. 3/3 Auburn, in the loss to Georgia Southern, in all three games at No. 14/15 LSU and in the SEC Tourney loss to No. 10/9 Tennessee.
- The quick start also translated into 55 first-inning runs, second most in a frame the Gamecocks have tallied (behind the 58 in the fourth).
- When the Gamecocks scored first, they are 26-6. More win-loss breakdowns are on pages 5 and 13.
- The Gamecocks led the SEC with 85 HBPs this year, which is the program's single-season record, breaking the previous best of 60 in 2013.
- Twelve came in two games, as six Gamecocks were hit against UNC Greensboro (2/19) and Michigan State (3/5).
- The Gamecocks struck out looking 58 times in 61 games, the third-lowest total in the SEC.
- South Carolina also tallied 82 RBI in 131 chances with a runner on third and less than two outs.
- That .626 conversion rate stood third in the league, behind Auburn (.656) and Tennessee (.632).
- Leading that charge was the trio of Alaynie Page (10-for-11), Krystan White (15-for-21) and Kennedy Clark (10-for-14).

GAMECOCKS HAVE SOLID PITCHING, DEFENSE TOO

- South Carolina's defense has been outstanding thus far, posting a .972 fielding percentage, which stands third in the SEC.
- That ranks third in Gamecock history, behind 1989 and 2007.
- Freshman Kenzi Maguire has helped the defense in her 45 starts at shortstop with 98 assists.
- In the circle, South Carolina has a team ERA of 2.82, which is the first time since 2008 that a Gamecock team held an ERA under 3.00.
- Gamecock pitching has allowed the third-lowest home runs per game (0.41) in the SEC, behind only Florida (0.31) and LSU (0.39).

SOUTH CAROLINA SOFTBALL HISTORICAL RECORD

- South Carolina has played 2,185 games in its softball history, going 1416-762-7 (.650) in its 41st season of sponsorship.

SNAER OWNS SC, SEC SINGLE-SEASON DOUBLES RECORD

- Junior first baseman Kaylea Snaer broke the SEC single-season record on Tuesday, April 26 against Furman with her 24th double of the year.
- The NCAA Division I leader in doubles, she earned a spot on the 2016 CoSIDA Academic All-District 4 team, the 17th Gamecock to garner selection.
- Snaer ended the season with 27 doubles after three in the Tallahassee Regional, tying for fourth in a single season in NCAA Division I history with five others.
- Six times, Snaer posted two doubles in a game, including in the elimination game win over No. 24/24 USF.
- Her double in game one at No. 14/15 LSU tied her with Georgia's Megan Wiggins (2011) and Tennessee's Kelli Fitzgerald (1998) for the SEC single-season record.
- She claimed South Carolina's record with a seventh-inning double against Georgia Southern on April 19.
- Snaer's biggest hit came in the seventh inning of the Gamecocks' SEC Tournament win.
- With two on and on an 0-2 count, Snaer hit her sixth homer of the year to tie the game against No. 17/15 Missouri, a game SC won an inning later on Taylor Williams' pinch-hit homer.
- Snaer saw a eight-game hitting streak end at USC Upstate, a streak that included multiple hits in each game, boosting her batting average at that time to a team-best .408.
- Snaer hit the game-winning home run in the eighth against No. 12/12 Georgia on Monday, March 21, clinching the series win.
- A year earlier, she ended a nine-inning contest with a single against No. 9/15 Tennessee, capturing the series for South Carolina.
- Snaer enters her senior year ranking first in SC history in doubles per game and walks per game and second in RBI per game.
- She is in the top 15 in a number of other categories (see full updates on page 12).

BLUE STARTING TO CLIMB GAMECOCK PITCHING CHARTS

- Junior Nickie Blue moved up on many career pitching charts in 2016, including eighth on the innings pitched and wins charts and seventh on the strikeouts listing.
- After her drop ball produced ground outs at a 65 percent rate (506-269) in her first two years on campus, Blue used a rise more often in 2016 but still tallied a 57 percent (271-203) ground-out rate.
- In 2015, Blue posted over 200 innings in the circle and an ERA under 2.00, one of two in the SEC to post such numbers (Lauren Haeger of Florida the other).
- Blue became the fourth Gamecock pitcher in history with back-to-back 200-inning years, joining Angie Lear (1990-91), Darlene Gareis (3 years, 1992-94) and Megan Matthews (4 years, 1999-2002) on that list.
- Blue tossed the first five innings of the no-hitter against Western Carolina on March 1, the first no-no for the Gamecocks since the second game of 2011.
- She added a one-hitter in a complete-game shutout of Troy on Sat., April 2, holding the nation's 17th-ranked scoring offense entering the weekend scoreless in six innings.
- Blue became the third pitcher to throw a shutout against Arkansas, holding the Razorbacks to three hits in the 14-0 (5) win on Friday night.
- She also tossed at two-hitter at No. 16/14 Missouri in SC's 3-1 win, which included forcing the Tigers' top-three batters to go 0-for-9 in the game.

SOUTH CAROLINA TEAM NOTES

- This South Carolina senior class owns a win over each SEC team in regular-season play, the first Gamecock group to accomplish this since the 2006 group beat its 10 SEC foes in four years.
- South Carolina pitchers Nickie Blue and Jessica Elliott combined for the first no-hitter in six years for the Gamecocks on Tues., March 1, blanking Western Carolina in a 1-0 victory.
- The Gamecocks posted a 10-game winning streak from Feb. 26-March 8, the second time under Beverly Smith and the fourth since the start of 1998 (others in 2002, 2009 & 2014).
- South Carolina is the only SEC team to improve its win total in each of the past three season, going from 23 wins in 2012 to 38 in 2015.
- Two of South Carolina's signees for next season, Cayla Drotar and Mackenzie Boesel, made the USA Today High School/American Family Insurance All-USA Preseason Softball Team.
- The Gamecocks started the season 9-1, the best start since the team went 12-1 to begin 2009.

SOME WIN-LOSS BREAKDOWNS

- The Gamecocks bring home 70.5 percent (74-of-105) of runners from third with less than two outs in wins and just 30.8 percent (8-of-26) in the 22 losses.
- With runners in scoring position, the Gamecocks hit .339 (136-of-401) in wins and .139 (22-of-158) in setbacks.
- That trend is more pronounced in bases loaded situations: .368 (21-of-57) versus .080 (2-of-25).
- South Carolina scored two runs or less 23 times, going 6-18 in those.
- All but two of those losses came against SEC foes (3 vs. No. 17/15 Kentucky, 1 vs. No. 12/12 Georgia, 2 at No. 3/3 Auburn, 2 vs. Mississippi, 3 at No. 14/15 LSU, 2 vs. No. 4/4 Alabama, 2 at No. 16/14 Missouri, vs. No. 10/9 Tennessee). The final two came against Florida State.
- South Carolina is 3-10 when not collecting an extra-base hit during a game.
- In games when the team has 10 or less total bases, the Gamecocks are 13-19.
- When the Gamecocks draw zero or one walk, they are 7-13.
- SC's pitchers do better with runners on in wins (.173, 72-of-416) than in losses (.303, 93-of-307).
- The other thing Gamecock pitching does better in wins is end innings, with foes batting .197 (58-of-295) in triumphs and .303 (54-of-178) in losses with two down.
- South Carolina is 18-3 when its foes don't record an extra-base hit, seven coming in shutouts.
- Other win-loss breakdowns can be found in the chart on page 13.

WE SCHEDULE TOUGH (AND THE SEC MAKES IT TOUGHER)

- The Gamecocks played 23 of their 55 regular-season games against teams who made the 2015 NCAA Tournament.
- Ten of those come against Women's College World Series participants, the season opener vs. Michigan and three each in SEC play at Auburn and LSU and at home against Alabama.
- A total of 37 of the Gamecocks' scheduled games came against teams that finished in the top 101 of the NCAA's Ratings Percentage Index last year.
- The Gamecocks played four defending regular-season conference champs: Michigan (Big Ten), Longwood (Big South), SIUE (Ohio Valley) and USC Upstate (Atlantic Sun).
- This year, three foes (Michigan, Longwood and USF [American]) claimed their league's titles.
- Against this year's NCAA Tournament field, the Gamecocks went 10-18, including going 3-16 against eight of the 16 national seeds.
- Versus teams ranked in the NFCA Top 25, SC went 7-18, with 23 of the 25 games coming against teams ranked 17 or better.
- That includes a 1-9 mark against the NFCA's top 10 at game time.
- Three former Gamecocks turned assistant coaches visited SC this spring: Chelsea Hawkins (UNC Greensboro), Kaela Jackson (Michigan State) and Chrissy Schoonmaker (Connecticut).

SINGLE-SEASON CHART MOVEMENTS

- Kaylea Snaer broke the program's single-season doubles record of 21, set by current volunteer assistant Tina Plew in 1995, and surpassed the SEC mark of 23 set by Georgia's Megan Wiggins (2011) and Tennessee's Kelli Fitzgerald (1998).
- Alaynie Page's next homer ties her with Debralee Troesh's 2003 total of 10 in fifth.
- Two RBI for Page ties her for sixth with two others, while four matches her production from last year, which stands fifth in SC history.
- One RBI for Snaer ties her with Page and two others in eighth.
- One sacrifice fly for Page, Snaer or Krystan White would put that person into a tie for seventh with seven others.
- Page's next free pass ties her with four others in 10th.
- The next walk to Kennedy Clark ties her with Page and two others in 14th for a year.
- The next stolen base for Page ties her with two others in 11th, while Alexis Mack is one from tying six in 15th.
- Jessica Elliott's next appearance ties three others in sixth, while two ties her with two in fourth.
- Elliott's next start ties her with two others in eighth, while two starts brings her even with two more in sixth.
- Blue's next save matches her NCAA-leading total from her freshman year of seven, which ranks second in program history.

2016 ACCOLADES AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR ALAYNIE PAGE

- Senior Alaynie Page is the only Gamecock in history with 20 home runs and 25 stolen bases in a career, ending her career with 33 blasts and 52 swipes.
- She tied McKenna Hughes for South Carolina's career home-run record (33) on Sat., April 30, part of her leading the Gamecocks to a 2-1 win over No. 4/4 Alabama.
- She scored both runs, going 2-for-2 with the homer and two walks against the Crimson Tide.
- She reached base at a .550 clip in the first five home games, stealing four bases, posting six RBI and hitting her second homer of the season.
- Her two home runs against No. 12/12 Georgia on Sun., March 20, the third time in her career to post two round-trippers in a game, helped the Gamecocks take the 5-4 win.
- She provided all the offense in the Charleston Southern win, posting the first run with an RBI single while walking, moving to second on a sacrifice, taking third on a wild pitch before scoring the game-winner on a passed ball.
- Page drove in four, including her seventh homer of the year, in the UNCW win.
- Page was selected as one of 30 candidates for the Senior CLASS Award, which stands for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School®.
- The returning first-team All-American also ranked as 50 players placed on the USA Softball National Player of the Year watch list.

ARD ADVANCING ON ALL FRONTS

- Six times, senior outfielder Ansley Ard produced the game-winning hit: vs. Coastal Carolina, Western Carolina, the first game against Buffalo, in the second Georgia game, vs. Furman and at No. 16/14 Missouri.
- Her grand slam against the Bulls propeled the Gamecocks to the 7-4 win, while she tied game two with an RBI bunt single.
- She hit a walk-off home run against the Bulldogs on Sunday night on the SEC Network, two innings after starting the rally that tied the game with a hit.
- Those moments helped Ard capture the SEC Player of the Week as well as the College Sports Madness Field Player of the Week on March 21-22.
- She had a two-out, two-run triple that provided the edge in the 4-1 win over Furman on April 26.
- Ard also went 2-for-3 with a two-RBI single that led the Gamecocks to a 3-1 win at No. 16/14 Missouri.
- For Ard, however, something bigger was when she learned she had made it into physical therapy school on the same day that she won the game vs. Coastal Carolina, which she started the week of the Tallahassee Regional.
- She's also quite proud of her one-inning appearance in the circle vs. Southern Utah on Feb. 26, picking up the win without allowing a run in her first pitching chance since high school.

CLARK LEADING GAMECOCK NEWCOMERS AT THE PLATE

- Freshman outfielder Kennedy Clark started all but two games during her freshman campaign.
- She ended the year second on the team on-base percentage (.430), doubles (11) and walks (26) while tying for third with four home runs and standing third with 36 RBI.
- Clark tied the program record with two round-trippers in the Ohio win.
- The freshman drove home 10 runners from third with less than two outs in 14 tries while also advancing runners at a .579 clip (70-for-121).

- Clark shared SEC Freshman of the Week honors for the week of March 6 with Kentucky's Abbey Cheek after hitting .588 with seven RBI, both team highs, in a 5-0 week.

OTHER NEWCOMER CONTRIBUTIONS FOR SOUTH CAROLINA

- The other four newcomers to the 2016 Gamecocks have all made their presence known.
- Junior Jessica Elliott went 18-10 with a 2.77 ERA in 47 appearances.
- Alexis Mack, a freshman who set Ohio high school's all-time stolen base record, finished second on the team in stolen bases (14), runs scored (35) and batting average (.341).
- Mack moved up runners at a .587 clip, second on the team, hitting mainly in the No. 2 spot in her 40 starts. Her team-best eight sacrifice bunts has helped in this situation.
- Freshman Kenzi Maguire started 45 games at shortstop and led the team with 15 HBPs, second in a single season at South Carolina.
- Mack, Maguire and Clark, hitting 2-3-4 in the lineup, combined to go 15-for-23 in wins over UConn and Kennesaw State, scoring nine runs and driving in eight as a group.
- Finally, Lex Hull is 6-for-31 and has started behind the plate in eight Gamecock wins.

GAMECOCKS OFF THE DIAMOND

- The 2015 Gamecocks posted the team's best GPA at 3.442.
- Thirteen Gamecocks garnered NFCA Scholar-Athlete honors in 2014-15, the most in the past five seasons.
- Victoria Williams became the 16th Gamecock selection to CoSIDA's Academic All-District team with her pick last year.
- Off the 2015 roster with 22 students, 19 Gamecocks earned SEC Academic Honor Roll nods last year.
- Sophomore Jordyn Augustus is one of 15 South Carolina students on the Columbia campus selected to participate in the Carolina Leadership Initiative for this academic year.
- Many Gamecocks have been on mission trips during their summers, including Augustus, Effie Manahan and Macey Webb.
- Gamecock signees Mackenzie Boesel, Cayla Drotar and Alexis Lindsey, during their official visit this fall, joined the team and community helping Columbia recover from the historic floods that devastated the Midlands in early October.
- The softball team has won the department's Community Outreach Team of the Year twice under Bev Smith in 2011 and 2013.

GAMECOCKS HAVE MEMORABLE WEEKEND IN SERIES WIN AT ARKANSAS

- Both of South Carolina's wins at Arkansas came with notes galore.
- Friday night's 14-0 win in five innings marked the largest margin of victory for the Gamecocks in SEC play and the most runs scored in an SEC game by South Carolina.
- The Gamecocks tallied 19 hits, also a high mark in SEC play.
- Eleven different Gamecocks had hits, including all nine of the starters.
- On Saturday, the Gamecocks rebounded from a 5-1 deficit to take a 7-5 win, scoring five runs in the seventh to complete the comeback.
- That's the first win for SC when entering the seventh trailing since March 30, 2014, when the Gamecocks came back to down Mississippi on Sunday 7-6 with a pair of bases-loaded walks.
- Sophomore Krystan White drove in the game-winning run with her first career triple.
- The Gamecocks won their fifth-consecutive series against the Razorbacks, including their third straight at Bogle Park.
- The series win also stretches a streak of gaining at least one road SEC series win to four years.

WHITE HITS HER WAY INTO LINEUP

- Sophomore Krystan White has hit her way into the lineup this spring, starting with a career-best day against Winthrop, going 3-for-4 with a homer and five RBI against the Eagles.
- She ended up drawing 46 starts and played all four spots in the infield.
- She drove in 15 runners from third with less than two outs in 21 tries.
- She tied her career high with a 3-for-4 Saturday against Troy while adding three RBI in the series finale.
- Her first career triple capped the seventh-inning comeback in the Saturday win at Arkansas.

OFFENSIVE RECORDS FALLING REGULARLY FOR GAMECOCKS UNDER SMITH

- In head coach Beverly Smith's first six years, the Gamecocks have broken team offensive records 25 times (tracked on page 15 in these notes), already adding to the total this year.

- This year, the Gamecocks have been hit 81 times, already tops in SC history.
- South Carolina snapped four more team offensive records in 2015: home runs (60), HR per game (1.00), on-base percentage (.391) and slugging percentage (.473).
- Smith's teams have set the home run and slugging percentage records in four-straight seasons and the on-base percentage mark in each of the last three.
- While not a record, the Gamecocks have hit .291 over the past four seasons, 75 points higher than the year before Smith came to Columbia.

GAMECOCK PITCHING MAKING STRIDES

- Beverly Smith's pupils in the circle have improved greatly in her first five seasons.
- Gamecock pitching has improved its strikeout-to-walk ratio in each of the past three seasons.
- Junior Nickie Blue, who led the nation in saves as a freshman, posted over 200 innings in the circle and an ERA under 2.00 in 2015, one of two in the SEC to post such numbers (Lauren Haeger of Florida the other).
- Blue's 165 strikeouts last season rank 14th in Gamecock history.
- Graduate Julie Sarratt put her name in the career top 10 for pitchers in eight major categories, including a tie for third in appearances (142).

ROSTER NOTES

- Seven position player starters return for the Gamecocks from last year's squad.
- SC lost four seniors who combined to start 143 games, including every start at catcher and 57 of 60 starts in centerfield.
- Every major offensive category leader from 2015 returns for the Gamecocks, 14 of those by Alaynie Page.
- The Gamecocks return over 70 percent of its offense in most categories, from 79.9 percent of their walks to 71.7 percent of the home runs.
- The highest percentage lost in any offensive category is triples at 37.5, with five of those by Kristen Struett.
- Forty of the Gamecocks' 41 stolen bases return.
- In the circle, 53.1 percent of the innings return, most by staff ace Nickie Blue.
- Blue also brings back 61.4 percent of the team's strikeouts.
- Five newcomers join the squad, led by NJCAA Pitcher of the Year Jessica Elliott.
- The team is dominated by South Carolina natives, with 25 percent of the roster (five players) hailing from the Palmetto State. California is second with four players.
- The Gamecocks hail from 11 states this year, with the newcomers coming from California, Florida, Kentucky and Ohio.
- Nickie Blue and Hayley Copeland are the first Gamecock duo who are both over six-feet tall.
- While both Williams' and juniors by class, Taylor and Victoria are not sisters.

SOUTH CAROLINA BATTING AROUND IN 2016

- On 12 occasions, the Gamecocks sent nine or more batters to the plate.
- Three of those came in one game, a 21-4 (5) victory over Southern Utah (2/26).

- Broken down by site, the Gamecocks are 50-88 (.362) at home, 20-125 (.138) on the road and 43-60-1 (.418) in neutral-site outings.
- This year, the Gamecocks went 7-18 against foes ranked at game time, including winning the series at home against No. 12/12 Georgia.
- Last season, SC went 6-16 against foes ranked by the NFCA at game time, including two wins over both No. 9 Tennessee and No. 14 Kentucky.
- The South Carolina series win over Tennessee was the Gamecocks' first series win over a top-10 foe since 2009 (No. 4 Alabama).

SOUTH CAROLINA STAFF HAS TOP CREDENTIALS

- Gamecock head coach Beverly Smith has been a part of 11 NCAA Tournament teams as a coach (eight at UNC, three at South Carolina).
- Associate head coach Lisa Navas has been to five NCAA Tournaments as an assistant coach (three at SC, one each at UNC and Missouri) and eight as a head coach (six Division II at Barry, two at NC State). Her 1998 Barry squad played in the national championship game.
- Assistant coach Calvin Beamon has three titles to his credit as a player, the biggest a College World Series title at Texas during 2005.
- He also won the NJCAA Division I title in 2003 at the College of Southern Nevada and a high school state championship at Smoky Hill High School in Cherry Creek, Colo.
- Volunteer assistant Tina Plew Whitlock played on the last Gamecock team to make the Women's College World Series and has coached teams to the NCAA Tournament at the Division II level.

SOUTH CAROLINA HAS PERFORMED WELL IN SEC TOURNAMENT PLAY

- For the 14th year and fourth in a row under Beverly Smith, South Carolina earned a spot in the SEC Tournament field.
- The Gamecocks are 17-18 all-time in the event, winning the title in 1997 and 2000.
- Since the event shifted to a single-elimination setup, SC has gone 2-4, winning opening-round games in 2013 (at No. 18 Kentucky) and 2015 (vs. No. 22 Texas A&M).

PAGE SOARED IN 2015

- Last season, left fielder Alaynie Page became the first Gamecock under head coach Beverly Smith to earn NFCA All-America accolades, garnering a spot on the first team.
- Page also gained first-team All-SEC honors from the coaches, the second under Smith (Lauren Lackey, 2012).
- First-team All-SEC honorees Page and Auburn's Emily Carosone finished 2015 in the top 40 in the country in batting average, on-base percentage and slugging percentage.
- Page led the team in 12 offensive categories, including batting average (.446), slugging percentage (.826), runs (58), hits (82), doubles (11), triples (7), home runs (15) and RBI (45).
- The Gamecocks' leadoff hitter reached base 61.5 percent of the time she's led off an inning.
- Only on three occasions did she not reach base safely in a game (Western Carolina 2/26, No. 21/20 Missouri 3/9, at No. 14/16 Kentucky-1 4/18).
- Page moved runners up at a team-best 60.8 percentage in 79 opportunities.

SOME OF LAST YEAR'S MILESTONES IN SEC PLAY

- For the second-consecutive year, South Carolina won at least half of its SEC three-game series, marking the seventh time it's happened since the advent of the three-game series in 2001 (2001-03, '05, '07, '14).
- The five series wins in 2015 was last done in 2005, when the team took six of eight three-game sets.
- That included series wins over No. 9 Tennessee and No. 14 Kentucky.
- The victories at Kentucky marked the first SEC series victory for the Gamecocks on the road at a ranked team.
- South Carolina won its final four series, including two road series triumphs at Kentucky and Mississippi.

AWARDS POURED IN FOR 2015 GAMECOCKS

- Alaynie Page became South Carolina's first NFCA All-American in 16 years when she earned a first-team nod.
- She also garnered first-team All-SEC honors, while Tiara Duffy gained a spot on the SEC All-Freshman Team in the utility spot.
- Page ranked as the only Gamecock on the NFCA All-Southeast Region team.
- Macey Webb gained a spot on the 2015 SEC Softball Community Service Team.
- Nickie Blue claimed the SEC Pitcher of the Week honor on March 16, 2015.

THIS IS HOW TOUGH 2015 WAS (ESPECIALLY IN THE SEC)

- The Gamecocks played 30 games against teams who made the 2015 NCAA Tournament, with SC going 13-17 in those games.
- The Gamecocks went 22-19 against teams with RPI marks in the top 100, including five wins over top-25 squads (Cal at 20, two vs. Tennessee at 9, two at Kentucky at 25).
- A total of 41 of the Gamecocks' scheduled games came against teams that finished in the top 100 of the NCAA's Ratings Percentage Index last year. Of those, 26 were against RPI top-50 teams.
- South Carolina faced regular-season champs from the SEC (Florida), ACC (Florida State), American (UCF), Conference USA (Western Kentucky), Atlantic Sun (USC Upstate) and Big South (Longwood) as well as the tourney champs of the Sun Belt (South Alabama).

GAMECOCKS VS. RANKED OPPONENTS (TOP 5 ON THE ROAD)

- South Carolina is 2-27 against top-five opposition on the road, with one win being the 3-2 victory at No. 3/3 Arizona State on Feb. 27, 2014.

GAMECOCKS TAKE MOMENTUM INTO POSTSEASON WITH SERIES WIN OVER MISSISSIPPI STATE

- The three home runs in Sunday's win all came in the third inning, the first time under Beverly Smith that the Gamecocks had three round-trippers in the same frame.

SOUTH CAROLINA TAKES ADVANTAGE OF ENDING SCHEDULE

- South Carolina also defeated No. 9/15 Tennessee in two of three games, the first series triumph over a top-10 ranked foe under Beverly Smith.
- The series wins over four-straight foes matches the 2002 group's victories over Tennessee, Auburn, Georgia and Kentucky in consecutive series.
- The wins at Kentucky and Mississippi matches the 2013's squad, which won its final two road series at Auburn and at Mississippi State.

GAMECOCKS WIN PAIR AT OLE MISS

- The Gamecocks last scored 10 runs twice against an SEC opponent in a year against Kentucky in a doubleheader sweep in Lexington on April 3, 2005.
- It's only the third time in history the Gamecocks have scored 10 twice against an SEC opponent in a year, the first coming vs. Kentucky in 1997.

SUSPENDED GAME NOTE IN SEC PLAY

- Friday's game was suspended in the second inning due to lightning and rain, the second-straight year for that to happen at home in SEC play.
- The April 19, 2014 game vs. LSU also was halted on Friday in the fourth and completed Saturday.

GAMECOCKS TAKES SERIES WIN VS. TENNESSEE

- South Carolina took two-of-three games from No. 9/15 Tennessee over March 13-15, the first series win over a top-10 SEC team for Gamecock head coach Beverly Smith.
- Nickie Blue garnered SEC Pitcher of the Week accolades after her two wins over the Lady Vols, shutting out the high-powered UT offense in Friday's triumph.
- The Gamecocks run-ruled Tennessee on Friday night, the first time UT had lost a shortened game since the 2010 NCAA Women's College World Series.
- Friday's win ended South Carolina's 28-game losing streak to Tennessee that dated back to 2003.

FIRST TRIP TO THE NUTTER CLASSIC FOR SC A SUCCESS

- The Gamecocks went 3-2 in the trip to the Palm Springs area, picking up two wins over Pac-12 foes in consecutive games.
- South Carolina downed Stanford 6-2 and No. 21/20 California 3-1 in the event, marking the first time the Gamecocks had two wins over a Pac-12 team in the same season since 2007 (W's over Oregon in 2007 Columbia Regional).
- When was the last time SC beat two different members of the current Pac-12 in a year? 1996 (W 2-1 vs. Utah, W 1-0 vs. No. 1 Arizona).
- Never before had South Carolina beaten two different Pac-12 teams in the same weekend.
- Overall, Sarratt and Blue combined for a 2.06 ERA, the sixth-best mark in the 35-team event.
- For the second-straight year, Gamecock head coach Beverly Smith challenged her team with a trip over the continental divide that included games against two ranked foes.
- This year, as part of the Mary Nutter Collegiate Classic in Cathedral City, Calif., the Gamecocks took on No. 9/8 Florida State and No. 21/20 California.
- Last season, South Carolina faced No. 3 Arizona State and No. 19 Minnesota in Tempe, Ariz.

GAMECOCKS PICKED TO FINISH 10TH IN SEC PRESEASON POLL

- In a poll of the SEC coaches, South Carolina was picked to finish 10th in 2015.
- Last season, the Gamecocks finished in a tie for eighth, three spots better than what the league's coaches predicted in the preseason.
- Of note, all nine teams picked ahead of SC appeared in both preseason national rankings.
- Defending national champion Florida was the coaches' selection to take the 2015 league crown.
- The past two years, the SEC has sent 11 teams into the NCAA Tournament, with two of the last three NCAA champions hailing from the league.

GAMECOCKS KNOW A LOT ABOUT THE BIG SOUTH

- Coastal Carolina will be the sixth Big South foe on the Gamecocks' schedule this season, matching last year's tally of foes from the league.

- Part of a long line of facility upgrades for South Carolina, Carolina Softball Stadium at Beckham Field hosted its first games in the spring of 2013.
- The Gamecocks opened their \$8 million facility on March 15, 2013, against defending national champion Alabama.
- All three games during opening weekend had a maximum capacity of 830 fans.
- Throwing out the first pitch on Friday night was Mitzi Beckham, who along with her husband David, continue to be honored by having the field named after them.
- Head women's basketball coach Dawn Staley and head football coach Steve Spurrier also helped out on opening weekend, throwing out first pitches on Saturday and Sunday, respectively.
- South Carolina got its first win in Carolina Softball Stadium history with a 5-0 shutout of Appalachian State on April 3, 2013.
- Carolina Softball Stadium at Beckham Field has a seating capacity of 1,305, with full capacity including standing room at 1,480. **This season, over 800 season tickets have been sold.**
- The stadium sits on the same site that the Gamecock Softball team has called home since 1983.
- Home plate has been in the same spot since the beginning of the 1997 season, when the former structure was built to usher in Southeastern Conference play.
- All time, South Carolina is 571-222-2 (.719) on the site. Since being renamed Beckham Field in 1998, the Gamecocks own a 294-169 (.635) mark on the field.
- A year after playing 17 games at home, the second-lowest mark in 16 years, the 2014 Gamecocks fell one postseason game shy from tying the 2002 team's record with 36 home games.
- The Gamecocks drew even with the 1997 team's win total of 27 wins, the second most in the field's history. The Gamecocks went 27-8 at Carolina Softball Stadium in 2014.
- Out of those 36 home games, South Carolina posted a shutout in 13 of them. One loss even saw the Gamecocks throw a one-hitter (vs. No. 16/19 Minnesota, 3/19). Another loss came in a 1-0 extra-inning game (vs. Longwood 4/26)
- In the 29 home dates in 2014, the Gamecocks posted paid crowds over 1,000 in 22 of them.
- Carolina Softball Stadium at Beckham Field hosted the 2014 SEC Softball Tournament, won by Georgia for the first time. All five sessions of the event had attendance marks over 1,100, with Saturday's finals on ESPN2 hitting the stadium's capacity with standing room filled at 1,480.
- All nine games of the SEC Softball Tournament were on the ESPN family of networks, giving the program and stadium national exposure over those four days.

SOME PEOPLE LOVED HOME COOKING; OTHERS SHINED ON THE

ROAD IN '14

- Ashlyn Masters tended to like playing at home, posting a .400 batting average and a .730 slugging percentage in Carolina Softball Stadium at Beckham Field against .311 and .527, respectively, away from home.
- Ansley Ard also hit better at home (.415/.492/.566 vs. .235/.297/.324).
- Chelsea Hawkins (.436 OBP vs. .242) reached base more often at home.
- Olivia Lawrence exhibited more power at home (.724 slugging percentage in 29 AB vs. .278 in 18).
- Brooke Barnhill scored 10 runs in 19 appearances away from Columbia, while she's scored only seven times in 24 home playing chances.
- Both of South Carolina's primary pitchers had ERAs under 2.05 at home and over 4.15 outside of the SEC's newest stadium.
- Helping home ERAs was the 190:79 K:BB ratio at Beckham Field compared to a 86:93 mark away.

NOTABLES FROM EARLIER

- The Gamecocks won their first game at Georgia since March 28, 2001 in the first game of the April 5 doubleheader.
- South Carolina's 3-2 win at No. 3/3 Arizona State marked the first win (and second all-time) at a top-five team's park since March 13, 2004, a 6-4 win in nine innings at LSU.
- South Carolina swept Mississippi at home over March 29-30, the first SEC home series sweep since the Rebels' last visit in 2011.
- The four double plays in the Florida Atlantic win (2/16) is believed to be a school record, as it matches what was once listed but could not be verified.
- This year's 14-2 start is bettered only by a 12-1 mark by the 2009 team in the last six years of Gamecock Softball. The 2007 Gamecocks went 24-3, the best start since the first year of SEC play.

BRING ON (OR BACK) THE DOUBLEHEADERS IN SEC PLAY

- Three times in 2014, the Gamecocks had to play Saturday doubleheaders to ensure completing a three-game series.
- South Carolina went 5-1 in those games, sweeping twinbills from Texas A&M and Mississippi at home before splitting the double dip at No. 15/17 Georgia.
- Friday nights were unkind, with the Gamecocks dropping all seven games started on the final day of the work week in SEC play.

Gamecocks With A First in 16th SEC Season

For the first time since the inception of Southeastern Conference softball in 1997, South Carolina did not post a defensive error in a three-game series. The format of most league series since 2001, the April 20-22 weekend against Tennessee marked the first time the Gamecocks played errorless softball in a weekend set. The previous two times the Gamecocks did that in a single-day doubleheader-only series in SEC play were also against Tennessee, in 2007 and a rain-shortened series in 2009. Remarkably, in all seven of those games, South Carolina came out on the wrong side.

TV Turnaround in 2013?

South Carolina went 0-2 on the small screen in 2012, losing two hard-fought, one-run contests. First was a 1-0 game at Florida on March 17 shown on Sun Sports, while the season finale at Mississippi went the Rebels way, 3-2. In 2011, the Gamecocks went 2-5 on the small screen.

Gamecocks Not Scared Against Top Team

In 15 matchups all-time against the nation's number-one team, the Gamecock softball program has gone 3-12, including winning the first three contests against them. But since UCLA came back to win the "if" game in the 2002 No. 1 Regional, the Gamecocks have not taken down a top-ranked

team in softball since, including seven losses to top-ranked SEC teams. This is just the third No. 1 team to come to Beckham Field, behind UCLA in 2002 and Georgia back on March 16.

If the team needs inspiration, the members just have to look around campus. In the 2010 calendar year, three South Carolina teams knocked off No. 1. On January 26, men's basketball dropped Kentucky, while baseball took out Arizona State on June 22 en route to the NCAA championship. And football dismantled Alabama on October 9 at Williams Brice Stadium. Last weekend, the baseball team took two out of three from then-No. 1 Florida in Gainesville.
