Upcoming Series

No. 24-ranked Stanford (4-3), after being swept at No. 3-ranked Texas this past weekend, will have a busy week playing five games in Northern California, of which four will count. The team played an exhibition Tuesday with Rikkyo Japan, which they won 4-2, and then will play at UC Davis on Thursday and host UC Santa Barbara this weekend. This weekend the Cardinal returns home for a three-game series with another Big West team, UC Santa Barbara (2-2), on Friday at 5:30 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday at 1 p.m. The team will then be off until March 19 for finals. The weekend rotation has also been set with RHP Jordan Pries (1-1, 4.85), LHP Scott Snodgrass (0-1, 4.50) and LHP Brett Mooneyham (0-1, 6.97) going for Stanford against UC Santa Barbara's LHP Mario Hollands (1-0, 0.00), RHP Nick Loredo (0-0, 5.68) and LHP Nick Capito (0-1, 1.23).

Stanford, after entering the series in Austin averaging 9.5 runs per game, scored just five runs against one of the nation's toughest pitching staffs.

About UC Davis

UC Davis, which lost to Nevada on Monday, dropped two of three to Brigham Young last weekend after taking two of three from Utah to open the season. The Aggies also beat Cal 8-0 in a midweek affair.

Through the first eight games this season, Daniel Cebin has a .379 average, while Scott Lyman is hitting .357. Rex Peters' club is batting .287 as a team, with a .963 fielding percentage. On the mound, UCD has a 3.12 ERA and a .259 opponent batting average. Justin Schafer is the team's leading returning hitter, batting .338 last year. UCD is coming off a 13-42 campaign reaching its first Division-I NCAA Regional in 2008. Stanford leads the all-time series 43-13. The Aggies are picked to finish last in the Big West, UCSB sixth.

About UC Santa Barbara

The Gauchos, behind head coach Bob Brontsema, are coming off a win over LMU on Tuesday and enter the game at 3-2 on the season. Brontsema is eight wins away from becoming the school's all-time win leader. UCSB is hitting .296 as a team with a 2.49 ERA and .989 fielding percentage paced by Ryan Palermo's .385 average and Shane Arslan's .353 mark. Stanford leads the all-time series 28-19. This is the

Team Leaders

Second baseman Colin Walsh, who hit his first career homer, a grand slam against Pacific last week, leads the team with a .375 average. First baseman Jonathan Kaskow is batting .353, while freshman infielder Kenny Diekroeger has a .350 mark.

Out of Left Field

• Rikkyo University out of Japan plays an exhibition with the Cardinal this week. Coach Mark Marquess, as the head coach of Team USA defeated Japan in the gold medal game at the 1988 Olympics.

In the Rankings

• The Cardinal dropped to No. 24 in Baseball America and the USA Today Coaches Poll and to No. 27 in Collegiate Baseball. The second week of the season they achieved a ranking of No. 18. The Cardinal began the season ranked as high as No. 25 nationally in USA Today in the preseason.

Leading Off

• Stanford after a 4-0 start, averaging 9.5 runs per game and a .336 average, the team hit under .200 and scored just five runs at No. 3 Texas.
• The Cardinal return five starters from last year's club that won 30 games (30-25), but were left outside the field of 64 and the NCAA Regional Tournament.
• Three sophomores, RHP Jordan Pries, LHP Scott Snodgrass and LHP Brett Mooneyham will begin the year in the weekend rotation. Pries and Mooneyham had 22 starts last year, Snodgrass was a spot starter.
• Three freshmen from Baseball America's second-rated recruiting class are regular starters, CF Jake Stewart, 1B/LF Stephen Piscotty and SS Kenny Diekroeger, while OF Tyler Gaffney has seen time in all seven games with one start.

• Mark Marquess '69 enters his 34th season as the Clarke and Elizabeth Nelson Director of Baseball. He has an overall record of 1356-694-7, producing 2 NCAA titles (1987, 1988), 7 Super Regionals (six titles), 14 College World Series, 25 NCAA Regionals and 12 conference titles. He is one of just 10 coaches to have played and coached in a CWS, doing so while a player in 1967. He also won a Gold medal as the head coach of the 1998 Seoul Olympic team and won a gold medal at the 1967 Pan Am Games. He carries a 120-55 (.686) postseason record and 36-25 CWS mark.

Longtime Lieutenant

• Fellow alum, Dean Stotz '75, has been with Marquess for all 33 years. In his current role, he is the team's primary hitting coach, since 1997. He has developed such Major Leaguers as Carlos Quentin, Johnny Bench Award winner Ryan Garko, Sam Fuld, Jody Gerut and Jed Lowrie. From 1993 to 1996 he was the team's pitching coach, working with Cardinal stars Kyle Peterson, Chad Hutchinson and Jeff Austin.

Pitching

• Veteran coach Rusty Filter, who spent the last 17 years at San Diego State will serve as the team's pitching coach. San Diego State led the Mountain West Conference in ERA in six of the league's first 10 seasons, ranking in the top-three in each of those years. Individually, four players were named the MWC's Pitcher of the Year, including Stephen Strasburg the last two years (2008, 2009), Bruce Billings (2005), and Scott Shoemaker (2004). In 2009, four of his hurlers--Cincinnati's Aaron Harang, St. Louis' Royce Ring, Boston's Jason Masterson and San Francisco's Alex Hinshaw, pitched in the Majors.

On the bases

• Dean Stotz '75 will be the third base coach and Mario Iglesias '96, the starting pitcher of the team's 1996 CWS team, will coach first base.

Coaches of Note

• Two of the Cardinal's national title stars from the 1987 and 1988 are in opposing dugouts, David Esquer (Cal) and Ed Sprague (Pacific). Esquer was the starting shortstop for the 1987 club, while Sprague was the starting third baseman for both the 1987 and 1988 clubs. Sprague also won a World Series title with the Blue Jays.

Cardinal Win First Midweek Game

• Junior Colin Walsh picked a good time for his first career home run, as his grand slam in the sixth gave No. 18-ranked Stanford (4-0) the lead for good in an 11-6 victory over visiting Pacific (2-2) on Wednesday evening. The all-conference second baseman and returning starter at second base was playing in his 91st game in a Cardinal uniform. The game saw five lead changes thru six innings when Walsh connected on his slam to right field to make it 8-5.

Stanford Swept in Texas

• No. 18-ranked Stanford were swept in a three-game series at No. 3-ranked Texas (L 0-6, L 3-6, L 2-8). In the opener, it was a pitcher's duel early, as Jordan Pries trailed just 1-0 until a fifth inning grand slam opened up the series opener. On Saturday, Scott Snodgrass could not get out of the fourth inning after Stanford closed to within 4-3. On Sunday, Stanford after giving up three runs in the first, closed to 3-2, before Brett Mooneyham gave up a two-run homer and a balk to seal the sweep for Texas. Stanford, which came in averaging 9.5 runs per game, hit just .189 for the series, scoring five runs. Colin Walsh was a bright spot hitting .444.

Glad to See Ya

• The Texas series continues a series dating back to 1998, while the Cardinal will host Rice (1991), UC Santa Barbara (1997) and Pepperdine (1992) for the first time in three-game series since the 1990's. The three-game series at Long Beach State, long-time playoff rivals, will be the first three-game series between the two California programs.

Veteran Middle

• Veteran catcher Zach Jones (126 games), shortstop Jake Schlender (129) and second baseman Colin Walsh (94) make up an experienced middle of the diamond.

Stanford Professionals

The Cardinal featured 11 players in the Major Leagues in 2009, including the 83rd player to go to Stanford and player in the Majors, John Hester, who made his debut for another Cardinal great, A.J. Hinch, who was his manager for the Diamondbacks.

Down on the Farm

Three former Stanford Cardinal, 2009 first round pick Drew Storen, outfielder Michael Taylor and catcher Jason Castro, were each named the top prospects for their respective teams by Baseball America. Storen was noted as the best pitcher in the Nationals system, while Taylor and Castro were the top hitting prospects for the Phillies and Astros, respectively. Taylor, who is now with the A's, was noted as the No. 2 prospect in Oakland's organization after getting traded.

World Champions

Since Tillie Shafer in 1912 and 1913 with the New York Giants, 16 former players have appeared in the Fall Classic, winning a combined 12 rings. Former Yankee Bobby Brown won four titles with the Yankees in the 1940s and 1950s, while Ed Sprague won back-to-back titles with the Blue Jays in the 1990s. Sprague also part of Stanford's CWS national title runs.

Award Winners

Former greats Jim Lonborg (1967) and Jack McDowell (1993) have each won Cy Young Awards. Bob Boone won a gold glove at catcher seven times from 1978 to 1989 and Mike Mussina was a gold glove winner from 1996 to 2008, seven times. Lonborg (1967), Boon (1976, 78, 79, 83), Ed Sprague (1991), McDowell (1991-93), Mussina (1992-94, 97-98) and Carlos Quentin were all All-Stars.

Gerhart Enters Draft... to the NFL

- Two-sport standout Toby Gerhart, following his Heisman Trophy runner-up performance on the gridiron has withdrawn from the university to focus on the upcoming NFL Draft. Gerhart hit .288 last year with seven home runs and 36 RBIs. He twice set the school-record for rushing over the past two years and this year led the nation in rushing touchdowns (28), while running for 1,871 yards (143.9 yards per game). Despite winning the Doak Walker Award, for the nation's top running back, he finished 28 points behind Alabama's own back, Mark Ingram for the Heisman.

Cardinal Picked Fourth by Pac-10 Coaches

- Stanford Baseball was picked to finish fourth in the preseason Pacific 10 Conference coaches poll. The Cardinal received 59 points, behind three-time defending champion, Arizona State (78 points and 7 first place votes), Oregon State (67, 2) and UCLA. The rest of the Pac-10 preseason picks are: Arizona (fifth), Washington State, Cal, USC, Washington and Oregon.

Preseason All-Conference

- Outfielder Kellen Kiilsgaard, who hit .313 last year and Brett Mooneyham, who went 6-3 as the team's top starter in 2009, were picked by Baseball America as pre-season all-conference selections. Kiilsgaard was a first team pick a year ago, while SS Jake Schlender and 2B Colin Walsh also made the all-conference team. Mooneyham, only a sophomore, is slated as the second-best prospect in the 2011 draft by Baseball America in the conference. Kiilsgaard and Colin Walsh are both preseason all-conference picks by Rivals.com

Don't Run on Them

- According to a survey by Baseball America, shortstop Jake Schlender, the Pac-10's Defensive Player of the Year, is again the best defensive shortstop in the conference. Combo mate, second baseman Colin Walsh is noted as the best defensive second baseman. Schlender is also noted as the infielder with the best arm. Kellen Kiilsgaard is noted as the outfielder with the best arm and the best defensive outfielder. Zach Jones, who was not listed, threw out 40 percent of would-be base stealers last year.

Youngsters Gain Notice

- Baseball America rated Stanford's incoming baseball class second nationally for recruiting coordinator Dean Stotz and head coach Mark Marquess, both in their 34th years at Stanford. The publication noted that "Stanford's class is rich with players who have the potential to be major league stars if everything breaks right; the key for the Cardinal will be developing those talents on an accelerated timetable."

Mooneyham Getting Noticed

- Sophomore LHP Brett Mooneyham has begun to get noticed across the nation following freshman All-American honors in 2009. He is listed as one of three preseason all-conference candidates by Baseball America in a pitching rich Pac-10, and according to former BA writer Allan Simpson, now a part of pgcrosschecker.com, he is the 21st overall collegiate prospect for the 2011 draft. Baseball America lists Mooneyham as the 15th-best sophomore in the country.

Young Trio Garner Best in the Conference

- Freshmen Kenny Diekroeger (1st), Jake Stewart (5th) and Mark Appel (7th) are rated by Baseball America as three of the top newcomers in the Pac-10 Conference according to their preseason publication. Stewart is listed as the conference's best athlete. The trio are also rated as the fourth, sixth and 17th-best freshmen in the country.

Nice Summer Away from the Farm

- Three Stanford baseball players, outfielder Kellen Kiilsgaard and pitchers Alex Pracher and Scott Snodgrass, were named to Baseball America's annual list of top prospects across various summer leagues. Snodgrass and Kiilsgaard were rated as

the No. 4 and No. 7 best prospects in the Alaska Summer League, while Pracher was the No. 7-best prospect in the Atlantic Collegiate League. Snodgrass (Yucaipa, Calif.), pitching for the Peninsula Oilers, went 2-3 with a 2.93 ERA over 10 games and eight starts, striking out 55 over 43.0 innings. For Kiilsgaard (Auburn, Wash.), he batted .295 over 39 starts, with 24 runs and 26 RBIs. He also stole nine bases. Pracher (Marlton, N.J.) produced an 0.82 ERA over five games and three starts, going 3-1 with 25 strikeouts over 22.0 innings.

Two-Sport Tradition

- Including Heisman runner-up Toby Gerhart (running back and outfielder), current head coach Mark Marquess (who was a quarterback, defensive back and punt returner) and NFL Hall of Famer John Elway (and outfielder and quarterback), the Cardinal have had a number of great two-sport stars. One of the first was Ernie Nevers, who starred for the Cardinal in the early part of the 20th Century. That list has included: Major League pitcher Joe Borchard (also a QB), NFL and MLB player Chad Hutchinson (RHP and QB), Brian Johnson (QB) and John Lynch (QB and RHP). Backup running back Tyler Gaffney, a freshman outfielder on the team, is the latest two-sport athlete.

Quentin One of Decade's Best

- Stanford Major Leaguer Carlos Quentin was named one of Baseball America's players of the decade for the first 10 years of the new century, joining four other Pac-10 players on the national publication's look back at the decade. A four-year Major Leaguer with the Diamondbacks and White Sox, Quentin starred for the Cardinal from 2001 to 2003 hitting .350 with 170 RBIs and 35 homers. Quentin hit .396 as a junior in 2003 with 24 doubles, 12 homers and 64 RBIs leading Stanford to the CWS Championship Game against Rice. Other Pac-10 players included: UCLA second baseman Chase Utley, Oregon State outfielder Jacoby Ellsbury, USC pitcher Mark Prior and Washington pitcher Tim Lincecum.

Cardinal Catchers

Since 1993, eight starting catchers have gone onto play professionally. Four have reached the Majors and a fifth, Jason Castro, is one of the top prospects in the Astros organization.

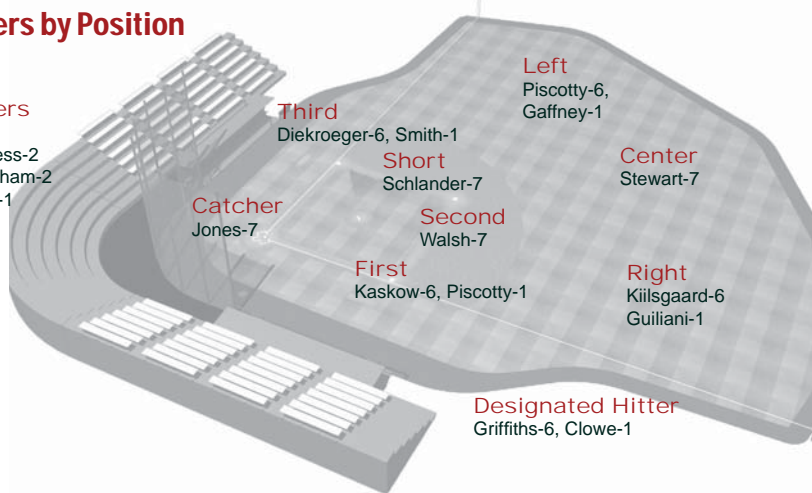
