1982 Outlook

Head coach Onnie Killefer says the 1982 season will be a challenging one; a season full of adjustments and changes. The coach certainly has good reason for such a statement.

Stanford still has a relatively young squad with only two seniors. Four of the top five defenders have departed through graduation and last year's leading scorer, junior Patsy Huntington, is lost for the season due to a knee injury incurred while playing with the U.S. National Under-21 Squad over the summer. Huntington (Lafayette Hill, Pa.) had tallied 16 goals as a sophomore last year, and 17 as a freshman, clearly demonstrating her prowess as a national-calibre forward.

Killefer seems to take this all in stride and remains optimistic about the upcoming season. She says, "We have a nucleus of strong players coming back and I expect we will be moving a number of our experienced players back to the defense." Killefer continues, "In fact there will be some wholesale changes in a number of areas.

"Without Patsy opponents will undoubtedly see a more balanced, more evenly distributed attack, and I'm sure we will be depending upon more of a team effort than ever before."

Perhaps Stanford's best returning player this year is senior midfielder and co-captain Becky Howell (Encinitas, Calif.), a definite leader who has the ability to adjust well from offense to defense. A versatile player, Becky was an attacker her first two years before switching to the midfield.

Kathy Nicholson (Philadelphia, Pa.), the team's other co-captain, is a smooth senior defender who has a knack for coming up with the ball in pressurized situations. Her strength is her ability to stabilize the defense.

A third very key performer is junior forward Valerie Jackson (Houston, Tex.), whose forte is speed, Jackson perhaps improved as much as anyone during the off-season and played at the "B" camp level last summer.

Linda De Los Reyes (San Diego), a

junior, is returning for her second season as a starting defender. Linda developed a lot of confidence during the year, and she should remain in the back line for the Cards.

There should be an interesting battle waged for the goaltending slot between junior Hillary Werhane (Chicago, III.) and sophomore Bonny Warner (Mt. Baldy, Calif.). Warner may have the edge, despite the fact that she is returning after a year's absence.

Another senior who is expected to contribute is forward Julie Erman (Santa Monica). Juniors in the same category include midfielder Terri Boyle (Miller Place, N.Y.) and defender Mary Donahue (Memphis, Tenn.).

Jennifer Bleakley, a forward from Alexandria, Va. is another sophomore to watch, while the freshman contingent is headed by midfielder Karen Chamberlain (San Marcos, Calif.), who also played at "B" camp.

Other freshmen likely to see some action include forward Dawn Curlee (St. Louis, Mo.), forward Suzanne Doi (Bonsall, Calif.), midfielder Rani Hublou (San Jose), forward Lisa Jacobson (Naples, Fla.) and forward Lisa Stewart (Darien, Conn.).

One of the more exciting aspects of this upcoming season is the prospect of playing at a new home site on the Farm. Whether the field (off of El Camino Real) is ready or not is the question.

"No matter where we play, the new field offers excitement to our field hockey program," notes Killefer. "It will allow and encourage top-level play and recognizes the development of field hockey here at Stanford."

Some of the nation's top teams will still be represented in the Nor-Pac Conference, including Long Beach State and Berkeley to name a pair. Killefer says, "The schedule, as always, is tough."

It remains to be seen whether Stanford can outdo its 6-5-3 mark of 1981. Working together as a supportive team could very well be the answer for this group.

ONNIE KILLEFER Head Coach

Onnie Killefer, one of the finest players ever to wear a Cardinal uniform, is in her second season as the Stanford head coach. Killefer, 26, piloted a young team to a winning season in her first year heading the Cards. A 1978 Stanford graduate. Killefer was a member of the 1976 U.S. National Team and a two-year member (1978-79) of the U.S. Elite Team.

Before coming to the Farm, Killefer was assistant field hockey coach and tennis instructor at Ohlone College in Fremont. The young Stanford coach served as an assistant to University of California coach Donna Fong from 1978-80 following graduation from Stanford.

An outstanding all-around athlete, Killefer participated in four varsity sports as a Stanford undergraduate. In addition to gaining team most valuable player honors for three straight seasons, (1974-76) in field hockey, she also competed in tennis (1974-75), basketball (1974-76), and on the club-level lacrosse team (1976-78).

She toured Holland, Wales, Ireland, and Scotland with the U.S. Touring Team in 1979 and was also a member of the Pacific Southwest squad which finished first in the national tournament last year. She is currently a member of the NorCal club team.

Killefer, whose Stanford bachelor's degree is in English, is currently enrolled in a master's program at St. Mary's College, studying health, physical education, and recreation. She resides in Union City.

JANET LUCE Assistant Coach

Now in her fourth season as an assistant coach, Janet Luce brings a wealth of experience and teaching ability to her position.

Luce, pursuing a doctorate at Stanford, is a former U.S. National team member who coached at Madison College in Harrisonburg, Va., prior to joining the Cardinal staff. She toured South Africa in 1974 with the U.S. team and also competed in the 1975 World Championships in Edinburgh, Scotland.

RACHEL SMITH Assistant Coach

Former U.S. National squad member Rachel Smith is with the Cardinal staff for her second season as a part-time assistant.

A defensive specialist with great knowledge in the stickwork area, Smith was a member of the national "A" squad from 1978-79 and participated in the U.S. Field Hockey Olympic Development program as a player from 1976-79. She received her B.S. degree from Cal Poly Pomona and earned a master's in physical education from Washington State in 1981.

Stanford Heritage

UNIVERSITY

Since its founding by Leland and Jane Stanford as a memorial to their only child, Stanford University has emerged as one of the foremost academic institutions in the world.

Organized in 1891, the University covers some 8,200 acres from the plain of California's Santa Clara Valley into the foothills of the Santa Cruz Mountains, beyond which lies the Pacific Ocean. The acres of fields. rolling hills and wooded retreats, streams and lakes comprise one of the finest settings of any American university. Beyond Stanford land, within a short distance, are not only the ocean and numerous beaches, but the city of San Francisco with all its cultural, entertainment and recreational activity.

Annually, Stanford enrolls approximately 12,800 students, of whom 6.600 are undergraduates. About 48 percent are from California and the rest from the other 49 states and some 80 countries.

The University is organized into seven schools: Earth Sciences. Education, Engineering, Graduate School of Business, Humanities and Sciences, Medicine and Law, Among the approximately 1,100 faculty members who make up the Stanford Academic Council, there are nine Nobel laureates and four Pulitzer Prize winners.

ATHLETICS

Along with a reputation nearly unmatched in education, Stanford holds a similarly high distinction in the realm of athletics.

Continually striving for excellence, Stanford provides student-athletes with the finest in coaching, facilities, and competitive opportunities. Success is realized not only in the form of NCAA titles, All-America honors, league championships and bowl game victories, but also in the development of each athlete's potential to the fullest. "Stanford is proud of a program that appeals to every aspect of the University," says Athletic director Andy Geiger, "Whether a student possesses extraordinary skills or is learning a lifetime activity at the beginner level, we are able to provide proper staff and facilities for optimum development and enjoyment."

Annually some 400 students compete in intercollegiate athletics, while participation in intramurals has reached 13,000 with many individuals active in more than one intramural sport. Physical education class enrollment generally averages 9,000 per year, again with a considerable overlap. In addition, 31 club sport teams compete at Stanford.

Today, the Stanford intercollegiate sports realm includes 24 varsisty sports with excellence represented in accomplishments on the national level of competition. The University has claimed 28 national team championships and 135 individual national titles. Cardinal Olympians are numerous with the likes of two-time decathlon gold medalist Bob Mathias and swimming gold medalist Kim Peyton among them.
