# SEASON PREVIEW

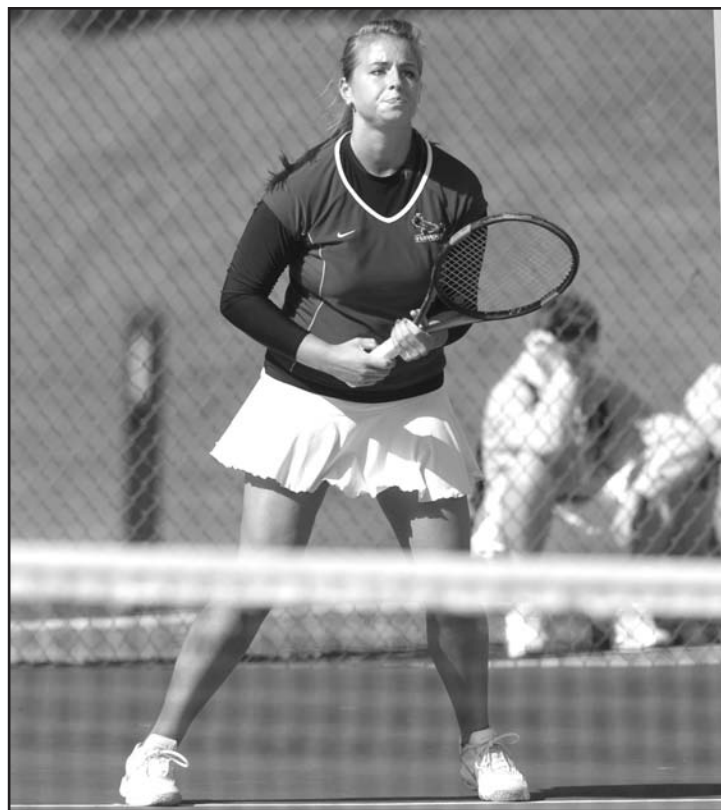
Coming off one of the best seasons in team history, expectations run high as Saint Joseph's returns a skilled group of veterans and a talented trio of freshmen for the 2007-08 season. Under the tutelage of head coach **Al Laveson**, Saint Joseph's will look to improve on its 12 victories from a year ago.

Leading the charge for the Hawks will be senior **Stephania Velazquez**. As a junior, she made an immediate impact for Saint Joseph's after transferring from Louisville. Playing at No. 1 singles, Velazquez became only the second Hawk in team history to earn Atlantic 10 All-Conference honors. A Second-Team selection, Velazquez posted an 11-11 mark at the top flight, tying for seventh most wins in a season and the fourth most victories at No. 1 singles in SJU history.

Looking to repeat one of the best individual seasons ever posted at Saint Joseph's is sophomore **Jennifer Kedzierski**. As a freshman, Kedzierski won a single-season record 16 matches, finishing the season 16-3 at No. 2 singles. Already the all-time leader in wins at the second flight, Kedzierski excelled at the A-10 Championship, winning key matches versus St. Bonaventure and George Washington.

Composing a stellar one-two punch for the Hawks in singles competition, Velazquez and Kedzierski proved to be even tougher in doubles play, posting a 10-2 mark at No. 1 doubles.

A three-year letterwinner for SJU, senior **Gina DiGiacomo's** steady improvement has seen her move from No. 6 singles as a freshman to the No. 4 flight last year. As a junior, DiGiacomo finished tied for third on the team in wins, posting an 8-13 mark in singles and 6-9 at No. 2 doubles.



**Sophomore Jennifer Kedzierski**

Posting her best season in Crimson and Gray, junior **Krysta Contino** solidified a spot in Laveson's lineup. Playing primarily at No. 5 singles, Contino won a career-high six matches and became the all-time leader in wins in that flight with 10.

After seeing limited doubles action as a sophomore, senior **Lauren Kuhmerker** had a breakout season in 2006-07. Teaming with Contino, the two posted a 12-7 record in doubles play, including a 3-1 mark in the top flight. Kuhmerker, who played in two singles matches at the end of the season, will likely see an increased role this year.

With open spots left by last year's graduating class, senior **Theresa Hornung**, junior **Tristin Reppert**, and sophomore **Courtney Scardellette** will compete for starting roles.

Having a deep core of veterans, Laveson has again added a stellar freshman class in rookies **Katy Borden** and **Margaret Mullaney**. A four-year letterwinner at State College Area High School, Borden posted a 70-24 singles record and was a three-time Mountain Athletic Conference All-Star. Helping the Academy of Notre Dame, Mullaney finished her high school career a three-time First Team All-Main Line honoree.

After a strong regular-season schedule helped Saint Joseph's to a tie for 11th at last year's A-10 Championship, Laveson has once again put together a challenging slate in 2007-08. Beginning the season at the Towson Tiger Fall Classic, the Hawks will also face conference foes Fordham, Rhode Island and La Salle this fall, before challenging for the A-10 title next April.

Combining proven winners with youthful potential, Saint Joseph's is poised for another special season on Hawk Hill.

# HEAD COACH



## Al Laveson

Director of Tennis / Women's Head Coach  
27th Season

Hawk Hall of Famer Al Laveson, the dean of coaches at Saint Joseph's University, has posted the most victories in the history of the school. The 1953 Temple grad has compiled a 480-533 overall record in 43 seasons with both Hawk tennis teams. Over 26 seasons at the helm of the women's tennis team, Laveson has guided Saint Joseph's to a 176-192 record, while coaching the men's squad to a 304-341 record over 43 years.

Last season, Laveson coached one of his best teams, as the Hawks set a single-season record for wins, finishing the year 12-10, including a tie for 11th at the Atlantic 10 Championships. Along the way, junior Stephania Velazquez became only the second Saint Joseph's player to earn A-10 All-Conference honors, as SJU's top player earned second team accolades. With Velazquez leading the way at No. 1 singles, Laveson guided freshman Jennifer Kedzierski to a record-setting season at No. 2 singles. The rookie became the all-time wins leader at the No. 2 flight and set a single-season record for victories with 16. Several other records fell during the season as sophomore Krysta Contino became the all-time leader in wins at No. 5 singles (10) and junior Gina DiGiacomo moved into the top-five for all-time wins at No. 4 singles with 11.

In 2004-05, Laveson helped the Hawks to match their best Atlantic 10 finish in six years, placing ninth. He has guided the women's tennis program to three 10-win seasons and began his career with the women's team with eight consecutive winning seasons.

Laveson, who was inducted into the Saint Joseph's Athletics Hall of Fame in 2001, was the first Hawk mentor to reach 400 career wins with a men's tennis victory over Towson in the fall of 2002. He became only the second Hawk coach to reach the 300-win plateau in 1994, joining the legendary Bill Ferguson, who guided the Hawk basketball team to 309 victories over 25 years. Laveson became the SJU coach with the most wins.

Captain of the Temple tennis team as a collegiate player, Laveson has been teaching professionally for the United States Professional Tennis Association for the past 42 years. He is also a past vice president of the organization.

Laveson retired from his full-time teaching position at Central High School in Philadelphia just before the 1994 season. Prior to his arrival at Central in 1987, he taught for 33 years at Penn Treaty Junior High School. Besides coaching at Saint Joseph's, Laveson coached the boys' tennis team at Father Judge High School for two years in the early 1960s. He won City Championships in badminton and tennis at Central, along with a gymnastics title while at Penn Treaty. Laveson also coached girls' field hockey at Central.

Laveson, who resides in Philadelphia, is the father of three sons, Bob, Dave, and Peter. The two eldest were both Saint Joseph's tennis team captains under their father.

# ASSISTANT COACH



**Jimmy Holland**  
**Assistant Coach**  
**Saint Joseph's '06 • 1st Season**

A four-year standout for the Hawks from 2003 to 2006, Jimmy Holland returns to his alma mater this season as an assistant coach with Saint Joseph's women's tennis team.

A two-time Atlantic 10 All-Conference selection for the Crimson and Gray, Holland finished his collegiate career as arguably the best No. 2 singles player in team history. The Coatesville, Pa., native finished his playing career with both the marks for the most wins in a single-season (13) and career (23) at the second flight. His 58 career victories are tied for fifth most in Saint Joseph's history.

As a senior, he entered the year ranked among the top 150 players in the country. With the departure of SJU's top performer, Holland stepped up to the No. 1 flight and posted an 8-10 record in match play. Even though he finished the year with a 14-18

overall mark - including a 6-8 mark in invitational play - Holland was recognized for his play by Atlantic 10 coaches with selection to the All-Conference Team.

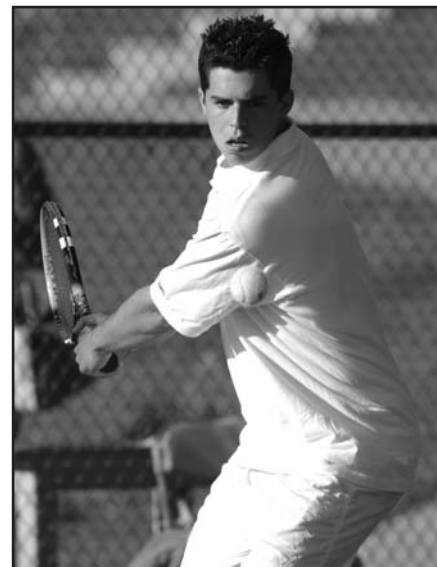
Battling through a nagging back injury as a junior, Holland finished the season 8-11 overall playing primarily at No. 2 singles, while going 9-8 in doubles competition.

Earning Atlantic 10 All-Conference honors as a sophomore, Holland finished the season 8-9 in match play and went 5-9 in invitational meets for a 13-18 overall mark. Helping the Hawks to a program-best fourth-place finish at the A-10 Championship, he posted a 2-1 mark at the conference tournament and finished the season 4-1 in A-10 matches.

Emerging as a staple in SJU's lineup as a rookie, Holland established himself as the No. 2 singles player quickly, setting a single-season record of 13 wins at that flight. His 13-9 mark at second singles, compiled with a 10-5 record in invitational matches, helped the 6-foot-3 freshman set the Hawks' single-season mark for wins.

The Hawks, as a team, posted a record of 44-34 during his four years, including a program-best 15 wins in 2002-03.

A graduate of Bishop Shanahan High School, he was twice named *Philadelphia Inquirer* Player of the Year. A four-year standout on the courts, Holland earned All-State and All-Area honors twice and earned All-District honors three times. He was selected as the *Daily Local News* Player of the Year as a freshman and sophomore.



# FINNESEY FIELD / COURTS



Laid out in a natural bowl in the center of Saint Joseph's campus, Finnesey Field has been the home of Hawk athletic teams since its inception in 1929. Originally constructed for football and opened in 1929 with plans for an eventual 70,000-seat stadium, the field has undergone numerous changes over the years.

In 1960, both the original grandstand and hillside seating were eliminated for the construction of Villiger (now Post) Hall/Bluett Theater. That construction necessitated raising the field's level some five feet above its earlier location. In 1990 the facility's usage was greatly expanded with the installation of artificial turf. That expansion continued in 1994 when lights were added. During the summer of 2001, the field received a facelift when new turf was installed and built into the hill closest to Barbelin Hall.

Finnesey Field is currently the home of SJU track and field, field hockey, men's and women's soccer and both men's and women's lacrosse. Previously, it played host to the football, baseball and softball teams.

Adjacent to Finnesey Field stand the Finnesey Courts, home to the Hawk men's and women's tennis teams since the late 1940s. Prior to that, SJU primarily played its home matches at the nearby Narberth courts. When courts were first built on campus, they were located where Bellarmine Hall now stands. Due to Bellarmine's construction in the summer of 1960, however, the Finnesey Courts were torn down and rebuilt in their current location.

After briefly disappearing in the late 1990's due to Mandeville Hall's construction, the courts were refurbished in the summer of 2000 to provide a better playing facility for the athletes. The Saint Joseph's women's tennis team has compiled a record of 76-123 on the Finnesey Courts since 1983.

Follow Rt. 76 East to exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make left on 54th Street and then right into parking lot. Field is straight ahead.

**From the East:** From the Ben Franklin Bridge (via Rt. 676) or the Walt Whitman Bridge: Follow Rt. 76 West to exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make left on 54th Street and then right into parking lot. Field is straight ahead.

**From the South:** Rte. 95 North to 476 North. Follow 476 North to exit 5 (Rt. 1). Follow Rt. 1 North to SJU, approximately 10 miles. Make right on 54th Street and right into parking lot. Field is straight ahead.

**From the West:** PA Turnpike to Exit 326 (Valley Forge). Follow Rt. 76 East, toward Philadelphia, to Exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make right on 54th Street and right into parking lot. Field is straight ahead.

**From the Airport:** I-95 North to Rt. 76 West. Follow Rt. 76 West to exit 339 (Rt. 1 South, City Avenue). Make right on 54th Street and right into parking lot. Field is straight ahead.

## THE HAWK



The Saint Joseph's Hawk mascot has been flapping its wings for more than a half a century.

One of the most famous mascots in college sports, the Hawk is best known for staying in constant motion by flapping its wings throughout every basketball game and representing the Saint Joseph's motto, "The Hawk Will Never Die".

Saint Joseph's athletic teams have been recognized with the nickname "Hawks" since 1929. At that time, the school's yearbook editor initiated a contest among the student body for a symbol. More than 100 submissions were narrowed, with "Hawks" winning out over "Grenadiers" by a slim margin. The name was appropriate because it typified "the fighting spirit of our crimson and gray athletes and it is suggestive of the aerial attack which has made our football team famous." Football, ironically, was discontinued at SJU following the 1939 season.

The Hawk mascot has garnered numerous accolades in its 50-year history. It has been selected as the nation's top mascot by *The Sporting News*, *Sports Illustrated*, *Sports Illustrated for Kids*, *Street & Smith's Basketball Yearbook* and *ESPN College Basketball* magazine.

# 2006-07 YEAR IN REVIEW



Posting a banner season, the 2006-07 Saint Joseph's women's tennis team hit several highs. From individual accolades, to a new single-season record in wins, the combination of veteran leaders and talented newcomers jelled for a season to remember on Hawk Hill.

Saint Joseph's took flight early in the fall, opening the season 3-1 at the Towson Classic. The Hawks posted consecutive 4-1 victories over Loyola and Washington College, respectively, before falling, 3-2, to Mount St. Mary's. Despite the stumble, Saint Joseph's recovered with 3-2 win over host Towson to earn second place.

The momentum continued to roll for Saint Joseph's as the Hawks snapped their 24-match losing streak to Villanova. The win over the Wildcats (4-3) was the first for the program since the 1978-79 season.

Having surpassed their 2005-06 win total by mid-September, the Hawks rolled through the remaining portion of their fall schedule, posting a 10-5 record.

Despite setting the single-season mark for wins (11) at Saint Peter's on March 31, Saint Joseph's dropped its final three matches of the regular season and was seeded 13th in the 2007 Atlantic 10 Championships.

In the opening round, the Hawks drew a tough matchup with the fourth-seeded Massachusetts Minutewomen. Playing up to its competition, Saint Joseph's challenged Massachusetts in every match, but fell 5-0.

Playing in the double-elimination format, the Hawks made quick work of the 12th-seed St. Bonaventure (4-1), advancing to face the eighth-seed, George Washington. Taking the first point of the match, Saint Joseph's couldn't maintain momentum, dropping a heartbreaking 4-3 decision.

Even though the Hawks' season came to a tough finish, it was still an amazing season for Saint Joseph's. As a team, the Hawks posted a program-record 12 victories, while earning their highest finish at A-10s since 2005, with a tie for 11th.

Individually, junior transfer Stephania Velazquez led the way. Becoming only the second Hawk to earn All-Conference honors, she posted an 11-11 record at No. 1 singles, tying for third-most single-season individual wins in that flight.

Additionally, freshman Jennifer Kedzierski set the single-season mark for wins, going 16-3 at No. 2 singles, while senior Erika Guers moved into the top-10 for all-time singles victories with 25. Guers' eight wins at No. 3 singles was the fifth most in a single season at SJU, while junior Gina DiGiacomo tied for fourth in single-season wins at No. 4 singles with eight. Krysta Contino became the all-time winner at No. 5 singles, as the sophomore finished with six wins on the season and 10 total for her career in that flight.

# ATLANTIC 10 CONFERENCE

On March 2, 1975, the idea of what is now the Atlantic 10 Conference was conceived. What started as an eight-school, men's basketball-only affiliation has grown into a 14-university, 21-sport league that is universally hailed as one of the best conferences in the country.

That growth and prominence is a direct result of the ideals and commitments of the member institutions of the Atlantic 10 - the University of Dayton, Duquesne University, Fordham University, The George Washington University, La Salle University, University of Massachusetts, University of North Carolina at Charlotte, University of Rhode Island, University of Richmond, St. Bonaventure University, Saint Joseph's University, Saint Louis University, Temple University, and Xavier University.

The presidents and chancellors of Atlantic 10 institutions have made a strong commitment to making the academic and athletics equation work. Over the years, the league membership has strived to better recognize the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. In doing so, the Atlantic 10, under the leadership of commissioner Linda Bruno, instituted the Commissioner's Honor Roll, which cites every Atlantic 10 student-athlete with a 3.5 grade point average or better. 1,170 student-athletes were named to the Fall 2006 Honor Roll and 1,119 were named to the Spring 2007 Honor Roll.

The league sponsors Academic All-Conference teams in each of its sports and honors one student-athlete per sport as the A-10 Student-Athlete of the Year. In 2006-

07, over 170 student-athletes earned Academic All-Conference recognition. Also, the Atlantic 10 provides postgraduate scholarship grants to qualified student-athletes.

Five A-10 schools were among the 51 cited for having five or more athletics programs recognized by the NCAA for their latest Academic Progress Rate scores. Fordham led the Atlantic 10 in the number of high-performing squads with nine teams receiving awards. Only the Ivy League (eight) and Patriot League (six) had more than the A-10's five, which was matched by the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Charlotte cross country and track & field standout Jane Daniels was chosen as a 2006-07 NCAA Div. I Coca-Cola Community All-American. The national honor includes a \$5,000 donation in her name to the charity of her choice. Daniels chose to split her donation among Girls on the Run International, the Charlotte University City YMCA and the Oostburg (Wis.) Community Education Foundation.

The Atlantic 10 Conference, with a total population of nearly 73 million people within its geographic footprint of eight states and the District of Columbia, will crown champions in 21 sports this season: baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's golf, women's lacrosse, men's and women's indoor and outdoor track & field, women's rowing, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming & diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball.



Ali Wean became the first Hawk to earn Atlantic 10 Offensive Player of the Year honors, as All-Conference First Team member led the A-10 in goals (14) and points (33).



Rebecca Cunfer, the 2004 Atlantic 10 Field Hockey Rookie of the Year, was named Student-Athlete of the Year in 2006.

# ADMINISTRATION



**Timothy R. Lannon, S. J.**  
University President

Timothy R. Lannon, S.J., is beginning his fifth year as president of Saint Joseph's University.

Fr. Lannon began his term as Saint Joseph's 26th president in July 2003. Since then he has led many significant University initiatives, most notably the agreement to purchase the 38-acre campus of the neighboring Episcopal Academy. Saint Joseph's anticipates taking possession of the property in 2008; the acquisition -- to be known as the Maguire Campus -- will provide unparalleled flexibility to enhance academic programs and facilities.

Under Fr. Lannon's stewardship, the University vastly upgraded student housing and parking options with the opening of the City Avenue Residence Halls in August 2004. Phase II of that initiative is currently underway and will result in additional parking and retail development along 54th Street.

Fr. Lannon has also played a major role in boosting Saint Joseph's academic profile, an effort which includes recently endowed faculty chairs and student scholarships as well as the opening of the Pedro Arrupe Center for Business Ethics. A major curricular-review initiative and the hiring of more than 50 new full-time faculty over a five-year period will serve to further strengthen the University's academic position. SJU attained its best-ever U.S. News ranking (t-8th, Northeast) in the 2008 "America's Best Colleges" edition.

Fr. Lannon has worked tirelessly to re-engage the University in its mission and to foster expanded outreach efforts to alumni, governmental leaders, and other external constituencies. In the latter role, he serves as chair of the City Avenue Special Services District (CASSD). As a central tenet of his leadership, Fr. Lannon's has articulated a vision for Saint Joseph's to be recognized as the preeminent Catholic comprehensive university in the Northeast.

He previously was vice president for university advancement and associate executive vice president at Marquette University, and served presidential internships at the College of the Holy Cross and Boston College while completing a doctorate and teaching fellowship in the Graduate School of Education at Harvard University. Fr. Lannon serves on the boards of Marquette University, St. Joseph's Preparatory School in Philadelphia, the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, and the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Pennsylvania.

Fr. Lannon has studied and written on Catholic identity at Jesuit universities. A native of Mason City, Iowa, he attended Creighton University as an undergraduate and was later president of Creighton Preparatory School. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1977 and was ordained in 1986.



**Dr. Cary Anderson**  
Vice President of Student Life

Cary Anderson, Ed.D., is the newest member of the Saint Joseph's University administration, assuming the post of vice president of student life on June 1, 2007. He brings a wealth of experience in higher education and student affairs to Saint Joseph's, along with a great familiarity with Jesuit institutions.

As vice president of student life, Dr. Anderson oversees many areas, including athletics and recreation, along with residence life, career development and counseling services.

Dr. Anderson came to SJU from Canisius College, where he served as the associate vice president and dean of students for eight years. Prior to that, he spent over nine years at the College of the Holy Cross, working first as complex director, then advancing to assistant dean of students and then to associate dean of students.

"The Jesuit philosophy on education resonates with my own personal educational philosophy," explained Dr. Anderson on his commitment to working with Jesuit institutions. "A lot of universities talk about educating their students with a concern for the common good, but Jesuit colleges and universities really act on this."

Dr. Anderson holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Iowa and a master's degree from Loyola University of Chicago. He earned his doctorate in education from the University of Massachusetts while working at Holy Cross.

He is a contributing columnist with several student affairs publications, and was recently elected editor of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA) Journal.



**Don DiJulia**  
Associate Vice President  
Athletic Director

One of the most active and involved leaders in collegiate athletics, Don DiJulia is in his fifth decade of affiliation with Saint Joseph's University. DiJulia is in his second stint as the University's top athletic administrator after returning to Hawk Hill as an Assistant Vice President/Athletic Director on June 8, 1988.

Over the past 19 years, DiJulia has overseen tremendous growth in the University's athletics programs. During his tenure, five varsity programs have been added, a new weight training facility built, athletic facilities upgraded and athletic fund drives initiated. In addition, the importance of the student-athlete has been recognized with the institution of the Athletic Director's Honor Roll as well as the senior scholar-athlete awards. DiJulia also spearheaded SJU's hosting of various conference and national tournaments, including the 2000 NCAA Women's Basketball Final Four.

A 1968 graduate, DiJulia has worn many hats in college athletics during his more than 30 years of professional experience. His career first started in coaching, where he served as an assistant basketball coach at Fairfield, George Washington and American.

During his first stint as Director of Athletics at SJU from 1976-1981, DiJulia was instrumental in the planning and construction of the \$5 million athletic and recreation complex. He also oversaw the growth of women's athletics as softball and cross country were added as varsity sports. DiJulia left SJU in 1981 to become Commissioner of the East Coast Conference, a position he held for two years until leaving to become the Commissioner of the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (1984 through 1988).

A two-sport athlete as an undergraduate at SJU, DiJulia was a member of the 1964-65 Hawk basketball team which compiled a 26-1 regular season record and a top 10 national ranking under head coach Dr. Jack Ramsay. He and his wife, Pat, are the parents of seven children and reside in Havertown, PA.



# THE UNIVERSITY

Founded in 1851, Saint Joseph's is an independent, Catholic, Jesuit university teaching disciplined reasoning, effective communication and a love of learning. From Willings Alley in Old City Philadelphia to Stiles Street in North Philadelphia to its current location on City Avenue, Saint Joseph's has continued to grow and change with the times. The University combines the Jesuit tradition of academic excellence, a history of service and an ideal campus location to produce successful students who seek to make a good world even better.

Full-time, undergraduate day enrollment is approximately 4,150. Graduate, evening and executive programs push total enrollment to more than 7,400.

### THE JESUIT TRADITION OF ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Saint Joseph's nationally recognized academic reputation is confirmed by ongoing acknowledgment in Barron's, U.S. News & World Report and Peterson's. The Jesuit tradition of intellectual inquiry and personal concern manifests itself in small, challenging classes taught by a caring faculty. Graduate assistants do not teach, so undergraduates can be sure they are receiving the very best educational experience. One-on-one interaction between students and faculty is a reality at Saint Joseph's.

A solid liberal arts curriculum provides across-the-board learning for every student. Supporting that curriculum are comprehensive academic majors and learning facilities. The result is a broad education which prepares students not only for employment and graduate school, but for life itself.

In the fall of 1998, SJU opened the \$25 million Owen A. Mandeville Hall, which houses the Erivan K. Haub School of Business, the Center for Food Marketing and the region's first "Teletorium" and "Moot Boardrooms." An 87,000-square-foot international academic center featuring state-of-the-art distance learning technology, it is located near the corner of 54th Street and City Avenue.

### A HISTORY OF SERVICE

The students of Saint Joseph's University are dedicated to making today's world even better. A natural spirit of volunteerism has enabled the University's community service programs to become the most popular extracurricular activities on campus. In addition, a Service Learning program allows students to receive academic credit for their work outside the classroom.

SJU offers local, national and international opportunities for student service. From North



Philadelphia to Camden, N.J.; from Tijuana, Mexico, to the Appalachian Mountains, Saint Joseph's students embrace the Jesuit mission of serving those in need. The Thanksgiving Dinner Dance for area senior citizens and the Hand-in-Hand Festival for the handicapped are two annual student-run events which draw thousands of special visitors to campus for fun and friendship.

### IDEAL CAMPUS LOCATION

SJU's City Avenue location combines the best of dynamic Philadelphia with the suburban, residential setting of the elegant Main Line. Saint Joseph's 65 acres span two counties, allowing students literally to enjoy the best of both worlds. The city of Philadelphia, with its tremendous wealth of historical, cultural, social and athletic attractions, is easily accessible, while the safety, serenity and greenery of a suburban campus are right at hand.

The friendly atmosphere and close-knit campus ensure that students don't get lost in either the literal or the figurative sense at Saint Joseph's. Expanded library, computer and athletic facilities add a big-time "feel" to this growing university.

### SUCCESSFUL STUDENTS

Men and women leave Saint Joseph's prepared. The University boasts an excellent record of placing its graduates in first-time jobs, professional schools and other advanced degree programs. Part-time work and internships provide real-world experiences, the kind which delight future employers. And with its many diverse student organizations, SJU offers ample opportunities to assume leadership positions.

An extensive on-campus recruitment program provides graduates with a head start in their employment search. Regular meetings with faculty advisors, along with advisory programs in the health professions and in pre-law, assist students who wish to further their schooling.

### PHILADELPHIA

SJU's Philadelphia location gives students access to two worlds. The campus resembles a park, surrounded by the stately homes of Philadelphia's historic Main Line suburbs. Yet students have access to the cultural, commercial and recreational activities of downtown Philadelphia - only a short ride away.

SJU students take frequent advantage of the artistic and cultural resources Philadelphia offers, as well. They visit the Philadelphia Museum of Art; the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts; the Franklin Institute Science Museum; the Academy of Music, which houses ballet and opera; and the new Kimmel Center, home to the Philadelphia Orchestra. In addition, SJU students know they always have a good time rooting for Philadelphia or other hometown teams in the four major professional sports.
