



# 2007 TCU HORNED FROG Track & Field

## 2007 Year in Review

TCU's 2007 track and field season was filled with high marks both on and off the track. Under third-year head coach Darryl Anderson, Flyin' Frogs earned 11 All-America certificates that were spread among seven student-athletes.

The season was punctuated at the NCAA Outdoor Championships with TCU's women's team earning its highest finish since 1993 by finishing in a tie for 27th with nine points. The women's team also closed the season ranked No. 23 by Trackwire.

Highlighting TCU's season off the track was the unveiling of a state-of-the-art track scoreboard. The scoreboard was presented with a dedication ceremony prior to the TCU Invitational on April 21. Located on the north side of the track, the scoreboard displays real-time results along with graphics and video.

At the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships, TCU had seven individuals and all four relay teams compete at the outdoor championships, while one individual and one relay team qualified at the indoor championships.

At the outdoor championships, TCU was one of just six schools in the country that had all four relay teams compete. In fact, TCU and LSU are the only schools in the country to have had all four relay teams qualify for the NCAA Outdoor Championships each of the past three seasons (2005, 2006, 2007).

Individually, TCU's seven All-America honors were broken down between seven student-athletes. The women's team earned 10 of the honors, while the men's team was represented by Jonathan Jackson.

Leading the way individually for TCU was Virgil Hodge, who collected three All-America certificates on the year, bringing her career total to five. At the NCAA Indoor Championships, Hodge earned one certificate by placing seventh in the 200 meters. At the NCAA Outdoor Championships, Hodge earned two certificates by finishing fifth in the 200 meters and running the anchor leg of TCU's 4x100 relay team that placed fourth.

In addition to Hodge's seventh-place finish at the indoor championships, TCU's other All-America honor came courtesy of a sixth-place finish by the women's 4x400 relay team of Deborah Jones, Kishelle Paul, Jamee Jones and Nathandra John.

At the outdoor championships, Jonathan Jackson placed third in the men's triple jump, earning TCU's first All-America honor in the event since 2001. Joining Hodge on the women's 4x100 relay team was Kandis Bell, Deborah Jones and Jamee Jones.

The Flyin' Frogs also set four school records during the season. Hodge broke her previous record in the indoor 200 meters with a time of 22.99. The women's 4x400 relay team of Jamee Jones, Paul, Deborah Jones and John also set a new indoor mark with a time of 3:34.75.

Moving outdoors, Paul broke the school record in the 400-meter hurdles at the Penn Relays (58.18) and then broke her own record at the Midwest Regional (57.70). The women's 4x200 relay team of John, Jamee Jones, Deborah Jones and Hodge also set a new record with a time of 1:33.21 at the Penn Relays.

Academically, the track program had a student-athlete earn first team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District VI honors for the second straight season. After Joe Brown earned the honor in 2006, McKale Davis was honored in 2007 after graduating with a 3.91 GPA in coordinated dietetics.

Darryl Anderson completed his third year at the helm of the Flyin' Frog program. A former associate track & field coach at Arizona State University, Anderson was named head track & field coach at TCU after a national search on November 18, 2004.

In just two previous seasons at the helm of the Horned Frogs' program, Anderson has combined a tireless work ethic with a tremendous coaching style that has molded TCU into one of the top track and field programs in the country. Anderson's success is clearly displayed in the 14 All-Americans he has coached in his short time at TCU.

In 2006, Anderson coached an NCAA Champion, had 13 athletes earn All-America honors and coached 18 athletes to conference titles. Between indoor and outdoor, TCU won 25 event titles.

The program was also represented well at the NCAA Championships. At the NCAA Indoor Championships, Jackson Langat won the NCAA title in the 800 meters to give TCU its first individual title since Kim Collins won the 60 meters and 200 meters at the 2001 NCAA Indoor Championships.

Anderson's immediate impact has been most felt in relays, where he has coached five relay teams to All-America status. Following the season, TCU earned a lofty honor from Track and Field News, which tabbed TCU as the country's top men's relay team for the 2006 season.

At the Midwest Regional, sophomore sprinter Justyn Warner shined brightest for TCU. Warner won the regional title in the 100 meters with a mark of 10.30 and was TCU's first male to win the event since Michael Frater won the regional crown in 2003. Warner was one of seven individuals that locked up automatic NCAA bids at the Midwest Regional. Both the men's and women's 4x100 relay teams also received automatic bids to the NCAA Championships, while both mile relay teams earned at-large berths.

In its second season in the Mountain West Conference, TCU once again displayed its strength at the conference meet with 15 event titles. TCU had 16 individuals named to the All-Mountain West Conference Outdoor team. The women's team placed second and the men finished fourth at the outdoor championships in San Diego, Calif. BYU won both the men's and women's league titles.

Individually, Delwayne Delaney earned the Male High-Point Award at the meet after winning the 100 and 200 meters and running a leg on both the 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams that won titles. As he was at the indoor league championships, freshman Dell Guy was selected Male Freshman of the Year after finishing third in the 200 and 400 meters, and running on TCU's 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams.

At the MWC Indoor Championships, TCU's women's team placed third, while the men finished fifth. The Flyin' Frogs won five league titles at the meet and earned three individual honors. Neidra Covington and Guy swept the Female and Male Freshman of the Year honors and Hodge won the Female High-Point Award after winning the 60 and 200 meters.

Also of note at the MWC Outdoor Championships was Candis Kelley winning her fourth straight league title in the women's shot put. A sophomore from College Station, Texas, Kelley has now won the league title in the shot put at all four championships she has participated in.

Despite not participating in the 10,000 meters prior to the league championships, senior McKale Davis won the title with a time of 36:22.75. The win marked TCU's first conference title in the 10,000 meters by a women.

Jonathan Jackson became the first athlete in TCU history to win league titles in both the long jump and triple jump. The title in the triple jump was Jackson's second consecutive MWC title in the event, marking just the second time in school history that a TCU athlete has won consecutive titles in the triple jump. Brandal Lawrence won consecutive league titles in the triple jump at both the 2002 and 2003 C-USA Championships. Jackson was also the first to win both the long jump and triple jump at the MWC Outdoor Championships since Air Force's Anthony Park in 2001.

TCU's success during the season was also demonstrated with the Frogs winning five Mountain West Conference Athlete of the Week awards. Winning the weekly honors were Delaney (March 27), Hodge (Jan. 23, April 24), Kelley (Feb. 13) and Paul (May 2).

With a solid base of returning letterwinners and the addition of a 16-member signing class, 2008 should be another exciting season for the track program.

Next season, for the first time in Anderson's tenure, the men's program will be off NCAA sanctions and will be able to compete in the postseason for the first time since the 2004 season.

The men's program will also receive an extra boost with All-American Otis McDaniel and NCAA qualifier Tommy Killen returning after redshirting in 2006.

## Women Tie For 27th at NCAA Outdoor Championships

TCU's women's team tied for 27th at the NCAA Outdoor Championships with nine points. The finish was TCU's best since placing 12th with 24 points in 1993.

## Jackson Finishes Third at NCAA Outdoor Championships

Jonathan Jackson narrowly missed becoming the first TCU student-athlete - male or female - to win an NCAA title in a field event. Competing in the triple jump, Jackson fell to third place in the sixth and final round after posting his top leap of 52-09.50 (16.09m) in the fifth round.

In the sixth round, Jackson was unable to improve on his mark with a leap of 16.04m, while Cornell's Ray Taylor registered a winning leap of 53-08.50 (16.37m) and Louisville's Andre Black moved into second with a leap of 53-00.00 (16.15m).

The finish by Jackson was the best by a TCU triple jumper since Jason Howard finished third at the 2001 NCAA Outdoor Championships. Last season, Jackson finished 10th at the championships.

## Hodge Wins Two All-America Certificates

Virgil Hodge earned All-America honors in the 200 meters and as a member of the 4x100 relay team at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. Hodge placed fifth in the 200 meters and anchored TCU's 400-meter relay team that placed fourth.

After posting a time of 22.77 in the prelims and 22.74 in the semifinals, Hodge improved her time again in the finals by clocking a mark of 22.70. Hodge was running a close second to meet champion Kerron Stewart (22.42) of Auburn until the last few meters of the race. The finish for Hodge was the best of her career after placing seventh in her previous two appearances.

Hodge has earned a five All-America certificates for her career. The five certificates is the most by a women in school history. She has earned three of the honors in the 200 meters and two in the 4x100 relay.

## Cracking the Top 25

The women's track team earned a national ranking on May 31 to close the season. The team earned a No. 23 ranking in the poll released by Trackwire.com. The women's team's last ranking was a No. 22 ranking on May 31, 2006. The men's team has not been ranked this season after being ranked every week except two during the 2006 indoor and outdoor seasons.

## Warner Wins Regional Title

Sophomore sprinter Justyn Warner won the 100 meters at the NCAA Midwest Regional on May 26 with a personal-best time of 10.30. His title in the event was TCU's first since Michael Frater won the 100 at the Midwest Regional in 2003.

## Brief Record

Junior Virgil Hodge set a Midwest Regional record in the 200 meters on May 25 with a personal-best time of 22.68. However, her record was short lived, as both Ebonie Floyd (22.32) and Simone Facey (22.49) broke the record in the finals on May 26.

## Four-Peat

Candis Kelley has been nothing short of dominant in the women's shot put at the Mountain West Conference Championships. Just a sophomore, Kelley has won the shot put crown at each of her first four MWC Championships (2006 Indoor & Outdoor, 2007 Indoor & Outdoor). A native of College Station, Texas, Kelley has tallied an NCAA regional qualifying mark in all six meets she has competed in and has three first-place finishes during that span.

At the Penn Relays on April 26 and at the MWC Outdoor Championships on May 12, Kelley set a personal best with a throw of 51-01.75 (15.59m).

## Relay Giants

TCU is one of just six programs in the country with all four relay teams represented at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The only other schools with all four relay teams at the championships are Baylor, Florida, LSU, Oklahoma and USC.

In 2006, TCU also sent all four of its relay teams to the NCAA Outdoor Championships.

## Sweet 16

After capturing 15 individual conference titles at the Mountain West Conference Outdoor Championships May 11-12, the TCU track and field team was honored with the announcement of the league's Men's and Women's All-MWC Outdoor team.

As announced by the league office, TCU had 16 student-athletes named to the Mountain West Conference Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field team. Following a second-place finish, the women's team had 10 selections, while the men's team had six honorees following a fourth-place finish.

In total, TCU's women's team had all-conference selections in 10 events, while the men's team had all-conference selections in eight events.

Headlining TCU's selections were Deborah Jones, Delwayne Delaney and Dell Guy, who each earned Virgil Hodge and Kishelle Paul, who each earned all-conference honors in four events. Virgil Hodge, Jamee Jones and Kishelle Paul each earned three honors.

On the men's side, Delaney won the 100 and 200 meters and also ran a leg on TCU's 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams that finished first. Delaney's success earned him the men's High Point Award. Guy was named Freshman of the Year after finishing third in the 200 and 400 and anchoring the 4x100 and 4x400 teams that finished first.

Also earning honors were Jonathan Jackson, who won the long jump and triple jump, Clint Renfro, who won the 400-meter hurdles and ran a leg on the 4x400 relay. Justyn Warner received all-league honors for finishing second in the 100 and as a member of the 4x100 team. Raymond Jones was also honored for running legs on TCU's winning 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams.

On the women's side, Deborah Jones was honored for winning the 400 meters, placing second in the 200 meters and running a leg on TCU's winning 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams. Hodge won the 100 and 200 meters and ran a leg on TCU's 4x100 team. Jamee Jones finished third in both the 100 and 200 and was a member of TCU's 4x100 team. Paul won the 100-meter hurdles, placed second in the 400-meter hurdles and was a member of the 4x400 relay team.

Earning two honors was Nathandra John, who finished second in the 400 meters and ran a leg on the Flyin' Frogs 4x400 relay team. Neidra Covington was honored for finishing third in the triple jump, while McKale Davis and Candis Kelley won the 10,000 meters and shot put, respectively. Kandis Bell was honored for running a leg on the winning 4x100 relay team and Brittany Blaylock was named all-conference as a member of the 4x400 relay team.

## Going Out In Style

Despite not participating in the 10,000 meters during the regular season senior McKale Davis won the title at the MWC Outdoor Championships.

Davis won the event with a time of 36:22.75. Throughout most of the race, Davis stayed amongst a pack of the top five runners. Davis began to make her move over the course of the last 600 meters or so until she was able to make her move and overtake BYU's Amber Muffin. The win marked TCU's first conference title in the 10,000 meters by a women.

## Delaney's Day

In a day filled with victories at the MWC Outdoor Championships, Delwayne Delaney's performance stood above the rest. Delaney won the 100 and 200 meters and ran a leg for TCU's 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams that each finished first.

Delaney's titles came one year after teammate Otis McDaniel won both the 100 and 200 meters at the MWC Outdoor Championships. For his efforts, Delaney won the Men's High-Point Award.

Delaney won the first league title of his career with an NCAA regional qualifying time of 10.40 in the 100 and he won the 200 with a time of 21.24. Hodge captured the crown in the 100 with a regional qualifying time of 11.40 and the 200 with a regional qualifying time of 23.04.

## Hodge Wins Again

Just like Delaney, Virgil Hodge won the 100 and 200 meters at the MWC Outdoor Championships and was a member of TCU's 4x100 relay team that finished first. Hodge's titles marked consecutive wins in all three events for her after winning the titles in 2006 as well.

With the victories in the 100 and 200 meters, Hodge became the first TCU athlete - male or female - to win four individual outdoor conference titles. Hodge also became the first female in school history to repeat in either the 100 or 200 meters.

## Leaps and Bounds Better

Less than 24 hours after winning the men's long jump title, Jackson became the first athlete in TCU history to win league titles in both the long jump and triple jump. In his first attempt of the meet, Jackson posted a season-best leap of 52-10.75 (16.12m) to win the title. Jackson's leap is also the fifth longest in the nation this season.

The title was Jackson's second consecutive MWC title in the event, marking just the second time in school history that a TCU athlete has won consecutive titles in the triple jump. Brandal Lawrence won consecutive league titles in the triple jump at both the 2002 and 2003 C-USA Championships. Jackson was the first to win both the long jump and triple jump at the MWC Outdoor Championships since Air Force's Anthony Park in 2001.

## Super Frosh

Freshman Dell Guy was named Men's Freshman of the Year at the MWC Outdoor Championships after placing third in the 200 and 400 meters and running a leg on TCU's 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams that won titles. Guy was also named Freshman of the Year at the MWC Indoor Championships.

## Fast Frog

Virgil Hodge showed the world just how fast she is on April 21 at the TCU Invitational. At the meet, Hodge posted what was the second-fastest time in the world this season with a time of 22.81 in the 200 meters. Hodge went on to top her 22.81 with a mark of 22.68 at the Midwest Regional, which is currently the 25th fastest in the world as of June 14. In the 100 meters, Hodge posted a wind-aided time of 11.19, which is the sixth-fastest wind-aided time in the world this year as of June 14.

Despite earning marks among the world's best, Hodge's times did not top her personal best times of 11.07 in the 100 meters and 22.57 in the 200 meters.

## Making the Mark

On the season, TCU earned 88 NCAA regional qualifying marks leading up to the Midwest Regional. Sixty-one of the regional marks have come from the women's side, while 27 have come from the men's side.

## Falling Records

Competing in the 400-meter hurdles at the Midwest Regional, Kishelle Paul set a new mark with a time of 57.70. The record topped her previous mark of 58.18 that was set on April 26 at the Penn Relays.

TCU's 4x200 relay team of Nathandra John, Jamee Jones, Deborah Jones and Virgil Hodge also broke the previous school record with a time of 1:33.21 at the Penn Relays. The previous record was 1:33.63.

## TCU Inks 16 Newcomers for 2008 Season

TCU signed six athletes to National Letters of Intent during the early signing period in November and eight more signed during the spring. Inking with TCU during the early period were Mychal Dungey of Austin, Texas (Austin High School), Stormy Harrison of Cisco, Texas (Cisco High School), Shaycoya Myers of Tulsa, Okla. (Edison High School), Jordan Pitts of Greenville, Texas (Greenville High School), LaQuinta Ross of Greenville, Texas (Greenville High School) and Shekila Wilkinson of Broken Arrow, Okla. (Broken Arrow High School).

Signing in the spring were Amber Anderson of Carrollton, Texas (Carrollton Creekview HS), Edina Brooks of Klein, Texas (Klein HS), Jessica Clarke, New York, N.Y. (Central Arizona CC), Kyericka Cole of Garland, Texas (Garland Naaman Forest HS), Kristal Juarez of Irving, Texas (Irving HS), Matthew Love of Cleveland, Ohio (Cleveland Heights HS), Andon Mitchell of Grenada (Central Arizona CC), Jeff Pels of Dallas, Texas (Jesuit HS), Meaghan Ryan of Lake Havasu, Ariz. (Central Arizona CC) and Sean Zurko of Las Vegas, Nev. (Silverado HS).

## TCU Ranked as No. 1 Relay Team in 2006 by *Track & Field News*

The TCU men's track and field team picked up an impressive honor, as Track and Field News tapped the Flyin' Frogs as the country's top relay team for the 2006 season.

In Track and Field News' September issue, the publication listed its 50th annual relay rankings for both men's and women's programs. In the publication, the TCU men earned the program's first No. 1 ranking since 1986 by edging second-ranked LSU by one point (30-29) in the scoring system. By earning the top ranking, TCU snapped the SEC's men's streak at seven.

The rankings were compiled by using a point scale of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 (5-4-3-2-1 for shuttle hurdles), which awarded points based on rankings for the eight relay events.

Despite not leading the rankings in a single event, the Flyin' Frogs were able to win the overall title by ranking no worse than fifth in four of the eight events. LSU finished first in the rankings in two events, but was only ranked in a total of three events, compared to TCU's four events.

TCU was ranked fifth in the 4 x 100, fourth in the 4 x 200, second in the 4 x 400 and third in the sprint medley.

## Twofer

TCU began a new tradition in 2007 with the start of the Horned Frog Invitational on March 24. Including the eighth annual TCU Invitational (April 21), TCU hosted two meets for the first time since the completion of the Lowdon Track & Field Complex in 1999.
