The Temple men's basketball team makes its 2008-09 Liacouras Center debut Wednesday night in the second game of a men's/women's doubleheader. The Owls, 3-2 on the season, host one of the top teams in the Mid-American Conference, Miami, at 7:30 p.m. with the TU women's team taking on Dartmouth in the opening game at 5:30 p.m. The men's game will be broadcast on The BigTalker, 1210 AM WPHT and both games can be viewed on OwlAccess.



All-America candidate Dionte Christmas continues to lead the Owls and the Atlantic 10 Conference with a 24.0 scoring average. The 6-5 senior guard also is pulling down 8.2 rebounds per game, second to sophomore Lavoy Allen (9.0 rpg.), while making a team-high 19 three-pointers. Allen, who suffered a fractured left thumb in the team's win at Lafayette (Nov. 21), missed the team's loss at Buffalo Saturday and his playing status will be a game-time decision.

Senior center Sergio Olmos returned to the lineup against Buffalo after missing the first four games due to an ankle sprain. The 7-0 Spaniard scored 12 points on six-of-10 shooting while playing 27 minutes in the contest. Junior guard Ryan Brooks (13.6 ppg.) also scores in double figures for head coach Fran Dunphy's Owls while junior guard Luis Guzman and senior guard Semaj Inge top the team in assists with 27 and 21, respectively.

Miami, under the direction of 13th-year head coach Charlie Coles, entered the season picked second behind Kent State in the MAC East Division. The RedHawks are led by senior forward Michael Bramos (14.2 ppg.), a preseason all-league selection. Senior guard Kenny Hayes leads the team in scoring with a 16.6 average.

The Owls own a 3-1 edge in the series that dates back to the 1967-68 season, but the RedHawks won the last meeting, 66-58, in Oxford, OH on Nov. 30, 2000.

OWLS VS. REDHAWKS: This is the fifth meeting between the schools, and first since the 2000-01 season. Miami won the last meeting, 66-58, in Oxford on Nov. 30, 2000. The Owls defeated the RedHawks, 60-47, in the first of that home-an-home series on November 21, 1999 in the Liacouras Center. The other two meetings, both Temple wins, came at the 1968 Motor City Tournament, 72-67, and the 1967 Charlotte Invitational, 65-60.

LAST MEETING (@Miami 66, Temple 58, Nov. 30, 2000): Jason Grunkemeyer scored 20 points to lead host Miami to a 66-58 upset of #17 Temple. The RedHawks made 11 of 22 from three-point range with Grunkemeyer connecting on five of seven treys. Lynn Greer led the Owls, who made just four-of-18 from behind the arc in the second half, with 17 points.

LAST GAME (@Buffalo 83, Temple 73, Nov. 22): Calvin Betts led a balanced attack for Buffalo, scoring 18 points, to lead the Bulls past the visiting Temple Owls, 83-73. Betts was one of five double-figure scorers for the Bulls, who shot 62 percent from the field in the second half to pull out the come-from-behind win. Dionte Christmas led all scorers with 25 points. Buffalo scored 14 unanswered points in the second half to take a 58-56 lead. The Owls regained the lead briefly, 62-60, with 6:41 remaining, but the Bulls scored 10 straight points over a two-minute stretch to put the game away. The Owls, playing without leading rebounder Lavoy Allen, were beaten on the boards, 33-24. Senior Sergio Olmos (12 points), making his first appearance of the season following an ankle sprain, started in place of Allen, who suffered a fractured left thumb in the Lafayette game.

ALLEN ALERT: Sophomore Lavoy Allen missed Temple's 83-73 loss at Buffalo due to a fractured left thumb. Allen will be evaluated Wednesday morning with his status for the Owls' home opener against Miami to be determined at that point. The preseason A-10 All-Defensive team selection leads the Cherry and White in rebounding (9.0 rpg) while averaging 11.0 points per game.

FAST START: Ramone Moore became the first Temple freshman to score double-figures in each of his first three collegiate games since Mardy Collins started his career by scoring in double figures in his first four Owl contests. Moore accomplished his feat coming off the bench while Collins started every game his freshman season. He is just the third freshman to accomplish the feat at Temple, and the first to do it as a reserve. He joins Collins and Mark Macon (1987-88), who opened his career with 23 straight double-figure games. Eddie Jones (1991-92) and Aaron McKie (1991-92) opened their careers with three straight double-figure games, but the duo were sophomore eligible during their initial campaign. Moore's streak came to a halt in game four, as he tallied just four points in 10 minutes of action in a 71-56 win over Lafayette.



MAC ATTACK: For the third straight year Temple will play four teams from the Mid-American Conference. The Owls went 3-1 against foes from their football conference in 2007-08, and are now 5-3 against the MAC since 2006-07. As part of a scheduling agreement with the MAC, Temple will play each conference school in a home-and-home series through the 2011-12 season. The Owls' 2008-09 MAC slate includes: at Buffalo (Nov. 29), Miami (OH) (Dec. 3), Kent State (Jan. 5) and at Eastern Michigan (Jan. 7).

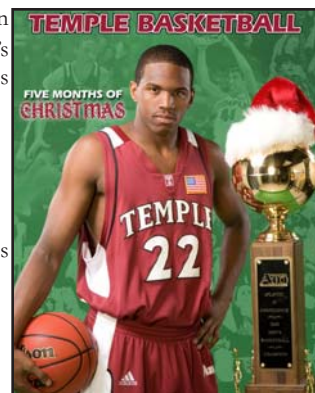

NATIONAL RANKING: All-America candidate Dionte Christmas is ranked ninth nationally in scoring (24.0 ppg.) according to the latest NCAA Statistics (through 11/29/08).

POW: All-America candidate Dionte Christmas earned his eighth Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Week citation (week ending Nov. 15), moving into sole possession of fourth place on the league's all-time list. The eight league POW awards is also the most by a Temple player, surpassing Mardy Collins (7, 2002-06). Christmas averaged 26 points and nine rebounds in the Owls' first two games of the season. Christmas also picked up his seventh Big 5 Player of the Week honor for the week ending Nov. 23.

ALL-TOURNAMENT: All-America candidate Dionte Christmas was named to the all-tournament team at the 2008 Charleston Classic. Christmas averaged 22 points and 7.7 rebounds in leading the Owls to the championship game.

OLMOS RETURNS: Temple senior center Sergio Olmos returned to the starting lineup against Buffalo after missing the team's first four games with a sprained his right ankle. The 7-0 Spaniard scored 12 points, grabbed two rebounds and made two blocks in 27 minutes of action.

LOUIE, LOUIE: Junior guard Luis Guzman set career highs in assists (7) and steals (4) while matching his previous career best in rebounds with seven against Clemson in the championship game of the Charleston Classic. He currently leads the team and ranks second in the A-10 with a 5.40 assist average.

FOR OPENERS: The Owls won their first two games for the first time since the 2000-01 season. That team was the last of five teams coached by Hall of Famer John Chaney to reach the Elite Eight.

CLASS OF 2013: Rahlir Jefferson and Khalif Wyatt, two highly-touted Philadelphia area high school seniors, have signed National Letters of Intent to attend Temple University on men's basketball scholarships. Jefferson, a 6-6 wing guard out of Chester High (Chester, Pa.), averaged 10.5 points, 7.2 rebounds, 2.8 assists and 2.1 blocks per game as a junior last season. A 2007 second team all-Southeastern Pennsylvania selection by the Philadelphia Inquirer, Jefferson helped Chester win the PIAA Class AAAA State Championship last season. Wyatt, a 6-3 guard out of Norristown High (Norristown, Pa.), averaged 18.0 points per game in leading his team to a 33-2 record last season before falling to Jefferson's Chester squad in the state championship game. In that game, an 81-77 loss, Wyatt scored 28 points on 8-of-18 shooting. The second team all-state selection also contributed seven assists and made seven steals.

PROFESSOR DUNPHY: For the second straight year Temple head coach Fran Dunphy is team-teaching an honors course in the University's prestigious Fox School of Business with Dr. Lynne Anderson. The course is titled Management, Theory and Practice: From the Locker Room to the Board Room. "I have had the opportunity to do it at Penn and now doing it at Temple has been a lot of fun for me. I get in the classroom and I get a chance to interact with the students. I get to see them in a different way. They get to see me in a different way. I get a chance to understand what our players are going through in terms of the classroom activities. Again, I think that it's me wanting to learn as much as I can about Temple and its student body as well. It's a home run for me. I am hoping it's a great experience for the students."

A DYNAMIC DUO: Temple has two Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame coaches. The first inductee was Harry Litwack, who coached the Owls from 1952 to 1973 and registered 373 wins. Litwack was inducted on April 26, 1976. John Chaney, who retired March 12, 2006 after 24 seasons and 516 wins at Temple, was inducted on October 5, 2001. Temple is only one of nine universities who have two coaches in the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame. The center jump circle at the Liacouras Center is jointly named in honor of these two coaching legends.

FOR THREE: Temple has made at least one three-pointer in 367 consecutive games. The last time the Owls did not make a three-pointer in a game was February 1, 1996. Temple missed all 16 three-point attempts that day in dropping a 59-35 decision to #1 UMass at McGonigle Hall.

ON THE LINE: Temple connected on 74.0 percent of its free throw attempts last season, the highest percentage by an Owl team since the 1986-86 squad set the school record with a 76.1 percentage. It marks the second straight season Temple shot over 70 percent from the line (70.9% in 2006-07). Prior to that the last time a Temple team made 70 percent from the line for a season was the 2000-01 team (471-673, .700). The Owls are off to another strong start at the line, leading the A-10 by hitting 72.5 percent (50-69) of their attempts from the line.

UNDER 50: Since a 49-41 loss to Oklahoma State on Dec. 30, 1995, the Owls have not lost when holding their opponent to 50 points or less. That streak grew to 66 games with the team's 69-46 win over Towson on December 6, 2007.

PRESEASON ACCOLADES: Two Temple men's basketball players were named to Atlantic 10 pre-season all-conference teams. Senior Dionte Christmas was named to the pre-season first team all-conference in a vote conducted by the league's head coaches and selected media. Sophomore forward Lavoy Allen was voted on the all-defensive team. As a team, Temple was picked to finish second in the A-10 behind Xavier.

THE NBA CONNECTION: Thirteen Temple players have been selected in the NBA draft since 1982. Seven of those 13—Terence Stansbury (1984), Tim Perry (1988), Duane Causwell (1990), Mark Macon (1991), Eddie Jones (1994), Aaron McKie (1994) and most recently Mardy Collins (2006)—were taken in the first round. The Owls currently have one player competing in the NBA — Collins (LA Clippers). Aaron McKie, who retired following the 2006-07 season, is an assistant coach with the Philadelphia 76ers.

CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAINS: Seniors Dionte Christmas, Semaj Inge and Sergio Olmos will serve as captains for the 2008-09 Temple men's basketball team.

A-10 RISING: For the 14th time in Conference history and fifth since 2000, the Atlantic 10 Conference earned multiple at-large berths to the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament last season as league champion Temple was joined by Xavier and Saint Joseph's in the field of 65. The A-10 earned two of the six at-large bids awarded to non-BCS conferences. The Atlantic 10 had a league record seven teams win at least 20 games in 2007-08 and all seven earned postseason berths. Only the Big East (eight) had more 20-win teams. In addition, 11 of the Conference's 14 teams reached the 15-win mark a year ago, the most in league history.



ALL-TIME LISTS

BIG FIVE: Temple has been the dominant team over the 53-year history of the Philadelphia Big 5. The Owls' 113-83 won-loss record in city-series games is tied for first in the Big Five and their 24 Big 5 titles (19 shared, five outright) top the city league. The Owls Big 5 schedule features Villanova (Dec. 29), Penn (Jan. 14), La Salle (Feb. 26) and Saint Joseph's (Mar. 5).



HOME-COOKING: Temple owns a 107-39 won-loss record in 11 seasons of play at the Liacouras Center. The Owls are 6-5 in home-openers in the building, defeating Ohio last season, 90-88, on Nov. 29. Temple posted an 10-3 record at the Liacouras Center in 2007-08.

NEXT UP: Temple travels to Penn State for a Saturday game (Dec. 6, 6:00 p.m.) against the Nittany Lions. The game will be televised on the Big 10 Network.

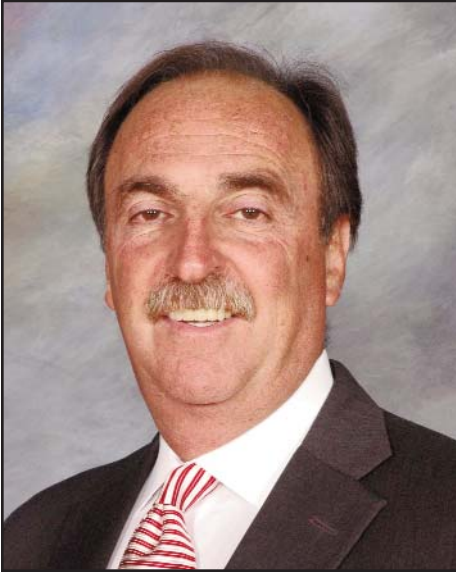

HEAD COACH FRAN DUNPHY



Fran Dunphy, one of the all-time winningest coaches in Philadelphia Big 5 history, has left his imprint on the Temple men's basketball team in just two years at the helm. After taking over the reins from Hall of Fame coach John Chaney on April 10, 2006, Dunphy brought the Owls back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2001 in just his second season when he guided his charges to the 2008 Atlantic 10 Championship.

The 17th head men's basketball coach in Temple's 108-year history of men's basketball, Dunphy, now in his third season with the Cherry and White, is the first person to serve as the head men's basketball coach at two Philadelphia Big 5 institutions. After 17 years, nine NCAA Tournament bids and 310 wins as head coach at Penn, Dunphy moved North to Temple to replace the legendary Chaney.

The 2008 Eastern College Coach of the Year, Dunphy led his second Temple team on a late-season run to the Atlantic 10 Championship. He guided the Cherry and White to a 21-13 overall mark in 2007-08, including a second place A-10 regular season finish with an 11-5 conference record.

One of the most respected coaches in the nation, Dunphy, who owns a 343-194 overall record, has personified success over his coaching career. Besides the 10 NCAA bids and win total, his impressive resumé includes 10 conference titles, ten 20-win seasons, five Philadelphia Big 5 City Series titles, seven Ivy League Players of the Year, three Ivy League Rookies of the Year, five perfect Ivy League seasons and 44 all-conference honorees.

Prior to joining Penn's coaching staff, Dunphy served as an assistant under Speedy Morris at his alma mater, La Salle University (1985-86 through

1987-88). The 60-year old Philadelphia native's coaching career began at the United States Military Academy (1971-72), where he served as an assistant under head coach Dan Dougherty. In 1975, he became head coach of his high school alma mater, Malvern Prep. He remained there until becoming Lefty Ervin's assistant at La Salle University (1979-80). The following year, Dunphy joined current Maryland head coach Gary Williams' staff at American University. He returned to La Salle in 1985, serving one more season under Ervin and assisting Speedy Morris for two seasons. He left La Salle to become Tom Schneider's assistant at Penn in 1988.

In 1989, Dunphy was named the 16th head coach at Penn. He would compile a 310-163 overall record in his 17-year career. His Quaker teams won an unprecedented 48 straight Ivy League games and four league titles from 1992 through 1996. His 1993-94 team posted a 25-3 record and earned a Number 25 ranking in the CNN/USA Today Coaches' Poll, the program's first such ranking since the 1978-79 campaign. That year also included a 90-80 first round upset of sixth-seed Nebraska in the NCAA Tournament.

In his last eight seasons at Penn, Dunphy guided the Quakers to six Ivy League titles and a 93-19 league record. From 1999-2001, he led Penn to 25 straight league wins, including a perfect 14-0 mark in 1999-2000. In 2001-02, Dunphy's Quakers posted a 25-7 record and won the school's first outright city-series title with a perfect 4-0 mark since 1973-74.

A full-time educator on and off the court, Dunphy is in his second year teaching in Temple's prestigious Fox School of Business. He is team-teaching an honors course with Dr. Lynne Anderson, entitled, Management, Theory & Practice: From the Locker Room to the Board Room. He previously had served as a lecturer in the Wharton Executive Education program and in the management department of the Wharton School.

Dunphy is one of the leaders in the local Coaches vs. Cancer campaign and was named to the National Council of Coaches vs. Cancer. He was also honored as the 2002 National Coaches vs. Cancer Coach of the Year for his service and tireless dedication to those in need. On September 23, he joined four other coaches to speak to legislators on Capitol Hill on the need for more funding for cancer research.

The Owl mentor also devotes time to Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Greater Philadelphia's Board of Directors, and his Penn teams have participated in the Big Brothers/Big Sisters program each year. He is also a member of the Philadelphia CYO Hall of Fame.

A 1970 La Salle graduate with a degree in marketing, Dunphy was an outstanding player under Explorers' head coach Tom Gola. As a junior, he helped the Explorers to a 23-1 record. He served as a co-captain his senior year when he averaged 18.6 ppg and led the team in assists, while also being named the MVP of the annual Quaker City Basketball Tournament. In 1979, he earned a Master's degree in counseling and human relations from Villanova University.

Dunphy and his wife, Ree, reside in Villanova, Pa., with their son, J.P.

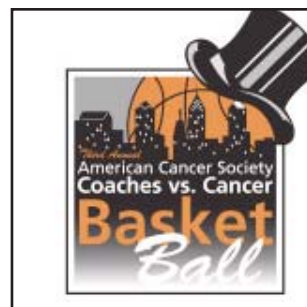

Dionte Christmas led all scorers with 26 points, tied a career-high with 11 rebounds and dished a team-high six assists to lead the Cherry and White to a convincing 79-65 win over East Tennessee State in the first round of the Charleston Classic. Lavoy Allen posted his second double-double of his career, scoring 14 points will pulling down a career-high 15 rebounds. Ryan Brooks made the best of his first collegiate start, scoring 15 points. Ramone Moore had an impressive debut off the bench, tallying 11 points and grabbing four rebounds in 20 minutes of work. All-America candidate Dionte Christmas posted his second straight 26-point game topping five double-figure scorers in leading Temple to a 70-65 win over host College of Charleston Saturday afternoon in the semifinals of the Charleston Classic. Besides Christmas, the Cherry and White had two players post double-doubles. Lavoy Allen had 10 points and a game-high 12 rebounds for his second straight double-double while Ramone Moore scored 11 points, including seven in a key Owl run, and added 10 rebounds. Ryan Brooks chipped in with 11 points, including four big free throws in the final minute, and Semaj Inge added 10 points. Temple took control of the game following a 12-2 early run, spearheaded by seven Christmas points, to take a 12-7 lead. The Owls never trailed after that point, but were unable to put much distance between themselves and the Cougars. With the score 34-30, Moore stepped up, tallying seven of his points in a key 9-2 run to provide Temple with some breathing room, 43-32, with just under 13 minutes to play. Calvin Betts led a balanced attack for Buffalo, scoring 18 points, to lead the Bulls past the visiting Temple Owls, 83-73. Betts was one of five double-figure scorers for the Bulls, who shot 62 percent from the field in the second half to pull out the come-from-behind win. Dionte Christmas led all scorers with 25 points. Buffalo scored 14 unanswered points in the second half to take a 58-56 lead. The Owls regained the lead briefly, 62-60, with 6:41 remaining, but the Bulls scored 10 straight points over a two-minute stretch to put the game away. The Owls, playing without leading rebounder Lavoy Allen, were beaten on the boards, 33-24. Senior Sergio Olmos (12 points), making his first appearance of the season following an ankle sprain, started in place of Allen, who suffered a fractured left thumb in the Lafayette game.
