BRUINS KICK OFF 2008 SEASON VS. TENNESSEE AT THE ROSE BOWL ON SEPT. 1 On ESPN



Fireworks Show to Follow Game
Game time is 5:15 pm



2008 SEASON OPENER — UCLA opens its 90th season of football with a Labor Day evening game against Tennessee in the Rose Bowl. Kickoff on Monday, Sept. 1 is scheduled for approx. 5:15 p.m. and the game will be televised nationally by ESPN (Mike Patrick, Todd Blackledge and Holly Rowe). The UCLA/ ISP Sports Radio Network (KLAC 570 AM is the Los Angeles flagship station) will broadcast the contest with Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook calling the action. The game also will be carried live on Sirius Satellite Radio and Sports USA Radio Network (Larry Kahn, Terry Donahue, John Robinson and Troy West). In addition, UCLA will produce a Spanish-language broadcast of the game that can be heard on uclabruins.com. Following the game, FSN Prime Ticket will air "Bruins Live" and "Lexus Gauntlet Live" from the Rose Bowl.

The Bruins have opened the 1996 (L, 20-35 in Knoxville), 1994 (W, 25-23 in Rose Bowl), 1989 (L, 6-24 in Rose Bowl), 1974 (17-17 in Knoxville), and 1967 (W, 20-16 in Los Angeles) seasons against the Volunteers. **Rick Neuheisel will become the third Bruin head coach to begin his UCLA coaching career against Tennessee.** Bob Toledo coached his first game at UT in 1996 (35-20 loss). Dick Vermeil took the field for his first Bruin game at Tennessee in 1974 (17-17 tie).

The Bruins are 58-26-5 overall in season-opening games. UCLA won 45-17 at Stanford in last year's opener for its third straight season-opening win (2005, won 44-21 at San Diego State; 2006, won 31-10 over Utah in Rose Bowl).

SERIES WITH TENNESSEE — The Bruins trail in the series by a 4-7-2 margin, but have won three of the five series games played in Los Angeles.

Tennessee captured the last meeting in the series, played on Sept. 6, 1997, by a score of 30-24 in a contest played in the Rose Bowl. The third-ranked Volunteers jumped out to a 24-0 lead in that game, thanks in part to a couple of Peyton Manning touchdown passes. However, the Bruins scored 18 straight fourth quarter points to narrow the margin to 27-24 with 7:33 to play. A UT field goal made it 30-24 with 4:42 remaining. The Bruins then had two more chances to impact the outcome. UCLA drove to the Volunteer 21-yard line before fumbling away that opportunity. In the final seconds of the battle, the Bruins drove to the Tennessee 20-yard line before giving the ball up on downs. Manning, a senior that season, finished with 341 passing yards for UT. Bruin junior quarterback Cade McNown threw for 400 yards.

The Bruins would go on to win the next 20 games in a row over two seasons and the next 13 straight home games over the following three seasons.

UCLA's last win in the series came in 1994, when the 14th-ranked Bruins bested 13th-ranked UT 25-23 in the Rose Bowl. A Bruin field goal with 13:06 left to play in the fourth quarter extended the home team's advantage to 18-0. Tennessee quarterback Todd Helton, now a MLB star with the Colorado Rockies, then directed a couple of scoring drives and threw for a pair of two-point conversions to make it 18-16 with 6:41 to play. UCLA was forced to punt on its next possession and the boot pinned the Volunteers down at their own one-yard line with just over three minutes to play. Six plays later, Bruin linebacker Donnie Edwards intercepted a Helton pass, giving the Bruins the ball at the Tennessee 32-yard line. Running back Daron Washington found the end zone on a third-and-eight play from 30 yards out to put the Bruins up 30-16 with 1:34 remaining. Tennessee tallied with 10 seconds left to make the final score 25-23. Senior quarterback Wayne Cook threw for a then-career best 295 yards in the contest.

The Fan Zone contains the AM 570 KLAC/ISP Sports stage, where fans can watch and hear the Bruin pre-game radio show. It also includes the Food Zone, which includes the following restaurants: American Pretzel, Baja Grill, Carl's Jr., Now You're Poppin', PSI Drinks, Robin's Wood Fire BBQ & Grill, Teri & Yaki and Angelena's Southern Cuisine. The Alumni Band will also be performing in the Fan Zone.

COACHING MOVES

The Bruins welcomed six new assistant coaches to the staff of first-year head coach Rick Neuheisel.

- * **Norm Chow** is the new Bruin offensive coordinator. He came to UCLA from the staff of the Tennessee Titans of the NFL where he served as offensive coordinator for the past three seasons. Before joining the Titans in 2005, Chow spent 32 seasons at the college level, working on staffs which won three national titles (BYU-1984, USC-2003, 2004), tutoring three Heisman Trophy winning quarterbacks (Ty Detmer, Carson Palmer, Matt Leinart), participating in 27 bowl games, and three times being named the Assistant Coach of the Year. He has worked with several of the NCAA's top career passing efficiency leaders and mentored six first-round NFL draft picks (Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon, Steve Young, Philip Rivers, Palmer, Leinart).
- * **Frank Gansz, Jr.** tutors the Bruin special teams units. He spent the last two seasons with the Baltimore Ravens and the previous five with the Kansas City Chiefs. He has also coached with the Oakland Raiders in 1998 and 1999 and spent the 1993-97 seasons at the University of Houston.
- * **Tim Hauck** is the Bruin safeties coach. He spent the last four seasons coaching the secondary on the staff of the University of Montana. Hauck played 13 seasons in the NFL, before retiring in 2002.
- * **Reggie Moore**, a former Bruin (1987-90), is the receivers coach. Moore worked the last four years as the wide receivers coach at North Dakota State University. He still ranks among the top 20 all-time at UCLA in receiving and caught many of his pass receptions from two of the top quarterbacks in Bruin history, Troy Aikman and Tommy Maddox.
- * **Wayne Moses** works with the Bruin running backs. He returns to Westwood where he was the Bruin running backs coach in 1990-95. Moses spent the last two seasons as the running backs coach for the St. Louis Rams. Prior to joining the Rams, he spent 28 years in the collegiate ranks, including stints at five Pac-10 conference schools.
- * **Bob Palcic** is the UCLA offensive line coach. Palcic also is returning to Westwood. He served as the

Rick Neuheisel, who quarterbacked UCLA to victory in the 1984 Rose Bowl and who compiled a record of 66-30 as a collegiate head coach, is now his alma mater's head football coach.

The energetic and personable Neuheisel returns to the collegiate ranks after spending the past three seasons in the NFL. In his eight years as a college head coach at the University of Colorado and the University of Washington, he fashioned a record of 66-30, winning at least 10 games on three occasions and finishing in the Top 10 three times, while leading his teams to seven bowl games. His winning percentage of .688 places him No. 17 among active coaches with at least five years in the Football Bowl Subdivision. He was also recognized as one of the nation's top recruiters during his college coaching days.

Neuheisel spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. He served as quarterbacks coach in 2005 and 2006 and in January of 2007, was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

During his four seasons (1999-2002) as head coach at the University of Washington, Neuheisel led the Huskies to a record of 33-16 (.673) and four bowl games (one Rose Bowl, two Holiday Bowls and one Sun Bowl). His Pac-10 record was 23-9 (.719) and Washington won one league title and finished second twice in those four seasons.

In 2000, Neuheisel led the Huskies to an 11-1 record, a first-place finish in the Pac-10 and a victory in the 2001 Rose Bowl.

During his four seasons (1995-98) as head coach at the University of Colorado, Neuheisel won 33 of 47 games (.702), including all three bowl appearances. His 20-4 record in his first two seasons at Colorado were the fifth-most wins at the time for a first-time head coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division IA).

Neuheisel spent the 1994 season as a Colorado assistant coach under Bill McCartney after going to CU from UCLA.

Neuheisel spent six seasons (1988-93) as an assistant coach at his alma mater. During his final four years he tutored the wide receivers, helping to develop some of UCLA's all-time great receivers, such as J.J. Stokes, Kevin Jordan and Sean LaChapelle.

Neuheisel joined the UCLA staff full-time in 1988 and coached quarterbacks for two seasons, including NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman's senior year (1988). Aikman earned consensus All-America honors and finished third in the Heisman Trophy race, completing a school-record 228 passes (since broken) for 2,771 yards, a .644 percentage and a school-record 24 touchdowns (since broken). Aikman was the No. 1 selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

In 1986, he served as a volunteer coach and his major assignment was to teach the offense to a transfer from Oklahoma who had to sit out the 1986 season - Aikman.

Neuheisel began his collegiate career at UCLA (1979-83) as a walk-on, holding for place kicker John Lee, and earned the starting quarterback job during his senior season (1983). In his final game as a Bruin, he overcame food poisoning to lead UCLA to a 45-9 victory against Illinois in the 1984 Rose Bowl. He was named the game's MVP after throwing for 298 yards and four touchdowns.

Bruin offensive line coach in 1993 on a team which went on to play in the 1994 Rose Bowl. Palcic spent the last two seasons coaching at the University of Wisconsin after 12 years in the NFL (New Orleans, Browns, Lions, Falcons).

* **Mike Linn**, a former Bruin offensive lineman (1990-91), returned to Westwood as the head athletic performance coach in February of 2008. Mike had previously worked in the Bruin weight room from 1992 to 2002, serving as the head of the UCLA program from 1999-2002.

UCLA has two sets of brothers on the team -- the Bosworths (Kyle and Korey) and the Molines (Chase and Chane).

Three Bruin coaches and nine players, including 2008 inductee Troy Aikman, are enshrined in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Coach Rick Neuheisel still holds the UCLA single season record for completion percentage. Neuheisel completed 185 of 267 passes (69.3%) for 2,245 yards in the 1983 season. He set a then-NCAA record when he completed 25 of 27 passes (92.6%) in a game that season against Washington.

UCLA and Oregon State are the only Pac-10 teams playing three non-conference opponents who each won at least nine games in 2007.

UCLA has 14 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, Danny Farmer, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Floyd Reese, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

Twenty-two UCLA players have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams a total of 27 times. Offensive lineman Chris Joseph (2006, 2007) and wide receiver Cormac Carney (1981, 1982) were two-time first-team selections.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 26 years (including 2007), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (14) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Mercedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 27 of the last 29 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships.

UCLA ON THE RADIO

The 2008 season is UCLA's 12th with Clear Channel and the games will again air on AM 570 KLAC in Southern California. For the first time, the games will be produced by ISP, UCLA's corporate and media-rights holder.

The Los Angeles all-sports station's broadcast includes a two-hour pre-game show (one hour local, one hour network) and a post-game show.

Chris Roberts, a four-time Golden Mike Award winner, is in his 17th season as the voice of the Bruins. Former Bruin quarterback Matt Stevens is in his 12th year on the broadcast team and his eighth as the analyst in the booth. Former Bruin quarterback Wayne Cook is in his seventh season as sideline reporter.

Stevens and Cook host the hour local pre-game show while Roberts, Stevens and Cook host the hour network pre-game and network post-game shows.

ISP will also originate a UCLA Magazine show that will air on AM 570 KLAC following the football post-game talk show. It will feature interviews and information on all sports.

AM 570 KLAC also provides ancillary programming, including head coach and player interviews during game weeks.

Bruin games are also available nationally through an agreement with Sirius Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics.

Games can also be heard via the internet at uclabruins.com (a UCLA All-Access pass is needed).

For the first time, UCLA home games will also be broadcast in Spanish on uclabruins.com.



UCLA ON TELEVISION

Heading into the 2008 season, 173 of UCLA's last 181 games have been televised live, including each of the last 41 dating back to 2004.

All 13 games in 2007 were televised live: ABC (10/6 Notre Dame, 10/20 Cal, 11/3 Arizona, 11/10 Arizona State, 11/24 Oregon, 12/1 USC), Fox Sports Net (9/1 Stanford, 9/22 Washington, 9/29 Oregon State, 10/27 Washington St.), Versus (9/8 BYU, 9/15 Utah), ESPN (Las Vegas Bowl).

In 2006, all 13 Bruin games were televised live -- four by ABC (at Oregon, Washington St., at Cal and USC), three by Fox Sports Net (Utah, Stanford and at Arizona St.), one by ESPN (vs. Florida St./Emerald Bowl), one by TBS (at Washington), one by NBC (at Notre Dame) and three by FSN Prime Ticket (Rice, Arizona, Oregon State).

FSN Prime Ticket (Channel 694 on DirecTV) will live post-game shows from the Rose Bowl following most Bruin home games.

Prime Ticket will also air the Lexus Gauntlet Live every Monday night at 9:00 pm. The live show will feature highlights from the previous week's game as well as interviews with UCLA and USC players and coaches. The show will alternate between campuses throughout the season.

STARTING EXPERIENCE

- * Senior defensive tackle Brigham Harwell leads the team with 29 career starts. Tight end Logan Paulsen (25) and linebacker Reggie Carter (20) are the only other Bruins with at least 20 career starts. Wide receiver Marcus Everett (19) and defensive back Alterraun Verner (12) are the only other Bruins to have started more than 10 ball games.
- * Senior tight end Logan Paulsen has started 22 straight games, the longest streak on the squad. Junior cornerback Alterraun Verner is next on the team with nine straight.

- * Has held 13 opponents over the last two seasons to less than 100 yards of rushing offense.
- * Held six opponents to less than 100 yards on the ground in the 2007 season (52-Stanford, 44-BYU, 46-Notre Dame, 67-Cal, 43-Oregon, 34-BYU/bowl).
- * Oregon gained 148 net yards in the 2007 game at UCLA, the best effort by a Bruin defense since holding Arkansas to 42 net yards in the 1989 Cotton Bowl.
- * UCLA's 16-0 shutout of Oregon on Nov. 24 was the first time the Ducks had been shut out in 267 games (Sept. 28, 1985, Nebraska 63-0). It was UCLA's first shutout since a 31-0 blanking of Stanford on Sept. 30, 2006.

- * It is also the most points scored by UCLA in a season opener on the road (UCLA scored 44 at San Diego State in 2005).
- * Over the last five seasons, UCLA is 21-1 when it scores at least 30 points (won 16 straight) in a game and 12-1 when it scores 40 or more (11 in a row).
- * Over the last five seasons, the Bruins are 20-3 when they hold the opponent under 20 points, and had a 16-game winning streak snapped when they lost the Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16.

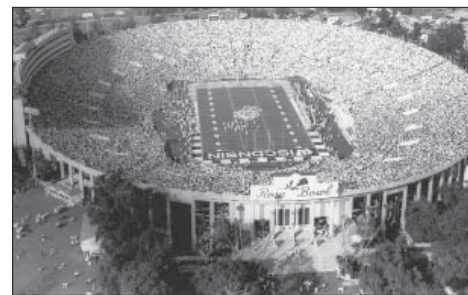
- *The crowd of 72,986 at the 2007 home opening-BYU game was the highest for a home opener since 2001 versus Ohio State (73,723). It was also UCLA's best non-conference crowd since that Ohio State game.
- *In 2007, the Bruins drew at least 70,000 for each game of its home schedule, the first time since UCLA moved to the Rose Bowl. The average of 76,378 was a new record, breaking the old mark of 73,709, set in 1998.

- * The Bruins have captured wins in 16 of the last 19 games played at home in the Rose Bowl.



THE 27TH YEAR AT ROSE BOWL

The 2008 season marks the 27th year that the Rose Bowl will serve as the home of the Bruins. UCLA moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 109-46-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games. UCLA is 24-7 overall at home in the last five years and 16-3 in the last three seasons (2005-07).

In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SIonCampus.

TURNOVER BATTLE

- * UCLA is 23-2 when it wins the turnover battle over the past five seasons, including 5-0 (Stanford, BYU, Oregon State, California, Oregon) in 2007.
- * It is 12-26 when it ties or loses the turnover battle, including 1-7 (Utah, Washington, Notre Dame, Washington State, Arizona, Arizona State, USC, BYU in Las Vegas Bowl) in 2007.

ALL-AMERICAN PRODUCTION

- * In the last eight seasons (2000-2007), UCLA has produced seven consensus All-Americans
 - 2000 WR Freddie Mitchell
 - 2001 LB Robert Thomas
 - 2003 DE Dave Ball

- * UCLA is 6-1 all-time in overtime, including a couple of 2005 wins in extra time --- a 30-27 single overtime win at Stanford and a 44-41 single overtime win at Washington State.

- * Walker and his staff have had the Bruin defensive unit ranked among the nation's best in each of his first two seasons.
- * In 2007, UCLA ranked 14th in rushing defense (109.2 yds./g) and 29th in total defense (343.23).
- * The Bruins also ranked second in tackles for loss per game (8.7), third in third-down conversion defense (29.1%), tied for 15th in sacks per game (3.0) and tied for 17th in fumbles caused (14).

REGGIE MOORE - WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

- * In his first season with the Bruins.
- * Moore returns home to UCLA where he played receiver from 1987-90.
- * He caught balls from two of the top quarterbacks in Bruin history, Troy Aikman and Tommy Maddox.
- * Moore entered the 2008 season still ranked No. 18 on UCLA's all-time receptions list with 92 and receiving yards list with 1,483.

BOB PALCIC - OFFENSIVE LINE COACH

- * Returns to UCLA where he spent the 1993 season.
- * The line that year included seniors Vaughn Parker and Craig Novitsky, both of whom earned All-America recognition and went on to play in the NFL. It also included sophomores Jonathan Ogden and Mike Flanagan who each played in the NFL for over a decade.

#19 DOMINIQUE JOHNSON - REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE WIDE RECEIVER

- * Ranked third on the team in 2007 with 25 catches.
- * Had 24 of the catches for 318 yards in the final 10 games of the 2007 season.

#92 BRIAN PRICE - SOPHOMORE DEFENSIVE TACKLE

- * Recorded all seven of his tackles for loss in last four games of the 2007 season.
- * He had three tackles for loss in the bowl game versus BYU.

#25 KAI FORBATH - REDSHIRT SOPHOMORE PLACE KICKER

THE OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS — Redshirt junior **KEVIN CRAFT (#3)** enrolled at UCLA in time for the 2008 Spring Quarter after transferring from Mt. San Antonio College and was able to participate in spring practice. He completed 313 of 511 passes (61.3%) for 4,231 yards, 44 touchdowns and 10 interceptions at Mt. SAC in 2007. He had seven games with over 300 yards passing, including a best of 452 yards vs. Cerritos College.

Craft spent the 2005 and 2006 seasons at San Diego State. As a redshirt freshman in 2006, he appeared in nine games for the Aztecs and started five. On the year, he completed 69 of 121 passes for 737 yards with four touchdowns and six interceptions. In his first career start, he completed 20 of 32 passes for 216 yards against BYU. He also started games against Air Force, Cal Poly SLO, Wyoming and UNLV. He threw touchdown passes of 60 yards (Wyoming) and 49 (Air Force).

Kevin's dad, Tom Craft, was the San Diego State quarterback in 1975 and 1976. Tom went on to become the head coach of the Aztecs from 2002-05.

Redshirt freshman **CHRIS FORCIER (#8)** served as the scout team quarterback through the first half of the 2007 season. He took trips with the team for games in 2007 at Utah, Oregon State, Washington State, Arizona and USC but did not play. He prepped at St. Augustine HS (two seasons) in San Diego where he threw for almost 5,000 yards and ran for over 1,000 more. His team captured CIF titles in both his junior and senior seasons. As a senior, her threw for 2,347 yards and 23 touchdowns while completing 158 of 291 passes. He also ran for 631 yards and 10 rushing touchdowns. In his junior season, he threw for 2,634 yards and 32 touchdowns and rushed for 415 yards and four scores.

Redshirt junior **OSAAR RASSHAN (#11)** saw the first game action of his career

when he lined up as a wide receiver during the 2007 opener at Stanford. He also saw limited action at receiver against Washington. Rasshan switched from the quarterback position to wide receiver during 2007 fall practices. He served as the scout team quarterback during his first two seasons in the program and had not seen game action. He moved back to the quarterback position during the bye week following the Notre Dame contest (10/6/07).

He saw his first action at quarterback against Arizona (11/3/07), entering the game on the second series of the second half. He led the Bruins to 13 points -- one touchdown and two field goals. Rasshan completed three of 10 passes for 78 yards, with a long of 42. He rushed eight times for 57 yards.

He made his first start in game 10 versus Arizona State (11/10/07) and completed 14 of 27 passes for 181 yards. His longest completion was 53 yards to Brandon Breazell. He rushed for 41 net yards on 13 attempts. Rasshan became the first African American to start at quarterback for UCLA since Bernard Quarles on Nov. 10, 1979, also versus Arizona State.

Against Oregon (11/24/07), he started and played only the first half. He did not play versus USC. He started in the Las Vegas Bowl (12/22/07) and played only in the first half, carrying four times for 17 yards and throwing one incomplete pass while leading two field goal drives.

Redshirt senior **BEN OLSON (#7)** broke his right foot in practice on Aug. 9, 2008 and underwent surgery on Aug. 12. He is expected to miss at least eight weeks. RUNNING BACKS —

True senior tailback **KAHLIL BELL (#36)** led the Bruins in rushing in the 2007 season with 795 yards on 142 attempts (5.6 avg) and a team-high five touchdowns in just eight games. His average of 99.38 would have been fifth in the Pac-10 and his average of 113.63 all-purpose yards would have ranked eighth. Bell also ranked fifth on the team with 13 receptions.

He enjoyed the best game of his career in the 2007 opener at Stanford, rushing for a career-high 195 yards. He had runs of 59, 31 and 22 yards among his 19 carries. His 195 yards were the most-ever by a Bruin in a season opener. Against BYU, he led the Bruins with 79 yards on 16 carries, including a four-yard scoring run. On that touchdown drive, he carried on all four plays, gaining 26, 17, 0 and four yards for the score.

Bell made his first career start against Washington and rushed for 109 yards and one touchdown, on 27 attempts. At Oregon State, he recovered from a tough start (fumbles lost on UCLA's first two plays) to lead the Bruins with 80 yards, including touchdowns of one and four yards, on 24 attempts. He also led the team with four receptions for 49 yards.

In the win over Cal, he led the Bruins with 142 yards on 22 carries. He had a 64-yard run, the longest of his career, to set up UCLA's first touchdown. At Washington State, he scored a 50-yard touchdown on the third play of the game, but on his fourth carry, he suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee and missed the rest of the season. He finished with 67 yards on four attempts.

LINEBACKER — Redshirt junior **REGGIE CARTER (#51)**, one of the top linebackers in the nation, is on the pre-season 'Watch Lists' of the Nagurski Award, the Lott Trophy, the Bednarik Award and the Butkus Award.

A year ago, he saw action in 13 games and made eight starts. He was a member of the 2007 Butkus Award Watch List and went on to register 62 tackles to rank sixth (tied) on the squad. He was third with 12.0 tackles for loss (0.92).

Carter led the Bruins at Stanford with a career-high 10 tackles, including two behind the line. At Oregon State, he made five tackles, including an eight-yard sack. He also forced a fumble that set up UCLA's first touchdown.

On October 9 (during a bye week), he had arthroscopic surgery on his right knee to remove meniscus. Eleven days later, he started in the win over Cal and made five tackles. True senior **KYLE BOSWORTH (#54)** saw action in 13 games and made seven starts. He ranked fifth on the squad in 2007 with 74 tackles. He made his first start of the year (second of his career) against Washington (game four) and finished with four tackles. At Oregon State, he started and tied for the team lead with eight tackles, one for loss. He started versus California and made three tackles, including one for loss, and forced a fumble.

SECONDARY — True junior cornerback **ALTERRAUN VERNER (#1)** appeared in all 13 games in 2007 with 10 starts. He ranked fourth on the squad with 75 tackles in 2007. Verner finished with 15 passes broken up and four interceptions. On the year, he ranked 11th (tied) in the NCAA and fifth (tied) in the Pac-10 with 16 (1.46) passes defended. He tied for ninth in the Pac-10 (0.31) and second on the team with his four interceptions. Verner was selected to the 2007 first-team Academic All-America All-District VIII team and the Pac-10 All-Academic first team. He was an honorable mention All-Pacific-10 selection in 2007.

Verner came off the bench at Stanford to make four tackles and break up two passes. Against BYU, he made the second start of his career (first in a non-nickel alignment) and made four tackles. At Utah, he started and made a career-high 10 tackles.

Verner started versus Cal and made six tackles, two for loss. He also made two interceptions and broke up three other passes. He went on to be named Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week. His second interception came with UCLA leading 23-21 and California on the Bruin 30-yard line facing a third-and-five situation. Verner stepped in front of the pass attempt and returned it 76 yards for a score with 1:33 remaining to clinch the victory. The game-clinching interception was the third touchdown return of his career, tying the UCLA record held by Jerry Robinson (1975-78), Marcus Turner (1985-88) and Spencer Havner (2002-05).

At Washington State, he made seven tackles and his third interception in two weeks. He made five tackles and his fourth interception of the season versus Oregon. Against USC, he made eight tackles and forced a fumble. In the Las Vegas Bowl, he made four tackles and broke up three passes.

In 2006, Verner was selected co-Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and was named a first-team Freshman All-America by Scripps/FWAA and CollegeFootballNews.com, second-team Freshman All-America by The Sporting News, Scout.com and Rivals.com and first-team Pac-10 All-Freshman by The Sporting News.

Verner ranked fourth on the team with 59 tackles in 2006. He was second on the team with two interceptions and became the sixth Bruin, and first freshman, to

score two touchdowns on interceptions in the same season. With 2:16 remaining in the second quarter of the season-opening Utah game, he picked off a Ute pass and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown. His interception return for a touchdown was the first by a UCLA true freshman since 1989, when Carlton Gray returned one 65 yards versus Washington. In the win over Arizona, he picked off a fourth quarter Wildcat pass and returned it 89 yards for a score. His return was the longest by a Bruin since Nov. 12, 1994, when Abdul McCullough scored on a 98-yard return versus Arizona State. At Oregon, he made his first start (UCLA was in a nickel package) and responded with seven tackles.

Redshirt senior cornerback **MICHAEL NORRIS (#22)** appeared in 13 games in 2007 and made one start (Utah). He saw consistent action on special teams and as a nickel or dime back. Norris saw his first game action in a year's time (sat out 2006 due to injury) during the 2007 season opener at Stanford. He made his first career start at Utah in a dime formation and made one assisted tackle. Against Washington, he had one tackle and returned two kickoffs for 43 yards. Redshirt junior safety **AARON WARE (#27)** saw action in all 13 games in 2007, primarily on special teams. He recovered an onside kick in the 2007 opener at Stanford. At Utah, he played three defensive snaps and on special teams. At Oregon State, Ware made two tackles and forced a fumble on a kickoff. He played on special teams versus USC and in the Las Vegas Bowl.

In 2006, he appeared in all 13 games and was credited with four tackles. He saw his first action as a Bruin against Utah in the opener, playing on special teams, and was credited with one tackle.

Several true or redshirt freshmen could see action in the secondary. True freshman **RAHIM MOORE (#3)** figures to start at strong safety in place of Bret Lockett. Redshirt freshman safety **GLENN LOVE (#20)**, redshirt freshman corner **COURTNEY VINEY (#7)** and true freshman corner **AARON HESTER (#9)** and true freshman safeties **TONY DYE (#6)** and **E.J. WOODS (#2)** are also contending for playing time.

THE KICKERS

One of the best punters in the nation and an honors candidate, redshirt senior **AARON PEREZ (#17)** served as the team's punter in all 13 games and also handled the holding chores on the placekicks in 2007. His season average of 42.3 ranked second in the Pac-10 and 29th nationally. On the year, he made 91 kicks with 35 inside the 20-yard line. The 91 punts tied the school record set by Chris Kluwe in 2003. He begins the 2008 season with a career average of 41.78 which is 10th on UCLA's all-time list. He was named honorable mention All-Pac-10 conference for 2007 and second-team Pac-10 All-Academic.

Perez had a big game against BYU, averaging 44.0 yards on eight kicks with six inside the 20-yard line. Against Notre Dame, he averaged 41.0 yards on five kicks, three inside the 20-yard line. Two were returned for one net yard. He averaged 39.0 yards on four punts versus Cal and none were returned. At Washington State, he launched a 66-yard punt, the longest of his career. At Arizona, he averaged 47.4 yards on eight kicks and placed four inside the 10-yard line. He tied his career long with a 66-yarder. Against USC, he averaged 40.7 yards on a career-high 11 kicks, which tied the school record, and placed three inside the 20.

In 2006, he served as the team's punter in all 13 games. He averaged 42.56 yards on 62 punts which ranked fourth in the Pac-10 and 22nd in the nation. Eighteen of his 62 kicks put opponents inside the 20-yard line. He had a huge game in the win over USC where he averaged 48.3 yards on six kicks, including two inside the 20-yard line. His 63-yard punt on the next to last play of the game was the longest of his career at the time.

In 2005, Perez averaged 39.9 yards (eighth in the Pac-10 on 54 kicks with 19 inside the 20-yard line. He made his debut in the 2005 opener at San Diego State.

A year ago, **KAI FORBATH (#25)** enjoyed one of the top kicking seasons in school history as a redshirt freshman. Now a redshirt sophomore, he will again handle the placekicking assignments. Forbath was a second-team Freshman All-America selection by The Sporting News and an honorable mention All-Pacific-10 conference selection for 2007. He was also a honorable mention Pac-10 All-Academic selection.

On the year, Forbath made 25 of 30 field goals and all 30 PATs for a team-high 105 points. He made 24 of his last 27 field goal attempts and had a streak of 10 in a row twice during the season.

Forbath is the first UCLA player to record five field goals of at least 50 yards in a season, including a freshman-best 54-yarder versus Oregon. He is one shy of Justin Medlock's career mark of six field goals of at least 50 yards.

His 25 field goals rank third on UCLA's single-season list (first among freshmen) and ninth on the career Top 10. His 105 points ranked eighth (tied) on UCLA's single-season list and first among Bruin freshmen.

During the 2007 season, Forbath ranked third (tied) in the NCAA and first in the Pac-10 in field goals (1.92), third in the Pac-10 in kick-scoring (8.08) and 44th (tied) in the NCAA and third in the Pac-10 in scoring (8.08).

In his debut at Stanford, Forbath missed his first two attempts before connecting on his first career field goal (39 yards). Against Utah, he converted from 45 and 52 yards. In the win over Cal, he made all three attempts (32, 28, 27). His final

field goal, from 27 yards with 3:06 left in the game, gave UCLA a 23-21 lead. He was named the Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week. At Washington State, he had a streak of 10 straight field goals snapped when he missed from 43 yards. At Arizona, he made 35 and 51-yard field goals.

In the win over Oregon, he made all three attempts (54, 31, 28). His 54-yard field goal was the third-longest in school history and the best by a freshman. In the Las Vegas Bowl, he made three of four. He converted from 22, 52 and 50 yards but on the final play of the game, a potential game-winning 28-yard attempt was blocked. He became the second player in school history to kick two field goals of at least 50 yards in the same game (Medlock at Oregon in 2004).
