Tennessee Opens NCAA Tournament Against Charlotte

The University of Tennessee women's soccer team will kick off the 2008 NCAA Tournament this Friday, Nov. 14, traveling to Chapel Hill, N.C. to meet Charlotte in the first round. The Lady Vols earned the conference's automatic bid after becoming the lowest seeded team ever to win the SEC Tournament title. No. 1 seed North Carolina and Western Carolina will meet in the other first round matchup at Fetzer Field.

UT enters the NCAA Championships with a 10-10-2 overall record after going 2-0-1 in conference tournament play. The Lady Vols are coming off a 1-0 victory over Georgia in the championship game which marked their first win over the Bulldogs since 2006.

The Orange and White is playing in its eighth NCAA Tournament, earning consecutive selections each year since 2001. Tennessee is 10-6-2 all-time in the tournament and has reached the Sweet 16 five times in the past six years.

The Big Orange boasts the 2008 SEC Tournament Most Valuable Player in senior keeper Jaimel Johnson who posted a 0.62 goals against average and 13 saves over the three matches at the event. Sophomores Tanya Emerson and Julie Edwards and freshman Chelsea Hatcher also earned All-Tournament Team selections after leading the Lady Vols to their fourth SEC Tournament title.

Though she is out with an injury, senior forward Kylee Rossi is Tennessee's career leader in NCAA Tournament points with 11. Junior midfielder Mick Imgram sits second on the list with eight points on two goals and four assists in six tournament matches. In her two trips to the NCAA Tournament, Johnson has helped UT post four shutouts, including back-to-back blankings in last year's first and second rounds.

of the tournament just once before, in 1998, when it topped South Carolina before falling to North Carolina.

Western Carolina enters the other first round match with a 13-7-2 record after taking its second Southern Conference Tournament title in program history. The Catamounts topped UNC Greensboro on penalty kicks after playing to a 0-0 draw through overtime. WCU will face No. 1-seeded UNC for the second time ever. The last time the two teams met, the Tar Heels earned a 2-0 victory in Western Carolina's first NCAA Tournament appearance in 2005.

North Carolina is an 18-time NCAA Champion and enters the tournament as one of the four top seeds. The Tar Heels are 19-1-2 overall and took their 19th Atlantic Coast Conference championship on Sunday with a 3-0 win over Virginia Tech. UNC will play host to three other conference champions in the first and second rounds and is looking to get back into the College Cup after getting bounced from the tournament in the Sweet 16 in 2007.

The winners of the two first-round matches will meet in the second round on Sunday, Nov. 16, with the victor advancing to the Sweet 16. Friday's action begins with Western Carolina versus No. 1 North Carolina at 5 p.m., followed by the 49ers and the Lady Vols at 7:30 p.m. Kick off for Sunday's second round is set for 1 p.m. All matches will be held at Fetzer Field in Chapel Hill, N.C. Live statistics will be available at utladyvols.com.

Tales from the Tournament

The Orange and White will make its fourth trip to Chapel Hill, N.C., in the NCAA Tournament and its second for the opening rounds. The last time the Lady Vols traveled to UNC in the tournament, the Tar Heels posted a 6-2 victory in the 2006 Sweet 16. In its only first round match at Fetzer Field in 2001, Tennessee played through four overtime periods to a 1-1 draw with Duke before falling on penalties, 4-2.

The Big Orange comes into the 2008 first round with a 6-0-1 record in the initial match of the tournament. Last year, Tennessee hosted Furman, topping the Lady Paladins, 2-0, to advance to a second round matchup with Clemson. After playing to a scoreless draw with the Tigers, the Lady Vols got a game winner in double overtime from Kylee Rossi to move on to the Sweet 16. UT traveled cross-country to face No. 2 Portland, falling 3-0 to the Pilots. In the loss, keeper Jaimel Johnson set a new program NCAA Tournament record with 12 saves.

All-time the Orange and White has posted nine shutouts in the NCAA Tournament, while scoring two or more goals in seven matches. UT has played overtime in the tournament three times, with two of those matches being decided on penalties.

Postseason Performers

Two current Lady Vols are among the program's all-time leading scorers in NCAA Tournament play. Senior forward Kylee Rossi is Tennessee's career tournament points and goals leader with 11 and four, respectively. Meanwhile, junior midfielder Mick Imgram has posted two goals and four assists in tournament play in her first two years in the Orange and White. Last year, Rossi scored two of the Lady Vols' three goals in the tournament, while Imgram notched the other.

Figuring Out the 49ers

Charlotte comes into the 2008 NCAA Tournament with a 17-3-1 overall record and is riding a 14-match winning streak that began on Sept. 21. During that span, the 49ers went 11-0 in Atlantic 10 play, won the regular season and conference tournament titles and outscored its opponents 52-6. Charlotte is making its fourth appearance in the NCAA Tournament and has a record of 1-2-0 all-time in the event.

The 49er offense ranks fifth in NCAA Division I, averaging 3.19 goals per game. Junior midfielder Hailey Beam, sophomore forward Whitney Weinraub and sophomore midfielder Sam Huecker have combined to record half of Charlotte's points this season, posting 35 goals and 35 assists. Beam leads the squad with 17 goals and 47 points on the year, ranking seventh in the nation in points per game. Beam has notched five game winners this year, while Weinraub and freshmen forwards Oni Bernard and Jonna Handra have posted three match winners apiece. The 49ers had seven All-Atlantic 10 selections this season and saw Weinraub named Offensive Player of the Year and Beam earn Midfielder of the Year honors.

Junior goalkeeper Lauren Brown has played a majority of the minutes between the



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pipes for Charlotte this season. Her 0.89 goals against average ranked fifth in the A-10, while her seven shutouts were second-most in the conference. Brown has posted a record of 17-2-1 while allowing just 17 goals this year.

Tennessee and Charlotte have met just once before. The Lady Vols posted a 3-0 victory over the 49ers in the First Tennessee Classic on Sept. 14, 2003. Last year, Charlotte traveled to Knoxville for the NCAA Tournament but fell in the first round to Clemson.

UT Head Coach Angela Kelly will face off against fellow UNC alum Jon Lipsitz who is in his fourth season at the helm for Charlotte. During his time with the 49ers, Lipsitz has led the squad to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances and A-10 titles, compiling a record of 57-22-4.

The Tournament Field

The 2008 tournament field features Notre Dame, North Carolina, UCLA and Stanford as No. 1 seeds. No. 2 national seeds include Florida State, Portland, Florida and Virginia, while Boston College, Wake Forest, Duke and Texas A&M each earned a No. 3 seeding. Colorado, Oklahoma State, Missouri and defending national champion USC round out the top 16 teams as No. 4 seeds.

UT is one of six Southeastern Conference teams in the 2008 NCAA Tournament field, joining Florida, LSU, Auburn, Georgia and South Carolina. Three SEC squads will play in the state of North Carolina for the first and second rounds, with Tennessee, Georgia and South Carolina playing at ACC host sites. The Bulldogs will take on James Madison at Wake Forest, while the Gamecocks will face William & Mary at Duke. Both Florida and Auburn will host the opening rounds and LSU will travel to Texas A&M to take on Washington.

The Lady Vols have played 13 matches this season against NCAA Tournament teams. UT has faced 10 invited squads including No. 1-seeded North Carolina and No. 2 Florida. The Orange and White has posted a 5-7-1 record this season against those teams, going 2-0-1 against tournament teams in last week's SEC Championship run.

Tennessee Captures SEC Tournament Title

Tennessee became the lowest seeded team to ever win the SEC Tournament Championship last week after downing fourth-seeded Georgia, 1-0, on Sunday afternoon in Orange Beach, Ala. The sixth-seeded Lady Vols got the only goal they needed from sophomore midfielder Julie Edwards in the 51st minute of the title game. Edwards one-timed a cross from sophomore midfielder Tanya Emerson past Georgia keeper Michelle Betos for the score. Senior keeper Jaimel Johnson made four saves to keep the Bulldogs out of the back of the net and record her fifth shutout of the season.

Johnson earned the SEC Tournament Most Valuable Player Award after posting a 0.62 goals against average and 13 saves on the week along with two penalty kick stops against LSU. Joining Johnson on the All-Tournament Team were Edwards, sophomore midfielder Tanya Emerson whose four points in the tournament led UT, and freshman midfielder Chelsea Hatcher who paced the squad with 14 shots on the week.

Road to the SEC Championship Game

Sixth-seeded Tennessee worked hard to earn its spot in the SEC Tournament final. First, the Lady Vols tackled third-seeded Auburn before battling with No. 2 LSU in the Nov. 7 semifinal.

Meeting Auburn for the second time in two weeks, the Orange and White got redemption after falling to the Tigers in the regular season, with a 2-1 victory on Nov. 5. UT got on the board just two minutes into the match when sophomore midfielder Devon Swaim played a ball into the slot where sophomore forward Tanya Emerson connected with a one-timer for the early 1-0 lead. Junior forward Mick Imgram scored the eventual game winner for the Lady Vols in the 57th minute. The Clifton, Va., native blasted a rocket of a shot to the far post from 20 yards out on the right side, finding the back of the net for the 2-0 lead. Though the Tigers converted on a penalty in the 62nd minute, UT held on to advance to its first semifinal since 2006.

Awaiting the Orange and White in the semifinal was LSU. Though Tennessee topped the Tigers 2-1 during the regular season, LSU had captured a share of the SEC West crown and won seven of nine matches since that match.

The Lady Vols scored first again, as Emerson teamed up with sophomore defender Grace Cuenin to find the back of the net in the 20th minute. Emerson's corner found Cuenin in the box where she poked in a shot past LSU keeper Mo Isom who had come off her line on the corner kick. The goal was the first of Cuenin's career and marked the second straight match in which Emerson recorded a point. Both teams battled back and forth until the Tigers scored the equalizer in the 54th minute. From there the defenses held strong, as the two squads played to a 1-1 draw through 110 minutes.

The subsequent penalty kick shootout saw Tennessee senior keeper Jaimel Johnson stop two LSU shots, while the Lady Vols converted on four of five to advance, 4-2. The match marked the sixth that went to extra time for UT at the SEC Tournament and the third time the Lady Vols have advanced in the tournament on penalty kicks.

Out of the Woodworks

With senior forward and four-time team leading scorer Kylee Rossi out with an injury, the Lady Vols have needed some new faces to step up on offense to get the job done. Step up they have, as sophomores Tanya Emerson, Grace Cuenin, Julie Edwards and Devon Swaim, and junior Mick Imgram proved in the SEC Tournament.

After going nine matches without a goal, Imgram provided the game winner in the Nov. 5 win over Auburn. Playing at forward, Imgram created havoc in the Tiger backline throughout the match, and beat keeper Allison Whitworth from 20 yards for the score.

Playing at both forward and midfield, Emerson has been on fire of late. Despite finishing 2007 as the Lady Vols' fourth-leading scorer, Emerson had yet to notch a point, until Nov. 5. Needless to say, Emerson has picked a fantastic time to step up, as she posted a goal and two assists during the tournament, earning all-tournament team honors.

With her goal in the Nov. 7 semifinal draw with LSU, Cuenin may have jump started the final step in her transformation from rarely-used walk-on to legitimate center back for Tennessee. After playing in just seven matches last season as a midfielder, Cuenin has worked to earn a spot as one of UT's starting center backs where she has made numerous plays to keep opponents off the scoreboard this year. As a target in the air on corner kicks, Cuenin has started to come into her own in the box and demonstrated that fact with her goal against the Tigers.

As Tennessee's second-leading scorer, Swaim may not have come out of nowhere, but she has definitely elevated her play ever since the start of the conference season. Swaim has recorded at least one point in six of the last 11 matches, posting three goals and four assists during that span.

Finally, Edwards' continuously improving performance led to Tennessee's game winner in the SEC Tournament final, where the Glenmoore, Pa., native one-timed an Emerson pass for her second goal of the season. Edwards was a force in the midfield throughout the event earning her a spot on the all-tournament team.

Baird Named to SEC Community Service Team

Molly Baird was named to the Southeastern Conference Community Service Team for the second consecutive year on Nov. 7. The redshirt sophomore goalkeeper joins 11 players from the other SEC schools on the team which highlights an athlete from each school who gives back to their community in superior service efforts.



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Baird has been a major presence in the Knoxville community throughout her Lady Vol career and over the past year she has again been a leader in on- and off-campus service projects. Active in Tennessee's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), Baird worked to publicize last year's Holiday Dinner for the Homeless and to organize September's SAAC canned food drive for the Second Harvest Food Bank of East Tennessee.

The Raleigh, N.C., native has also become involved in several projects to benefit children in the Knoxville area. Last holiday season, she helped organize a Fellowship of Christian Athletes/Athletes In Action campaign to provide Christmas gifts for underprivileged children in Knoxville. Baird also has made visits with her teammates to the East Tennessee Children's Hospital and volunteers regularly at UT's youth soccer clinics.

Baird also has read to children with her teammates to promote reading and volunteers at an elementary school with the Lady Vol strength and conditioning staff to promote healthy lifestyles among students.

After serving her time as a backup to All-American Jaimel Johnson, Baird will get her chance to win the starting spot for Tennessee in 2009. In her second appearance as a Lady Vol, Baird helped UT to a 5-0 shutout of Chattanooga to open the 2008 season. As a prep athlete, Baird was a five-year member of the Region III Olympic Development Program team and led her high school squad to four straight appearances in the North Carolina High School Athletic Association 4A title game, winning three titles.

The SEC's Finest

Three Lady Vols were named to the 2008 All-SEC and All-Freshman Teams on Nov. 5. Seniors Kylee Rossi and Jaimel Johnson earned spots on the first and second teams, respectively, while Chelsea Hatcher was selected for the All-Freshman Team.

A native of Pennington, N.J., Rossi led the SEC in scoring in 2008 with 13 goals, including nine during conference play. She accounted for all but five of the Lady Vols' goals and posted two game winners during the league campaign. The forward also set a UT record this season, becoming the program's career points leader on Oct. 5. The selection is the fourth of Rossi's career and her third straight to the first team.

In her third season as Tennessee's starting keeper, Johnson has recorded a 1.49 goals against average during conference play, shutting out two opponents and recording 40 saves. The Dayton, Ohio, native played every minute in goal for the Orange and White this SEC season, recording five wins. Johnson currently holds the No. 2 spot in career shutouts, saves and goals against average at UT.

Since the start of conference play, Hatcher has become a presence in the Lady Vol midfield. The Cincinnati, Ohio, native tied for third on the team with 22 shots during SEC play, helping the Orange and White lead the league in shots. Though she has yet to find the back of the net during her young career, Hatcher has come on strong of late, earning a spot in the starting midfield and playing at least 80 minutes in each of the last four matches.

Seniors Say So Long

The 2009 Lady Vol graduating class made its final regular season appearance at Regal Soccer Stadium on Oct. 31. Seniors Jaimel Johnson, Kylee Rossi, Sarah Van Sickle, Leslie Vineyard and Alissa VonderHaar donned the Orange and White for the final time in Knoxville after four seasons of success at UT.

The five seniors have helped to bring the Big Orange to new heights. During their tenure, Tennessee has posted a 50-28-9 record overall while earning two berths in the NCAA Sweet 16 and winning one SEC Triple Crown. The quintet was at its best in Knoxville, helping the Lady Vols win 83 percent of their matches at home, notching 20 shutouts in 29 wins there since 2005.

Between them, the five seniors have also garnered numerous accolades over the past four years. Johnson became Tennessee's third NSCAA All-American in 2007, while Rossi is UT's only SEC Offensive Player of the Year, winning the award in each of the past two seasons. All five seniors were named Academic All-SEC last season, with Van Sickle, Vineyard and Johnson each earning three-straight selections to the team.

Johnson and Rossi have combined to take the record books by storm during their time at UT. Rossi enters Friday's match as the school record holder in career points (102), goals (43), game winners (15), golden goals (4) and shots (329), as well as single-season shots (96 in 2007). The Pennington, N.J., native is also set to become the only player to lead the team in scoring in each of her four seasons in the Orange and White.

Meanwhile, Johnson comes into the last week of the season in UT's top three in minutes played (5,104), saves (236), shutouts (19), victories (29), matches (57) and goals against average (1.06). The Dayton, Ohio, native also set a program record with 111 saves in 2007, while falling just one blank sheet short of helping UT topple the teams record.

Back in the Game

Senior midfielder Leslie Vineyard returned to the field for the first time since suffering a knee injury on Sept. 7. The St. Louis, Mo., native came on in the 25th minute of the Oct. 17 win over Ole Miss, playing 66 minutes and helping UT hold the Rebels' leading scorer, Jennifer Hance, without a shot. Vineyard also saw time in the Oct. 19 victory over Mississippi State, notching one shot in her 24 minutes on the pitch.

Despite having its deepest bench in recent history, the sight of Vineyard on the field is a relief for UT. The senior, whose first career goal was the game winner at Chattanooga on Aug. 22, had played at least 60 minutes in each of the first four matches before her injury. Last season, she played every minute of 13 matches, starting 21 of 22 in the midfield.

Joining Vineyard on the list of players returning from injury are freshman forward Emily Dowd and sophomore forward Anna Fisher.

First Timers

Several of the Lady Vols' 11 rookies are already making an impact on the field for Tennessee this season. True freshmen Hannah Hut, Emily Dowd, Emily Shore, Chelsea Hatcher and Lara Langworthy and redshirt freshman Molly Delk have all earned substantial minutes this year, both as starters and substitutes.

Shore and Delk lead the rookies with eight starts this season, while Hut and Dowd have been in the starting lineup six times. Hatcher has made five starts and came off the bench against Western Carolina to play 57 minutes and assist Kylee Rossi on the game winner. Langworthy earned her first career start against Ole Miss and has provided quality minutes off the bench, seeing time in 14 games this season. Dowd sits in fifth on the team with three points on the year. If the trend continues, the UT rookies look set to make the most of their four years in the Orange and White.

UT Sweeps Mississippi Trip

Tennessee recorded its second weekend sweep of the conference season, topping Ole Miss, 1-0, on Oct. 17 before coming from behind to beat Mississippi State, 2-1, on Oct. 19.

Senior forward Kylee Rossi notched the game winner against the Rebels, heading home sophomore forward Devon Swaim's rebound off the crossbar. The UT defense held Ole Miss leading scorer Jennifer Hance without a shot in the match while recording its fifth shutout of the season.

After allowing the first goal to the Bulldogs, the Lady Vols bounced back in the second half with Rossi and Swaim coming through again with goals. The scores marked the fifth match in the last six that Rossi and Swaim have each recorded a point. Rossi's 12th goal of the year tied her career high set last year, while Swaim set a new season high with her third score in 2008. The win also marked the first time this year that Tennessee has won a match when it did not score the first goal.

Rossi Named to National Team of the Week

Kylee Rossi was named to the National Team of the Week by Top Drawer Soccer on Oct. 13. The selection comes after the senior forward notched two goals in the Lady Vols' win over Kentucky on Oct. 10.

In the 3-2 victory over the Wildcats, Rossi opened the scoring just 10 minutes into the match, and notched another goal in the second half. The match marked her second two-goal effort of the season and her first since the opener on Aug. 22.

Rossi tied for the team lead with nine shots on the weekend. She now sits at 40 goals and 96 points in her career, both program records. Following her weekend performance, Rossi is now just two goals away from matching her career-high of 12 set last season. She is also well on her way to becoming the only player to lead the team in scoring in each of their four seasons in the Orange and White.

Recording Artist

Kylee Rossi continued to solidify her place as the most prolific scorer in Tennessee women's soccer history on Oct. 5. The senior forward helped lead the Orange and White



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to back-to-back victories last week, while setting a new record for career points at UT.

Rossi totaled five points in wins over then-No. 15 LSU and Arkansas, scoring two goals and dishing out one assist. In Friday's 2-1 victory over the Tigers, the Pennington, N.J., native scored her 37th career goal and 14th career game winner to move past former Lady Vol Rhian Wilkinson to the top of Tennessee's career points list. Friday's game winner pushed Rossi to 89 career points, surpassing Wilkinson's record of 88 set in 2003.

In a 2-0 win over Arkansas on Sunday, Tennessee's leading scorer added to her weekend résumé. First, the senior dished the ball to sophomore forward Devon Swaim who scored from close range to put the Orange and White on the board in the 49th minute with the eventual game winner. Then, 13 minutes later, Rossi changed her role, this time receiving a ball in the box from junior midfielder Mick Imgram in the box to score the insurance goal for UT.

With a goal and an assist on Oct. 7, Rossi posted a season-high of three points in the match while continuing to add to her new record. Her 12 goals this year rank first in the Southeastern Conference.

Following the weekend performance, Rossi is now Tennessee's career record holder in points (100), goals (42), shots (372), game winners (15) and golden goals (4).

On the heels of her record-breaking weekend performance on the pitch, Rossi was named the Lady Vol Athlete of the Week and earned a spot on the *Soccer Buzz* National Elite Team of the Week.

Pick of the Litter

Assistant Coach Keeley Dowling was selected as the first pick of the second round in the Women's Professional Soccer (WPS) draft on Oct. 6. The former Lady Vol All-American was chosen as the eighth overall pick by the New Jersey/New York franchise, Sky Blue FC. The inaugural season of the WPS, which represents the highest level of women's professional soccer in the United States, is scheduled to begin in April 2009.

The 2005 Tennessee graduate last played professionally in Örebro, Sweden from 2006-07, after spending a season with the Charlotte Lady Eagles of the W-League. During her time with KIF Örebro, Dowling played against former U.S. National Team member Tiffeny Milbrett and 2007 FIFA World Player of the Year, Marta, of Brazil.

Last April, Dowling signed a contract with the U.S. Women's National Team. The contract guarantees the Carmel, Ind., native an opportunity to compete for a roster spot whenever the team plays. Dowling won gold medals at the 2004 Nordic Cup with the Under-21 National Team and with the Under-19 National Team at the 2002 World Championships.

During her playing days at Tennessee, Dowling was the Lady Vols' first National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-American, earning three selections including two to the first team in 2003 and 2004. The defender was a two-time Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Year and helped UT to its first NCAA Tournament appearance, as well as its initial NCAA Sweet 16 berth, SEC Tournament Championship and SEC Triple Crown.

Dowling joins a Sky Blue FC roster that includes fellow draft selections goalkeeper Cori Alexander, midfielder Kacey White and defender Jenny Anderson-Hammond, as well as 2008 U.S. Olympic gold medalists Natasha Kai, Christie Rampone and Heather O'Reilly. Three players on the roster were members of NCAA National Championship teams during their college careers, while 10 have earned at least one cap with their home country's full national team.

Stay CLASSy, Tennessee

Kylee Rossi was named as a candidate for the 2008 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award on Sept. 17. The senior forward is among 30 women's soccer seniors nominated for the honor which is presented each year to the senior student-athlete who best exemplifies dedication and achievement in competition, character, the classroom and the community. Rossi is the only representative from the SEC among the candidates for the award.

Already at the top of Tennessee's career goals list, Rossi became the Lady Vols' all-time points leader on Oct. 3. The Pennington, N.J., native has put away 38 career goals and is the only player to lead UT in scoring in three consecutive seasons.

Off the field, Rossi also has been a solid representative of the Lady Vol soccer program. A sport management major, she entered her senior year with a 3.1 overall grade point average, and was named Academic All-SEC for the first time in 2007.

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for 2008-09, Rossi will help to organize and manage community service activities for UT student-athletes throughout the year. Along with the other SAAC members, she will also serve as a liaison in bringing issues important to student-athletes to the attention of the conference and national SAAC representatives. The senior is also an active member in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes/Athletes In Action organizations.

An acronym for "Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School," the CLASS award was launched during the 2001-02 season in response to the trend of college basketball players leaving college early to turn professional. A national media committee will select 10 finalists for the 2008 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award in October. Those 10 student-athletes will then be placed on the official ballot for a nationwide vote beginning October 9 and concluding November 19. Winners will be announced during the 2008 NCAA Division I Women's Soccer Championships in Cary, N.C.

Return of the MAC

For the third consecutive year, a Lady Vol has earned a spot on the Missouri Athletic Club (MAC) Hermann Trophy Preseason Watch List. This year, Jaimel Johnson and Kylee Rossi are among 47 players chosen to the 2008 watch list for the prestigious award which is presented each year to the top player in Division I women's soccer. Johnson and Rossi's selection marks the first time in program history that two players from UT have earned a spot on the watch list.

Johnson set a new UT standard for saves in a season last year, making 111 in her 22 starts. The Dayton, Ohio, native recorded 10 solo shutouts while being named to the All-SEC First Team. In the NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 loss to Portland, Johnson recorded a career-high 12 saves after facing 28 Pilots' shots.

With her blanking of Western Carolina on Sept. 19, Johnson moved into second in career shutouts at Tennessee. Her 0.96 career goals against average ranks her behind only former Lady Vol Vanessa Phillips-Bosshart in that category in the UT annals.

Rossi makes her second consecutive appearance on the Hermann Trophy Watch List after becoming Tennessee's all-time leading goal scorer in 2007 with 30 career strikes. Last year, Rossi set four new Lady Vol career records and one single season mark. Along with career goals, the Pennington, N.J., native now leads UT in all-time game winners (14), overtime game winners (4) and shots (298). She also established a new single season record last year with 96 shots.

For her efforts in 2007, Rossi earned her second consecutive SEC Offensive Player of the Year Award and a spot on the Soccer Buzz All-America Third Team. The forward now needs just six points to surpass former Lady Vol and Canadian Olympic Team member Rhian Wilkinson for the program's all-time scoring record. Teamed with one of Tennessee's strongest returning midfielders, Rossi will look to continue her record setting this season.

The Orange and White has had two players named semifinalists for the Hermann Trophy in Kim Patrick and current assistant coach Keeley Dowling. Patrick was named a finalist in 2002, while Dowling earned a spot among the semifinalists in both 2003 and 2004.

First Time's A Charm

Freshman forward Emily Dowd proved that nerves were no match for her goal-seeking mindset in the first match of her collegiate career at Chattanooga. The Gainesville, Fla., native entered the season opener on Aug. 22 in the 29th minute and made an immediate impact up top, taking two shots before the end of the half. Dowd returned 20 minutes into the second frame, where she converted on just the third shot of her collegiate career. A cross on the ground to the far post found a sprinting Dowd, who scored for the first time in the Orange and White, following the ball into the back of the net. The rookie finished the night with four shots in 33 minutes for a promising start to her time as a Lady Vol.

Repeat Performance

For the second straight season, the Lady Vol coaching staff features a new face on the sidelines in former Lady Vol defensive stand-out Keeley Dowling. The Carmel, Ind., native returns to Rocky Top following the departure of three-year assistant and former Lady Vol Jen Laughridge Grubb, who left to raise daughter Riley Elisabeth, born Nov. 13, 2007. Dowling joins the staff after spending time playing professionally in Sweden and serving as the interim assistant during Grubb's maternity leave.

Dowling brings a long list of playing credentials with her to the staff as one of the program's most decorated student-athletes. A three-time National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-American and two-time Southeastern Conference (SEC) Defensive Player of the Year, Dowling patrolled the backline for Tennessee from 2001-04. In her final two seasons with the Lady Vols she was a semifinalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy.
