### GAME INFORMATION

After posting its first Big 12 win of the season at home against Kansas State, the Red Raiders head back out on the road in search of their first road victory of the 2009 season. Texas Tech travels north to face the No. 15/17 Nebraska Cornhuskers on Saturday afternoon at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln, Neb. Kickoff has been set for 2:30 p.m. and the game is SOLD OUT.

### RANKINGS

Nebraska is ranked No. 15 by the Associated Press and No. 17 in the USA Today/Coaches poll. Texas Tech is unranked but did receive one vote the this week's AP poll.

### TELEVISION

Saturday's game will be televised on a regional basis by ABC Sports. Mike Patrick (play-by-play), Craig James (analyst) and Heather Cox will call the action live from Memorial Stadium. Scott Matthews will produce the game for ABC which will be presented in high-definition.

### TECH LOOKING FOR FIRST ROAD WIN

The Red Raiders will be in search of their first road win of the season on Saturday and Nebraska's Memorial Stadium will present another big challenge for Texas Tech. Tech has

dropped its last four contests on the road, including the 2009 AT&T Cotton Bowl against Ole Miss. Tech's last road win was at No. 19 Kansas on Oct. 25 of last season. Since that 63-21 win over the Jayhawks, Tech has fallen at No. 5 Oklahoma, vs. No. 20 Ole Miss (Cotton Bowl), No. 2 Texas and No. 17 Houston.

► Texas Tech's last five road trips have been at ranked opponents (Kansas, Oklahoma, Ole Miss, Texas and Houston) and with No. 15/17 Nebraska on tap this weekend, that will make it six in a row for the Red Raiders.

► The last time Tech faced an unranked opponent on the road was last season at Texas A&M (43-25 Tech win).

### THE SERIES

Texas Tech will take a three-game win streak against Nebraska into Saturday's game, the longest such streak in school history over the Huskers. Nebraska leads the all-time series 7-3 with the first meeting between the schools dating back to the 1976 Bluebonnet Bowl, a 27-24 win by the Huskers. From that point, Nebraska reeled off seven-straight wins in the series before Tech claimed its first-ever win in 2004 (70-10 at Jones AT&T Stadium). In 2005, the Red Raiders picked up their first win in Memorial Stadium as Tech scored in the final minute to post a 34-31 victory. Tech extended its win streak to three-games last season with a 37-31 overtime win on homecoming.

► Texas Tech is 1-3 all-time in Memorial Stadium.

## MIKE LEACH RADIO SHOW

Red Raider Football with Mike Leach returns for another season but this year it will be heard on the new flagship station for Texas Tech Sports - Double T 104.3 The show is hosted each week by **Robert Giovannetti** and **Chris Level**. The show gets underway on Sept. 3 and will continue each Thursday evening from 6 p.m. until 7 p.m. The show will tape live from Ruby Tequila's across on University Ave. across the street from Jones AT&T Stadium.

**A QUICK LOOK AT THE HUSKERS**

The Nebraska Cornhuskers overcame a driving rain storm in Columbia, Mo., on Thursday evening to log a 27-12 come-from-behind win over the Tigers. The Husker win snapped a two-game losing skid to the Tigers and gave Nebraska its 33rd league opening win in the last 35 years. Nebraska scored all 27 of its points in the fourth quarter to improve to 4-1 overall and to 1-0 in the Big 12. The win vaulted the Huskers up six spots (from No. 21) to No. 15 in the AP poll on Sunday morning.

► The Huskers boast the third best defense in the Big 12 as they are allowing just 271.4 yards-per-game. The Nebraska pass defense is tops in the league as they have held opponents to an average of just 162.6. The Huskers also own the top scoring defense in the league as they are holding opponents to an average of eight points per-game.

► Offensively, the Huskers own the sixth ranked total offense in the league at 404.6 yards-per-game. The Husker attack is balanced between the rush and the pass as the rushing offense ranks eighth in the league (168.0 yards-per-game) while the passing attack ranks seventh (236.6 yards-per-game).

**LAST TIME AGAINST NEBRASKA**

**LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)** -- Eric Morris scooted 1 yard around right end for a touchdown in overtime and Jamar Wall made that score stand up for Texas Tech with an interception, and the seventh-ranked Red Raiders defeated Nebraska 37-31 on Saturday.

Texas Tech (6-0, 2-0 Big 12) left the door open for the Cornhuskers to win it with a touchdown and extra point, when the Red Raiders botched the PAT after Morris' score.

But the mistake didn't cost the Red Raiders. Joe Ganz, who threw for 349 yards for Nebraska (3-3, 0-2), was scrambling and trying to throw the ball away on the Huskers' second play when Jamar Wall intercepted along the Texas Tech sideline to end the game.

Graham Harrell, who threw for two touchdowns and ran for another, was 20-of-25 for 284 yards.

Late in regulation Harrell threw a 47-yarder to Michael Crabtree on fourth-and-5 from the Red Raiders 36 to keep Texas Tech's drive alive after Nebraska tied it at 24 to midway through the fourth quarter.

A few plays later Harrell took it in on a sneak to put Tech up 31-24.

Ganz brought the Huskers back in quickly. Todd Peterson caught two passes from Ganz for 11 yards each en route to completing a 17-yarder for a TD to cap an eight-play drive in 1:52 - the shortest possession for the Huskers all day.

Nebraska trailed throughout but got back in on a gamble. Jake Wesch came in to hold for a field goal early in the fourth quarter but instead threw for a first down to Mike McNeill on a fake to give Nebraska a first down at the 1.

Ganz took it in for a score with a quarterback sneak to pull Nebraska within 24-17 with 12:10 remaining.

After holding Texas Tech to its first three-and-out, the Huskers went 68 yards to tie it at 24-24 with about six minutes remaining. Ganz hit Dreu Young for a 2-yard TD score.

**TECH TIES HOME WIN STREAK RECORD**

Tech's 66-14 win over Kansas State gave the Red Raiders a school-record tying 12-straight wins at home. Tech previously won 12-straight home games between the 1939 and 1941 seasons. The Red Raiders can establish a new school record in two weeks when they host arch rival Texas A&M on Oct. 24.

**LEACH ERA HISTORY MADE AGAINST K-STATE**

History was made against Kansas State on Saturday night, as for the first time in the Mike Leach era a starting quarterback missed a start. Junior quarterback Steven Sheffield made his first career start against the Wildcats in place of Taylor Potts. Potts was knocked out of the New Mexico game in the second quarter and did not return. Prior to the KSU game, a Tech starting quarterback under Mike Leach had never missed a start.

**SHEFFIELD MAKES HISTORY IN HIS FIRST START**

Steven Sheffield, making his first career start, established a new school record in the first half as he threw for 370 yards and five touchdowns to help guide Tech to a 38-0 halftime lead over K-State. Sheffield surpassed B.J. Symons' mark of 367 yards thrown in the second half at Mississippi on Sept. 27, 2003, to earn the school record. Cody Hodge's 356 yards against Sam Houston State in the first half of that contest on

Sept. 17, 2005, ranks as the third most yards in a single half.

► Final stat line for Sheffield: 33-of-41 for 490 yards and seven touchdowns.

► Tossed his seventh touchdown pass of the game (tied for second most in school history) with 12:34 remaining in the fourth quarter when he connected with Lyle Leong for a 25-yard TD. *Sheffield is the second Tech quarterback this season to throw seven touchdown passes in a game as Taylor Potts did so against Rice back on Sept. 12.*

**TECH WRECKS K-STATE DEFENSE**

The Kansas State defense came into last Saturday's game with the top pass defense in the Big 12 and ranked third overall in total defense. That all changed in Jones AT&T Stadium. The Texas Tech offense racked up a season-high 739 yards of total offense, including 554 through the air. In all, 12 different receivers caught passes against the Wildcats with Detron Lewis leading the way with 100 yards on eight catches.

• Combined with the last visit by Kansas State here in 2005, the Red Raiders have torched the Wildcats for 1,423 yards of total offense.

**739**

Texas Tech cranked out a season-high 739 yards of total offense on Saturday night against Kansas State. The 739 yards of offense is the most by any school in the Big 12 this season with Texas' 639 yards against UTEP coming in a distant second place. The yardage was also the third most in school history for the Red Raiders, trailing 775 yards put up against Iowa State in 2003 and 770 yards against Sam Houston State in 2005.

► Texas Tech ranks second nationally in total offense as the Red Raiders are averaging 521.5 yards-per-game. Houston is the national leader with an average of 569.2.

► The 739 yards by the Tech offense is the second highest output of the season in the NCAA. Nevada is on top of the NCAA list as they put up 773 yards of total offense against UNLV.

**DEFENSE KEY IN WIN OVER K-STATE**

The Texas Tech defense enjoyed its best outing of the season against the Wildcats in the Big 12 home opener at Jones AT&T Stadium on Saturday. Tech held KSU to 284 yards of total offense (second lowest output of the year) while picking up two turnovers and four sacks. Franklin Mitchem, D.J. Johnson and Donnie Carona led the team with five tackles each. In the first half, Tech's swarming defense registered three sacks in the first half (two by Brandon Sharpe) and five tackles for loss. The Red Raiders held KSU to just 55 total yards of offense in the first half.

**MC SACK ATTACK**

The Ronald McDonald House couldn't be happier. Defensive Coordinator Ruffin McNeil, who has long been a champion for the local Ronald McDonald House, has his team raking in big money for his favorite charity. Each time the Red Raiders sack a quarterback, a donation is made to the Lubbock Ronald McDonald House to help a sick child and their family. With a league-leading 18 sacks on the season, the Red Raiders are not only wreaking havoc on opposing offenses but generating money for a great cause.

► With 18 sacks in six games, Tech is well on its way to surpassing last season's total of 34 sacks in 13 games.

► Tied with Oklahoma for the Big 12 lead and tied for 12th nationally.

► DE Daniel Howard, the team leader with five sacks, ranks fourth in the Big 12 and is tied for 25th nationally.

**DEFENSIVE NOTES/RANKINGS**

► Junior linebacker Brian Duncan leads the squad with 43 total tackles, including four tackles for a loss. He also leads the team with four pass breakups.

► Tech's total defense is ranked sixth in the Big 12 and 55th in the nation at 350 yards-per-game.

► Tech's rush defense is fourth in the Big 12 and 28th nationally at 107 yards-per-game.

► The Red Raiders lead the Big 12 in total tackles for loss and rank 17th nationally with 45.

**LEACH ON HIS WAY TO BECOME WINNINGEST COACH**

Mike Leach is just three wins away from surpassing Spike Dykes as the all-time leader in wins at Texas Tech. Dykes led the Red Raiders to a school record 82 wins between 1986-99 before Mike Leach took over the program. In just eight years, Leach has compiled 80 wins with 43 of those coming in the Big 12 Conference.

## "STICKS" LEADS TECH IN WIN OVER NEW MEXICO

Texas Tech head coach Mike Leach was forced to turn to his backup quarterback late in the first half against New Mexico - and boy did it pay off. Steven Sheffield, a former walk-on from Pflugerville, thrilled the Texas Tech faithful on his first drive as he led the Red Raiders on a five-play, 86-yard drive in just 58 seconds that broke a 7-7 tie and gave Tech a 14-7 lead over the Lobos at halftime.

*He wasn't done yet.*

Sheffield led Tech to three touchdowns on consecutive drives in the second half to help build a 35-7 lead. His four consecutive TD drives in the game actually gave him five-straight on the year at the time as he led Tech on a TD drive in his only other appearance this season in the game against Rice.

### Notes on Sheffield

- ▶ Spent his first three years as a walk-on before being placed on scholarship prior to this season. Earned the backup quarterback job in summer training camp.
- ▶ Nickname is "Sticks" due to the fact he is 6-4 and weighs only 190 pounds.
- ▶ Saw his first action in a game earlier this season against Rice (led Tech on a touchdown drive).
- ▶ Finished the New Mexico game 16-of-23 for 238 yards and three touchdowns.

## WITH TIME EXPIRING ....

A pretty rare feat happened for the Texas Tech offense against New Mexico. Tech closed each half with a touchdown as time expired and that marked a first in the Mike Leach era. In the first half, backup quarterback Steven Sheffield connected with Alex Torres for a 25-yard strike to the end zone as time expired to give Tech a 14-7 lead at the half. Redshirt freshman running back Harrison Jeffers made the final play of the game count as he scored on a 2-yard rush as time ran out to give Tech a 48-28 win.

## HUGE DAY FOR JEFFERS

Redshirt freshman Harrison Jeffers turned in a career day against New Mexico as he went into the endzone four different times (three on the ground and once through the air). He became the fifth player in the Mike Leach era to score four touchdowns in a game.

## BATCH KEYS TECH RUN GAME

Junior running back Baron Batch lived up to his preseason billing as a Doak Walker candidate by rushing for a career-high 114 yards on 19 carries and scored two touchdowns on against Houston. He was part of a Tech rushing attack than ran for a season high 163 yards on 32 carries. The team rushing total was the most since a 179 yard effort last season against UMass.

## SPREADING THE WEALTH

Last season Michael Crabtree (2007 and 2008 Biletnikoff winner) was the main target in Mike Leach's vaunted offense as he caught 97 balls while only two other receivers caught at least 50. This season the distribution of catches has evened out. Nine players have double digit catches this year with Alex Torres leading the way with 29. Three players (Torres, Lewis and Leong) have over 20 receptions.

## HOWARD IN THE MIDDLE OF BREAKOUT SEASON

Senior defensive end Daniel Howard seems to have saved the best for last as he is in the middle of a breakout season, in this his last year in a Red Raider uniform. Coming into the season looking at a role of a backup defensive end, Howard has forced his way not only into opposing backfields but also into a starting position. The junior leads the team with five sacks and that ranks him fourth in the Big 12. He had a career-high 11 tackles against Houston and owns 22 on the year (seventh on the team).

## STEPHENS SETS SCHOOL RECORD

True freshman running back Eric Stephens continued his impressive start to the 2009 season with a stellar showing at No. 2 Texas. He racked up an eye-catching 182 kickoff return yards to set a new Texas Tech school record for the most in a single game. The 182 yards surpassed Donny Anderson's (The Golden Palomino) mark of 169 set against Oklahoma State back in 1965 (44 years ago). His seven kick returns in the game also set a new school mark as he surpassed Ivory McCann who previously held the record of six against New Mexico in 2001.

Stephens' currently ranks 20th in the nation (No. 1 in the Big 12) with a kick return average of 29.5 yards per-game. In all, he has 236 yards on eight returns and a long of 54 yards (set against Rice).

## LEACH JOINS FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS CAST

Mike Leach made a cameo appearance on the hit NBC show "Friday Night Lights" this past week prior to Tech's game at Texas. Leach visited the set on Friday evening to record his spot in an upcoming show that should air at the end of October.

## POTTS LUCKY SEVEN

Junior quarterback Taylor Potts accomplished something against Rice that even his predecessor Graham Harrell was unable to do. Potts became the first Tech quarterback to throw for at least seven TD's in a game since B.J. Symons threw eight against Texas A&M on Oct. 4th, 2003. The junior from Abilene spread the ball around as five different players caught a TD. He finished the night 36-of-57 for 456 yards, all new career highs.

## LEONG HAULS IN THREE

For Lyle Leong, the touchdowns seems to come in bunches. The junior from Abilene caught three touchdown passes in Tech's win over Rice. The three TD receptions mark just the fourth, fifth and sixth of his career and were the first since last season's game at Kansas State. Against the Wildcats, Leong hauled in three touchdown catches and coming into tonight, those were the only touchdowns of his Texas Tech career. He finished the night with nine catches for 117 yards.

## THE TAYLOR POTTS ERA BEGINS

Texas Tech unveiled junior Taylor Potts as its starting quarterback for the 2009 season in the opener against North Dakota. Potts replaced a three-year starter in Graham Harrell who ended his career earlier this year in the Cotton Bowl and became the NCAA's all-time leader in touchdown passes. The start for Potts on Saturday was his first since leading Abilene High School in an area round playoff game against Southlake Carroll in 2005. Exactly 1,379 days ago!

- Potts' first drive was a success as he led the Red Raiders

to a touchdown on the opening possession of the game. The drive covered 64 yards on seven plays and lasted 3:18. Baron Batch capped off the drive with a three-yard rush for the first touchdown of the season for the Red Raiders.

- Potts was responsible for Tech's second touchdown of the game as he dove into the end zone on a one-yard quarterback keeper to give the Red Raiders a 13-0 lead with 6:06 remaining in the first quarter.
- Rushed for his second touchdown with 3:12 remaining in the third quarter to give Tech a 27-6 lead.
- Became only the third Tech quarterback under Mike Leach to throw for 400-plus yards in his debut.

## LEWIS SHINES IN ANOTHER SEASON OPENER

For the second-straight season, Detron Lewis was the go-to receiver for the Red Raiders in the season opener. Lewis hauled in a game-high 146 yards (one touchdown) for what was just the second 100-plus yard receiving game of his career. Lewis shined last season for the Red Raiders in the season opener against Eastern Washington as he hauled in a career-high 163 yards on nine catches.

## NEW FACES IN THE SEASON OPENER

There were plenty of new faces on the field when the Red Raiders opened up their 2009 season against North Dakota. A total of eight players made their first career starts against the Sioux, including three redshirt freshman. Making their first career starts were: QB, Taylor Potts, LT Chris Olson, Z receiver Alex Torres, H receiver Adam James, RE Daniel Howard, SS Franklin Mitchem, FS Cody Davis and RC LaRon Moore.

## CARONA DEBUTS IN NEW ROLE

Sophomore Donnie Carona debuted a new role against North Dakota - punter. Carona entered last season as Tech's placekicker but lost that battle to Matt Williams beginning with the Kansas game. In the spring, special teams coordinator Eric Russell moved Carona to punter and against North Dakota, he got the starting nod. He punted just one time in the contest and the kick went 40 yards and the Red Raiders ended up recovering a fumble on the return.

## TRUE FRESHMEN SEE PLAYING TIME

Freshman running back Eric Stephens became the first true freshman to earn playing time this season as he took part in Tech's opening touchdown drive against North Dakota. Stephens is a product of Mansfield Timberview High School. Will Ford, a freshman from Abilene Cooper, saw action in the Tech defensive backfield on the second drive by North Dakota.

## DEFENSE TURNS IN BIG EFFORT IN THE OPENER

The defensive effort against North Dakota was statistically one of the best under Ruffin McNeil - although it hardly compares to some dominating performances last season against Texas and Oklahoma State. However, the Red Raiders were solid on Saturday allowing only 207 yards of total offense (73 on the ground and 134 through the air). The 207 yards allowed was the fewest by McNeil's defense since allowing only 118 yards to Northwest Louisiana in his first game as the defensive coordinator back in 2007.

## SELLOUT STREAK SNAPPED IN SEASON OPENER

Texas Tech had its consecutive sellout streak come to an end at six games as the season opener against North Dakota drew just 47,824 fans to Jones AT&T Stadium. Tech's sellout streak began last season against SMU and the Red Raiders sold out each home game the rest of the way in 2008.

## PROTECTING THIS HOUSE

Since the start of the 2003 season, Texas Tech boasts a 36-5 record at Jones AT&T Stadium. The .874 winning percentage ranks third in the Big 12 behind only Oklahoma and Texas. The Red Raiders are currently riding an 11-game win streak at Jones AT&T Stadium with their last loss coming at the hand of Colorado on Oct. 27, 2007.

**TECH STEADY AT HOME OUT OF CONFERENCE**

Since Mike Leach's arrival in 2000, the Red Raiders boast a 23-1 non-conference record at Jones AT&T Stadium. Overall, Texas Tech is 37-9 in non-conference match-ups, including five bowl wins. The program is 8-5 on the road and 6-3 at neutral sites during the previous eight seasons.

**SEVEN STRAIGHT AND COUNTING**

Texas Tech is tied eighth nationally with Ohio State, USC and West Virginia with seven straight eight-win seasons. Georgia (12) is first, followed by Texas (11), Virginia Tech (11), Boise State (10), LSU (9), Oklahoma (9) and Boston College (8). The Red Raiders' run began during Mike Leach's third season as the team posted an 9-5 record.

**TECH IN MIDST OF WINNING SEASONS STREAK**

Texas Tech ranks fourth nationally with 14-straight winning seasons. Florida State leads with 31, while Florida (20), Virginia Tech (14) and Tech comprise the top four.

**DEFENDING BIG 12 SOUTH CHAMPIONS**

For the first time since the inception of the Big 12 Conference, the Red Raiders will take to the field in the season opener as the defending south division champions. Texas Tech ended the 2008 season in a three-way tie for the division lead with Oklahoma and Texas. The Sooners won the tie-breaker based on BCS standings and went on to defeat Missouri in the championship game.

**WE'VE BUILT IT ... AND THEY HAVE COME**

The overwhelming popularity of Red Raider Football has led to the third renovation of Jones AT&T Stadium since the arrival of head coach Mike Leach back in 2000. Last year, the athletics department secured \$25 million in funding to renovate the east side of the stadium and also add six thousand seats to the north side. The new east side stadium building will feature 500 club seats and more than 20 luxury suites and will follow in the same architecture of the existing west side stadium building. The approximate 1,000 seats in the new building along with the six thousands seats in the north end zone will bring stadium capacity close to 60,000. The seating in the north end is expected to be completed in time for the Texas A&M game on Oct. 24.

**SOMETHING OTHER THAN FOOTBALL?**

Jones AT&T Stadium was put to use for something other than football this past summer for the first time in over 20 years. The stadium held its first concert since 1987 on Aug. 7 as "The Bob Dylan Show" took over the turf and drew a crowd of more than 12,000. Bob Dylan, John Mellencamp and Willie Nelson were the featured performers and ironically it was Nelson who last headlined a concert in the stadium. The concert was met with rave revues and the stadium is being looked at in the future to host other major concert events.

**BOWL STREAK CONTINUES**

Texas Tech's appearance in the prestigious AT&T Cotton Bowl Classic back in January marked the school's 32nd postseason game (tied for 17th nationally). Texas Tech has been bowl eligible for a Big 12 record 15-straight seasons and has been to a bowl game in each of Mike Leach's eight seasons as head coach.

**TIME TO PROVE THEM WRONG AGAIN**

The Big 12 media have looked into their crystal balls and predicted that the Red Raiders will finish fourth in the Big 12 South in 2009. Texas was given the edge to take the division followed by Oklahoma and Oklahoma State. Baylor was picked fifth while Texas A&M was slotted sixth. The good news for Tech fans is that the Red Raiders have finished higher than their preseason projection in three of the last four years.

**NATIONAL TELEVISION STREAK COMES TO AN END**

Saturday's game against North Dakota will not be broadcast to a national television audience, thus ending a nine-game streak for Texas Tech. The Red Raiders were featured on national television in the final nine games of the 2008 season, including three national Saturday prime time broadcasts on ABC. Texas Tech will return to the national stage in just three weeks as the Red Raiders head to the capitol city for a match-up against the Texas Longhorns. The game will be carried live on ABC in prime time (7

p.m. CT) with Brent Musburger and Kirk Herbstreit calling the action. More than likely, ESPN's College Gameday will originate from Austin on that Saturday.

**NEW FLAGSHIP STATION**

Texas Tech has joined forces with Learfield Sports in terms of media rights and that will mean a new flagship station for Texas Tech Football as well as men's and women's basketball and baseball. Red Raider fans will now tune their dial to Double T 104.3 here in Lubbock to catch all the action. Double T 104.3 will host all of their pregame programming live from in front of the Frazier Alumni Pavillion, just across the street from gate one of Jones AT&T Stadium.

**ROSTER PREDOMINANTLY TEXAN**

To say that the Red Raider roster is predominantly "Texan" might be putting it mildly. A grand total of 95 players on the roster hail from the great state of Texas with Oklahoma coming in second with seven players. The roster features two players each from Georgia and Louisiana while New Mexico, South Carolina, California, Arizona, Tennessee, Hawaii, Kansas and Oregon have contributed one player each.

**TECH IS LEADER IN GRADUATION RATE**

One of the most important coaching philosophies for Mike Leach is that he and his staff steer each and every player toward a degree. That philosophy has certainly paid off as Texas Tech leads the Big 12 Conference in football graduation rates at 79 percent. The graduation rate was the best among any team in the Top 25 last season.

**CAPTAINS ELECTED**

A team vote has produced four captains (two from the offense and two from the defense) for the 2009 season. This year's captains will be junior quarterback Taylor Potts, senior offensive lineman Brandon Carter, senior cornerback Jamar Wall and senior defensive end RaJon Henley.

**LEACH GRACES TEXAS MONTHLY COVER**

Head coach Mike Leach became the first head coach in school history to grace the cover of the popular *Texas Monthly Magazine*. Leach is featured on the cover of the September issue while wearing an eye patch to play off his love of pirates. The cover poses the question that "he just might be the best college football coach in the country." Leach flew to Austin to tape the "Texas Monthly Talks" episode and that will air on Sept. 10 on PBS (check local listings for times).

**LEACH, TEXAS TECH AGREE TO NEW CONTRACT**

Mike Leach will be the head coach of the Red Raiders for a long time to come thanks to a new deal that was ironed out during the spring. The new contract will keep Leach as the school's "head pirate" through the 2013 season.

**FOUR RED RAIDERS NAMED TO PRESEASON LISTS**

Last year, it was Graham Harrell and Michael Crabtree garnering all the preseason accolades. This year is quite different. A total of four players have been named to preseason award lists including offensive lineman Brandon Carter, receiver Detron Lewis, running back Baron Batch and quarterback Taylor Potts. Carter led the way with his inclusion on two different awards list as he was named a preseason candidate for the Outland and Lombardi trophies. It will be up to Detron Lewis to see if Texas Tech can bring home three-straight Biletnikoff trophies as he was named to the Biletnikoff list by ESPN. Baron Batch earned a nod by the Doak Walker Award while Taylor Potts grabbed attention from the Davey O'Brien Award.

**FOUR PLAYERS LEAVE TEAM DURING CAMP**

Four players left the team during fall camp including one incoming freshman. Defensive backs Jarrell Routt (Jr.) and Angelo Traylor (So.) left the team in week three of training camp but have made no indications in regards to a transfer. Sophomore wide receiver Adrian Reese left the team in week two of camp and has transferred to Northwestern State in Louisiana. Incoming freshman Romario Cathey has returned home without ever suiting up during camp.

## FRESHMAN ARE MAKING BIG IMPACT

A slew of freshmen are making strides towards significant playing time for the Red Raiders this season. Mike Leach's tendency to use numerous running backs in his arsenal is likely to benefit Eric Stephens. The freshman from Mansfield saw significant time during fall camp and broke numerous plays including running over two defensive players to get in the end zone. The trio of Will Ford (safety), LaAdrian Waddle (offensive line) and Pearlie Graves (defensive line) are also pushing for playing time at their respective positions. These freshmen could be the biggest group in numbers to play for Tech in quite a few years. Donnie Carona and Jamar Wall are the last true freshman to see playing considerable time.

## CARTER EARNS ALL-BIG 12 PRESEASON NOD

Senior offensive lineman Brandon Carter was selected to the Big 12 Conference Preseason First Team, announced by the league office in late July. The team was voted on by the 12 conference head coaches.

Carter, a 6-foot-7, 344-pound, guard returns for his senior season as one of the nation's top interior lineman. Earlier this summer he was named a preseason first-team All-American by NationalChamps.net and a second-team selection by Phil Steele Magazine.

Last season when he didn't allow a sack from his right guard position, Carter became the first offensive lineman since Charles Odiome in 1989 to earn first-team All-America honors. Carter received first-team nods from both The Sporting News and the American Football Coaches Association.

## LINEBACKERS RETURN

The trio of Brian Duncan, Marlon Williams and Bront Bird return as the core of the defensive unit as all three started last season. Duncan was named to the All-American sophomore honorable mention team and All-Big 12 honorable mention. He led the team with 94 tackles on the season. Williams was an All-Big 12 honorable mention and recorded 72 tackles. Bird was the fourth-leading tackler on the squad. The group will add leadership and experience to the defense.

## DUNCAN NAMED TO LOTT LIST

Junior Brian Duncan was named to the Lott Award watch list. The award is given to the Defensive Impact® Player of the Year and it is a unique honor because it is the first trophy to weigh personal character as well as athletic performance for a defensive player. The award is named after Ronnie Lott who was a two-time All-American at USC and won four Super Bowl rings with the San Francisco 49ers. He is a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

## HEAD COACH MIKE LEACH

Arguably one of the most innovative coaches in the country, Mike Leach not only has transformed Texas Tech Football, but also the face of college football with an all-out aerial assault. This is evidenced by the number of programs incorporating more passing into their schemes than before. Leach's offense has become a hot commodity as coaching staffs from across the country have come to Lubbock get a glimpse into what makes the program tick; but none have mastered it like the 10th-year coach.

Leading the most prolific passing offense in the country, Leach, who received three national coach of the year awards in 2008 – the Woody Hayes Award, Howie Long/Fieldturf Coach of the Year, and George Munger Award – spreads the field with his exciting brand of football and has guided the Red Raiders to six NCAA passing titles and three total offense titles during his tenure. Leach's offense produced school records in nearly every passing category in 2000, but surpassed those numbers in each of the last nine seasons. His nine teams have combined for more than 155 team and individual records at Tech.

Texas Tech, which appeared in its second Cotton Bowl since 2005, experienced one of the most memorable seasons in school history in 2008 as the team set a program record with 11 regular-season wins en route to an 11-2 record. The win total tied the mark, set previously by the 1953 and 1973 squads. Numerous accolades poured in from across the country as an unprecedented four players earned first-team All-America status, in addition to Leach's three coach of the year honors. Quarterback Graham Harrell, offensive tackle Rylan Reed and offensive guard Brandon Carter each garnered first-team honors, while wide receiver Michael Crabtree was honored as a unanimous consensus All-American for the second-straight season.

On the field, the Red Raiders led the nation in passing for the sixth time in Leach's nine seasons and ranked among the top five in total offense. Harrell finished his storied career second on the NCAA career passing yardage list with 15,793 yards. Harrell also broke the career NCAA passing touchdowns mark with 134.

The Texas Tech program has established itself as one of the nation's leading producers of productive quarterbacks since the 2000 season. Harrell threw for 4,555 yards in his debut as the starter in 2006 and became the sixth player and third Red Raider in NCAA history to throw for 5,000 yards in a season with his 5,705-yard effort in 2007 and 5,111 yards last season. He also is the third quarterback under Leach to win nine games in a season and the first Red Raider in history to win 11 in a regular season. Former quarterback Kliff Kingsbury in 2002 and Cody Hodges in 2005 each posted nine-win seasons during their careers, while 2003 and 2004 signal callers B.J. Symons and Sonny Cumbie each won eight games in their respective seasons as the starter.

The Red Raiders have improved their total offensive numbers from 324.8 yards per game to 531.0 yards per game since Leach's arrival. The last nine seasons rank as



the top nine all-time at Tech in total offense, while scoring went from 23 points per game in 1999 to a school-record 43.8 points last season. The most significant increase has been in the passing game, where the Red Raiders averaged 475.3 yards per game in 2008 compared to 175.4 yards in 1999.

The running game has flourished under Leach as well. Former Red Raider Taurean Henderson holds the NCAA career record for receptions by a running back. The Red Raiders' 28 total rushing scores in 2008 were the most for a Tech team since the 1993 team scored 30. Despite Tech's offense revolving around the pass, Leach has done a tremendous job of incorporating the running back position into the mix. Henderson finished his career with 303 receptions, which ranks first in NCAA history among running backs and fourth overall.

The Red Raiders are not solely known for their play on the scoring side of the ball. The Texas Tech defense also has flourished during Leach's nine seasons. The Red Raiders tied for the national lead with three shutouts in 2000 and followed with others in 2001, 2002, 2005 and 2006. Combined with the six shutouts are five other games where the opposition was held without an offensive touchdown. Tech's shutout of Baylor in Waco during the 2005 season marked Tech's first blanking of a conference opponent on the road since the inception of the Big 12 Conference in 1996.

The play of the special teams also has improved with each season. Former placekicker Alex Trlica holds the NCAA record with 233 career extra points and another record for extra points made without a miss. He finished with 377 career points, which ranks among the top 10 in NCAA history among kickers.

While leading the Red Raiders to 76 wins in his nine seasons, Leach is the only coach in school history to lead nine teams to bowl games. The 76 wins are the third-most among Big 12 coaches since the 2000 season.

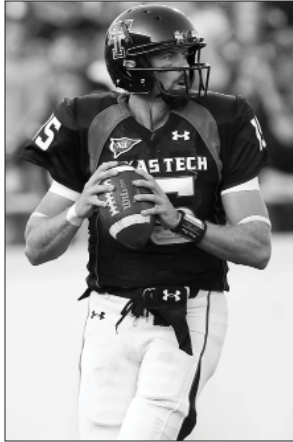

**LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)** - Taylor Potts threw for two touchdowns and ran for two others to lead Texas Tech past North Dakota 38-13 on Saturday night.

The Red Raiders (1-0) scored three of their five TDs on the ground, unusual for a team known for its pass-happy offense.

Potts, in his first start, got his rushing touchdowns on sneaks from 1 yard out. He also had three interceptions, one more than he had in the two seasons he played backup. North Dakota safety Joel Schwenzfeier intercepted all of them to tie a school record.

Tech kept the Fighting Sioux secondary wondering which receiver was Potts' target. He was 34-of-48 for 405 yards to 10 receivers.

Detron Lewis led Tech receivers with 146 yards on eight catches, pulling in Potts' longest — a 49-yarder — for a score.

Mitch Sutton got North Dakota's lone touchdown on a 9-yard run in the final quarter to whittle the margin to 28-13.

Potts' second touchdown pass came late in the game when he hit Adam James, son of former SMU running back Craig James, for an 18-

yard score to put the Red Raiders up 38-13.

North Dakota (0-1) was overmatched throughout, but the Fighting Sioux managed to keep the Red Raiders from blowing them out. Last year, Texas Tech averaged 44 points per game, so North Dakota's defense managed what many schools last year couldn't: they stayed relatively close throughout.

Before the season began Texas Tech coach Mike Leach told Potts that if he avoided interceptions and sacks he would be fine. Last year, Graham Harrell, who had two 5,000-yard passing seasons to set an NCAA record, threw nine interceptions in 13 games.

Potts' three interceptions came in 48 attempts. The two he threw as a backup came in 85 attempts.

Potts is Leach's sixth quarterback since his arrival in 2000. In eight of the past nine years, Leach's quarterbacks have led the nation in passing, and he has said Potts is better prepared in his first year than any of the others.

The Fighting Sioux, a Football Championship Subdivision team which won the Division II title in 2001, is in its second provisional year in what was formerly known as Division I-AA.

Expectations were low for North Dakota, but it wanted to keep the Red Raiders offense off the field. The Fighting Sioux's offense was successful in a couple of first-half drives but was only able to garner field goals.

Jake Landry was 20-of-28 for 134 yards in his first start for the Fighting Sioux.

North Dakota stopped Texas Tech drives with interceptions twice in the first half. Potts' second interception came as he tried to hit James along the sideline inside the Sioux 20. The ball hung in the air, and Schwenzfeier had time to move in front of James and grab the pass.

The win gave Leach his 77th victory at Tech. He is six victories short of surpassing Spike Dykes for the most wins by a Tech coach.

**LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)** - Taylor Potts threw seven touchdowns to lead Texas Tech past Rice 55-10 Saturday.

He threw TD passes of 5, 7, 8, 11, 27, 34 and 30 yards as Texas Tech moved to 2-0 on the season. Potts completed 36 of 57 passes for 456 yards and threw to 13 different receivers.

It marked his second consecutive 400-plus yard performance. Last week, though, Potts threw three interceptions; he had none against the Owls.

Lyle Leong, Potts' teammate at Abilene High, caught three of Potts' scoring strikes. Adam Zouzalik, Edward Britton, Tramain Swindall and Eric Stephens each caught one TD pass from Potts. Swindall caught a 26-yarder from backup Steven Sheffield late in the game.

Rice (0-2) used three quarterbacks, Nick Fanuzzi, John Thomas Shepherd and Ryan Lewis, but none could sustain a potent enough attack to keep up with Texas Tech's offensive.

Potts' seven TD passes fell one short of a school record. B.J. Symons had eight touchdowns against Texas A&M in 2003.

Texas Tech's tempo seemed to have smoothed out since last week. Potts wasn't throwing off his back foot like he did last week.

He left the game midway through the fourth quarter.

Rice struggled early, gaining only 6 total yards in the first quarter with Fanuzzi at quarterback. John Thomas Shepherd came in on the Owls' third possession and led them to a 45-yard field goal to whittle their deficit to 14-3.

Fanuzzi was back after halftime, though. But after three first downs, the Owls turned the ball over on downs.

Shepherd came back in the third quarter but couldn't generate much. The Owls quarterbacks completed 25 of 41 for 197 yards. Tech's defense sacked them six times.

The Owls got their only touchdown when Shepherd found Taylor Dupree on a 3-yard score in the fourth quarter. It was each player's first career score.

Rice finished with 257 total yards, less than half of Tech's 560 total yards.

Tech had two receivers with more than 100 yards.

Swindall, in his first career start, shined early. He had four catches for 67 yards at halftime and finished with 123 yards on six catches. Leong caught nine passes for 117 yards.

But Detron Lewis, one of the Red Raiders' leading receivers, went out with a hurt right leg in the second quarter. Potts handed off to Baron Batch who pitched the ball back to Potts. He heaved the ball deep down the middle to Lewis who couldn't hang onto the ball and laid sprawled on the field after the play. He limped off the field and did not return.

The Red Raiders again fell short of their per-game rushing average from last season (118 yards). In last week's 38-13 win over North Dakota, Texas Tech got only 40 rushing yards. Against the Owls, the Red Raiders ran on just 14 plays for 52 yards.

**AUSTIN, Texas (AP)** - Texas fans will call it revenge. The Longhorns were more likely to describe it as relief.

Colt McCoy threw a 3-yard touchdown pass to Dan Buckner in the fourth quarter that gave the Longhorns some room and No. 2 Texas beat feisty Texas Tech and their prolific new passer 34-24 Saturday night.

The pass to Buckner with nine minutes left put Texas ahead 31-17, but it was an otherwise shaky outing for last season's runner-up for the Heisman Trophy.

McCoy finished with 205 yards and two interceptions on 24 of 34 passing for the Longhorns (3-0, 1-0 Big 12).

After Texas Tech (2-1, 0-1) spoiled the Longhorns' national title hopes with a 39-33 win in Lubbock last season—on a touchdown with 1 second to play—a record crowd of 101,297 was looking to whoop it up for a 4-hour blowout behind McCoy & Co.

What they got was a hard-hitting first half in which neither team scored an offensive touchdown. When the fireworks finally cranked up

in the second half, they watched as Red Raiders quarterback Taylor Potts would not let the Longhorns pull away.

"Survival," Texas coach Mack Brown said. "I'm proud of the way our guys grew up, the way they worked, and fought and hit."

Potts, the latest gunslinging quarterback to guide Texas Tech's passing wizardry, finished with 420 yards and three touchdowns. But he also had two fourth quarter turnovers, including a fumble on a sack by Sergio Kindle to set up McCoy's TD pass.

Even after the big hit, Potts' led a touchdown drive to keep the Red Raiders in the game.

"He's really tough, and he didn't let the hit affect him," Texas Tech coach Mike Leach said. "Not many QBs can get hit really hard and come in the next series and not flinch."

McCoy took his share of lumps too. On one of his first runs of a game, a defender met him at the line of scrimmage and knocked his helmet off. The drive stalled when he was sacked on the next play.

Jordan Shipley's 46-yard punt return in the first quarter for Texas was the only time either team reached the end zone in the first half that ended 10-3.

Shipley caught the ball in the middle of the field, dashed straight ahead, then broke to his right and outran punter Donnie Carona to the corner. His momentum took him all the way to the massive live Longhorn mascot Bevo and he startled the big fella.

The offenses got going in the third quarter.

Texas scored the first offensive touchdown on the first drive of the second half. McCoy converted three third downs with passes before Tre' Newton scooted 19 yards up the middle for a 17-3 Texas lead.

The Red Raiders immediately answered with Potts' throwing the first of two touchdowns to Lyle Leong, who was wide open after beating cornerback Chykie Brown on a fake for a 14-yarder.

Leach tried to catch the Longhorns off guard with an inside kick, but Texas recovered at the Red Raiders' 47. Given the short field, McCoy found Buckner with a completion across the middle to the Texas Tech 1 before Cody Johnson punched it in for the touchdown.

Potts was getting better as the game wore on. The Red Raiders marched right down the field to get back within a touchdown on Potts' 10-yard TD pass to Leong again.

After picking apart the Texas defense, Potts gave up two turnovers in the fourth that swung the game.

**HOUSTON, Texas (AP)** - Houston's first win over a Big 12 opponent earned the Cougars their first ranking in 18 years.

The second makes Houston a legitimate contender to become Conference USA's first BCS buster.

Case Keenum finished off a 95-yard touchdown drive with a 4-yard quarterback keeper with 49 seconds left to give the 17th-ranked Cougars a 29-28 win over Texas Tech on Saturday night.

Houston coach Kevin Sumlin downplayed the Bowl Championship Series possibilities.

"All we can do is play the people on our schedule," he said. "We're not going worry about that."

The Cougars trailed 21-10 in the first half, but held Tech's high-powered offense to one second half score.

Houston (3-0) was playing as a ranked team for the first time in 18 years after knocking off then No. 5 Oklahoma State two weeks ago. A record crowd of 32,114, including Phi Slama Jama stars Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler showed up to cheer them on.

Keenum passed for 435 yards and kept the game-winning drive going with a 7-yard pass to Patrick Edwards on fourth-and-3.

The Red Raiders (2-2) led 28-23 midway through the fourth quarter before Will Ford's interception stopped a Cougar drive. But Tech couldn't convert and had to punt back to Houston with about six minutes remaining.

Tech had a last chance for the win but Taylor Potts' desperation throw on the last play of the game was broken up by the Cougars, sending thousands of Houston fans onto the field.

Potts finished with 321 yards passing and a touchdown pass.

"I thought it became a game of situations where Houston played better in key situations than we did," Texas Tech coach Mike Leach said.

Keenum was 38 of 58 and had a touchdown pass and an interception in the first meeting between these two teams since 1995 when both were in the Southwest Conference.

He spread the ball well with four receivers catching at least seven passes. Charles Sims led with 10 receptions for 122 yards and Tyron Carrier had eight for 99 yards.

It was the shootout most expected with the two teams combining for 1,063 yards of offense.

But the pass-happy Red Raiders relied more heavily than normal on their running game. Tech had gained 86 yards rushing in its first three games but had 163 Saturday.

Of course the Red Raiders still passed plenty. Potts was 30 for 45 with a touchdown pass.

A hands to the face penalty by Tyrell Graham erased an interception with less than a minute left in the third quarter. But the Red Raiders weren't able to take advantage of the blunder and came away empty after Potts was stuffed for no gain on fourth down from the 1.

"We need to score and then we get a half a yard," Leach said. "Hindsight I should have kicked it, which is a fairly big blotch on my part I would say."

David Hunter forced his second fumble of the night when he made Tech freshman Eric Stephens cough it up late in the third quarter. C.J. Cavness recovered it for the Cougars.

They drove to the 4, but came away with only a field goal after three consecutive incomplete passes. That left the Red Raiders ahead 28-23.

**LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)** - Backup quarterback Steven Sheffield threw for 238 yards and three touchdowns to help lead Texas Tech to a 48-28 win over New Mexico on Saturday.

Taylor Potts, the nation's leading passer, left the game before half-time after two hard sacks appeared to affect his balance. Officials from Texas Tech (3-2) declined to comment on his injury.

Sheffield threw scoring passes of 25, 20 and 62 yards. He was 16 of 23 with one interception. Alex Torres, Detron Lewis and Harrison Jeffers caught the touchdowns.

Potts was intercepted twice, both by cornerback Nathan Enriquez.

The Lobos (0-5) got their only first-half score off Potts' second interception. Donovan Porterie threw a 7-yard TD pass to Josh Fussell in the second quarter.

Porterie completed 30 of 56 passes for 316 yards and two touchdowns.

The loss for New Mexico was its ninth straight dating to last season.

The game capped a week of off-the-field distractions for both teams.

Red Raiders coach Mike Leach made headlines when he indefinitely suspended Brandon Carter, a team captain and pre-season All-America pick, for violating team rules following Texas Tech's 29-28 loss to No. 12 Houston. Carter was in the stands for much of the game. He did not practice with the team this week.

Leach also banned his players from using Twitter after learning Marlon Williams had tweeted about Leach being late to a team meeting.

For the Lobos, coach Mike Locksley is under investigation by the university following a Sept. 20 fight involving an assistant. Receivers coach J.B. Gerald told police Locksley struck him during a staff meeting. Gerald hasn't been with the team since the incident.

At the outset, Texas Tech showed no signs of being distracted.

On its first possession, Potts threw a 79-yard pass to Tremain Swindall, who outran Lobos defenders to the 1 on the Red Raiders' longest play from scrimmage this season. Jeffers took the ball in on the next play to put the Texas Tech up 7-0.

Potts, who was without a touchdown pass, was not on the sideline after halftime. He got sacked hard twice late in the second quarter.

Tech trainers checked Potts' balance - he stood on one foot and then the other - and rubbed the back of his neck.

Lobos linebacker Carmen Messina sacked Potts on a first-down play and Johnathan Rainey threw him to the ground on third-and-9 after Potts scrambled toward the far sideline late in the second quarter.

The nation's leading passer got up slowly after the second sack, then stood still momentarily as he bent over, resting his hands on his knees. His head was down as he made his way to Texas Tech's sideline.

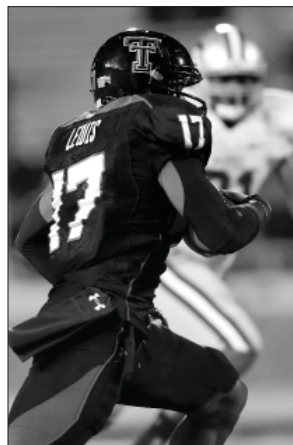
Sheffield replaced Potts and led the Red Raiders on an 86-yard drive to a touchdown, finding Torres on a 25-yard score with 1 second remaining in the half for a 14-7 lead.

**LUBBOCK, Texas (AP)** - Steven Sheffield threw for 490 yards and seven touchdown passes in his first career start to help Texas Tech beat Kansas State 66-14 on Saturday night.

The Red Raiders backup quarterback was 33-for-41 and finished with TDs passes of 52, 6, 4, 72, 28, 12 and 25 yards to five receivers.

It was the second time this season that a Texas Tech (4-2, 1-1) quarterback notched seven passing touchdowns. Taylor Potts, out with a concussion this week, threw seven in a 55-10 win over Rice.

Texas Tech put the game out of reach by halftime. The Wildcats (3-3, 1-1) got into Texas Tech territory only once in the first half and punted five times.

Sheffield, who had 370 yards by halftime, threw two TDs to Detron Lewis and Torres, and one each to Tramain Swindall, Jacoby Franks and Lyle Leong.

Sheffield's first-half yardage set a school record, besting the 367 yards thrown by B. J. Symons against Mississippi in 2003.

Three Red Raiders receivers tallied 90 yards or more. Lewis caught eight passes for 100 yards, Franks had three passes for 99 yards and Swindall got 97 yards on five catches.

Sheffield threw to 11 receivers before leaving the game with about 10 minutes remaining in the game.

Texas Tech's running game kept Kansas State off-balance. Baron Batch rushed for 86 yards on nine carries and Harrison Jeffers got 55 yards on seven carries.

The Wildcats offense was anemic in the first half. They sustained only one drive in the first half, managing four first downs and hanging onto the ball for more than six minutes on their opening possession. Grant Gregory got sacked three times--twice by Brandon Sharpe and once by Ra'Jon Henley--before Carson Coffman replaced him late in the second quarter.

Kansas State's first score came from its defense. Sheffield threw an interception on his first pass of the second half when Wildcats end Jeffrey Fitzgerald stepped in front of a ball meant for Alex Torres and returned it 17 yards to make it 38-7.

It wasn't until quarterback Carson Coffman replaced Gregory that the Wildcats showed some life. He was 11-for-17 and finished with 131 passing yards.

Coffman found some success in the third quarter but it didn't translate into a touchdown. After a 52-yard pass to Daniel Thomas and a 29-yarder to Jeron Mastrud, the Wildcats failed on a fourth-and-5 and gave the ball back to the Red Raiders.

Kansas State scored its second touchdown--and its only offensive one--midway through the fourth quarter when Kei-then Valentine ran for an 8-yard touchdown.
