TULSA GETS THIRD 10-WIN SEASON IN LAST FOUR YEARS . . . WINS THIRD STRAIGHT BOWL GAME

FINAL RELEASE

THE SEASON . . . Tulsa finished the 2010 season with an overall 10-3 record . . . the Golden Hurricane was Conference USA West Division Co-Champions with a 6-2 league mark . . . it was a season that presented some early season adversity, but one that ended with a seven-game winning streak . . . included among those final seven wins was a dramatic 28-27 win over Notre Dame for one of the most prestigious victories in school history . . . a huge Conference USA road win over rival Houston . . . a Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl victory over 24th-ranked Hawai'i, 62-35, closed out the 2010 season.

SHERATON HAWAII BOWL WAS TULSA'S FIFTH BOWL GAME IN LAST SIX YEARS; 17th OVERALL . . .

Tulsa played in its 17th Bowl Game in school history and its fifth in the last six years, as the Hurricane captured a 62-35 victory over #24-ranked Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl . . . Tulsa has now won its last three Bowl games, while averaging 56.7 points per game and allowing 18.3 points in those three games . . . Tulsa also posted a 45-13 win over #22 Ball State in the GMAC Bowl on January 6, 2009 . . . the year before, Tulsa defeated Bowling Green 63-7 in the GMAC Bowl . . . the 56-point difference in the Bowling Green game was an NCAA record for the largest margin of victory in a bowl game . . . the other two bowl appearances for the Hurricane in the last six years came in the 2006 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl and the 2005 AutoZone Liberty Bowl . . . Tulsa now has an overall 8-9 record in bowl games.



TULSA WINS 10 GAMES FOR THIRD TIME IN FOUR YEARS . . .

The Tulsa Golden Hurricane ended the season with a 62-35 victory over 24th-ranked Hawaii to clinch a 10-3 record . . . it marked the eighth time in school history that the Hurricane has won 10 games and the third time in the last four seasons . . . Tulsa finished the 2007 campaign with a 10-4 record and the 2008 season with an 11-3 mark . . . other 10-win seasons came in 1916, 1920, 1942, 1982 and 1991.

TULSA ENDS SEASON WITH SEVEN-GAME WINNING STREAK . . .

After a three-point loss against Co-Conference USA West Division Champion SMU, Tulsa rattled off a seven-game winning streak to close out the 2010 season with a 10-3 record . . . in those seven games, Tulsa outscored the opposition 45.9 to 30.9 points . . . Tulsa's wins in that seven-game winning streak came at home against Tulane, Rice, UTEP and Southern Miss and on the road at Notre Dame, Houston and Hawai'i.

ONLY A JUNIOR, DAMARIS JOHNSON SETS NCAA ALL-TIME RECORD FOR ALL-PURPOSE YARDS . . .

Already the NCAA's record-holder for kick return yards, junior Damaris Johnson became the NCAA's career record-holder for all-purpose yards in the final game of the 2010 season . . . he tallied 326 yards in a 62-35 victory over Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl . . . he entered the game with 7,470 all-purpose yards, needing 103 yards to tie DeAngelo Williams (Memphis, 2002-05) for third place on the NCAA list and first on the Conference USA chart, 118 yards to tie C.J. Spiller (Clemson, 2006-09) for second and 294 yards to tie Brandon West (Western Michigan, 2006-09) for first place . . . Johnson completed his junior season with 7,796 career all-purpose yards.

TULSA IN 2011

- Nine starters on offense and eight starters on defense return for the 2011 season.
- Tulsa returns 86.9-percent of its 2010 rushing total and 69.7-percent of its pass receiving total from 2010.
- Tulsa's three tacklers return in 2011, as does eight of the top-10 tacklers.
- The NCAA's all-purpose yardage leader from each of the last two seasons, Damaris Johnson, returns in 2011.
- C-USA Offensive Player of the Year G.J. Kinne returns at quarterback.

TULSA CRUSHES #24-RANKED HAWAII AT SHERATON HAWAII BOWL TO WIN THIRD CONSECUTIVE BOWL GAME . . .

Tulsa won its 10th game for the eighth time in school history and third time in the last four seasons with a 62-35 victory over Hawaii in Ninth Annual Sheraton Hawaii Bowl in front of 41,089 fans at Aloha Stadium . . . it was Tulsa's defense that gave Tulsa the lead in the first half, and the offense that built on that lead in the second half for the 27-point victory . . . Hawaii came into this game allowing just 16 points to its home opponents . . . the game was built as a matchup of two high-powered offenses, however, it took awhile for both offenses to get in gear . . . it was the defenses that took center stage in the first half, as there were seven turnovers in the first 30 minutes — six takeaways by Tulsa and one by Hawaii — and a first half that saw Tulsa hold a 27-14 lead . . . after the two teams combined for just 367 yards in the first half, only 94 for Tulsa, it was a different story in the second half . . . Tulsa totaled 437 yards following intermission, while Hawaii surpassed its' first half total of 273 yards with 277 second-half yards . . . Tulsa gained 531 yards for the game, while Hawaii totaled 550 yards . . . the Hurricane had 343 yards passing and Hawaii had 479 passing yards . . . Tulsa's Damaris Johnson set the NCAA's career all-purpose yardage record by gaining 326 all-purpose yards, while G.J. Kinne completed 17-of-31 passes for 343 yards and three TDs . . . Johnson ended the game as the MVP. . . defensively, Tulsa's Cornelius Arnick and John Flanders each had first-half interception returns for touchdowns, while Arnick added another interception to lead to Tulsa's first score of the game . . . Tanner Antle and Charles Davis also intercepted passes to give the Hurricane five interceptions for the game.

DAMARIS JOHNSON NAMED AP ALL-AMERICAN . . . The nation's leader for all-purpose yards last season and this year, Tulsa junior Damaris Johnson was named to the 2010 *Associated Press* All-America team . . . Johnson was named to the AP second team as an all-purpose performer . . . a kick returner, punt returner and receiver, Johnson led the nation for the second straight year in all-purpose yards with a 202.2-yard per game average . . . the 5'8" Johnson had six 200+ all-purpose yard games . . . the last Tulsa player to earn either first-, second- or third-team *Associated Press* All-America honors was tight end Garrett Mills in 2005 as a third team selection . . . the last time a Tulsa player was named to the AP second team was receiver Chris Penn in 1993 . . . Johnson also earned *SI.com* second-team All-America honors as well.

FRESHMEN JACKSON AND NELSON EARN ALL-AMERICA HONORS . . . Tulsa freshmen defenders Shawn Jackson and Marco Nelson were named to *Phil Steele's* 2010 postseason All-Freshman Team . . . Nelson started 12 games at safety for the Golden Hurricane this season, while Jackson was in the starting lineup nine times . . . they each earned Conference USA All-Freshman accolades, while Nelson was also a first-team all-C-USA pick by the league's coaches, and Jackson earned honorable mention merits . . . the also earned Freshman Honorable Mention All-America merits by collegefootballnews.com.

Jackson was credited with 88 tackles, a team-leading 15.5 stops for -74 yards, a team-leading 8.5 sacks for -55 yards and two interceptions . . . Nelson totaled 86 stops and added six pass breakups and six interceptions on the season.

TULSA'S SUCCESS OVER EIGHT-YEAR PERIOD . . . Although Todd Graham was in his first season as Tulsa's head coach in the 2007 season, he came to the Hurricane in 2003 and spent three seasons as Tulsa's defensive coordinator before serving as the head coach at Rice in 2006 . . . Graham helped lay the groundwork for the recent success that the program has seen.

In addition to appearing in six bowl games, Tulsa has 65 victories in the last eight seasons, posting a 65-39 (.625) record.

In the eight years before the 2003 season (1995-2002), Tulsa had a 23-67 record for a .255 winning percentage . . . in an 11-year stretch (1992-95), Tulsa won just 34 games from 1992-2002, compiling a 34-88 mark for a .279 winning percentage.

THE HEAD COACH . . . Tulsa's **TODD GRAHAM** (East Central '87) completed his fourth season as head coach of the Golden Hurricane in 2010 . . . Graham has a 36-17 record with the Hurricane in four seasons . . . his 36 wins moves him into seventh place on the school's all-time wins list . . . Graham's 21-7 mark in his first two seasons was the best record for any Tulsa coach in their first two seasons.

Graham has an overall coaching mark of 43-23 in five seasons as a college head coach . . . he led Tulsa to two straight C-USA West Division titles (2007, 2008), one shared C-USA Western Division crown (2010), two appearances in the C-USA Championship Game (2007, 2008), two GMAC Bowl Championships and the 2010 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl Championship.

Never before has a Tulsa head coach led a team to back-to-back 10+ win seasons, and three 10+ win seasons in four years . . . no coach before Grhama had more than one 10-win season . . . Graham led the Hurricane to a 10-4 record in 2007 and an 11-3 mark in the 2008 campaign . . . in each of those seasons, Tulsa led the nation in total offense by gaining 543.9 yards in 2007 and 569.9 in the 2008 season . . . after a 5-win season in 2009, Graham led the Hurricane to a 10-3 mark in 2010, while averaging 505.6 yards per game.

In 2010, Tulsa defeated 24th-ranked Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl by a score of 62-35 . . . the Hurricane defeated No. 22-ranked Ball State in the GMAC Bowl in 2008 by a score of 45-13 . . . In 2007, Tulsa posted a 63-7 win over Bowling Green in the GMAC Bowl, the largest margin of victory in NCAA Bowl history . . . Tulsa set 29 school records, 15 C-USA marks and four NCAA records that season.

Graham was the head coach at Rice in 2006, where he led the Owls to a 7-6 record, second-place in the C-USA West Division and the school's first bowl berth in 45 years.

Before his stint at Rice, Graham spent three years as the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Tulsa . . . he helped Tulsa post a 21-17 record and win the 2005 C-USA Championship and 2005 Liberty Bowl titles.

Prior to coming to Tulsa as defensive coordinator, he spent two years at West Virginia . . . Graham coached in the prep ranks in Texas and Oklahoma before moving to the college level.

DAMARIS JOHNSON IS ALSO NCAA'S CAREER KICKOFF RETURN YARDAGE LEADER . . .

Damaris Johnson set the NCAA record for kickoff return yardage against UTEP with his first return of the game, a 25-yarder, although he only needed four yards to become the all-time leader . . . he surpassed Western Michigan's Brandon West's (2006-09) total of 3,118 yards . . . Johnson ended the game with 87 kickoff return yards . . . he completed his junior season with 3,417 career kickoff return yards . . . earlier in the year, he became the Conference USA record-holder on his second kick return against Rice, surpassing SMU's Jessie Henderson (2005-08 — 2,945 yards) for the record . . . this year, Johnson totaled 904 kick return yards on 34 returns for a 26.6 average.

TULSA PLAYERS TAKE TWO OF SIX MAJOR CONFERENCE USA AWARDS. . .

The University of Tulsa took two of the six major player of the year honors in Conference USA as voted on by the league's coaches . . . junior quarterback G.J. Kinne was selected as the C-USA Offensive Player of the Year, while fellow junior Damaris Johnson was named the Special Teams Player of the Year . . . Kinne completed 60 percent of his passes for 3,650 yards and 31 TDs, while leading the team in rushing for the second straight year with 561 yards . . . Johnson had 872 receiving yards, 560 rushing yards, 904 kick return ayrds and 292 punt return yards this season.

TEN SENIORS END CAREERS . . . Ten Tulsa seniors played for the final time in a Golden Hurricane uniform in the 2010 Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl . . . the group included Tanner Antle, Charles Clay, Charles Davis, Nick Gates, Trae Johnson, Tyler Pistoia, Odrick Ray, Michael Such, John Supica and Jamad Williams . . . in the last four seasons, these seniors have been a part of 36 victories, two Conference USA West Division titles, one shared title and three Bowl Game victories.

QB KINNE NAMED CONFERENCE USA OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR . . .

Junior G.J. Kinne was named the C-USA Offensive Player of the Year . . . the honor marks the 11th time in the last 13 years that a quarterback has won the Offensive Player of the Year award . . . it is also the second time in the last four years that a Tulsa quarterback has earned the award, as Paul Smith won the same honor in 2007.

Kinne ranked first in C-USA for total offense (323.9 ypg) and second for pass efficiency (144.3) and passing yards per game (280.8 ypg) . . . Kinne led Tulsa to the No. 1 ranking in C-USA in rushing offense, scoring offense and total offense. . . he completed 60 percent of his passes for 3,650 yards and 31 TDs, and rushed for 561 yards and 7 TDs.

DAMARIS JOHNSON NAMED C-USA SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE YEAR . . .

Junior kick/punt specialist Damaris Johnson was named the Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Year . . . Johnson led the nation for the second straight year in all-purpose yards with a 202.2-yard per game average . . . Johnson has six 200+ all-purpose yard games.

Johnson became the FBS and C-USA record-holder for career kickoff return yards in only his junior year and he ended the season with 3,417 career KOR yards . . . in 2010, many opponents kicked away from Johnson, as he returned only 34 kicks on 73 kickoffs . . . he produced 904 yards, one TD and a 26.6-yard average on those 34 returns . . . Johnson ranked 25th in the FBS for kickoff return yards and 17th for punt returns this season.

He also had a team-leading 872 receiving yards and four TDs, while rushing for 560 yards, a 10.2 average and seven touchdowns . . . Johnson also earned first team all-C-USA honors as a punt returner and second team recognition as a wide receiver and a kick returner this year.

TULSA PLAYERS GET CONFERENCE USA HONORS . . .

The Tulsa Golden Hurricane had five players named to the first- and second-team all-Conference USA teams as voted on by the league's coaches . . . one of those Golden Hurricane players earned all-conference honors for three different positions . . . Tulsa also had 10 players earn honorable mention merits, while five freshmen were named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team.

Conference USA's top-ranked scoring offense, rushing offense and total offense had just one player named to the all-league first team . . . the Hurricane offense scored 41.4 points per game, totaled 505.6 yards and rushed for 216.9 yards. Tulsa also ranked third in passing offense, throwing for 288.7 yards per game.

Quarterback G.J. Kinne (Gilmer, Texas) was Tulsa's lone selection to the first-team offense, while freshman safety Marco Nelson (Glenpool, Okla.) was the only Hurricane to earn first-team defensive accolades . . . Nelson was the only C-USA freshman to earn first-team honors . . . the nation's leader in all-purpose yards, junior Damaris Johnson (Norco, La.), was selected as the league's first-team punt return specialist.

Johnson also earned second-team honors at the receiver position and as a kick-off return specialist . . . junior offensive guard Clint Anderson (Allen, Texas) and senior punter Michael Such (Allen, Texas) were also second-team selections.

FIVE FROSH NAMED TO C-USA FRESHMAN TEAM . . .

Tulsa had five freshmen named to the C-USA All-Freshman Team . . . Tulsa tied Southern Miss and UCF for the most rookies named to the freshman all-conference team.

The C-USA Freshman Team recognized two players on offense and three players on defense for the Hurricane. The offensive selections included receiver Thomas Roberson (Tulsa, Okla.) and Stetson Burnett (Lawton, Okla.), while Tulsa's all-freshman team defensive performers were linebackers Shawn Jackson (Tulsa, Okla.) and Cody Wilson (Broken Arrow, Okla.) and safety Marco Nelson (Glenpool, Okla.)

Roberson started 9 contests and had 30 catches for 367 yards, two TDs and a 12.2 average per reception, while offensive-mate Burnett started nine games while helping the offensive front pave the way for the league's top rushing, scoring and total offense unit.

On defense, Nelson was among the Conference USA leaders in three statistical categories . . . he tied teammate Dexter McCoil for most interceptions with six, while also ranking among the C-USA best for passes defended with 12 and tackles with 86 . . . Jackson totaled 88 tackles and team-highs of 15.5 stops for -74 yards and 8.5 sacks for -55 yards, while Wilson had 20 tackles for the Hurricane.

THE JOURNEY WITH A PURPOSE FOR DAMARIS . . .

In only his junior season, Damaris Johnson set the NCAA record for career all-purpose yards and kickoff return yards . . . he completed his junior campaign with 7,796 career all-purpose yards in 39 games for a 199.9-yard per game average during his career, while amassing 3,417 all-time kickoff return yards . . . he surpassed some of the top names in NCAA history en route to the all-purpose record, including jumping over Texas' Heisman Trophy winner Ricky Williams for fourth place on the all-time list against UTEP . . . two weeks earlier, Johnson amassed 322 yards of total offense against Rice on November 6th, and thus shot up on the NCAA's career all-purpose list from 19th to 10th place . . . in the Rice game, he totaled three punt return yards, 22 rushing yards, 134 kick return yards and 163 receiving yards . . . he also had two receiving TDs and had a 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown . . . he entered the game ranked 19th on the NCAA career list for kickoff return yards with 6,502 yards and jumped all the way into 10th place with 6,824 yards . . . he surpassed players like Rice's Trevor Cobb, USC's Charles White and Reggie Bush, Pittsburgh's Tony Dorsett, Wisconsin's Ron Dayne and supplanted Kansas State's Darren Sproles for 10th place . . . in the next game against Houston, Johnson jumped two more spots into eighth place with a total of 6,969 career all-purpose yards.

TULSA SHOWS BALANCE IN SEVEN-GAME WINNING STREAK . . .

After a six-point loss at SMU, Tulsa put together a season-ending seven-game winning streak to close out the regular season, including five Conference USA victories, a win over Notre Dame and a win over 24th-ranked Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl . . . in the final seven games, Tulsa averaged 45.9 points (321) and 524 yards (3,670) of total offense . . . in the seven-game winning streak, the Tulsa offense was pretty balanced as the Hurricane passed for 295.5 yards (2,069) and rushed for 228.7 yards (1,601) . . . defensively, the Hurricane forced 23 turnovers for a 3.3 average per game in the seven wins, while scoring 22 points on three interception returns and two defensive PATs.

McCOIL, NELSON RANK AMONG NATION'S TOP-10 FOR INTERCEPTIONS . . .

With six interceptions apiece, sophomore Dexter McCoil and true freshman Marco Nelson ranked among the nation's best for interceptions . . . McCoil and Nelson tied for the fourth-most interceptions this year in the FBS . . . McCoil ranked fifth with an average of .50 interceptions per game, as he played in just 12 games . . . Nelson ranked in a 10th-place tie with three other players with an average of .46 pick-offs per game.

TULSA GOES OVER 500 AND 40 . . . Tulsa has gone over 500 yards in 33 games under Todd Graham, including eight contests this season . . . the Hurricane has also surpassed 40 points in 26 contests since Graham took over the coaching reigns in 2007 and seven times this season . . . Tulsa has tallied 500 yards and scored 40 points in the same game 23 times under Graham, posting a 20-3 record . . . the Hurricane has accomplished that feat in six games this year, against East Carolina (49 points and 579 yards), Central Arkansas (41 points and 539 yards), Tulane (52 points and 538 yards), Rice (64 points and 612 yards), Southern Miss (56 points and 634 yards) and Hawai'i (62 points and 531 yards) . . . Tulsa has reached 40 points in seven games this year — including a loss at East Carolina (49) and wins over Central Arkansas (41), Memphis (48), Tulane (52), Rice (64), Southern Miss (56) and Hawai'i (62).

TRUE FROSH MARCO NELSON NAMED WALTER CAMP NATIONAL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK . . . Tulsa true freshman safety Marco Nelson was selected as the Walter Camp Foundation FBS National Defensive Player of the Week for his three-interception performance in a 28-25 victory at Houston on Nov. 12th . . . Nelson totaled seven tackles, including six solos and tied a single-game school record with three interceptions.

All of his interceptions were deep in Tulsa territory, thus preventing the Cougars from scoring . . . in the first quarter, Nelson had the first pick-off on Houston's initial offensive possession . . . after Tulsa took an early 7-0 lead, Houston traveled to the Tulsa 12-yard line and Nelson intercepted a pass in the end zone off a batted pass by teammate Charles Davis . . . on Houston's second possession, the Cougars were again driving in Tulsa territory when Nelson intercepted his second pass at the Tulsa 15-yard line . . . Tulsa got out of the first quarter with a 7-0 lead and built a 21-7 lead at halftime.

After Houston clawed to within three points, 28-25, the Cougars were driving to take the lead and the potential victory . . . Nelson's third interception came with 5:43 remaining in the game when he picked off a Houston pass at the Tulsa 21-yard line and returned it seven yards . . . the Tulsa offense proceeded to run out the final 5:39 on the game clock to preserve the three-point victory on the road.

IT'S McCOIL THIS TIME . . . A week earlier, it was true freshman Marco Nelson's interception with 5:43 remaining in a 28-25 victory over Houston that helped seal the victory for the Golden Hurricane as the Tulsa offense ran out the clock . . . a week later against UTEP, it was sophomore Dexter McCoil who intercepted a Miner pass at the Tulsa 30-yard line with 1:40 to play in the game, preserving a 31-28 win.

SPECIAL COVERAGE UNITS; TULSA RANKS FIRST IN NCAA FOR PUNT COVERAGE . . . Tulsa's punt and kickoff coverage units were pretty special in covering punts and kicks this season . . . Tulsa ranked first in the nation for punt return defense, as the Hurricane has allowed only 29 yards on 19 punts for 1.53-yard average this year . . . after the eighth game of the year against Notre Dame, the Hurricane replaced the Irish for the top spot, in which ND was allowing 0.43 yards per punt return until Tulsa's Damaris Johnson returned three punts for 72 yards against Notre Dame . . . despite allowing a kick return for a touchdown in two consecutive games, Tulsa ranked 10th nationally in kickoff return defense, allowing 19.1 yards on 86 returns.

KINNE MOVES UP TULSA'S CAREER CHARTS . . . In only his second year as the starter, junior quarterback G.J. Kinne has passed for 6,382 career yards and 53 touchdowns, while amassing 7,336 total offense yards . . . Kinne ranks third in school history for passing yardage, surpassing John Fitzgerald's (1994-98) total of 5,822 yards . . . he is also in third place on the career total offense list, surpassing Fitzgerald (1994-98) and is 1,744 yards shy of moving into a second place tie with T.J. Rubley (9,080) . . . he trails Tulsa's all-time leader Paul Smith's (2003-07) 4,554 passing yards and 4,266 total yards.

WHAT YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT TULSA'S FOOTBALL TRADITION . . .

- Tulsa was the first school to play in five straight New Years Day Bowl Games — Sun Bowl (1-1-42), Sugar Bowl (1-1-43), Sugar Bowl (1-1-44), Orange Bowl (1-1-45) and Oil Bowl (1-1-46). Tulsa has played in 16 bowl games.

- Ellis Jones, an All-American guard in 1945, was a one-armed player. He was the defensive standout for the College All-Star team vs. the Chicago Bears in 1945.

- Three former TU football players are enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio. They are Bob St. Clair, Jim Finks and Steve Largent.

- Two former Tulsa players finished runner-up in the Heisman Trophy voting — quarterback Jerry Rhome in 1964 and receiver Howard Twilley in 1965.

- Perhaps the greatest Tulsa football player of all-time is Glenn Dobbs (1940-42). He was also head coach of the Hurricane teams in the 1960's. Eighth Street which is just north of Skelly Stadium was dedicated as Glenn Dobbs Drive on Oct. 21, 2000.

- Former TU players — Glenn Dobbs, Howard Twilley and Jerry Rhome — are enshrined in the College Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

- Some other former TU players went on to the NFL — Steve Largent, Drew Pearson, Rickey Watts, Don Blackmon, David Alexander, Jerry Ostroski, Gus Frerotte, Dennis Byrd, Tom Miner, Steve August and Gus Frerotte — to name a few.

- Coaching in the NFL — Tulsa has had four former players serve as head coaches in the NFL — Tommy Hudspeth (Detroit Lions); Sam Rutigliano (Cleveland Browns); Ray Rhodes (Philadelphia Eagles and Green Bay Packers); and Lovie Smith (Chicago Bears). Chicago Bears assistant coach Bob Babich is also a Tulsa graduate.

- Tulsa has three former players and two former coaches who have been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame. The players are Glenn Dobbs, who also coached the Hurricane, Howard Twilley and Jerry Rhome . . . the coaches are Francis Schmidt (1919-21) and John Cooper (1977-84).

DAMARIS JOHNSON LED NATION FOR SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR FOR ALL-PURPOSE YARDS . . .

Tulsa junior Damaris Johnson led the nation a year ago for all-purpose yardage with 224.4 yards per game . . . he totaled 2,693 yards on 168 total plays . . . this year Johnson totaled 2,628 all-purpose yards for a 202.2-yard average to lead the nation again.

Johnson moved to the top of the NCAA all-purpose yardage list after the Rice contest, but fell behind Kentucky's Randall Cobb the next week, before re-establishing himself as the all-purpose leader . . . Johnson had 180.1 yards and Cobb had 186.09 yards, before moving ahead of Cobb . . . following his 322-yard performance against Rice, Johnson jumped from eighth to first-place nationally in all-purpose yards.

Johnson had a career-best 326 all-purpose yards in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl.

TULSA GETS PRESTIGIOUS WIN AT NOTRE DAME . . .

On October 30th, Tulsa went into perhaps the most tradition-rich venue in college football history, Notre Dame Stadium in South Bend, Indiana, and defeated the Notre Dame Fighting Irish by a score of 28-27 . . . in a seesaw game, Kevin Fitzpatrick's 27-yard field goal with 3:23 remaining in the game put the Hurricane ahead by one point . . . Notre Dame marched to the Tulsa 19-yard line and on second down threw a pass into the corner of the end zone that was intercepted by Tulsa's John Flanders with 0:36 ticks left on the clock . . . the win snapped a 19-game losing streak against BCS teams dating back to 1998 . . . the last BCS win came against Oklahoma State on Sept. 12, 1998, 35-20.

INTs LEAD TO HURRICANE WIN AT HOUSTON . . .

The Tulsa defense intercepted five passes against Houston . . . it was the most interceptions in a game for a Tulsa defense since intercepting five passes against UTEP in 1999 . . . four of the five interceptions were in Tulsa territory and foiled Houston scoring opportunities . . . true freshman Marco Nelson had two first quarter pick-offs, one in the end zone and the second at the Tulsa 15-yard line . . . junior Curnelius Arnick intercepted two passes in the second quarter with both leading to Tulsa TDs . . . the first at the Tulsa 43-yard line and the second coming at the Houston 26 . . . Nelson had his third interception with 5:43 left in the game, giving the Hurricane offense the ball at the Houston 28-yard line.

TULSA GETS FIVE MORE INTs IN SHERATON HAWAII BOWL . . .

The Hurricane defense had two games with five interceptions in the 2010 season . . . the first came against Houston, while the second time came against Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawaii Bowl . . . this time two went for touchdowns as Curnelius Arnick and John Flanders each raced 54 yards for first-half scores against Hawai'i . . . Tanner Antle, Charles Davis and Arnick added another pick-off to total five interceptions for the Golden Hurricane . . . Tulsa ended the season with 24 interceptions.

QB KINNE USES HIS LEGS IN HOUSTON VICTORY . . .

Quarterback G.J. Kinne used his legs more so than his arm in Tulsa's 28-25 road win over Houston in a key Conference USA West Division showdown . . . the junior rushed for a career-best 190 yards and one touchdown on 31 carries against Houston . . . it is the third-most rushing yards for a Tulsa quarterback in school history, trailing only Steve Gage's 206 yards against Wichita State (1985) and 212 yards against New Mexico (1986) . . . the 190 yards is also the 26th best rushing performance in school history and the most for any Tulsa player since Tarrion Adams went for 207 yards against Ball State in the GMAC Bowl following the 2008 season . . . it's only the 14th time that a Tulsa quarterback has rushed for over 100 yards as well.

TULSA POSTS 6-0 HOME MARK . . . Tulsa posted a perfect 6-0 record at home this year . . . the last time Tulsa went undefeated at home was in the 1989 season with a 5-0 mark on its home venue . . . in 2008, Tulsa registered a 6-0 regular season mark, but lost in the C-USA Championship Game at H.A. Chapman Stadium to finish the year at 6-1 on the home turf.

"THE ROCK"

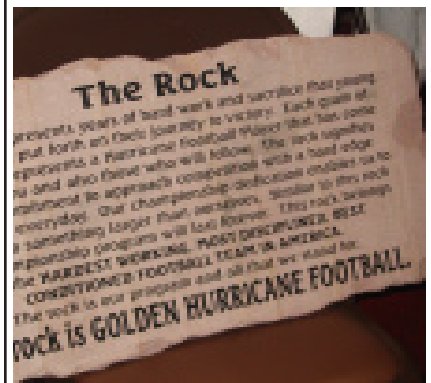
The Golden Hurricane unveiled a new tradition in 2007 as the "ROCK" took center stage at the team's practice the day prior to the season opener. Tulsa began practice as the entire travel team gathered in the end zone, and stretched out from sideline-to-sideline, hand-in-hand and began the walk.

Steve Craver, a senior safety and the player in charge of the "ROCK" for that road trip, was flanked by honorary coach Steve August, a 1976 All-American as an offensive lineman at Tulsa. The team walked the entire field with Craver carrying the 60-pound, 1.5x2-foot "ROCK". At the end of the walk, Craver, then August, talked to the team.

The "Rock" is inscribed with the following words: "The rock represents years of hard work and sacrifice that young men have put forth in their journey to victory. Each grain of this rock represents a Hurricane Football Player that has come before you and also those who will follow. The rock signifies our commitment to approach competition with a hard edge mentality every day. Our championship dedication enables us to belong to something larger than ourselves. Similar to this rock our championship program will last forever. This rock belongs to the HARDEST WORKING, MOST DISCIPLINED, BEST CONDITIONED FOOTBALL TEAM IN AMERICA. The rock is our program and all that we stand for. The rock is GOLDEN HURRICANE FOOTBALL."

The "Rock" travels with the Hurricane and accompanies the team at meetings, meals and to the stadium.

The "Rock" was a tradition that Tulsa Head Coach Todd Graham originated at Allen High School as that school's head coach in the 1990s.

DEFENDING ITS HOME . . . In six home games this season, the Tulsa defense held the opposition to an average of 27.2 points per game (163) . . . giving up 20 points against Bowling Green, 14 points against Central Arkansas, 24 against Tulane, 27 against Rice and 28 against UTEP, but then 50 against Southern Miss in the home finale . . . Tulsa also held its six home opponents to a 415.0-yard average (2,490) in total offense, including 144.5 rushing yards (867) and 270.5 passing yards (1,623) . . . Tulsa also forced 13 turnovers, including seven interceptions and six fumbles, in its six home games.

WHAT ABOUT ON THE ROAD? . . . Tulsa's defense showed steady improvement in its final five road contests of the season, cutting its points allowed from the first two road games by an average of 35.0 points, and its yardage allowed by 207.8 yards per game . . . in the final five road games (Memphis, SMU, Notre Dame, Houston and Hawai'i), Tulsa allowed 23.0 points (115) and 422.2 yards (2,111) of total offense (326.0 passing – 1,630 yards; and 108.8 rushing – 544 yards) . . . in the first two road games of the season (East Carolina and Oklahoma State), the Hurricane allowed 630.0 total yards and 58.0 points . . . those two teams, whom ranked among the top-5 nationally most of the season in passing, combined for 478.5 yards through the air and 151.5 yards on the ground against Tulsa.

DAMARIS JOHNSON SETS TULSA'S CAREER KICKOFF RETURN RECORD IN SEASON OPENER . . . With his third return of the game in the season opener against East Carolina, junior Damaris Johnson became Tulsa's all-time record-holder for kickoff return yardage . . . he entered the season with 2,513 yards and needed 59 yards to tie Jason Jacoby (1994-97) for the school record of 2,572 yards . . . he ended the game with 151 return yards . . . Johnson now is the Conference USA and NCAA record-holder as well with 3,417 career KOR yards.

O-LINE HANDLES THE PRESSURE . . . Tulsa quarterback G.J. Kinne was sacked 24 times in 13 games this year, and not all were the fault of the offensive line . . . it's a far cry from the 46 sacks suffered a year ago in 12 games . . . Tulsa has averaged 2.1 sacks allowed per game this year as compared to 3.8 sacks last year, a difference of 1.7 sacks.

In 2009, Kinne played in back of eight different starting offensive line groups, and this year it has been just three different starting lines.

This year, Kinne has been behind familiar faces on the offensive line . . . it was the same starting lineup in the first four games — (left to right) Tyler Holmes, Clint Anderson, Trent Dupy, Stetson Burnett and Brandon Thomas, while Brian DeShane replaced Thomas at right tackle in the fifth game of the season, and started the final nine contests since then . . . Eric Sproal started for Stetson Burnett at right guard against Notre Dame, Houston and Hawai'i, while Burnett played the majority of the game against the Irish and returned to the starting lineup against Rice.

TULSA GOES OVER 60 AND 600 . . . Tulsa surpassed the 60-point and 600-yard plateau against Rice . . . it marked the first time this year that Tulsa went over 60 points and 600 yards . . . it was also the fifth time Tulsa surpassed 500 yards of total offense and second time over 50 points this season . . . the Hurricane went over 600 yards against Southern Miss . . . Tulsa also scored over 60 points at Hawai'i in the Sheraton Hawai'i Bowl with 62 points . . . since 2007, Todd Graham's first as the Hurricane head coach, Tulsa has now gone over 600 yards in 12 games . . . Tulsa has reached 60 points six times under Graham.

YOUTH IN THE SECONDARY . . . At the start of the season, only four Tulsa defensive backs had seen collegiate playing time in the secondary — senior safety Charles Davis, junior cornerback John Flanders and sophomore safeties Dexter McCoil and Trent Wilkins . . . Davis, Flanders and McCoil each had started before in the secondary for the Hurricane . . . four non-freshmen players — senior Jamad Williams and sophomores Justin Skillens, Brian Moore and Lowell Rose — saw their first collegiate playing time on defense this year . . . Williams and Skillens played offense before, while Moore and Rose saw their first action this year . . . Williams then moved back to offense . . . Tulsa had four true freshmen to see action in the secondary — Marco Nelson (12 starts), Brion James, James Roberson and DeWitt Jennings (4 starts).

TULSA GOES FOR 500 . . . In eight games this season, Tulsa's offense surpassed the 500-yard plateau, going for 579 yards at East Carolina, 546 yards vs. Bowling Green, 539 yards against Central Arkansas, 538 yards vs. Tulane, 612 against Rice, 543 yards against UTEP, 634 against Southern Miss and 531 against Hawai'i.

Since Todd Graham took over the head coaching reigns for the Golden Hurricane, Tulsa has tallied over 500 yards 33 times . . . the Hurricane went over 500 yards 10 times in 2007, 12 times in 2008, and just three times last year.

Under Graham, Tulsa has also scored more than 50 points in 13 games . . . the Hurricane also just missed two 50-point games this year — by one point in the opener against East Carolina (49) and by two points at Memphis (48).

Tulsa had 612 yards and 64 points against Rice, while Tulsa's 62 points and 531 yards against Hawai'i marked the 13th time that the Hurricane totaled both 500 yards and 50 points in the same game since 2007.

ARNICK & ANTLE LEAD THE WAY ON DEFENSE . . . Tulsa's linebacker duo of Curnelius Arnick and Tanner Antle became a solid tandem for the Hurricane defense and were among the top linebackers in Conference USA.

The junior Arnick had a team-leading 115 tackles, while Antle has collected 83 stops despite missing the Rice game with an injury . . . Arnick also had nine TFLs for -41 yards, four pass breakups and four interceptions, while Antle had 7.5 TFLs for -20 yards, and three QB hurries and two fumble recoveries.

Arnick turned in seven double-digit tackle games this season . . . he had 10 stops each against East Carolina, Bowling Green, Central Arkansas, UTEP and Hawai'i . . . Arnick missed hitting the double-digit mark in two other games by just one tackle each . . . he also had a season-best 12 stops at Notre Dame and against Southern Miss . . . he had nine tackles against Oklahoma State and Memphis . . . Arnick now has 185 career tackles in 37 games.

Antle had his first double-digit tackle game of the year with 10 stops at SMU, while adding 1.5 TFLs for -6 yards, and also had a season-best 11 tackles against Tulane to go along with two TFL's for -9 yards, one caused fumble and one fumble recovery . . . he had four career double-figure tackle games . . . Antle completed his career with 262 career tackles and 22.5 TFLs for -64 yards.

CLAY ADDS TOUCHDOWNS AND MOVED UP ALL-TIME TD CHARTS . . . With 38 career touchdowns in 53 games, senior H-back Charles Clay fell one touchdown shy of Tarrion Adams' (2005-08) career record for touchdowns with 39 . . . Clay had 28 receiving TDs and 10 rushing touchdowns in his career . . . Adams ended his career with 32 rushing TDs and seven receiving touchdowns . . . Clay's 28 receiving touchdowns was also just four shy of tying Howard Twilley (1963-65) and Steve Largent (1973-75) for first-place on the school's career receiving TDs list of 32 receiving touchdowns. . . Clay finished his career one TD ahead of teammate Trae Johnson's 27 career receiving TDs . . . Clay had a three-yard TD catch in the season opener at East Carolina, a 43-yard TD reception against Bowling Green, a 19-yard TD catch against UCA, a two-yard reception at Memphis, TD catches of 33 and 25 yards against Tulane and a 12-yard touchdown reception for a total of seven receiving TDs this season . . . Clay totaled 2,544 receiving yards on 189 receptions, while also rushing for 911 yards on 178 carries during his 52-game career.

TRAE ENDS CAREER WITH 27 TOUCHDOWN RECEPTIONS . . . The Tulsa school record for touchdown receptions in a career is 32, a record held by two of the all-time greats in school history who each went on to outstanding careers in the NFL — Howard Twilley (1963-65) and Steve Largent (1973-75) . . . senior Trae Johnson finished his career one TD behind teammate Charles Clay on the school's all-time TD reception list in the chase to reach Twilley and Largent . . . Clay finished his career ranked fourth and Johnson fifth . . . Johnson played in 52 career contests and caught 27 touchdowns . . . Johnson had three TD receptions this season . . . in the opener, Johnson had one TD reception, as it came when the senior located a high tip off of fellow receiver Thomas Roberson as he tracked it down and dove for the reception in the end zone . . . last year, Johnson caught a total of 22 passes for 311 yards, and eight of those went for TDs.

FRESHMEN STARTERS . . . Tulsa had eight freshmen start games this season, including four true freshmen, two red-shirt freshmen and two gray-shirt freshmen . . . on offense, guard Stetson Burnett started 10 games, receiver Thomas Roberson started nine contests, tailback Trey Watts had four starts and tailback Ja'Terian Douglas started one game . . . defensively, safety Marco Nelson started 12 games, linebacker Shawn Jackson 10, safety DeWitt Jennings had four starts and linebacker Cody Wilson started two games . . . in addition to those freshmen starters, the Hurricane also had four other newcomers start this year including cornerback Lowell Rose, six games; defensive end Tyrunn Walker, 12 games; and defensive lineman Darrell Zellars and receiver Milton Howell, one game each . . . Rose transferred from UCLA, while Walker, Howell and Zellars are JUCO transfers.

KINNE GOES FOR 300 IN SIX GAMES THIS YEAR . . . In Tulsa's first two games this year, junior quarterback G.J. Kinne passed for 300 yards, throwing for 399 yards at East Carolina and 356 against Bowling Green, while also throwing for seven TDs . . . he did not reach the 300-yard passing plateau again this year until throwing for 371 yards and 4 TDs against Rice . . . he threw for over 300 yards in four of the season's final five games for the Hurricane . . . Kinne surpassed 300+ passing yards with 325 yards and two TDs against UTEP, had a career-best 406 yards and 4 TDs against Southern Miss and threw for 343 yards and three touchdowns at Hawai'i.

Kinne has nine career 300-yard passing games . . . his 399 yards in the 2010 opener bettered his previous best of 396 yards in the 11th game a year ago at Southern Mississippi.

Three of Kinne's five 300-yard passing games have occurred on the road — including at New Mexico (310), at Southern Miss (396), at East Carolina (399) and at Hawai'i (343).

GRAY-SHIRT JACKSON FILLS THE SPOT . . . Gray-shirt freshman linebacker Shawn Jackson, who started 10 contests, totaled 80 stops, a team-leading 15.5 TFLs for -74 yards, 8.5 sacks for -55 yards, seven QB hurries and two interceptions in his first collegiate season . . . coming off the bench in the opener, Jackson had two stops . . . but a week later, as he was inserted into the starting lineup due to an injury to Cody Wilson, Jackson responded with eight tackles, 2.5 stops for -12 yards and one interception against Bowling Green . . . he also had eight stops in each of the next two weeks against Oklahoma State and Central Arkansas . . . Jackson totaled eight tackles and 2.5 TFLs for -18 yards against Tulane . . . against Notre Dame, Jackson had six tackles, one sack for -7 yards, two QB hurries and a 66-yard INT return for a touchdown just before halftime to cut the Irish lead to 20-18, thus earning Conference USA Defensive Player of the Week honors . . . against Hawai'i, he totaled eight tackles and three sacks for -18 yards.

FROSH MARCO NELSON MAKES IMPACT IN DEFENSIVE SECONDARY . . . For being a prep all-state tailback at Glenpool (Okla.) High School, true freshman Marco Nelson has made a quick transition to the defensive secondary for the Hurricane . . . in 13 games, Nelson tallied the third-most tackles on the team with 86 tackles, and had six pass break-ups and six interceptions, which along with teammate Dexter McCoil was the most since the 2005 campaign by cornerback Nick Graham . . . he ranked 10th nationally this season for interceptions per game.

Nelson came off the bench in the first game, but in the last 10 contests has been in the starting lineup . . . in his 11 starts, he has totaled 66 tackles, six pass breakups, one forced fumble and six INTs . . . against OSU, he had a team-high 12 tackles and his 81-yard interception return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter was the fourth-longest INT return in school history . . . in his first career start against Bowling Green, he totaled five tackles, one interception and one pass breakup.

Nelson was named the Walter Camp Football Foundation National FBS Defensive Player of the Week for his seven tackles and three interceptions against Houston.

DAVIS RETURNS IN 2010 . . . Senior free safety Charles Davis returned to the field this year after missing most of the 2009 campaign with a knee injury . . . in the first three games, he totaled 17 tackles, two stops for -9 yards, three pass breakups and one interception . . . he did not earn a tackle in the fourth game as he left the contest with an injury, and missed Tulsa's fifth game at Memphis . . . he returned in limited action at SMU and Tulane . . . Davis returned to the starting lineup at Notre Dame and had four tackles, one stop for -3 yards and two pass breakups.

On the year, Davis tallied 46 tackles and a team-leading 11 pass breakups . . . Davis completed his career with 217 tackles, 23 pass breakups and four interceptions in 54 games with 39 career starts.

Davis totaled 8 tackles and 3 pass breakups at East Carolina in the opener and had six stops, two TFLs for -9 yards and an interception against Bowling Green . . . his interception in the BGSU game stopped a drive at the Tulsa nine-yard line as the Falcons were looking to cut the Tulsa lead to six points with less than six minutes on the game clock.

In 2009, Davis was off to having a solid senior campaign as he totaled 16 total tackles before suffering a season-ending knee injury against Oklahoma in the third game of the season . . . Davis was granted a medical hardship and returned for this fifth year . . . he played as a true freshman in 2006 and would have ended a four-year career in 2009.

TULSA TURNS THE TIDE . . . After an opening game two-point loss that saw East Carolina win the game on a "Hail Mary" pass on a fourth down play with seconds remaining and a game against SMU that saw two Tulsa field goals blocked in a three-point SMU victory, the tide turned for the Hurricane against Notre Dame . . . against the Irish, a second down pass from the Tulsa 18-yard line was intercepted by John Flanders in the corner of the end zone with 0:36 left on the game clock.

OH SO CLOSE . . . Tulsa opened the season on the wrong end of a "Hail Mary" pass in the last seconds as the Hurricane lost, 51-49, at East Carolina . . . during Todd Graham's tenure as head coach at Tulsa, the Golden Hurricane has suffered some heart-breaking losses . . . here's a look:

2007 — UTEP wins 48-47 . . . with Tulsa ahead 47-41, UTEP went 76 yards in 11 plays in just 3:36 to tie the score at 47, while the PAT by Jose Martinez gave UTEP the one-point lead and eventual victory with 0:58 remaining in the game.

2008 — Arkansas wins 30-23 . . . Tulsa suffered three turnovers . . . the Tulsa defense didn't allow a second-half touchdown . . . with 3:04 left on the game clock, Tulsa drove 73 yards to the Arkansas four-yard line but couldn't push through for a TD.

2008 — East Carolina wins 27-24 . . . in the C-USA Championship game, Tulsa turned the ball over seven times and ECU's Ben Hartman kicked a 36-yard field goal with 1:43 left in the game for the win.

2009 — #5 Boise State wins 28-21 . . . G.J. Kinne connected on a 55-yard TD toss to Slick Shelley to make the score 28-21 with 9:29 left in the game . . . the Tulsa defense held and a Hurricane drive ended in a fourth down pass that fell short of a wide-open Charles Clay.

2009 — UTEP wins 28-24 . . . a week after the Boise State game it was a second straight Wednesday contest for Tulsa . . . the Hurricane had a 24-13 lead with 8:32 left in the game, but UTEP scored two TDs in the final 6:25 for the win . . . what looked like a sure interception by Tulsa's John Destin to end the game dropped out of his hands, and UTEP proceeded to score for the win.

2009 — #13 Houston wins 46-45 . . . Houston scored to make the score 45-43 with 0:21 remaining in the game . . . Tanner Antle's sack of Cougar QB Case Keenum on the two-point conversion appeared to have sealed the upset win for Tulsa, but the onside kick bounced out of a Tulsa players' hands, giving Houston the ball at their own 39-yard line with 0:20 on the clock . . . UH marched to the Tulsa 34-yard line and a 51-yard Matt Hogan field goal with 0:00 left gave Houston the victory.

2010 — East Carolina wins 51-49 . . . with 1:22 left in the game, Tulsa took the lead 49-45 on a 3-yard pass from G.J. Kinne to Charles Clay . . . but, East Carolina went 66 yards in nine plays for the win . . . on a fourth down and 10 with 0:05 remaining, ECU quarterback Dominique Davis threw up for grabs a 33-yard pass in the end zone that 6'8" receiver Justin Jones came down with for the Pirates victory.

Yates' 412 yards and three TDs on 28-of-46 completions.

TULSA PLAYERS EARN C-USA WEEKLY HONORS . . . Since the final Saturday in October, Tulsa players have garnered Conference USA Player of the Week honors six times . . . freshman linebacker Shawn Jackson was named the C-USA Defensive Player of the Week at Notre Dame, when he tallied 6 tackles, one TFL for -7 yards, 2 QB hurries and a 66-yard INT return for a TD . . . Tulsa receiver/return specialist Damaris Johnson won back-to-back C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his performances against Notre Dame and Rice . . . he had 208 all-purpose yards including a 59-yard punt return for a touchdown at Notre Dame . . . a week later, he had 322 yards on 163 receiving yards and 134 kick return yards, while returning a kick 94 yards for a TD against Rice . . . after the Houston win, safety Marco Nelson earned the Defensive Player of the Week honor after his seven-tackle, three-interception performance in a 28-25 victory over Houston . . . quarterback G.J. Kinne won the offensive award that same week after rushing for 190 yards and one TD, while passing for 154 yards and two touchdowns against Houston . . . Kinne also won the award for his 406-yard, 4-TD effort in the season finale victory over Southern Miss.

TULSA HAS PLAYED FOR THREE CONFERENCE USA TITLES IN FIRST SIX YEARS IN THE LEAGUE . . . Tulsa entered Conference USA as a member in all sports on July 1, 2005 . . . a little over five months later the Golden Hurricane captured the school's first C-USA title in any sport.

Tulsa completed its first season by winning the C-USA West Division with a 6-2 league record and posting a win over UCF in the C-USA Championship Game.

In 2007, Tulsa had another 6-2 record to win the West Division and went on to face UCF in the title game once more . . . this time the Knights captured the title game victory . . . in the 2008 campaign, after finishing 7-1 in C-USA play and winning its third West Division title, Tulsa hosted East Carolina in the Championship Game, dropping a 27-24 decision.

Tulsa has won 34 conference titles in school history. Tulsa's C-USA crown in 2005 was the first since 1985 when the Golden Hurricane won the Missouri Valley Conference Championship.

TULSA GAME NOTES . . .

Vs. EAST CAROLINA . . . East Carolina wins toss and elected to receive . . . six Tulsa players started their first career games in the season opener — TB Trey Watts, WR Thomas Roberson and OG Stetson Burnett on offense; MLB Cody Wilson, CB Lowell Rose and DE Tyrann Walker . . . Tulsa had 11 freshmen play in the season opener, including six true freshmen, three red-shirt freshman and two gray-shirt freshmen . . . Tulsa fumbled on its second play of the game. It was the 12th turnover in the last three games against East Carolina. Tulsa had seven turnovers in the 2008 C-USA Championship game, and last year had four turnovers against the Pirates. Tulsa ended the game with two turnovers . . . Alex Singleton's one-yard TD run in the first quarter was his first career rushing touchdown . . . Damaris Johnson has now caught a pass in 27 straight games, which is all the games of his career . . . Damaris Johnson had his second career rushing touchdown, his first since the 8th game of the 2008 season as a true freshman . . . sophomore Dexter McCoil had his second career interception. His first career INT came last year against UTEP in the seventh game of the season . . . Oklahoma transfer Jameel Owens caught his first career pass at Tulsa with a 26-yard reception in the second quarter. He caught 4 passes for 44 yards in 2008 at Oklahoma. Owens also had his first career touchdown reception, coming in the third quarter . . . Damaris Johnson established the new career kick-off return record today. He entered the season with 2,513 kickoff return yards and needing 59 yards to tie Jason Jacoby's school record of 2,572 yards. His first return of the game went for 39 yards, and he set the new record with his third return of the game, going for 22 yards . . . G.J. Kinne had his fourth career 300+ yard passing game, and his third in the last five games dating back to last season. The 399 yards is a new career-high bettering his previous high of 396 yards . . . Tulsa has now scored 40+ points in 20 of 41 games in the Todd Graham era.

Vs. BOWLING GREEN . . . True freshmen Marco Nelson and Shawn Jackson made their first career starts for Tulsa's defense . . . they both had their first career interceptions . . . Nelson recorded his first career interception at the 5:22 mark of the first quarter and Jackson recorded his first career interception at the 6:52 mark of the second quarter . . . Nelson's interception snapped a streak of six scoring drives that Tulsa had allowed dating back to last week's 51-49 loss at East Carolina . . . Charles Clay scored his 33rd career touchdown on a 42-yard reception from G.J. Kinne at the 4:39 mark of the 1st quarter . . . with that touchdown, Clay moved past Howard Twilley, Steve Largent and Micheal Gunter to claim sole possession of 2nd place on TU's all-time total touchdown chart . . . junior college transfer Darrell Zellers recorded his first career quarterback sack, for a six-yard loss, at the 1:45 mark of the 1st quarter . . . the last time Tulsa recorded two interceptions in the same game was against UTEP (10/21/09) . . . senior Jamad Williams recorded his first career quarterback sack at the 3:04 mark of the third quarter. Williams made his second start as a safety after moving from the offense where he was the starting running back . . . junior Kevin Fitzpatrick kicked his fourth field of the game at the 0:56 mark of the third quarter. It tied his personal-best of four field goals last season against Memphis (11/27/09) . . . senior Charles Davis recorded his third career interception at the 5:32 mark of the fourth quarter. It was his first interception since he registered two picks against New Mexico (9/20/08) . . . Davis, Nelson and Jackson combined for three interceptions in the game. It marked the first time since Tulsa's game against New Mexico (9/20/08) that the team intercepted three passes in a single game. In that game, Davis and Roy Roberts each had two interceptions . . . Damaris Johnson ended the game with 84 yards on seven catches. That total pushed him over the career 2,000-yard receiving yards mark. He now has 2,009 career receiving yards . . . G.J. Kinne passed for 350 yards. That ranks 29th among TU's best individual passing performances (tied with Paul Smith vs. Oklahoma on 9/20/07). It was his second consecutive game with over 300 yards passing and fifth career 300-yard game and third best overall performance . . . Tulsa tallied 540 yards of total offense making it the second straight game that Tulsa has gone over 500 yards and the 27th time in the Graham era.

Vs. OKLAHOMA STATE . . . Tulsa won the toss, deferred. OSU received the kickoff . . . senior linebacker Tanner Antle continued Tulsa's longest streak as a starter. He started his 27th career game against OSU . . . for the second straight week, Tulsa's opponent scored on its first possession. Last week, Bowling Green scored a TD, this week OSU had a field goal . . . OSU's 49-yard field goal on its' first possession was the longest in two attempts so far this season against Tulsa. The previous long was 38 yards by East Carolina . . . OSU scored on their first two possessions. That's the first time in three games this year that has happened against the Hurricane . . . OSU's 20 points in the first quarter are the most this year in the first quarter against the Hurricane. East Carolina had 10 first-half points in the season opener. It is also the most against Tulsa since UTEP scored 28 points on October 18, 2008 . . . Tulsa trailed 20-0 in the first quarter. The last time Tulsa was down by 20 points was last year against East Carolina when the Hurricane trailed 20-0 in the second quarter on November 15, 2009 . . . the previous largest first-quarter deficit for the Hurricane was 17 points (17-0) against Arkansas on November 1, 2008 . . . Tulsa failed to score in the first quarter for the first time this season. The last time Tulsa did not score in the first quarter was in the 10th game last season against East Carolina, as Tulsa trailed 3-0 in the game after one quarter . . . Shavodrick Beaver saw his first action at quarterback this season against OSU, gaining 8 yards on his first play . . . Trae Johnson's third reception of the game at 11:33 went for eight yards, gave him 24 yards in the game and put him over 2,000 career receiving yards. He thus became the third current Tulsa player with 2,000 career receiving yards, joining Charles Clay and Damaris Johnson . . . OSU's 41 first-half points was the most against the Hurricane since Houston scored 42 first-half points on November 15, 2008 . . . OSU's 81-yard pass play for a touchdown was the longest against the Hurricane since Game 11 of the 2009 season (Nov. 21) as Southern Miss' Martevious Young threw 95 yards to DeAundre Brown . . . OSU scored their most points in the series, surpassing their 56 points in a 56-35 victory on October 1, 1988 . . . the eight touchdown passes by OSU is the most for a Tulsa opponent in school history, and the most since Houston had six TD passes on November 15, 2008. It was the first time that a Tulsa player had at least two interceptions in one game since Sept. 20, 2008 when Charles Davis and Roy Roberts each had two interceptions against New Mexico . . . Nelson had his third interception of the game at the 5:39 mark of the fourth quarter. His three interceptions tie a school record which had been set by several Golden Hurricane players in the past. The latest was Michael LeDef's three interceptions against UTEP in 2004 . . . Tulsa's defense has now forced multiple turnovers for the eighth time this season, and it marks the seventh straight game that the Hurricane forced two or more turnovers . . . G.J. That capped a 23-second, two-play drive--Tulsa's shortest of the season. Kinne's 40-yard pass to Trae Johnson set up the scoring play . . . Tulsa scored 21 points in the first quarter. That's the most first quarter points this season and the most since Tulsa scored 28 points in the first quarter against UTEP two seasons ago (10/18/08) . . . Tulsa and Southern Miss scored a combined 31 points in the first quarter. That's the most combined first quarter points this season and the most since Tulsa and UTEP combined for 56 points in the first quarter two seasons ago (10/18/08) . . . Tulsa tallied 634 total yards--the most this season and the most since TU had 791 yards against UTEP two seasons ago (10/18/08) . . . Tulsa has compiled 600 yards or more twice this season and

12 times under head coach Todd Graham . . . Tulsa scored more than 50 points (56) for the third time this season and for the 13th time under head coach Todd Graham . . . Tulsa and Southern Miss combined for 106 points--the most combined points in a Tulsa game since TU and UTEP combined for 112 points two seasons ago (10/18/08) . . . Tulsa finished the regular season with a 6-0 home record at H.A. Chapman Stadium. That marks the 18th time TU has gone undefeated at home and the 15th time TU has gone undefeated and untied at home. The last time Tulsa finished a season undefeated at Chapman Stadium was in 1989 (5-0). The last time TU went 6-0 at home was in 1978 . . . Tulsa's record against Southern Miss improves to 4-3-1, which includes a 3-0-1 mark in Tulsa . . . Tulsa incurred no penalties during the game. That marks the first time TU has gone penalty-free in a game since the GMAC victory against Ball State (1/6/09) . . . on the opening driving, Damaris Johnson caught an eight-yard pass from G.J. Kinne. Johnson has now caught at least one pass in 38 consecutive games--the sixth longest active streak among FBS players . . . at the 13:17 mark of the first quarter, sophomore Ricky Johnson caught a pass from G.J. Kinne for a 40-yard touchdown. It was his first receiving touchdown of the season and longest receiving touchdown of his career . . . with that 40-yard pass to Johnson, Kinne surpassed 3,000 passing yards for the season. He is the fourth TU quarterback to pass for 3,000 or more yards in a season. The others are Paul Smith (5,065/2007), David Johnson (4,059/2008) and Billy Guy Anderson (3,464/1965). Kinne ended the game with 3,307 yards for the season . . . Trae Johnson's 40-yard reception from Kinne was his longest of the season and his longest since a 44-yard reception during the 2008 season . . . on Tulsa's first drive of the second quarter, Jamad Williams had a 31-yard rushing play--his longest of the season . . . at the 1:15 mark of the second quarter, Kinne threw a 19-yard pass to Charles Clay. That moved him past John Fitzgerald (5,822/1994-98) for third on TU's all-time passing yards chart. He finished the game with 6,039 career yards. Kinne is the third TU quarterback to surpass the 6,000-yard career passing mark (Paul Smith, 2003-07 / T.J. Rubley, 1987-91) . . . with 10 seconds remaining in the second quarter, Dexter McCoil intercepted a pass from Austin Davis. It was McCoil's sixth interception of the season and seventh of his career . . . at the 12:05 mark of the third quarter, Tanner Antle recovered a Southern Miss fumble. That was his fifth career fumble recovery--one shy of Tulsa's school record. George Gilbert (1978-81) recovered six fumbles over his career . . . at the 7:10 mark of the third quarter, Kinne completed a 67-yard touchdown to Willie Carter. With that pass, he surpassed Billy Guy Anderson (3,343/1,965) for third most yards of total offense in a season among TU quarterbacks. Kinne ended the game with 454 yards of total offense for the game and now has 3,532 for the season . . . sophomore Willie Carter had a career-best 93 receiving yards on four catches. He also tallied his first game with multiple touchdowns (two receiving and one rushing) . . . Trae Johnson caught four passes for 113 yards. It was his best performance since his freshman season when he caught nine passes for 119 yards against Army (11/17/07). This was Johnson's third career 100-yard receiving game . . . Damaris Johnson had 221 all-purpose yards. He now has 18 career 200-yard games, including five this season. Johnson has 7,470 career all-purpose yards. He is 103 yards shy of DeAngelo Williams (Memphis/2002-05) for first on the C-USA chart and third on the NCAA chart. Johnson is 118 yards shy of C.J. Spiller (Clemson/2002-05) for second on the NCAA chart . . . Johnson has 2,302 all-purpose yards this season. He is the third FBS player to have three 2,000-yard seasons in a career (along with Williams and Antonio Brown/Central Michigan). He is the second FBS player to have three 2,000-yard seasons in his first three years (along with Brown) . . . G.J. Kinne recorded his first career 400-yard passing game (406). He became the fourth TU player to hit the 400-yard mark, joining Billy Guy Anderson (1964-65) with four, David Johnson (2005-08) with three and Paul Smith (2003-07) with three . . . it was also G.J. Kinne's eighth time to pass 300 yards in a game. He only trails Paul Smith who has 14 career 300-yard passing games . . . Kinne was responsible for six touchdowns with four passing and two rushing. That's the most by a TU player since David Johnson's seven against North Texas (9/6/08). Kinne's mark ties Johnson for second most in TU history. Johnson was responsible for six touchdowns against New Mexico (9/20/08) . . . Kinne threw four touchdown passes to give him 50 for his career. He moved past David Johnson (2005-08) for third most in TU history . . . Kinne completed 12-of-25 passes with two interceptions in the first half. He finished 11-for-12 in the second half, which included 10 consecutive completions.

Vs. HAWAII . . . Tulsa captains were G.J. Kinne and seniors Trae Johnson, Charles Clay, Jamad Williams and Tyler Pistoia . . . Tulsa won the toss and received . . . this was the 17th Bowl game appearance in school history for Tulsa, and the fifth Bowl appearance in the last six years for Tulsa . . . Tulsa is now 8-10 in Bowl games. The Hurricane has won its last three Bowl games, and four of the last five Bowl contests . . . it was Tulsa's first appearance in the Sheraton Hawaii Bowl. It is the 13th different Bowl that Tulsa has played in. The Hurricane has played in the Sugar Bowl, Bluebonnet Bowl, Independence Bowl and GMAC Bowl twice in its history and eight other Bowls just once . . . Tulsa won 10 games for the eighth time in school history and the third time in the last four years . . . Tulsa scored over 60 points for the second time in a Bowl game. The previous game of 60+ points came against Bowling Green in the 2008 GMAC Bowl (63-7) . . . Tulsa's 343 passing yards is a school Bowl record . . . Damaris Johnson had 101 receiving yards, and now has gone over 100+ receiving yards in the two Bowl games in which he has appeared . . . Tulsa went over 500 yards for the eighth time this season and the 33rd time in the last four years under Todd Graham as head coach . . . junior Damaris Johnson became the Conference USA career record-holder for all-purpose yards when he surpassed DeAngelo Williams (Memphis, 2002-05) record of 7,573 yards. Johnson needed 103 yards entering the game to become the all-time C-USA leader . . . Damaris Johnson later became the NCAA's all-time record-holder with a 12-yard run in the fourth quarter, giving him 301 yards in the game and 7,771 career all-purpose yards, breaking the record of 7,764 yards. He ended the season with 7,796 all-purpose yards . . . on Hawaii's second possession, senior linebacker Tanner Antle had his first career interception in his 52nd career game played. He intercepted the ball in the end zone . . . before Fitzpatrick's 42-yard field goal in the first quarter he had converted on just 2-of-8 from behind 40 yards this year . . . this was the fourth game this year that Tulsa held its opponent scoreless in the first quarter. The other three games were Central Arkansas, Memphis and Houston . . . Tulsa led at the end of the first quarter for the seventh time this season, as Tulsa trailed three times and was tied three times . . . Tulsa held Hawaii scoreless in the first quarter, marking only the second time this season that Hawaii had not

scored in the first quarter of a game. The other game was against No. 2-ranked Boise State on Nov. 6th . . . Tulsa scored two TDs on interception returns – John Flanders on a 54-yard return and Curnelius Arnick also on a 54-yard TD – in the first half. On the year, Tulsa has now scored . . . Curnelius Arnick had two interceptions against Hawaii, giving him four interceptions on the season, and marking the second game this year that he had two interceptions in one game. The other game was against Houston . . . Tulsa had four or more first-half interceptions for the second time this season. The Hurricane had five first-half interceptions. Tulsa had four interceptions in the first half against Houston . . . Tulsa has scored 40+ points for the seventh time this season and the 26th time since Graham became the Hurricane head coach in the 2007 season . . . in the second half, Tulsa scored 21 points on its first six plays of the half — going 74 yards in 2 plays, 75 yards in 2 plays and 57 yards in 3 plays . . . Damaris Johnson had his fifth career 300+ all-purpose yardage game and the second of the season . . . Curnelius Arnick had his seventh game with double-digit tackles this year and the eighth time in his career.

4 — GJ KINNE (6-2, 215, JR) — has started all 25 games in which he has played... named the C-USA Offensive Player of the Year... earned first-team all-C-USA honors as well as all-Academic team accolades... became the 5th Tulsa quarterback to pass for 30+ TDs in a season... had his first career 400+ passing game and eighth career game over 300 passing yards with 406 yards and 4 TDs against Southern Miss, thus earning C-USA Player of the Week honors... a week earlier, had 325 yards and two touchdowns against UTEP... had a career-best 190 rushing yards and one touchdown and threw for 154 yards and two TDs in a win over Houston... was named the C-USA Offensive Player of the Week for that performance... his 190 yards is the third-best rushing performance for a Tulsa quarterback... threw for 371 yards and 4 TDs against Rice... he had thrown 194 passes before throwing an interception against Houston, while going five games without an INT... had 399 yards and a career-best 5 TDs against East Carolina in the season opener... has 6,382 passing yards and 53 touchdowns in his career to rank 3rd on both the school's career passing list and touchdown passes chart... ranks 3rd for career total offensive yards with 7,336 yards... completed 60 percent of his passes for 3,650 yards and 31 TDs in 2010... ranks third on the school's single-season passing chart with his 3,650 yards... has nine career 300+ passing games, including six this year... became the first quarterback in school history to pass for 300 yards and rush for 100 yards in the same game when he threw for 334 yards and rushed for 100 yards against #13 Houston in the 2009 season... named to the Davey O'Brien and Manning Award Watch Lists for 2010.

2 — SHAVODRICK BEAVER (6-3, 190, SO) — has played in 15 career games, including 6 this year... did not play against Bowling Green, SMU, Notre Dame, Houston, UTEP, Southern Miss and Hawai'i... has totaled 102 rushing yards for a 5.1 average and one TD, while completing 4 passes for 62 yards... had a career-long pass of 27 yards against Rice... scored his first career TD with a 14-yard run at Memphis... completed 2-of-4 passes for 25 yards and rushed for 18 yards against UCA... had 54 rushing yards and 10 passing yards at Oklahoma State... played in 8 games as a true freshman in 2009... rushed for 63 yards on 27 carries... completed his first career pass for 6 yards vs. Sam Houston State... ranked as Rivals.com No. 5 Best Scrambling QB in the Nation and as the No. 8 Top Dual Threat QB coming out of high school as a prep senior in 2008.

8 – ALEX SINGLETON (6-1, 249, SO) — has played in 14 career games, including all 13 this year... has gained 399 yards on 87 carries for a 4.6 average per carry and a team-high 11 TDs... has three multiple TD games this year — Rice, Tulane and Hawai'i — with 2 rushing TDs in each game... rushed for 55 yards and 2 TDs against Rice... totaled 45 yards and 2 TDs on 9 carries against Tulane... had a career-best 93 yards on 12 attempts against UCA... had a team-high 74 yards and one TD vs. Bowling Green, including 63 yards on Tulsa's final drive... was rated as the No.11 fullback in the nation by Rivals.com as a prep senior in 2008.
