Head Coach
First Season
Mississippi State University, 1980

Tom Schubert begins his first season at The University of Texas-Pan American after being named the 13th head men's basketball coach in school history on April 21st, 2006.

Schubert brings 24 years of coaching experience to The University of Texas-Pan American, which includes 11 NCAA Tournaments, two Sweet Sixteen appearances as well as a trip to both the Elite Eight and Final Four. The newly-named head coach has been a part of 12 different 20-win programs and has coached 14 conference championship squads in five separate NCAA Division I Conferences.

Known in many coaching circles as a tremendous recruiter, Schubert helped put together the top-ranked recruiting class in the country during his time at the University of Memphis. He has recruited a trio of NBA players, three McDonald's High School All-Americans and two National Junior College Players of the Year. He also played a major role in bring Anfernee "Penny" Hardaway – one of the top collegiate players in the 1990s – to the University of Memphis.

"I've known Tom for a lot of years, and this was a job that really, really wanted. He is known in the business as having incredible energy, and his enthusiasm and excitement for the job is unmatched. I think this is a great hire because Tom is a guy who has paid his dues as a coach, and now he gets the opportunity to put his own signature on a program. He's a tireless

recruiter, and he is a guy who absolutely loves coaching and loves this profession. I think this is a great match for him and UTPA," said Jerry Wainwright, head men's basketball coach at DePaul University.

Prior to coming to the Rio Grande Valley, Schubert spent

four seasons at the University of Central Florida where the Golden Knights recorded an 84-41 record during his tenure on the coaching staff. The Golden Knights earned a pair of berths to the NCAA Tournament while winning the Atlantic Sun Conference Tournament Championship twice along with one Atlantic Sun Conference Championship.

In his four seasons, Schubert helped the Golden Knights record three consecutive 20-plus winning seasons, including 25 wins during the 2003-04 season which were the second most victories in program history. The Golden Knights posted the second-most victories (84) among all NCAA Division I schools in the State of Florida, only behind the University of Florida (102).

Schubert served as the Recruiting Coordinator at the University of Central Florida as well as assisted head coach Kirk Speraw with all aspects of the Golden Knights' basketball program, including on-court coaching and game preparation. Under his guidance, seven UCF student-athletes have earned all-conference accolades over the past four basketball campaigns.

"UTPA is getting not only a great energetic basketball coach, but also a man of great character. Tom will make a tremendous impact on the community as well as the University. He's a tireless worker, and has had nothing but suc-

cess at every institution that he's coached at. Scott Street made a great decision in giving Tom this opportunity," said Speraw.

Before joining the University of Central Florida, Schubert served as an assistant coach at the University of Alabama at Birmingham – a member of Conference USA – during the 2001-02 campaign. He spent one season as the Blazers' Recruiting Coordinator and assisted former Head Coach Murry Bartow with scouting, practice preparation, on-floor coaching and academic supervision.

Schubert spent four seasons as an Assistant Coach at Southeast Missouri State University from 1997-01 where he helped guide the Redhawks to a pair of 20-win seasons. During the 1999-00 season, Southeast Missouri State University recorded a 24-7 season and captured an Ohio Valley Conference championship as well as an OVC Tournament crown en route to earning a berth in the NCAA Tournament.

The Redhawks posted their first-ever 20-win season as a NCAA Division I member during the 1998-99 season, including a program-record 15 wins in the Ohio Valley Conference en route to posting runner-up honors in the conference.

Prior to joining Gary Garner's squad at Southeast Missouri State University, Schubert spent five seasons at the University of Memphis where he served as an Assistant Coach and Recruiting Coordinator. He helped the Tigers post three NCAA Tournament appearances, including a trip to the Sweet Sixteen during the 1994-95 season, as well as a Great Midwest Conference crown and Conference

during the 1994-95 season, as well as a Great Midwest Conference crown and Conference USA title during his tenure on the coaching staff.

Schuberth helped the University of Memphis record three 20-plus winning seasons as well as three top-25 rankings in the final Associated Press poll. The University of Memphis was ranked in the top-10 in the Associated Press poll twice during Schuberth's tenure. During the 1995-96 season, the Tigers were ranked as high as third in the nation and were voted by *Sports Illustrated* as the Most Athletic Team in the country.

Schuberth made his mark in the college basketball recruiting ranks when he put together the nation's number one recruiting class, according to analyst Bob Gibbons, in 1993. Among some of his most-prized recruits, Tigers signed Lorenzen Wright, a McDonald's High School All-American, who went on to earn National Freshman of the Year honors following the 1995-96 season. He later became the seventh overall pick by the Los Angeles Clippers in the 1996 NBA Draft following his sophomore season.

The Broncs' newly-named head coach spent nine seasons as an Assistant Coach at the University of Louisiana at Monroe, a former member of the Southland Conference, from 1983-92 where he served as the Recruiting Coordinator and assisted former Head Coach Mike Vining with all phases of the basketball program, including scheduling, scouting, team travel, on-floor coaching and game preparation.

The Indians captured four Southland Conference Tournament Championships and garnered three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances with Schuberth on the coaching staff. The University of Louisiana at Monroe recorded four 20-plus winning seasons, including a school record 25 wins during the 1990-91 season, and won the Southland Conference title outright on three occasions.

The Chicago, IL, native began his college coaching career as an Assistant Coach at the University of North Alabama in 1982 after he spent two years touring with the Harlem Globetrotters. Schuberth toured over 25 countries as a member of the California Chiefs, the opposing team of the Globetrotters.

Schuberth was a three-time letterman and two-year starter at Mississippi State University where he was ranked third in the Southeastern Conference in assists during the 1979-80 season. He appeared in two post-season tournaments during his collegiate playing career, advancing to the 1977 Final Four with UNLV as a freshman and 1979 National Invitation Tournament with Mississippi State. In 1980, Schuberth was selected as an honorable mention Academic All-American and Academic All-Southeastern Conference.

Schuberth graduated from Mississippi State University with his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1980. A year later, he earned his master's degree in physical education from Mississippi State University.

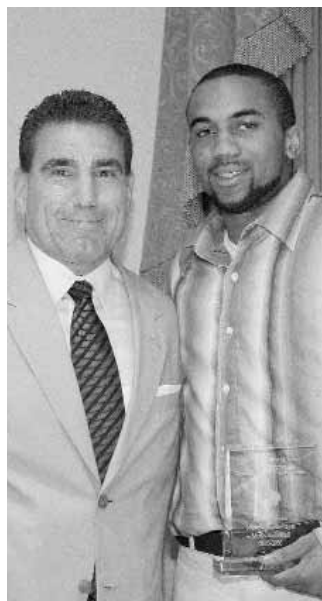

ASSISTANT COACH



Ben Johnson begins his first season as an assistant coach with The University of Texas-Pan American men's basketball program.

Johnson was a four-year starter during his collegiate career in the Big 10 Conference, spending his first two seasons at Northwestern University followed by junior and senior campaigns at the University of Minnesota. He spent three seasons as a team captain for both the Golden Gophers and Wildcats during his collegiate career.

While a member of the Golden Gophers, Johnson eclipsed the 1,000-point milestone against conference-foe Penn State University en route to finishing his career with 1,202 points in 3,463 minutes of action. He was also part of a Golden Gophers' program that participated in the National Invitation Tournament and pre-season National Invitation Tournament.

During his time with the University of Minnesota, Johnson scored in double figures on 23 occasions and recorded 60 double-digit scoring performances during his collegiate career. He set milestones with the Golden Gophers by recording his 300th-career rebound against Wofford as well as playing in his 100th-career game in that contest. He collected his 100th-career three-pointer against the University of Indiana.

Johnson averaged 11.5 points per game with the University of Minnesota during his senior campaign and finished his collegiate career with a 10.1 scoring average.

He recorded a career-high 32 points during his senior campaign against Furman by connecting on 12-19 shots, including a perfect 6-6 from the charity stripe, while playing in a career-high 40 minutes. He also added 23 points on 10-12 shooting, including a trio of three-

pointers, against Western Illinois in 27 minutes of action.

The new Broncs' assistant coach became the fourth freshman in program history at Northwestern to lead the team in scoring, averaging 11.6 points per game, while starting in all 30 games. He scored in double figures in 20 of 30 games and led the Wildcats in scoring on 16 occasions. As a sophomore, Johnson finished second on the team in scoring after averaging 10.7 points per game while starting in all 30 games that season. He was also ranked first on the squad in free throw percentage and second for the Wildcats in total assists.

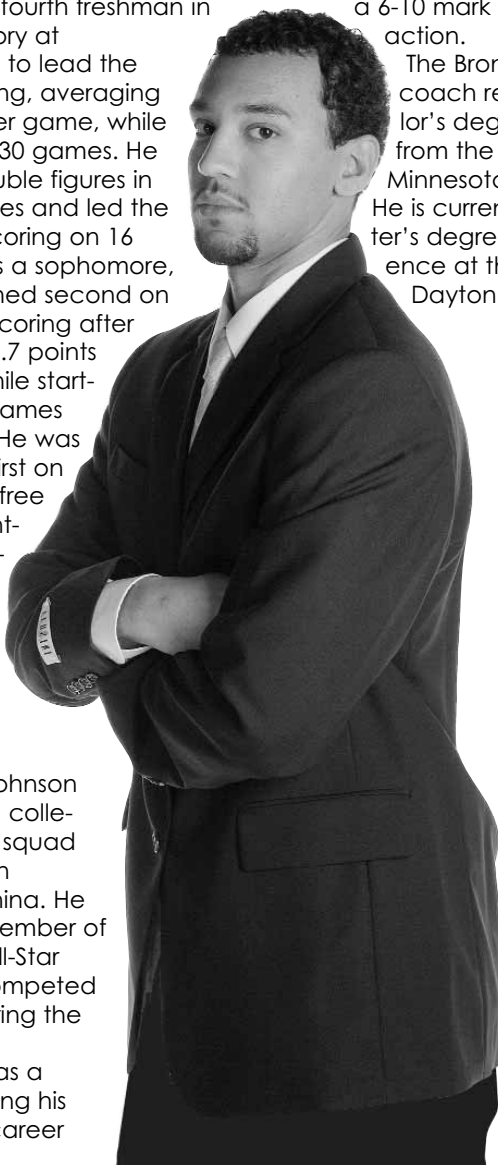
Following his playing career at the University of Minnesota, Johnson was part of a collegiate touring squad that played in Shanghai, China. He also was a member of the Big Ten All-Star team that competed in Europe during the 2002 season.

Johnson was a standout during his high school career

where he was a NIKE All-American honorable mention and *Street & Smith* All-American selections and listed as the 60th best player in the country. He was also on Tom Lemming's high school football All-American list as the 20th-best recruit in the nation.

During the 2005-06 season, Johnson served as the graduate assistant men's basketball coach at the University of Dayton, a member of the Atlantic 10 Conference. As a member of Brian Gregory's staff, Johnson assisted in individual drill work during practices, game-film breakdown as well as monitoring the academic progress of the Flyer student-athletes. In his one season with the Flyers, Dayton finished with a 14-17 record, including a 6-10 mark in conference action.

The Broncs' assistant coach received his bachelor's degree in sociology from the University of Minnesota in May of 2005. He is currently pursuing his master's degree in exercise science at the University of Dayton.

Lance Madison begins his first season as an assistant coach with the men's basketball program at The University of Texas-Pan American.

During the 2005-06 season, Madison served on the coaching staff at The University of Texas at San Antonio where the Roadrunners accumulated an 11-17 record in his only campaign with the program. With the Roadrunners, he served as the recruiting coordinator of junior college prospects from the States of Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Illinois and Iowa.

Madison was responsible for developing scouting reports and pre-competition evaluations of opponents and had his finger in several other pots, including fundraising, marketing and promotions, clinics and camps while also monitoring the academic progress of the Roadrunner student-athletes.

In his lone season with the Roadrunners, Madison helped the program lead the Southland Conference in offensive rebounding and defensive field goal percentage while ranking second in field goal percentage. UTSA qualified for the Southland Conference Tournament and captured the tournament championship at Florida International University.

Prior to joining the UTSA coaching staff, Madison served three seasons at Redlands Community College in El Reno, OK, from 2002-05 as an associate head coach as well as the Intramural Coordinator. With the Cougars, he also served as the recruiting coordinator and

assisted with individual instruction for player development, video breakdown, game preparation and practice plans.

Madison helped the Cougars post an outstanding 94-9 record in his three seasons with the program, which included a runner-up honor at the NJCAA Division I National Championship game in 2004. That season, Redlands Community College ended the season ranked first in the nation after finishing third in the country the previous campaign.

During his tenure with the Cougars, Madison helped the program capture a trio of Bi-State West Conference Championships along with a pair of NJCAA National Tournament appearances and Region II crowns. The Cougars also excelled in the classroom under the watchful eye of Madison as Redlands Community College posted the highest grade point average among all NJCAA men's basketball programs.

Madison spent five seasons at Olney Central College, a NJCAA Division II program in Olney, IL, from 1996-02 where he served as an assistant coach on the men's basketball team as well as the head women's softball coach. In all five seasons with the program, the Knights posted 20 or more victories, including a top-20 ranking in

three consecutive campaigns. The Knights also captured the Great Rivers Athletic Conference Championship and finished as the runner-ups in Region XXIV during his tenure.

Madison began his coaching career at the very familiar surroundings of Vincennes University during the 1992-93 campaign. He was also the coordinator of the Vincennes University Boy's Camp and High School Team Camp.

Madison was a two-year letter-winner at IUPUI from 1990-92 and served as a team captain during his senior campaign. Prior to joining the Jaguars, Madison spent two seasons at Vincennes University, a NJCAA Division II program in Vincennes, IN, where he led his squad to an appearance at the NJCAA National Tournament during his sophomore campaign.

The newly-named Bronc assistant coach earned his bachelor's degree from Eastern Illinois University in August of 2004 and also holds an associate's degree from Vincennes University.



Assistant Coach



Brad Enright begins his first season with the men's basketball program as an assistant coach at The University of Texas-Pan American.

Enright comes to the Rio Grande Valley after spending the past two seasons at Paris Junior College where he was a part of a coaching staff that captured the 2005 NJCAA National Championship. In the championships game, Paris Junior College handed 16th-ranked Mobley Area Community College a 70-61 setback to claim the title, and it was the first national championship for the Dragons and was the first time that they had advanced to the national tournament since the 1954 season.

The Dragons finished with a 28-9 record during their national championship campaign and advanced to the national tournament after defeating the second-ranked San Jacinto College in the NJCAA Region XIV Tournament. At the NJCAA National Championships in Hutchinson, KS, the Dragons defeated sixth-ranked College of Southern Idaho prior to defeating Mobley Area Community College for the title.

Enright served as the Recruiting Coordinator for Bill Foy's coaching staff at Paris Junior College where he recruited and coached three highly-touted perimeter players that earned All-Texas Eastern Conference performers. He recruited and coached current UTPA guard Brian Burrell to the Dragons' program prior to the beginning of the 2004-05 season.

The newly-named assistant

coach also held on-court coaching responsibilities for the Dragons as well as monitored study hall and the academic progress of his players during his tenure. Enright also oversaw the strength and conditioning development of the Dragons' program.

Prior to joining Paris Junior College, Enright spent two seasons at the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD, where he was served as an assistant coach under Don DeVoe. During his tenure with the Midshipmen, Enright was responsible for recruiting in the West and Midwest and held several on-court coaching duties.

Enright was primarily responsible for coaching the low post players for Navy, and he also assisted in the development of offensive and defensive game plans for Patriot League and non-conference opponents during his two seasons. He also served as the Head Coach of the Junior Varsity program for the Midshipmen.

Before joining Don DeVoe's staff at Navy, Enright spent two seasons as the top assistant coach at California State University-Dominguez Hills for Larry Hauser's program. During his time with the Toros, Enright held several on-court coaching responsibilities; served as one of the main recruiters for the program; coordinated the Toros' summer camps; managed the team's budget and handled travel arrangements for the program.

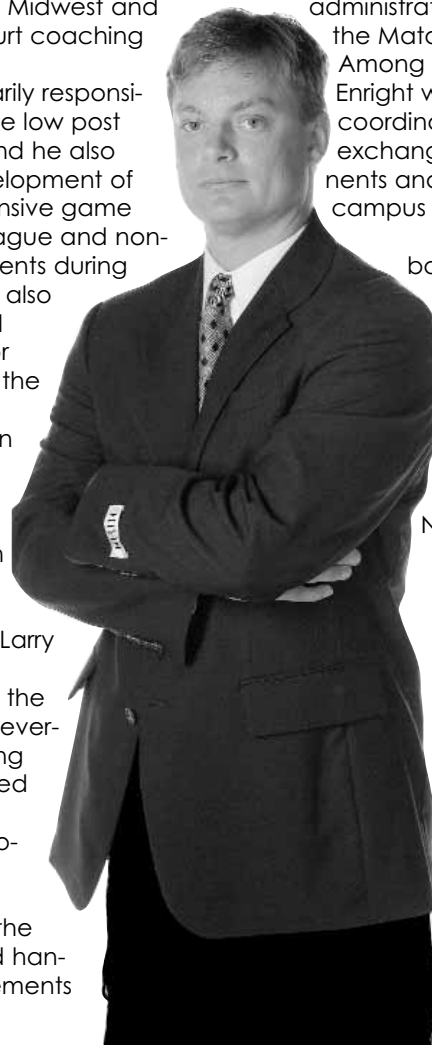
Enright spent one season as the Director of Basketball Operations at Pepperdine University during the 1999-00 season where he was part of a Waves' program that captured the West Coast Conference Championship en route to advancing to the NCAA Tournament. In the first round of that NCAA Tournament, Pepperdine provided one of the biggest upsets in the tournament by defeating the University of Indiana.

At Pepperdine, Enright was responsible for scouting opponents, film exchange, travel and the overall day-to-day operations in the Waves' basketball program. He also served as the Director of the Junior Waves, which was a youth basketball program sponsored by Pepperdine Athletics.

Enright began his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, California State University-Northridge, where he served as the administrative assistant for the Matadors' program.

Among some of his duties, Enright was responsible for coordinating film exchange, scouting opponents and coordinating on-campus recruiting visits.

Enright earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology in 1996 and master's degree in education administration in 2001 – both from California State University-Northridge.

Grant Leonard begins his first season as the Administrative Assistant for the men's basketball program at The University of Texas-Pan American.

Leonard comes to the Rio Grande Valley after serving as the first assistant coach at Washington College during the 2005-06 season. He assisted in all basketball duties and day-to-day operations for the program and headed all skill development sessions for the Shoremen. As the recruiting coordinator for Washington College, Leonard received commitments from 15 recruits and also served as the Director for Fundraising for the men's basketball program.

During his coaching career at Washington College, Leonard also assisted in the operation of the Eastern Invitational Basketball Clinic in New Jersey as a camp coach. His prior basketball camp experience consisted of serving as the Director of the North Shore Basketball Camp in Chicago, IL, from 1998-2005 where he overall the day-to-day activities while hiring and training all staff members.

The UTPA administrative assis-

tant served as the first assistant coach at Shorewood High School in Shorewood, WI, from 2004-05 where he held several coaching assignments for the Greyhounds while overseeing the skill development and strength and conditioning programs.

At William Penn University, Leonard earned Academic All-Region laurels during his junior and senior seasons while guiding the Statesmen to 32 wins over his career with the squad.

A student-athlete at William Penn University in Oskaloosa, IA, Leonard earned Academic All Region honors in 2003 and 2004. As a scholarship player he helped lead the Statesmen to nine conference championship games and 15- and 17-win seasons.

Leonard earned his bachelor's degree in psychology while garnering Cum Laude laurels and earned his master's degree in psychology from Washington College in 2006.

Darren Johnson begins his first season as the graduate manager for the men's basketball program at The University of Texas-Pan American.

Johnson comes to UTPA after serving as the head student manager of the men's basketball team at the University of South Dakota since the 2002-03 season. During his tenure with the Coyotes, Johnson assisted in all practices while working with the players on an individual basis. He maintained all multi-media and basketball equipment as well as handled all office and managerial duties assigned by the head coach.

Prior to his stint with the Coyotes, Johnson was the assistant men's basketball coach of the London Towers Basketball Team in London, England.

Johnson assisted with the recruiting of players and evaluated game and practice film while a member of the Towers' coaching staff.
