

Cost of Attendance

The UC Davis Cost of Attendance is an estimated figure used to determine financial aid eligibility. It includes tuition and fees as well as average amounts for standard expenses such as books, supplies, room, board, and other living expenses for three quarters of study. Keep in mind that your actual costs may differ. Eligible expenses must occur between mid-September through mid-June. Our office reserves the right to exercise professional judgment to deny requests that are not considered direct educational expenses.

(3) Students residing in campus apartments or other housing not designated as a Residence Hall or who transfer to single student apartments do not have a recognized

Housing Contract, they have a 12-month lease; therefore, those students are not eligible for an "On-Campus" budget. Residing in housing located on campus or opting to purchase a meal plan (which is available to all students) does not meet the criteria for an "On-Campus" budget.

(4) The Health Insurance budget component is based on an estimated figure. Accordingly, the final approved rate may differ from the amount shown. For the most recent Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP) fee, please visit the [Budget & Institutional Analysis](#) website. This mandatory fee can be waived, as long as the student can show proof that he or she has adequate private health insurance. It is important to note that financial aid will not cover the health insurance budget component for dependent students who elect to waive out.

Summer Cost of Attendance

For Summer financial aid, students are packaged either with an off-campus or commuter budget. Students with an on-campus housing contract for the Summer can submit a Summer Change in Aid form (available when the summer term is open) to have their budget adjusted. Summer budgets are displayed in the tables below.

Students will be billed for actual enrolled units. Fees are charged on a per unit basis and are subject to change without prior notice.

Right to Know – UC Davis Intercollegiate Athletics

What expenses, identified above, are not included in a full grant-in-aid scholarship due to NCAA rules and regulations?

For the 2016-17 academic year, a full athletic grant at UC Davis covers tuition, fees, room and board and books. For determining the percentage of an athletic grant, \$800 is used for the book amount. Any student-athletes on a full athletic grant will receive all required books through the book loan program. An athletic grant does not include non-athletic health insurance (SHIP). Additionally, an athletic grant of on-campus students does not include personal and transportation expenses. A full athletic grant may not exceed the university's budgeted cost of attendance. Because of this rule, a full athletic scholarship may be reduced when a student-athlete receives other scholarships and grants.

What is the UC Davis policy on athletic grants for summer school? Are these athletic scholarships proportionate to what a student-athlete receives during the regular academic year?

Limited summer school financial aid funds are available. The total amount of funding available varies from year to year, and the amount of any award will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

What is the average monthly full grant-in-aid athletic scholarship payment received by student-athletes who live on-campus and off-campus during the academic year and summer session?

There is not an average monthly payment because remaining funds are dispersed to students in the form of a refund at the start of each quarter. Student-athletes living on-campus may or may not have a refund depending on what meal plan they choose. Charges are deducted from the student's account in the following order: tuition, fees, SHIP, room and board. Off-campus student-athletes should see the full amount for room and board at the start of each quarter. For both on- and off-campus recipients, other charges that appear on their account may lessen the actual amount refunded. Examples of some of these other charges include, but are not limited to health center charges, orientation fees, late fees, lock out fees, bookstore charges, printing charges, electricity charges, etc.

Pursuant to NCAA rules, a verbal commitment is not binding on either the student-athlete or the institution. The National Letter of Intent is a binding agreement between a prospective student-athlete and an institution in which the institution agrees to provide a prospective student-athlete who is admitted to the institution and is eligible for financial aid under NCAA rules athletics aid for one academic year in exchange for the prospective student-athlete's agreement to attend the institution for

one academic year. The National Letter of Intent must be accompanied by an institutional financial aid agreement. If the prospective student-athlete signs the National Letter of Intent but does not enroll at that institution for a full academic year, he or she may be subject to specific penalties, including loss of a season of eligibility and a mandatory residence requirement.

What is the NCAA policy on scholarship duration?

Generally, athletic scholarships at UC Davis are awarded on a one-year basis. They may be for less than the academic year if the student-athlete is a midyear enrollee, is graduating after fall or winter quarter or the student-athlete has never been awarded an athletic scholarship before.

What is UC Davis' policy on the renewal or nonrenewal of an athletic scholarship?

Generally, it is the policy of UC Davis that a scholarship will be renewed at the same amount or higher in continuing years unless the student-athlete has failed to conduct him or herself appropriately, rendered themselves academically ineligible, quit the team voluntarily or has stopped attending required practices, meetings and competitions without proper authorization to do so by the head coach.

What if the student-athlete suffers a temporary or permanent sports-related injury? What if there is a coaching change? What if a student-athlete's performance is deemed to be below expectations?

A temporary sports-related injury will have no bearing on the athletic scholarship unless the student-athlete decides on his or her own to voluntarily quit the team or chooses not to rehabilitate the injury as prescribed by the athletic trainers or a physician. In that instance, the student-athlete still has a chance to appeal the removal of the athletic scholarship.

If the student-athlete suffers a permanent sports-related injury he or she has the opportunity to work in the athletic department as part of the agreement to receive the funding. Athletic scholarships will be awarded provided the student-athlete is meeting all NCAA academic eligibility requirements including APR points and meets with an athletic academic advisor each quarter.

UC Davis student-athletes will not have their aid reduced for performance reasons at any time, including if there is a coaching change. Aid may only be reduced for reasons having to do with behavioral problems or academic underperformance. Performance is not a criterion for reducing or eliminating aid.

It is a baseline behavioral expectation for UC Davis student-athletes to make a good faith commitment to the success of their team and demonstrate a dedication to athletics that is (a) commensurate with a reasonable Division I standard and (b) aligned

with the level of dedication demonstrated by their teammates. Failing to meet this expectation of reasonable Division I commitment and dedication is considered by UC Davis to be a behavioral issue, and not a performance issue, and may be justification for the reduction or elimination of aid.

Medical Expenses

What is the NCAA's policy on whether athletic programs are mandated to pay for athletically related medical expenses?

An active member institution must certify insurance coverage for medical expenses resulting from athletically related injuries sustained by the following individuals while participating in a covered event:

- a) A student-athlete participating in a covered event in an intercollegiate sport as recognized by the participating institution; and
- b) A prospective student-athlete participating in a covered event who has graduated from high school and signed a National Letter of Intent or an institution's written offer of admission and/or financial aid to participate in an intercollegiate sport at a participating institution.

What is UC Davis' policy on whether it will pay for student-athletes athletically related medical expenses, including deductibles, copays and coinsurance? Will UC Davis pay for athletically related medical expenses that exceed any maximum insurance limits?

UC Davis Intercollegiate Athletics (ICA) provides medical insurance coverage for student-athletes who are injured while participating in scheduled, supervised and sponsored intercollegiate athletic competitions or authorized practice sessions as a player or trainer. Provided insurance is secondary insurance coverage, at no cost to the student-athlete. ICA insurance will cover co-payments, deductibles, co-insurance, and other expenses that the primary insurance does not cover, only after the primary insurance has processed the claim first.

If medical bills for a covered injury exceed \$90,000 within two years from date of injury, catastrophic insurance may apply if the student-athlete has no other medical coverage.

What is UC Davis' policy concerning who is required to pay for any required athletically related insurance premiums for student-athletes who do not have such insurance?

ICA pays for athletically related insurance premiums for all student-athletes. At UC Davis, SHIP insurance is required of all students unless they provide proof of other coverage and waive out of SHIP. If a student-athlete has other coverage, then our insurance provides secondary coverage. If a student-athlete does not have applicable

primary insurance coverage, ICA insurance becomes the primary coverage for expenses related to athletically related injuries/illnesses at no cost to the student-athlete.

What is the duration of time UC Davis will continue to pay for athletically related medical expenses after a student-athlete's eligibility has expired?

ICA insurance coverage is effective for up to two years from the date of injury for up to \$90,000. If medical bills for a covered injury exceed \$90,000 within two years from date of injury, catastrophic insurance through the NCAA will apply if the student-athlete has no other medical coverage.

Does our medical policy cover expenses associated with attaining a second medical opinion for an athletically related injury from a physician who is not associated with the athletic program? Do we provide coverage for such services?

ICA insurance provides coverage only for treatment that is referred through the UC Davis athletic training staff by a UC Davis team physician. In the event that a student-athlete wishes to seek a second medical opinion, the athletic training staff will assist in providing this service by scheduling the student-athlete with another team physician (or with an outside physician if the problem resides outside the scope of the team physician staff) at no cost to the student-athlete. If the student-athlete requests a second medical opinion, but does not wish to be seen by one of the UC Davis team physicians, the student-athlete may pursue an evaluation from any physician that they choose, but the student-athlete is then responsible for the cost incurred.

Transfer Release

What is the NCAA policy on whether an athletic program may refuse to grant an athletic release to a student-athlete who wishes to transfer to another institution?

Athletic programs may refuse to grant an athletics release to a student-athlete who wishes to transfer to another institution and also may refuse to grant the student-athlete permission to speak to other institutions. In either case, the decision to grant or deny the request(s) must be decided within seven business days of when the written request was received. If either type of request is denied, the student-athlete must be notified in writing that he or she, upon request, shall be provided a hearing conducted by an institutional entity outside of the athletics department.

What is UC Davis' policy concerning whether it may use any power to refuse to grant an athletic release for a student-athlete who wishes to transfer to another institution?

For granting athletic releases, each situation is considered on a case-by-case basis and coaches and/or department staff members have the power to deny the request. If a student-athlete's request to transfer is not granted, he or she will be notified of the hearing policies and procedures in a timely manner as per NCAA rules.
