**GAME 10** — UCLA (3-6, 2-4 in Pac-10 play) travels to Seattle to play at the University of Washington (0-9, 0-6) on Saturday, November 15. Kickoff is scheduled for 7:26 p.m. The game will be televised nationally by FSN with Barry Tompkins and Petros Papadakis calling the action and Jim Watson on the sidelines. The UCLA/ISP Sports Radio Network (KLAC 570 AM is the Los Angeles flagship station) will broadcast the contest with Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook calling the action. The game also will be carried live on Sirius Satellite Radio (Channel 127). In addition, ISP produces a Spanish-language broadcast of all UCLA home games which can be heard on the Bruin website at [uclabruins.com](http://uclabruins.com) with Armando Aguayo and Mario Amaya.

**SERIES WITH WASHINGTON** — The Bruins and the Huskies will meet for the 68th time on Saturday, Nov. 15 in a series which dates back to 1932. The Bruins lead the series by a count of 36-29-2. UCLA has captured six of the last seven meetings. The teams have split the last four contests played in Seattle (UCLA wins in 2004 and 2002; UW wins in 2006 and 2000). UCLA's last win in Seattle came by a score of 37-31 in the 2004 season.

UCLA won the 2007 meeting in the Rose Bowl by a score of 44-31. The Bruins racked up 333 yards of rushing offense in the affair and 537 yards of total offense. UW totaled 340 yards of offense. Chris Markey (193) and Kahlil Bell (109) each hit the 100-yard rushing mark for the Bruins.

The score was knotted at 10-each at halftime, setting the stage for a second half scoreboard explosion. The post-intermission quarters featured four scoring plays of at least 60 yards in length, including a 72-yard run by Chris Markey, an 85-yard kickoff return by Matthew Slater and a 60-yard interception return by Dennis Keyes. A scoring dash by Bell and the interception return sent UCLA into the fourth quarter with a 24-10 lead. The Huskies won the fourth quarter 21-20 but it was not enough. Patrick Cowan filled in for injured Bruin starter Ben Olson at quarterback and threw for 147 yards in the contest, before leaving the game with an injury as well.

In the last battle between the teams held in the Northwest, in 2006, the Huskies used a 15-0 fourth quarter rally to slide past the Bruins by a score of 29-19. UCLA had jumped out to a 16-0 lead to start the contest. Washington scored with just over a minute left in the first half to make it 16-7 at the break. UW moved to within 16-14 early in the third quarter and trailed 19-14 entering the fourth quarter after a 22-yard Justin Medlock field goal late in the third quarter. Washington took its first lead, at 22-19, on a short scoring pass and a two-point conversion with 7:32 to play. A Ben Olson pass was then intercepted and returned for a Washington touchdown at the 6:02 mark to help cement the Husky win.

Coach Rick Neuheisel owns a 1-0 record versus Washington, with the meeting coming in the 1996 Holiday Bowl (33-21) while he was head coach at the University of Colorado. He also coached at the University of Washington for four seasons (1999-2002), compiling a record of 33-16. His teams were 23-9 (.719) in league play and earned four bowl berths, winning the 2001 Rose Bowl to finish 11-1.

### LINEUPS AND STARTS

\* Senior defensive tackle Brigham Harwell leads the team with 38 career starts. Linebacker Reggie Carter (29), tight end Logan Paulsen (26), cornerback Alterraun Verner (21) and wide receiver Marcus Everett (20) are the only other Bruins with at least 20 career starts. Linebacker John Hall is the next closest to 20 with 16 starts.

\* Junior cornerback Alterraun Verner has the longest starting streak on the team with 18 straight. Senior tight end Logan Paulsen had a 23-game starting streak snapped against BYU when he sat out the game due to a broken foot. Senior center Micah Reed had a string of 10 straight snapped when he did not play versus Arizona (knee) and senior defensive end Tom Blake had a 10-game streak snapped when he did not play at Oregon. Sophomore defensive tackle Brian Price owns the next longest active streak (11).

### FIELD POSITION AND TURNOVERS

\* UCLA is 25-2 when it wins the turnover battle over the past five-plus seasons, including 5-0 (@Stanford, BYU, Oregon State, California, Oregon) in 2007 and 2-0 (WSU, Stanford) in 2008.

\* It is 13-32 when it ties or loses the turnover battle over the last five-plus seasons, including 1-6 (beat Tennessee, lost to @BYU, Arizona, Fresno State, @Oregon, @Cal and Oregon State) in 2008.

\* Opponents have started 28 drives in UCLA territory this season (during regulation) and have totaled 103 points. Tennessee started one drive (U 26-yard line) in Bruin territory and it led to a UT punt. BYU began six drives (U 37, U 30, U 25, U 48, U 43, U 16-yard lines) in UCLA territory and came away with five touchdowns and a field goal for 38 points. Four of the BYU drives came after UCLA turnovers and a fifth came after a blocked

field goal. The sixth came after UCLA turned the ball over on downs. Arizona started four drives (U48, U26, U42, U25) and scored two touchdowns for 14 points. Fresno State started one drive in UCLA territory and it resulted in a Bruin interception. Washington State started two drives in UCLA territory and neither resulted in points, one ending with a punt and one on downs. Oregon started three drives in Bruin territory and two resulted in 10 points (touchdown and field goal). Stanford started three drives in UCLA territory (U46, U29, U46) and they resulted in two touchdowns and one field goal. Cal started three drives in UCLA territory (U41, U40, U47) and scored one field goal. Oregon State started five drives in UCLA territory (U4, U21, U8, U35, U15) and scored three touchdowns.

TAKING THE FOURTH

- \* UCLA has trailed entering the fourth quarter in eight of the nine games played to date (led against Washington State)
- \* In five of the nine contests, the Bruins have trailed by just one score entering the final quarter ... Twice, against Tennessee (10-14) and Stanford (13-14), the Bruins have rallied to win the game
- \* Scores entering the fourth quarter: Tennessee (10-14), BYU (0-59), Arizona (10-17), Fresno State (24-36), Washington State (21-3), Oregon (14-21), Stanford (13-14), California (13-17), Oregon State (6-17)
- \* UCLA has been outscored in the fourth quarter (overtime) in just three of the nine games (Tennessee 17-10, BYU 0-0, Arizona 0-14, Fresno State 7-0, Washington State 7-0, Oregon 10-10, Stanford 10-6, Cal 7-24, Oregon State 0-17)

FRESHMEN

- \* UCLA has played a total of 22 freshmen this season, 11 true freshmen and 11 redshirt freshmen. They have combined to make 42 starts (S Rahim Moore - 9; TE Cory Harkey - 5; WR Taylor Embree - 7; OL Jeff Baca - 5; DL Datone Jones - 2; OL Mike Harris - 2; LB Steve Sloan - 7; LB Akeem Ayers - 3; OT/TE Nate Chandler - 2; S Tony Dye - 1). **Eight started the Oregon State game.**
- \* UCLA has played a total of 11 true freshmen (seven offense, four defense) so far this season. The Bruins played seven freshmen in the 2008 season-opening game against Tennessee --- LB Sean Westgate; S Rahim Moore; TE Cory Harkey; WR Taylor Embree; S; Tony Dye; WR Antwan Moutra; WR Nelson Rosario. RB Aundre Dean made his debut versus BYU. TB Derrick Coleman, OT Jeff Baca and DE Datone Jones debuted versus Arizona.
- \* A school-record 17 true freshmen played for the Bruins in 1977. Thirteen played in 1975, 12 played in 1978, 1980 and 2004 and 10 played in 1979. In recent years, nine played in 2005, eight in 2006 and two in 2007).

FIRST ACTION

- \* A total of 29 players (17 offensive and 12 defensive) have seen their first action as a Bruin during the 2008 season (**11 true freshmen** - seven offensive and four defensive players (LB Sean Westgate, S Rahim Moore, TE Cory Harkey, WR Taylor Embree, S Tony Dye, WR Antwan Moutra, WR Nelson Rosario, RB Aundre Dean, RB Derrick Coleman, OL Jeff Baca, DL Datone Jones); **11 redshirt freshmen** - five defensive and six offensive players (DB Courtney Viney, LB Steve Sloan, LB Akeem Ayers, DB Glenn Love, OL/TE Nate Chandler, RB Raymond Carter, DL Justin Edison, WR Ryal Jagd, QB Chris Forcier, TE Glenn Rauscher, OT Mike Harris), **six redshirt sophomores** - three offensive and three defensive players (OL Brandon Bennett, LB Mike Schmitt, DL Reginald Stokes, OL Sonny Tevaga, OL Jake Dean, DB Garrett Rubio), **one redshirt junior** (QB Kevin Craft).
- \* In addition to the seven true freshmen listed above, 10 other Bruins saw their first action in the 2008 season-opening win against Tennessee --- redshirt sophomore OL Brandon Bennett; redshirt sophomore LB Mike Schmitt; redshirt sophomore DL Reginald Stokes; redshirt sophomore OL Sonny Tevaga; redshirt freshman DB Courtney Viney; redshirt freshman LB Steve Sloan; redshirt freshman LB Akeem Ayers; redshirt freshman OL Nate Chandler; redshirt freshman RB Raymond Carter; redshirt freshman DB Glenn Love. At Brigham Young, true freshman RB Aundre Dean, redshirt sophomore C Jake Dean, redshirt freshman DL Justin Edison and redshirt sophomore S Garrett Rubio made their Bruin debuts. Against Arizona, true freshman TB Derrick Coleman, true freshman OT Jeff Baca and true freshman DE Datone Jones played for the first time. Redshirt freshman WR Ryal Jagd played on special teams versus Fresno State. Against Washington State, redshirt freshman QB Chris Forcier and redshirt freshman TE Glenn Rauscher made their debuts on offense. Redshirt sophomore FB Tobi Umodu (he played on special teams last season) and redshirt junior OG Jess Ward (he played DT last year) made their offensive debuts versus the Cougars. Redshirt freshman OT Mike Harris made his debut at California.

FIRST STARTS

- \* Nineteen players (12 on offense and seven on defense) have made their first starts this season. Six players made their first position starts --- S Aaron Ware; S Rahim Moore; OG Sonny Tevaga; OT Nick Ekbatani; QB Kevin Craft; WR Terrence Austin - versus Tennessee. At BYU, OG Darius Savage, TE Cory Harkey and LB Akeem Ayers made their first starts. Versus Arizona, WR Taylor Embree, C Jake Dean and LB Steve Sloan made their first starts. Against Fresno State, TE Nate Chandler and OT Jeff Baca made their first starts. DE Reginald Stokes made his first start at Oregon. TE Jeff Miller made his first start versus Stanford. OT Mike Harris and DE Datone Jones made their first starts at California. S Tony Dye made his first start versus Oregon State in the nickel package.

TEAM NOTES —

- \* UCLA's defense has allowed opponent offenses to convert just 18 of the last 64 (28.1%) third down conversion attempts in the last five games.

**BRUINS IN THE NFL**

On the opening weekend of the 2006 NFL season, 30 Bruins were listed on various rosters -- 26 on regular rosters, three on the practice squad and one on injured reserve. The 26 Bruins ranked 12th (tied) nationally and tied for first in the Pac-10.

On the opening weekend of the 2007 season, there were 22 Bruins on active rosters (26 overall). That total ranked third in the Pac-10 behind USC (27) and California (24).

- \* Oregon's 42 yards passing is the fewest allowed by the Bruin defense since Sept. 4, 2004, when the Bruins held Oklahoma State to 23 yards in the air.
- \* In a three-game span (Oregon, Stanford, California) UCLA allowed just 246 passing yards (21 completions in 54 attempts), including two games under 100 yards.
- \* Washington State's 177 yards of total offense was UCLA's best defensive effort since holding Oregon to 148 net yards last season. That was the best effort by a Bruin defense since holding Arkansas to 42 net yards in the 1989 Cotton Bowl.
- \* Washington State's 26 net yards rushing was the lowest total by a Bruin opponent since UCLA held Arizona to minus-13 yards rushing in 2006.
- \* UCLA's 234 rushing yards against Fresno State was its highest total since running for 333 yards against Washington last season (game four).
- \* Over the last five-plus seasons, UCLA is 21-2 when it scores at least 30 points in a game and 12-1 when it scores 40 or more (11 in a row).
- \* Over the last five-plus seasons, the Bruins are 21-3 when they hold the opponent under 20 points, and had a 16-game winning streak snapped when they lost the Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16.
- \* Has held 14 opponents over the last two-plus seasons to less than 100 yards of rushing offense.
- \* Held six opponents to less than 100 yards on the ground in the 2007 season (52-Stanford, 44-BYU, 46-Notre Dame, 67-Cal, 43-Oregon, 34-BYU/bowl).
- \* In 13 games in 2007, opponents converted 62 of 214 (29.0%) third down opportunities and UCLA ranked third in the nation and second in the Pac-10 in that category.
- \* UCLA held its 13 opponents to 1,419 net rushing yards on 472 attempts (3.0 average) and ranked 25th in the nation (109.15) in rushing defense in 2007.

**ROSE BOWL ADVANTAGE**

- \* The Bruins have captured wins in 19 of the last 25 games (.760) played at home in the Rose Bowl.
- \* Over the last six seasons, UCLA's home record is 27-10 (.730).
- \* UCLA has won 17 of its last 21 (.810) non-conference matchups played in the Rose Bowl (2008: L Fresno State / W Tennessee; 2007: L Notre Dame / W BYU; 2006: W Rice / W Utah; 2005: W Oklahoma / W Rice; 2004: W San Diego State / L Okla. State; 2003: W San Diego State / W Illinois; 2002: L Colorado / W Colorado State; 2001: W Ohio State; 2000: W Michigan, W Fresno State, W Alabama; 1999: W Fresno State / W Boise State; 1998: W Texas).
- \* UCLA's 10-game home winning streak in 2005-06 was its longest since 1997-1999, when it won 13 consecutive home games.

**UCLA AGAINST RANKED OPPONENTS**

- \* UCLA has won six of its last eight home games played against AP ranked opponents with wins over Tennessee (2008-18th), Oregon (2007-9th), Cal (twice, 2005-10th, 2007-10th), USC (2006-2nd) and Oklahoma (2005-21st) and the losses to ASU (2007-9th) and Fresno State 2008-25th).
- \* UCLA has defeated three of the last five Top 10-ranked opponents it has faced.

**HEAD COACH RICK NEUHEISEL**



\*Owns a career college head coaching record of 69-36, including four years each at Colorado and Washington

\*Led teams to three Top 10 finishes and seven bowl games

\*Coached three seasons in the National Football League

Rick Neuheisel, who is in his ninth season as a collegiate head coach and his first at his alma mater, enters this week's game with a career record of 69-36 (.657).

The energetic and personable Neuheisel returned to the collegiate ranks after spending the past three seasons in the NFL. In his eight years as a college head coach at the University of Colorado and the University of Washington, he fashioned a record of 66-30, winning at least 10 games on three occasions and finishing in the Top 10 three times, while leading his teams to seven bowl games. His winning percentage of .688 entering the season placed him No. 17 among active coaches with at least five years in the Football Bowl Subdivision. He has also been recognized as one of the nation's top recruiters during his college coaching days.

Neuheisel spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. He served as quarterbacks coach in 2005 and 2006 and in January of 2007, was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

During his four seasons (1999-2002) as head coach at the University of Washington, Neuheisel led the Huskies to a record of 33-16 (.673) and four bowl games (one Rose Bowl, two Holiday Bowls and one Sun Bowl). His Pac-10 record was 23-9 (.719) and Washington won one league title and finished second twice in those four seasons.

In 2000, Neuheisel led the Huskies to an 11-1 record, a first-place finish in the Pac-10 and a victory in the 2001 Rose Bowl.

During his four seasons (1995-98) as head coach at the University of Colorado, Neuheisel won 33 of 47 games (.702), including all three bowl appearances. His 20-4 record in his first two seasons at Colorado were the fifth-most wins at the time for a first-time head coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division IA).

Neuheisel spent the 1994 season as a Colorado assistant coach under Bill McCartney after going to CU from UCLA.

Neuheisel spent six seasons (1988-93) as an assistant coach at his alma mater. During his final four years he tutored the wide receivers, helping to develop some of UCLA's all-time great receivers, such as J.J. Stokes, Kevin Jordan and Sean LaChapelle.

Neuheisel joined the UCLA staff full-time in 1988 and coached quarterbacks for two seasons, including NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman's senior year (1988). Aikman earned consensus All-America honors and finished third in the Heisman Trophy race, completing a school-record 228 passes (since broken) for 2,771 yards, a 64.4 percentage and a school-record 24 touchdowns (since broken). Aikman was the No. 1 selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

In 1986, he served as a volunteer coach and his major assignment was to teach the offense to a transfer from Oklahoma who had to sit out the 1986 season - Aikman.

Neuheisel began his collegiate career at UCLA (1979-83) as a walk-on, holding for place kicker John Lee, and earned the starting quarterback job during his senior season (1983). In his final game as a Bruin, he overcame food poisoning to lead UCLA to a 45-9 victory against Illinois in the 1984 Rose Bowl. \* 11 offensive players who combined to start a total of 86 games, including 49 on the offensive line (Chris Joseph-13, Brian Abraham-12, Shannon Tevaga-10, Aleksey Lanis-6, Noah Sutherland-6, P.J. Irvin-2) have been lost.

\* Nine defensive players who combined to start 91 games, including five players who started all 13 games last season (DT Kevin Brown, CB Trey Brown, DE Bruce Davis, S Chris Horton, S Dennis Keyes) have been lost.

## ROSE BOWL CROWDS

\* In 2007, the Bruins drew at least 70,000 for each game of its home schedule, the first time since UCLA moved to the Rose Bowl. The average of 76,378 was a new record, breaking the old mark of 73,709, set in 1998. That average is also the sixth-highest in Pac-10 history.

\* UCLA has drawn at least 70,000 fans in nine of its last 13 games and has drawn at least 60,000 fans in 14 consecutive home contests.

\* The crowd of 83,484 for the 2007 California game was UCLA's largest for a non-USC game since Nov. 12, 2005, when it drew 84,983 for Arizona State.

## DID YOU KNOW...

UCLA has two sets of brothers on the team -- the Bosworths (Kyle and Korey) and the Molines (Chase and Chane).

Three Bruin coaches and nine players, including 2008 inductee Troy Aikman (Dec. 9), are enshrined in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Coach Rick Neuheisel still holds the UCLA single season record for completion percentage. Neuheisel completed 185 of 267 passes (69.3%) for 2,245 yards in the 1983 season. He set a then-NCAA record when he completed 25 of 27 passes (92.6%) in a game that season against Washington.

UCLA and Oregon State are the only Pac-10 teams playing three non-conference opponents who each won at least nine games in 2007.

UCLA has 14 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, Danny Farmer, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Floyd Reese, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

Twenty-two UCLA players have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams a total of 27 times. Offensive lineman Chris Joseph (2006, 2007) and wide receiver Cormac Carney (1981, 1982) were two-time first-team selections.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 26 years (including 2007), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (14) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Marcedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 27 of the last 29 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships.

**UCLA ON THE RADIO**

The 2008 season is UCLA's 12th with Clear Channel and the games will again air on AM 570 KLAC in Southern California. For the first time, the games will be produced by ISP, UCLA's corporate and media-rights holder.

The Los Angeles all-sports station's broadcast includes a two-hour pre-game show (one hour local, one hour network) and a post-game show.

Chris Roberts, a four-time Golden Mike Award winner, is in his 17th season as the voice of the Bruins. Former Bruin quarterback Matt Stevens is in his 12th year on the broadcast team and his eighth as the analyst in the booth. Former Bruin quarterback Wayne Cook is in his seventh season as sideline reporter.

Stevens and Cook host the hour local pre-game show while Roberts, Stevens and Cook host the hour network pre-game and network post-game shows.

ISP also originates a UCLA Magazine show that will air on AM 570 KLAC following the football post-game talk show. It features interviews and information on all sports.

AM 570 KLAC also provides ancillary programming, including head coach and player interviews during game weeks.

Bruin games are also available nationally through an agreement with Sirius Satellite Radio, the Official Satellite Radio Partner of UCLA Athletics.

Games can also be heard via the internet at uclabruins.com (a UCLA All-Access pass is needed).

For the first time, UCLA home games are being broadcast in Spanish on uclabruins.com with Armando Aguayo and Mario Amaya.



**UCLA ON TELEVISION**

Heading into the game vs. Washington, 182 of UCLA's last 190 games have been televised live, including each of the last 50 dating back to 2004.

All 12 games this season will be televised live - ABC (9/27 FSU, 10/25 CAL, 12/6 USC), ESPN (9/1 Tenn), ESPN2 (11/28 ASU), FSN (9/20 ARIZ, 10/11 OREGON, 11/15 UW), VERSUS (9/13 BYU), FSN Prime Ticket (10/4 WSU, 11/8 OSU) and FSN West (10/18 STAN).

All 13 games in 2007 were televised live: ABC (10/6 Notre Dame, 10/20 Cal, 11/3 Arizona, 11/10 Arizona State, 11/24 Oregon, 12/1 USC), Fox Sports Net (9/1Stanford, 9/22 Washington, 9/29 Oregon State, 10/27 Washington St.), Versus (9/8 BYU, 9/15 Utah), ESPN (Las Vegas Bowl).

FSN Prime Ticket (Channel 694 on DirecTV) airs live post-game shows from the Rose Bowl following most Bruin home games.

Prime Ticket also airs the Lexus Gauntlet Live every Monday night at 9:00 pm. The live show will feature highlights from the previous week's game as well as interviews with UCLA and USC players and coaches. The show will alternate between campuses throughout the season.

**LAST GAME**

\* Nov. 8 - UCLA 6, Oregon State 34  
 The game was tied 3-3 at halftime but Oregon State scored touchdowns on each of its first two second-half possessions en route to a 34-6 victory over UCLA at the Rose Bowl.  
 Each team scored a field goal in the first quarter and the second quarter was scoreless. OSU's second possession of the second half started on the Bruin 21-yard line due to a short punt from the one-yard line, coupled with an 18-yard return. It took the Beavers just two plays to make the score 10-7. Following a three-and-out by the Bruin offense, OSU drove 61 yards to make the score 17-3. Later in the quarter, UCLA added a field goal to make the score 17-6.  
 In the fourth quarter, UCLA had driven from its own 11-yard line to the OSU39. Following a five-yard penalty, Kevin Craft threw an interception that was returned to the Bruin eight-yard line. Oregon State scored on two plays to make the score 24-7 and added a field goal with 4:02 remaining and a touchdown with 2:18 left for the final score.  
 Defensively, UCLA allowed 423 yards, 211 in the first half and 212 in the second half. Reggie Carter led the team with 10 tackles (nine solos), including two for loss. Brigham Harwell (two for loss, including one forced fumble) and John Hale made six tackles each while Alterraun Verner and Bret Lockett added five stops apiece. Rahim Moore was one of several players with four tackles but added an interception and recovered a fumble.  
 Offensively, Kevin Craft completed 20 of 42 passes for 189 yards with two interceptions. Taylor Embree led the team with five catches, Dominique Johnson made four and Rayn Moya added three. Kahlil Bell led UCLA rushers with 45 yards on 12 carries.  
 On special teams, Aaron Perez averaged 47.0 yards on eight kicks, Kai Forbath made field goals of 29 and 35 yards and Terrence Austin averaged 21.2 yards on five kickoff returns.

## THE DEFENSE

**DEFENSIVE LINE** — An honors candidate (pre-season “watch list” for the 2008 Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award), redshirt senior tackle **BRIGHAM HARWELL (#93)** recorded five tackles, including one tackle for loss, in the season-opening win over Tennessee. At BYU, he made a career-high eight tackles, including 0.5 for loss, and also broke up one pass. Against Arizona, Harwell tied his career high with eight tackles (four primaries). He added six tackles versus Fresno State. In the win over WSU, he had two tackles, including an eight-yard sack. At Oregon, he made four tackles, including one for loss. In the win over Stanford, he had five tackles and also recovered a fumble. At California, he made two solo tackles. Against Oregon State, he made six tackles (five solos), including 2.0 for loss, and forced a fumble.

Harwell is fourth on the squad with 46 tackles and is third with 5.5 tackles for loss. **He is first among Pac-10 defensive linemen with his 5.11 tackles average and tied for 36th overall.**

Harwell was granted a medical substitute year of eligibility after sustaining a knee injury in game two of the 2007 season against BYU. He made two stops in that game before leaving in the second quarter with a tear of his left medial collateral ligament. He missed the final 11 games of the season.

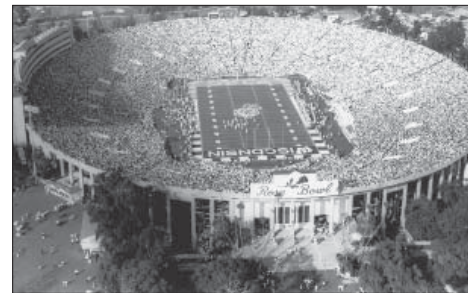

One of the top young players at his position in the nation, true sophomore defensive tackle **BRIAN PRICE (#92)** was on the pre-season “watch list” for the 2008 Lombardi Award.

**Price leads the team with 10.0 tackles for loss (eight in the last six games) and is eighth in the Pac-10 with 1.11 tackles for loss per game. He is second on the squad with 3.5 sacks (T-11th in Pac-10). He has made 17 tackles for loss in his last 13 games dating back to last year.**

He opened 2008 with a four-tackle performance against Tennessee, including two tackles for loss. He started at BYU but was not credited with a tackle. Against Arizona, he made two tackles and broke up one pass. Against Fresno State, he made four tackles, including one for loss. He also intercepted a tipped pass, the first interception of his career, and blocked a PAT that UCLA returned for two points. The pick led to a Bruin field goal. He also saw a couple of snaps at fullback, notably on Kahlil Bell's first touchdown. Against Washington State, he made two tackles - one a five-yard sack and the other a five-yard loss on a run. He also had some snaps at fullback in goalline situations. At Oregon, he had three tackle assists, including 0.5 sacks and another 0.5 tackles for loss. He also played at fullback on the goalline. In the win over Stanford, he had four tackles (three solos), including an eight-yard sack. He also played at fullback on the goalline. At California, he recorded a sack and two others for loss among his five tackles (four solos). He made two tackles (one solo) versus Oregon State.

A year ago, he earned second-team Freshman All-America honors from rivals.com and scout.com. Price played in each of the last 10 games in 2007 after missing the first three contests with NCAA clearing house issues. He made his first appearance versus Washington (game 4) and his first start at Washington State (game 8). In the Las Vegas Bowl, he had four tackles, three for loss and forced the fumble that led to the Bruins' lone touchdown.



## THE 27TH YEAR

### AT ROSE BOWL

The 2008 season marks the 27th year that the Rose Bowl will serve as the home of the Bruins. UCLA moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 112-49-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games. UCLA is 27-10 overall at home in the last five-plus years and 19-6 in the last three-plus seasons (2005-08).

In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SIonCampus.

### THIS WAY TO THE ROSE BOWL

For just \$2 round trip, fans can ride shuttle buses from the Parsons Engineering parking lot in downtown Pasadena (Walnut and Fair Oaks) to the Rose Bowl. Parking at the Parsons Lot is free. Shuttle service begins four hours prior to kickoff and runs up to one hour after the game.

The Metro Gold Line will run from downtown Los Angeles (and points further) to downtown Pasadena (approx. one block from the Parsons Lot) on game days. Gold Line patrons are encouraged to use the \$2 shuttle from the Parsons lot to and from the Rose Bowl.

Redshirt junior defensive end **KOREY BOSWORTH (#55)** is **fifth (tied) on the squad with 42 tackles. He leads the Bruins with 5.5 sacks and is second with 9.0 tackles for loss. He is fifth in the Pac-10 in sacks (0.61) and ninth (tied) in TFL (1.00).**

Bosworth was credited with five tackles, a sack and two tackles for loss in a starting role against Tennessee. He had four tackles at BYU, including one for loss. Against Arizona, he made six tackles and recovered a fumble for a touchdown. He made two tackles against Fresno State. In the win over Washington State, Bosworth accounted for six tackles, including a four-yard sack and a second for loss. He also broke up two passes. At Oregon, he made six tackles, including 1.5 sacks and another 0.5 (2.0 total) tackles for loss. He made two tackles versus Stanford.

At California, he made a career-high seven tackles (three solos), including two sacks and another 0.5 stop for loss. The 2.5 TFL

and the 2.0 sacks tied his career highs in both categories. He made four tackles (three solos) versus Oregon State.

Bosworth appeared in all 13 games and made three starts in 2007. He ranked fourth on the team with 8.5 TFL and was tied for fifth on the team with two sacks.

He had two stops in the win over Washington State. He has not played in the last four games (at Oregon, Stanford, at California, Oregon State) and had season ending sports hernia surgery.

**LINEBACKER** — Redshirt junior **REGGIE CARTER (#51)**, one of the top linebackers in the nation, is on the pre-season 'Watch Lists' of the Nagurski Award, the Lott Trophy, the Bednarik Award, the Butkus Award and the Lombardi Award.

**He has a team-high 67 tackles, including 4.5 for loss which is fourth on the squad. He is fourth in the Pac-10 with his 7.44 tackles per game.**

He started against Tennessee and made five tackles and forced a Vol fumble at the Bruin six-yard line on UT's opening drive of the second half. **SECONDARY** — True junior cornerback **ALTERRAUN VERNER (#1)** is considered one of the top corners in the nation and is was on the pre-season "Watch List" of the Lott Trophy (nation's top defensive player). **He had also been added to the "Watch List" for the Jim Thorpe Award, presented to the nation's top defensive back.**

**Verner ranks second on the squad with 57 tackles. He ranks 15th in the Pac-10 in tackles (6.33) and fifth in the Pac-10 and eighth in the NCAA with 1.44 pass defenses per game. He is also T-15th in the Pac-10 in interceptions (0.22).**

Verner tallied six tackles and picked off his seventh career pass in the opener against Tennessee. He was selected the Lott Trophy IMPACT Player of the Week for his efforts. At BYU, he was credited with a career-high 13 tackles (nine solos), including 0.5 for loss, and broke up one pass. Against Arizona, he made three tackles and broke up two passes. He made 10 tackles (eight solos), including one for a three-yard loss, to rank second on the team versus Fresno State.

In the win over Washington State, he led the team with seven tackles. He also made his second interception of the year and eighth of his career to set up a touchdown, broke up a second pass and also forced a fumble. At Oregon, he made one tackle and broke up a pass. Cal was on the Bruin 30-yard line facing a third-and-five situation when Verner stepped in front of the intended receiver and returned it 76 yards for a score. The game-clinching interception was the third touchdown return of his career, tying the UCLA record held by Jerry Robinson (1975-78), Marcus Turner (1985-88) and Spencer Havner (2002-05).

In 2006, Verner was selected co-Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and was named a first-team Freshman All-America by Scripps/FWAA and CollegeFootballNews.com. Verner ranked fourth on the team with 59 tackles. He became the sixth Bruin, and first freshman, to score two touchdowns on interceptions in the same season. With 2:16 remaining in the second quarter of the season-opening Utah game, he picked off a pass and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown. His scoring return was the first by a UCLA true freshman since 1989, when Carlton Gray returned one 65 yards versus Washington. In the win over Arizona, he picked off a fourth-quarter Wildcat pass and returned it 89 yards for a score. **THE OFFENSE**

**QUARTERBACKS** — Redshirt junior **KEVIN CRAFT (#3)** enrolled at UCLA in time for the 2008 Spring Quarter after transferring from Mt. San Antonio College and was able to participate in spring practice.

Craft started his first game as a Bruin in the 2008 opener and helped orchestrate the second-half comeback win over Tennessee. After completing 7 of 18 passes for 66 yards with four interceptions in the first half of action, Craft went on to complete 18 of 25 attempts for 193 yards after halftime (12 of 14 for 139 yards in the fourth quarter). He connected on three of four attempts on a third-quarter field goal drive which narrowed the Tennessee lead to 14-10. Craft hit on all six passes in an 80-yard fourth quarter touchdown drive which put the Bruins ahead 17-14. He completed six of eight aerials on a nine-play, 70-yard fourth-quarter drive, including a three-yard scoring pass to tight end Ryan Moya, which gave UCLA a 24-21 lead with 27 seconds to play. For the game, he completed 25 of 43 passes for 259 yards. His 43 pass attempts are tied for the 11th-most in school history.

At BYU, Craft completed 23 of 39 passes for 230 yards and one interception. Against Arizona, he completed 15 of 31 passes for 81 yards. Against Fresno State, he completed 11 of 20 passes for 150 yards and one touchdown and also rushed for 46 yards on six attempts. He led two touchdown drives of at least 65 yards and helped produce six offensive scores - three touchdowns and three field goals. Against Washington State, Craft completed 23 of 36 passes for 225 yards and two touchdowns with no interceptions. He led touchdown drives of 64, 74 and 83 yards. His touchdown passes measured 15 and 12 yards, both to tight end Ryan Moya. At Oregon, he completed a career-high 27 of 43 passes for a career-high 288 yards with one touchdown and one interception. In the second half, he completed 19 of 28 passes for 218 yards with one touchdown and one interception. He led the offense to 24 points in the second half with two of the touchdown drives measuring 87 and 63 yards.

In the win over Stanford, he was at his best late in each half. At the end of the first half, he drove the Bruins 88 yards on 16 plays, culminating with Kai Forbath's

19-yard field goal on the last play of the half. In the second half, he drove the Bruins 87 yards on 11 plays in 2:13. On the final play of the drive, he rolled to his right and tossed a seven-yard touchdown pass to Cory Harkey with 10 seconds remaining in the game. He was six of seven for 60 yards and also ran for two yards on that drive, completing passes to five different receivers. On the afternoon, he completed 23 of 39 passes for 285 yards with two touchdowns, a two-yard shovel pass to Terrence Austin and the seven-yard game winner to Harkey, and one interception. In the second half, he was 13 of 17 for 172 yards and two touchdowns. At California, he completed 17 of 35 passes for 206 yards but had four intercepted, two of which were returned for touchdowns. Against Oregon State, he completed 20 of 42 passes for 189 yards and two interceptions.

**On the year, he leads the Pac-10 in completions (20.44), and is fourth in total offense (215.56) and fifth in passing yards (212.56).** He has completed 184 of 328 passes for 1,913 yards, seven touchdowns and 13 interceptions.

**His 184 completions already rank ninth on UCLA's single-season and career lists. His average of 20.5 completions per game would set a new single-season school record over 12 games (245). He is also on pace to pass for over 2,500 yards.** His 27 completions against Oregon rank 10th (tied) in school history for a single game.

A year ago, Craft completed 313 of 511 passes (61.3%) for 4,231 yards, 44 touchdowns and 10 interceptions at Mt. SAC in 2007. He had seven games with over 300 yards passing, including a best of 452 yards vs. Cerritos College. Craft spent the 2005 and 2006 seasons at San Diego State. As a redshirt freshman in 2006, he appeared in nine games for the Aztecs and started five contests. He started games against BYU, Air Force, Cal Poly SLO, Wyoming and UNLV. He threw touchdown passes of 60 (Wyoming) and 49 yards (Air Force). Kevin's dad, Tom Craft, was the San Diego State quarterback in 1975 and 1976. Tom went on to become the head coach of the Aztecs from 2002-05.

Redshirt senior **BEN OLSON (#7)** broke his right foot in practice on Aug. 9, 2008 and underwent surgery on Aug. 12. True freshman **KEVIN PRINCE (#14)** has competed for the backup role at quarterback but is not expected to play this year, preserving his redshirt. He took the trips to BYU, Oregon and California. Prince earned three letters at Crespi HS in Encino, CA. He was injured in the first quarter of the first game a year ago and missed the remainder of the 2007 high school season after undergoing knee surgery. As a junior, he completed 112 of 197 passes for 1,422 yards and 12 touchdowns and five interceptions.

**RUNNING BACKS** — True senior tailback **KAHLIL BELL (#36)** went down in the first quarter of the 2008 opener against Tennessee with a left ankle injury and sat out the balance of the game. He made five rushes for 11 yards and caught a pass versus the Vols before heading to the sidelines. Bell did not play at BYU or against Arizona. He returned to action against Fresno State. He started and rushed for 73 yards and two touchdowns on 20 attempts. In the win over Washington State, he rushed for two one-yard touchdowns and finished the night with 43 yards on 21 carries. At Oregon, he carried 14 times for 32 net yards, including a two-yard touchdown to make the score 21-14 after three quarters. Bell has been named to the 2008 Doak Walker watch list. He led the Bruins in rushing in 2007 with 795 yards on 142 attempts and a team-high five touchdowns in just eight games. His average of 99.38 would have been fifth in the Pac-10 and his average of 113.63 all-purpose yards would have ranked eighth.

He enjoyed the best game of his career in 2007 at Stanford, rushing for a career-high 195 yards. True freshman **DERRICK COLEMAN (#33)** made his debut versus Arizona and carried seven times for 24 yards and also made two receptions. Against Fresno State, he led the Bruins with a career-high 86 yards on 10 attempts, including a 44-yard run, UCLA's longest of the year. Against Washington State, he came off the bench to lead the team with 49 net yards on six carries, including a 31-yard run on which he bounced to the outside after initially being stopped. True freshman **AUNDRE DEAN (#30)** saw the first game action of his career at BYU, carrying once and spraining his ankle on the rushing attempt. He missed the Arizona and Fresno State games but returned against Washington State, carrying once for one yard. He did not play against Oregon, Stanford or California (ankle). He saw limited action against Oregon State.

**WIDE RECEIVERS** — True junior **TERRENCE AUSTIN (#4)** leads the team with 40 receptions and is averaging 24.54 yards on 37 kickoff returns and 10.53 yards on 15 punt returns. **He leads the Pac-10 and ranks seventh nationally with his average of 169.00 all-purpose yards. He also ranks seventh in the Pac-10 in receptions (4.44), first in kickoff returns and fifth in punt returns.**

**His 37 kickoff returns are a new UCLA single-season record and his 908 kickoff return yards rank second. He is also the only player in school history to gain over 200 yards on kickoff returns in a game twice in a career.**

**At his current pace of 169.00 all-purpose yards, he would finish the regular season with 2,028 yards, breaking Maurice Drew's mark of 1,863, set in 2005. He already ranks seventh on the single-season list with 1,521 yards. In receiving, he would finish with 53 catches at his current pace, the most by a Bruin since Mercedes Lewis in 2005 (58).**

He made five catches for 37 yards against Tennessee while making his first start at wide receiver. He also returned three punts (13 yards) and a couple of kickoffs (37). At BYU, he accounted for 191 all-purpose yards. He made a career-high eight receptions for a career-high 88 yards and four first downs. He also returned three kickoffs (95), one for 38 yards, and returned one punt (8). Against Arizona, he accounted for 155 all-purpose yards, making five receptions for 36 yards, gaining 96 yards on five kickoff returns, 16 yards on three punt returns and seven yards on his first carry.

Against Fresno State, Austin accounted for 298 all-purpose yards on 13 touches. He set a school record with 206 kickoff return yards on six attempts with a long of 73. He also had a game-opening 100-yard scoring return erased by a penalty. He gained 44 yards on three punt returns with a long of 22, rushed for 29 yards on two carries and added 19 yards with his two receptions.

In the win over Washington State, he led the team with seven receptions for 77 yards. He also returned one kickoff (22), one punt (10) and carried once (1), finishing with 110 all-purpose yards. At Oregon, he accounted for 143 all-purpose yards (56 on four receptions, 55 on three kickoff returns and 32 on three punt returns) prior to being injured in the fourth quarter. Austin started in the win over Stanford and led the Bruins with five receptions (50). He scored the first touchdown of his career, on a two-yard shovel pass from Kevin Craft in the third quarter. He added 88 yards on five kickoff returns and had one 12-yard run for 150 all-purpose yards.

At California, he accounted for 249 all-purpose yards. He returned seven kickoffs, tying a school record, for 203 yards, three shy of the school record he set versus Fresno State, and his 82-yard return was the longest of his career. He also returned one punt for 35 yards and added six yards on one reception and five yards on one rush.

Coming off the bench versus Oregon State, he accounted for 138 all-purpose yards. He averaged 21.2 yards on five kickoff returns, made three receptions for 22 yards and carried three times for 10 net yards.

True freshman **TAYLOR EMBREE (#82)** came off the bench in the 2008 opener against Tennessee and caught four passes for 53 yards. He made two big catches on the Bruin fourth-quarter scoring drives. The first was a 12-yard catch which came on a third-and-nine play on the drive which put UCLA up 17-14. Embree and quarterback Kevin Craft connected on a 21-yard play to begin the scoring drive which gave UCLA a 24-21 lead with 27 seconds left. At BYU, he made one reception (18 yards). He made his first career start versus Arizona and had two receptions (12). He started against Fresno State and tied for the team lead with three receptions (48). Against WSU, he again started and made five receptions (63), including one for 23 yards. At Oregon, he tied for the team lead with a career best six receptions (58). The six receptions were a school record total for a true freshman in a game. In the win over Stanford, he made four receptions for a team high 72 yards. His 43-yard reception late in the third quarter was the longest by a Bruin this year and set up Kai Forbath's field goal on the first play of the fourth quarter. At Cal, he tied for the team lead with five catches for a career-high 90 yards. He led the team with five receptions for 64 yards against Oregon State, his seventh straight start.

**Embree is second on the squad with his 35 receptions and leads the team with 478 yards. His average of 13.7 yards is the second-highest on the team among players with at least five receptions. He has produced a team-high 26 first downs with his 35 receptions.**

**His receptions and receiving yards totals are UCLA records for true freshmen. He also ranks ninth in the Pac-10 in receiving yards (53.11) and receptions (3.89).**

Embree, the son of former Bruin assistant head coach (2003-05) and current Kansas City Chief assistant coach Jon Embree, enrolled at UCLA in January of 2008 after greyshirting in 2007.

Redshirt senior **MARCUS EVERETT (#9)** went out in the first quarter of the opening game against Tennessee with a dislocated right big toe. He caught one pass for 17 yards versus the Vols. Everett sat out the BYU, Arizona, Fresno State, Washington State and Oregon games due to the injury. He returned and saw limited action versus Stanford but did not make a reception. At Cal, he made two catches for 29 yards. He made two receptions for 17 yards versus Oregon State.

True freshmen **NELSON ROSARIO (#83)** and **ANTWON MOUTRA (#88)** each came off the bench to see their first action in the 2008 season-opener against Tennessee. Rosario made one catch for 14 yards on UCLA's 11-play, 80-yard fourth-quarter scoring march which put the Bruins up 17-14. Neither played at BYU and Moutra played against Arizona. Both saw action against Fresno State, Washington State and Oregon.

Rosario had a breakout game in the win over Stanford. On the day, he made four receptions for 71 yards -- both career highs. His first reception, on third-and-16, was good for 25 yards and a first down on UCLA's field goal drive at the end of the first half. He made a 21-yard reception on third-and-17 in the fourth quarter. On the game-winning touchdown drive, he made receptions of nine and 16 yards. Rosario made one catch for 14 yards at California.

Against Oregon State, Moutra made the first reception of his career, good for nine yards. Rosario did not play due to an ankle sprain suffered during the bye week.

**TIGHT ENDS** — Redshirt junior **RYAN MOYA (#15)** caught a career-best seven passes against Tennessee, including a go-ahead three-yard scoring pass with 27 seconds remaining in regulation which put the Bruins up 24-21. His seven receptions were the most by a Bruin tight end since Marcedes Lewis made seven versus Arizona State on Nov. 12, 2005. At BYU, he came off the bench to make three catches (26 yards). Against Arizona, he made three receptions off the bench. He started against Fresno State and tied for the team lead with three receptions, good for a team-high 52 yards, including one for 32 yards.

In the win over WSU, Moya came off the bench and made six receptions (57) and a career-best two touchdowns -- 15 yards in the second quarter and 12 yards in the third quarter. At Oregon, he tied for the team lead with six receptions for a team-high 63 yards, including a 39-yard catch-and-run to the one-yard line to set up UCLA's fourth quarter touchdown. He made one reception for eight yards late in the winning touchdown drive against Stanford. At Cal, he made two catches for 19 yards. Against Oregon State, Moya made three receptions for 17 yards.

**Moya leads all Pac-10 tight ends with his 34 receptions and is 10th (tied) overall in the league in receiving (3.78 per game). He is the team's third-leading receiver and leads the squad with three receiving touchdowns. His 315 yards are third on the squad.**

**Moya's 34 receptions are the most by a Bruin tight end since 2005, when Marcedes Lewis made 58 receptions (a school record for tight ends), and Moya ranks fifth on the single-season tight end list.**

Moya returned to the team after sitting out the 2007 season for personal reasons. He re-enrolled in classes during the 2008 Winter Quarter and participated in spring practice. He saw action in the first six games of the 2006 season before fracturing his left fibula in a game at Oregon.

**OFFENSIVE LINE** — Nine different Bruins have started on the line this season and three have started at two different positions. Seven players have made their first start on the line this year. UCLA has used seven lineups in nine games.

Redshirt junior **NICK EKBATANI (#75)** is the only lineman to start all nine games this year. He started his first career game when he opened at right tackle in the 2008 season-opener against Tennessee and also started at BYU and against Arizona, Fresno State, WSU and Oregon, playing every snap. Against Stanford, he started at right guard but moved to tackle in the third quarter. He started and played the entire Cal game at right guard. He started at RG versus Oregon State but played just part of the contest.

Redshirt sophomore center **JAKE DEAN (#57)** saw his first action in relief of Micah Reed at BYU. He started and played the entire contests against Arizona, Fresno State, Washington State, Oregon, Stanford, California and Oregon State.

True freshman **JEFF BACA (#60)** made his debut versus Arizona, playing the entire second half at left tackle. He started and played the full game against Fresno State, becoming the first true freshman to start on the line since Shannon Tevaga in 2004. He also played the entire contest versus Washington State, Oregon and Stanford. He missed the Cal game with a strained hamstring suffered in practice. He returned to the starting lineup against Oregon State (his fifth start) and played the whole game.

Redshirt senior **MICAH REED (#58)** started his first game at the center position in the 2008 opener against Tennessee. He started for the 10th time in his career at BYU but suffered an MCL sprain in the second half. He did not play versus Arizona. Reed returned against Fresno State and saw action at both guard spots before spraining his left MCL. He missed the Washington State and Oregon games. In the victory over Stanford, he started and played most of the game at left guard and did the same at California. He did not play versus Oregon State. Reed moved to center in 2008 after starting the final eight games of the 2007 season at guard.

True junior **MICAH KIA (#73)** started the first three games at left tackle. He returned to the starting lineup versus Stanford, playing right tackle. **THE KICKERS**

One of the best punters in the nation and an honors candidate, redshirt senior **AARON PEREZ (#17)** had six punts for a 46.8 yard average against Tennessee, including one inside the 20. At BYU, he averaged 49.0 yards on four kicks with a long of 61 yards and one downed inside the 20-yard line. Against Arizona, he averaged 45.1 yards on 11 punts and put three inside the 20. The 11 kicks tied his career-high and the UCLA single-game record. Against Fresno State, he averaged 38.5 yards on four punts, with none inside the 20-yard line. In the win over WSU, he averaged 42.1 yards on seven kicks with three inside the 20-yard line. Only three were returned for a total of nine yards. At Oregon, he averaged 41.0 yards on eight kicks with a long of 56 yards. Three of his kicks put the Ducks inside their 20-yard line. In the win over Stanford, Perez averaged 42.6 yards on five kicks with two inside the 20-yard line (16- and two-yard lines). Stanford netted just 19 yards on three returns. At California, Perez averaged 50.2 yards on six punts. He placed two inside the 20-yard line and had two kicks of at least 50 yards, including a career-long 67-yarder in the first quarter. He also completed a pass for 22 yards from punt formation.

Against Oregon State, he averaged 47.0 yards on eight kicks. He placed two inside the 20-yard line and his 67-yard kick tied his career best, set against California earlier this year. He had four kicks of at least 50 yards.

**Perez, who was on the Ray Guy Award Watch List, is averaging 44.75 yards on 59 kicks and ranks seventh in the NCAA and first in the Pac-10. Twenty of his 59 kicks have been for at least 50 yards and 17 have been downed inside the 20-yard line.**

**In his four-year career, he is averaging 42.44 yards per punt, fifth highest in school history. He also ranks second with 266 punts (the record is 267 by Nate Fikse in 1999-02) and 11,289 yards (Fikse's record is 11,420).**

Perez served as the team's punter in all 13 games and also handled the holding chores on the placekicks in 2007. His season average of 42.3 ranked second in the Pac-10 and 29th nationally. The 91 punts tied the school record set by Chris Kluwe in 2003. He was named honorable mention All-Pac-10 conference for 2007 and second-team Pac-10 All-Academic.

In 2006, he served as the team's punter in all 13 games. He averaged 42.56 yards on 62 punts which ranked fourth in the Pac-10 and 22nd in the nation. In 2005, Perez averaged 39.9 yards (eighth in the Pac-10).

**KAI FORBATH (#25)**, one of the nation's top kickers and a member of the Groza Award pre-season Watch List, began 2008 by connecting from 42 yards in overtime to provide the winning margin against Tennessee. Forbath also made good on his only other attempt of the night, a 41-yarder in the third quarter. He was selected Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week. At BYU, Forbath had one field goal blocked (32) and missed a 27-yard attempt. Against Arizona, he converted his only field goal attempt, a 35-yarder at the end of the first half, and added a PAT. Against Fresno State, he tied his career best by kicking three field goals - 25, 46 and 35 yards - and made two of three PATs (the third was blocked) for 11 points. In the win over WSU, he made all four PATs and did not attempt a field goal. At Oregon, he made one of two field goals (missed from 47, made from 28) and all three PATs for six points. He also handled the kickoff chores for the first time in his career.

In the win over Stanford, he tied his career high by making all three of his field goal attempts (37, 19 and 28 yards) and added two PATs for 11 points. For his efforts, he was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time this season. He was also selected one of three Lou Groza Award Stars of the Week. At Cal, he made field goals of 23 and 38 yards and added two PATs for eight points. Against Oregon State, he made field goals of 29 and 35 yards - his seventh and eighth straight kicks.

**Forbath ranks sixth on the all-time UCLA field goals made list with 39. His average of 1.56 field goals this year is second in the Pac-10 lead and ranks 16th (tied) in the NCAA. He is also 12th in the league in scoring and seventh in kick-scoring (6.56). He has made eight straight field goal attempts and 12 of his last 13 over seven games. His 14 field goals in 2008 rank No. 15 (tied) on UCLA's single-season list (his 25 field goals last year rank No.3 on that same list).**

In 2007, Forbath was a second-team Freshman All-America selection by The Sporting News and an honorable mention All-Pacific-10 conference selection, as well as an honorable mention Pac-10 All-Academic pick. On the year, Forbath made 25 of 30 field goals and all 30 PATs for a team-high 105 points. He made 24 of his last 27 field goal attempts and had a streak of 10 in a row twice during the season. Forbath ranked third (tied) in the NCAA and first in the Pac-10 in field goals (1.92), third in the Pac-10 in kick-scoring (8.08) and 44th (tied) in the NCAA and third in the Pac-10 in scoring (8.08).

Forbath is the first UCLA player to record five field goals of at least 50 yards in a season, including a freshman-best 54-yarder (third-longest in school history) versus Oregon. He is one shy of Justin Medlock's career mark of six field goals of at least 50 yards. His 25 field goals in 2007 ranked third on UCLA's single-season list (first among freshmen) and ninth on the career Top 10. His 105 points ranked eighth (tied) on UCLA's single-season list and first among Bruin freshmen. In the Las Vegas Bowl against BYU, he became the second player in school history to kick two field goals of at least 50 yards in the same game (Medlock at Oregon in 2004).

## RED ZONE

\* In 2008, UCLA is 27 for 33 in the Red Zone (81.82%) with 15 touchdowns (seven rushing, eight passing) and 12 field goals for 140 points. Against Tennessee, UCLA was three of three with two touchdowns (one passing, one rushing) and one field goal for 17 points. At BYU, the Bruins were zero for two (blocked field goal, missed field goal). Against Arizona, UCLA scored a field goal on its only opportunity. In the Fresno State game, UCLA converted five of seven opportunities for 26 points -- three touchdowns (two rushing and one passing) and two field goals. The other possessions ended on downs and with a fumble. Against Washington State, UCLA converted all four opportunities with four touchdowns (two rushing, two passing) for 28 points. At Oregon, UCLA converted all four trips, scoring three touchdowns (two rushing, one passing) and one field goal for 24 points. Against Stanford, UCLA converted five of six opportunities with two passing touchdowns and three field goals for all 23 points. The other possession was an interception. At Cal, UCLA converted three of four chances for 13 points (one passing touchdown and two field goals). The fourth possession ended in an interception. Against Oregon State, UCLA converted both trips into field goals.

\* In 2008, opponents are 30 of 37 in the Red Zone (81.08%) with 22 touchdowns (10 rushing, 12 passing) and eight field goals for 178 points. Tennessee converted three of four opportunities with two touchdowns (two rushing, one fumble, one field goal) for 17 points. BYU was eight for eight with seven touchdowns (six passing, one rushing) and one field goal for 52 points. Arizona was three for five with three touchdowns (two rushing, one passing) for 21 points. Fresno State converted three of four opportunities for 17 points -- two passing touchdowns and one field goal. Washington State did not have a opportunity. Oregon converted all three opportunities (two rushing touchdowns, one field goal) for 17 points. Stanford converted all three opportunities (two rushing touchdowns, one field goal) for 17 points. California was two of three (one passing touchdown, one field goal, end of game) for 10 points. Oregon State converted on five of seven opportunities for 27 points - three touchdowns (one rushing, two passing) and two field goals.

## FAN ZONE

Bruin fans should plan on arriving in the Arroyo Seco early to avoid traffic and picnic at the Rose Bowl. UCLA is sponsoring the Fan Zone in Area H. The Fan Zone opens four hours prior to the game. The Fan Zone contains the AM 570 KLAC/ISP Sports stage, where fans can watch and hear the Bruin pre-game radio show. It also includes the Food Zone, which includes the following restaurants: American Pretzel, Baja Grill, Carl's Jr., Now You're Poppin', PSI Drinks, Robin's Wood Fire BBQ & Grill, Teri & Yaki and Angelena's Southern Cuisine. The Alumni Band will also be performing in the Fan Zone.

\* In 2007, UCLA was 34 of 42 in the Red Zone (81.0%) with 18 touchdowns (nine passing, nine rushing) and 16 field goals for 173 points. Opponents converted 29 of 38 opportunities (76.3%) with 23 touchdowns (16 passing, seven rushing) and six field goals for 179 points.

**TURNOVERS**

\* In 2008, UCLA has caused 11 turnovers (six interceptions, five fumbles) which have led to 24 points (three touchdowns, one field goal). The Bruins had one interception and one fumble recovery versus Tennessee which led to no points. UCLA made one interception at BYU which led to no points. UCLA recovered one fumble for a touchdown (Korey Bosworth) against Arizona. The Bruins made one interception versus Fresno State and converted it into a field goal. UCLA made one interception against Washington State and converted it into a touchdown. UCLA did not cause a turnover at Oregon. UCLA forced two fumbles and made an interception against Stanford and converted one of them into a touchdown. UCLA did not force any turnovers at California. UCLA caused two turnovers (one fumble, one interception) versus Oregon State but did not convert either into points.

\* In 2008, UCLA has committed 21 turnovers (14 interceptions, seven fumbles) for 79 points (10 touchdowns, three field goals). UCLA threw four interceptions against Tennessee which led to seven points on a return for touchdown. At BYU, UCLA lost three fumbles and threw an interception and all four were converted into touchdowns. Against Arizona, UCLA fumbled a punt and it led to a field goal. Against Fresno State, UCLA lost one fumble and FSU ran out the clock following the fumble. UCLA did not make a turnover against Washington State. At Oregon, UCLA had one interception and it was converted into a field goal. Stanford made one interception and forced one fumble for seven points. UCLA threw four interceptions at California. Two were returned for touchdowns and another set up a field goal for 17 points. Oregon State made three interceptions and recovered a fumble and converted two of the four turnovers into touchdowns.

\* In 2007, UCLA caused 27 turnovers -- 14 fumbles and 13 interceptions -- and converted them into 66 points - seven touchdowns (four offensive, three defensive) and six field goals. ### Game 9: Oregon State 34, UCLA 6 - November 8, 2008

**Game Notes** - The Bruins suffered their sixth loss of the season as the Beavers held UCLA scoreless in the second and fourth quarters. Both teams traded field goals in the first 15 minutes of play for the only scores of the first half. OSU came out of the break and put 14 unanswered points on the board to lead 17-3 with just under eight minutes left in the third.
