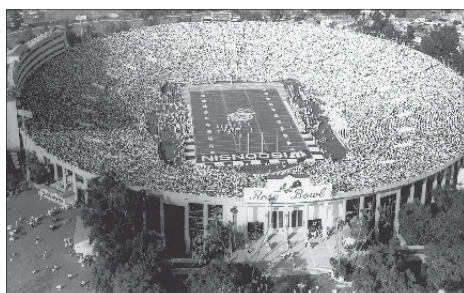

UCLA HOSTS OREGON AT ROSE BOWL

Teams Have Split 12 Prior Games Played in Rose Bowl

New UCLA Hall of Fame Inductees to be Honored at Halftime



THE 28TH YEAR

The 2009 season marks the 28th year that the Rose Bowl will serve as the home of the Bruins. UCLA moved from the L.A. Coliseum in the summer of 1982 and went 6-0-1 in that first year, capping the season with a victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game.

The 2006 season-opening win against Utah was UCLA's 100th at the Rose Bowl. The Bruins own a record of 114-50-2 since moving to Pasadena, including a 3-2 record in Rose Bowl games. UCLA is 29-11 overall at home in the last six+ years and 21-7 in the last four+ seasons (2005-09).

In July of 2007, the Rose Bowl was selected the No. 1 sports venue by SI.com/SlonCampus.

GAME 5 — UCLA (3-1, 0-1) will welcome No. 13 AP/17 ESPN-USA Today Oregon (4-1, 2-0) to the Rose Bowl on Saturday to begin its Pac-10 Conference home schedule. Kickoff is slated for 12:30 p.m. on ABC with Terry Gannon and David Norrie calling the action. The UCLA /ISP Sports Radio Network (KLAC 570 AM, the Los Angeles flagship station) will broadcast the contest with Chris Roberts, Matt Stevens and Wayne Cook mikeside. That radio feed will also be carried live on Sirius XM Satellite Radio (Channel 121 on Sirius, 103 on XM). In addition, ISP produces a Spanish-language broadcast of all UCLA home games which can be heard on the Bruins website at uclabruins.com with Armando Aguayo and Mario Amaya.

SERIES WITH OREGON — UCLA owns a 39-23 advantage in the series with Oregon which dates back to 1928. The Bruins lead the series 22-12 in games played in Los Angeles and the teams have split the 12 games contested in the Rose Bowl. The teams have also split the last four meetings, with each winning on its home field. Oregon captured last season's battle in Eugene by a score of 31-24. UCLA shut out Oregon 16-0 in the 2007 meeting in Pasadena. Coach Neuheisel is 4-2 overall, 0-1 while head coach at UCLA, against the Ducks.

Last season, the Ducks handed the Bruins a 31-24 setback in their first Pac-10 road contest of the season. Oregon scored first and tacked on seven more points to close out the first half up 14-0. UCLA began the third quarter with a touchdown drive, capped off by then-freshman running back Derrick Coleman's first career score. Oregon answered back and took a 21-7 lead with 6:11 remaining in the quarter. Kahlil Bell's two-yard run pulled the Bruins back to within 21-14 at the close of the third quarter. After the teams traded field goals, the Ducks led 24-17 with just under three minutes to play. A 69-yard scoring run pushed the home team into a 31-17 lead with 2:22 to play. Quarterback Kevin Craft found tight end Jeff Miller on a short scoring pass with just under a minute remaining to close out the scoring. Oregon totaled 323 yards on the ground in the game, 170 coming from quarterback Jeremiah Masoli. The Ducks had just 42 passing yards. Craft was good for 288 yards passing, a career-best total, while connecting on 27 of 43 attempts, with one interception, one touchdown. The Bruins totaled 63 yards on the ground.

In the last meeting played in the Rose Bowl (Nov. 24, 2007), UCLA shut out the Ducks 16-0. The UCLA defense held the Oregon offense to 148 total yards (43 rushing) as the Ducks played without injured starting quarterback Dennis Dixon and utilized three other signalcallers during the contest. Kai Forbath connected on a field goal in each of the first three quarters and Craig Sheppard ran in from 20 yards out in the fourth quarter to round out the scoring. Linebacker Christian Taylor led UCLA with 13 tackles.

HONORARY CAPTAIN — **Bob Geddes** played under coach Tommy Prothro on the defensive line for the 1968 and 1969 teams at UCLA. A former Marine, he transferred to UCLA in March of 1968 after starring at Riverside City College in football and track. In 1968, he started two games at defensive tackle and saw action in 164 minutes. He moved to end in 1969 on a defensive unit which recorded three shutouts and held eight of its nine opponents that season to 14 points or less while posting an 8-1-1 record. Against Oregon that season, Geddes recorded a 10-tackle performance. The following week against USC, he made 12 tackles and recovered a fumble. After earning his degree in 1970, Geddes played professional football for the Rams, Broncos and Patriots. Following his pro football career, he became a marketing and advertising executive.

HALL OF FAME PLUS EIGHT — Eight new members will be inducted into the UCLA Athletics Hall of Fame in ceremonies to be held on Friday, Oct. 9. The inductees will also be honored at halftime of the Oregon football game. The 2009 group includes **Tyus Edney**, basketball 1992-95; **James "Cap" Haralson** (track, football, basketball, baseball 1920's); **Cade McNown**, football 1995-98; **Stein Metzger**, volleyball 1993-96;

WATCH US — The following Bruins are on the list of players "To Watch" for the major post-season awards: senior DT **Brian Price** -- Chuck Bednarik Award (nation's top defensive player), Bronco Nagurski Award (nation's top defensive player), Ronnie Lott Trophy (nation's top defensive player), Outland Trophy (top interior lineman), Rotary Lombardi Award (nation's top lineman); senior CB **Alterraun Verner**--Lott Trophy, Bednarik Award, Nagurski Award, Jim Thorpe Award (nation's top defensive back); senior LB **Reggie Carter**--Lott Trophy, Bednarik Award, Rotary Lombardi; senior DE **Korey Bosworth**-- Rotary Lombardi Award, Ted Hendricks Award (top defensive end); senior LB **Kyle Bosworth**--Rotary Lombardi; senior TE **Ryan Moya**--John Mackey Award (nation's top tight end); senior TE **Logan Paulsen**--Mackey; junior PK **Kai Forbath**--Lou Groza Award (nation's top place kicker).

AUSTIN RANKS — For his career, senior wide receiver **Terrence Austin** ranks T-third in kickoff returns (54), fourth in punt returns (71), 17th in all-purpose yards (3,054) and T-22nd in receptions (84).

FORBATH ON A ROLL — Redshirt junior kicker **Kai Forbath** has connected on his last 23 field goal attempts from a distance of 50 yards and in over the past two seasons. After missing a 47-yard attempt in game 6 at Oregon last season, Forbath has been perfect on field goal attempts from 50 yards and in. He made his last 12 straight from that range last season and has sent his first 11 kicks of this season (miss from 51) through the uprights.

MOORE ON INTERCEPTIONS — Sophomore free safety **Rahim Moore** has picked off five passes (3 v. SDSU, 2 at Tennessee) in the first four games of the season. The last Bruin to make more interceptions in a season is Larry Atkins, who had six in 1997. Moore now has eight in 16 career games. He leads the nation with his five interceptions and 1.25 average and is second in the country in passes defended (2.25).

MOYA ON THE LIST — Senior tight end **Ryan Moya** has 67 career catches which rank fifth (tied)-most ever by a Bruin tight end.

PRICE FOR A LOSS — Junior defensive tackle **Brian Price** has recorded 19 tackles for loss in his last 13 games, including 4.0 at Tennessee and 2.0 at Stanford. He has 7.0 in four games in 2009 to rank second in the Pac-10 and 15th (tied) in the NCAA.

SECOND-HALF DEFENSE — Opponents have totaled 25 second-half drives in the first four games of the season and have come away with just four scores (Tennessee-FG, K-State-TD, Stanford-TD, FG) for a total of 19 points. 10 of the 25 drives have resulted in a three-and-out for the opponent offense (one was at the end of the game on three kneel-downs). Four other drives have been terminated by a Bruin interception. Seventeen of the 25 drives have taken 2:08 or less off the clock. Fifteen of the 25 drives have been for less than 10 yards.

IN THE SECOND PLACE — The Bruin opponents have totaled 457 yards of offense in 134 second-half plays through the first four games (3.41/play avg.). In the first half of action, the Bruin opponents have averaged 4.95/play on 668 yards in 135 plays.

FIRST AND 10 — In the first four games of the season, the Bruins have scored on their initial offensive drive of the contest (SDSU - 9 pl, 49 yd, 4:45 - FG; TENN - 10 pl 51 yd, 4:16 - FG; K ST - 11 pl, 64 yd, 5:08 - TD; STAN - 9 pl, 45 yd, 2:59 - FG). San Diego State (TD) and Tennessee (FG) each scored against the Bruins on their first offensive possessions. Kansas State committed a turnover (interception) as did Stanford (fumble).

TEAM NOTES

* With the win at Tennessee, the Bruin non-conference road record in the decade of the 2000's is now 7-5 --- 2000 -none; 2001-W Alabama, W Kansas; 2002-W Oklahoma State, W San Diego State; 2003-L Colorado, L Oklahoma; 2004-W Illinois; 2005-W San Diego State; 2006-L Notre Dame; 2007-L Utah; 2008 L BYU; 2009- W Tennessee.

* The win at Tennessee on Sept. 12 improved UCLA's record in the decade of the 2000's to 4-0 versus teams from the SEC. The Bruins swept a series with Alabama, winning at home in 2000 and in Tuscaloosa, AL in 2001. The win in Knoxville completed a sweep of the Vols.

* UCLA is 27-4 (9-2 in last 11 games) when it wins the turnover battle over the past six-plus seasons. It was 3-1 (won vs. WSU, Stanford, Washington, lost vs. USC) in 2008 and is 1-1 (beat Tennessee, lost to Stanford) in 2009.

* It is 15-33 when it ties or loses the turnover battle over the last six-plus seasons, including (2-0) in 2009.

* The Bruins have qualified to play in a bowl game in 10 of the last 12 seasons (not in 1999, 2008).

* The UCLA defense has held three of its four opponents to fewer than 300 yards total offense (SDSU - 277, Tennessee - 208 and Kansas State - 268). It has allowed just seven touchdowns in the four games.

* The Bruin defense has held 18 opponents (13-5 record) over the last three-plus seasons to less than 100 yards of rushing offense. In 2009, it has held SDSU to 39 net rushing yards, Tennessee to 115 and Kansas State to 69. In 2008, it limited three opponents to less than 100 yards on the ground (26-Wash. St., 96-Washington, 21-Ariz. St.). It held six opponents to under the century mark in 2007 (52-Stanford, 44-BYU, 46-Notre Dame, 67-Cal, 43-Oregon, 34-BYU/bowl). In 2006, the Bruin defense limited seven opponents to less than 100 yards rushing (Rice-53, Washington-49, Stanford-49, Arizona-minus 13, Notre Dame-51, Oregon St.-85, USC-55).

* The Bruin defense has limited opponents to less than 300 yards of offense in 18 contests (14-4 record) over the last three-plus seasons. In 2009, it has held SDSU to 277 total yards, Tennessee to 208 and Kansas State to 268. In 2008, it kept three teams to under 300 yards of offense (Wash. St.-177, Washington-133, Ariz. St.-122). It held five opponents short of 300 in 2007 (Oregon St.-248, Notre Dame-140, Cal-299, Oregon-148, BYU bowl-265). In 2006, the Bruins held seven opponents under 300 (Utah-287, Rice-184, Washington-249, Stanford-166, Arizona-222, Oregon St.-260, Ariz. St.-264).

*In the last nine seasons (2000-2008), UCLA has produced seven consensus All-Americans (2000, WR Freddie Mitchell; 2001, LB Robert Thomas; 2003 DE Dave Ball; 2005 TE Mercedes Lewis and KR Maurice Drew; 2006 DE Justin Hickman and PK Justin Medlock). Only one other school (USC) in the Pac-10 has produced more and UCLA's total is two ahead of third-place California. UCLA has produced 16 consensus All-America selections in the last 17 years (1992-2008), just five fewer than USC and seven more than No. 3 Arizona.

***UCLA has produced a total of 37 consensus All-America selections (33 players) in school history. That total ranks 15th among all Football Bowl Subdivision schools and second in the Pac-10.**

* UCLA's defense allowed opponent offenses to convert just 33 of 108 (30.6%) third down conversion attempts in the final eight games of 2008. In four games this season, it has allowed opponents to convert just 32.8% (19 of 58) - 32nd in NCAA and third in the Pac-10. In the last 12 contests, that adds up to a total of 52-166 (31.3%).

* UCLA held Tennessee to just 93 yards passing. Washington's 39 yards passing in 2008 were the fewest allowed by the Bruin defense since Sept. 4, 2004, when the Bruins held Oklahoma State to 23 yards in the air. UCLA held three opponents (Oregon 42, Stanford 51, Washington 39) under 100 yards passing in 2008.

* Arizona State's 122 yards total offense in 2008 was UCLA's best defensive effort since holding Arkansas to 42 net yards in the 1989 Cotton Bowl.

* Arizona State's 21 net yards rushing in the 2008 contest was the lowest total by a Bruin opponent since UCLA held Arizona to minus-13 yards rushing in 2006.

* UCLA's 234 rushing yards against Fresno State in 2008 was its highest total since running for 333 yards against Washington in 2007.

* Over the last six-plus seasons, UCLA is 22-2 when it scores at least 30 points in a game and 12-1 when it scores 40 or more (11 in a row).

* Over the last six-plus seasons, the Bruins are 25-3 when they hold the opponent under 20 points, and had a 16-game streak snapped when they lost the Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16.

UCLA PLAYER / COACH NOTES

*Senior defensive back **Alterraun Verner (#1)** has scored four touchdowns in his career, including a 70-yard score with a blocked field goal in the 2009 opener versus San Diego State. He has three interception returns for touchdown in his career (34 yards-Utah, 2006; 89-Arizona, 2006; 76-California, 2007). That total ties the UCLA record held by Jerry Robinson (1975-78), Marcus Turner (1985-88) and Spencer Havner (2002-05). **He also has 11 career interceptions.**

*Redshirt senior linebacker **Reggie Carter's (#51)** leads the Bruins with 31 tackles, including 14 at Tennessee, and ranks sixth (tied) in the Pac-10. His total of 83 tackles led the team in 2008 and placed 10th in the Pac-10 conference (6.9/g). He recorded a career-best 20 tackles in the 2008 game at BYU. It was the most tackles by a Bruin player since Eric Turner totaled 21 in a 1989 contest versus Oregon.

*In the opener versus San Diego State, true sophomore safety **Rahim Moore (#3)** made three interceptions to tie the UCLA single-game record held by Ron Carver (Texas 1971), Craig Rutledge (Oregon State 1986) and Darryl Henley (Oregon State 1986). Moore was named Walter Camp Football Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week and was nominated for the AT&T All-America Player of the Week Award.

Moore made two more interceptions at Tennessee and already has as many interceptions this season (five) as past team leaders Trey Brown made in 2007 and Matt Ware made in 2001. The last Bruin to make six interceptions -- in a full season -- was Larry Atkins in 1997. Moore is first in the NCAA with five interceptions (1.25 per game) and second with 2.25 passes defensed per game.

*Junior defensive tackle **Brian Price (#92)** made 2.0 sacks and 4.0 tackles for loss at Tennessee. He leads the Bruins with 7.0 TFL in four games and is second in the Pac-10 and T-15th in the NCAA with 1.75 TFL per game. In 2008, he led the team with 14.0 tackles for loss and ranked seventh in the Pac-10 with 1.17/g. All told, he has totaled 28 tackles for loss in his last 20 games (1.40/g) dating back to the 2007 season.

*Coach **Rick Neuheisel** began the 2009 season with a head coaching record of 32-15 against the opponents on this year's UCLA schedule. He is currently 29-13 as a head coach against Pac-10 teams, other than UCLA. (Arizona 4-1, ASU 2-3, Cal 3-2, Kansas St. 2-3, Oregon 4-2, Oregon St. 3-2, Stanford 4-1, San Diego St. 0-0, SC 1-2, Tennessee 1-0, Washington 2-0, WSU 6-0).

*Redshirt junior **Kai Forbath (#25)** has now converted 25 of his last 26 attempts (23 straight fgs from under 50 yards) dating back to last season. He leads the nation with 3.00 field goals per game. He has kicked 56 field goals (No. 4 in school history) in 29 career games. He booted his seventh career field of 50 yards or

more with a 50-yarder in the 2009 opener against San Diego State to set a new UCLA career record. Forbath is the first Bruin to record five kicks of 50 or more yards in the same season (2007) and the second to kick two in the same game (Justin Medlock did it in 2004 at Oregon). His 54-yard field goal versus Oregon in 2007 was the longest ever by a Bruin freshman and third longest in UCLA history. At Tennessee, he kicked a career-best four field goals and was three for three versus Kansas State and Stanford

*Senior kick returner **Terrence Austin (#4)** accounted for 160 all-purpose yards versus San Diego State. In 2008, he set a school record with 1,878 all-purpose yards (broke Maurice Jones-Drew's 2005 mark of 1,863 yards). He also set school marks with 46 kickoff returns in '08, 206 kickoff return yards in last season's game against Fresno State and 1,109 kickoff return yards in '08.

*Sophomore wide receiver **Nelson Rosario (#83)** is a two-sport performer who placed third in the long jump (25-0), 10th in the high jump (6-6.75) and 14th in the triple jump at the 2009 Pac-10 Outdoor Track Championships. He qualified for the NCAA Championships in the long jump event and placed 22nd (24-3.50).

YOUTH AND EXPERIENCE — 30 players with freshmen or sophomore class standing saw action in the opener against San Diego State. The Bruins played a total of 18 freshmen (eight true freshmen and 10 redshirt) and 12 sophomores (six true sophomores and six redshirt sophomores) in the 2009 season opener. Redshirt freshman linebacker David Allen saw his first action at Tennessee to up that number to 31 for the season.

SEASON CAPTAINS — Senior receiver **Terrence Austin**, senior linebacker **Reggie Carter**, senior tight end **Logan Paulsen**, senior cornerback **Alterraun Verner** are serving as team captains this season.

AT THE STARTING LINE

*Senior linebacker **Reggie Carter** leads the team with 36 career starts. Tight end **Logan Paulsen** (30), cornerback **Alterraun Verner** (28), defensive tackle **Brian Price** (21) are the only other Bruins with at least 20 career starts.

*Senior CB **Alterraun Verner** has the longest starting streak of any position player with 25 straight. Junior defensive tackle **Brian Price** owns the next longest active streak (18). TE **Logan Paulsen** had a 23-game starting streak snapped against BYU in 2008 when he sat out the game due to a broken foot.

*Seven positional players (five offense - QB Kevin Price, TB Johnathan Franklin, OT Xavier Su'a-Filo, C Kai Maiava, OG Eddie Williams; two defense - DT Jerzy Siewierski, CB Aaron Hester) made their first career starts in the 2009 season-opener against San Diego State. In addition, Jeff Locke and H Danny Rees also made their first starts. Cornerback Courtney Viney became the eighth positional player to make his first career start when he opened at cornerback at Tennessee. Cornerback **Sheldon Price** became the ninth positional player to make his first career start when he took the field versus Kansas State.

LAST GAME -- UCLA scored a field goal on its first possession but couldn't overcome a 14-6 halftime deficit and lost for the first time this season, dropping a 24-16 decision at Stanford.

UCLA took a 3-0 lead when Akeem Ayers forced and recovered a fumble and the Bruins moved down the field for the first of Kai Forbath's three field goals. However, Stanford, controlling the ball on the ground, took a 14-3 lead on back-to-back touchdown drives before UCLA added a Forbath field goal on the final snap of the half to make the score 14-6.

The Bruins punted on their first two possessions of the second half and the Cardinal countered with a touchdown and a field goal to make the score 24-6. Johnathan Franklin's one-yard touchdown run and Forbath's third field goal brought the Bruins within eight points with 4:16 remaining. The Bruin defense forced a three-and-out to give UCLA the ball at its own 22-yard line with 3:06 remaining but couldn't move past its own 42-yard line before turning the ball over on downs.

UCLA accounted for 299 yards on offense, 204 in the air and 95 on the ground. Kevin Craft completed 22 of 34 passes for 204 yards with no touchdowns and no interceptions. Taylor Embree made four receptions and four other Bruins had three catches each. On the ground, Franklin led the team with 58 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, UCLA allowed over 300 yards for the first time all season, finishing at 372 - 198 in the air and 174 on the ground. Running back Toby Gerhart had 134 yards and all three touchdowns on 29 carries and Andrew Luck completed 14 of 20 passes for 198 yards. Cornerback Alterraun Verner led the Bruins with 11 tackles while Tony Dye made 10 and Sheldon Price added nine. Akeem Ayers made eight stops, including forcing a fumble that he recovered and Kyle Bosworth also made eight stops and Reggie Carter added seven. Brian Price

HEAD COACH



RICK NEUHEISEL

- *Owns a record of 73-39 in his 10th year as collegiate head coach
- *Led teams to three Top 10 finishes and seven bowl games
- *Coached three seasons in the National Football League

Rick Neuheisel, who quarterbacked UCLA to victory in the 1984 Rose Bowl and who has compiled a record of 73-39 as a collegiate head coach, is in his second season as his alma mater's head football coach.

The energetic and personable Neuheisel returned to the collegiate ranks in January of 2008 after spending the previous three seasons in the NFL. In his eight years as a college head coach at the University of Colorado and the University of Washington, he fashioned a record of 66-30, winning at least 10 games on three occasions and finishing in the Top 10 three times, while leading his teams to seven bowl games. He was also recognized as one of the nation's top recruiters during his college coaching days.

Neuheisel spent the 2005-2007 as an assistant coach for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens. He served as quarterbacks coach in 2005 and 2006 and in January of 2007, was promoted to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

During his four seasons (1999-2002) as head coach at the University of Washington, Neuheisel led the Huskies to a record of 33-16 (.673) and four bowl games (one Rose Bowl, two Holiday Bowls and one Sun Bowl). His Pac-10 record was 23-9 (.719) and Washington won one league title and finished second twice in those four seasons.

In 2000, Neuheisel led the Huskies to an 11-1 record, a first-place finish in the Pac-10 and a victory in the 2001 Rose Bowl.

During his four seasons (1995-98) as head coach at the University of Colorado, Neuheisel won 33 of 47 games (.702), including all three bowl appearances. His 20-4 record in his first two seasons at Colorado were the fifth-most wins at the time for a first-time head coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (Division IA).

Neuheisel spent the 1994 season as a Colorado assistant coach under Bill McCartney after going to CU from UCLA.

Neuheisel spent six seasons (1988-93) as an assistant coach at his alma mater. During his final four years he tutored the wide receivers, helping to develop some of UCLA's all-time great receivers, such as J.J. Stokes, Kevin Jordan and Sean LaChapelle.

Neuheisel joined the UCLA staff full-time in 1988 and coached quarterbacks for two seasons, including NFL Hall of Fame quarterback Troy Aikman's senior year (1988). Aikman earned consensus All-America honors and finished third in the Heisman Trophy race, completing a school-record 228 passes (since broken) for 2,771 yards, a .644 percentage and a school-record 24 touchdowns (since broken). Aikman was the No. 1 selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

In 1986, he served as a volunteer coach and his major assignment was to teach the offense to a transfer from Oklahoma who had to sit out the 1986 season - Aikman.

Neuheisel began his collegiate career at UCLA (1979-83) as a walk-on, holding for place kicker John Lee, and earned the starting quarterback job during his senior season (1983). In his final game as a Bruin, he overcame food poisoning to lead UCLA to a 45-9 victory against Illinois in the 1984 Rose Bowl. He was named the game's MVP after throwing for 298 yards and four touchdowns.

YOUTH UNDER CENTER — Redshirt freshman **Kevin Prince** was named the starting quarterback by head coach Rick Neuheisel shortly after the end of 2009 Spring Practice.

The only previous time the Bruins have taken the field in a season-opener with a freshman quarterback under center was in 1989. **Bret Johnson**, a redshirt freshman, started all 11 games that season and the Bruins finished with a 3-7-1 record. UCLA opened that campaign with games against Tennessee (6-24 loss in Rose Bowl) and San Diego State (28-25 win at SDSU).

QB FIRST STARTS — **Eight of the last 11** quarterbacks to start their first game for the Bruins have helped to lead the team to victory in that contest. **Kevin Prince** helped orchestrate a 33-14 victory in the 2009 opener against San Diego State.

Last season, **Kevin Craft** (Jr.R) engineered a 27-24 overtime win over Tennessee. In 2006, **Ben Olson** (So.R) helped lead the Bruins past Utah 31-10. **Drew Olson** (Fr.) was at the helm of a 34-24 Bruin win in Seattle in 2002. Also in 2002, the Bruins emerged with a 28-18 win over Stanford behind **Matt Moore** (Fr.). In 2001, **Scott McEwan** (Sr.R) piloted the Bruins to a 52-42 win over ASU. In 1999, **Cory Paus** (Fr.R) won his first start, against Fresno State, 35-21. The Bruins won the 1999 season-opener with **Drew Bennett** (Jr.R) under center in a 38-7 decision over Boise State.

On the other side of the ledger, the Bruins came up on the short end of a 24-20 score in **Ossar Rasshan's** (So.R) 2007 debut against Arizona State. Oregon bested the Bruins, 30-20, in Eugene in **Patrick Cowan's** (So.R) first start in 2006. **Ryan McCann** (Fr.R) was under center in USC's 17-7 win over the Bruins in the Coliseum in 1999.

OPENING GAME TRUE FRESHMAN STARTERS — Left tackle **Xavier Su'a-Filo** became the first true freshman (since freshmen became eligible in 1972) to start a season opener on offense in the game against San Diego State. The other position players who have been in the starting lineup for the season-opening game in their true freshman season: 2008-**Rahim Moore**, safety; 2001-**Matt Ware**, cornerback; 1999-**Asi Faoa**, linebacker.

FRESHMEN OVER THE YEARS — A school-record 17 true freshmen played for the Bruins in 1977. Thirteen played in 1975, 12 in 1978, 1980 and 2004 and 10 played in 1979. In recent years, nine played in 2005, eight in 2006, two in 2007 and 11 in 2008. UCLA has played eight freshmen in 2009 (each saw action in the opener against SDSU).

MOST-EVER TRUE FRESHMAN STARTS — **Rahim Moore's** 12 starts last season at free safety were the most by a Bruin true freshman defensive back and the highest total in UCLA history by a true freshman at any non-kicking position. **Jeff Baca's** eight starts along the offensive line in 2008 set a new mark for a Bruin true freshman o-lineman. Wide Receiver **Taylor Embree's** total of eight starts in 2008 were the most ever by a true freshman Bruin at that position.

MEDIA GUIDE UPDATE — One number change - **Rodney Sermons** will wear #2 this season and not #29 as listed in the 2009 media guide.

DID YOU KNOW...

Three Bruin coaches and nine players, including 2008 inductee Troy Aikman, are enshrined in the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Coach Rick Neuheisel still holds the UCLA single season record for completion percentage. Neuheisel completed 185 of 267 passes (69.3%) for 2,245 yards in the 1983 season. He set a then-NCAA record when he completed 25 of 27 passes (92.6%) in a game that season against Washington.

UCLA has 13 former players currently working in the broadcast media - Troy Aikman, Charles Arbuckle, Wayne Cook, Randy Cross, Terry Donahue, Danny Farmer, David Norrie, Ron Pitts, Tom Ramsey, Matt Stevens, J.J. Stokes, Rick Walker, James Washington.

Twenty-two UCLA players have been selected to CoSIDA Academic All-America teams a total of 27 times. Offensive lineman Chris Joseph (2006, 2007) and wide receiver Cormac Carney (1981, 1982) were two-time first-team selections.

UCLA is the only school to produce six quarterbacks — Troy Aikman, Steve Bono, Billy Kilmer, Tommy Maddox, Tom Ramsey, Jay Schroeder — to have played that position on a Super Bowl team.

During the last 27 years (including 2008), UCLA has been ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 on 12 occasions, second only to USC (15) among Pac-10 schools. Washington is next with 10 rankings.

The selection of tight end Mercedes Lewis by the Jacksonville Jaguars in the first round of the 2006 NFL draft marked the 29th time a UCLA player has been taken in round one.

Quarterback Drew Olson finished eighth in the 2005 Heisman Trophy balloting. It marked the 21st time that a Bruin has finished in the top 10 of the Heisman Trophy voting.

UCLA has had at least one former player participate in 28 of the last 30 Super Bowl games.

The only three-time consensus All-Americans in Pac-10 history are Bruins (LB Jerry Robinson and S Kenny Easley).

In the decade of the 2000's, UCLA has had 11 finalists / winners of the National player awards --- 2005 Mercedes Lewis-Mackey Award winner; 2004 M. Lewis, Mackey finalist; 2002 Mike Seidman-Mackey finalist; 2004 Chris Kluwe-Ray Guy Award finalist; 2003 Dave Ball-Bronco Nagurski Award finalist; 2001 Robert Thomas-Dick Butkus Award finalist; 2000 Freddie Mitchell-Fred Biletnikoff Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Vince Lombardi Award finalist; 2006 Justin Hickman-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Ted Hendricks Award finalist; 2003 D. Ball-Chevrolet National Defensive Player of the Year Award.

On May 13, 2007 UCLA became the first school in history to win 100 NCAA team championships (women's water polo).

He orchestrated two big comeback wins in 2008 against Tennessee and Stanford. After completing 7 of 18 passes for 66 yards with four interceptions in the first half of action versus the Vols, Craft went on to complete 18 of 25 attempts for 193 yards after halftime (12 of 14 for 139 yards in the fourth quarter). For the game, he completed 25 of 43 passes for 259 yards. His 43 pass attempts tied for the 11th-most in school history. Against Stanford, Craft connected on a seven-yard scoring pass to tight end Cory Harkey for the game-winning points with 10 seconds remaining. He completed 23 of 39 passes on the day for a total of 285 yards and a pair of touchdowns.

RUNNING BACKS — True senior fullback **CHANE MOLINE (#42)** came off the bench in the 2009 opener (the Bruins did not start a fullback) and made one reception for 13 yards. In the win at Tennessee, he came off the bench and scored the Bruins' only touchdown, making a reception in the flat and turning it into a 12-yard TD. He made one reception for seven yards versus Kansas State and one for six yards at Stanford.

In 2008, he appeared in all 12 games with eight starts (six fullback and two tailback). He rushed for a career-best 72 yards on 11 carries versus Arizona, including a career-long 40-yard run. Moline came off the bench at fullback versus Fresno State and made three receptions for 31 yards, including a 20-yard touchdown - the first scoring reception of his career. True sophomore **DERRICK COLEMAN (#33)** came off the bench to lead the Bruins in rushing versus San Diego State. He ran for 69 yards on four carries, including a 29-yard touchdown on his first carry of the game and a 31-yard run on his second. At Tennessee, he carried six times for one net yard. In the win over Kansas State, he netted 46 yards on eight carries, including a long run of 13 yards. At Stanford, he netted three yards on two carries and also had a three-yard reception. **On the year, he is averaging 5.9 yards per rushing attempt and is 18th in the Pac-10 in rushing with his 29.8 average (119 yards).**

In 2008, Coleman played in the final 10 games of the season and made one start (at Washington). He was second on the squad with 284 yards. Coleman made his debut versus Arizona (game three) after sitting out the first two games of 2008 due to injury. He carried seven times for 24 yards and made two receptions against the Wildcats. Redshirt freshman **JOHNATHAN FRANKLIN (#23)** saw the first action of his career in the season-opener against San Diego State, starting at tailback. On his first carry, he outran defenders to his left and scored a 12-yard touchdown. On the afternoon, he carried 12 times for 43 yards and one score. He started at Tennessee and rushed for 80 yards on 17 attempts. He also made one reception for 10 yards and a first down. In the win over Kansas State, he led the Bruins with 119 net yards on 23 carries. He scored UCLA's first touchdown on a three-yard run and also had a rush of 36 yards, the longest of his career. He became the first Bruin to rush for at least 100 yards since Chris Markey did it in the 2007 Las Vegas Bowl. His 119 yards were the most by a Bruin since Kahlil Bell ran for 142 in the 2007 win over California.

At Stanford, he led the Bruins with 58 net yards on 14 attempts and scored the team's only touchdown on a one-yard run.

He leads the Bruins with 300 rushing yards, averaging 75.0 yards per contest, and is eighth in the Pac-10.

Franklin was a co-winner of the 2008 Charles Pike Memorial Award for Outstanding Offensive Scout Team Player. He rushed for 1,732 yards as a senior at Los Angeles Dorsey HS.

Redshirt junior **CHRISTIAN RAMIREZ (#24)** returns after missing last season due to a failure to meet NCAA eligibility standards. Redshirt junior **TREVOR THERIOT (#31)** made one reception for nine yards against San Diego State. He played on special teams at Tennessee. Against Kansas State, his 32-yard return on a short kickoff set up a Bruin field goal. He played on special teams at Stanford.

Theriot saw action in the first three games of 2008 and made two starts before an injury ended his season. He caught one pass from his fullback position against Tennessee and threw a key block on a Bruin touchdown run. He started versus BYU and Arizona. On the Wednesday prior to the Fresno State game (Sept. 24), he suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in practice and missed the remainder of the season following surgery. He was named Pac-10 All-Academic second team for the second straight year.

Theriot appeared in all 13 games and started six at fullback in 2007. A former walk-on, he earned a scholarship following the 2007 season.

WIDE RECEIVERS — True senior **TERRENCE AUSTIN (#4)** accounted for 160 all-purpose yards in the opener versus San Diego State. On offense, he tied

for the team lead with six receptions (37 yards) and his six-yard touchdown reception gave the Bruins a 23-14 halftime lead. He also returned two kickoffs for 98 yards and three punts for 25 yards. His 65-yard return on a pooch kickoff gave the Bruins possession on the 12-yard line trailing 14-3 and UCLA scored on the next play.

At Tennessee, he accounted for 93 all-purpose yards, including 52 on three kickoff returns, 32 on two punt returns and nine on one reception. Against Kansas State, he made two receptions for 58 yards, including a 51-yard touchdown catch-and-run with 6:18 remaining in the game to give UCLA a 23-9 lead. It was UCLA's longest scoring play since the 2007 Oregon State game. He added 19 yards on two punt returns for 77 all-purpose yards.

At Stanford, he accounted for 117 all-purpose yards. He had 62 on three kickoff returns, eight on two punt returns and 47 yards on three receptions.

Austin ranks ninth in the Pac-10 in all-purpose yards (111.75), 30th (tied) in the NCAA and fourth in the Pac-10 in kickoff returns (26.50), sixth in the Pac-10 in punt returns (9.33) and 15th (tied) in the Pac-10 in receptions (3.00). He also leads the team with 12 receptions.

For his career, Austin ranks fourth in kickoff returns (54), T-third in punt returns (71), 17th in all-purpose yards (3,054) and T-22nd in receptions (84).

Austin saw action in all 12 contests in 2008 and made seven starts. He led the team with 53 receptions (tied for 10th on all-time Bruin season list). Austin ranked second in the Pac-10 and 16th nationally with his average of 156.50 all-purpose yards per game. He also ranked seventh in the Pac-10 in receptions (4.42), fifth in kickoff returns, sixth in punt returns and 19th in receiving yards (38.33).

Austin's 46 kickoff returns set a new UCLA single-season record. He became the first Bruin to break the 1,000-yard barrier for kickoff return yardage (1,109). He is also the only player in school history to gain over 200 yards on kickoff returns in a game twice in a career. His 1,878 all-purpose yards set a new school record, breaking Maurice Jones-Drew's mark of 1,863, set in 2005. In receiving, his 53 catches were the most by a Bruin since Mercedes Lewis in 2005 (58) and tied for 10th on UCLA's single-season list. He earned second-team All-Pac-10 honors as a kick returner.

He made his first start at receiver in last year's season-opener against Tennessee. Against Fresno State, Austin accounted for 298 all-purpose yards on 13 touches. He set a school record with 206 kickoff return yards on six attempts. At California, he accounted for 249 all-purpose yards. He returned seven kickoffs, tying a school record, for 203 yards, three shy of the school record he set versus Fresno State, and his 82-yard return was the longest of his career. At Arizona State, he had 188 all-purpose yards and tied his career high with eight receptions.

UCLA did not allow a sack versus Kansas State and has allowed just three in the last three contests (one at Stanford).

True sophomore **JEFF BACA (#60)** has started at left guard in the first four games of the season and has now made 12 career starts. In 2008, he appeared in nine games with eight starts at left tackle. He made his debut last season versus Arizona and his first start against Fresno State.

Redshirt sophomore **MIKE HARRIS (#65)** started at right tackle in the first four games of the season and has started the last nine games. Last season, he saw his first career action in a start at Cal and went on to start the final five contests.

Paulsen, who is on the John Mackey Award "watch list," started against San Diego State and made one reception (5). At Tennessee, he started and made two receptions (22), including one for 14 yards to start UCLA's second field goal drive of the second half. Versus Kansas State, he made two receptions for 23 yards. At Stanford, caught two passes for 14 yards.

THE DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE — One of the best defensive tackles in the college game, true junior defensive tackle **BRIAN PRICE (#92)** is a pre-season All-America selection and on the "Watch List" for the 2009 Bednarik Award, Nagurski Trophy (both for nation's best defensive player), Outland Trophy (nation's top interior lineman) and Rotary Lombardi Award (nation's top lineman). On Oct. 2, he was added to the Lott Trophy (nation's best defensive player) watch list. He was voted first-team All-Pac-10 by the league's coaches in 2008.

On the year, he ranks 15th (tied) in the NCAA and second in the Pac-10 with 1.75 tackles for loss per game. He leads the team with 7.0 tackles for loss and is tied for the lead with 2.0 sacks (T-10th in Pac-10) and has made 13 tackles on the year.

In the opener versus San Diego State, Price made three tackles, one for loss. At Tennessee, he made a career-best two quarterback sacks and two other tackles for loss among his career-high-tying five solo stops. Against Kansas State, he made three tackles. At Stanford, he made two solo tackles, both for loss (five yards). He has made 28 tackles for loss in his last 20 games (1.40/g) dating back to the 2007 season.

Price started all 12 games in 2008 and led the team with 14.0 tackles for loss (12 in the last nine games) and was seventh in the Pac-10 (1.17/g). He was second on the squad with 4.5 sacks (T-14th in Pac-10).

He opened 2008 with a four-tackle performance against Tennessee, two for loss. Against Fresno State, he intercepted a tipped pass and blocked a PAT that UCLA returned for two points. Redshirt senior defensive end **KOREY BOSWORTH (#55)** is on the "watch list" for the Rotary Lombardi Award and the Ted Hendricks Award. In the opener versus San Diego State, he made two tackles and broke up two passes. In the win at Tennessee, he made four tackle assists, including 0.5 for loss. Against Kansas State, he made three tackles, including 0.5 sacks, and broke up two passes. He started at Stanford but was not credited with a tackle.

In 2008, Bosworth started all 12 games and ranked fifth on the squad with 55 tackles. He led the Bruins with 7.5 sacks and was second with 11.0 tackles for loss. SECONDARY — True senior cornerback **ALTERRAUN VERNER (#1)**, a pre-season All-America selection, is on the 2009 pre-season "watch list" of the Lott Trophy, Bednarik Award and Nagurski Award (all for the nation's top defender), as well as the Thorpe Award (nation's top defensive back). He was selected second-team All-Pac-10 by the leagues' coaches last season and also earned a spot on the Pac-10's All-Academic first team for the second straight year.

In the 2009 opener versus San Diego State, Verner made two tackles. He scored the fourth touchdown of his career when he returned a blocked field goal attempt 70 yards for the final score of the game. At Tennessee, he made six tackles and an interception. In the victory versus Kansas State, he made two interceptions to increase his career total to 11 and added five tackles. His first interception set the stage for UCLA's touchdown drive on its opening possession. At Stanford, he led the Bruins with 11 tackles, including eight solos.

His scoring return was the first by a UCLA true freshman since 1989, when Carlton Gray returned one 65 yards versus Washington. In the win over Arizona, he picked off a fourth-quarter Wildcat pass and returned it 89 yards for a score. It was the longest by a Bruin since Nov. 12, 1994, when Abdul McCullough scored on a 98-yard return versus ASU.

THE KICKERS

KAI FORBATH (#25), a member of the Groza Award pre-season Watch List, has earned numerous pre-season All-America honors this season. In 2008, he earned third-team All-America acclaim from Associated Press and second-team All-Pac-10 honors from the league's coaches.

On the year, he has made 12 of 13 field goals and seven of eight PATs for 43 points. He ranks first in the nation in field goals (3.00) and third in the Pac-10 and 11th (tied) nationally in scoring (10.75).

Forbath has converted 25 of his last 26 field goals (has made nine straight) and had a string of 16 straight successes (final 13 of 2008 and the first three of 2009) snapped at Tennessee when he missed wide from 51 yards. **He has connected on his last 23 straight field goal attempts from a distance of 50 yards or less (his last such miss came on a 47-yard attempt in game 6 last season at Oregon).**

He ranks fourth in school history with 56 field goals and 10th in career scoring with 226 points in just 29 games.

Forbath made field goals of 49 and 50 yards and converted three of four PATs (the other was blocked) for nine points in the 2009 opener against San Diego State. The 50-yard field goal was the seventh of his career of at least 50 yards, a new school record. At Tennessee, he made a career-best four field goals in five attempts and added one PAT for 13 points. He converted on kicks of 26, 39, 31 and 47 yards and missed from 51. He was named Pac-10 Special Teams Player

of the Week. Against Kansas State, he scored 11 points, converting all three field goal attempts (39, 35 and 40) and both PATs. At Stanford, he made all three field goal attempts (29, 34 and 35 yards) plus a PAT for 10 points.

In 2008, he made 19 of 22 field goals on the season. His average of 1.58 field goals tied for the Pac-10 lead last season and ranked ninth (tied) in the NCAA. He was also ninth in the league in scoring and fifth in kick-scoring (6.50).

He began 2008 by connecting from 42 yards in overtime to provide the winning margin against Tennessee. At Oregon, he also handled the kickoff chores for the first time in his career. Forbath is the first UCLA player to record five field goals of at least 50 yards in a season (2007), including a freshman-best 54-yarder (third-longest in school history) versus Oregon. In the Las Vegas Bowl against BYU, he became the second player in school history to kick two field goals of at least 50 yards in the same game (Justin Medlock did it at Oregon in 2004).

Redshirt freshman punter **JEFF LOCKE (#18)** saw his first career action against San Diego State. Locke averaged 38.8 yards on five kicks with two inside the 20-yard line. Just one of the punts was returned for three yards. Locke also handled the kickoff chores, averaging 64.9 yards on seven kickoffs. At Tennessee, he averaged 47.0 yards on four kicks with just one returned for six yards (a second was a touchback). He had a long of 64 yards. He also averaged 66.3 yards on six kickoffs with three touchbacks. Against Kansas State, he averaged 46.7 yards on three kicks (one touchback) with one returned for 11 yards. At Stanford, he averaged 47.8 yards on four kicks (long of 55), putting one inside the 20-yard line. Stanford averaged just 2.8 yards on four punt returns. He also averaged 70 yards on four kickoffs with three touchbacks. Chris Owusa, averaging 59.2 with three touchdowns on kickoff returns, had just one for 34 yards.

On the year, he is averaging 44.6 yards (14th in NCAA and third in the Pac-10) on 16 punts with three inside the 20-yard line and three of 50+ yards. He also has eight touchbacks on kickoffs.

At Tennessee, UCLA converted all three opportunities for 13 points (one passing td and two fgs). Against Kansas State, the Bruins scored on all three chances for 10 points (one rushing td and one fg). At Stanford, UCLA converted all four attempts for 16 points (one rushing td and three fgs).
- * On the year, opponents have converted 10 of 13 (76.9%) Red Zone opportunities

for 53 points - six touchdowns (one passing, five running) and four field goals. San Diego State converted one of three Red Zone opportunities for seven points (passing td). UCLA blocked a field goal and made an interception on the other two possessions. Tennessee scored 13 points (one rushing td and two fgs) by converting three of four opportunities.
